Everyone knows that a postman s hard on shoes, so when chemists the United States Department Agriculture wanted help in an experiment to determine the rela-tive wearing qualities of sole leath-er tanned by different processes they asked postmen in Washington, D. C., to wear the test shoes.

Rule No. 5 Rules Posted: The owner, operator or manager of every barber shop, school or college shall keep a copy of these rules to be furnished by the State Board of Health posted in a conspicuous place in said shop for the information and guidance of the persons working and employed therein and the public generally.

Rule No. 6. Water: All barber shops or beauty parlors, barber schools or colleges shall be supplied with an adequate, portable supply of hot and cold running water. Water must be supplied by the City system, or if no city supply, from a tank or similar gravity pressure container.

Rule No. 7. Proper quarters: Every barber shop, barber school or college shall be well lighted and heated, well ventilated and kept in a clean, orderly and sanitary con-dition. All shops and parlors, schools and colleges using artificial heat should maintain a temperature not exceeding 72 degrees. Spitting on the floor prohibited.

**Builders Urged to Design Living Room For Comfort and Livability**

The home builder should make certain that the living room is large enough. A weakness of many such rooms is the small area. When the furniture is placed the room is cramped. The width of the living room should be thirteen to fifteen feet while the length should be in the neighborhood of twenty-two feet. This allows ample room for attractively arranging the furniture and for the display of the rugs and other furnishings.

If possible the living room should have windows on three sides. Ce.tainly plenty of window space should be available on two of the sides. Cross ventilation is important for during the summer days by throwing open the windows a breeze can be enticed into the room, cooling its occupants.

**Exposure Important** The exposure of the living room should be preferably to the South and West. This allows the prevailing winds to cool the interior and during the colder months of the year to sun to enter, creating a bright, cheerful atmosphere.

Those living rooms which are located on other sides of the house are often dark and lifeless. A living room on the North may be cool in summer but if the rays of sum never enter it lacks something that

Comfort and convenience is paramount in the living room. To fully live up to its name it must be ar-ranged and equipped with those ac-cessories and furnishings that promote this feeling.

Lighting, not only natural, but artificial as well, is important. Plenty of windows are needed to let in the clear light of day. At the same time, the electrical equipment should be such that good light is available after sunset.

The living room needs an abund. ance of lamps. The chandeliers, for in a long room two are often advisable, are used for general light-ing. Many housewives prefer to eliminate these center lighting fixtures but since they have a purpose, lighting engineers advise that they be placed in position to meet the demand which may be necessary from time to time.

Side wall lighting fixtures are growing in popularity and often are used as a substitute for the chandelier. Their real purpose is often to provide a spot of color to the room, decorative rather than useful.

#### **Electrical Outlets**

The growing use of floor lamps makes it necessary to provide the living room with plenty of electrical outlets. These should be placed on each wall of the room and in the case of long living rooms two to a side are convenient.
