# Clayton Goes Ahead On Water Proposal

AUSTIN - Speaker Bill Clayton has filed a proposed constitutional amendment that would allocate half the treasury surplus to water projects and half to pay off state government bonds.

Clayton's proposal, not yet formally introduced and referred to committee, is similar to Gov. Bill Clements' recommendation of a water fund as a form of future "tax relief."

If approved by the Legislature and the voters, the amendment would split the surplus each biennium between the bond retirement fund and a fund dedicated to water development, conservation and

Once all state bonds had been retired - a sum Clayton estimates at \$620 million - the share of the surplus formerly dedicated to that purpose would go into a 'special reserve fund" that the Legisla-

# Oil Refiners Hike Prices

NEW YORK (AP) - Several of the nation's largest refiners boosted wholesale prices of gasoline, home heating oil and diesel fuel as much as 5 cents per gallon following decontrol action by the Reagan administration.

The hikes could be felt shortly by consumers, although one industry source said gasoline dealers in some regions 'are going to have to eat a lot" of the wholesale increases because demand for the fuel has been weak following earlier price hikes.

The source, who asked not to be identified, said heating oil users probably would see the full effect of the wholesale increase because "they've got to have"

Mobil Corp. said it raised gasoline, diesel fuel and home heating oil prices a nickel a gallon nationwide to reflect "incrude oil prices" here and you want to postpone a tax bill or for college construction" or other purposes.

Comptroller Bob Bullock estimates the surplus at the end of the current biennium will be \$568 million.

aggravated assault and rape cases. The governor also is pushing for wiretap legislation for the Texas Department of Public Safety to utilize in major drug

in vestigations. The amendment Jackson had to reluctantly accept would schedule the school elections for November, which is what Reps. John Bryant and Paul Ragsdale,

both Dallas Democrats, want. Ragsdale also said four of the five board trustees who would be up for reelection if the election is held in April had requested the U.S. Justice Department not to sanction the election if the

House passed the bill. In 1979 the Legislature passed a bill allowing the Dallas school board to forego elections in 1981 because redistricting could not be completed before the scheduled April elections. But Jackson said recent controversy among the nine-member school board has prompted citizens to ask for a restoration of the orginal April 1981 elections

In the Senate Monday, the Committee on Economic Development approved and sent to the Senate a bill by Sen. Roy Blake, D-Nacogdoches, that would prohibit substitute teachers from obtaining

# Study Asks Vast Spending Slash

WASHINGTON (AP) - While President Reagan is honing his proposals for reducing federal spending, congressional economists have come up with 105 ways to cut billions of dollars from the budget and increase revenues.

The proposals are contained in a Congressional Budget Office study submitted today to the House Budget Committee.

Actions described range from simply increasing efficiency to imposing direct fees to pay for government services such as Coast Guard activities. Some of the proposals have been rejected by previous congresses and others were contained in former President Carter's budget for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

Although the report from the non-partisan economic research arm of Congress stresses that the proposals are examples and do not constitute recommendations. it adds: "If the Congress is to bring down federal spending ... something of the sort described here will have to happen."

There is no way to arrive at a grand total of projected savings or revenue gains for the separate items because some of the proposals are alternatives to others, and some might have spinoff effects on other federal programs that cannot be calculated.

The president will begin unveiling his economic program in an address to the nation later this week and add details in an appearance before Congress later this

The report notes that efforts to cut the budget will include any of a number of strategies, including:

—Management efficiency, because "the federal government could manage its resources better than it does."

-Across-the-board rules such as repeal of all automatic indexing of programs that make direct payments to individuals so "the largest and least controlled upward pressure on federal spending would be brought under the

discipline of the budget process." -Restraint of programs making di-rect payments to individuals through "some combination of less generous benefit levels, less generous indexing, strict-er eligibility rules so that fewer people qualify and phasing out of whole programs

-The consolidation of categorical "targeted" programs into block grants. According to the report, about half of all federal spending goes for benefits to

# .S. Assures Allies Of Aid

Secretary Caspar Weinberger said today the United States would consider a request from Israel to base American troops on Israeli soil — if such a request is made in the future.

He also said he was re-examining the ossibility of deploying neutron weapons in Europe. Former President Carter scrapped development of the neutron bomb after America's European allies had approved it.

Weinberger told his first news conference as defense secretary the United States would give sympathetic considera-tion to basing troops in Israel if the Jewish state requested such a move. But he made it clear the United States

would act similarly toward any ally that requested the assistance of American forces. He said he was not changing U.S. "If they (the Israelis) should decide -I confess, I would be very surprised if they did — we would certainly consider a

request from them to station troops in Israel," Weinberger said. But, he said, "I would never initiate

Israel, even during its four wars with the Arabs between 1948 and 1967, never requested the aid of American troops. Israeli political leaders, including former Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, publicly have offered the port of Haifa as a U.S.

In an earlier appearance before the Senate Armed Services Committee, Weinberger emphasized the need for a strong national defense and said it would mean higher expenditures this year and for fiscal 1982 beginning Oct. 1.

President Carter submitted a supple mental defense asking of \$6.3 billion for fiscal 1981 and Weinberger said he will add to it. He gave no figures, but said the revised budget will be submitted to Congress by Feb. 25 or 26.

Carter proposed a \$196.4 billion defense budget for next year, which Weinberger also has indicated he will want in-

The regents voted to provide between 11 to 17 feet of right-of-way for the wid-

The proposal is expected to go before the Lubbock City Council and affects University Avenue from Fourth to 16th

It includes a provision for three northbound lanes and two southbound lanes from Fourth to 16th, where the street then will become six lanes. North and southbound flow will be divided by brick medians and shrubbery plantings.

The medians and plantings will prevent left turns off of University heading east and off of westbound streets onto University by blocking off all but three intersections - Broadway, Sixth and 15th

Store owners along the avenue say they fear the widening will increase traffic and traffic speeds on the road, making it more difficult - if not dangerous for students at the university to cross the

# Hispanic Slaps Removal Of Bilingual Regulation

A local Hispanic leader today condemned the Reagan administration's decision to withdraw federal guidelines for expanding bilingual education, but local school officials said the program would have been costly and damaging. Chevo Morales, president of the local

council of the League of United Latin American Citizens, said this morning, 'We're not very pleased" with Education Secretary Terrel Bell's move to scrap the federal regulations. The guidelines, developed under the Carter administration, would have mandated instruction in a child's native language through grade 12.

"Reagan has taken the wrong step right away by doing this," Morales said. We felt this coming," he said, adding that Hispanics are willing to make sacrifices, but that the move by the new administration is an arbitrary "whacking away" at strides made by Hispanics. He echoed national LULAC President

Ruben Bonilla's criticism that Reagan appears to be showing little gratitude for the massive Hispanic vote he gained. Morales, said however, that the Lub-

bock bilingual program is "one of the best in the state" and said he is concerned more for the national status of bilingual education. The local LULAC director said his

group probably will issue in the next few days a formal statement concerning the action taken by the new education secre-

The president of the Lubbock school board, however, was critical of the proposed federal regulations because of the potential cost that was involved.

"I think it is not practical to teach

tion or in the local school district because of the cost involved. We would need a lot more classes to teach the same number

The director of bilingual education for the district agreed with Hasie, explaining that it would have been close to impossible to provide teachers to instruct every child in the district in his or her native tongue. "Students come to us with many different languages," said Lucy Gutierrez. "Sometimes there might be a teacher for just one or two students. How could we do that?"

Mrs. Gutierrez said the scrapped proposal would have called for a maintenance program that would prolong a stu-

The philosophy of Lubbock educators

has always been that bilingual education should be a transitional, not maintenance program. With a strong program in the elementary grades, bilingual education beyond that level should in most cases be unnecessary, she said. Some school districts may need a

beefed-up bilingual program, Mrs. Gutierrez said, though not necessarily one that would continue through grade 12. She pointed out that Texas probably

will have to await word on the new philosophy on bilingual education voiced by the new administration before the state plan will be affected.

# **Memphis Official Draws Blast**

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - A suggestion by city Police Director E. Winslow Chapman that rapists be castrated is shocking and may encourage police to mistreat suspects, says Shelby County's public defender.

"I'm not suggesting that members of the department are going to go out and castrate rapists," said public defender A

"But such remarks may give them greater license to go beyond the normal bounds of their duties when dealing with suspects," said Wharton, adding he was "shocked" by the

Wharton said Monday he too is frustrated about the rise in violent crime, "but I don't think exciting, catchy solutions to problems come close to getting to the heart of the prob-

Chapman called for the castration of rapists and the death penalty for murderers in a talk Sunday at an "antipublic meeting sponsored by the Vollintine-Evergreen Community Association.

'If maybe we can castrate rapists one or two times

that crime would go down the drain. I'm convinced of that," Chapman said, drawing applause from a crowd of 150.

Chapman said he had received a number of telephone

calls after his remarks were published Monday. "The calls were almost totally positive," he said. Chapman said he "was not advocating a massive number

of castrations. "I'm just convinced a lot of rapists rape for kicks ... because they know they can get away with it," he said. "The possible consequence of castration would dissuade 90 to 95

percent of rapists." Memphis, with a population of 667,000, led the nation in per capita rapes in 1980, authorities say. Last year, there were 788 rapes, up from 704 in 1979. There were 166 homicides in the city, one shy of the 1974 record and 48 above

Chapman, police director since 1976, is a member of President Reagan's 20-member National Advisory Task Force on Law Enforcement, but he said he does not intend to suggest castration of rapists to the panel.

#### Iowa Allows Checkoff For Wildlife.

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — The donkey and the elephant already have their own checkoffs in Iowa. Now there's a bill labeled the "chickadee checkoff" that would give aid and comfort to wildlife via state tax returns.

The Natural Resources Committee gave the checkoff unanimous approval Monday, but members pointed out the bill is somewhat different from the checkoff that designates funds for the Iowa Republican and Democratic parties

The bill would let Iowans designate from \$1 to \$10 of their state income tax refunds to a fund for developing wild-life habitats. The money would be channeled into the fish and wildlife protection fund to buy, lease or obtain easements to land for wildlife.

Rep. Lowell Norland said he didn't want the bill to be confused with the political party checkoff, which allows lowans to designate \$1 of their income taxes to a political party. The wildlife donation, by contrast, would come out of the taxpayer's refund.

But House Minority Leader Don Avenson, D-Oelwein, said "it doesn't matter what you call it. It's going to be known as the chickadee checkoff." That, he said, is what it was promptly labeled in Minnesota.



# So Much For So Little

A RECENT STUDY of the coverage of inflation on television news found that 80 percent of the reports deal with the problem only as a matter of price hikes or wage increas-

The public then learns to see inflation as something done by the private sector, i.e., businesses lifting prices and pulling in higher profits, workers demanding raises, bankers asking higher interest rates.

The government is left out altogether, which is somewhat like giving a performance of Hamlet without the moody Danish prince -in this case, the moody administration, Congress and Federal Reserve Board.

That's because inflation is a decline in the value of money-and only government has the power to debase the currency by creating too much of it. Nonetheless, erratically rising prices are indeed a key facet of inflation and an index of its destructive effects.

THE EFFECT on the elderly with fixed incomes and on those of modest means is particularly grievous.

The goods and services consumed by a family living on a low budget cost just under \$7,000 in 1970. Today, they cost nearly \$12,-

The food budget of an average family of four has risen from \$59 a week in 1970 to \$122

This family can no longer afford a new house. A house that cost \$29,000 to buy in 1970 would cost about \$75,000 today.

At the existing rate of inflation, the food and services expenses of a family of four esti-mated at \$12,600 today will be more than \$24,000 by 1990. The price of that \$29,000 house in 1970 that is \$75,000 today will be \$131,000 just five years from now-and \$231,-

We don't have to search far and wide for the instigator of much of the increase in the money supply. It rests in the huge rise in government spending.

IT IS POPULAR these days to analyze inflation and its cure in terms of demand and supply elements. Clearly, the federal budget is the outstanding culprit on the demand side.

A top priority of the new Congress, therefore, must be a more effective control over

While the government has promoted consumption, it has also been busy discouraging supply. If inflation can be summed up as too much money chasing too few goods, a relative decline in production is as inflationary as a relative increase in money.

As David Rockefeller, retiring chairman of The Chase Manhattan Bank, writes in the current journal of the National Association of Manufacturers, "We have reached the end of the line. The growth of social programs can no longer exceed the growth of the business-es on which they finally depend. That is the bottom line." Indeed.

# Prosaic Poet Didn't Know It

SCRABBLE, VA .- They called him the Palmetto Poet, the Songbird of Saluda, the Bard of the Congaree, and the dulcet-voiced singer of Dixie.

What he was, was the worst practicing professional poet in the history of the American Republic. J. Gordon Coogler was his name, and his fame has been too long obscured.

I am minded to write about the gentleman out of the same fascination with which one contemplates painting-by-the-numbers. There is a point at which awfulness takes on its own paradoxical

It is like the toad, ugly and venomous, which yet wears a precious jewel in his head. Sweet are the uses of perversity

MY FIRST AWARENESS of the Bard of the Congaree came some years ago when I encountered H.L. Mencken's famous essay on Southern culture, "The Sahara of the Bozart.

That essay began with a couplet of penetrating insight and abominable rhyme:

"Alas, for the South! Her books have grown

She never was much given to literature. The couplet was attributed to J. Gordon Coog-

If I thought about it at all, I probably supposed that Mencken had invented J. Gordon Coogler, just as Mencken invented the Great Bathtub Hoax. It is the kind of name that W.C. Fields

would have loved. This past December I noted that Robert Tyrrell, the puckish fellow who edits The American Spectator, had announced his "Sixth Annual J. Gordon Coogler Award," given for the worst book published in the U.S. in the preceding 12 months. Out of curiosity, I checked all the standard bio-

graphical dictionaries around the office, and

urned up no trace of a J. Gordon Coogler. THEN I WROTE Mr. Tyrrell, charging him, in effect, with honoring real authors in the name of a

bogus character. Not so! cried my brother. Coog-And Mr. Tyrrell thereupon directed me to Pro-

fessor Claude Henry Neuffer of the University of South Carolina in Columbia.

The professor is the world's leading authorityindeed, the only authority-upon this deservedly forgotten exemplar of prosody at its worst. Mr. Neuffer sent me Coogler's Complete Works.

I am about to tell you more about Coogler than you really want to know. He was born on Dec. 3, 1865, in Doko, S.C., the son of Samuel and Luana Coogler.

At 14, he himself changed his name (from what I do not know) to John Brown Gordon Coogler, after a Confederate general of the same name. At 15 he began his career as a printer.

HIS TALENT FOR versification blossomed. He put a sign in his shop window: "Poems Written While You Wait." Thereupon began a career that ended much too soon with his death in September

Decontrol of oil prices will give the federal treasury an extra \$4.6 billion this fiscal year, the state treasury an extra \$200 million, the University of Texas-Texas A&M an extra \$15 million-and My Neighbor Twice Removed an Excedrin head-

WITH THE SO-CALLED experts saying that decontrol of oil prices eight months ahead of schedule will drive up the price of gasoline 9 cents a gallon, it's hard for My Sweet Wife to see how it's going to help her any.

If she hadn't misplaced the Family Oil Well, everything would be okay.

Truth of the matter, though, is that decontrol will help all of us in the long run. Gasoline probably wouldn't be as high as it is already, in fact, if President Nixon hadn't misguidedly slapped the

controls on a decade ago.

When OPEC saw that the U.S. was becoming more and more dependent on imported oil be-cause the controls had made it unprofitable to

look for more here, it drastically raised the world price in 1973.

The U.S. was helpless. OPEC raised the price again and again. Rather than solve the problem, the Carter administration decided to get in on the gravy: It passed the windfall tax that gives the federal treasury a new gusher of money every time the price goes up.

CONSUMERS, thus, are the captives of inflationary oil prices caused by governments—our own and those of OPEC.

What decontrol will do for us, even with the confiscatory windfall tax, is leave producers enough profit to encourage them to find and produce more of the stuff.

As the domestic supply increases, consumers will be less vulnerable to price gouging. If we were to be lucky enough to get a glut on the market, competition would even bring the price down, especially if our own government would rescind that terrible tax.

So, don't blame decontrol for higher gasoline prices; blame the original controls and other government actions.

One day after Ma Bell's rate increase request was slashed by two-thirds, a computer malfunction left much of Lubbock without service. The old gal must have blown a fuse!

DALLAS BLACKS are stirring the street renaming controversy even more than one faction in Lubbock is.

Some in Dallas are furious because a committee

appointed by the City Council has recommended

against naming a street in honor of Malcolm X, the black muslim who was gunned down in 1965.

Martin Luther King Jr. and Ralph Bunche, an organizer of the United Nations, would have streets named in their honor if the committee's recommendations are followed, however.

Dallas uplike Lubbook has no reliev seasons.

Dallas, unlike Lubbock, has no policy against naming streets for individuals. It was on that basis that the Lubbock City Council declined to rename Quirt Avenue for MLK, a very wise decision from the standpoint of race relations.

The Dallas black militants have signatled there might be no end to agitation for honoring various blacks by renaming streets.

"ONCE AGAIN, YOU'VE given us a slice of bread while you've run away with the loaf," Bill Stoner, an employe of the tax-supported Dallas Legal Services, furned after the committee voted to honor King and Bunche but not Malcolm X or Frederick Douglass, a 19th Century black aboli-

City Councilman Elsie Faye Heggins had want-ed Douglass' name substituted for that of Robert B. Cullum, a white civic leader, on a new state

highway segment.

She also had suggested that Oakland Avenue be renamed for Malcolm X. That was turned down, but the committee agreed with her that Bunche's name should replace that of a white Jewish Dallas businessman and philanthropist on what now is known as Julius Schepps Freeway.

That freeway is otherwise known as Interstate

# Speech Speaks Well For Reagan

WASHINGTON-After more than a third century in Washington, there I was listening to Ronald Reagan's first Inaugural Address, and saying to myself, "Don't believe in rhetoric!

President Reagan was telling us we are all 'heroes" and that there is no weapon more powerful than "the will and moral courage of free men and women."

Of course, there are few heroes among us, and a whiff of grapeshot has been known to overcome moral courage. But rhetoric in its best sense is eloquence, and eloquence is the language of leader

Now, there is something that the most jaded listener, the most punch-drunk reporter of politics, does believe in.

Great religions, great nations, great institutions of every sort are formed behind leadership, and a leader would be mute and inglorious without some degree of eloquence.

THE FOUNDER OF Christianity gave us the simple beauty of the Lord's Prayer. It is said of Gen. George Washington that retreat of his Continentals would cause him to "swear till the leaves shook on the trees.

What sort of a leader would Churchill have been without rhetoric? What is more memorable of Lincoln than his words at Gettysburg and elsewhere? Rhetoric and words, language and eloquence are not enough, but they are almost indis-

If we measure Reagan for leadership by his first Presidential address, I think we will have an accurate estimate of what to expect. His Inaugural Address, in fact, was his "basic speech" with trimmings.


He has been giving the basic ever since he was General Electric's banquet speaker, ever since he electrified the country in 1964 when he took the basic to TV for Barry Goldwater and, finally, in 1980 when he crisscrossed the country and made every formal address his well-trusted "basic.

IT SERVED HIM well. He bowled over his primary opponents. Bush and Baker, with his fundamentals. He used the tried-and-true aphorisms to mow down Jimmy Carter in debate. Reagan only got in trouble when he wandered off the script.

The Reagan administration will be much like the Reagan campaign. His leadership was outlined

It promises to be the leadership of the organization, much like Eisenhower, the opposite of Carter's disorientation, quite different from the social experimenting we saw in Kennedy, Johnson and Franklin Roosevelt.

It will be said that a President proposes, and a Congress disposes. But this Congress has read the election results of 1980 and is inclined to be Re-

Another feature raised the volume to classic heights. Dozens of editors of that day, enchanted by Coogler's awfulness, had praised him in lavish

It became a game among them. "Genius will out," cried the Providence Journal. "True poetic expression," said the Kansas City Times. "The author has seen life," exulted the Hartford Courant.

HENRY W. GRADY laid it on with a five-inch brush; he advised Coogler that a literary club had been formed, to be known as the Atlanta Stanza of the J. Gordon Coogler Society.

"I read your verses constantly," wrote Grady. 'At every perusal I find something new to ad-

Coogler never suspected a thing. Apparently he accepted each fulsome tribute as no more than his due. Among the reprinted reviews is an editorial from the Carolina Spartan, quoting an especially deplorable quatrain.

'Now if that is not poetry," inquired the editor, we would like for someone to tell us what it is." Professor Neuffer has reproduced Coogler's fi-nal volume in facsimile. At six bucks a copy, it beats a ticket to the ball game.

It is more true to say that this time the President proposes, the people have already disposed by endorsing the Reagan basics.

The Inaugural Addresss was the Basic Speech, I said, with trimmings. These added ingredients were the President's strong but unspecific message to friend and foe-in short, his proposed for-

"We will match loyalty with loyalty," he said for

the attention of the democracies as well as the dictatorships which wish to be our allies. "When action is required...we will act," he said for the ben-efit of large and small adversaries where the Carter example left much room to doubt American re-

Yes, it was all rhetoric, sometimes rising to eloquence, but it was the language of leadership. Dare we believe in President Reagan? Rather ask -dare we not believe?

# Medicare Unreasonable On What's Reasonable

NEW YORK-"... Please find enclosed item in which Medicare paid 80 percent of \$45.30, where the doctor's bill was \$78. (Medicare paid not 80 percent, but only 46 percent.) The difference be-

tween 80 percent and 46 percent could wipe me .. I had to have some minor surgery on my eye. The doctor did the surgery in his office in less than 30 minutes. His bill was \$200. Medicare paid \$80; our plan paid \$35 and I still had to pay \$85. As we grow older and weaker our problems are going

to increase... "...I am upset that Medicare premiums continue to rise and yet Medicare does not pay 80 percent of the cost as I had assumed. Medicare has not kept pace with their allowance to the covered in-

"DO YOU KNOW of any qualified internist that would charge \$13.50 for a physical examination and recognized laboratory that would charge less than \$5 for blood work?

These are typical of letters that America's older citizens are sending in mounting volume to their congressmen, their own organizations, columnists -all telling of their growing dismay about their unexpected health care out-of-pocket costs. The reason: the option that doctors have to bill Medicare patients directly.

A doctor who uses the optional billing method under Medicare has no obligation to accept Medicare-set "reasonable charge," says Daniel Sigel-man of the Washington-based Health Research Group. "He (or she) can set the fee as high as he wants."

MEDICARE, THOUGH, will reimburse the pa-tient for only 80 percent of the "reasonable charge." The patient is responsible for paying not just the remaining 20 percent, but also the entire excess charge.

Under the Reagan administration-and with the full approval of the American public-all social welfare programs will be re-examined.

When a doctor uses the assignment method of billing under Medicare, he sends the bill to Medicare and also agrees that his full charge will be no higher than the amount Medicare determines is the reasonable charge. But doctors have been reducing assignment bills.

THE PERCENTAGE OF Medicare bills paid by the assignment method has fallen from 61.5 percent in 1969 to about 50 percent, according to figures obtained by the Health Research Group

Physicians have a valid defense in pointing to a 6-30-month lag in Medicare's updating of reasonable charge data. The real problem lies in Medicare underpay-

ments, not doctor overcharges, declares the American Medical Association. And congressional committees have in fact weighed possible changes in the law to require Medicare to use more current charge data in setting "reasonable charges" or to provide tax incentives for physicians to take assignments.

XXXXXX This sort of legislative reform would surely take a long time. In the meantime, there are ways Medicare beneficiaries might be helped to avoid excessively-high doctor bills.

# **IRS Hoping For Improvements** In Number Of Form Errors

By RAY De CRANE (Second of 14 parts)

If you have been expecting a tax refund because of all those campaign promises of a tax cut last fall, forget it.

Income taxes almost certainly will be lowered - in 1981. Any reduction in that tax bill will not be apparent until you file your tax return next vear.

This is going to be a transition year, a year of adjustment, for the Internal Revenue Serv-

In a year when there is substantial change in tax law, the error rate on returns shoots up. That's what happened last year, as taxpayers wrestled with a new tax form and greatly revised tax laws.

The tax forms and the tax laws are little changed this year. As a result, IRS is hoping for a big improvement in the number of errors that delayed the processing of 7 percent of all the returns filed a year ago.

What changes have been made will affect relatively few of the estimated 95 million taxturns this year.

Among the changes is an increase in the permitted deduction for auto expenses.

For the business use of an automobile, the taxpayer may now claim an optional mileage rate of 20 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business driving. After that, the rate is 11 cents a mile. A year ago, the comparable allowances were 18 1/2 cents and 10 cents.

If you used your car in connection with deductible charitable activity, as part of your allowable moving expenses or as part of your allowable medical expenses - such as driving to and from doctor's offices or the pharmacy - the mileage rate has been upped to 9 cents from the 8 cents permitted a year ago.

For salespeople and others who use their personal cars in their business activity, the higher optional mileage allowance still might not be advisable to take.

It is always possible to claim the actual cost of such car expense. This takes into consideration annual depreciation and the costs of gas, oil, repairs, insurance and related expenses. The way inflation has hit the cost of cars, gasoline, repairs and insurance, a higher allowance might still be obtained by

tabulating your actual cost in-stead of claiming the standard mileage rate.

The most accurate method of finding out which is best for you is to work out the figures both ways and then elect the option that gives you the great-

# Judge Protecting Company's Claim Against Iran

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - A federal judge says the U.S. government may have been "coerced" into returning Iran's assets to get the hostages back, but that doesn't mean American businesses gave up their constitutional rights.

The judge said Behring International Inc. of Houston had a right to \$503,000 it was owed under a year-old consent agreement it reached with the government of Iran to settle a civil suit.

U.S. District Judge H. Lee Sarokin told the Treasury Department on Monday it must notify him and Behring if it planned to transfer to Iran funds in a Trenton bank earmarked for Behring.

The Iranians coerced the United States into surrendering a number of things by their terrorist acts," U.S. District Judge H. Lee Sarokin said. "But that does not include the waiver of rights guaranteed by our Constitution.

He turned down the company's request to immediately release the money, which has remained at Broad Street National Bank under former President Carter's Nov. 14, 1979, executive order freezing Iran's assets in the United

# Hostage Kelates Daily Harassment

CHICAGO (UPI) - Robert Blucker. one of the 52 former hostages held in Iran said he and the other captives could only be sure of one thing - day-to-day harassment by their captors.

Blucker, of Little Rock, Ark., described his 444-days as a hostage in the second of a five-part series in today's edition of the Chicago Tribune.

# Former Captive Suing Iranians

WASHINGTON (AP) - Marine Sgt. Gregory A. Persinger, charging that his diplomatic privileges, immunities and civil rights were violated when he was taken hostage in Tehran, is seeking \$120,-000 in damages from the government of Iran, it was reported today.

In a suit filed Monday in U.S. District Court, Persinger said he and his family suffered when he was "threatened with execution before a firing squad" and "subjected to numerous instances of assault and battery, physical abuse and severe emotional and psychological pressures," The Washington Star reported.

Under the terms of the agreement that led to the release of Persinger and 51 other American hostages on Jan. 20, the United States said it would prohibit all future suits against Iran stemming from the hostage seizure.

Peter Neeson, one of the attorneys representing Persinger, told The Wash-ington Star that the terms of the agreement barring suits against Iran would be challenged in court.

"I believe that our clients' rights have been violated. He (Persinger) believes that, and his parents believe that, and that's why we're taking this action, Neeson said.

Persinger, 23, of Seaford, Del., is seeking punitive, compensatory and special damages. His parents, Lawrence and Jacqueline Persinger, also are listed as plaintiffs in the suit.

Blucker said during his ordeal he was moved 16 times, always between midnight and 3 a.m. by Iranian militants who demonstrated little or no organization.

During the moves, Blucker said, "I got up from the floor, where I was sleeping and a blanket was thrown over my head. I also was wearing a blindfold, which I think was made from a rag. "I was pushed outside, where there

were a couple of other Americans also waiting for whatever was next."

During one of Blucker's moves he was reunited with two hostages he had not seen since Nov. 4, the first day of captivity - Steve Kirtley, a marine from Blucker's hometown and Jerry Plotkin, an American businessman from Sherman Oaks, Calif.

Blucker described the militants as unpredictable - never permitting the hostages to settle into a routine.

Like many of the hostages, his first early days of captivity were filled with emotional harassment and humiliation. At this stage. Blucker said there were never any kicks or blows.

Days were spent on the cold floor under a blanket, reading books, he said, "and it was here Thanksgiving came and went. We did not observe it, and our guards did not mention the holiday."

# **Tris-Treated Sleepware** Found In Flea Markets

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Children's sleepwear treated with Tris, a flame retardant chemical banned in 1977 after it was linked to cancer, has been discovered in flea markets and discount stores in two states, federal officials say.

The sleepwear - estimated at 150,000 pieces - was to have been made into rags for industrial use after being recalled four years ago.

But Tom McKean, a compliance officer for the Consumer Product Safety Commission's regional office, said a rag company is suspected of selling the pajamas whole

'What we've been able to determine is that one of these firms, which knew it was supposed to cut the material into rags, sold the material as sleepwear,' said McKean.

He would not identify the rag company, but said a rag company in Philadel-phia was being investigated to determine its liability.

# Citizens Of Chrysler **Town Also Suffering**

Firm Needs Approval

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP) - With a statue of a Civil War soldier on the courthouse square and the 1932 state basketball championship banner in the new high school gym, New Castle seems the very embodiment of middle America.

A city of 18,884 people living amid corn and soybean fields 46 miles from Indianapolis, it is a place of unfailing courtesy and deep pride — and deep anxiety.

Here is what people in New Castle are saving, in their own words, as their major employer - Chrysler Corp. - struggles for life.

'My children are growing up the greatest people in the world because of this place. ... If they say they're going to play basketball at 10 o'clock at night in the school gym, that's where you'll find them." - Dick Gross, who was manager of Chrysler's forge and machining plant here from 1974 to Jan. 23 of this year.

'The community was comfortable with the situation before. There were seasonal, and market, ups and downs. Now it's a hungry community for the first time in decades. It will not allow itself to be kicked into the ground. ... Whether Chrysler fails or whether Chrysler lives, we have got to diversify." Rick Thrasher, a business development specialist.

DALLAS (UPI) - The nation's largest drugstore chain has been thwarted, at least temporarily, by a federal antitrust suit filed to block efforts to acquire Zale Corp.'s Skillern Drug Division.

But officials of both Revco D.S. Inc. and Zale are hopeful they soon can reach an out-of-court settlement with the government, and proceed with the approximately \$65 million cash sale that had been scheduled to begin today.

The Justice Department filed the antitrust suit Monday, as promised, to block the Twinsburg, Ohio, firm's acquisition of the 145 Skillern stores in Texas and New Mexico. The sale had been announced in October.

Attorney General William French Smith said the lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Dallas, alleged the acquisition would violate federal antitrust laws by eliminating competition between Rev-

Spokesmen for the two firms said negotiations were under way with the government in an attempt to reach an out-ofcourt settlement in the civil suit.

"In fact, we were meeting with them at about the same time the suit was filed," said Zale spokesman Gary Kastel. "We think the differences can be worked out in negotiations.

In Ohio, a Revco official said, "We're trying to resolve this matter and we hope to do it as expeditiously as possible."



The average discount rate on 26-week Treasury bills declined to 13.735 percent Monday's weekly auction from the 14 121 percent of a week earlier, the Treasury said. The new figure is the lowest since the 13.182 percent reported Jan.

As a result of Monday's auction, banks and thrift institutions may pay up to 13.985 percent on six-month money market certificates, beginning Thursday. The current ceiling on the \$10,000-minimum-deposit certificates, which are linked to the 26-week Treasury rate, is 14.371 percent.

Depositors choosing 21/2-year certificates - requiring smaller minimum deposits - can earn 12 percent at thrift institutions and 11.75 percent at commercial banks. These rates are at their federally controlled ceilings.

The discount rate on short-term Treasury bills understates the actual return to an investor because a portion of the price is refunded at the time of purchase. The actual return, or investment rate, came to an average of 14.97 percent on 26-week bills and 15.43 percent on 13week bills at Monday's auction.

# Scientists Warn Against Danger Of 'Carbohydrate Sensitivity'

ANAHEIM, Ca. (Special) - New research findings back up nutritionists who say that individuals with a disorder called "carbohydrate sensitivity" should not eat high levels of sugar.

This was reported recently at the an-nual meeting of the Federation of American Societies of Experimental Biology.
Scientists of the U.S. Department of

ministration and the University of Maryland did the research and reported the results. Sheldon Reiser, Ph.D. chief of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory at Beltsville, Md., coordinated the coopera-

Twenty-four volunteers took part in the study. All had been tested and identi-

fied as carbohydrate-sensitive.

In the tests, each volunteer drank a solution composed of two grams of sucrose per kilogram of body weight (equivalent to about five ounces of sucrose for a 150-pound person.) After that, blood samples were taken and analyzed for insulin levels. An exceptionally high insulin response, or a prolonged high insulin lev-

el, was regarded as an indicator of carbohydrate sensitivity.
Dr. Reiser and his associates said that

carbohydrate-sensitive people may have several exaggerated metabolic responses to sugar in the diet. One of the most common and noticeable responses is an exceptionally high level of blood triglycerides - if a diet high in sucrose (table sugar) is eaten. An estimated 20 million Americans have some degree of carbohydrate sensitivity.

The 24 people ate diets with 5, 18 or 33 percent of total calories in the form of sucrose. All ate diets at each sugar level for six weeks.

A five percent sugar diet, the nutri-tionist said, is far below the U.S. average, which is estimated at near 18 percent; 33 percent is above average but may be about the intake of many individuals who like sweet foods.

Beside Dr. Reiser, members of the research team were Otho E. Michaelis IV. Ph. D., and biochemists Judith F. Hallfrisch and Mary C. Bickard of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory; Elizabeth S. Prather, Ph.D., chairman of the University of Maryland department of food, nutrition and university administrations; and biochemists Mark Kenney, Ph.D. Karen D. Israel and Ellen L. Bohn of the university's biochemistry department.

They reported:

•Six of the volunteers who consumed the highest level of sugar (33 percent cal-ories) developed a "type IV hyperlipo-proteinemia pattern." In this condition, blood carries amounts and kinds of fats that have been linked with heart disea

Blood triglyceride levels in both men and women increased as the amount of sugar in the diet increased, and the increases were much greater in men than in women. Triglyceride levels were nor-mal in the men when they had the five percent sugar diets. Elevated triglyceride evels also have been associated with







# Woman's Suicidal Tendencies Puzzle Officials

**Avalanche-Journal Staff** Three persons walking down Avenue D last week gave little notice to the short, obese woman as she walked past them. They didn't realize she held a kitchen knife in her right hand.

The three said that moments later they saw the woman, her back turned to them, pull open her coat and blouse and move the right hand toward her stom-

She then wheeled around and, with her clothes still pulled back, revealed the handle of the knife she had just buried into her abdomen.

The horrifled trio called police. The first officer on the scene said the woman was sitting on a porch, her shirt pulled up and the "knife was in almost to the hilt."

The 42-year-old woman told officer Dexter McKay she had been jumped and stabbed in the street by an assailant whom she could not describe. She told a person standing nearby that she was attacked by a white man.

"And she later told me that she was stabbed by her husband, a black man," McKay said in his report.

The woman was taken to Lubbock General Hospital where Emergency Medical Services technicians told officers it was the fourth time within a month the woman had been taken to the hospital, each time the victim of a self-inflicted

A hospital spokesman said the woman left the next morning "against medical advice.

She is well known to local lawmen, many of whom have investigated her complaints of being attacked - by a black man, a Mexican-American or a white. Her assailant, she tells the officer each time, displays a knife when she rejects his sexual advances.

But investigators say there is overwhelming evidence, at least in most cases, that she is the one who reyeals the weapon and turns it on herself. She has cried wolf too many times, they say,

Most who know her say they don't feel the woman means to seriously harm herself, although one officer said her stomach "is just a big mass of scar tissue," and a doctor said it is now hard to find a vein to inject antibiotics and other medicine when the woman enters the hospital.

Acquaintances say her actions are just a radical cry for attention.

"She simply likes to be around people who can take care of her," said one officer, who asked not to be identified. "I've been around her only one time and she doesn't strike me as being crazy...other than poking herself in the stomach and passing it off on someone else," he said.

Medical attendants say the woman's fatty build has so far prevented her from piercing a vital organ. The knife has usually had a short or average length blade. But she at times has been listed in serious condition upon entering a hosIn the past decade, the woman has reported being assaulted about 20 times. Last November, she walked into the Lubbock County Jail and, much to the jailer's surprise, revealed a knife with an eight-inch blade sticking in her stomach.

As in many of her reports, she told of walking down the street (one she could not remember) when a Mexican-American man drove up and offered her a ride, which she accepted. She said that when they neared 13th Street and Avenue F, the man asked her for a "date." When she refused, the man stabbed her and kicked her out of the car, she said.

She told officers she was unable to see where the assailant went, but that she managed to walk to the jail for help.

On Sept. 21, 1980, a police officer was waved down by two persons who said a woman stopped their car and asked for directions to the nearest hospital. The woman's shirt was torn, revealing a wooden knife handle, they said. She was located and taken by ambulance to Methodist Hospital where she told of being assaulted by two white men who had confronted her on 19th Street.

She said one man stabbed her and the other hit her in the back of the neck after she turned down money for sex.

A year earlier, the woman, bleeding profusely from the stomach, walked into the emergency room of the then-Health Sciences Center Hospital. She said an unknown male, driving a green pickup, gave her a ride and then began fondling her. When she pushed him back, the man cut her with an unknown object,

Her complaints used to be classified as aggravated assaults. But the complaint last week was labeled attempted suicide, indicating officers are incredulous from the very start. In fact, the woman, also a familiar face to ambulance attendants and emergency room personnel, has become a joke.

But the laughing stops when someone asks why the woman has not been helped. Why is it the injured woman is simply allowed to leave, with everyone knowing well they will see her again?

Texas' revised civil statutes state, "Any health or peace officer who has reason to believe...that the person is mentally ill and because of his mental illness is likely to cause injury to himself or others if not immediately restrained, may upon obtaining a warrant from any magistrate, take such person into custody and immediately transport him to the nearest hospital..."

The law further states, however, that detention can only be at a place where

there is proper psychiatric care. And the person cannot be held more than 24 hours unless there is a written order from the county court. An application also can be made through the court for temporary hospitalization.

"The application may be made by any adult person, or by the county judge, and shall state upon information and belief that the proposed patient is not charged with a criminal offense, that he is mentally ill, and that for his own welfare and protection or the protection of others he requires observation

Records show the woman was briefly committed to a state hospital in 1971. But there has been no recent attempt made to force the woman to undergo psychiatric care, and hospital personnel say she will not willingly do so.

"I don't even see any papers started on this case," said Helen Ramby, secretary for Lubbock County Judge Rod Shaw. "It takes someone interested enough to come down and get commitment application papers. So many people are not willing to do this," she said.

We just haven't had anybody come to this office who's interested enough. It's very sad," she added.

Shaw, who was reluctant to talk about the case, said "I don't have any idea" why no one has attempted to seek mandatory help for the woman. The judge, who would have to be contacted before psychiatric care could be forced on the patient, said, "I know absolutely nothing about the woman."

A Mental Health, Mental Retardation case worker also has never been assigned. The Avalanche-Journal was told.

Maj. K.O. Stuart, head of the police department's uniform division, said officers are not "discouraged or encouraged" to seek psychiatric help for ailing persons they come into contact with. "We're not doctors and we have no way of knowing how crazy a person is. It's not an officer's place any longer to try and commit them," he said.

While refusing to discuss the woman's individual case, Dr. John Farquhar, director of emergency services at Lubbock General Hospital, said physicians must weigh the seriousness of the victim's self-inflicted wound and exhaust ev-

ery other avenue of care before considering involuntary treatment. But a nurse at Lubbock General said the woman has repeatedly turned down any help offered by the hospital.

"She very definitely should be committed," Stuart said, "but her family should do it.

Not surprisingly, however, the woman's 61-year-old mother does not feel the youngest of her two daughters should be detained in a mental health institu-

Asked if she has ever attempted to commit her daughter to the state hospital in Big Spring, the woman said, "Never have. She might not last too long down there. She's a mother's child and needs me. She's not crazy. She's just got too much on her mind. Maybe she has to talk to a psychiatrist ... a good one

"She'll be real sick sometimes. She's a nervous type of person. She likes to work, but the doctors won't let her no more. Psychiatrists have talked to her. They told her she had too much on the brain.'

The mother shares a tiny apartment in a run-down East Lubbock complex with her daughter. Asked how many times her daughter has been stabbed, she said, "I can't count that high. I can't go through it."

# Frenship Calls HUD **Action Arbitrary**

The Frenship Independent School District, in a post-trial brief filed Monday afternoon, argues the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development was arbitrary in its site selection for a contested public housing project, and did not allow developers free and open competition in bidding.

Frenship attorney Charles Galey attacked HUD site selection for preselect-ing the 24th Street and Frankford Avenue site, just inside the Frenship boundary, failing to follow its own regulations and conducting no studies on the project's impact on Frenship schools.

When the trial phase of Frenship's suit adjourned Wednesday, U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward allowed Galey to file his final arguments in written form by Monday. Defense counsel have until Thursday to respond, with Woodward's ruling expected to come sometime next week

Frenship filed suit to permanently halt the project Sept. 23, 1980, naming as defendants HUD, Temple Management, the Lubbock Housing Authority and the City of Lubbock. Although Temple and the LHA signed a \$5 million construction contract Sept. 30, 1980, only grade leveling work has been done at the site near Lubbock Christian College.

Based on testimony by Temple project planner Tim Kirkscey, the Frenship brief asserts the true reason HUD rejected the LHA's site preference and approved Temple's revised proposal was because all Temple sites were inside

Frenship points out the LHA did not have the subjective loop criteria, and that the rejected sites have been zoned by the city for development.

HUD did not comply with its own regulations, the brief claims, when it failed to explain to the LHA why its site choices were rejected. Frenship contends an agreement was not reached between HUD and Temple because there was no communication or mutuality, but admitted the defense would dispute that claim.

Frenship said the LHA accepted

HUD's arbitrary site choice under the worst duress, and referred to testimony by former LHA board member Cathy Morton and a letter introduced as evidence from former Mayor Dirk West. Both expressed concern over the possible loss of Community Development funds if HUD's advice was not taken. West referred to HUD's attitude as an "ever present threat

Frenship also argues the Temple sites should have been disqualified by HUD on the basis of its own regulations for two reasons: 1) the two sites were originally rated poor but changed to adequate and HUD's handbook requires automatic rejection for a poor rating; and 2) HUD regulations require rejection of a proposal if it does not contain a map showing the project's relation to existing schools. and Temple included no such map in its developer's packet.


Galey's brief further calls HUD's actions arbitrary for not making the LHA responsible for the planning and development of the project, as it says regulations specify, and for deciding the 96-unit lowincome project would not adversely affect Frenship schools without making

any studies on the question.

# Bus Transfer Point Eligible For Funds

mittee Monday, the proposed downtown transfer point for Citibus passengers became eligible for federal funding.

The Lubbock Urban Transportation Study Steering Committee approved the program revision to bring about the eligi-

The city's transit staff requested that the panel shift the capital assistance grant from the 1982-83 fiscal year to the current year because the transfer point, one of several projects the grant covers, has received priority sooner than antici-

The board placed the grant in this year's element as a preliminary step toward the city seeking federal funds for the downtown transfer point. City transit coordinator John Wilson pointed out, however, that the City Council could opt to apply for Community Development funds, revenue sharing or use city general fund money, if available

"If costs are involved (in securing a downtown transfer point) this approval simply starts the funding process in case the council wants to use Urban Mass Transportation Administration funds," Wilson explained.

He added the council members could still change their minds about which direction to take. The estimated cost for the building alone is \$220,000. The federal capital assistance grant provides \$480,-000, which also can be spent on shelters, signs and other amenities.

In recent weeks, the council and transit staff have discussed several possible sites for the transfer point, which would provide an indoor waiting area for bus riders where they could make change and buy refreshments.

Wilson said the optimum location would be on Broadway between Avenues J and K, because 83,000 bus trips a year

ing sites all along that street. The council has discussed the feasibi ity of locating the transfer point at the former John Halsey Drug Store at Broadway and Avenue K, in a blocked-off area of Avenue J or at the new transit facility

under construction at 801 Texas Avenue. If the transfer point is not on Broadway, Wilson said, costs for the site will increase. He added it is not uncommon for more than 50 riders to be waiting for a bus on Broadway at J or K, with as

many as 100 there at times. Committee members also received copies of a population and economic growth projection report prepared by Frank Osgood Associates of Dallas. The study is one of 10 information segments the panel will use to update transportation plans during the next two years.

Committee member and city planning director Jim Bertram said Osgood predicted an approximate two percent annual growth rate for Lubbock's economy and an increasingly diverse industrial base through the year 2005.

Bertram said Osgood did not have 1980 census figures available for his research, but still was optimistic about Lubbock's economic future despite population figures which were not as high as

The report will not be available to the public until after board members review it and register their approval or disapproval within the next three weeks.

# **Grand Juries Will Investigate Allegations Against Employees** By MARY ALICE ROBBINS

An alleged slush fund established by employees in county commissioner Precinct 3 and possible election code violations by County Clerk Frank Guess will be reviewed by Lubbock County grand juries within the next two months.

Criminal District Attorney John Montford said Monday he plans to present investigative reports on both cases to grand juries to determine if any charges should be filed. The grand jury meeting this month

will review a state election inspector's report on an alleged irregularity during the absentee voting period here last fall. An investigation on the alleged slush

fund - nicknamed the "fishing fund" because workers reportedly used the money to finance fishing trips - will go to the March grand jury, Montford said. Guess was first investigated by the elections division of the Secretary of

State's Office in late October, following reports that he allowed unauthorized voting at a local retirement home. The investigative report, prepared by election inspector John McKenzie, indi-

cates that Guess took a punch card voting device to the Pioneer Retirement Hotel In his report, McKenzie said that

Guess admitted to taking the voting maelderly residents.

Under the Texas Election Code, the county commissioners court can authorize a county clerk to establish a branch office for absentee voting. But the code specifies that a branch office must remain open throughout the official absentee voting period.

According to the investigative report, the voting device was available at the retirement hotel for only one day. And commissioners apparently never voted to authorize absentee voting at the hotel. "I do not see any evidence of criminal

intent to violate the election code based on my review," Montford said. "Making boxes more convenient to senior citizens shows no criminal intent. Montford termed the election investi-

gator's report "one-sided" but said a grand jury should have the opportunity to review the case. "I just want to be fair about it," he said.

If the grand jury determines Guess should be prosecuted for an election law violation, he could be charged with a misdemeanor. Upon conviction, he could

ed that more investigation is needed concerning the amount of money collected. Sheriff's deputies initiated the investigation of the precinct shop in mid-January, after former commissioner Jim Lan-

caster of Idalou turned over an envelope containing \$444.20 which Lancaster charged was part of the fishing fund. In a written deposition, Lancaster charged that the Precinct 3 road crew had accumulated the fund over a several year period. He claimed the money came partly from the sale of county-owned

donations the crew received for performing extra road work. Lancaster said he had held the money since June 1979. But the former commissioner has never explained why he did not turn the money over to authorities

# **Ecuador-Peru Truce** QUITO, Ecuador (UPI) - Ecuador disputed jungle region and acknowledged the loss of only one.

The announced truce brought to a halt the fighting in one of the world's remotest spots and ended a six-day conflict between Ecuador — a little known mem-ber of OPEC — and Peru, whose air armada consists of French mirage jets and Soviet MiGs.

Ecuador announced it had agreed to a cease-fire proposed Monday by the Unit-ed States, Chile, Argentina and Brazil and "observation commissions" of military attaches from the four countries would go immediately to the remote mountainous frontier.

The four countries guaranteed a 1942 border agreement and their military attaches from Quito were to be escorted to the Condor Mountain Range border by Ecuadoran officials, while the four attaches based in Lima were taken to see the Peruvian side of the battle front.

Peru said Sunday it had ordered a truce because it had driven Ecuadoran forces from its territory. Ecuador said it had always owned the three posts in the

**Attaches To Supervise** 

In Washington, the Organization of American States held an emergency meeting at Ecuador's request Monday but took no action. Ecuador, which does not accept the 1942 border, wanted the OAS to investigate its charges Peru started the undeclared war.

The cease-fire appeared just a first step to stop fighting until negotiations can be arranged. Ecuador, whose oil production is the smallest in OPEC, hoped for an OAS investigation that might negotiate a settlement giving it long-sought access to the Amazon River system, where untapped deposits of oil have been The 1942 treaty, following a 1941 war when Ecuador lost about half its land, cut Ecuador off from the river and 100,-000 square miles of potentially oil-rich

# GAO Urges Employees To Ride Bikes

WASHINGTON (AP) - The bureaucracy would roll to work on two wheels instead of four if the General Accounting Office were in charge of getting government workers from place to place.

In a 39-page report to Congress, the GAO said the government should encourage its employees to use bicycles and mopeds in lieu of automobiles and compensate them for the travel - 4 cents a mile for bike riders and 8 cents a mile for moped users.

But obstacles - real and "attitudinal" - stand in the way of a bicycling bureaucracy, said the GAO, an investigative arm of Congress. It recommended

# Firing Of U.S. Ambassador No Surprise

WASHINGTON (AP) - Robert White's ouster as U.S. ambassador to El Salvador wasn't exactly a surprise: it was predicted even before President Reagan

A leak from the Reagan transition team in December accused White and several other ambassadors of improperly acting as "social reformers." The report said White would be ousted soon after Reagan became president. White, the first career ambassador to

be removed from his post by the Reagan administration, had publicly criticized transition team proposals on the future of U.S. relations with El Salvador.

While in El Salvador, White had told reporters Reagan's transition advisers were "weakening my authority to carry out the policy of the Carter administra-

He also was reported to be upset at reports that some members of the transition team were advising certain Salvadorans that they could disregard the team's public denials of support for a rightist takeover in the Central American nation.

A senior State Department official said Monday that White's use of the media instead of private channels to voice his policy disagreements with Washington led to his removal.

The GAO demurred, in part, Sometimes, it said "in addition to conserving energy and protecting the environment, bicycle riders can save time in situations such s congested downtown areas, where bicycle travel is faster than car travel."

# Actors Union Considering Merger Plan

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - The national board of the Screen Actors Guild, one of two actors unions that shut down Hollywood film and television production in a bitter 10-week strike last summer, is considering a merger of their memberships.

The board said at its annual membership meeting recently that it would in-struct SAG President William Schallert to meet with William Hillman, president of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, to set up a SAG-AF-TRA committee to study a three-step plan to merge the unions.

The unions' combined memberships

total more than 60,000.

SAG National Executive Secretary Chester L. Migden told the group of 800 SAG members present that he hoped the long-discussed merger, which may also include the Screen Extras Guild, could be accomplished by early 1983, the next time SAG and AFTRA face film-TV producers at the bargaining table.

"I am convinced that we cannot confront conglomerate(s) ... with fractional-ized forces," said Migden. "It takes all the strength and unity we can find. In the process we have to put aside petty differences, perhaps a little pride and keep our eye on the object, which is building the strongest union we can.

The board proposal was greeted enthusiastically by members present, who passed several motions commending the merger plan, said SAG spokeswoman





DR. LAMB

DEAR DR. LAMB - I was shocked to read in one of your columns that lung cancer is now the second most common cause of cancer deaths in women. Is that because of increased air pollution from factories and automobiles? Shouldn't the government do more about these air pollutants? What is the lung cancer rate in men compared to women? Is the high rate in women because of sex hormones? Isn't cancer becoming an increasing problem in our society? How can an average citizen avoid this dreadful disease?

DEAR READER - You are right about the increase in lung cancer in women being due to air pollution. BUT the biggest source of air pollution that has led to the increase in lung cancer in women is the same one that causes lung cancer in men - cigarette smoke. The air that is important is the air that goes down the windpipe and into the lungs. By far the biggest pollutant danger in our society today is still the smoke polluted air the smoker inhales into his or he. own lungs. I'm always a little annoyed to hear an anti-pollutant fan harangue

while smoking a cigarette.

Lung cancer is by far the leading cause of cancer deaths in men. We used to think women were safe from it, mostly, but that was because not enough women had been smoking long enough to show us that it was just as big a danger for women. Predictions now are that lung cancer deaths will replace breast cancer as the leading cause of cancer deaths in women. It is not a question of hormones but a question of smoking.

About 85 percent of all lung cancers are preventable simply by not smoking. What we know about prevention of cancer is discussed in The Health Letter number 14-8, Cancer: A Fact of Life, which I am sending you. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019.

There has been enormous progress in treating cancer in recent years. Many cancers can be cured. The cure rate in lung cancer is NOT GOOD. That is why it is one cancer you should do all you can to prevent.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I had a hysterectomy when I was only 24. I was going through a messy divorce and my nerves were shot. I'm 29 now and oh how I want a child. There are so many wonderful things happening in medical science now. Can they give a woman back her organs so she can have children? I am desperate. I'm even willing to donate my body for experiments to try this

DEAR READER - I have quite a few questions asking about a uterus transplant so a woman can have a baby. Unfortunately, that is not within the current state of medical science.

The other possibility is a surrogate mother. That means someone else has a baby by your husband and you then raise the baby as your own.

It has not yet been done, but a variation on the test tube baby method may one day be possible. In that case an ovum from you would be harvested at the time of ovulation, fertilized in the laboratory and implanted in another woman's uterus for the pregnancy. The baby would be the product of yours and your husband's genes.

# Heart Failure Treatment Smoke Biggest Pollutant Undergoing Revolution

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) - If you went to a doctor 10 years ago with symptoms of progressive heart failure, you would have been given a weak heart stimulant and drugs to relieve the fluid retention which accompanies the condition.

Two or three years later, you would have returned to the doctor with worsening fatigue and shortness of breath. You probably would have been given extra doses of the same drugs.

"Despite this aggressive therapy in the hospital, you probably would have tended to have, over a short or long course, a downhill progression and eventual death," said Dr. Jay N. Cohn, head of cardiovascular medicine at the University of Minnesota Hospital in Minneapo-

But. Cohn said, times have changed. He said there has been a revolution in understanding heart failure and ways to deal with it.

Five years ago, if you were lucky enough to go to the right medical center, you would have been treated with more appropriate drugs. Today, most medical centers used far more aggressive treatment regimens.

Instead of trying only to improve the force of the heart's blood pumping action with drugs, doctors now are using other drugs to reduce the blood vessel resist-

These drugs are called vasodilators They increase the diameter of the blood vessels and thus reduce resistance -"like taking the nozzle off a hose," Cohn

said at an American Heart Association The vasodilators are particularly effective in heart failure because when the heart begins to fail, the blood vessels normally constrict to support blood pres-sure and to squeeze more blood back to

the heart to help its filling action. Thus, by opening up the vessels the drugs improve the function of the heart and relieve some of the condition's





WARSAW, Poland (AP) - In one of the sharpest attacks to date on the independent trade union Solidarity, Polish Communist Party leader Stanislaw Kania accused the labor movement of having violated its statutes. It was the party's second attack on the free labor movement in less than 24 hours.

In a speech carried in part by Polish radio today, Kania told the commission preparing for the forthcoming party con-

But the foremost problem - the strikers' demand for registration of a private farmers' union - was to be discussed on Wednesday when members of the government delegation, led by Deputy Agriculture Minister Andrzej Kacala, return from Ustrzyki Dolne.

The minister, after talks with strikers occupying the former trade union building in Rzeszow, went to Ustrzyki Dolne to talk to some 20 protesters holed up in the local office of Solidarity.

A Solidarity spokesman said Kacala was expected to be confronted with complaints about agricultural problems in the mountainous Bieszczady region where most of the protesters are tenant

The farmers issue appears to be the big remaining obstacle to labor peace in

Solidarity, the first union free of Communist Party control in the Soviet bloc. and the Polish government reached tentative agreement Saturday on two other roadblocks - the five-day week and greater union access to the media.

# **Baghdad Favors** Ties With U.S.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Iraq hinted it would like to end its 14-year diplomatic isolation from the United States. but Iran - its adversary in the Gulf War remains mired in internal discord and isolated by the Reagan administration.

Iraqi Deputy Prime Minister Tarek Aziz said in an interview with a Saudi Arabian newspaper published Monday that Baghdad was ready to restore diplomatic ties with the U.S. government if it changed its attitude on Israel.

The Iraqi News Agency, which carried excerpts, said Aziz told the newspaper the move would come "if Washington takes a positive, acceptable and more objective stand toward the conflict between Arab states and Israel."

The United States and Iraq broke diplomatic relations in 1967 following the Arab-Israeli war. It has close ties with the Soviet Union, but the opening to Washington was another hint Iraq would like stronger ties with the West.

Iran's relations with the United States ere severed by Washington during the hostage crisis and have not been restored, making the Islamic Repulic an

outlaw state in Washington's eyes. Last week. France delivered the first of 60 Mirage fighter jets that Iraq had or-

dered four years ago. The move brought cries of protest from Iran. The Iraqi Foreign Ministry confirmed

the arrival of the fighters today and said the country "will not forget the French government's healthy decision in future bilateral relations."

By supplying the Mirages, France has proved the independence of the French decision and affirmed its honorable stand, which will be reciprocated by Iraq," the statement said.

Iran in turn Monday demanded France hand over three missile patrol boats that have been blocked in Cherbourg for a year because of an embargo imposed for holding the American hos-

Iranian Charge d'Affaires Ali Banifatemi told a Paris news conference Iran has been demanding delivery of the boats for a month and said France "must satisfy our demand or this would be new proof of its pro-Iraqi stance.

# Weekends Most Dangerous For City Drivers

By PAT GRAVES

**Avalanche-Journal Staff** Mayor Bill McAlister warned Lubbock motorists today that, according to 1980 traffic statistics, the most dangerous time to drive in Lubbock is on the week-

Of the 31 fatal accidents last year, McAlister said 15 occurred on Fridays and Saturdays, as did 35 percent of all accidents. He called the period between 5 p.m. Friday and 3 a.m. Sunday the most

The mayor told the Citizens Traffic Commission this morning that figures show one third of the 1980 fatal accidents occurred between the hours of midnight and 4 a.m., and eight occurred between 4

p.m. and 8 p.m. McAlister also stressed the influence of alcohol on drivers as an integral factor in 11 of the 31 deadly wrecks, which accounted for 34 deaths last year. So it would appear Lubbock streets are least safe late at night on weekends when many drivers are returning from nightclubs and parties.

The mayor pointed out, however, that almost 68 percent of all accidents occurred last year during daylight hours, although the more serious ones were at

night, and 73 percent in clear weather. traffic analysis system. Another particularly dangerous time to drive, McAlister said, is between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. on weekdays, when 22.5 percent of all 1980 accidents happened.

The mayor announced the city's Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) has been funded by the Texas highway department through June with a \$110,665 grant. An additional \$27,000 in state money has been granted to pay for the police department's computerized

Lubbock recorded 23 traffic fatalities in 1979, and 34 in 1980, despite some 25,-000 tickets being issued last year by STEP officers. Three persons have lost their lives on Lubbock streets this year. In fact, the first death occurred on New Year's Day when a man trying to right his motorcycle was struck by a car on 19th Street.

McAlister stated that 19th Street accounted for 10 percent of all 1980 acci-

dents. The most dangerous portion is between Avenues A and J, he said. Of the approximately 9,700 accidents last year. 937 were on 19th Street.

The second highest number of accidents occurred on 50th Street, where 910 were reported. McAlister said its most hazardous stretch is between Avenues A and K. The next most dangerous streets. in order of number of accidents, were 34th Street, University Avenue, Slide Road and Loop 289.

Guerra took the witness stand under questioning by defense attorney Jim Al-exander to tell the jury how the accident occurred and under cross-examination by prosecutor Jim Bob Darnell, Guerra denied passing witness Mark Lowell Thompson at a high rate of speed.

"I never even got into passing gear," the defendant asserted.

Thompson told the 137th District Court jury that he noticed the Corvette traveling closely behind his own car before it accelerated to about 60 mph and passed him on the right side of the road. As the Corvette approached the intersec-tion, the driver of the car "tried to beat the light," Thompson testified.

"I had looked up, and there was a green light five car lengths before the in-

was green when he entered the intersection, and he saw the Pontiac starting to turn in front of him, Guerra added. It was then that he applied the

brakes. Guerra told the court. In earlier testimony, Emergency Medical Services worker Phil Klein told

the court that he and another EMS worker used cardio-pulmonary resuscitation and advanced life support methods in attempts to save the woman. Klein told the jury that they were unable to find a pulse about two minutes after the woman was placed in the ambulance.

Justice of the Peace L. J. Blalack testified that Mrs. Kirby died of massive head and chest injuries. He ruled the death a homicide, Blalack testified.

Attorneys were scheduled to begin final arguments in the case this afternoon.



# Tech Takes Long, Winding TCU Road

FORT WORTH - Texas Tech will put a pair of streaks, one as impressive as the other is unimpressive, on the line here tonight when the Red Raiders meet Texas Christian University.

Something will have to give. It will be impossible for the Red Raiders to pro-

long both strings any longer.

First of all, the Raiders are 0-6 on the road this season, including an 0-4 Southwest Conference mark. On the other hand, Tech has come out on top of TCU in the last 18 meetings between the two schools. Ideally, the Raiders would like to stretch that win streak to 19 in a row and break out of the road blues that have haunted them the last two seasons.

Both Tech and TCU bring 4-5 SWC slates into tonight's game at Daniel-Mey-er Coliseum, scheduled for a 7:30 p.m. tipoff. The game will be broadcast on KFYO radio in Lubbock.

If the 10-9 Raiders are ever to win a road game, it would appear this would be the best place to start. In fact, Daniel-Meyer was the site of Tech's last victory outside the Hub City (discounting two tournament victories on neutral courts).

here last year. While the Raiders are fresh off an im-

pressive 81-70 victory over league-leading Houston, beating TCU won't be easy. The Frogs took Tech right down to the wire in an earlier meeting in Lubbock, which the Raiders won 57-54.

So both coaches, Gerald Myers of Tech and Jim Killingsworth of TCU, downplayed the significance of either Tech's win streak over TCU or the Raiders' inability to win on the road.

"Has Tech really won that many in a row on us?" asked a laughing Killingsworth. "Well, they must've cheated us out of a couple of 'em then."

And told of Tech's troubles away from home, Killingsworth was equally Well, as I remember, they sure

didn't have any trouble down here last year," said the TCU coach. "They bombed us right out of the gym."

"We're not going to be worried about any win streak," said Myers, "and we're not going to be thinking we've got some kind of road jinx or can't play on the

"It's not something we're going to

think I'll mention it.'

Myers did say he'll do plenty of talking to his squad about Frog guard Darrell Browder, the SWC's third-leading scorer with a 20.2 average. To stop TCU, Tech must shut down Browder.

"TCU played us a very close game here, and we realize we've got to play them smart," said Myers. "We've got to do a good job on Browder.

Killingsworth reports that his team has seen a box-and-one zone defense with special attention on Browder in its last eight games. Myers, while not disclosing any game plan, says there are other ways

"I don't think you have to resort to a box-and-one," said Myers. "We've got some pretty good defensive players."

Myers said that 6-9 senior forward Ralph Brewster, who got his first start-ing assignment of the season in Monday's 81-70 win over Houston, will open against the Frogs as well.

"He's earned it," said Myers, "and he

did a great job against Houston."

Nonetheless, TCU's 4-5 SWC mark and 7-12 overall record both represent giant steps forward for the Frog pro-


"I've been pleased with the effort I've been getting," said Killingsworth. "I would've liked us to shoot the ball a little better this year, but, effort-wise, I can't

# Cook Survives Crosby Playoff

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) - His expessionless face never betrayed it, but young John Cook admitted "I was choking a little on those last few holes, trying to get in the playoff" for the title in one of golf's more confused, confusing but nevertheless spectacular events.

First he watched poker-faced while his amateur partner actor Jim Garner engaged in a shoving match with an over-boisterous spectator. Then such names as Jack Nicklaus and Tom Watson shot themselves out of it, gritty Ben Crenshaw blew sole control of the lead and two-time U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin failed on a short, playoff putt that would have won it.

After all that the 23-year-old Cook emerged as the winner of the first five-man sudden-death playoff in modern golf history and the Bing Crobsy Pro-Am golf

Despite the interruption of the Garner incident late on a sunny afternoon, despite his attack of nerves over the final holes of regulation, the 23-year-old Cook regained his composure when the five men trooped to the first tee at Pebble

"I felt very comfortable in the playoff," Cook said. "I relax by hitting balls. So after I'd finished at Spyglass, I just hit some balls and I felt fine in the playoff." Barney Thompson, Bob Clampett and Crenshaw dropped out on that first extra

hole when Cook birdied from 10 feet and Irwin scored from four. Both parred the par-5 second, with Irwin missing a 4-footer that would have

"I got in my own way," the veteran said. "Cook deserved to win it." And win it he did on the next hole. Irwin missed the green and bogeyed. Cook

had it four feet from the flag for a birdie, but missed. He had about an 18-inch putt to win it and calmly dropped the ball in the cup for a \$40,500 first prize and the first victory of his two-year pro career. It was a dramatic windup to a much-troubled event that was rained out for two

days, eventually was cut from 72 holes to 54 and finished a day late on six holes spread over three courses spaced along about five miles of picturesque beauty on the Monterey Peninsula coast.



"We were trying to be a little more deliberate than usual," Copeland said. We did what the defense let us do. We moved the ball around and took advantage only when there was an opening."

The first half saw neither squad emerge with an advantage. The Lobos led for the majority of the 20 minutes but never by more than five points.

LCC finally tied the score 32-32 at the buzzer on a 20-foot basket by guard Keith Money. The second half was close and of good quality for nine minutes, or until the Chaps' Rick Murdock scored underneath to give his team a lead it would not

LCC outscored Sul Ross 11-2 during the next three minutes as seven points by Fortner, a layup by Money and two free throws by Bruce Carver enhanced the margin to 55-44 with 7:39 left.

It was then that LCC resorted to its delay offense, a risky proposition considering that Chap leads have not held together during implementation of this strategy in past games.

"That delay was either gonna break us or win the ball game," Copeland said. "We ran it pretty good tonight. We showed some confidence in it. It got us into a free-throw shooting game, and that's what we wanted."

LCC handled the ball well down the stretch and hit eight of 10 free throws during the final 2:12. Sul Ross never seriously threatened.

Carver, who hit eight of eight free throws and led the Chaps with 22 points, now has connected on 20 charity shots in a row. He is within three of the LCC re-

#### 'Sul Ross will fight you to the end," Kush Takes Stand, Denies Charges Rutledge's Mistreatment

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - Former Arizona State football coach Frank Kush took the witness stand for the first time Monday and gave a conflicting account of an alleged incident which spurred ex-Sun Devil punter-defensive back Kevin Rutledge into filing a \$2.2 million damage suit.

Rutledge, who now attends the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, is suing Kush, former Arizona State assistant coach Bill Maskill, the university and other parties - contending that Kush punched him in the mouth after a poor punt in the Sun Devils' 41-7 loss to Washington Oct.28, 1978 in Seattle.

He also said both Kush and Maskill subsequently harassed him into quitting the team and forfeiting his scholarship.

Following a 26-yard punt in the second quarter of the Washington game, Rutledge testified Kush grabbed his face mask, shook Rutledge's head from side to side and up and down, and then delivered a punch under the facemask that split Rutledge's upper lip.

Taking the witness stand for the first time Monday, Kush said he had no recollection of grabbing Rutledge's facemask in the game. "I don't recall grabbing anybody's facemask," Kush told the court. "I'm sure I

did sometimes. It was not unusual. "I did it mostly with the older players for making mental mistakes - caused by lack of concentration," added Kush. "Young players, like Kevin, I was more lenient with. I had more compassion for.

Rutledge, a sophomore at the time of the alleged incident, testified earlier Monday that Kush slapped his helmet and grabbed his facemask "too many times to count" before the game in question.

"It had to be out of the ordinary to have me remember one in particular," Rutledge said. "What separated this instance was the fact that he (Kush) did punch

Rutledge donned a helmet similar to the one he wore at Arizona State and his attorney. Robert Hing, play-acted the alleged punch twice Monday — first with the chin strap fastened and then with it unfastened. Hing's hand reached Rutledge's upper lip both times.

Kush's attorneys tried all last week to show the jury that with the chinstrap unfastened. Kush could not have possibly landed the alleged punch.

In a previous deposition, Rutledge had said his chinstrap was fastened but has since testified that it was unfastened.

Rutledge has said Kush called him "gutless," swore at him and kept him from punting during 1978's training camp after he tackled then-Sun Devil quarterback Mark Malone in a practice drill. Rutledge said he tackled Malone, who was recovering from an injury at the time, at Maskill's instructions.

From that point on, Rutledge said, he was listed as a fifth-string defensive back on the team. He sat out Arizona State's 1978 season-opening game and figured he was going to be redshirted.

"We weren't going to do that. He was our top punter," Kush told the court."
"But his kicking at camp was very erratic. I thought by not dressing him, it might." motivate him.

During the following week's practice, Rutledge said Kush told him to "get off your -and start punting

"I told him (Kush) that I thought I was going to be redshirted," Rutledge testified. "But he said, 'That's a damn lie. I don't know where you heard that."

Kush said he didn't recall ever talking to Rutledge about being redshirted. Rutledge said he then attempted to attend regular meetings for the team's de-fensive backs but was told by Maskill "not to bother because you're not going to

After missing one of the meetings because he went to the wrong room, Rutledge said Kush took away his uniform and Maskill made him run 45 wind sprints. Rutledge said he suffered a pulled hamstring muscle while he was running the sprints — an injury he says affected his play when he went back to punting.

# Coed Alleges Coach's Role In Abortion Coverup

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Wichita State basketball coaches arranged and apparently paid for an abortion after a coed became pregnant by a star player, a newspaper quotes the young woman as saying.

In a copyright story today, the Kansas City Times said the woman, at the urging of coaches, aborted the pregnancy on Jan. 18, 1980, at the Wesley Medical Center

"It's all a bad memory for me now," the former coed was quoted as saying. She said Gene Smithson, head coach, and assistant coach Jeff Jones pressured her to abort the pregnancy after the mother of the player threatened to have her son re-

The newspaper said hospital documents obtained without the young woman's assistance verified that an abortion was performed. Dr. Terry A. Tracy signed the admission record as the attending physician, the newspaper said. It said the cost who paid the medical fees.

Neither the player nor the young woman were identified. The Times said the player acknowledged the pregnancy and abortion, but said the coaches never knew of the situation. The player's mother also denied knowing about the pregnancy or threatening to have her son removed from the team.

They didn't pay for nothing," the player said of the coaches. "I paid for it. I gave her the cash and she took care of it."

Smithson and Jones and other WSU officials refused comment The newspaper made the allegations in the second of a five-part investigative series on collegiate athletics. In a story Monday, the Times said four former WSU basketball players said they received more than \$4,500 in gratuities from coaches and college boosters the past three years.

Today's story quoted the former coed as saying that after she decided to have the abortion, the coaches stalled until the player's mother threatened to remove

Smithson called me," she said. "He told me to go to the hospital that evening. I did. I had some tests run. The hospital never sent me a bill. They didn't question me about who was paying. All I had to do was say my name and that was all.

She said that after the abortion the coaches warned her to tell no one and promised to pay her hush money and place her in a job in a Wichita bank.

She said that after she assured the coaches she would not reveal the abortion, Smithson smiled and took \$6 from his pocket and handed it to her. She said she received no more cash, but was sent to work at a Wichita Bank.

seen for more than a week. The other defendants are Muhammad Ali Amateur Sports Inc., also run by Smith: MAPS president Sam Marshall; Barbara Smith: Gladys Lewis, and Bodak Productions Inc.

Ben Lewis was a branch officer until Jan 23. In a statement released from its San Francisco headquarters Monday, Wells Fargo said the total amount of missing bank

funds was \$21,305,000. Wells Fargo alleges the fraud was accomplished through an internal manipulation of funds involving some 13 accounts. the statement said. "Appropriate law enforcement and regula-

tory authorities have been advised. Wells Fargo ... believes that all but \$1 million of the loss would be covered by insurance."

# Cavs File Suit **Against Station**

CLEVELAND (AP) - The board of directors of the National Basketball Association's Cleveland Cavaliers has voted to file a lawsuit seeking \$10 million in damages from radio station WWWE and an end of play-by-play rights to Cavalier

The suit alleges the 50,000-watt, clear channel station has breached its contract in the way it has commented on the Cavaliers, said team lawyer Kent B. Schnei-

Schneider said the suit would be filed today in Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court.

He said the Cavaliers will seek \$5 million in compensatory damages, \$5 million in punitive damages and termination of the contract.

The three-year contract involving the Cavaliers and WWWE, signed April 30, 1980, calls for WWWE to pay the Cavaliers \$82,000 for the current season, \$90,-200 for the 1981-82 season and \$98,400 for the 1982-83 season. The suit would have broadcast rights terminated at the end of

Schneider said the NBA club also will petition the Federal Communications Commission to impose against WWWE penalties for repeated violations of FCC

Neither Ted Stepien, the Cavaliers' principal owner, nor management of the radio station have as yet commented on

Stepien this season has said criticism against him voiced on a WWWE sports talk show hosted by Peter J. Franklin

But Dr. Jerry Ramsey, associate vice president for academic affairs at Tech, says the lack of women should not be cause for concern.

'There's not nearly as many females in each category," he explained. The office of statistics and reports lists 378 women and 1,102 men on the Texas Tech facul-

'Traditionally the work force in higher education in many disciplines has been white males." Ramset said. "It takes a while to fill that pipeline.

Ramsey noted that a change in academic rank usually includes a pay increase and that all such salary changes would become effective in the next academic year,

# Discrimination Complaints At Tech Probed

Teams from two federal government offices are on the Texas Tech campus this week to investigate separate discrimination complaints.

Dennis Good from the Albuquerque office of federal contracts compliance program of the U.S. Department of Labor is reviewing the complaint of Mexican-American law school students and also gathering information on the university's affirmative action compliance.

Also, a team from the civil rights office of the U.S. Department of Education is investigating a complaint filed by a woman alleging job promotion discrimi-

"We'll be gathering information on things to either substantiate or disprove the complaint," Good said of the law students' allegations.

Seven organizations submitted the complaint concerning university practices to both the education and justice departments last spring, but the case is commonly referred to as the law students' complaint.

The complaint alleged discrimination in recruitment, hiring, pay, promotion and tenure of faculty, administration and staff, and in the admissions policies of the graduate schools. One statistic cited in the complaint

was that of 574 students enrolled in Tech's Law School at the time the complaint documents were drafted none were black and 3.8 percent were Mexi-

Department of Education representatives visited the campus last summer to investigate the complaint, which is now being reviewed by the labor department.

Good said he will look at all employ ment practices at Texas Tech for both facully and staff members. Among the categories to be examined are hiring, promotion, salaries, tenure and number of men and women in comparable rankings and departments.

and jetties of oil," said Coast Guard spokesman Doug Bandos, The slick went ashore Monday night north of Texas City, and into an area considered an environmentally sensitive area because of the shrimp there. It beached on mostly hard-packed clay,

Bandos said. 'We lucked out, I guess," Bandos said. "It could have really been a mess if it had gone into the lake.

An estimated 20,000 barrels of crude oil spilled last Wednesday when the 365foot chemical carrier Lucor Wicliffe tore a 12-foot gash in the left rear quarter of the 809-foot oil tanker Olympic Glory in the collision near where the channel enters Galveston Bay.

Coast Guard spokesman Doug Bandos said contract cleanup crews went to work shortly after the accident - at a cost to the ship owners of \$100,000 daily - and "very conservatively, I would say we have 40 percent of the thing picked up."

He said he expected the major pockets of the oil would probably be cleaned up by Wednesday, but it might be two weeks before all remnants of the slick were cleaned.

Bandos said estimating how much oil remained to be recovered was difficult because the spilled oil had emulsified in the wind-chopped bay waters and created a mess greater than the volume of the

'I'm not an environmentalist, but as far as I know, it hasn't really hit any really sensitive areas. It missed Atkinson's Island (a bird feeding area due east of the collision site). It went right on by it,"

Bandos said the crews Monday chased 4,000-barrel patch of oil-water emulsion down the western side of Galveston Bay, trying to catch it before it could pollute any environmentally sensitive areas and claimed success.

The slick went ashore Monday evening near Moses Lake, about one mile south of Morgan's Point at the mouth of the ship channel and considered an environmentally sensitive area because of the shrimp there, and beached on mostly hard-packed clay.

He said the crews had strung boom and vacuum trucks were working to sweep in the slick and prevent any of it from going into the lake.



# Regan Requesting Debt Ceiling Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Blaming high spending and "poor man agement" by the Carter administration, Treasury Secretary Donald Regan said today the government soon won't be able to pay its bills unless Congress allows it to borrow more money.

Appearing before the House Ways and Means Committee, Reganappealed for prompt congressional action to raise the national debt ceiling from its current \$935.1 billion level to \$985 billion. A House vote is scheduled Thursday.

If the ceiling is not raised, Regan estimated the government will begin running short of money Feb. 18 and will have to decide which of

'If we can't borrow, we can't pay our bills," he told the panel. Regan said he made the request with "regret," but, "We have no choice but to increase the debt limit if we are to honor the existing commitments that have already been made by the government.

He blamed an "explosion of federal expenditures," partly due to overly optimistic spending estimates by Jimmy Carter's administra-Regan also blamed the previous administration's "poor manage-

ment" in letting the Treasury's cash balance get too low on Dec. 31, 1980 - only \$12 billion instead of the planned \$15 billion. He said that means the Treasury must borrow more to build up the balance. Regan warned Congress not to engage in eleventh-hour "political

brinksmanship" as in the past, when legislators failed to bring the debt ceiling up to the government's needs for brief periods. Regan said that caused "great confusion" and unsettled financial markets.

If Congress does not act promptly, Regan said, the government must decide "which of the government's obligations it should pay — Social Security checks, payroll checks, unemployment checks, defense contracts - and whether, for the first time in history, it will de-

# DJ Admits Story Of Voices False

TEMPLE (AP) - Boris Badenoff is bad enough, but a bogus Boris Badenoff became a bit too much.

My ego sort of got carried away and I sort of embellished on a lot of things," a sheepish Bob Raleigh said Tuesday, admitting his voice was not that of the pint-sized television villain on the program "Rocky And His Friends," as he had claimed in three recent interviews and a job applica-

The hoax ended when Raleigh, 36, was asked about statements from the show's producers that Raleigh never worked for them. He said he felt "embarrassed" at the deception and was glad it was over.

Raleigh joined Temple radio station KTEM as morning disc jockey three weeks ago, bringing an impressive resume, station officials said

It listed employment at several radio stations and the voice of "Boris," plus jobs as the cartoon voices of "Astro," the dog on "The Jetsons" and "Scooby Doo," another semiliterate cartoon pooch, plus voice work on the cartoon version of "Star Trek

His reputation spread, several reporters asked for interviews and he agreed.

The Temple Daily Telegram printed a story, KRLD-AM in Dallas interviewed him and the Dallas Times-Herald published a Sunday feature on his talents that was was transmitted nationally on Monday by the Associated Press.

But the charade ended Tuesday when a spokesman at Jay Ward Productions, the Los Angeles producers of the cartoon show, said the Boris' voice came from veteran actor Paul Frees, not Raleigh "I'm not upset," said Bill Scott, a writer-producer for the

old "Rocky" series. "but he shouldn't say he was a member Raleigh said he began making the false claims about his

cartoon voice work in a "situation where I was among a bunch of people of notable talent," and felt he had to enhance his own background to "be on equal footing. Raleigh's claims went unchallenged because he actually

did uncannily accurate impressions of the characters. 'He sounded like Boris to me ... he was damn good," said KRLD interviewer Alex Burton. "I sat in the studio and

listened to him do all those voices. Raleigh said he uses the cartoon-character voices on his

radio program. The voices say things I can't because of their personalities. It may sound old-fashioned, but I really like to enter-

tain," he said. Raleigh said he wants to "apologize to anyone who was misled to believe I was anyone I was not.

"I'm sorta glad this happened, because now I can dump the story. Raleigh said he never tried to do cartoon voices profes-

sionally because he lacked self-confidence. "Have him give me a call." Scott said. "I may not have a job for him, but I'd like to hear from him. And Raleigh's bosses want him to stay on.

"Boris Badenoff came to Temple," said KTEM official Steve Cannon, "and he's going to stay here.

# **Banks Reduce Prime Rate**

NEW YORK (AP) - Several major New York banks today reduced their prime lending rates to 19.5 percent from 20 percent, joining several other banks at that level.

Chemical Bank, Morgan Guaranty Trust Co., Manufacturers Hanover Trust Co. and Irving Trust Co. were among the banks that reduced. their rates to the level first adopted last Wednesday by Marine Midland Bank and since matched by some other banks.

The widespread cuts made it likely that the 19.5 percent rate will become the industry standard, although some major banks are still charging 20 percent. But there is considerable uncertainty as to whether interest rates will decline substantially. The prime rate is the rate charged by most banks on loans to their

most credit-worthy corporate customers, with other commericial and industrial borrowers paying more. The rate hit a peak of 21.5 percent in mid-December and has since declined slowly.
