

# They're Free!

Iran freed the 52 American hostages today on the 444th day of captivity in exchange for return of its \$8 billion in frozen assets, giving Jimmy Carter a dramatic victory in the closing minutes of his presidency.

The liberated captives flew from the Moslem nation just after nightfall aboard two Algerian 727 aircraft.

Word of the release came at 10:35 a.m. CST by telephone to London from Tehran airport officials, at the end of days of non-stop negotiations in four capitals involving bankers and government officials in the largest financial transaction in history.

Shortly after 1 p.m. CST, President Reagan announced that the 52 hostages were "free of Iran."

The U.S. Treasury confirmed the \$8 billion was transferred to an Algerian account in London, to be turned over to Iran.

Algerian officials said the hostages were expected to arrive in Algiers at approximately midnight local time (6 p.m. CST). The Air Algérie aircraft carrying the hostages and their baggage were expected to land at Ankara airport in Turkey for refueling.

Their freedom came just minutes before the engineer of the triumph, Jimmy Carter, surrendered his presidency to Ronald Reagan despite finally prevailing over the dilemma that contributed to his crushing election defeat Nov. 4 — ironically, the anniversary of the seizure of the hostages in Tehran.

Carter's hopes of greeting the returning Americans while he was still chief

of state were dashed Monday by the last-minute hitches that extended over two days. But President Reagan graciously invited Carter to go to Wiesbaden, West Germany, and greet the Americans as Reagan's personal representative after the inauguration, and Carter accepted.

The liberated Americans included diplomats, 20 military guards, communications specialists and a businessman. About 20 are servicemen. The Americans ranged in age from 20 to 64.

Lights burned in government offices in Tehran, Algiers, Washington and London throughout the morning as the final mechanism to deposit the assets in an Algerian account in London for transfer to Iran — the "go" signal for the long-awaited release — was accomplished.

The assets were frozen by Carter Nov. 14, exactly 10 days after the hostages were seized by 450 militants who stormed the U.S. Embassy to protest the hospitalization in New York of the exiled shah. For months until the shah's death of cancer in July in Cairo, the militants demanded the fallen monarch's return as the price for freedom for the hostages.

More than 90 hostages were initially taken hostage. Sixty-six were Americans. Thirteen American hostages — women and blacks — were released Nov. 19 and Nov. 20 with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini calling it a victory for oppressed minorities. A 14th hostage, Richard Queen, 23, of New York, who was suffering from multiple sclerosis, was freed July 11.

The release on inauguration day ended 14½ months of U.S. frustration and feelings of helplessness. The hostage seizure inflamed Americans. Iranian

students were attacked early in the crisis by enraged Americans and cries for the students' deportation resounded through the country.

Diplomatically, the impasse paralyzed much of U.S. foreign policy and contributed to an image of U.S. impotence. Throughout the drawn-out dilemma, America never got its European allies to go along with complete sanctions against Iran.

The blocking of the assets were one of the earliest steps taken to force a solution. It was followed by U.S.-backed condemnation of the hostage-taking at the United Nations and the successful pursuit of a suit at the World Court in The Hague, the Netherlands. The court ruled the Iranian government's backing of the hostage seizure illegal.

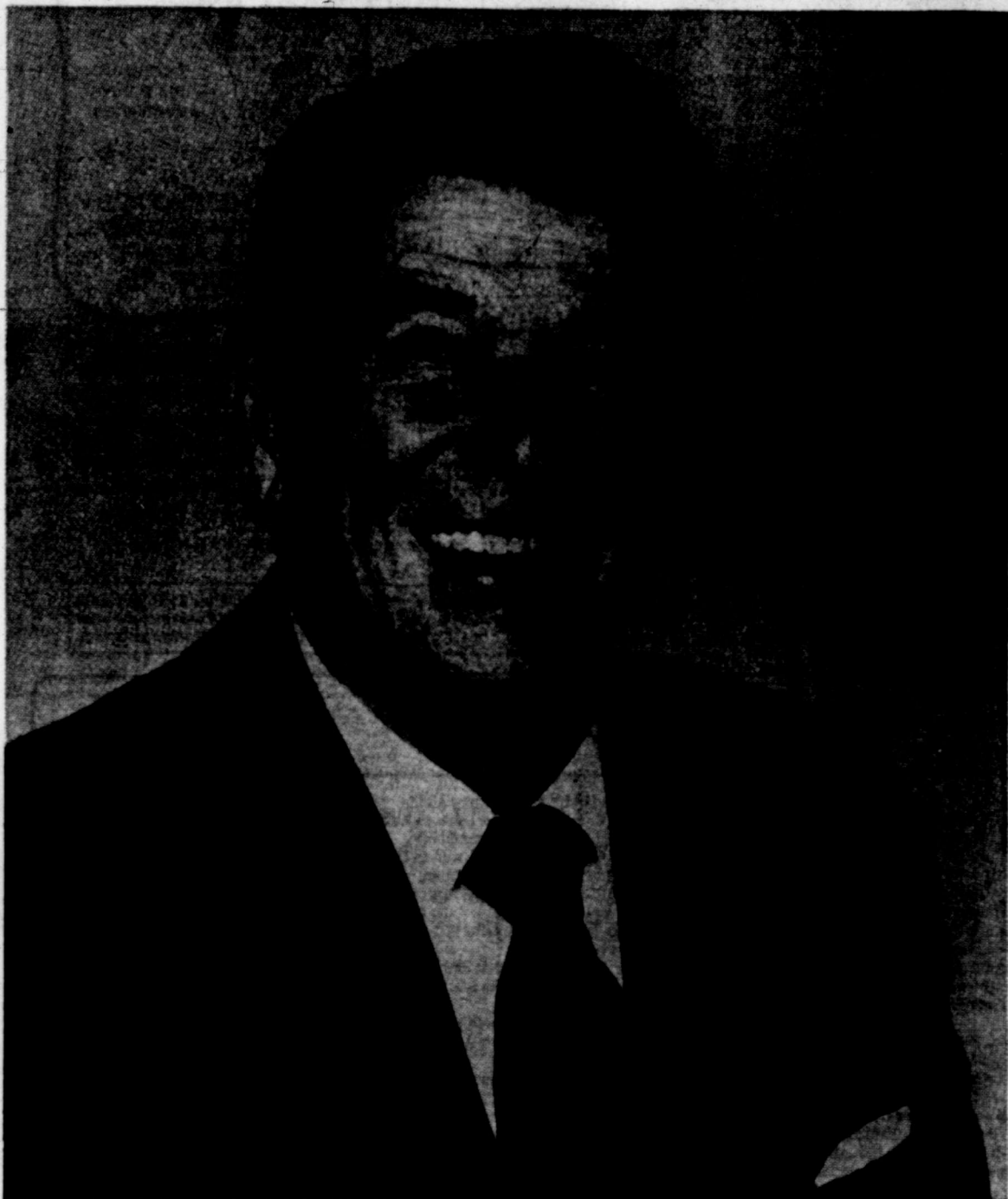
But the most dramatic attempt to force a solution was an April 25 military rescue raid that ended in a debacle in the Iranian desert, killing eight American servicemen — burned to death when a helicopter collided with an aircraft. Ironically, the two craft collided as the American commando group was trying to pull out after the mission was called off due to mechanical failure.

The rescue attempt angered the militants, who promptly announced they were dispersing the Americans from the Embassy to different sites around Iran. And their whereabouts following the April mission were unknown.

All Monday night, messages flew back between Carter and Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher in the go-between capital of Algiers. White House Press Secretary Jody Powell came out to speak to the press five times

## Reagan Urges 'Renewal'

### Address Stresses Hope

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan was inaugurated as 40th president of the United States today, summoning Americans to "an era of national renewal" amid bells and cannon, music and pageantry that became a celebration, too, for 52 American hostages, reported free at last from Iranian bondage.

There was no official U.S. confirmation at the inaugural hour that the prisoners had in fact begun their flight to freedom, and Reagan did not mention the hostages in a 20-minute inaugural address that pronounced every American a hero.

An hour later, however, he was able to say "they are airborne."

At the stroke of noon, power passed from James Earl Carter Jr., Democrat, to Ronald Wilson Reagan, Republican, conservative, veteran of Hollywood, governor of California, overwhelming choice of his countrymen.

Denied a second term, Carter watched as Reagan raised his right hand, put his left on a family Bible, and swore the simple, 35-word oath of office. Moments before, George Bush had taken the almost identical oath of vice presidential office.

He began the oath four minutes before he began the term. When it was done, Carter joined the applause, a brittle smile on his face. A 21-gun salute boomed over the Capitol and the marble monuments of American government.

A crowd estimated at 70,000 watched the ceremony at the West Front of the Capitol, swelling across the broad lawn below on a mild January noon.

Reagan was in formal morning coat, Mrs. Reagan in red.

Applause sounded as the new president vowed to take action, "beginning today," on the economy, promised sacrifice for peace, but never surrender, declared that there would be no compromise in his effort to shrink government and its tax burden.

In Carter's final hour, a policeman at Tehran airport said the hostages had taken off on the first leg of a journey home. But as Carter stepped to the inaugural stand to yield office, he said simply, "not yet."

Carter and Reagan agreed that neither would announce release of the hostages before they had cleared Iranian airspace, their spokesmen said.

The Iranian news agency Pars reported that an Algerian airliner, carrying the hostages had taken off from Tehran's Mehrabad Airport.

Reagan said he means to curb the size and influence of the government he now heads. He said he will make government "work with us, not over us... stand by our side, not ride on our back."

He promised to ease the tax burden, restore the balance between various levels of government, promote American enterprise.

"These will be our first priorities and on these principles, there will be no compromise," he said.

And in an era of renewal at home, Reagan said, the nation will stand abroad as "the exemplar of freedom and a beacon of hope for those who do not now have freedom."

He promised the United States will be a faithful ally to friends, and told potential adversaries that peace is America's highest aspiration. "We will negotiate for it, sacrifice for it, we will not surrender for it — now or ever."

Reagan said forbearance should never be misread as a failure of will. "When action is required to preserve our national security, we will act," he said. "We will maintain sufficient strength to prevail if

In his inaugural address, Reagan told Americans:

"With all the creative energy at our command, let us begin an era of national renewal. Let us renew our determination, our courage and our strength. Let us renew our faith and our hope. We have every right to dream heroic dreams."

Reagan said Americans are entitled, for they are themselves heroes, "you, the citizens of this blessed land."

"Your dreams, your hopes, your goals are going to be the dreams, the hopes and goals of this administration, so help me God."

Reagan's invocation to his new administration began with a pledge to confront and handle "an economic affliction of the worst proportions. We must act today in order to preserve tomorrow. And let there be no misunderstanding — we are going to act beginning today."

The new president said the nation's economic ills "will not go away in days, weeks, or months, but they will go away."

"In this present crisis, government is not the solution; it is the problem," Reagan said, a line sounded day after campaign day in the quest that won him the

## Families Of Hostages Rejoice Over Release

Families of the 52 American hostages rejoiced today at word that, after 444 days of anguish, their loved ones were on their way home.

For the people who had waited so long, it was a time for celebration and for forgiveness. But many still were hesitant to believe the good news they had seen snatched from their grasps so many times before.

"Yahoo!" shouted Philip Kennedy, 21, son of hostage diplomat Moorehead Kennedy.

"Yahoo!" he bellowed. "Thank you." He said the past few days have "been like a movie — it's so dramatic."

He had no comment on the agreement that brought about the hostages release.

"They're on the way home. That's all that matters. I'll analyze it later."

Theresa Lodeski, who spent 443 days in control of her emotions, wept when she heard the news her son, Bruce Ger-

man, and the 51 other American hostages had left Tehran for freedom.

Relatives and reporters crowded five and six deep around Mrs. Lodeski in the family's Edwardsville, Pa., cafe to hug her and join in her celebration of German's release.

"She's very happy, very exhausted," said a relative. "She's crying and talking at the same time and singing 'America the Beautiful' with the television."

The song opened the inaugural ceremonies for Ronald Reagan in Washington, D.C.

Andrew Appel, attorney for the family of hostage Duane Gilette of Columbia, Pa., said he is "going to the Gilettes with a magnum of champagne" as soon as the State Department confirmed the release.

For Howard Ode of Midland, Mich., it was "one of the happiest days of my life."

"I had a feeling it was going to come," said Ode, brother of freed hostage Robert Ode. "I was severely disap-

pointed yesterday, as I'm sure all the rest of the families were. I've been an extreme optimist.

"I feel our hopes and prayers would finally be answered and I guess they are. I'll feel a lot better when I see him getting off that plane in Germany."

Nancy Ward of Houston, sister of hostage Marine Sgt. Johnny McKeel, was elated.

"This is unreal. I just think it's the most wonderful news in the world. If it's really true, it's wonderful. If it's not, I think I'll go over to Iran and stomp them all."

What will it take for her to believe it? "I guess for them to get on German soil, or at least get in Algeria."

David Engelmann, brother of Navy Lt. Cmdr. Robert Engelmann, declined to comment on the news the hostages had been freed.

"I'm not going to make a comment until all 52 are on the ground in Germany," he said. "I'm still skeptical."

## Officials Probe Daniel Slaying

LIBERTY (UPI) — Investigators said today they planned to question the wife of former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr., who was shot to death at his home late Monday.

"When a husband is shot and the only other person around is his wife, well, you have to question her," Liberty County Sheriff Buck Echols said early today.

"We feel like she was involved."

"She was pretty hysterical and they took her to the hospital, gave her a sedative and we haven't talked her yet," he said. "We expect to talk to Mrs. Daniel later today."

Echols said authorities had ruled out suicide.

Officers found Daniel's body in a hallway between the kitchen and a carport shortly after 7:43 p.m. Monday, when Mrs. Daniel summoned an ambulance to the home.

"We recovered a shotgun and a .22-caliber rifle from the house. We believe

at this time he was shot with the .22," Echols said.

He said wounds indicated Daniel was "shot more than once" and authorities retrieved two spent cartridges in the kitchen.

Mrs. Daniel and the couple's two children were believed to have been in the home when the shooting occurred, he said.

Daniel's body was taken to Ben Taub Hospital in Houston, where an autopsy will be performed, Echols said.

Sheriff's deputies were notified after ambulance attendants arrived and discovered Daniel was dead.

Mrs. Daniel, the former Vickie Moore of Liberty, filed for divorce in 1977 but withdrew the petition a month later. The couple was married three years after Daniel's divorce from his first wife.

Daniel, 40, won election to the speakership on a reform platform in the aftermath of the turbulent Sharpstown bank-

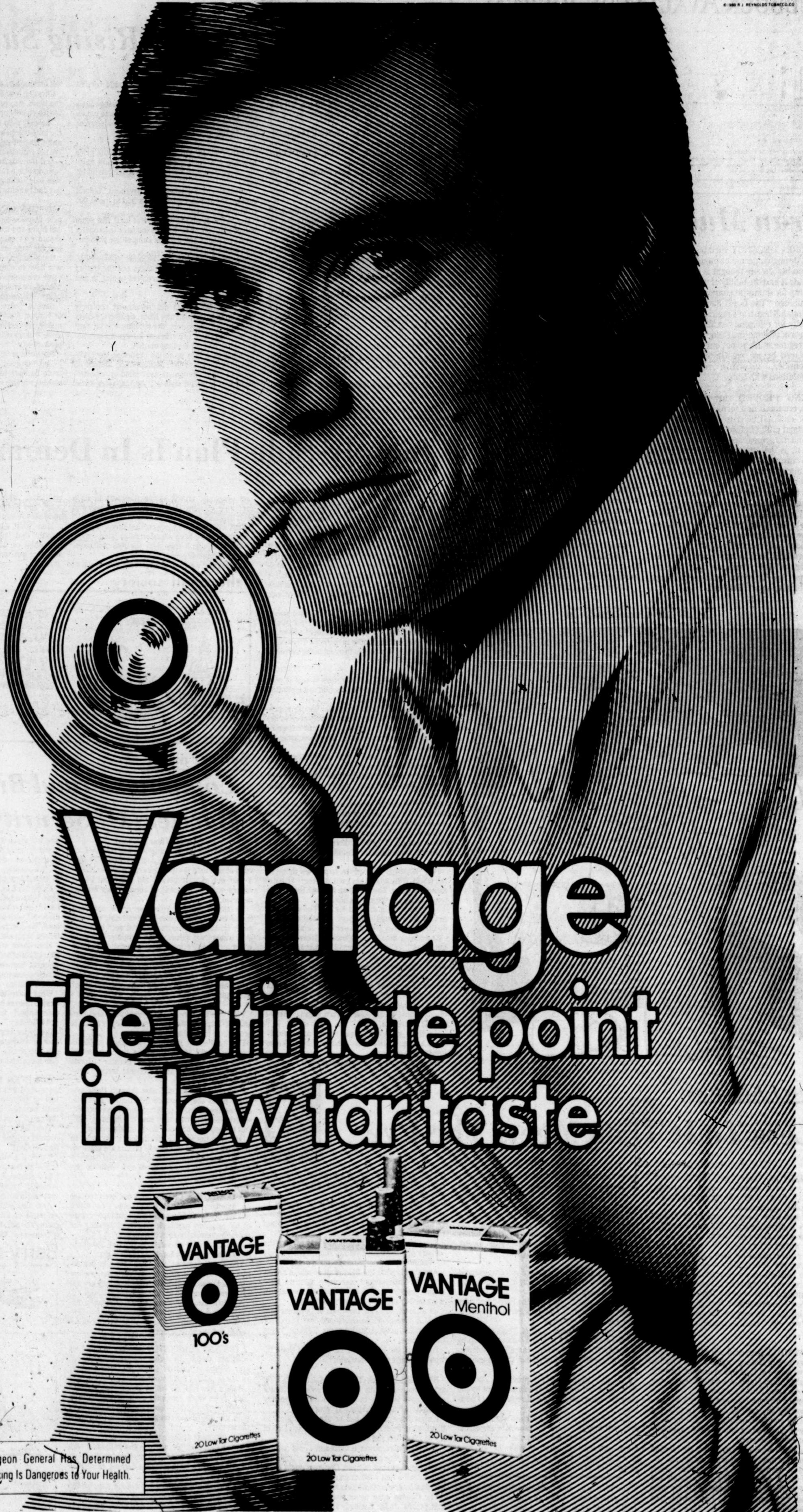

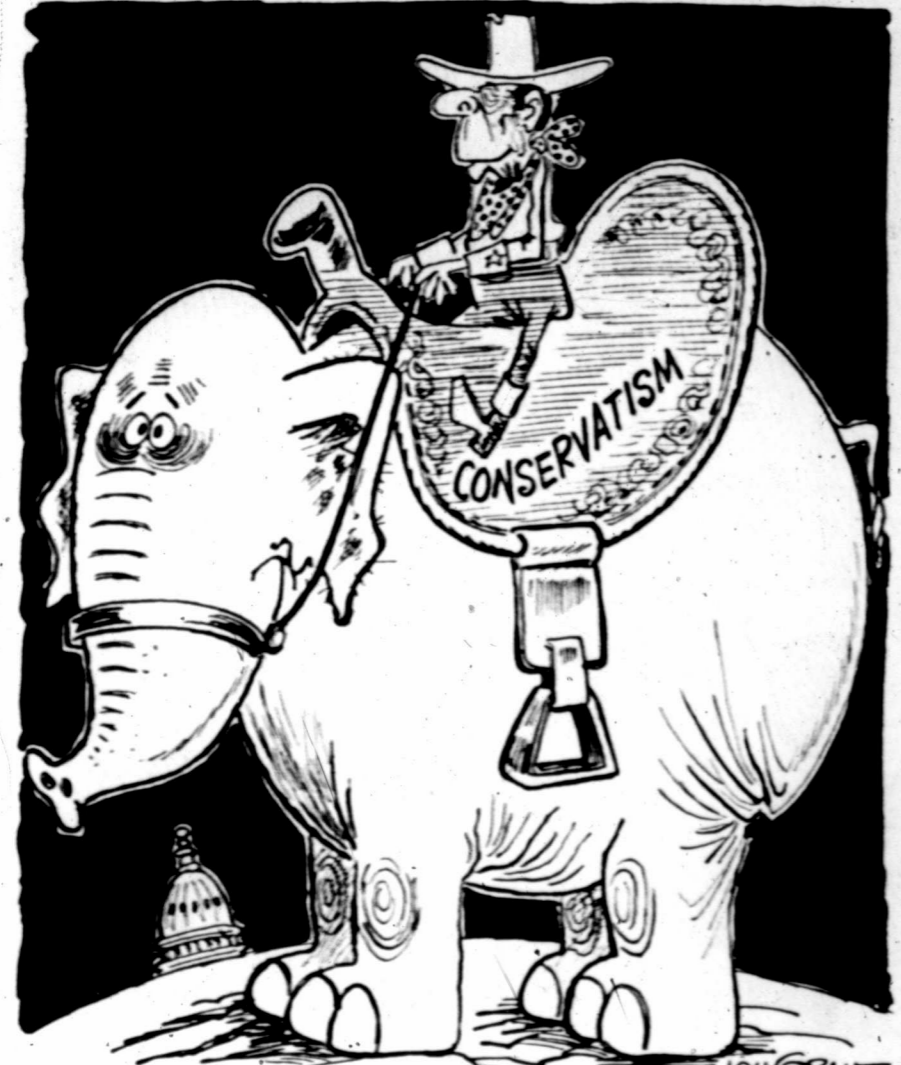

# Judge Delays Harrelson Hearing Until April 6

HOUSTON (AP) — Convicted hit man Charles V. Harrelson, who has been questioned by federal agents concerning the 1979 killing of a federal judge, must wait until April 6 to learn whether all cases pending against him must be thrown out.

The decision by Judge Thomas Routh followed a brief private conversation with Mary Sinderson, an assistant U.S. attorney who asked that the subpoena for FBI Special Agent Mario Gonzalez be thrown out.

Harrelson, 42, who has been in the jail since September on state charges, also has been questioned in the federal investigation of the 1979 slaying of U.S. District Judge John Wood Jr. in San Antonio.

## State Leaders Honor Confederate Heroes

AUSTIN (AP) — Confederate Heroes Day, a state holiday honoring the men who lost the Civil War, was celebrated here with speeches by top officials, the unveiling of a poster, and a salute to the Confederate flag.

He called the Civil War a "war of principle, as stated on this monument." Hobby and other speakers noted, however, that many Texans were Union sympathizers and anti-secessionists, including Sam Houston, a hero of Texas' war for independence from Mexico, first president of the Republic of Texas, and governor at the beginning of the Civil War.

Jan. 19, which the Legislature has designated Confederate Heroes Day, is also Lee's birthday.

Clark is one of the poster's "Confederate Heroes."

During a jail interview with newsmen after discovery of the tape recorders, Harrelson said federal officials are out to nail him in the Wood case because "they have to get somebody."

"With today's tendencies to discredit our heroes, it is indeed refreshing to be part of this celebration," Clayton told the audience of about 100 meeting in the United Daughters of the Confederacy museum, near the Capitol.

Harris County District Attorney John Holmes has denied knowledge of the tape recorders and federal officials and Sheriff Jack Heard have refused comment.

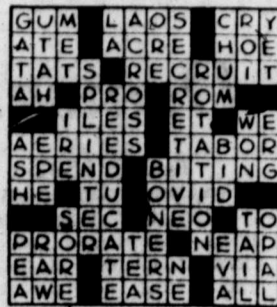

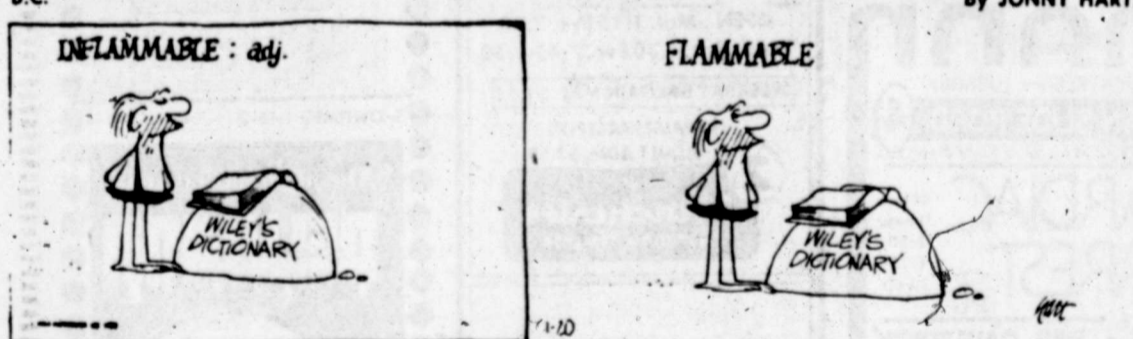

# Custer's Relative Sets Own Military Records

DAVENPORT, Iowa (AP) — Walter Custer makes little of the fact that he is a relative of Gen. George Armstrong Custer.

The 54-year-old Army sergeant carries the family name proudly, but is not one to claim kinship to the famous Army general for self-fulfillment. This Custer can stand alone.

"They say I'm his 32nd cousin," said Custer, brushing his close-cropped gray hair with a leathery hand.

"My brother looked up our family tree and that's what he found. I'm sure he's right, but I'm just going on hearsay."

George Armstrong Custer was an 1861 graduate of West Point who distinguished himself as an Indian fighter in the Southwest and in the Dakota and Montana territories.

He made his famous "Last Stand" when about 200 members of his Seventh Cavalry were killed by Sioux Indians at the Little Big Horn River in Montana.

To Walter Custer, a soft-spoken sergeant first class stationed at the Rock Island Arsenal, the exploits of his famous cousin are exciting. But in almost 33 years as a soldier, this Custer has his own battle biographies in World War II and Vietnam.

After being drafted in October 1942 in his native Chambersburg, Pa., Custer

was assigned as a gunner to the 139th Glider Infantry, a unit of the 17th Airborne Division.

He fought in the Battle of the Bulge and helped in the Rhine River crossing. His unit was also part of the drive into Luxembourg, which was the largest airborne operation ever attempted.

Custer left the Army in 1945 but returned three years later when he was laid off his railroad job in Chambersburg. He served first as a marksmanship instructor for trainees at Fort Dix, N.J., and later as a machine-gun squad leader with the First Infantry Division in Germany.

Custer was discharged again in 1953, but remained in a reserve unit while he worked as an artillery repairman at Lettkenny Army Depot in his hometown. At the same time he enrolled in a Red Cross advanced first-aid course, which proved valuable later in his career.

His reserve unit was called to active duty in May 1968 to provide aviation maintenance support in Vietnam. After taking jungle-survival training at Fort Benning, Ga., Custer was sent to Bien Hoa Air Base with his unit's equipment.

As an aircraft armament sergeant, his first task was to scrounge for building materials and set up a shop to repair downed airplanes and helicopters. Once the facility was built, Custer's crew of 14 soldiers and three civilians worked night

and day to keep the aircraft flying.

During that same time, Custer was ordered to set up the unit's medical evacuation team, a task he finished after teaching first-aid classes for three days.

On June 6, 1969, his teaching paid off when the Viet Cong hit the 200-man camp.

"Charley hit us with mortars and rockets, knocking down more than half of the 32 squad tents," Custer said. "They blew up the runway, a large tanker aircraft and a supply of JP-4 (aircraft fuel). Two men were killed and 18 were injured."

With shrapnel in his knee, Custer and his five-man medical team worked to save the injured.

Custer was awarded his second Bronze Star, this one with a combat "V." He also has three Army Commendation Medals and the Air Medal.

Custer returned to Vietnam two years later, but was sent home when he was found to have diabetes. After stints at Fort Carson, Colo., Fort Benning and Germany, he came to the Rock Island Arsenal as a weapons armament supervisor and instructor in the maintenance directorate.

After nearly 33 years of federal service, Custer, who lives with his wife, Dorothy, in Davenport, said he still loves the Army.

## Reduce Fat In Diet

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My 17-year-old daughter is 5 feet 2 and weighs 136 pounds. She is very solidly built. She is the only member of the family who is overweight. I have been trying to help her diet (without nagging) for the last six months. I took her to a doctor and she has no health problems. I was very disappointed in his advice. All he told her was to cut down on carbohydrates. Would you please send me your Health Letter, Weight Losing Diet? Will she lose weight on it if she follows it faithfully? She will exercise for a short time and then give it up. I think if she would get more exercise this would help. She has too much weight on her stomach and legs.

DEAR READER — There seems to be a national kick on cutting down on carbohydrates. It is often a misguided effort. The most calories in most American diets are from fat — not carbohydrates. A gram of fat contains nine calories while a gram of carbohydrate only contains four. Beyond that, the biggest factor affecting the calories in food is the water and fiber content. Many carbohydrate foods are low calories foods because they contain lots of water and bulk. Most vegetables are in this category and certainly most salads — unless you add a fat-containing salad dressing.

her food wherever possible. You can help in this by preparing foods without significant amounts of fat.

Of course, sweets and concentrated starches should be avoided. Why? Because they contain very little water or bulk and that causes them to be high calorie foods.

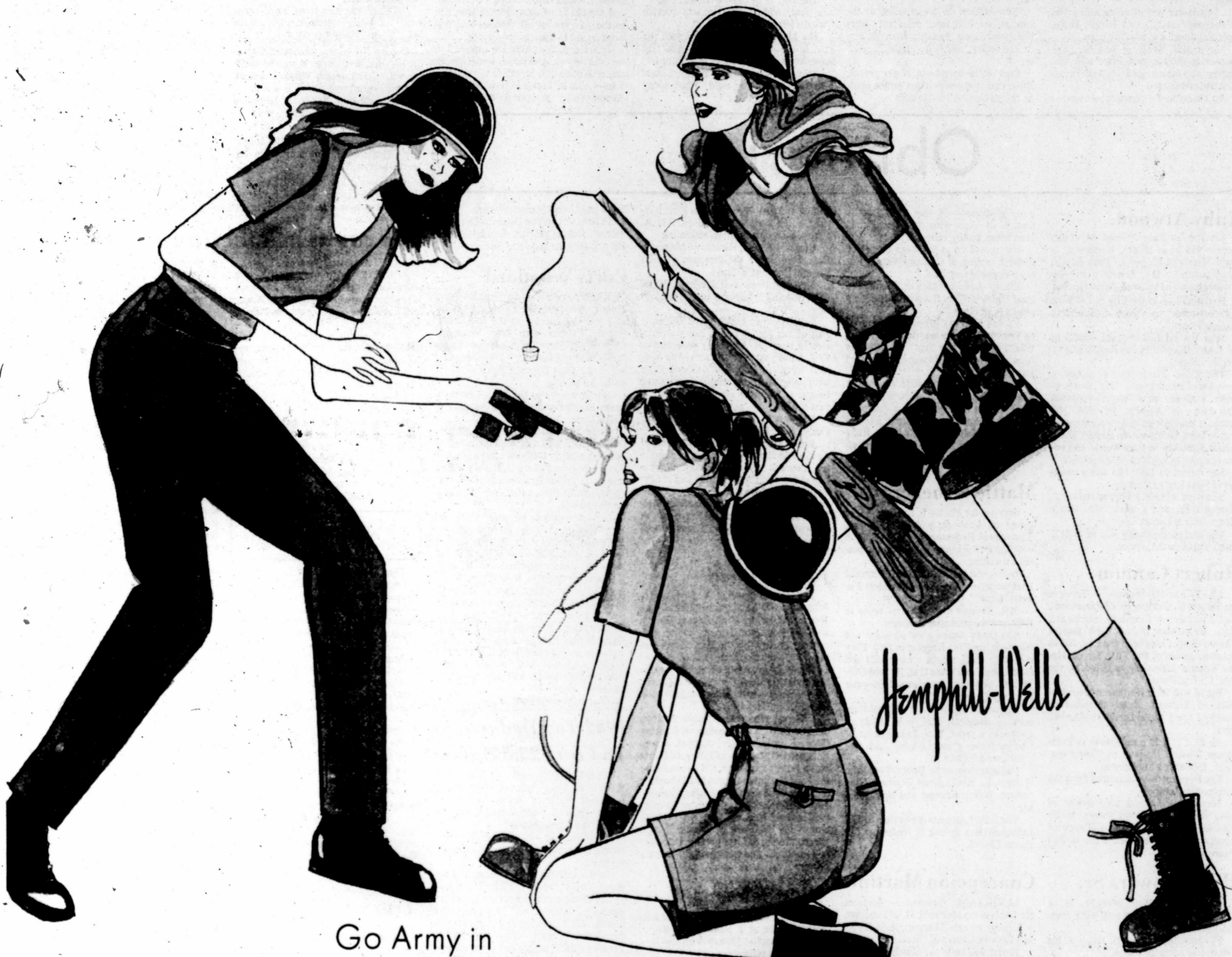

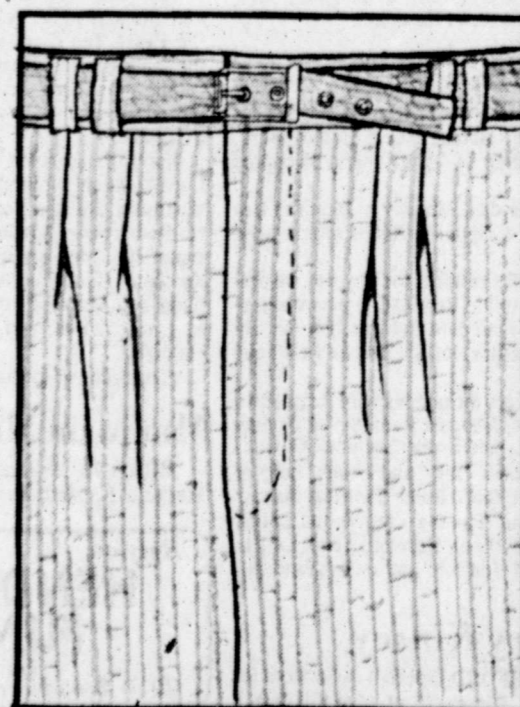
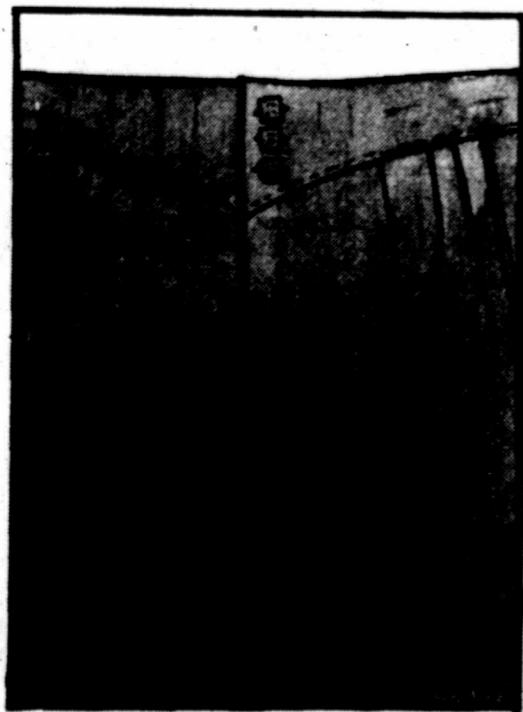
