## STRANGE CASE OF LUBBOCK MAN SPEAKS FOR CRAZY WATER

Thought To Be Hopeless Yet He Lived To Tell **His Story** 

Three weeks ago today, I came to the Crazy Water Hotel on a stretch-er from the city of Lubbock, Texas, with what the doctors called Typhoid Spine, and they told me that there was no medicine that would cure me. The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Dec. 7. Stephen's Contribution to Christianity. Acts 6:7-10;7:54-60.


The contribution that Stephen nade to Christianity may be considered under two aspects; namely the effect of his witness and martyrdom upon the course of early




