Notations at the heading of the large sheet of heavy brown paper reads as follows: "Mustered in 30th Day of April, 1862, Regiment of Rifles, Capt. John B. Moore, Army of the Confederate States of America."

The document has been well preserved and the writing in ink is clearly visible. The 69-yearold roll is one of the few remaining relics of its kind of the Civil War and is consdered highly valuable by its owner

Maximum loan \$3 per acre, on land under cultivation, \$600 to individual; \$2,000 to landlord with terants or to lessee with tenants

Loans extended only for stock food, fertilizer, gas and oil for tractors, and seed.

A farmer will be granted loan only on row crops in county in which he resides unless other crops are also in certified

Tenant farmers, owning teams and equipment, showing distressed condition due directly to drouth only are eligible after signing affidavit to that effect

Interesting and informative data a brief visit in Ralls while in this accompanied the exhibit for use in section. the lecture. Part of an article by Florence Topping Green, chairman of arts and crafts, General Federation, on the subject of "American Art and the Potter's Wheel," read as follows:

The making of pottery is one of oldest decorative arts in the world; the most artistic pottery is still made by hand or on the pot-ter's wheel; first the clay is carefully washed, the flint and feldspar finely ground; these materials are placed in "plungers" with water and kneaded. The mass is then sifted

and worked through canvas bags. The process used a thousand years ago when the ancients operated the potter's wheel in the Valtoday, the kneaked clay is cut, the potter throws it on a flat revolving disc resting on a pivot, he thrusts his thumbs into the clay and with both hands forms it into a cone. The wheel still revolving, he draws the clay outward and upward until the vase rises into shape under his hand. No two forms can possibly be alike for the lightest touch controls the shapes and makes the artistic variations so impossible to achieve by mechanical means. Without being fired, the moist clay shapes are turned over to artists who decorate upon the soft surface a lovely design either floral, landscape or conventional. Then the decoration is worked into the vase by slip-painting modeling. "Slip" is clay and water mixed with mineral colors. After this, the piece is ready for

In modern factories the wheels are driven by electricity, each workman regulating his own. In making hollow pieces the clay is carefully pressed into a mold, made in two parts, which are then brought together. The seams are covered with clay which is smoothed, when dry the pieces are removed. Handles, spouts, lids, etc., which have been made in other moulds, are fastened to the ware or "slips." Then they are protected by "saggers" made of fire clay, and placed in a kiln. This is called baking the 'biscuit." The next process is to dip the ware into a tub filled with glaze, then it is carried to the glost kiln for a second firing. If the pieces touch in the kiln, they are said to kiss," this ruins the vase because the glaze melts and they stick together. Sometimes the pottery is decorated over glaze or under glaze; most of this work is done by artists entirely free hand, sometimes the designs are engraved on copper plates and transferred to the surface of the

Pottery has recorded the earliest artistic efforts of the savage tribes and in a good pot found the two first principles of art; form and color. It is interesting to watch the Pueblo Indians at work.

Sometimes they use a basket as a mould and a pivot, thus becoming an incipient form of the wheel; sometimes the crude patterns are made by partial applications of textiles and by impressing bits of cord in geometrical arrangement.

The Acoma Indians have two distinct forms of design upon their pottery, the flower, leaf and bird forms, together with a beautiful scroll; and the other, a convention-


