### KGB Fails In Attempt To Blackmail U.S. Major

Union hurriedly last month after a mysterious incident in which Soviet agents may have tried to set him up for blackmail and recruitment as a spy, Western sources said today.

The U.S. Embassy refused to comment on the reports concerning Maj. James R. Holbrook, an officer in the embassy's defense attache section.

But according to sources here, the incident occurred dur-ing a trip by Holbrook, 41, late last year or early in January to the Soviet city of Rovno, about 600 miles west of Moscow near the Polish border.

Western defense attaches travel frequently around the Soviet Union, and many have visited the Polish border area massed forces there.

In Royno, the sources said, an "incident" occurred that Holbrook believed could lead to later blackmail attempts by Soviet agents seeking to force classified information out of him. Holbrook reported the incident to his superiors, the sources said, and was withdrawn from the Soviet Union about six months before his tour of duty in Moscow was to

The sources said they could not confirm the details of what happened to Holbrook, but a Washington Post report said the incident may have included the use of drugs to incapacitate him in efforts to arrange compromising photohe would not comment on the report.

Another report, published in the Daily Telegraph of London, said Holbrook may have accepted an invitation from a casual Russian acquaintance to a party in Rovno where the alleged incident happened.

The Telegraph report said that "knowledgeable sources suggest that the Soviet secret police had plotted a scenario worthy of a cheap spy thriller.

But none of the accounts provided details of the incident reported by sources.

'How Maj. Holbrook came to attend the party and pre-

cisely what happened to him there remains known only to the Americans and the KGB," the Telegraph said.

One reason for Holbrook's departure that circulated in Moscow was that he was being considered for an important military adviser's job, possibly in the office of Vice President George Bush. An embassy spokesman declined to say if Holbrook had actually been a candidate for such a post.

The Telegraph, in a report from its Moscow correspondent, also said U.S. Embassy officials said Holbrook was in line for a key advisory post, but added, "American officials later let it be known privately that Maj. Holbrook had reported being compromised in a KGB blackmail attempt."

### Senate Votes To Hike Age **ForDrinking**

AUSTIN (UPI) - The Senate today approved 26-2 and sent to the House a bill that would make it illegal for 18-yearolds to buy or consume alcoholic beverages in Texas.

The proposal by Sen. Bill Sarpalius, D-Hereford, raises the minimum drinking age to 19, but would allow 18-yearolds to continue to handle alcoholic beverages as clerks in stores or bars.

The only controversy concerning the bill was from Sen. Walter Mengden, R-Houston, who supports the idea but resented Sarpalius' sponsoring the proposal after Mengden had worked on almost identical legislation for the past two

Mengden said both he and Sarpalius met with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to determine which of their bills would be brought before the Senate.

We went in the lieutenant governor's office and flipped a coin, and he won and I lost," Mengden said.

Art Kelly, Mengden's top aide, was more openly angry about Sarpalius' bill being considered rather than Mengden's. "I think this is an atrocious action on the part of Senator Sarpalius. I think it is a breach of ethics and I hope it will not

be repeated," Kelly said. Sarpalius said raising the drinking age was a major issue in his fall campaign, and said drinking among high school stu-dents has created problems in school dis-

tricts throughout the state.
Also today, Speaker Bill Clayton of Springlake told a House committee that a commission needs to be created to recommend a guideline list of "do's and

don'ts" for public officials.

This is a simple suggestion to attack a problem we've had in the state for years," Clayton told the House State Affairs Committee. "We have never had any guidelines for the do's and don'ts elected officials can engage in.

Clayton, who was acquitted last Oct. 22 on federal bribery charges stemming from the Brilab investigation, announced immediately after his trial he would push legislation to set up a special committee to determine what public officials can and cannot do without violating any of the assortment of ethics, campaign expense reporting and other laws that apply to those elective offices.

Under the proposed legislation, the committee would be made up of four

ernor, four by the speaker, the presiding judges of the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, the Travis County district attorney, the executive officer of a public employee asso-ciation and a member of the governor's

The committee would operate until Aug. 31, 1983, and then would recommend to the Legislature what type of sta-tutory guidelines are needed to be enact-

### Civic Leader Homer Hunt Dies At 72

Homer E. Hunt, 72, grandson of a Lubbock founder and eyewitness to most Lubbock County history, died in his sleep at his home at 2306 54th St. early today. Mrs. Hunt found him dead in his bed.

Services for the president of Hunt Investments are pending with Sanders Fu-

Born in Lubbock in 1909, Hunt learned history prior to his appearance in West Texas from a grandfather, George M. Hunt who led a wagon train to Texas to the Hank Smith rock house in Crosby County, then to Estacado before moving to North Town, which consolidated in 1890 with Monterey to become Lubbock.

George Hunt built the first grocery store in Lubbock and gave the first Christmas party while Hunt's other grandfather, W. N. Green, freighted supplies, including lumber for the first Lubbock courthouse.

The famous Nicolett Hotel, built first in North Town, then torn down and reassembled across Yellowhouse Canyon in new Lubbock, was managed by George

Hunt's father, A.G., was the first cashier for Citizens National Bank when it was founded in 1909.

Hunt himself had to do with many of the firsts in Lubbock - from the first family to first automobile, first airplane and many others to add to the first church, first school, first business, etc.,

### Nkomo Loyalists Agree To End Armed Standoff

SALISBURY, Zimbabwe (UPI) -Dissident guerrillas loyal to Joshua Nkomo laid down their arms today and agreed to be moved out of the urban area of Bulawayo, ending the threat of a new outburst of major violence in the south-

A police spokesman said the agreement was followed by the immediate formation of a bus convoy to transport rebellious ZIPRA guerrillas to an abandoned rifle range 18 miles from the city.

He said guerrillas who missed the convoy should report to the nearest police station to be rejoined with their col-

weekend when the guerrillas refused to give up their guns and the drivers of leased buses refused to transport them with weapons. The breakthrough came after about

1,500 rival ZANLA guerrillas loyal to Prime Minister Robert Mugabe surrendered their weapons and agreed to be moved to a camp 32 miles away from the site assigned to the ZIPRA guerrillas.

Fierce battles last week between the two factions left an estimated 300 dead. Much of the fighting took place in the black Entumbane township of Bulawayo, the country's second-largest city.

Refrigerated railroad cars had to be commandeered to store the overflow of corpses from local morgues. Officials said unclaimed bodies from the fighting would be buried today to prevent a health hazard.

Nkomo and his guerrilla force belong to the minority Matabele tribe, while Mugabe and his fighers belong to the majority Shona tribe. The two nationalist leaders formed an edgy alliance to wage war against the white minority that ruled since 1965 in defiance of Britain's plans to grant majority rule in its former colony, then known as Rhodesia.

After a cease-fire and British-spor sored elections early last year, Mugabe became the first prime minister of independent Zimbabwe. Although his party won a majority in Parliament, he formed a coalition with Nkomo, the head of the Patriotic Front Party, who became deputy prime minister and took charge of the national police. But in a Cabinet reshuf-

fle last month he was demoted. Nkomo's loss of status in the government apparently worsened the friction between Shonas and Matabeles in the new national army and between the rival guerrilla factions waiting in camps to be integrated into the army. When they started fighting last week, Mugabe ordered the white-led Rhodesian African Rifles, an elite black infantry unit in the old Rhodesian army, to restore order

### Refineries Face Gasoline Glut

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The United States' rapidly growing reserves of gasoline are so great that refineries may be forced to slow down or shut down and gas prices eventually may drop, an oil industry analyst says.

Dan Lundberg said oil-production runs at refineries are at "uneconomic rates" and gasoline stockpiles, fast approaching a record-breaking inventory, are so great that "the industry may have

But his Lundberg Letter, a weekly oil industry periodical, stressed that "regardless of surpluses, certain increased costs must get through to the pump, so a decline in prices is not a reasonable prospect at this time."

The letter said consumer conserva-

tion of gasoline and continued production of fuel oil for winter heating were combining to create stocks of 277 million barrels of gas at refineries, in pipelines and at large terminals throughout the

Another oil industry publication official said Sunday that the nation has begun to control its consumption of petroleum products and could be on the way to easing the energy problem "without fully realizing it.

German Chacin, editor of the Energy Detente newsletter, said the U.S. economy has improved its energy efficiency 12 percent since the Arab oil embargo of 1973. He said that translates into a savings of 4.9 million barrels of oil a day,

Since the petroleum price increases

of 1973-74, conservation ... has entered the scene with a vigor that many wouldn't have thought possible back in the 1960s and early '70s," Chacin said.

Energy Detente is a bilingual, twicemonthly publication that studies the energy situation in the Western Hemisphere. It is affiliated with the Lundberg

The Lundberg Letter said refinery production runs dropped to 72.7 percent of capacity in January from an already low 76.6 percent in December. Refiners, who generally like to run at about 90 percent capacity, are faced with "even greater slowdowns, perhaps shutdowns,

Industry experts say production runs

of less than 75 percent aren't profitable for most refineries.

A record surplus of 283.1 million barrels, set in April of last year, brought a 1.2 cent average drop in gasoline prices over an eight-month period, and another overload "would almost certainly cool the current round of price increases," the Lundberg Letter said

If a dip in prices does occur, it could come "before the end of March," the let-

The Lundberg Letter had previously predicted an average price for all grades of U.S. gas of \$1.45 a gallon by the end of 1981, but said in the latest edition that 'excess supplies could lower that predic-

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) - Former Beatles Ringo Starr and Paul McCartney have reunited for a recording ses-

sion, but an official at a Caribbean studio denies rumors that the third surviving member of the rock group, George Harrison, will add his talents to the record.

And Steve Jackson labeled as "totally untrue" a report in the Sun newspaper of London that the album would be a tribute to John Lennon, the Beatle who was shot to death Dec. 8 outside his New York City apartment. He said McCartney and Starr had booked recording time at the studio before Lennon's death.

Jackson, manager of Montserrat's Air Studio, said Sunday in a telephone interview that he, studio owner George Martin and McCartney met Starr, the Beatles' drummer, at the airport about noon

There were about four other people there and no one made a fuss," Jackson said.

McCartney reportedly has been on tiny Montserrat for a

Jackson denied that Harrison would be going to the island, as did McCartney's lawyer in New York, Lee V. East-

Martin produced the Beatles' albums before the group's break-up in 1971. He established Air Studio a few years ago as a retreat for musicians to combine recording and leisure in a secluded tropical environment.

### Leader Defends Iran Mission

HERMITAGE, Pa. (AP) - Army Maj. Gen. James Vaught says the com-mando raid he led to Iran trying to free the American hostages was a worthwhile effort and not "foolish" despice its fail-

At a freedom celebration for six of the 52 former hostages, Vaught pulled away a white satin cloth to unveil a monument dedicated to the eight commandos who died in the Iranian desert after the rescue mission was scrapped.

The six former hostages at the ceremony Saturday lit what is to be an eternal flame at the base of the monument.

The still-unfinished monument, donated by the residents of Scranton, stands amid 444 American flags in Hillcrest Memorial Park, where the flags were raised for each day of the hostages' captivity. The hostages were freed Jan. 20 after prolonged negotiations.

Vaught, who was in charge of the raid last April, said some observers have called the mission "foolish or a fiasco."

"It was none of that. It was a very best effort by a group of brave, courageous Americans of which we can all be proud," he said.

He spoke briefly of mechanical problerns that crippled several of the mission's helicopters and caused the project to be aborted "No matter how hard one may try,

JACKSON TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) -Petite, frail Amy Brown, suffering from a rare metabolic disorder that makes her ravenously hungry, has been so weak she was forced to abandon her high school

Because of her condition - which forces the 5-foot-3, 92-pound woman to eat up to 30 dozen eggs a week - Miss Brown and her boyfriend can't afford to go to movies

But things are looking brighter. With the help of a tutor, the 19-year-old is preparing to graduate from high school, and she's engaged to be married to a sailor whom she met because of the publicity generated by her disorder. "I'd say I'm very happy," she said.

She has been plagued for six years by malabsorption of the kidneys, an extremely rare disorder that requires her to eat constantly to replace potassium in her body.

Doctors expect her body to mature

during the next two years, possibly ending the constant hunger that keeps her weekly food bill at \$200. "I'm still the same. There's been no change," she said recently. "I still have

to eat as much as ever, except that now I have to eat more and more eggs just to keep my cholesterol levels up.

Miss Brown has stuggled to complete her education, first by attending classes and now through daily tutoring. She expects to graduate from Jackson High School in June

Lunch might include two steaks, more eggs, vegetables and three glasses of chocolate milk.

improves.

She usually downs an afternoon snack of sandwiches, cookies and milk before the family dinner. And before bed, she makes a sandwich or two. And, after several hours' sleep, she usually awakens to a growling stomach and her never-ending quest for sustenance continues.

She must avoid caffeine, alcohol and spicy foods. But despite all the calories, she is too weak to work or go to school and receives \$98 a month in welfare and \$70 a month in food stamps.

Since the welfare is not enough to cover her food bill, friends, relatives, benefactors and Ocean County civic groups help the family get by. Miss Brown's father, Albert, is a public works





### Tax Policy Overtaxing

can government has forced our domestic policies to the middle of the road. That has been a source of great strength in our political life.

But the sharing of power and the need for compromise has slowed our response to radical changes in conditions often perceived by the taxpayers as something short of an emer-

Often, lawmakers have suffered from dealing with many issues in too short a time frame. The period for dealing with problems frequently is seen as beginning with the twoyear life of a new Congress, or at most, the four-year term of a new President.

In some areas, the result is a lack of contifuity and a tendency to repeat past errors.

TODAY, THERE is evidence of national consensus on the principal issues: 1. Inflation as a major source of national concern; 2. The need to bring fiscal and monetary policy into better balance; 3. The need for higher levels of saving and investment;

4. A distrust of economic regulation; 5. A new appreciation of the economic burdens imposed by detailed regulation in areas of social concern and a willingness to experiment with less detailed coercive methods; and 6. Adjustment to high energy prices.

There is also greater recognition that monetary policy alone cannot do the job.

While the problem of balancing the federal budget in a time of recession has posed formidable obstacles, the political mainstream seems committed to that goal for fiscal poli-

Only substantial progress in that direction will reduce the pressure on monetary policy that is created when it is required to bear the whole anti-inflation burden.

IF AMERICA is to increase its levels of savings and investment, then we must face the question of the adequacy of our tax poli-

Our tax system tends to favor consumption over investment. Interest paid on consumer debt, for example, is deductible, while income received from savings is taxed at ordinary income rates.

Indeed, capital income other than capital gains is taxed at potentially higher marginal rates than salary or wages.

These biases can be attacked only through significant tax reform.

The density of the political thicket called comprehensive tax reform makes a wholesale revision of the structure of the federal income tax unlikely. But the prospect for specific measures that would increase the appeal of capital investment looks brighter than it has in years.

In the give-and-take, though, merchants got to keep angle parking which, on the plus side, may hold up traffic for less time than parallel parking

Merchants and property owners along both University Avenue and 19th Street should not be surprised, however, if one day all on-street parking has to be removed. They should plan for that day

by acquiring sites for off-street parking.

In that regard, the University Avenue plan does not permit left-turns from 10th Street. This destroys much of the value of the 10th and Main oneway pair and will force more traffic onto crowded 19th Street.

Maybe Avenues S and T as a north-south oneway pair will be upgraded to take more of the traffic feeding downtown via Main and 10th

Anyway, if all goes well, a contract for widening University Avenue should be awarded this summer and, by next spring, the work should be com-

Until this is done, the advocates say, the public will remain misinformed and competing manufacturers who have advertised fairly will be at a disadvantage.

· RECALL ORDERS. In the past fiscal year, the Consumer Product Safety Commission alone issued an average of more than 10 recall orders per week in an effort to remove more than 53 million unsafe items from the market.

But consumer groups believe both advertising and recall remedies are dangerously inadequate. Federal agencies can't order makers to take out costly ad campaigns to say that their products may, say, overheat, cause fires or burns.



### Both Iraq, Iran Boast Successes In Gulf War

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Iran and Iraq claimed fresh successes in air, sea and land combat today as the Persian Gulf war slogged into its 22nd week in the snow-blanketed foothills of the Zagros Mountains and the rain-washed marshes of Khuzistan.

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein threatened to conquer more Iranian cities to force the Islamic revolutionary re gime in Tehran to "kneel and plead for peace." Hussein said Iraq has more tanks, planes and guns now than at the outbreak of the war 148 days ago.

Military communiques from the two nations, however, showed no break from the reigning stalemate at the war's two major theaters in Iran's western highlands, and the southwestern oil heartland of Khuzistan, both largely occupied by

Iran claimed 83 Iraqi deaths and Iraq claimed 80 enemy fatalities in 24 hours of paratroop assaults and long-range artillery duels as helicopter gunships raided each other's positions at both ends of the 300-mile warfront.

An Iranian communique also claimed 80 Iraqi deaths in a flank attack that brought Iranian forces punching across the border to capture a chain of hills in northeastern Iraq.

A communique from Iraq claimed that Iraqi warplanes sank an Iranian gunboat off Iran's besieged oil refining city of Abadan at the border waterway of Shatt al-Arab. The Iraqis claimed to have sunk an Iranian warship at the Persian Gulf's northern tip on Saturday.

The war claims could not be independently verified because mostly Persian Iran and predominantly Arab Iraq ban journalists from battlefield report-

President Hussein issued his threat of more conquest on Sunday when he addressed an Iraqi infantry brigade departing to the front from Baghdad, the Iraqi capital, according to the official Iraqi

"We have refrained from grabbing more enemy cities and land to give the

enemy leadership the chance to reconsider its position and accept peaceful coexistence with Iraq," Hussein said. "But if it fails to do so, then it shall be forced to kneel and plead for peace. ... We are capable of taking more Iranian cities at

Hussein said Iraq concluded billions of dollars worth of arms deals since the

start of the war, but did not say what countries the weapons were bought

We have found additional paths to weaponry," said Hussein, whose main arms supplier before the war was the Soviet Union. "We have also made deals with all forces of the black market to get

### Journalist Cautions Against Protections

executive said today any attempt by the U.N. Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization to issue regulations to protect newsmen would actually harm them.

George Beebe of the InterAmerican Press Association, spoke at a UNESCO meeting on licensing and regulating of journalists to conform to "ethical rules."

### South Yemen's Paris Embassy Bombed

PARIS (UPI) - Terrorists severely damaged the South Yemen embassy today in a spectacular rocket attack in the heart of the French capital and claimed they acted to avenge the bombing last

fall of a Paris synagogue.

Police said the early-morning bombing in which no one was hurt was the work of "experienced specialists" who planted two missile launchers with delayed action firing in the court of an apartment building behind the embassy.

The launchers were placed atop nine feet of soil next to a wall facing the windows of the embassy about 90 feet away, police said. The rocket pulverized shutters and metal bars on the embassy windows and wrecked the room in which

they exploded. On the wall next to the launching site the militants had scrawled with black paint in English, "Remember Copern-

The phrase recalled the bombing of a that killed three persons and injured 15 among passersby and Jews worshipping on their Sabbath. The crime, the most violent anti-Semitic act in France since World War II, caused an uproar.

An anonymous caller to the French news agency also played a recording on the telephone that said in French that the rockets were fired at the South Yemen embassy "in the name of all the victims of Rue Copernic

The blast marked the first time that rockets have been fired in the center of Paris in a terrorist act. Palestinians fired rockets against an Israeli plane at Orly airport in the early 1970s.

### Study Says Trident, MX May Boost Arms Race

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deployment of both the advanced Trident II submarine missiles and the MX missile system, which would enhance American strategic capabilities, might lead to accelerated nuclear arms development in the Soviet Union, a federal study says.

"The Trident II missile, combined

"The Trident II missile, combined with other U.S. programs ... could increase Soviet fears of a U.S. first (nuclear) strike," according to an arms control impact statement sent to Congress on

The Soviets might respond to deployment of both missiles by developing new nuclear weapons that would upset the nuclear balance and could not be easily controlled by any new arms agreement, the statement says.

Although acknowledging the possible arms controls risks associated with deployment of the MX, the report says, "the national political and military risks

involved in not doing so are even great-

The impact statements by the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency says some mix of Trident II and MX missiles might be found that would not threaten arms control.

The United States has not made a decision on whether to deploy both the Trident II and MX missile.

Meanwhile, the second-ranking official at the Soviet embassy in Washington, Minister-Counselor Vladillen M. Vasev, said Saturday the SALT II treaty is "not in force" because the U.S. has not rati-

Asked about the fate of the strategic arms limitation agreement, Vasev told the Cable News Network, "I would say the ball is in the court of the (Reagan) administration ... We are in the process of waiting for the United States to do its side of the agreement."

The U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency reviewed more than 90 U.S. weapons systems and concluded that all were in accord with present arms control agreements. The report was sent to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and House Foreign Affairs Committee.

The statements say both the landfired MX missiles and Trident II submarine missiles would overcome increasing U.S. vulnerability to a Soviet first nuclear strike.

Arms control could be threatened, the statements say, if the Soviets developed a new weapons system to counter the increased capabilities the United States might gain from deployment of the Trident and MX missiles.

However, either the MX mobile missile system or the Trident II missiles could enhance arms control if the Soviets responded by building a controllable new mobile missile system of their own.

### Balloonists Abandon Bid To Circle Glode

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — Two American adventurers, their bid to float around the world in a giant helium-filled balloon ended in a muddy field at the foot of the Himalayas, said today their conquest of the air would have to wait for another year.

for another year.

"The balloon is finished, we cannot use it again," the pilot, 46-year-old Maxie Anderson of Albuquerque, N.M., told UPI. "We have neither the heiturn nor the time. The westerlies have moved north and it is definitely off for this year."

Anderson and his co-pilot, 47-year-old Donald Ida of Longmont, Colo., made arrangements today to retrieve "Jules Verne." the battered balloon that was trampled under the feet of thousands of curious villagers in a muddy field 120 miles northwest of New Delhi.

An Indian Air Force helicopter arranged by Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's son Rajiv failed in an attempt to lift out the red, white and blue gondola by cable Sunday night and Anderson said they would bring it back by truck.

they would bring it back by truck.

A helium leak that began shortly after the balloon lifted off from Luxor, Egypt, Thursday prevented them from rising high enough to clear the snow covered peaks of the Himalayas.

The Americans feared that even if they made it to the other side of the range they might be stranded on the barren plateaus of Tibet and gave up in India Saturday.

"We decided we would rather land somewhere near civilization where it is warm." Anderson said.

The two men slept in the gondola after thousands of curious farmers and villagers arrived by camel, oxcart and foot to see the downed craft and its two American pilots.

### Peasants Drop Key Issue

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Striking peasants in the southeastern town of Rzeszow dropped a key demand for a rural Solidarity union, an apparent acceptance of Prime Minister Wojciech Jaruzelski's call for a "honeymoon" to stabilize Poland's shattered economy.

Spokesmen for the peasants' group said "the crucial issue of the future registration of Rural Solidarity as a furners' trade union has been suspended" until a

The development came as 10,000 striking university students in Lodz, Poland's second biggest city, postponed their call for nationwide student protests in anticipation of signing a compromise agreement with the government over their grievances.

Talks in Rzeszow began after the arrival of the independent Solidarity union leader, Lech Walesa. He traveled there Sunday in an attempt to resolve the labor revolt by peasants who have occupied the former offices of the government-run un-

A spokesman for the peasants said negotiations would center on other issues in a list of 68 demands, most important of which is the increase of state investment in private agriculture.

Spring is coming and we have to go back to the fields," a spokesman for the peasants said. "If all goes well the talks

After he was named prime minister last week, Jaruzelski appealed for a 90day period of no strikes.

Although Solidarity has not formally agreed to go along with it, a spokesman today indicated the union supports Jaruz-elski's efforts to get the nation's economy back on its feet.

"We (the union) do not want weak government power because it is danger-ous for the country," Solidarity spokes-man Karol Modzewski said in an interview in the newspaper Zycie Warszawy. "Weak power cannot be a trustworthy power for the people."

#### Gorski and a spokesman for the students said Sunday night the two sides were about to formally accept a compromise, ending compulsory Russian language and Marxism courses in Polish universities. In return, the students dropped a demand for shortening their compulsory military service. LONDON (AP) - The dollar posted fresh gains on world money markets today, showing some of the sharpest advances seen in months on the basis of indications of tough new economic policies from President Reagan.

The dollar hit a seven-year high against the French franc, touched its highest level in years against the sagging West German mark, the Swiss franc and Dutch guilder, and reached another unofficial all-time record against the Italian

The dollar is still riding the wave and may well stay strong during the week while the market waits for Ronald Reagan's economic speech," said one Swiss

Reagan's speech, scheduled for Wednesday, is expected to detail his plans for trimming the budget and curbing inflation.

Most U.S. banks were closed today for the President's Day holiday.

existing prisons - Coffield and Beto units in Anderson County and Ellis unit in Walker County. Clements said the units, each com-

posed of 15 buildings, will be designed to accommodate 960 inmates each, and will include recreational and industrial facilities as well as libraries and chapels.

Inmates at the new units would be housed in metal barracks type buildings, Clements said.

This will in large measure answer the immediate problem of getting the population down so we do not have three people in one cell," he said. "This \$35 million will be in addition to the funds we will need in the long term to build a new unit in Grimes County and two additional units in the future.

Barring any major problems, Page said astronauts John Young and Robert Crippen most likely will be cleared for takeoff in mid-April on their 541/2-hour voyage around Earth. The landing is planned for Edwards Air Force Base in California's Mojave desert.

The bodies of 14 young men, all showing signs of torture, were found in Guatemala and 250 more people were reported killed in El Salvador as political violence continued without letup in the two neighboring Central American countries.

Guatemalan authorities said the 14 bodies found about 100 miles east of Guatemala City, the capital, on Sunday may have been the victims of rightist death squads that carry out almost daily assassinations in response to attacks by leftists trying to topple the military regime of Fernando Romeo Lucas Garcia. Death squad victims include a growing number of students, union and political leaders and professionals.

Police also reported a shootout Saturday in front of the Guatemala City headquarters of the liberal Christian Democratic Party. It was not clear what prompted the shooting in which one person was killed and three others were

wounded. They were not identified. Hundreds of people were killed in political violence last year in Guatemala, while 13,000 died last year in the warfare between leftists and rightists in El Salvador. And the death rate there is increas-

Informed sources said the toll last week in El Salvador was at least 250, raising the toll so far this year to more

Most of last year's deaths were attributed to rightists fighting a leftist bid to establish a Marxist government in place of the civilian-military junta that now runs the country. However, the leftist guerrillas are waging more offensive ac-

tions this year Since a widespread guerrilla offensive

last month failed to capture any towns for the leftists, they have been blowing up bridges and communications links in an apparent attempt to isolate cities and towns from San Salvador, the capital. An official of the Public Works Ministry said 138 of the ministry's workers have been killed and 11 bridges blown up in the eastern provinces.

The government claims the guerrillas also are burning cotton fields in an attempt to cripple the economy further and are trying to collect a "war tax" from businessmen by threatening them

The Roman Catholic archbishop of

San Salvador pleaded "in the name of God" Sunday for an end to the political

"Please, in the name of humanity do not kill the defenseless, in the name of Christ do not kill your own brothers, in the name of God do not kill," Archbishop Arturo Rivera y Damas said in his weekly

He said the security forces must be given certain special rights because of the situation, but they should make "prudent use of those rights." He said that in less than a month at least 178 people have been shot for violating the dusk-todawn curfew in force across the nation.

### 17th Murder Victim Identified

Jeffery Lamar Mathis, last seen almost a year ago when he walked to a service station near his home, has become the 17th black child found slain in the Atlanta area in the past 19 months, police say.

Medical officials who spent much of the weekend examining the skeletal remains found Friday in an overgrown area of south Fulton County made the identification Sunday

Dr. John Feegel, associate medical examiner for Fulton County, said dental records were the main tool used to identify the Atlanta child and to rule out the possibility the body was that of another missing black child, 10-year-old Darron

He said there were "minor inconsistencies" between the records of each child and the teeth found in the skeleton. But the skeletal teeth also had several consistencies with Mathis' records and none with Glass', he said. Glass is the only child still missing in

the series of 18 slayings and disappearances of black children. Feegel said no cause of death could

be established from the remains, which were found by an FBI team in an area where the bodies or remains of six other children have been found since the string of slavings began.

Mathis' remains were discovered less than an hour before a maintenance worker on the other side of the Atlanta metropolitan area spotted the body of a young black male, later identified as 11-year-old Patrick Baltazar.

That body was the first in the 17 deaths to turn up in suburban DeKalb County. Unlike many of the others, found in isolated areas, it was discovered behind an office complex in a densely

DeKalb Public Safety Director Dick Hand said after the discovery of Baltazar's body that the more deaths discovered, "the greater the chance of apprehension. We've learned more and more with each one of these cases.

Police spent the weekend questioning workers in the Corporate Square Office Park, where the body was found. Authorities said they hoped to work up composite drawings of possible suspects seen in the area.

The two discoveries Friday brought to six the number of children's bodies or remains that have been found in the Atlanta area in the past six weeks. All but two of the 17 victims have been male, all have been between the ages of 7 and 15, and eight of them either were suffocated or strangled.

Several hundred volunteers turned

clues in the cases in an area southwest of the city near where the Mathis child's remains were found.

The volunteer searchers have been combing Atlanta neighborhoods since last fall, but have turned up nothing significant since the first search found the remains of 7-year-old Latonya Wilson.

In another development Sunday, selfofessed psychic Jeanne Dixon, in the city to deliver a speech at an educators' convention, dropped by unannounced at the office of the special police task force created to investigate the 17 slayings and

one disappearance. Mrs. Dixon spoke with investigators, showed reporters a paper predicting that police "will solve the murders of Atlanta's children this year," and said task force members promised to call her to-





Other sources said the club refused to admit persons it considered troublemakers. But the manager refused to say if anvone was turned away Friday night, when about 800 people jammed the Stardust for a "Dance the Night Away" Valentine party. The Sunday Tribune said five girls re-

ported they saw youths lighting the padded chairs with matches just before the fire began to spread near the stage of the club early Saturday

A 19-year-old waitress, Elizabeth Marley, said she saw two chairs afire and

"I told the barmen and the bouncers and between 12 and 15 of them rushed to the fire and tried to put it out with fire extinguishers," she said, "One of them opened a fire prevention screen and the flames just leapt out across the ceiling."

Witnesses said thick black fumes filled the nightclub within four minutes and burning plastic dripped from the ceiling on the panic-stricken young men and women trying to flee.

Officials had believed 49 people were killed, but a police spokesman said pathologists established that only 48 bodies were found. However, the mother of three teen-agers who were in the club. 40-year-old Mary Coyne, died of a heart attack when told her son and two daughters were safe.

#### Nations Writing Environmental, Economic Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Caribbean nations and their neighbors will meet in Nicaragua later this month to complete work on a "Caribbean action plan" to work on the region's environmental and related economic problems.

It is not an issue of conservation, said Arsenio Rodriguez, a marine biologist with the United Nations, "it is an issue of economic survival."

Rodriguez said representives from countries in the region will meet in Nicaragua in late February to put the finishing touches on the environmental plan that is supposed to cover everything from oil spills to hurricane protection.

General agreement to continue with the plan was reached last January and the coming meeting will decide the next step, he said.

The pact covers Central America. Mexico, the Caribbean islands, the U.S. gulf states, the Bahamas and northeastern South America from Colombia to Guiana and Panama.

Haiti, the poorest nation in the Western hemisphere, is one example Rodriguez used in a recent interview to illustrate the need for an environmental pact. He said 80 percent of that country's land is unusable because of environmental

Vatican officials said the pope's major theme on his 21,000-mile voyage would be peace - through disarmament, fair distribution of wealth, protection of human rights and inter-faith dialogue.

L'Osservatore Romano, the Vatican newspaper, said the pontiff would call for critical decisions to advance the cause of peace because mankind is "threatened by an immense danger, ... an atomic conflict and the terrible existential and social inequalities which culminate in the tragedy of poverty and



**Leads Sought** In Slaying

Crime Line Inc. this week spotlights the 11-year-old unsolved murder of city zoning administrator A.J. Prim, who died July 24, 1970, after being wounded more than two weeks earlier.

A \$1,000 reward is offered for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person or persons responsible for the death of the city official.

Prim was found about 3 a.m. July 8, 1970, slumped over in the front seat of his 1967 Chevrolet at the intersection of FM 1729 and Acuff Road.

After discovering he had been shot, four passersby took Prim to Methodist Hospital, where he died 16 days later. He had suffered five .22-caliber gunshot wounds in the abdo-

In brief interviews with sheriff's deputies while he was hospitalized, Prim indicated a black man entered his car at a traffic light at Idalou Road and Quirt Avenue and forced him to drive east of the city.

The 50-year-old Prim told deputies the man became angry and shot him when he refused to follow the abductor's instructions. Investigators said the victim's wounds indicated he was shot by someone in the car on the passenger side, or by someone standing outside the passenger door.

Prim said he attempted to drive back to Lubbock after being shot, but he lost consciousness several times before being taken to the hospital

The Lubbock County Sheriff's Department recently reopened the investigation of the mysterious murder, and anyone having information about the case is urged to call Crime Line at 741-1000. Callers may remain anonymous.

Judge Menton Jr. told police he, his wife and the youngster were driving west in the 3100-block of Clovis Road when a man in a late-model Ford pickup

truck fired a single gunshot blast at their vehicle. The boy was struck in the head by the blast, and he is undergoing treatment

### Gym Class Improves Students' Self Images

Avalanche-Journal Staff At 1:30 p.m. each weekday, the Monterey High School girls' gym echoes with shouts of encouragement for 10 handicapped youngsters discovering they can get more out of physical education than just volleyball skills

The students are the pioneering members of a new adaptive physical education class developed and taught by PE instructor Marty Montoya. Most of the youngsters are emotionally disturbed or otherwise emotionally maladjusted but several have mental or physical handi-

The project, begun with the new semester in January, has proved a test of patience and guidance for Mrs. Montoya, but not at all to her dismay.

"Mostly I volunteered for the program," she said, noting resource teachers (who serve handicapped students in special classes) had "mentioned the need, and the timing was now." Monterey principal Jerrell Snodgrass added 'parents were just hungry" for such a

The program is geared to aid students who generally have low self esteem and "are quick to react," Mrs. Montoya said. They get angered easily," she added and some have formed a "protective shield" against potential embarrassment and hurt feelings.

Several students who have physical handicaps have additional limitations, although they are obstacles that are being

overcome. One young man confined to a wheelchair because of muscular dystrophy rolls about the basketball court eager for his chance to handle the ball.





What do you bid now? A.-Slam prospects flared when partner opened the bidding, which encouraged you to make two forward-going moves by overcalling at the two-level and cue-bidding the club ace en route to four spades. ### Choices In Bank Credit Cards

By ROBERT BURNS

NEW YORK (AP) - Time was, you wanted a credit card, you went to a bank and applied for one, not worrying much about which bank; one was pretty much the same as the next. And so were their credit-card services.

But that's all changing

Now there are such things as creditcard wars in many parts of the country. Although many banks lost money on their credit-card operations last year,

they are still trying to undercut each other on the pricing features of their cards. Such battles reflect the trend toward deregulation of the nation's financial industry. Competitive barriers are falling left and right. And that has opened the door for aggressive bankers trying to expand their consumer base. Others are

content just to protect what they already

For the consumer, that means more choices in finding the best credit-card deal in town.

Banks in many states require you to pay an annual fee for the right to hold your card. That trend started last spring when the Federal Reserve Board asked banks to tighten their credit programs in an attempt to stem consumer spending and curb inflation.

Now, nearly a year later, dozens of banks require such fees. At Bank of America in California, the fee is \$12 a year. If you have both a Visa and Master-Card, that means a \$24 annual charge. Bank of America has about 8:3 million card holders, more than any other bank in the country.

But Crocker National Bank, one of Bank of America's biggest competitors in California, took a different tack when it changed its credit-card pricing last sum-

It decided to charge cardholders 12 cents for each time the card is used. So

the more you use the card, the more you pay. If you use the card only for identification, and not for purchases, you pay nothing. But for most people, it means their credit card is no longer as cheap as it once was.

"There's no question ... that (card) prices are not going to be as low as they once were," said Betty Lattie, a Crocker public affairs official. "That's part of the changes in banking."

And those changes are affecting consumers in most parts of the country. But while the prices are higher, they also vary greatly from bank to bank and from region to region.

In Chicago, for example, Harris Trust & Savings Bank charges a \$20 yearly fee two. Continental Illinois Bank, on the other hand, charges a yearly fee of \$15 for Visa and MasterCard. But you can have a combined account for \$15 a year. compared with \$30 for separate accounts.

In New York, several banks recently established annual fees of \$15 for their credit-card holders. But not all are the same. In fact some banks chose to not impose an annual fee in hopes of luring customers upset by the fee strategy.

For Bank of New York, the no-fee decision seems to have worked well. The bank started a local newspaper advertising campaign on Jan. 29, stressing that, unlike most other big New York banks, it was not charging an annual fee.

Richard Field of the bank's marketing department said apllications in the specific.

The ad campaign "struck a spark" in consumers peeved by the new fees imposed by Bank of New York's chief competitors, Field said, "much more so than

we had anticipated." New York banks only recently started charging annual fees on credit cards because state law had prohibited such fees

until it was changed last fall.

Nationally, the range of fees — and the complexity of fee structures - varies

greatly. Take the Huntington National Bank of Columbus, Ohio for example. It charges Visa and MasterCard customers \$20 per account or \$25 for a combined account with a single line of credit.

But cardholders may waive up to \$20 of that by maintaining a checking ac\$1,000 or a certificate of deposit with \$1,-

But if the customer keeps a minimum checking account balance of \$500, neither the savings accounts nor the certificate

of deposit are needed. But each month the account requirements are not met, a \$1.65 charge shows up on the cardholder's checking account

But senior citizens need not worry about the account requirements. They

are charged no fees, regardless. Gone are the days of bank-card simpl-

### Scientists Plan To Avert Earth-Asteroid Collision

WASHINGTON (AP) - Warning that errant asteroids could one day destroy civilization on Earth — just as they may have wiped out dinosaurs — a group of scientists says man should be planning to use rockets and hydrogen bombs to deflect asteroids back into space.

There are about 800 asteroids in deep space that could destroy most of life on our planet, and perhaps hundreds of thousands of smaller ones that could demolish a single city or region, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Advisory Council said in a recent

The only way to avoid an impending collision would be to detect the possibility far in advance and intercept the approaching body with a hydrogen bomb, the council said.

posed a modest beginning: a few million NASA dollars to start Project Space-

The project would dedicate one large telescope to detecting all asteroids and meteors larger than 30 to 60 feet in diameter whose paths cross the Earth's orbit and track them for years in case they wander onto a collision course. The observation could later be expanded to detect smaller objects with a network of telescopes, radars and satellites.

To change a collision course, the council said, a spacecraft carrying a hydrogen bomb would attach itself to the object in space and be exploded by a radio signal from the ground.

The group, assembled by NASA to explore future space projects, noted there

when an asteroid, perhaps six miles in diameter, struck the Earth.

The theory, proposed three years ago by Nobel physicist Luis Alvarez, is that the collision threw so much dust and debris into the atmosphere that it blocked out the sun for years, destroying plant life and plant-eating animals like the di-

"In the 130 million years the dinosaurs roamed the Earth, they failed to develop the technology to avoid their own extinction," the council said. 'Homo sapiens have developed an adequate technology. He can avert any further extinction by asteroid impact. We think we should."

So what is NASA doing with this recommendation?

"In the current financial climate, it's difficult to propose a new program such as this if you can't justify a clear need for

it," he said. French would like to see a low-level effort started, such as investing \$3 million to \$4 million in a telescope especially for asteroid and meteor observation.

'We need more capability to determine how many bodies are out there and where they are," he said. "A dedicated telescope would certainly enlarge our data base. Right now there are too many objects that we can't detect because they're too small and move too fast.

"These things are potential hazards," French added. "There's unquestioned evidence these impacts have occurred in the past, and they probably will again."

Tech president Lauro Cavazos is chairman of the city of Lubbock portion of the fund raiser, Henry said.


Hillcourt, in his address to the crowd. discussed the founding of the Boy Scouts and his commitment to the organization. He said scouting has had its ups and



Lubbock County authorities recovered stolen narcotics worth an estimated \$50,-000 and jailed two burglary suspects in a Sunday morning raid on a Carlisle resid-

The two men, ages 19 and 21, were ar-rested shortly before 8 a.m. when Lubbock County Sheriff's deputies and investigators from the Criminal District Attorney's office converged on the home, located a few miles west of the city.

Armed with a search warrant issued by County Judge J.Q. Warnick, the lawmen recovered several thousand narcotic pills believed to have been taken in last week's burglary of Gordon Moore Rexall Drug, 2609 Boston Ave.

Investigators estimated the street value of the stolen narcotics, mostly barbituates, at approximately \$50,000.

Both men remained in the Lubbock County Jail today, but authorities are still seeking another man for questioning about the burglary.

In addition to the stolen narcotics. lawmen confiscated approximately two grams of suspected cocaine, assorted drug paraphernalia including several syringes, a bank bag from the pharmacy and

Hal Hensley, chief administrator for Authorities believe the pickaxe was used to hack a large hole in the north wall of the pharmacy. The tool was covered with white mortar powder similar

to the debris found inside the pharmacy. The intriders then apparently stood on a garbage dumpster outside the building to crawl through the hole which was several feet above the ground according to police reports on the incident.

Pharmacist Gordon Moore initially reported that 3,100 pills, primarily the tranquilizer Valium and the painkiller Percodan, were stolen in the break-in. However, he later told police 1,300 more pills - 1,000 phenobarbital and 300 Placidil — also were discovered missing.

Authorities said the Phenobarbital, a powerful depressant, greatly increased the street value of the drugs.

Sunday's arrests marked the second major drug-related raid in Lubbock County in eight days. Three persons were arrested, and a quantity of heroin worth \$70,000 was confiscated Feb. 7.

SEATTLE (AP) - An earthquake

"The major eruption caused the stresses in the crust - how the crust is pulled and pushed," Dvorak said Saturday. 'When you move such a large amount of material, the stresses readjust. This earthquake is probably a realization of those stresses.

Meanwhile, a flurry of aftershocks that jolted western Washington through the weekend had tapered off drastically by Sunday night, scientists said.

The earthquake, centered about 12 miles northwest of the volcano, registered 5.5 on the Richter scale of ground motion and was detected by people from California to lower British Columbia

A quake of 5 is capable of considera-

ble damage in a populated area. 'Since Friday we've easily had over 100 (aftershocks), but since 7 o'clock (Sunday) morning we've only had about 15." said Susan Carlson, spokeswoman for the University of Washington geophysics center

Only two of the minor tremors were strong enough to be detected by people. and no one called in to report them, Miss Carlson said. The largest of the aftershocks measured 2.0 and 2.8 on the Richter scale of ground motion at about 11 a.m. and 2.45 p.m., respectively, she

Such aftershocks are likely to continue for about three days after a quake as large as Friday's, Miss Carlson said.

The federal government is trying to tell Americans everything they've ever wanted to know about automobiles with a 68-page guide called "The Car Book" that has become an instant hit with con-

Critics, including some industry sources, charge that the publication now in its second printing - is inaccurate and unfair, particularly in its safety

The National Highway Traffic Safety

Administration prepared the guide and defends it. Bob Boaz, a spokesman for the agency, said the book is designed to show that there ARE differences among various makes and models and that there are cars on the market today that combine safety and good mileage.

"The choice between safety and fuel economy is not one that the consumer hould have to make," Boaz said.

Critics of "The Car Book" say that the safety tests used were too limited because they involved only one type of at a speed of 35 mph, into a concrete bar-rier. The critics also say that the flat "pass-fail" rating system used to grade the cars is unfair.

Boaz said the "pass-fail" grades are not meant as complete safety ratings. They are simply intended to show comparative performance. He said the headon crash was used as a standard for testing because it is a common type of accident. He said more than 60 percent of crashes involve a front-end collision of some type. ### Farmers Plan Showdown Over Stored Grain

NEW MADRID, Mo. (UPI) - There are three sets of padlocks on the bankrupt Ristine Grain Elevator - one belonging to a federal judge, one to the state and one to the farmers who own the \$6 million worth of crops inside.

The judge says the farmers will have to wait in line with the other creditors. The farmers say they own the grain and they will take it back. The state wants to stay out of the way.

Wayne Cryts, a spokesman for the farmers, said Sunday the farmers were going to start loading their crops today. in defiance of the judge's order.

"We're willing to lose everything we've got," said Cryts, who has 31.000 bushels of soybeans worth about \$250,000 stored in the elevator. "We're willing to go to jail if we have to, and we're going to go to the elevator if we have to go by ourselves.

"I'm still paying interest on those beans. My assets are tied up. I've got outstanding bills that are growing at 2 percent a month. This is absolutely going to bankrupt us if we don't get it settled.

The Missouri farmers - who grew

the crops and hold negotiable warehouse receipts issued by the state department of agriculture - have been joined by farmers from as far away as Nebraska, Louisiana and Virginia in their dispute with the government.

About 500 farmers gathered for a weekend rally in Sikeston, about 10 miles north of the grain elevator, to plan their

### Grand Juries To Probe Auto Thefts

CHICAGO (AP) - Federal grand juries will meet in five Midwestern states this week to investigate the multimillion-dollar racket of stealing, stripping and re-selling automobiles, a published report said today.

The Chicago Tribune, quoting unnamed sources, reported that the grand juries will meet in Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Louis, Hammond, Ind., and Louisville. It quoted the sources as saying the Chicago area and northern Indiana have become the hub of the nation's auto "chop shop" industry

The report said the investigation,

which will concentrate on the role played by organized crime, will be directed by Douglas P. Roller, attorney for the Chicago-based Organized Crime Strike

The probe will be a coordinated effort by the strike force and the Internal Revenue Service, which plans to investigate unreported income by people involved in the rackets.

In a separate article in its Sunday editions, the Tribune said the high risk of automobile theft in Chicago adds \$100 or more to the cost of every car owner's in-

Ninety cars a day are stolen from Chi-cago streets, and most of them are found stripped down if they are recovered at all, the article said.

Local car thieves gross more than \$200,000 a day from auto thefts, and most of that money is channeled into other illegal activities, the newspaper said.

Most car thieves have organizedcrime connections and there is a continuing war for control of the lucrative illegal market, the Tribune said. Federal authorities believe at least 21 people have been killed in disputes involving automobile thefts, the paper said.

Fewer than 15 percent of vehicle thefts end in arrests.

### **Understanding Asthma**

By LAWRENCE LAMB, MD.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 63 years old and have what my dector has diagnosed as intrinsic asthma igarette smoke, perfumes and strong detergents seem to trigger my cough ing spasms. I can sleep through the night but with my first contact with irritants my lungs will partially close and I will have a wheezing rattle in my throat, which will also affect my

My doctor is a specialist in allergies and has put me through all the tests. He says there is nothing more that can be done for me and my best bet is to avoid the irritants that bother me. Of course that is impossible to do

Is there a place I could go that may have newer medical treatments? My doctor is competent but if there is a chance other treatments would help I would appreciate knowing about it.

DEAR READER - The chances are that your doctor has done all that can be done. However, it is quite natural that you would want to seek out anything that might enable you to do better. The solution for patients with this situation is to have a consultation. The American Medical Association actively encourages physicians to use

consultations as a means of ensuring that patients get the best and the latest in medical management.

A good way to do this is to ask your doctor to refer you to a major clinic or medical center. That way their studies will be returned to him for your future care.

Now, your story is not quite typical. Intrinsic asthma is usually not associated with specific factors that you are allergic to, but rather it is triggered by some internal mechanism in your own body. External asthma is the more common type and is associated with allergic reactions. Your doctor is quite right that the best way to control asthma caused by specific allergies is to avoid those substances.

And there are several types of asthma. Some people have mixed forms. To give you a better understanding of asthma I am sending you The Health Letter number 8-, Asthma. Incidentally, be careful not to use aspirin or any products that contain aspirin as these can cause asthma attacks in many asthmatics. There are some new medications that are help-ful in preventing attacks. Your doctor may have already tried them.

DEAR DR. LAMB - What role does iodine play in a reducing diet? My daughter has lost a lot of weight and this iodine pill is part of her diet plan. Can this be injurious?

DEAR READER - Iodine combines with substances including food in the stomach to produce iodides, a salt. Small amounts are used to loosen secretions and aid as an expectorant. And if a person is iodine deficient, causing low thyroid function, it helps restore normal thyroid function. Otherwise, it has no role in enabling people to lose weight, unless they take enough to irritate the digestive system and cause diarrhea

In small amounts it is not likely to cause a problem but there is such a thing as chronic iodide toxicity, and some people are sensitive to iodine. Stopping the iodine or iodide usually solves the problem. Your daughter probably lost weight because her program limited her calories, not because of the iodine, unless she really did have a thyroid disorder that bene-





Searching For Reality

NEWS THAT THOMAS HENDERSON, the former Dallas Cowboy linebacker, is in an out-of-state hospital trying to free himself of narcotics addiction came as a real shocker to this scribbler. If there ever was a fellow who didn't need to rely on drugs, it was "Hollywood."

To the casual acquaintance, at least, Henderson had everything going for him. He was a magnificent physical specimen and handsome enough to be a movie star. He was bright and witty and a lot of fun to be around. Even Coach Tom Landry, never one to throw adjectives around, said that Henderson had the grid ability to be great.

If there were shadows in Henderson's past, as a black youngster living in poverty, he concealed them very successfully. From the time a Cowboy scout first visited him on the campus of little Langston College in Oklahoma, he was bubbling with self-confidence. He had strong opinions on certain subjects, too.

When the Cowboys routinely sent him a questionnaire during his senior season, a secretary typed his name as "Tom Henderson." The questionnaire came back a few days later with the name crossed out and a note in bold letters across the top: 'My name is THOMAS!

In a section for the player's comments, he declared, "You better draft me, be-

cause I'm going to play for somebody in the NFL! "Hollywood" never hid his emotions, for sure.

HENDERSON WAS DRAFTED by the Cowboys late in the first round in 1975, after using an earlier pick from the New York Giants to grab all-everything Randy White. The 'Pokes made quite a talent haul that year, with 12 rookies - the 'Dirty Dozen" - making the squad. It should have been the "Lucky Thirteen," but Landry cut quarterback Jim Zorn at the last minute to make room for veteran Preston

That was fast company for a player from Langston, who also had to make the switch from defensive end to linebacker. Sure enough, Henderson had problems galore when he reported to the Cowboys' training camp at Thousand Oaks, Calif., that July

After a couple of weeks, the scribblers covering the Cowboys began to wonder out loud if Henderson was the sure-fire talent that Dallas scouts had proclaimed. He had speed and agility, admittedly, but he also was having a tough time mastering Landry's complex defensive scheme.

At one point, the writers asked Landry if there was a possibility that Henderson would not make the squad despite being a first-round draft pick.

"Certainly," Landry replied. "I have seen Heisman Trophy winners who didn't make it.

One Sunday morning when the situation appeared grim, Henderson climbed a high hill behind the training site and sat up there for hours. He never revealed his thoughts, but when he came down it was with his dream of success in the NFL re-

HENDERSON DID MAKE the squad, of course, chiefly because of his value on the special teams. He was a streak going downfield to cover on punts and kickoffs and was a deadly tackler.

His amazing speed - for a linebacker - helped the Cowboys win a crucial tilt at St. Louis that autumn. Henderson returned a kickoff 97 yards for a touchdown that enabled Dallas to eventually win in overtime, 37-31.

The Cowboys played Pittsburgh in Super Bowl X that season and Henderson nearly repeated the feat. He took the opening kickoff back into Steeler territory and only a desperate grab by a startled Roy Gerela saved a touchdown.

Henderson made a lot of big plays during his five seasons with the Cowboys, although he never achieved the consistency that the coaches sought. He became the starting strongside linebacker in 1977, when White moved to tackle and Bob Brounig moved to the middle, but his greatest success was on the kicking teams.

BECAUSE OF THE controversy surrounding him the last two years at Dallas,

when he dropped all restraint in an obvious bid for personal publicity, teammates and the media became highly critical of his antics. Landry tried to get him to tone down his verbal blasts at opponents, because that was contrary to the mentor's own code of conduct. But Henderson would not be squelched. He made the Pro Bowl in 1978, despite

his growing notoriety, and turned in some truly spectacular plays. In an exhibition game against the Houston Oilers, he met the mighty Earl Campbell head-on and got a draw out of it. They both went down on the spot, not yielding an inch. And Campbell outweighed Henderson by 20 pounds!

Now the golden throats in the booth claim that Campbell cannot be brought down by one tackler, but Henderson did it.

Against the Rams in the '78 playoffs, Henderson intercepted a pass and ran it


back for a touchdown. That nearly killed the gladiators from Tinsel Town. In Super Bowl XIII, Henderson blitzed Pittsburgh's Terry Bradshaw and pinned his arms to his side, enabling Mike Hegman to steal the ball and romp to a touchdown that put the 'Pokes ahead for a time

"Hollywood" made good on some of his boasts, after all.

LANDRY TRIED EVERYTHING in an attempt to help Henderson, but in 1979 the situation became intolerable. We know why, now, with Henderson's admission of drug use. He became a disciplinary problem and hurt team morale. So Landry reductantly suspended him and later shipped him off to San Francisco with the hope he might find a new scene helpful.

He did not. Cut by the 49ers, he caught on briefly with Houston. Then the Oilers released him.

Henderson's whole world has collapsed now and his critics are chortling in glee. But some of us, at least, hope that the personable young man overcomes his problems and achieves success. If not in the NFL, perhaps in some other area. Life is bigger than a football field, when the final whistle sounds.



### Irwin Blisters Hawaiian

HONOLULU (AP) — Hale Irwin won the Hawaiian Open by a six-stroke margin and with a record score. He led all the way in the final round, by a minimum of two strokes.

But it wasn't easy.
"It sounds absurd, but it's hard to play with a five-stroke lead," Irwin said Sunday after scoring his first victory on the PGA Tour since the 1979 U.S. Open.

You don't want to get too aggressive and make mistakes. And you don't want to be too conservative and back off."

The key to it, Irwin said, was experience.

"A lot of experience came into play over those last few holes," said the man who now has won 12 American titles in 13 years on the Tour.

"I knew I had to play a good back nine, not so much making birdies but making good golf shots and a lot of par, forcing the other guys to try to catch me." He did that. And more.

Irwin got the pars he needed to secure the victory. And then he put on a birdieeagle finish to set the tournament scoring record at 265, 23 strokes under par on the 6,881-yard Waialae Country Club course that was robbed of its defenses by the rare absence of wind.

"Deep down I wanted to break the record, but, really, it was just a bonus," said Irwin, who started the final round with a five-shot cushion, saw it dwindle to two strokes at the turn, then finished his closing 69 on a high note.

Don January, a 51-year-old veteran and an occasional competitor on the seniors

Ben Crenshaw, Terry Diehl and Isao Aoki, Japan's leading player, were next at 272. Crenshaw, who once got to within two strokes of the top spot but finished with a 67, said, "You have to be realistic about it. I was playing for second. I didn't have any thought of catching Hale. He's too good a player.' Aoki had a closing 69, Diehl 70.

The group at 273 included Bean, Tom Watson, John Schroeder, John Mahaffey and George Archer. Bean, Mahaffey and Archer had last round 67's. Watson shot a 68 in the warm sunshine and Schroeder matched par 72.

Lee Trevino finished with a 68 and a 274 total. Bruce Lietzke, a two-time winner this season, had a birdie-birdie-birdie finish for a 69 that extended his streak of consecutive rounds at par or better to 18. He had a 275 total.

Irwin, who won \$58,500 from the total purse of \$325,000, had the lead all the way in the last round but said: "Things were starting to get a little shaky there for a while" when his lead dwindled to two strokes.

He added to that margin, however, with a great 9-iron shot that left him a six-inch tap-in for birdie on the 12th. The critical string of pars followed.

And he got the scoring record with a 5-iron shot that left him a six-footer on the 17th and a 3-wood shot that set up his 20-foot eagle putt on the last hole.

Weaver took the WBA title away from Tate last March 31 when he knocked Tate out with 45 seconds left in the fight. Holmes is the World Boxing Council heavweight champion. Both of these fighters are in a much faster league than the 27year-old Steichen, who said after the fight, "I thought I would have a harder time than I had. He never hurt me, his punches were more like pushes than punches. I was intimidated by him more than anything else.







ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — A triple bogey on the 10th hole cost JoAnne Carner the lead midway through the Ladies Professional Golf Association's S&H

But she parred it in the final round and got a standing ovation and a hefty dose of confidence to carry her to a two-stroke victor in sudden death over Dot Ger-

"I knew I was going to play well when I parred 10," Mrs. Carner said Sunday. She played conservatively and safely on the extra hole and stroked her way to a \$15,000 victory in wind and rain Sunday. It was the second time in as many weeks she was forced into sudden death play.

Miss Germain, the defending champion at Pasadena Golf Club, made her only birdie of the day on the 18th hole to catch the veteran Mrs. Carner at 1-under-par 215 in regulation play.

She hadn't been playing well most of the day and the extra hole was no different. She hit a tree with her first shot, then hooked one and it landed in the bunker. She hit over the fairway, missed a 50-foot chip shot and wound up with a doubleboge 6 for second place and \$9,800.

Jan Stephenson was third at par, 216, for \$7,000 and Cindy Hill was two strokes back to pocket \$5,000.

Mrs. Carner, who was leading on the back nine, bogeyed the 17th and skimmed the water coming in on the last hole. She made par and said she knew then - even

before Miss Germain shot — that they were headed for a playoff.

"I love playoffs. I usually win them," said the 11-year pro, who is 7-4 in sudden death. Mrs. Carner lost the Whirlpool Classic last week in a playoff with Judy Rankin and winner Sally Little.

"That 10th hole," Mrs. Carner said after Sunday's finale over the 6,214-yard course. She bogeyed it opening day, but still wound up the first-round leader with 3-under 69. The triple bogey Saturday left her with a 2-over-par 74 round. On Sun-

day, she fired two birdies, but they were canceled by a pair of bogeys for a par 72.

After a first-round total of 71, Miss Germain took the lead after 36 holes with a 70. She hit 74 on Sunday.

It was the first playoff for Miss Germain, a seven-year veteran whose only tournament victory was here last year. She bogeyed the first two holes Sunday, but said it really didn't bother her.

"My putting wasn't good and I missed many birdie shots," Miss Germain said. "I knew in the fairway JoAnne had parred the last hole and I was trying to get a birdie to catch her.




