Work Under Way On New Sound System At Palace Theatre

Research Expert Arrives To

F. R. von der Hoya, electrical engineer from the Research Laboratories of New York City, arrived in Floydada early yesterday to begin the installation of the new \$17,000 Western Electric Sound system at the Palace Theatre. Active work on the installation of the new equipment began Saturday afternoon, and will continue at every possible opportunity during the week, according to J. G. Deakins, manager of the Floydada Theatres.

Because of the extensive work necessary to install the Western Electric system, it will be necessary for the theatre to be closed on Friday and Saturday of this week, Mr. Deakins stated. Shows will continue through the first four days of the week, but the theatre will not operate on Friday and Saturday, matinees nor nights.

It is expected that everything will be in readiness for the formal opening of the Greater Palace on Sunday afternoon of next week. At the grand opening, the Palace will present the first showing

Whether the body will be returned to Floydada for the funeral and interment or whether it will be sent to Austin will not be known until after he is able to communicate with the South Texas relatives.

The Rix-Sanders ambulance answered the call when the accident was reported, Mr. McCarty, the attendant said.

Husband And Two Sons Survive Wreck Victim

Mrs. Fred Bell, whose death occurred last night between nine and ten o'clock on the Ralls-Lubbock Highway, two miles east of Idalou, as she with three companions, was enroute to Lubbock, has been a resident of Floyd and Briscoe Counties for more than twenty years. For fifteen years the family resided in Silverton, where Mr. Bell was engaged in the grocery business, with G. S. Morris, late of Lockney, as his partner. The family has been residents of Floydada since the spring of 1925, coming here from Lockney. At that place Mr. Bell was engaged in the cotton buying business for two seasons.

After moving to Floydada he engaged in the automobile business as Chevrolet dealer, later operating the Floydada Bottling Company. Mr. Bell's most recent activity has been the taking of the official census of the city of Floydada.

Two sons, Floyd, 18, and Ted, 9, also survive the deceased. The older is a mem-

was Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Cardwell, were laying on the ground with their feet under the overturned Ford roadster in the bar-pit. One of the women had gotten up and was getting in another car.

"An examination of the injuries disclosed that Mrs. Bell's neck had been broken and she seemed to be hurt about the chest. She was still alive when the ambulance left with her for Lubbock.

"I gave Mrs. Cardwell a hypodermic to ease her suffering. She had a deep wound on the head and was injured internally.

"Mrs. Berry had a broken collar bone. She probably had several broken ribs on the left side.

"I talked with the driver, Mrs. Cantwell, and she said that the women were sitting in the same seat when they turned over. She said that they were driving about 35 or 40 miles per hour when they met a car with blinding lights. She said in turning out to permit the other car to pass she swerved to the right more than she anticipated and was turning over before she realized the car wheels were so near the bar-pit.

"The car was facing west and was completely wrecked. From appearances it had turned over two or three times. The embankment at the place of the wreck was not especially high.

Before the ambulance left some 20 or 30 people had gathered at the scene.

who was driving the car that

had the bright lights that apparently was responsible for the accident."

Mrs. Cantwell, driver of the car, when interviewed about the accident, was calm and well composed, the Avalanche-Journal reporter said. A cut on her right hand was her only injury, apparently.

In telling of the accident, Mrs. Cantwell said: "I hardly know how it occurred. I was blinded by the lights of an approaching car. Before we knew what was happening we were turning over in the ditch by the side of the road."

The emergency ambulance rushing the injured women to the Lubbock Sanitarium was met at the Santa Fe under-pass by C. E. Luce, Lubbock motorcycle police force, and he cleared a way for the ambulance through the traffic to the hospital.

Mrs. Cardwell's condition was unchanged at 4 o'clock this morning, a telephone conversation with Mrs. Anna Barton, night supervisor of the Lubbock Sanitarium, indicated.

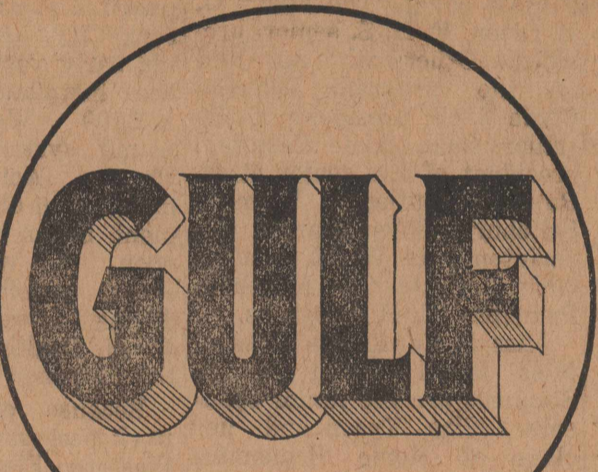

THREE OTHER FLOYDADA WOMEN HURT

"No operation was performed on Mrs. Cardwell, but she was taken to the operating room where a deep five-inch cut on her head was sewed up. The doctors stated that they did not believe her skull had been fractured. An X-ray will be made this morning to determine the extent of her injuries. The doctors stated that her chest seemed to be injured, but said they would not be able to tell how much she was hurt until an examination was made today. She is very ill and is not expected to live, the doctors have indicated.

"The doctors stated that Mrs. Berry had a broken collar-bone on the left side. She was terribly shocked and shaken up. An X-ray will be made of her chest today."

Mrs. Bess Cantwell, driver of the car, is owner and joint operator with Mrs. Effie Cardwell of the Marinello Beauty Parlor in this city, acquiring the business about five years ago. Her husband, J. Cantwell, is owner and manager of the De Luxe Bar-Shop in which the beauty parlor is located. The Cantwells formerly resided at L. A. Egan, Texas. Mrs. Cantwell being a daughter of Mrs. Andrews.

Mrs. Effie Cardwell has no relatives in Floydada. She has relatives at Waco and brother who resides at Verdugo, Mrs. Ama Smalley said this morning at 12:30 before leaving for Lubbock. The physicians who treated Mrs. Cardwell told friends here by telephone that they had little hope for Mrs. Cardwell's recovery, her death being expected before morning.

Mrs. Sam Berry, who is less seriously injured than Mrs. Cardwell it is thought, resides in the 400 block on

West Missouri Street with her son, Raymond. Another son, Alan, is engaged as salesman with a drug store in Littlefield, and Mr. Berry, her husband, is salesman with the C. E. Stone Company Store at Turkey. His son, Raymond, when he left Floydada was not aware of the extent of his mother's injuries.

Immediately following the report of the accident reaching Floydada, Dr. and Mrs. Andrews, Raymond Berry and Mr. Cantwell left for Lubbock. Mr. Bell left about 11 o'clock and his son left for Lubbock about 12 o'clock, accompanied by Dave Luttrall, Howard Welborn and other school friends.

Other friends of members of the party who left here to attend victims of the accident included Mrs. Jno. N. Farris, Mrs. J. B. Jenkins, Mrs. Ama Smalley, and Mr. and Mrs. B. Hatley, who left here between 12:30 and 1 o'clock this morning.

First reports that reached Floydada came to Dr. Andrews by telephone, who was advised of the wreck and of the injury sustained by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Cantwell, and to Raymond Berry, who said a short time before he left for Lubbock that he had just retired and was awakened from slumber by the ringing of the bell.

"Mother and the other ladies were driving my car over to Lubbock where they were to be joined by my brother, Alan from Littlefield. After bringing them home he was to have taken the car back with him to Littlefield," Raymond said. At that time he had not learned just how serious were the injuries of his mother, and was greatly agitated for fear that the injuries would prove fatal.
