

American Woman's Release Hits Snag

Cynthia B. Dwyer, an American writer convicted of spying and ordered deported from Iran, was detained today at Tehran airport over a last-minute problem with her exit papers and the plane that was to fly her to freedom left with-

A State Department spokeswomen in Washington said, "We have been in-formed by the Swiss that she has not left There is apparently some problem in her exit papers and she is still being de-

Earlier, Western reporters in Tehran

held for nine months on espionage charges, had boarded an Iranair flight for Vienna, Austria.

In the Swiss capital, a Swiss Foreign Ministry spokesman said the flight left without Mrs. Dwver because of "some problems with her papers." Spokesman Othmar Uhl said, "our people are now trying to straighten things out at Tehran airport and they hope to be able to put her on the next plane." He said he did not know when she might leave Iran.

The Iranair office in Geneva said its next scheduled flight out of Tehran was Wednesday, flying to Istanbul, Turkey and Frankfurt, West Germany. Iranair is the only airline regularly flying out of

When the Iranair Boeing 747 arrived in Vienna, Flight Engineer Ali Grami said the plane had been delayed for an hour and the crew had been told to await four VIP passengers. "Then they said we could go, I don't know why," he told re-

The 49-year-old Mrs. Dwyer, who went to Iran to write about Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolution, was convicted by a Revolutionary Court Sunday and sentenced to the time she had already served.

Western reporters in Tehran said a black Mercedes limousine with bulletproof glass took Mrs. Dwyer to Mehrabad Airport as the noon Iranair flight was warming up and she was smiling as she ran to the plane. But the Swiss, who represent U.S. interests in Iran, reported to Washington that a problem arose over

Bandit Escapes With S&L Loot

Avalanche-Journal Staff A bandit with a stocking over his face entered a 21st Street savings and loan association shortly before 10 a.m. today, took \$2,115 cash and tied up the two female tellers before crawling out the front door, police said.

Seconds after the heist at State Savings of Lubbock, Medical Branch, at 3519 21st St., a man matching the suspect's description barely missed colliding with another motorist at 19th Street and Indiana Avenue. The witness told officers the man was traveling north at a high rate of speed in a red car.

Police spokesman Bill Morgan said the bandit again was spotted by an officer traveling east on Fourth Street, but lost the man when he turned north on either Elgin or Boston Avenues. "The officer got just close enough to tell it was a red car," Morgan said.

The man lost the officer in a residential section and remained at large early this afternoon.

Tellers Sherry Ward, 21, and Carolyn Cole, 33, the only two persons present when the masked man entered the business, told police they never saw a weap-on. Association president Burl Greaves said neither employee was injured, but both were shaken and did not want to talk to reporters

Police said Mrs. Cole was standing by a coffee pot in the southeast corner of the small office and Miss Ward was behind a counter when the man walked in at 9:50 a.m. Morgan said the robber had a nylon stocking over his face and a beige toboggan cap pulled down to his eye-

The bandit was white, in his 20s, about 5 feet 7 inches tall, with a chunky build, according to the tellers. He was clad in a jean jacket and baggy blue jean pants, they said.

The man carried a brown sack or envelope under his left arm, with his right hand covering it, according to the tellers.

Mrs. Cole told authorities, including the FBI, that the man first confronted her and ordered her to walk behind the counter where Miss Ward was standing. Instructing Mrs. Cole to lie on the floor, he then turned to the other teller and demanded all the cash.

Morgan said when Miss Ward laid more than \$2,000 in various bills on the counter, she too was made to lie on the floor. He then produced a thin cord and tied Mrs. Cole's hands behind her. peatedly, "Be quiet, close your eyes, I

Police said the man was tying Miss Ward's wrists when a customer pulled up to the drive-through window, activating an automatic service bell. "When that bell rang, that spooked him," Morgan

The bandit asked the bound tellers if there was a back door. The women said when they told the man there was not, he got on his hands and knees and crawled to the front door, holding the money in

Greaves said the tellers knew the man had left when they heard the door

chimes ring. "He didn't tie one of the girls (Mrs. Ward) very well, and she got loose soon after he left," he said.

Police said a second bank customer, who had pulled to the side service window, saw the man drive off in the red vehicle. Shortly afterward, officer James Howard was flagged down at 19th Street and Indiana Avenue and told by a motorist that he almost was hit by the fleeing

The man was then spotted on Fourth Street by a police officer, but Morgan said traffic kept him from getting close to the suspect. Except for the color, no witness was able to give a description of the vehicle.

WIDOW SEEKS \$2.2 MILLION

FaultyForecast Cited In Death

BOSTON (AP) - Charging that an inaccurate forecast by the National Weather Service sent her husband to his death, the pregnant widow of a Plymouth fisherman is seeking \$2.2 million compensation from the U.S. government.

Honour Brown's federal suit contends the weather service issued a forecast that failed to warn of an approaching storm. She said her husband, Gary, would not have gone to sea if he had known about the storm.

Brown. 25. was washed from the pilot house of the lobster boat Sea Fever during a Nov. 22 storm on the Georges Bank, a rich fishing ground about 180 miles southeast of Boston.

Three fishing vessels sank that day. Three men died aboard the lobster boat

The suit, filed on behalf of Mrs. Brown and her unborn child, alleges negligence of the Coast Guard and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration were responsible for her husband's death.

She also has sued the Sea Fever Corp., owner of the lobster boat, for \$2.2 million, charging the boat was not seaworthy. U.S. Attorney Paul Troy, who is handling the case for the government, dec-

Michael Latti, Mrs. Brown's attorney, said the suit against the government

contends that a crucial wind-measuring instrument, mounted on a weather buoy in the Georges Bank, had been broken for more than two months before Latti said he will argue that the forecast would have been different if that information had been available and used.

Suing the federal government over bad weather forecasts is not unheard of. However, Dr. Edith Brown Weiss, an attorney at the Georgetown University

Law Center in Washington, said other such suits have been inconclusive.

In three cases stemming from the path and time of arrival of hurricanes, judges ruled the plaintiffs could sue the federal government. However, she said, the plaintiffs lost when the court ruled they failed to prove the government.

Stations Up Prices On Gasoline

Avalanche-Journal Staff

Following an average price increase of 10 cents a gallon for gasoline across the nation, the Lubbock market stayed close behind with an approximate 8-cent price jump reported here since President Reagan instigated price decontrols.

The increases have hit Lubbock consumers gradually, with average 4-cent markups showing up at the pumps in each of the past two weeks.

And, at least two distributors here are predicting retail prices will hit at least \$1.50 a gallon by this summer.

Gas buyers are already paying in the \$1.20 to \$1.44 range, with the price depending upon whether the purchaser uses regular or unleaded fuel and self-or full-service.

A survey by The Avalanche-Journal of 10 local service stations points out that consumers can save considerably by filling up their own tanks. Prices for selfservice regular grade gas usually ranged in the \$1.20 to \$1.27 a gallon range, while buyers who let someone else do the work can expect to pay in the \$1.29 to \$1.33 cat-

Full-service, unleaded gasoline, the most expensive, hit the \$1.44-a-gallon mark this week at a University Avenue station. However, those who look farther can pay as low as \$1.29 a gallon for the same fuel.

Both Reagan's price decontrols and OPEC price increases have contributed to a national price jump since Jan. 1.

Under the terms of that contract, the county can earn 8 percent interest or the current money market certificate rate, whichever the county deems most beneficial, on time deposits up to \$100,000. Interest rates for deposits topping \$100,000 go up to 10.8 percent.

County Judge Rod Shaw said he saw no problem in the commissioners' action on the bank depository.

Shaw said he inadvertently left the depository contract off the agenda, but he noted that the bid opening was advertised in The Avalanche-Journal. However, commissioners also took ac-

tion on another issue that failed to appear on their agenda - which apparently violated the Texas Open Meetings Act. Commissioners voted unanimously to

authorize the purchasing agent to take bids on a building to house fire equipment for the Roosevelt Volunteer Fire Department. The county will loan the department around \$25,000 to construct the building, with the funds to be repaid through fire calls.

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Workers occupied their factories and offices today in the southwest Polish city of Jelenia Gora in a general strike called after negotiations broke down over workers' demands for access to a local resort and clinic reserved for officials of the Communist Party and the government.

Buses and other city transportation carried the workers to their jobs during the morning rush hours. Once they were there, the citywide strike began and public transportation came to a halt.

A spokesman for Solidarity, Poland's 10-million-member independent labor federation, had predicted Sunday that 100,000 workers might strike in Jelenia Gora, but the exact number of strikers could not be confirmed today.

The spokesman said health services and communications facilities were operating and some bus service was available to and from local tourist resorts.

Solidarity said Sunday that the gov-ernment had "interrupted" talks with union leaders in Jelenia Gora. The union's spokesman said the government representatives reaffirmed official opposition to the union's demand that the resort and the clinic be turned over to the local health service.

The workers also want the dismissal of Trade Union Minister Stanislaw Ciosek, who was the local party secretary between 1975 and 1980, and other local officials

Lech Walesa, Solidarity's national leader, arrived in Jelenia Gora Sunday and met with about 200 delegates from regional Solidarity chapters.

ROCKFORD, Ill. (UPI) - Six unsolved murders - all committed in broad daylight in less than a week have frightened area residents into arming themselves, locking up their homes and closing businesses early. 'This time of year, in a week, maybe

I'd sell two or three guns," said a local gun store owner. "In the past week, I've sold 15. Everybody's coming in - wives, husbands, store owners."

An employee at a service station where one victim was shot said the doors were "locked most of the time now, especially when the driveway's empty.

Police blame a lone gunman, armed with a "large caliber" weapon, for the killing spree that began Jan. 27.

The first four victims were in Rockford, a northern Illinois industrial city of 150,000, on Jan. 27. The most recent two were in neighboring Beloit, Wis., 20 miles north across the state line.

Police in both cities said no real pattern had emerged in the killings at service stations and small stores. Two victims were black and four were white. Police all but ruled out drugs and gambling as a motive, and said only small amounts of money were taken from two of the victims. All were slain in daylight hours.

Rockford police Sgt. James Anderson, who hesitated to discuss the investigation, said authorities were seeking to question a man wanted on a robbery war-

rant in Chicago. He is believed to have lived in Rockford recently.

The first victims were Willie Fredd, 54, and Albert Pearson, 20, who were found dead on the floor of Fredd's Groceries on Tuesday, Jan. 27. Each had been shot several times. The next morning, Kevin Kaiser, 18, was killed in a nearby Clark Oil service station. Five bullets were found in his head and body.

On the following day (Thursday), Kenny Lee Faust Jr., 34, was shot in the head as he worked at an E-Z Go service station two blocks away from the Clark

The killings shifted to Beloit the following Monday. Richard W. Boeck, 21, and a customer, Donald Rains, 21, were

shot with a large caliber weapon. No money was reported stolen. Rockford residents are scared. They are taking no chances.

Gary Pollock, 29, who works at the E-Z Go where Faust was killed, said he locks the doors most of the time, and posted on the door of the Clark station where Kaiser was killed is a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the killer. It is signed by Robert Reed, board chairman of Clark Oil and Refining Co.

A gunshop owner on Rockford's northwest side, who asked not to be identified because "I don't want that guy mad at me for saying anything" said gun sales in the area have increased dramatically in the past week.

ATHENS, Greece (UPI) - The government today reported 19 people, mostly teen-agers, were killed and more than 50 were injured in a stampede that broke out among crowds expressing jubilation at their team's soccer victory.

Police said 39 people were hospital-ized, 10 of them in critical condition in the Sunday incident which Premier

George Rallis called one of the worst catastrophies in Greek history.

Scenes of human tragedy took place inside the Tzanneion hospital in Piraeus late Sunday and early today with parents identifying missing children among the

A crowd massed outside the hospital.

Death Toll Reaches 71 In Circus Tent Blaze

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) - More victims of a fire that raced through a circus tent crowded with children died today to raise the death toll to 71.

More than 400 people were injured in the Saturday matinee fire in Bangalore in southwestern India, and 100 of them were treated and released.

Five children caught in the fire, which broke out during a special children's show, died in Bangalore's Victoria Hospital today, lifting the death toll to

More than 20 other women and children lay close to death in overcrowded wards at the hospital, where doctors and relatives of victims still worked at identifying remains that were burned beyond recognition.

Officials said 58 people, mostly children bused in from outlying areas for the show, died instantly when a fire broke out near the roof of the big top, which was packed to near its 4,000-person capacity. Eleven of the victims died later.

Forty-five of the dead were children. Most of the 24 adult victims were women - mothers and teachers accompanying the children.

Officials said their initial assessment that faulty wiring might have caused the fire probably would prove correct. Many of the childen died in a

stampede to escape as the flaming tent floated down on them. Employees of the Venus Circus pulled tigers and lions in their cages free from the blaze. Artists performing on trapezes,

high wires and on the ground escaped. Several elephants and horses broke free of their tethers and escaped injury, circus officials said.

Strike Wrong Answer

SINCE STRIKES are no longer getting the teacher unions what they want, they are looking for other ways to achieve their objectives and, according to NEA general counsel Robert Chanin, binding arbitration is among those alternatives.

Chanin says during the 1960s teacher strikes were something new. They got lots of attention and had an effect. But now the novelty has worn off and school boards have learned they can take a teacher strike.

"After all," Chanin says, "people generally recognize that teacher strikes do not pose an immediate threat to the health and safety of the community."

Consequently, there's an increasing recognition on the part of the NEA that strikes are not the answer.

"THE ASSOCIATION is looking at alternatives to strikes," Chanin told The Government Union Critique, a fortnightly report on public sector unionism. "Binding interest arbitration is one of them. But it's probably too early to conclude if interest arbitration is the final answer."

Not only are strikes not having the effect they used to have, the courts are coming down harder on them. Says Chanin: "The courts are turning tough. The fines are getting big. But more than money, teachers have begun to see the insides of jail cells."

The New Jersey Education Association, for instance, once had so many union leaders in jail it held its leadership conference there.

At best, the NEA official concedes, a legal right to strike is a mixed blessing. Even in a egal strike a school board can replace stri-

Teacher unions are finding when strikes are legal, they last longer, and the union often ends up in financial straits.

AS A RESULT, two major NEA goals this year will be to push for binding interest artibration statues and agency shop.

Unions want it because it gives them a better chance for what Chanin terms "a fair deal." It takes decision-making out of the hands of employers and turns it over to a socalled neutral third-party.

Unions sell, or try to sell, the idea to the public by claiming binding arbitration reduces strikes. But NEA has not had much success wrestling with courts over agency

A Bridgeport, Conn., court jailed 265 striking teachers, charged them \$28 a day room and board and fined their union \$1 million (subsequently negotiated down to \$190,000).

Teacher unions have long pushed the right to strike, but, as Chanin concedes, they're finding out that it's not the correct answer.

Order On The (Courtroom) Set!

WASHINGTON-The press, the people, and our nation's political principles won a nice little victory last week in the U.S. Supreme Court.

By a vote of 8-0, with Justice Stevens sitting out, the court found nothing unconstitutional in Florida's experiment with televised trials.

The outcome had been anxiously awaited by TV broadcasters, who remain the red-headed stepchildren of the First Amendment. They were understandably gratified at the ruling.

But in a larger sense, the decision was a victory for the entire taxpaying public. After all, the state courts are public courts, and TV can give the people some further understanding of what occurs in

MOST SIGNIFICANTLY, the high court's action reaffirms the 200-year-old principle of federalism, by which the states respectively retain power to undertake political experiments.

As of last October, when the Florida case was argued, 19 states permitted TV coverage of both trial and appellate courts, three others permitted coverage of trial courts only, and 12 were studying

This is exactly how federalism is supposed to

work. The facts of the Florida case were not in dispute. Two Miami Beach policemen, Noel Chandler and Robert Granger, were charged with grand larceny and with conspiracy to burglarize a restaurant.

A jury found them guilty on all counts. They appealed on the sole contention that TV coverage of their trial was inherently prejudicial—that is, that they could not possibly have received a fair trial with cameras in the courtroom.

The effect of the Supreme Court opinion was to uphold their convictions

THE TONE OF the opinion was regrettably cool and almost grudging, as if Chief Justice Burger were suffering acid indigestion of the intellect. The chief and the TV boys do not get along.

In order to approve Florida's experiment, the court had to overrule the leading case of Estes vs. Texas, decided back in 1964, and for some inexplicable reason six members of the court were unwilling to do this openly.

Nevertheless, like Byron's maiden, saying they would ne'er overrule, they overruled. The Estes case no longer controls.

And a good thing, too. In the nearly 20 years that have passed since Billie Sol Estes was tried for swindling, the technology of television has greatly

PUBLIC AWARENESS OF TV cameras-and public indifference to them-has become a fact of urban life. Under the Florida rules, only one camera and one cameraman are allowed in court; no

special lighting is permitted. The TV reporter, under these circumstances, is no more "intrusive" than the print reporter with pad and pencil.

RONALD REAGAN'S approach to curing what he calls the "worst economic mess since the Great Depression" is so progressive that the American people do not yet fully comprehend how profound

Tax rate cuts and investment incentives are needed, the President said, to make work, saving

and risk-taking rewarding again.

This was no President Carter standing before

the American people, as he did four years ago, to paint a bleak picture of economic stagnation and saying our only hope is to pull in our horns, con-serve our limited resources and dig in for a future of sacrifice and scarcity.

ONE MAN'S OPINION

IT WAS, INSTEAD, a President Reagan saying the future is bright with promise if only we will shake loose from our economic bondage and use our brains and our muscle to recapture the go-go spirit of America.

'Our aim is to increase our national wealth so all will have more, not just redistribute what we already have, which is just a sharing of scarcity,"

Reagan said. "We can begin to reward hard work and risktaking by forcing the government to live within its

means," he said Inspiring words, these-and yet slow to soak in on a mentality conditioned by 50 years of ersatz liberalism to think that more and more government is our friend instead of our insidious enemy.

The patriots of 1776 understood this well, as did frontier Americans. But the protective feudalism of the Middle Ages has been allowed in the last 50 years to creep back in.

This worn-out philosophy, carried to excess, usurps our freedoms while masquerading something new-the New Deal, Fair Deal, Great Society or whatever catch phrase might delude.

TO REIN IN THIS runaway monster and turn it around, President Reagan says we must quit feeding it so many oats

"We can lecture our children about extravagance until we run out of voice and breath," he said in terms anyone can understand, "or we can cure that extravagance simply by reducing their allowance.

That's why, he said, talk of waiting until spending has been cut before reducing taxes is an unworkable approach.

Both cuts must go forward on the same track, Reagan added, sticking to his guns in calling for a 30 percent across-the-board reduction in the income tax rate over the next three years.

Tax revenues will continue to rise because the rate cut will trigger economic expansion, the President's economic advisers believe.

Spending, too, will continue to go up but at a reduced rate, resulting in a balanced budget as early as 1983, by their projections.

THIS CONCEPT, ridiculed as simplistic and un-realistic by those who are responsible for a federal debt that is nearing \$1 trillion, certainly is worth a

Reagan makes it clear that his goal is to restrain the growth of government, not to deny help to the elderly, disabled and others who through no fault

of their own are in need. He also emphasizes that "our basic system is sound" and that the only panic button we need to push is the one that will release government's stranglehold on our collective throats.

It's a concept that anyone with a 36-cent 1960 dollar in his pocket should grasp as a drowning man would a life jacket.

Gold Tests Investors' Mettle

NEW YORK-Andre Sharon makes an odd kind of gold bug.

He says gold is "unquestionably and substantially overvalued on fundamentals"—even after the steep tumble its price has taken in the last year. He describes the metal as a "sterile" invest-

ment, meaning it yields no dividends or interestand thus carries an unseen "opportunity cost" as compared with other possible uses of your money, And he suspects gold's price is more likely to

decline than increase over the next few months. Nonetheless, Sharon, who oversees international investments for Drexel Burnham Lambert (and is one of the most respected gold-watchers in the business), thinks you ought to own a little gold right now

INDEED, HE TELLS me that he remains "more firmly convinced than ever" that "some gold-related exposure legitimately belongs in vir-tually all well-diversified portfolios, both institutional and individual."

At the root of Sharon's approach is a belief that the primary forces propelling gold prices are political rather than economic or financial, and that these forces-while neither "predictable nor quantifiable"-can be expected, over time, to cause the price to trend upward.

He is scarcely a blind partisan of the metal; in September, he recommended profit-taking in South African mining shares, which had run up sharply, and advised reducing gold investre from 16 percent to 12 percent of one's non-U.S. in-

Of that portion, two-thirds would be invested directly in bullion and the rest in gold stocks.

HISTORICALLY, THE investment and specula tive demand for gold relates not so much to the absolute level of inflation as to changes in the rate

And while such rates remain unsatisfactorily high, Sharon says, investors perceive a future slackening of inflation in the West generally and in the U.S. particularly.

Such a perception hurts gold two ways: It reduces the psychological fears that lead to buying panics, and it enhances the return available on alternative financial assets

In recent months, U.S. non-gold investors have been earning returns that handsomely beat infla-

But there's another side to the story, too, and Sharon points to factors he thinks will boost gold in the long run-including diminished supply (he estimates a "steep drop" worldwide), global political worries (notably "the ascendancy of Russian imperialism") and what he regards as "the de-fac-

These pennies add up! (I can't count the times I've pasted three 15-cent stamps on an envelope that properly could have been mailed for 41 cents -a waste of four cents.)

'Make surprise spotchecks on your outgoing mail from time to time to be sure the correct postage is being applied," warns Daly. The Postal Service will not volunteer a refund if you pay too much. You lose.

(2) IF YOU POSSIBLY can, try to mail in No. 10 envelopes. These are machine processable, thus get swifter handling.

(3) If you must use 9-by-12-inch envelopes, avoid kraft-color ones for, even though they carry the

Carter Defends Hostage Talks

ATLANTA (AP) — A serene and re-laxed Jimmy Carter, still toting his fishing poles after 12 days in the Virgin Islands,4 seemed unperturbed by criticism from President Reagan that he had mishandled the Iranian hostage crisis.

"The First Sixty-Two Years, History of Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, Texas," by Louise Allen and Emil Carmichael (Department of Development and Public Relations, Methodist Hospital, \$10)

The proud history of Methodist Hospital has been chronicled by two local writers, Louise Allen and Ernil Carmichael. Obviously, theirs was a labor of love in carefully researching each step in the development of Methodist Hospital from its earliest beginnings to the stature it now has become.

In reading this book, one is immediately conscious of the fact that as more people flocked to the fledging town and county of Lubbock, so grew the demands of the new settlers for community services - particularly that of medical care.

Fortunately, as recounted by the authors, a few physicians were willing to sacrifice to come to the newly-opened country. Among them were: Dr. William J. Hunt who came from Estacado and thought to be the first physician to practice in Lubbock; Dr. J.A. Pharr, who served as county physician and county of-ficer (1900); and Dr. L.C. Wayland, who operated a drug store briefly but moved to Plainview in 1901 when he finished his medical training

When Dr. M.C. Overton arrived in 1901, Dr. Pharr was the only physician in town. But Dr. G.S. Blake arrived later that year, followed by Dr. O.H. Westlake in 1904. In 1905 Dr. P.D. Reynolds arrived to practice in Lubbock.

To say these earty-day physicians made sacrifices is putting it mildly. Although pioneer doctors practiced some from their offices, more often they made house calls in the homes of patients. Traveling by buggy or on horseback, armed with scores of bottles of medication in their little black bags, they might travel as much as 100 miles in any kind of weather to treat a patient and return to Lubbock.

Doctors also were frequently called out to see patients at ranches or line camps. Dr. W.L. Baugh, another early physician, usually carried three medical bags in his buggy - one for medicine, one for surgery and one for obstetrics.

According to longtime physician, Dr.

A.C. Surman of Post, "There was no prenatal care, and no Caesarian deliveries, so obstetric instruments were hot very good."

Scalpels, forceps, probes for bullets were among the doctor's stock-in-trade. Operations were often performed on a farmhouse kitchen table, with a saturated cloth of chloroform (usually) to anesthesize the patient.

Dr. J.T. Hutchinson, who came to Lubbock in 1909, walked to make house calls in town. On one occasion, Hutchinson was heard to complain that because

Counseling Before Problems Arise Helpful In Success Of Marriages

Lubbockites recently had the opportunity to learn more about the institution of marriage during a two-day seminar at the Lubbock Civic Center.

The "Family Affair Seminar" was conducted by J. Allan Petersen, founder and director of Family Concern, and Bruce Narramore, Christian psychologist and professor of Rosemead Graduate School of Psychology. The pair came here under the sponsorship of Lubbock Youth for Christ, local and area church-

Petersen believes couples should be-come aware of possible problems ahead, working to more fully strengthen their marriages, instead of seeking avenues of help after the difficulties arise. He explained, "The seminar is not for people's good to prevent problems before they occur, these seminars are beneficial to couples contemplating marriage, new-lyweds, singles and the whole family.

"People go into a marriage without any preparation. Now, some pastors ins-ist that couples be counseled," Petersen said. He argues that counseling is important, but he does not necessarily advocate professional in-depth counseling. He does feel, however, that someone who has a personal background in dealing with marital problems, someone who has put some principals into practice, is qualfied to assist.

"I wouldn't encourage anyone to share a serious problem with anyone, professionally or other wise, who doesn't have their own act together," said Petersen, who has counseled hundreds of couples. Of the 20 million couples in the seek professional help from approved marriage counselors.

When choosing a counselor, he advises asking questions of the counselor first.
"Ask the counselor what his basic feelings about marriage and divorce are,"

He feels that it is vitally important to the children's development that parents have a good, strong marriage. As he explained, parents are setting patterns for their children to follow in their future marriages. "Parents must recognize their style of parenting," he states. "Whether they are lenient, strict or ents do not know what their style is. They do what their parents did." But through the seminars, people gain hope.
"We want people to believe that whatever their situation, it can be improved,"

Atlanta Searching For Another Missing

ATLANTA (AP) — Police began searching for another missing black child as volunteers combed surburban neighborhoods in two separate searches for clues to the slayings or disappearances of 17 black children.

Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown said Sunday that the police department's missing persons unit has been searching for 11-year-old Patrick Baltazar since he was reported missing Friday

Brown said Baltazar's case had not been turned over to the special 35-member task force created to investigate the 15 slayings and two disapparances of black children since July 1979.

Meanwhile, a black youth missing since Jan. 5 was reported Sunday to have been in the Tallahassee, Fla., city jail

Authorities in Tallahassee said the

youth, Lee Manuel Gooch, was released Saturday and they did not know his whereabouts

Tallahassee police said the 15-year-old gave them a false name and age when he was arrested last month on traffic charges. His stay in the Florida jail was discovered when investigators began checking on overdue traffic summonses that had arrived at the boy's home in At-

A photograph of the youth was identified by Gooch's father, authorities said.

Gooch's disappearance, like that of Baltazar, has been handled by the missing persons unit rather than the special task force. Police have listed both boys as runaways.

"We receive six or seven reports of children missing every day," Brown said. 'Missing persons investigates even it it is someone who ran away from home."

Police made the unusual move in the Baltazar case, however, of releasing his picture to area television stations on Saturday night. Brown said he hoped the broadcasts would produce some informa-tion as to the child's whereabouts.

The volunteer searchers, for the second weekend in a row, worked both Sat-urday and Sunday but failed to turn up any obvious clues to the baffling deaths and disappearances.

About 75 people searched surburban College Park on Sunday and found two pairs of children's tennis shoes as well as

bones believed to have come from an animal. The shoes were turned over to the task force, while the bones were delivered to the county medical examiner for

Several hundred volunteers turned out for the search Saturday. The larger than usual turnout apparently resulted from the discovery last Thursday of the body of the latest victim in the string of

Flowerpot Made Of Baker's Dough

By SHARI LEWIS

When I'm given a piece of clay, my fingers instantly go to work on their own. The first thing they always do is pull a small hunk away from the large lump and roll this little bit into a snake. I don't know why. I'm not too crazy about snakes

But for my birthday (in January) someone gave me a flowerpot filled with dried flowers and leaves. I'm crazy about it. She made it out of snakes of baker's dough, which is just like clay.

You can make one, too. Here's

Mix 21/2 cups of all-purpose (unsifted) white flour, 1/2 cup of salt and % cup of water.

Mix all the ingredients in a big bowl. Use your fingers (you're not going to eat this stuff anyway). It'll make a stiff, dry blob.

Knead it on a floured counter or board for about five minutes. (To knead it, squeeze it between your fingers, lift pieces and slam em down, and generally mash the mixture. You might ask an older friend to help you knead.)

Then turn a small red clay flowerpot upside down. (Don't use a plastic pot - it'll melt in the oven.) Drape a sheet of aluminum foil over the upside-down pot, with the shiny side out. Grease the foil on the bottom surface of the pot (which is up, since you have turned the pot upside down).

Now roll a snake out of your baker's dough. Wind your long snake around the bottom surface of the pot, then continue winding until the pot is covered with the

(which is just a mold) when you

Bake the piece in a 325 degree oven for one hour. Remove the mold as soon as it comes out of the

A coat of acrylic spray or spray lacquer will protect your pretty pot from moisture.



Additional Drug Charges Loom

Avalanche-Journal Staff More than 50 criminal narcotics charges may yet be filed as a result of this weekend's multi-agency drug bust in an attempt to wrap up what investigators have identified as a major heroin supply line into Lubbock.

Four persons were arrested and charged this weekend for possession and possession with intent to distribute cocaine and heroin and are scheduled to go before the grand jury meeting this week But a source close to the investigation revealed that this weekend's arrests were just the beginning and that more than 50 persons also connected with the illegal distribution would probably face criminal charges in the coming months.

A 32-year-old Lubbock man arraigned early Sunday on suspicion of drug trafficking is believed by officials to be "the supplier who took care of all the (heroin) dealers in the county." It is estimated that the persons arrested this weekend carried the bulk of the Lubbock heroin trade since Cosme Tijerina and several of his family members were arrested on similar charges in a massive drug raid in

More than 100 balloons of suspected cut heroin, nine ounces of the pure substance and a like amount of suspected cocaine, plus numerous firearms and ammunition and approximately \$25,000 in cash were confiscated Saturday as the result of a multi-agency undercover investi-

Three other persons, two men and a woman, also were arrested Saturday night, and the haul represents what au-thorities say is one of the largest amounts of narcotics recovered by lawmen in recent Lubbock County history.



Iraq Renews Abadan Drive

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Iran today claimed its besieged forces at Abadan repulsed a new Iraqi attempt to overrun the southern oil refining center from the Persian Gulf as the Iran-Iraq war entered its 21st week

Iraq claimed its forces "crushed" an Iranian attempt to break an Iraqi siege of the key Iranian highway town of Susangerd, killing 66 Iranian troops in overnight fighting at the western border of Iran's occupied oil province of Khuzis-

As the fighting continued, Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi opened a four-day conference of non-aligned for-eign ministers in New Delhi with a plea for an end to the 141-day-old Persian Gulf war. Iran and Iraq are both members of the 94-nation non-aligned move-

"In the name of peace and the future of mankind, we plead with the combatants and those waiting in the wings to call their young men back to their homes," Mrs. Gandhi said.

But there was little hope for an early cease-fire. Behzad Nabavi, Iran's minister of state for executive affairs, attending the New Delhi conference, reiterated Iran's rejection of any peace-making effort until Iraq withdraws from occupied Iranian territory.

Nabavi also said in a statement carried by Iran's official Pars news agency that he would press for a suspension of Iraq's membership in the non-aligned movement as long as the Iraqi occupation continues.

In Tehran, President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr of Iran said that if the New Delhi conference wanted to play a role in ending the war "we expect it to stand up to the aggressor and ask: Why did you launch an aggression?"

Iraq has said it will not withdraw until Iran recognizes its sovereignty over the Shatt al-Arab, the border estuary that provides Iraq's only waterway to the Per-

Tehran Radio said Bani-Sadr met today with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to discuss the war situation. Pars news agency quoted Bani-Sadr as saying after the meeting: "If we want to remove differences, everyone must work for victory. This is the best way to remove differences. We hope that everyone will do just

Speaking about the war, Bani-Sadr said Iranians must have "patience and tolerance." Senate Panel Approves Right-To-Work Moves

AUSTIN — A Senate committee quickly approved today a legislative package that would put the present rightto-work law into the Texas Constitution and call on Congress to do the same for the federal constitution

Only two votes were cast against any of the three measures approved for floor debate by the Senate Economic Development Committee.

Sen. Walter Mengden, R-Houston, said he would not try to bring up any of the measures immediately — "at least not until I get the votes."

A proposed constitutional amend-ment would let voters decide next next Nov. 2 if the Constitution should contain a ban on anyone being denied employ-ment because of membership or nonmembership in a labor union.

A second measure would add to present law a provision that an employee could not be forced to pay union dues in order to hold a job. Present law says no one may be forced to join a union.

The third measure would ask Congress to approve a proposed right-to-work amendment for the federal constitution and send it to the states for ratification. Voting against the resolution were Sens. Dee Travis, R-Garland, and Bob Glascow, D-Stephenville.

In other business, the House this week will probably vote to give retired state employees and retired schoolteachers a pay increase, as the Senate did last

week.

The Senate passed bills giving the retired state employees and teachers a 5.1 percent emergency increase. The week before the Legislature voted a 5.1 percent increase to current state employees, with each receiving a minimum \$50 raise. The retired people, however, will not get a minimum raise.

The House was to deliberate on the pay increase bills last Thursday, but action was postponed to allow time for the Senate version of the pay increase to get through House committee. The bills should be deliberated either today or

The court sentenced her to nine months in prison, but with the term beginning last May 5 when she was arrested, and ordered her deported.

Two other Americans and four Britons also have been in jail in Iran for months. One of the Americans was freed Wednesday, the other's fate is not known, and Iranian officials said the Britons would be freed soon.

Mohi Sobhani, 44, a naturalized American citizen born in Iran, was freed Wednesday after being held since Sept. 6 for undisclosed reasons. He had remained in Iran to run a computer business after his former employer, Rockwell International, pulled out in 1979. Relatives in the United States said they put up \$1 million bond to secure his release.

Nassry, a New York travel agent, was as rested in March after he went to Tehran to open a clinic for Afghan refugees. There has been no information on his

to oil market analyst Dan Lundberg.

The rise reflects increases by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, retroactive to the first of the year, and President Reagan's decision to lift oil price controls ahead of schedule,

Lundberg said. Lundberg's staff had projected prices of \$1.45 a gallon by the end of the year without decontrol and OPEC price boosts. Now, he said, "It looks like the end of the year will get here sooner than

we had thought." The trend will hold true in Lubbock, say two wholesalers.

"There's no question about it," said Nelson Hall, vice president of Benton Oil

Hall said that although many factors will contribute to the gas market fluctuations, \$1.50 a gallon will not be an unex-pected price by mid-year, nor will \$1.65 a gallon by the end of 1981.

Both Hall and distributor Jim Ince of Ince Oil Co. feel that because of the competitiveness of the Lubbock market, prices should stay in a comparable, if not lower, range with the rest of the nation.

"You're not going to find anybody scalping anyone," Ince said. He noted that Lubbock gas prices will be high in any consumer's terms, but the local competition should result in an

eventual tapering-off of pump prices. Hall said competition all over the

state is normally strong, with Texas suppliers realizing a lower profit margin than other areas of the nation. Hall pointed out that the number of

unbranded, independent retailers in Lubbock adds greatly to the rivalry for cus-Analyst Lundberg said prices have

Puerto Rican Groups Pose Threat Of Terrorism

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal law enforcement officials say the greatest terrorist threat to this country is posed by five tiny underground Puerto Rican independence bands who are becoming more daring and more willing to kill.

These officials, who asked not to be dentified, said there are fewer than 100 members among the five groups, but they are becoming increasingly sophisticated and operate in concert more often.

"They're damned near impossible to penetrate," one official said. "Their recruitment is very slow. They are very selective and very careful of infiltrators.

Last month, in the most recent attack, the Puerto Rican Popular Army, better known as the Macheteros or machetewielders, sneaked onto an Air National Guard base in Puerto Rico and blew up nine jets worth \$45 million. "It was a highly skilled tactical maneuver, with no evidence they had inside help," one offi-

The attack came as experts were predicting more and more terrorist attacks in the United States.

Secretary of State Alexander Haig has called international terrorism the greatest problem in human rights today and has launched a full-scale review of how to deal with it. The Defense Department has intensified its anti-terrorist training, the FBI conducts mock hostage situation exercises every six months in each of its 15 regions, and the Senate has set up a

In addition to the Macheteros, the officials say the groups include the Armed Forces of Popular Resistance or FARP, the Organization of Volunteers for the Puerto Rican Revolution or OVRP, the Revolutionary Commandos of the People or RCP, and the Armed Forces for National Liberation or FALN, the oldest, dating to 1972. All five advocate inde pendence and a socialist government in

Senate Panel Will Renew Probe Of Donovan Business Practices

committee will reopen its investigation of Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan's past business practices because of new allegations linking him to organized

The renewed investigation was requested by five Democratic senators who cited "two serious inaccuracies" in the FBI's report on Donovan's past business practices.

Donovan called the new allegations 'scurrilous," but the chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee pledged a thorough investiga-

"All allegations, including the most recent ones, will be fully gone into and evaluated in a thoroughly bipartisan manner by the staff of the main Senate Labor and Human Resources CommitOrrin Hatch, R-Utah.

Donovan, through a spokesman, said he would not be "looking back at false, unfounded and unsubstantiated charges to which I was subjected during my confirmation hearing.

"I have a clear conscience," he said. Thomas H. Bruinooge, Donovan's lawyer, said Sunday that efforts to reopen the investigaton were "politically motivated and an attempt to embarrass the Reagan administraton."

'Every time someone says he knows this guy or he knows that guy, the minority members of the committee want a further investigation," he said.

Bruinooge accused Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., one of the Democrats who requested the new investigation, of trying to "drag this thing on" to gain the helped elect Ronald Reagan president.

In a letter to Hatch, Kennedy and the other Democrats cited a newspaper report that found inaccuracies in the FBI's report of its investigation on Donovan.

The Record of Hackensack, N.J., reported Sunday that two men, both with past criminal associations, corroborated portions of the story told by Donovan's chief accuser, FBI informant Ralph Picardo, although neither linked the labor secretary with any wrongdoing.

Picardo, whom Donovan has called 'a murdering slime," has alleged that Donovan made payoffs to organized crime figures to ensure labor peace and that his company, Schiavone Construction Co. of Secaucus, N.J., dealt with re-

Help For Weight Loss

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB — I'm 5 feet 8 and weight 240 pounds. I went to doctors for pills to lose weight but they make my heart beat so fast and I'm so nervous I can't go to sleep at night. They didn't give me a list of foods I can eat and cannot eat. They just told me to cut down on things I do eat. I have tried everything and I can't lose

Would you please send me a diet to lose weight and tell me what kind of vitamins to take while I'm on the diet? I'm 27 years old and have no friends or boyfriends to go out with. I guess no likes to be seen with me anymore because I'm so fat.

DEAR READER - You should have professional help while you are trying to lose as much weight as you may need to lose. A number of different diet plans are all right for those who need to lose around 20 pounds, but you may need to lose as much as

The first step for gross weight problems is a good examination to be sure there is no underlying medical

problem that is a factor. I presume that has been done. There are diseases that affect metabolism and cause

Then you will need to be on a diet that does not cause you to lose too much salt and water, or your body chemistry will become seriously af-fected — which can be dangerous.

You can follow the diet I am sending you in The Health Letter number 4-7, Weight Losing Diet. It is a balanced diet that provides about 1,200 calories. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of The Avalanche-Journal, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10019. You could take any all-purpose vitamin tablet to supplement it if you like. Even so, I would like you to check

to see how fast you lose on it. If you are losing more than two pounds a week, add a few calories of fresh fruits or vegetables to avoid losing too fast. And check in with your doctor as you progress.

I was told that this was the result of excessive bleeding of my gums while having my teeth cleaned a few days previously. I was advised to take antibiotics before and after any future dental work.

Would you explain bacteremia to me? Do you think it is necessary for me to take antibiotics in the future? It is almost time for me to have my teeth cleaned again.

DEAR READER - With that history you should definitely take antibiotics whenever your teeth are cleaned or when you have other dental work or operations. Ask your doctor if you have any other medical problem. Bacteremia refers to bacterin the blood stream. Ordinarily when we get some bacteria in the circulation the defense mechanisms kill them. But if a person has a diseased heart valve or some congenital heart defects the bacteria implant and set

School Integration Decisions Spark Parent Demonstrations

Some 2,000 white parents angered at a school integration move in New York City vowed today to extend a weeklong school boycott, but in central Lousiana some 500 blacks marched in favor of a

disputed busing program.

No violence was reported at either demonstration Sunday.

Jeering parents at an angry meeting in the borough of Queens said they would continue their boycott of two elementary schools until a decision that would transfer 327 of their children to a black school

In Alexandria, La., blacks marched in favor of a federal judge's order mandating the integration of Rapides Parish schools through busing and some school

The New York rally was called to denounce a decision closing the annex of Intermediate School 231 - a move aimed at achieving integration at the main building of the predominantly black ju-nior high school 2 miles away.

pied the annex for a week until the final 30 parents were evicted Saturday - also decided to press efforts to seek a federal court order to overturn the closing. Four parents were arrested for trespassing in The New York parents also have kept

The parents - some of whom occu-

their children from classes at Public School 138 and Public School 195 (two feeder elementary schools for the high school annex) since last Monday and vowed to continue the boycott until the closing decision is reversed.

In Alexandria, a demonstration with a reverse intent was held - to show support of federal Judge Nauman Scott's order that has been fought by predominantly white school districts.

Murder Defendant Attacks Witness

ANOKA, Minn. (AP) - The defendant in a kidnap-murder trial lunged at the star prosecution witness with a knife as she testified against him, wounding her on the neck and leaving the future of his

An Anoka County District Court spokeswroman said today the trial of Ming Sen Shiue had been postponed and no date for resumption had been set.

There was speculation a mistrial would be declared.

Shime is on trial for kidnapping and second-degree murder in the death of 6year-old Jason Wilkman of Roseville. He pleaded innocent by reason of mental illness to both charges.

Last fall he was convicted in federal court in the May 16 kidnapping of Mary Stauffer and her daughter, Elizabeth, of Arden Hills. The Stauffers escaped from captivity at Shiue's Roseville home last July. The Wilkman boy allegedly was abducted the same day and placed in a car trunk with them.

As Mrs. Stauffer was on the witness stand testifying Sunday, Shiue bolted from the defense table as three stunned security officers watched. He grabbed Mrs. Stauffer around the neck and threatened to kill her, one law officer

Mrs. Stauffer, a Baptist missionary, screamed, "Oh, my God! Someone do something!"
Gene Schnagl, a sheriff's investigator,

grabbed the knife away and in the process suffered a minor hand cut.

Shiue was wrestled to the floor, handcuffed and dragged struggling from the courtroom. Judge Robert Bakke then cleared the room and recessed the trial.

The entire incident lasted about 90



Lietzke Cinches Playoff, Wins

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Bruce Lietzke proved some things to the only man he's trying to impress - himself - with his second victory of the young PGA tour

"I've now proved to myself I can come from behind and win," said Lietzke, who was five strokes back with eight holes to go but ended up a playoff winner Sunday in the Wickes-Andy Williams San Diego Open.

"All my other wins had come with me leading going into the last round. I'd proved I could win from the front. But this is the first time I've come from well

'Now I know I can do it again." Lietzke, golf's most successful cross-handed putter, had to birdie the second hole of a sudden death playoff to turn back Ray Floyd and Tom Jenkins for the title after they'd finished the regulation 72 holes of play with matching 278 to-

tals, 10 shots under par on the 7.002-yard South course at the Torrey Pines Golf All three birdied the par-5 18th hole, with Floyd missing by an agonizing inch on a 60-foot eagle putt that would have won it outright. Floyd played the final 18 in 71. Jenkins in 70. Lietzke, who had to battle back from a double bogey on the first hole of the rainy day, shot a 68 that included a 32 on the back.

Jenkins eliminated himself with a bogey on the first playoff hole while Lietzke and Floyd made two-putt pars. On the second playoff hole, a par-3, Floyd put his shot well to the right of

the flag and Lietzke hit "a five-iron, just as good and solid as I could hit it. It was the right iron shot at the right time," he said. It came to rest some five feet from the flag and, after Floyd had missed his

long putt. Lietzke dropped the winner. It went with his record-setting victory in the Bob Hope Classic last month to make him the first two-time winner of the season. He won \$45,000 from the to-

tal purse of \$250,000 and pushed his season's winnings to a tour-leading \$102,-Floyd, who also lost a playoff for this title in 1975, and Jenkins both won

Never A Dull Moment

NOW THAT THE National Football League season is over, after six months of fun and games, this should be vacation time for everyone connected with the sport. The players need a rest, for sure, after those jarring collisions, and the moguls must be worn out from contract hassles and counting all that loot.

Some of the gridders are taking it easy these days, but in different ways. A few are lolling on the beach at Acapulco, while most work around the ol' homestead or go fishing. The Cowboys' Randy White scoffs at relaxation, however, and is busy fixing up his farm in the snowy hills of Pennsylvania. A macho type, that Randy!

The rest period was short for many of the people involved in pro football, though. The scouts, having just completed their reports on the graduating seniors, now are preparing to hit the circuit again to watch spring training at college cam-

Coaches, too, have started the tedious procedure of analyzing game films, evaluating personnel and plotting strategy for the next campaign. The pace is not as hectic as it was a couple of months ago, but there is a lot of activity in the film room and around the conference table.

THERE HAS BEEN more than the usual amount of hustle and bustle in the Dallas Cowboys' organization in recent weeks, including a couple of developments that may have an impact on the upcoming race.

Butch Johnson, the talented wide receiver who has been unhappy over his backup role for several years, threw a match into the powder keg a couple of weeks ago and accused teammate Tony Hill of lack of effort and defiance of authority. Some other Cowboys, although refusing to be named, backed Johnson's charges

That brought Coach Tom Landry into the picture, pronto. He defended Hill's mediocre performance in the playoff games, explaining that the Pro Bowler had a shoulder injury which required post-season surgery. Landry also denied that Hill was in the same class with Thomas Henderson as a disruptive influence. "Hill sometimes is late to meetings," Landry admitted, "and he gets fined for

it. But he is not a disciplinary problem or a threat to team morale. Dallas insiders say that Johnson will be shuffled off to Buffalo, or Houston, or

wherever, before next season. Which is what he wanted all the time

ANOTHER POTENTIAL CONTROVERSY came to light Feb. 1 when the league office revealed the names of all the players who became free agents on that date. An impressive list it was, too, with such names as Walter Payton and Vince Ferragamo and Craig Morton.

Only two Cowboys were included, veteran linebacker D.D. Lewis and thirddown specialist Preston Pearson. Newsmen subsequently learned that Lewis had been given a qualifying offer by the club, which means the Cowboys still control his destiny, but that Pearson is truly a free agent. No qualifying offer and no compensation for the 'Pokes if he signs elsewhere.

Lewis has said all along that he wants to play another year, despite his age (35) and the fact he has lost what little speed he ever had. He also wants a bigger contract, which is brave talk for a fellow who may be expendable.

No one ever doubted Lewis' courage, though.

UNDER THE SYSTEM at Dallas, players don't decide whether they will play another year. Landry does that, after evaluating their performance during the preceding season and estimating their value to the team in the upcoming campaign. If he wants a player back, he invites him to participate in the off-season drills start-

If there is no invitation, the player gets the message.

Every now and then, a gridder will upset Landry's timetable. Quarterback Roger Staubach bowed out a year before Landry had intended, despite the mentor's assurance that the Dodger's skills were undiminished and that he could still make a valuable contribution to the team. Roger declined. He didn't need the money that bad, or the numerous head inju-

ries caused by the cheap shots and vicious hits of envious or unethical opponents.

LANDRY APPARENTLY WANTS Lewis back for another semester. He told newsmen that he didn't know any reason, at this time, why Lewis could not play one more year. But he did qualify his remarks by saying that he would meet with Lewis later and try to work things out.

Preston Pearson is another matter, though. Landry praised the seemingly ageless pass-snatcher for his contribution to the Cowboys, but made it clear that the specialist is not a key figure in his planning for '81. Preston turned 36 the other day and makes a lot of money for a fellow who sees so little action. Landry plans to talk to Pearson later, too. But chances are that his assignment

will be given to one of the younger players with speed and good hands. James Jones, perhaps, or even Ron Springs.

Baseball Talks Move Nowhere

Because baseball waffled on biting the bullet last spring, it may have to swallow it. Didn't anybody ever hear about the dangers of lead poisoning? It looks like a grim spring for the national pastime.

Negotiators are entering the final week of talks aimed at resolving the only issue blocking a labor peace — that of compensation, or the price a club should pay another for grabbing off one of its prize free agents.

A strike last May was averted at the 11th hour when four moderate owners -George Steinbrenner of the New York Yankees, Edward Bennett Williams of the Baltimore Orioles. Peter O'Malley of Los Angeles and John McMullen of Houston prevailed upon their more obdurate compatriots to opt for a truce.

It now appears they have merely postponed the inevitable and given substance to a line by one of the old-time owners, who said: "If we're gonna get nuked, let's get it over with.

For weeks now. Marvin Miller, the steely honcho of the Players Association, and Ray Grebey, the hard-knuckled negotiator for the owners, have been going at it eyeball-to-eyeball with negligible progress. "We're getting nowhere," said Miller.

"I am not optimistic," says Grebey.

If some common ground isn't reached this week, the owners may unilaterally put their modified compensation plan into he four-year Basic Agreement, already signed. But if the players don't like it - and most of them say they don't - then they strike. They must call their strike by May 31. The owners, a splintered group, still have a tiger by the tail.

This is the advantage that Miller has over his rival, Grebey. Miller has the 100 percent support of the players. Thus he deals from strength and confidence. Grebey, once a negotiator for General Electric (which had a 101-day strike) has warring factions hammering in his ears. He lacks a big stick.

They say rebey is hanging tough because he needs a victory. The owners have been caving in to the players ever since the reserve clause came under fire and finally disintergrated with Peter Seitz' arbitration ruling in the Andy Messersmith-Dave McNally case in 1975, which gave players their freedom. On the other hand, Miller, a sauve, cool tactician, has announced this will be his

last major battle and he will go on to calmer things. He does not intend to bow out Grebey resents newspaper talk that this is a duel between him and Miller and

that a "victory" is the prize. Early in negotiations he sought to keep progress of the talks secret and was distant to the press. But when Miller, a media favorite, started getting headlines, Grebey found it

necessary to keep the machines grinding out press releases with the owners' view-What the owners are asking - fairer compensation for a star player lost in the

re-entry draft (now only an amateur draft pick) — is not unreasonable.

At the same time, it is easy to understand the players' position. For almost a

century they were bound to their clubs for life until traded or sold. They had no rights or privileges. Owners refused to listen to warnings by such foresighted baseball men as Bill Veeck Then came the great liberation in 1976, and as did the labor movement general-

ly, the pendulum swung the other way.

But the owners have only themselves to blame. Beginning with the first re-entry draft, they started tossing out millions not only to deserving Pete Roses and Reggie Jacksons, but to run-of-the-mill ballplayers who threw the game's salary scale out of all reason.

If the bomb is ticking away - as commissoner Bowie Kuhn has said in speaking of free agency - the place to look for the fuse is not in the dugout, but in the executive suites.

Westerners Earn Respect In Upset Of Coronado

Avalanche-Journal Sports Staff At first, it was a kind of game. Last year when Lubbock High won its first two contests, people were quick to point out that the Westerners had already tied the previous year's win total.

Folks said the same thing this year. First Lubbock High dumped San Angelo in the Caprock Tournament to win its eighth game - the same as last year's total - and then when they beat Estacado 71-67 in early January for their 10th win — the same as the last two years com-

Then there were other things, like when the Westerners won their first district game in three years last Tuesday or when they beat Coronado Friday night the first time in three years they'd knocked off their cross-town rival.

But somehow, by the time Friday night's 54-47 win had sunk in, the sarcasm was gone from the record-keeping. That win was a big one.

It was the first time since 1971 that the bunch from 19th Street had managed to win back-to-back district contests.

That's not just some idle statistical oddity. That is a definite sign of the kind of improvement the club has made in the last three seasons.

The fact is the Westerners have recorded the highest win total of all but eight of their seasons in the last 25 years

and the third-highest since 1967. If they can get the same results from the second half of the district season that

they did from the first, their win total will jump to No. 6.

Is Craig Wells surprised at this kind of

"No, not really," said the third-year coach. "I feel like we have got some kids playing for us now who have been with us for three years.

"That's no accident. Our kids have worked hard. Now I think they're reap ing the benefits of some of that hard work back in April, all of that running around the track and lifting weights.'

Wells is also quick to point out that the change isn't limited to his varsity. His sophomore team beat Coronado Friday night for the first time in three years.

Dow Jones Falls 1.36 To 950.94

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices turned mixed today as one major bank lowered its prime lending rate to 19 percent, the low-est level in two months, but other banks failed to follow.

Today was also the first trading day since the late Friday Federal Reserve Board report that the nation's money supply declined sharply in the final week of January, suggesting that the Fed may not think it necessary to tighten credit

TIA Plans Takeover Of Competing Line

By The Associated Press Texas International Airlines, a feisty regional carrier, today said it owns a 9.5 percent stake in Continental Airlines and

will try to take over the larger carrier. Texas International said it "plans shortly to make a tender offer for a minimum of four million shares" of Conti-nental at \$13 a share, and might buy as many as two million more shares. That would cost \$78 million if all shares were

Continental already has agreed to merge with another major carrier, Western Airlines, and that union won the blessing Friday of a Civil Aeronautics Board law judge, although it still needs CAB approval and the approval of stockholders of both companies.

Texas International, a subsidiary of

Texas Air Corp., said it bought 800,500 shares of Continental stock on Friday and now owns a total of 1,459,200 shares.

The purchase of 6 million more shares would give Texas Internatonal a 49 per-cent stake in Continental, the nation's 10th-largest airline, which primarily serves the western states and has routes to Mexico. Texas International said it would seek a combination with Continen-tal if the CAB approved, but said it had

not decided what terms to offer.

Continental was the most active stock on the NYSE Friday, climbing \$1.375 to \$11.75 on volume of 914,300 shares.

A Continental spokesmen in Los Angeles said the company had no immediate comment on Texas International's

Texas International has previously tried twice to acquire larger airlines, first National and then Trans World. It wound up selling its National stock to Pan American World Airways and reported an after-tax profit of about \$35 million. It did not disclose what profit, if any, was made from the sale of its stock in Trans World Corp.

Texas Air, the holding company, also owns New York Air, a new regional carrier and has announced plans to sell a minority stake of 1.5 million shares at \$10 to

the public.

Texas International said it will file an application with the Civil Aeronautics Board for the approval required to exercise control over Continental. It said purchases pursuant to the offer will be subject to certain conditions, including CAB approval of a voting trust in which all shares purchased would be held pending a decision on the control application.

Bodies Exhumed In Guatemala

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (UPI) - Authorities exhumed 16 bodies buried in a secret mass grave and five people, including a town mayor, were killed in continuing left-right violence in Guatemala.

Police said Sunday the 16 decomposed bodies, apparently all males, were unearthed Saturday in San Martin Jilotepeque, 37 miles west of Guaternala City in Chimaltenango province.

The grisly discovery was made almost one year after 30 bodies were exhumed from a ravine in western Comalapa prov-

It was not immediately known who was responsible for killing the people found in the mass grave Saturday, but right-wing death squads have been suspected in similar discoveries in the violence-torn Central American nation of 7.2

Authorities said presumed rightist gunmen Saturday night shot and killed Augusto Samayoa Rosales, 28, mayor of La Democracia, a town 47 miles south of the capital. Samayoa Rosales, a Christian Demo crat and student at the state-run San Car-

los University that rightists say is a Com-munist hotbed, escaped a similar at-tempt on his life last June 12, authorities Leftist guerrillas fighting to over-throw the government of President Gen. Romeo Lucas Garcia shot and killed four landowners in a raid late Saturday on the

Sadat To Back Peace Initiative

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) - President Anwar Sadat left for Luxembourg today to address the European Parliament and declare qualified support for a European Economic Community initiative to promote a peaceful solution of the Arab-Israeli

Israel, apparently seeking to torpedo Sadat's trip, leaked a dispatch filed by Eliahu Ben-Elissar, the Israeli Ambassador in Cairo, alleging Sadat opposed the European initiative.

Sadat's planned speech Tuesday to the European parliament, the first by a

third world head of state, was billed by the Cairo press as another Egyptian milestone toward Middle East peace.

But officials said Egypt continued to uphold the 1978 Camp David peace framework agreements it concluded with Israel and the United States as the cornerstone of the peace effort. One high of-ficial said Egypt would support a Euro-pean initiative provided it "adds to the Camp David process."

Sadat, who met separately in Cairo in the past few months with several European ministers, was expected to endorse a European role on this basis.

HOUSTON (AP) - Chief Justice Warren Burger, in a speech that drew both praise and blame, told the American Bar Association that the U.S. criminal justice system is too concerned with the rights of criminal defendants and "cries out for

ABA President William Reece Smith of Tampa, Fla., described Burger's Sunday remarks as "bold, courageous, and quite innovative."

But American Civil Liberties Union Legal Director Bruce J. Ennis said some of Burger's ideas for change were "dangerous" and said he was "shocked that a chief justice would make such sugges-

The chief justice told the attorneys' convention that a growing U.S. crime rate may be due, in part, to excessive concern for the rights of the accused and that courts must share the blame.

"Crime and the fear of crime have permeated the fabric of American life, damaging the poor and minorities even more than the affluent," the nation's topranking judge said.

"Like it or not, today we are approaching the status of an impotent society whose capability of maintaining elementary security on the streets, in schools and for the homes of the people is in doubt." he said.

Entire School To Get Meningitis Vaccine

HOUSTON (AP) - Inability to pinpoint the source of a Houston meningitis outbreak that has killed four people prompted a decision to vaccinate every student, teacher and staff member at an elementary school today, health officials

The vaccinations at Dodson Elementary School followed more than 1,500 throat cultures and blood samples taken from 150 Dodson teachers, students and relatives, with results from those tests

expected today.

In all, 10 Texans — one of them a Dodson student - have died from meningococcal meningitis since the first of the year, and the disease has struck another 51, and the outbreak appears cen-tered in Houston where four deaths and 31 confirmed cases have been reported since Jan. 1.

The reason for the extra caution at Dodson is that six of the confirmed Houston cases were reported from the sixthgrade at the school.

An official with the city health department said the mass-vaccination decision was reached late Saturday at a meeting involving health department representa tives, officials with the Baylor College of Medicine and a representative of the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta.

The school outbreak is unprecedented, said Dr. Carol Baker, a pediatrician at the Baylor College of Medicine. The disease usually afflicts groups at military bases, day care centers, within families, at homes for the elderly - anywhere people come in close contact for extended periods of time, she said.

Jury Clears Inventor Of Perjury

BELTON (AP) - After four trials covering more than two years, Arnold Burke is a free man following a jury's decision that he did not commit perjury when he testified he had built a perpetual motion machine.

Burke's troubles stemmed from his invention, dubbed "Jeremiah 33:3." which he said could generate electricity using only water and gravity - no fuel. He claims a production version of his prototype machine could generate enough electricity to serve an averagesized home.

After the jury's weekend decision clearing him of the perjury charge, Burke said, "I feel like the Lord's will is

The state of Texas alleged Jeremiah was a fraud built to induce investors to pay Burke \$800,000 for marketing rights. The fraud allegation was based on the discovery in December 1979 of a concealed pump inside Jeremiah. The pump was connected to batteries in another

Burke was tried for perjury because he testified under oath on Dec. 13, 1979, that he never used external power to run Jeremiah. He testified last week he put the electric pump in Jeremiah after Dec.

He said he destroyed revolutionary water pumps that were the "heart" of Jeremiah and put in the electric pump to throw off state authorities who he feared might steal the secret of his invention.

And Dorothy Samuels, director of the New York chapter of the ACLU, criti-cized Burger for using the crime problem as a "political opening to push long-held views in opposition to procedural safeguards that protect all in society from illegitimate police activity."

Burger is a longtime opponent of legal doctrines that overturn criminal convictions because of procedural mistakes by

"Is a society redeemed if it provides massive safeguards for accused persons ... yet fails to provide elementary protection for its decent, law-abiding citizens?

'What I suggest now ... is to survey the wreckage and begin a damage control program ... It is as much a part of our national defense as the Pentagon budget,"

Burger suggested these attempts at

combatting crime: - Release on bail only those accused criminals who are deemed, by the seriousness of the charged crime and their past record, to be not dangerous.

- Provide for most criminal trials within weeks of arrest.

 Give appellate court priority for appeals filed within eight weeks of a conviction judgment.

 After a criminal defendant's appeal
 After a criminal defendant's appeal of conviction has failed, limit all sul quent appeals to "claims of miscarriage

Former ABA president Leon Jawor-ski of Houston, the Watergate special-prosecutor, said he believed Burger was challenging attorneys to "find ways to avoid making the senseless errors that often result in reversals. These are procedural errors and really have nothing to do with the crime itself. What we need to do is make guilt relevant again."



Foreign Investment Shows Sharp Rise

NEW YORK (AP) - Western Europe continues to be the focus of American manufacturing investments, with the United Kingdom, Ireland and Japan attracting the most U.S. business last year, a new report on foreign investment says.

The Conference Board, composed of a cross-section of American businesses, said in a report released Sunday that foreign investment by American manufacturing companies rose by more than 50 percent from 1979 to 1980.

U.S. manufacturers announced 252 foreign investment projects last year, up from 159 in 1979, the report said.

Many economists predict home heating oil could reach \$1.40 a gallon by winter's end, compared with 95 cents a galion late last fall, due largely to price de-

The Civil Aeronautics Board last week said it will permit airlines to raise domestic fares another 3.8 percent because of skyrocketing jet fuel costs.

Overall, Data Resources says, oil price decontrol probably will add 0.5 per-cent to the Consumer Price Index this year, Reagan's proposed tax cut and the Federal Reserve's tight money policies could add another 0.6 percent through 1983, Data Resources estimates.

Such increases would carry over to wages of Americans who have cost-of-living contracts, further feeding the inflationary spiral, economists say.

Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker told Congress last week the central bank would lower its money growth targets in 1981 and acknowledged this could mean higher interest rates for a prolonged period.

Higher rates translate into higher prices for houses, autos and other bigticket items that must be financed.

"The whole purpose of our policies, as ironic as it sounds, is to bring down interest rates," Volcker said, insisting that to loosen money controls might lower prices now but would worsen inflation in

That's also the Reagan administra-

tion's philosophy.

The reasoning is that less taxes would

more, spend more and save more. Companies, in turn, would expand produc-

tion, particularly if they also receive tax The key to the plan, however, is convincing financial markets, businessmen

and consumers that inflation can be beat-

en, administration officials say.

But this approach, to many economists, is risky.

'Reagan is asking the public to believe in a theory and its long-range results. But the average person will be going to the grocery store and see prices rising," says Gar Alperovitz, an economist who heads the Washington-based Center for Economic Alternatives.

Individual Retirement Account Can Help Pension Recipients

Some pension or profit-sharing rograms give employees the option of receiving a lump-sum payment at retirement time instead of monthly pension checks for life.

If such a lump sum - which could amount to \$100,000 or more for longtime employees — is used in some way by the employee, there is a sizable income-tax consequence. All of the money becomes taxable income in the year it is received.

But there is a way to shield the money from any immediate tax while creating a tremendous investment opportunity for the recipient. This is done by making a rollover contribu-tion to an Individual Retirement Account. This must be done within 60 days of receiving the lump-sum check.

When this is done, no tax is paid on the lump-sum settlement in the year in which it is received. Furthermore, all the earnings on the IRA are shielded from any income tax until withdrawals begin.

To qualify for this special rollover treatment, the lump sum must be from a qualified pension or profitsharing program. In addition, it must be received as a result of one of these situations: the employee has retired or terminated his employment, the pension or profit-sharing plan has been terminated, or the employee has passed age 59 1/2 or had died and the surviving spouse is making the rollov-

A rollover works to its greatest potential if the employee can leave the money untouched for several years. At today's high interest rates, the funds in a rollover account can double in less than six years.

At age 70 1/2, the employee must start to make withdrawals from the IRA at a rate insuring that over the employee's life expectancy, or over the combined life expectancies of a husband and wife, the account will be exhausted

In a typical example, the author has seen a rollover account grow from \$120,000 to \$285,000 in only nine years. Then, during the withdrawal phase, while compounded interest still did its work, a total of more than half a million dollars was withdrawn from an account that had only \$285,000 in it when withdrawals began.
