

New Year's Brings Out Strange Behavior

Once a year, Mexicans burn tires, Brazilians dump brandy into the sea and Scots carry lumps of coal to their neighbors. What makes people act in such strange ways?

New Year's nap course
There are almost as many ways to usher in New Year's around the world as there are countries to celebrate it. Most, however, share the common custom of drinking too much.

New Year's can also be a risky business, depending on where you celebrate it.

In Italy, custom calls for Italians to throw unwanted objects accumulated over the past year out the window, all too often without looking down at the street below.

The next day, the streets are filled with broken crockery and furniture and the newspapers are filled with accounts of the injuries suffered by those on whom the objects fell.

In Lebanon, to say that New Year's is ushered in with a bang would be remarkable understatement. By the stroke of midnight, the night sky is filled with glow of tracer bullets and the sound of explosions that definitely are not the firecracker type.

Lebanese militiamen, Palestinian guerrillas and ordinary citizens all fire off their guns. Last year, one militia group was caught lobbing mortars into the sea.

In Austria, they dance a Viennese waltz in the streets but in Brazil they dance on the beach. Every New Year's, tens of thousands of faithful from Brazil's voodoo cults gather on the beach at Rio to toss flowers, brandy and cigars into the sea as an offering to the sea goddess.

Brezhnev Admits Difficulties

MOSCOW (AP)—President Leonid Brezhnev, acknowledging "difficulties and disappointments as well as achievements and joys" in 1980, wished the Soviet people a happy new year Wednesday and said he would pursue arms restraint and detente.

"We want peace for all peoples," the 74-year-old party and state leader declared, delivering a New Year's message personally over national television for the first time since 1973.

"Our adherence to the ideals of freedom, justice and progress is immutable," he said. "The Soviet Union resolutely comes out for detente, for strengthening cooperation and says a firm 'no' to the arms race and to complications and conflicts generated by imperialist policies."

Brezhnev did not discuss foreign or military affairs in detail, although he said, "Our defenses are being maintained at the proper level."

On domestic affairs, he vowed to accelerate scientific progress, struggle against food shortages, increase the output of consumer goods and build more housing.

"The Soviet Union has many good friends in the world," Brezhnev said.

On New Year's Eve, we convey our best wishes to the working people of the countries of socialism, to the Communist workers and national democratic parties and to all fighters against imperialism, reaction and war.

In the previous six years the Soviet leadership issued a joint New Year's greeting that was read by a television announcer. There was no official explanation for Brezhnev's personal delivery of the speech this year.

Western analysts have said in recent months that Brezhnev appeared to be raising his public profile in advance of the Communist Party's 26th congress, a major policy session scheduled for February.

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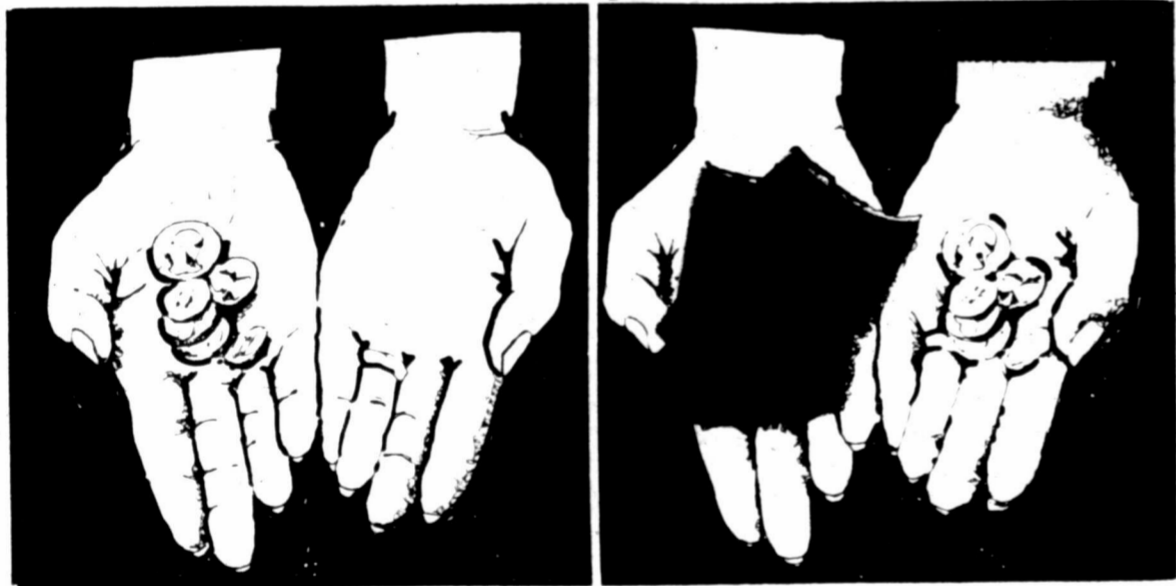
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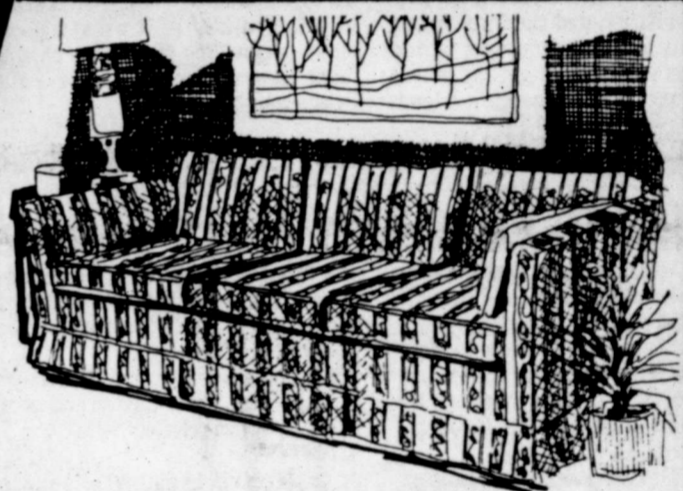
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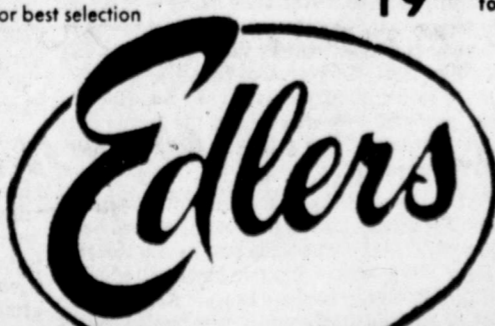

Census Fight Hurting Redistricting

AUSTIN (UPI) — Texas will have to redistrict this spring, but there is no guarantee the plans drawn by the Legislature will be legal for use in elections, a redistricting expert said Wednesday.

Because the Supreme Court approved the release of 1980 census figures, Austin attorney Steve Bickerstaff said, the Legislature is bound to use them in redistricting. But the Court has not ruled on whether the figures are adequate for redistricting.

Rep. Gerald Hill, D-Austin, chairman of the House committee in charge of redistricting, said the Legislature will have to prepare the plans in the hope that they will stand up in court.

"Our position really hasn't changed that much," he said. "I had planned to continue with the process, knowing that the figures might be in jeopardy. Hopefully the legal problems will have been worked out by the end of the session."

The uncertainty about the census figures comes from two federal district court decisions — one involving New York and the other involving Detroit — that the census results cannot be used in redistricting because minorities and low-income groups have been undercounted.

In both cases, federal district judges ordered revisions in the census before the results can be used for redistricting. Now, Supreme Court stays of those orders have permitted the figures to be released as originally scheduled.

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All county and district elected officials will be sworn into office during a special ceremony scheduled for 10 a.m. today in the 137th District Courtroom. District Judge Robert C. Wright will administer the oath of office. Elected officials' bonds will be approved during a meeting following the ceremony in the commissioners courtroom.

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Poland Hears Warning Of More Hard Times; Unity Encouraged

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland ended one of its most turbulent years in decades Wednesday with warnings from its leadership of more hard times ahead and with appeals for national unity.

"We enter the new year without illusions and easy promises," President Henryk Jablonski said in a speech on national television.

"Conflicting interests of various elements, classes and social groups are bound to clash in it, and they become more apparent as the economic situation of the country becomes graver," he said.

Jablonski, in a frank statement on the nation's plight, said "only we alone can solve our problems on the political, economic and moral level."

"We are saying farewell to a difficult and crucial year, to a year heavy with threats and great hopes," he continued. "The social conflict bore in itself the danger of deep divisions and shocks. We solved it by choosing the way of understanding. This was a joint victory of the workers protest and the forces of renewal within the party."

The president, whose job is largely ceremonial, thanked the Soviet Union and "other socialist countries" for their "help" during the difficult period.

The Communist Party, in its newspaper Trybuna Ludu, also advised that the new year would not bring with it the solution to Poland's problems.

"The new year will not greet us with prosperity," the party said in a front page commentary Wednesday.

"The process of making order in our lives will result in decisions and operations that will not be accepted by all with the same satisfaction."

The party called on Poland's 35.5 million people to join in "hard and patient efforts" to solve the problems.

The paper made no direct reference to the labor crisis of 1980, when hundreds of thousands of workers laid down their tools to demand more money, independent trade unions and a greater say in matters influencing their lives. The crisis brought the possibility of Soviet interven-

tion.

But the paper noted the year was "hard" on Poland.

Strikes did not end with the old year, as revelers discovered when they showed up at state-operated restaurants for New Year's Eve parties. Musicians demanding increased pay and benefits refused to perform and officials had to use taped music.

February is scheduled to bring the first full-scale rationing plan for meat and other scarce foodstuffs since the end of World War II. The government used a temporary rationing plan during Christmas week to ensure that everyone got a minimal amount of meat and butter for the holidays.

The government is working on a number of measures to reform Polish life, including new labor laws, easing of censorship and a new economic plan.

The 3.5 million member Communist Party, described as divided and demoralized, is expected to hold a congress in March.

Senegal Official Resigns

DAKAR, Senegal (AP) — Leopold Sedar Senghor, the poet-statesman who led Senegal since independence from France 20 years ago and helped formulate the concept of "negritude" as a proud slogan of African cultural tradition, announced his resignation Wednesday effective New Year's Day.

The resignation of Senghor, 74, had been expected for some time. He was to be replaced by 45-year-old Prime Minister Abdou Diouf, a long-time protege of the president who was scheduled to be sworn in to office Thursday before the Supreme Court, as specified under the constitution of this nation on the West African bulge.

Diouf, whom Senghor recently described as an "intelligent, competent and humble man," will complete the presidential term scheduled to expire in 1983.

Sources here said Senghor planned to spend some time traveling abroad but would return to live in one of the capital's residential areas.

In an interview earlier this month with the Paris daily newspaper Le Monde, Senghor said he would continue working for the creation of an international African socialist organization, one of his pet projects.

As president, Senghor, a mild-mannered man of small stature, cultivated a reputation as a liberal humanitarian. But he was sensitive to criticism and tolerated little political opposition.

His former prime minister, Mamadou Dia, was jailed in 1962 following an abortive coup attempt that led to the establishment of a presidential form of government under Senghor's exclusive control.

In response to demands for political and constitutional reform, Senghor reinstated the post of prime minister in 1970, appointing Diouf. Four years later Dia was released along with a number of other political detainees.

In 1976, Senghor revised the constitution to allow the formation of political parties whose ideologies were prescribed by law.

Senghor led Senegal as a formally non-aligned but pro-Western country.

Police Seek Seattle Murderer

SEATTLE (AP) — Police on Wednesday hunted a sullen drinker in a fatigue jacket who ordered a double margarita, pulled out a pistol and opened fire in a crowded downtown bar, killing two people and wounding two others in a flurry of bullets.

"Being so close of New Year's, they thought it was firecrackers going off until people started falling down," homicide Lt. Ernie Bisset said of the one dozen to two dozen patrons in the Gibson House bar in the St. Regis Hotel at the time of the shooting Tuesday night.

"The guy was not communicating with any other patrons in the bar. He was sitting there drinking his drinks and minding his own business. Then he got up and started shooting."

Police spokesman Gary Flynn said, "He got up, got a gun, apparently just fired indiscriminately."

Six to 10 shots were fired, Bisset said. The victims were identified by the King County medical examiner's office as Daniel Lee Meserve, 26, of Seattle and Dortha A. Edenso, 28, of Santa Cruz, Calif., who had recently resided in Seattle.

Harry George Rundberg, 23, of Redmond was in critical condition Wednesday undergoing surgery for a gunshot wound in the back, said Harborview Medical Center officials. Another woman was treated for a superficial leg wound and released.

Bar tender Susan Hamilton described the gunman as someone who "sounded very much against the world." She said he had been in the bar about two months earlier. He complained of poor service before opening fire.

The man was described as a black male in his mid-to-late 20s, about 5 feet 6 inches tall, thin with a short Afro hairstyle and moustache, wearing a fatigue jacket and carrying a knapsack.

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New Examination Can Identify Carriers Of Cystic Fibrosis

BOSTON (AP) — For the first time, doctors have found a way to identify parents who are likely to produce children with cystic fibrosis, the most common inherited fatal disease among whites in the United States.

Use of the test at first will be limited to people whose relatives already have the disease. But even in this restricted form, the exam could greatly reduce the number of babies born with the illness, its developers say.

The test, they say, tells parents whether they carry a genetic defect so they will know whether or not it is safe to have children.

Cystic fibrosis attacks the pancreas,

respiratory system and sweat glands. About 1,200 children are born with the illness each year, and the average life expectancy of victims is 19 years.

The new test was developed at Children's Hospital Medical Center in Boston, and a report on the work was published in Thursday's issue of the New England Journal of Medicine.

The doctors say the test is highly accurate in showing which adults are likely to produce children who will have cystic fibrosis. About 4 percent to 5 percent of the population carries the defective gene but shows no symptoms of the disease.

If a mother and father each have a gene that causes cystic fibrosis, there is a one in four chance that their children

will have the disease. However, if only one parent carries the gene, there is no chance that the baby will have it.

No pre-natal test exists to determine whether an unborn child has the disease.

Dr. James Epstein, one of the researchers, said the test takes about five minutes to administer, and doctors must obtain a tiny skin sample. Over the next year or two, the test will be limited to people who seem most likely to carry the disease.

"The magnitude of lining everybody up and spending five minutes with them to take a skin sample is really enormous," Epstein said in an interview. "What we are doing at the moment is limiting this test to individuals who are in the high-risk categories — people who have a brother or sister or other close family member with this disease."

People who have cases of the disease in their families are most likely to produce children with the illness. "Doing just the high-risk people," Epstein said, "should help an enormous amount in reducing the incidence of this disease."

Epstein said the research team hopes to develop a simple blood test within the next year that could replace the skin test and be more widely used. But even the skin test could be conducted in doctors' offices and analyzed in existing laboratories.

In the current tests, doctors measure the amount of sodium that skin cells absorb when they are exposed to ouabain, a medicine ordinarily given to heart patients as a substitute for digitalis.

In their study, they used the test on 13 healthy children, eight cystic fibrosis victims, eight parents of victims and three unaffected brothers and sisters of victims. The cells of the healthy youngsters absorbed twice as much sodium as did those of the victims, their parents or siblings.

"I think it's a very usable genetic counseling tool," Epstein said. "Unfortunately, there is no other carrier detection method available right now for cystic fibrosis."

In an accompanying editorial, Dr. John W. Littlefield of Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore said identifying people with the cystic fibrosis gene is an important research goal, because it's doubtful that doctors will soon find better ways to treat the disease.

"For patients and their parents," he wrote, "cystic fibrosis remains a grim sentence, usually prolonged through an unhappy adolescence to a sad, inevitable end."

Study Reveals Cancer Drugs' Effectiveness

BOSTON (AP) — Treating women with a combination of drugs after mastectomy for spreading breast cancer greatly increases their odds of survival, but the medicine must be given in high doses, a study concludes.

Doctors at the National Tumor Institute in Milan, Italy, gained widespread attention four years ago when they reported that a combination of three drugs effectively prevents a new outbreak of disease in women treated for breast cancer.

In Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine, the team reports on a follow-up study on 901 women who underwent removal of cancerous breasts. In these patients, the disease had spread to the lymph nodes or beyond.

The team, headed by Dr. Gianni Bonadonna, compared the outcome of women who received full doses of three drugs — cyclophosphamide, methotrexate and fluorouracil — with women who took lower doses of the medicine or no drugs at all.

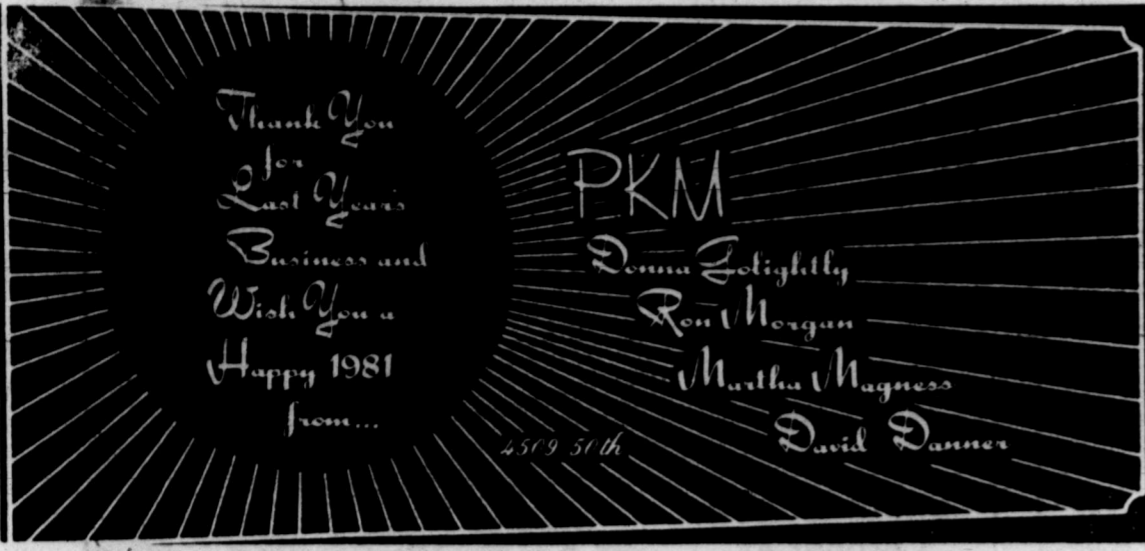
After five years, 77 percent of the women who received full doses of the medicine were still alive and disease-free. By comparison, only 45 percent of those who took no drugs were still free of cancer, as were 48 percent of those who took reduced doses.

Sometimes doctors give women less than full doses of the chemotherapy because of the toxicity of the drugs.

"Our findings indicate that it is necessary to administer combination chemotherapy at a full dose to achieve clinical benefit," the doctors wrote.

They also concluded that cancer victims who had gone through menopause had as good a chance as younger women of survival if they received full doses of the three drugs.

The American Cancer Society estimates that 111,000 new cases of breast cancer will be discovered in the United States in 1981, and 37,100 women will die from the disease.



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Pelicans Outstay Welcome

MA'AYAN ZVI, Israel (AP) — Thousands of migrating pelicans from the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe have changed their travel plans and are staying here to feast on Israeli fish.

But the birds that came to dinner have outstayed their welcome.

"It's beautiful to watch them, but who's paying the bill?" laments Yohanan Sadeh. He says the pelicans have gobbled up 40 tons of fish worth more than \$10,000 at ponds on his kibbutz.

The big, white birds with nine-foot wingspans are annual September visitors at Israel's fish farms as they migrate from Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union to Africa.

Usually they leave Israel by November. But this year, the unseasonably warm winter has tempted the pelicans to stay, to the delight of nature-lovers and passing motorists.

"Everybody is enjoying watching them, but nobody knows how to get rid of them," says Sadeh, whose 500 acres of ponds on the Mediterranean coast south of Haifa contain carp, mullet and the locally favored St. Peter's fish.

Sadeh has posted a 24-hour pelican patrol at the ponds. At the first sign of the birds, the "pelican spotter" fires a shotgun in the air to scare them off.

But the shotgun apparently doesn't ruffle many feathers. "We get the impression that they're pretty smart," said Sadeh. "It doesn't really help."

Yosi Eshbol, an ornithologist at the Nature Protection Society's camp at neighboring Ma'agan Michael, claims the fishermen don't always fire just to scare off the pelicans.

"Every time a fisherman sees the pelicans and gets excited he opens fire with a shotgun or even an automatic weapon, often wounding them," said Eshbol. "There are more reasonable ways to deal with them."

He suggests studying bird-dispersal methods used at airports, or running cables over the ponds to prevent the birds from landing.

Eshbol fears that unless a method is found to keep the pelicans out of the fish ponds, many will be killed.

"Every pelican shot is a great loss," said Eshbol. Unlike many birds that lay five or six eggs two or three times annually, "here we're talking about a bird that lays only one egg, and not even every year," he said.

"Their reproduction is very slow. If man puts obstacles in their way, it can be very dangerous."

Procrastinators Announce '80 Resolutions

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Procrastinators Club of America finally got around to making its 1980 New Year's resolutions Wednesday, canceling a camping trip to Mount St. Helens.

"I heard it's volcanic," said president Les Waas in letters to club members that announced other New Year's resolutions in living up to its name that it's never too late to look backward.

"We think it's time to congratulate the Philadelphia Phillies for winning the National League pennant in 1916, and time to learn to disco since it could be the biggest dance craze of the '70s."

Waas said the resolutions took years developing and don't come off the top of anybody's head.

"None of these resolutions are going to be difficult to fulfill, which is a benefit of procrastination," he said. "We're not up tight about it. We're sure we're doing the right thing."

Waas, named president in 1956 and still waiting for the 1957 elections to pick a successor, said he thinks the club has "over 3,000 members" but won't know for sure until the 1973 dues checks are deposited.

"This is the time when people normally look forward, when a new year arrives, but we find it more favorable to look the other way," Waas said, expressing pleasure over President-elect Ronald Reagan.

"Such a philosophy would do him a lot of good at his age," Waas said.

Then Waas thought about Christmas cards.

"Now is the perfect time to mail them. People notice cards that come after Christmas."

A New Year's eve party? "Well, maybe, in August or September, or even in 1985, when the new year shapes up and proves it is worth celebrating."

High Court Backs Voter Referendum

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that city councils have no choice about submitting to voters charter amendments initiated by petitions that comply with state and local requirements.

Its opinion explained why the court ordered the Victoria City Council on Dec. 17 to place a tax limitation proposal on the city's Jan. 17 charter amendment ballot.

The Victoria Political Action Committee had collected 1,300 signatures to put on the ballot a charter amendment limiting tax increases to 5 percent.

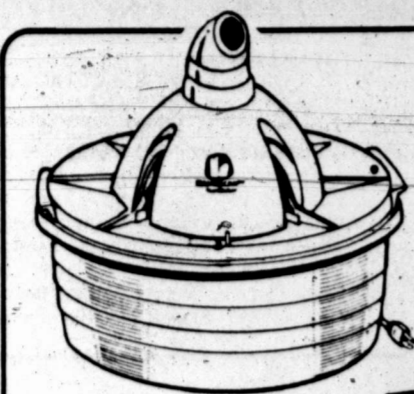
Even though the city secretary certified the petition was valid and had enough signatures, the city council voted Nov. 3 against placing the amendment on the ballot.

Coin Company Lays Off 74 Workers

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) — International Coins and Currency Inc., once Vermont's fastest-growing company, Wednesday laid off more than half its workers as part of austerity program aimed at recovering from unsuccessful marketing ventures.

Vice President Douglas Schneible said the layoffs for the 74 employees take effect Friday. He did not say whether they were temporary or permanent.

The action marks the second major layoff for International Coins, which sells stamps, coins and other collectibles worldwide. The company laid off about 55 workers three months ago when it began to lose money from failing business ventures.

Employees will be given one day's pay for every month they worked for International Coins, company officials said.

In the present shake-up, president and founder Stephen Hochschild will become chairman and Cornelius Hogan, the former director of daily operations, will succeed Hochschild as president.

Last year, the company grew by 400 percent, Hochschild said. "We enjoyed it and got overconfident."

Schneible said the company's financial troubles can be traced to its ventures into the marketing of new products. One product that did not succeed was a line of copies of Pablo Picasso paintings produced in France, Schneible said.

In August, the New York state attorney general's office was asked to investigate the possibility of misrepresentation in ads for the Picasso reproductions.

The investigation is still going on, according to spokesmen for the attorney general's office.

International Coins plans to auction off in New York about 200 pieces of a Chinese art collection it acquired, company officials said. The March auction will be conducted by Sotheby, Parke, Bernet of London and New York.

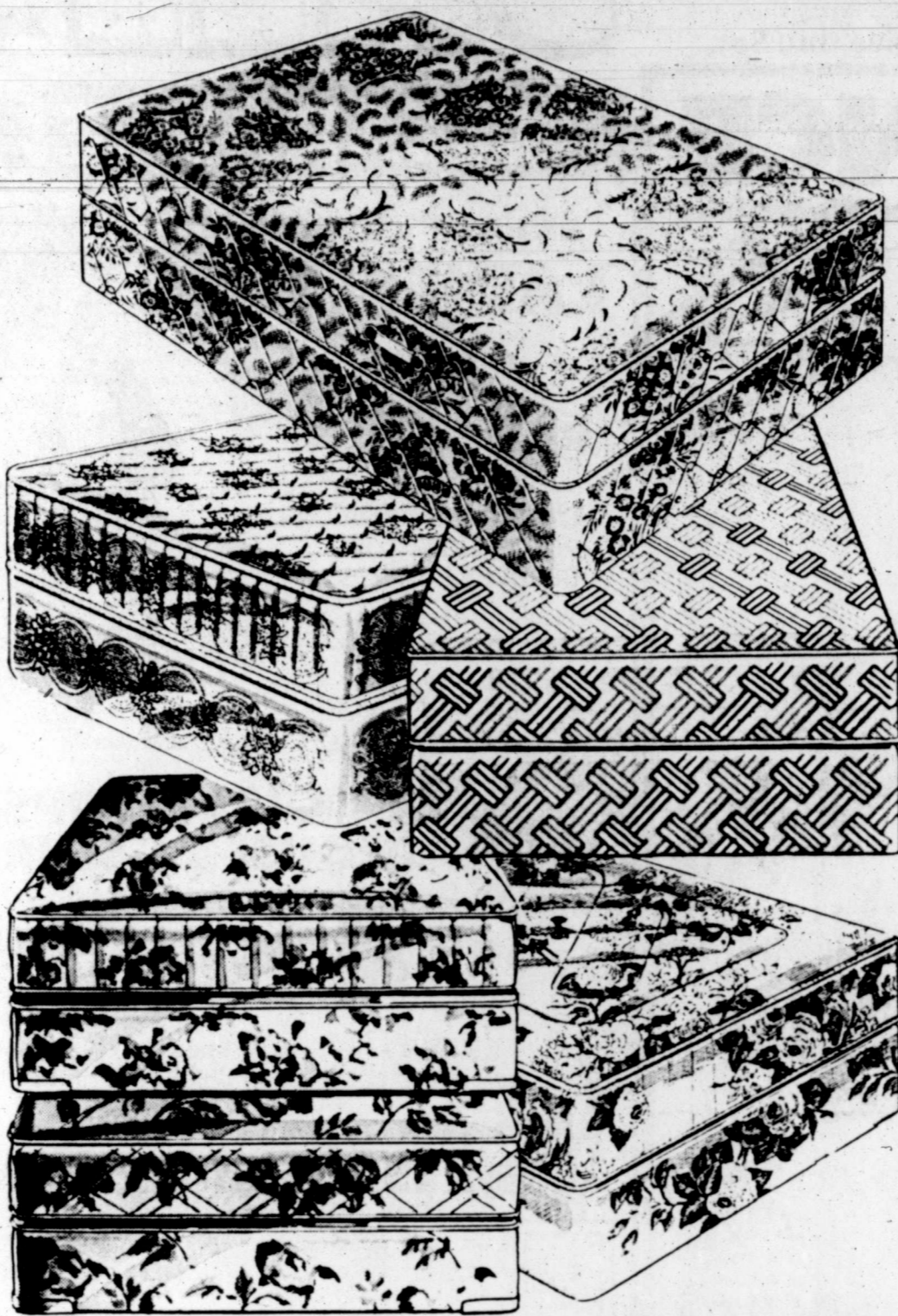

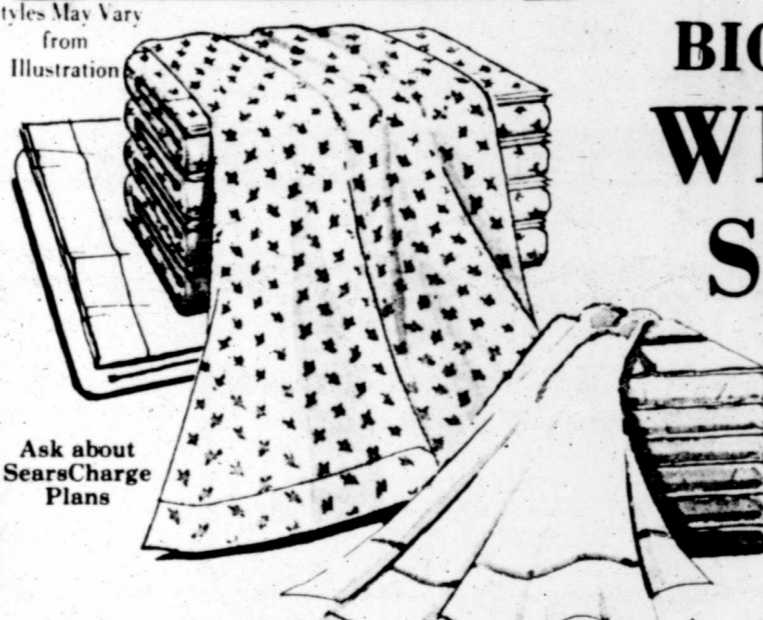

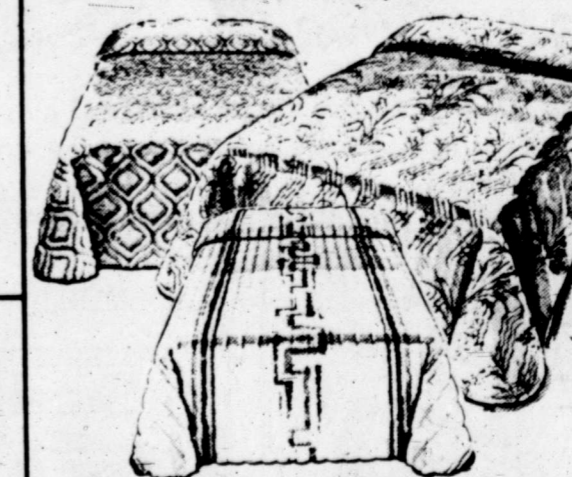

Unseasonable Sunshine To Welcome New Year

While the northern half of the nation is expected to experience a soggy New Year's Day, the southern half should have sunshine and continued springlike weather.

Temperatures near 60 are expected to accompany 1981's arrival to the South Plains, and today's fair skies should continue through Friday. Tonight's low reading is forecast near 30.

Although winds today should become northerly at 10 to 15 mph, an upper level ridge over the western United States should provide the region with weather similar to Wednesday's, when Lubbock recorded an afternoon high of 65.

Temperatures around the nation Wednesday ranged from one degree above zero at Massena, N.Y., to 87 degrees at Palm Springs, Calif.

And at Casper, Wyo., the mercury rose to 50 degrees Wednesday afternoon to tie that city's record for that date set in 1942.

However, snow is expected to spread from lower Michigan eastward to the northern half of the Atlantic coast today. Widely scattered rainshowers are expected along the north Pacific coast, with fog likely across northern Utah.

Snow fell over the Great Lakes and the Ohio Valley on Wednesday, and travelers advisories were issued as the storm was expected to move eastward toward Delaware.

Widely scattered light snow, drizzle and freezing drizzle were reported in the upper Mississippi Valley.

Skies were cloudy in many other areas, including parts of the northern Plains, the Atlantic Coast states and the country's midsection.

Temperatures were on the cold side with afternoon readings ranging from near zero to the teens in much of the Northeast. Temperatures were mild in the central Plains. A reading of 50 degrees at Casper, Wyo., tied the record there for the date.

In Alaska, a large low pressure system packing rain, snow and wind moved over the Bristol Bay area late Tuesday, sending previously frigid temperatures soaring.

In Fairbanks, where temperatures Sunday plummeted to 44 degrees below zero, highs in the 20s were expected Wednesday. Temperatures there climbed 25 degrees between midnight and 4 a.m. Wednesday. Temperatures at Anchorage soared into the 30s; temperatures there two weeks ago hovered at 25 below zero.

Valdez, on Prince William Sound in southcentral Alaska, got 27 inches of snow in 24 hours. Winds raging to 60 mph blasted the rugged Alaska Peninsula.

Temperature at 1 p.m. CST ranged from 1 degree at Massena, N.Y., to 87 at Palm Springs, Calif.

For today, snow is expected from Lower Michigan and the central Ohio Valley eastward through the northern half of the Atlantic Coast. In the West,

widely scattered showers were forecast along the northern Pacific Coast, with fog in various areas from Idaho to California.

Highs in the 20s and 30s were predicted from the northern Plains to the northern Atlantic Coast states, and in the 60s and 70s across southern California and most of the southern Plateau.

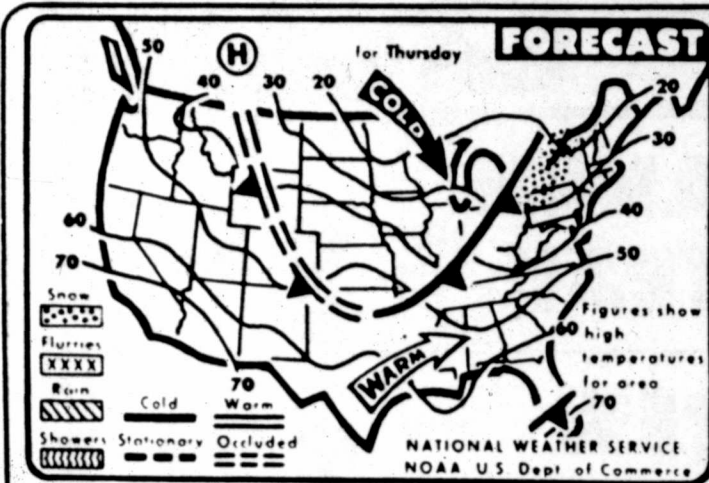

U.S. Military Sales Near Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration, which had proclaimed its intention to reduce arms sales, sold a near-record \$15.3 billion in military gear in its last full year in office.

This was disclosed in Pentagon figures covering arms sales to more than 70 countries in the 1980 fiscal year that ended Sept. 30. The \$15.3 billion was only about \$500 million short of the record set in 1975 during the administration of President Gerald Ford.

The crisis in the Persian Gulf and President Carter's efforts to arrange a permanent settlement between Egypt and Israel were apparently major factors in the arms sales turnaround.

Shortly after taking office in 1977, Carter announced a new policy and set of controls designed, he said, to curb the "virtually unrestrained spread of conventional weaponry."

Later, Defense Secretary Harold Brown told Congress that "in the future, the United States should take the initia-

tive in reducing arms sales."

In the first year under the new Carter policy, arms sales dropped to \$8.8 billion. But the total began climbing after that to more than \$11.7 billion in 1978 and to about \$13 billion in 1979.

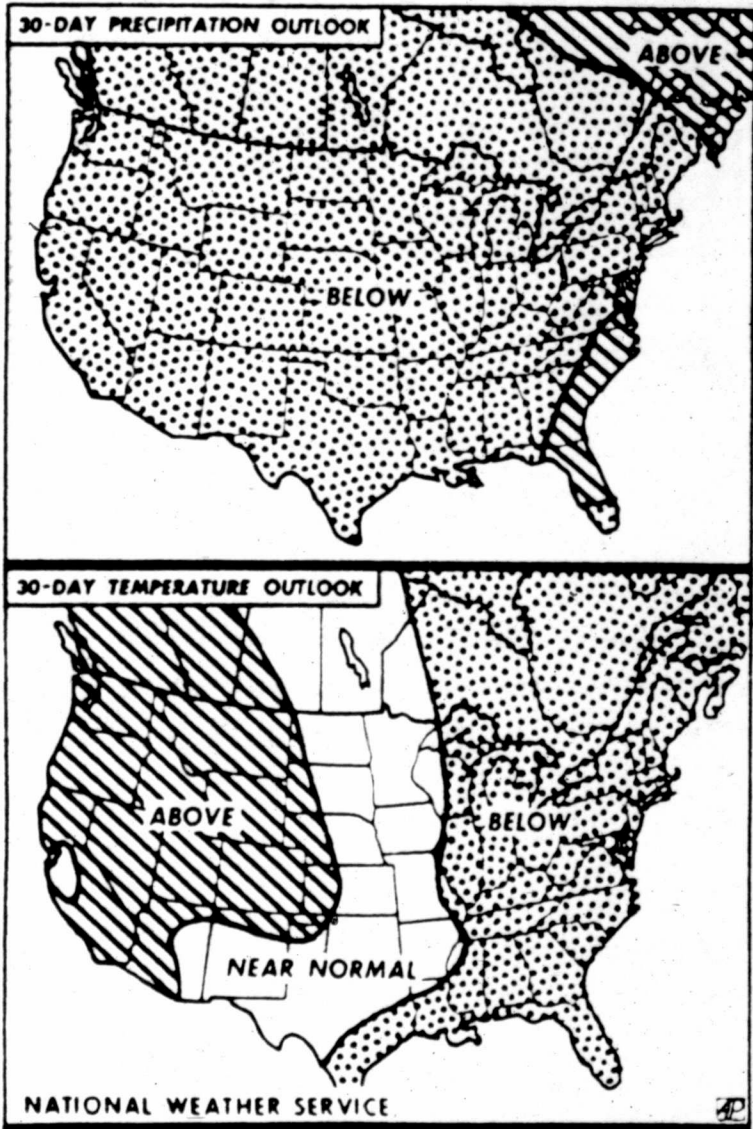
It was barely noticed at the time, but Carter left himself an out when he proclaimed his intention to limit arms sales. He reserved the right to grant exceptions in "extraordinary circumstances...or where I determine that countries friendly to the United States must depend on advanced weaponry to offset quantitative and other disadvantages in order to maintain a regional balance."

Events since 1977, including the loss of Iran as a U.S. ally, have led the United States to make special efforts to cement key friendships in the Middle East, particularly with Saudi Arabia and Egypt.

The effects of this are reflected in the arms sales statistics which show that the \$1.9 billion total for Saudi Arabia in 1977 was less than half the \$4.5 billion in U.S.

arms and equipment sold to Saudi Arabia, this country's biggest foreign oil supplier, in fiscal 1980.

Three years ago, Egypt bought only \$1.7 million in military equipment from the United States. In 1980, the total soared to \$2.4 billion as the United States undertook to modernize Egypt's armed forces, which officials said had deteriorated since Russia cut off supplies of spare parts and new equipment to the Cairo government. Until Moscow and Cairo split over the question of a Middle East peace, the Egyptian armed forces had been supplied and armed by the Russians for about 20 years.

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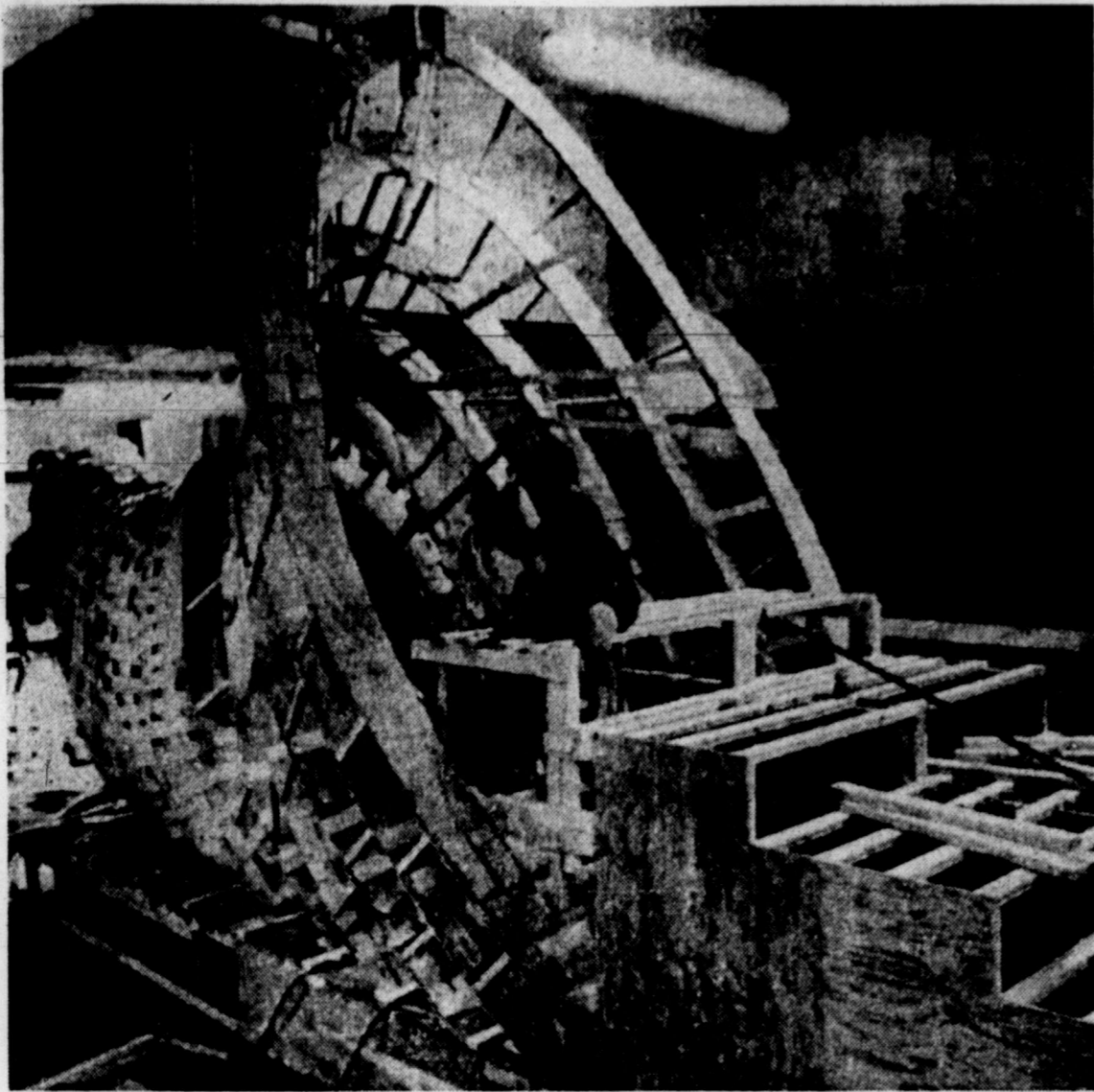

"You can count on him any time, day or night, and count on him to deliver top-quality work," Montford said.

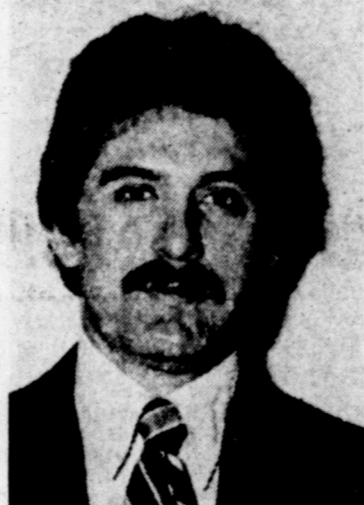
Holmes succeeds veteran law enforcement officer Lee Rice, who will remain on the staff as an investigator.

New West Blaze Mystery Solved; Probe Continues

As fire investigators and police continued their investigation Wednesday into the fire which destroyed the New West club, at least one of the mysteries surrounding the \$600,000 blaze was solved.

Larry Mancuso, supervisor of four nightclubs in Lubbock including New West, told authorities that he received an anonymous telephone call about 3 a.m. Tuesday from a woman informing him that the club was on fire.

Police discovered Wednesday that the switchboard operator of the Country Inn, 4105 19th St., placed the call to Mancuso, who was staying at the motel.

Det. Marshall Berry said the woman apparently was so excited upon seeing the blaze that she forgot identify herself to Mancuso.

Investigators had thought the anonymous woman caller was involved in the apparent burglary-arson incident.

The motel is located across the street from the 4138 19th St. club.

Registration For Draft Entering Final Stages

The last mass draft registration of American men currently scheduled will begin Monday for those born in 1962.

Mark Shapiro, with the Lubbock Draft Information Center, said the Selective Service is asking those born the first three months of 1962 to register at Post Offices on Monday, the second three months of the year on Tuesday, the third three months on Wednesday and the last three months on Thursday.

Following the week-long registration period, men who become 18 years old are expected to register a month before their eighteenth birthday to a month after, Shapiro said.

There is a decision pending before the U.S. Supreme Court on the constitutionality of draft registration because women are not required to register, but men who do not register could face criminal penalties, Shapiro said.

If the Supreme Court declares draft registration unconstitutional, men who have not registered could face up to five years in prison and a maximum \$10,000 fine.

However, if the court makes the opposite finding, those who failed to register have not violated any law, Shapiro said. The Supreme Court may rule on the case this summer, he said.

A second court case in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., means men who register for the draft currently do not have to give their Social Security numbers to the Selective Service, Shapiro said.

That court ruled requiring registrants to give their Social Security numbers violated a privacy law passed by Congress, he said.

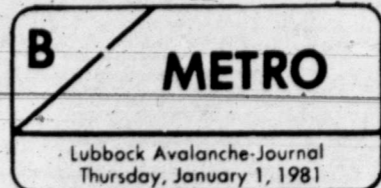
Shapiro said the Draft Information Center doesn't advocate men refusing to list their Social Security numbers, but said he wants them to be aware they have that option.

"Probably the reason they (the Selective Service) wanted Social Security numbers was to cross-check them against other lists to find out who didn't register," he said. "If someone doesn't want the government to cross-check," and feels the government has enough information on American citizens, "they can avoid it," Shapiro said.

Selective Service regulations proposed Dec. 3 would give registrants only 10 days after their induction notices are mailed to claim exemptions and deferments, Shapiro said.

If adopted, the regulations would mean no documentation on deferments or exemptions would be accepted until a man is ordered to report for induction. No men are now being drafted into the armed services apd. at the present time, there is no legislation in the works to restore the draft.

"It doesn't give you a whole lot of time to decide if you want to apply for deferments or exemptions," he said. "I



strongly suggest men plan in advance" if they plan to request deferments or exemptions.

There are three major categories — medical, hardship and conscientious objection — all of which require time to prepare documentation, he said. Shapiro added, the Draft Information Center will provide information on preparing for deferments or exemptions. The center's telephone number is 747-6865.

"The regulation proposing to give people so little time, I think will result in a situation like during the Vietnam War when the educated, people and people

with money were prepared and received deferments and the poor and lower educated were the ones who got drafted," he said.

Shapiro said Thursday is the final day to comment on the proposed regulations and urged persons to send their opinions to the Selective Service in Washington, D.C.

"As far as I know, no one has been prosecuted yet for not registering," Shapiro said, adding the Selective Service is "in the process of getting their lists together to find out who didn't register."

"The Selective Service System estimated 7 percent of those who were supposed to register didn't register," he said. "That's about 300,000 people so it's obvious they're not going to prosecute all who didn't register," he said.

"My feeling is, the people who are proud of not registering are the ones who will be prosecuted," Shapiro said.

Rumors Swirl In Probe Of Missing Helicopter

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — The mysterious disappearance of a pilot and three television news technicians on a helicopter in the Bahamas nearly two months ago is still surrounded by rumors, including an unconfirmed report that they were shot down.

"Any time you have anything like this disappearance, speculation runs rampant," Lt. Cmdr. David N. Russell of the Coast Guard's Miami intelligence unit said Tuesday.

Investigators said they have no solid leads to the Nov. 12 crash of a helicopter piloted by Boca Raton developer George Snow and carrying technicians from NBC and ABC News. The technicians had covered the forced evacuation of more than 100 marooned Haitians from the Bahamian island of Cayo Lobos.

"As of this week, we have nothing but a big fat zero," Russell said.

A report relayed to the Coast Guard from the Drug Enforcement Administration said that a confidential drug informant told investigators he was aboard a

marijuana-laden smuggling boat off Andros Island on the evening the news helicopter took off.

When the helicopter swooped near the boat, the smugglers opened fire and shot it down, the informant said.

But Navy Cmdr. James Smuda, a liaison officer in Nassau, said an investigation of the informants' by Bahamian authorities proved fruitless.

The official Coast Guard search, which covered land and water from just north of Cuba to St. Augustine, Fla., ended a month ago.

Snow's family and the networks said they will continue their own searches and investigations.

Evelyn Wythe, assistant U.S. consul in Nassau, said U.S. and Bahamian authorities have investigated several fruitless or unproven leads.

For instance, an unnamed source reported that he knew the crash site and where the victims' bodies were buried. But Bahamian authorities could find no graves or wreckage.

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Little Known About Role Of Appendix

 Dear Dr. Donohue: I had my appendix removed when I was 26 years old. What is the purpose of the appendix? Where exactly is it? I was told by a masseur that it releases oil that helps in elimination. Is this correct? How well does a person get along without an appendix? — A.A.

The appendix is a worm-like dead-end pouch at the juncture of the small and large intestines. If you place your hand on your right lower abdomen just inside the inner side of the hip bone you feel approximately where it is.

Beyond this anatomy and the fact that inflammation of it can be dangerous, we know little about the structure. It has traditionally been considered a vestigial organ, meaning that at one time it had a function, but that now it is obsolete.

Newer thinking assigns the appendix some undefined role in early life. We know that lymph glands begin to appear in the appendix a couple of weeks after birth. They seem to have lost whatever function they may have had by age 30. The appendix may, like the tonsils, perform some immunity role. I have no information about it having to do with digestion or elimination in humans. You can get along fine without an appendix. So far as I know, no problems arise from its removal. A burst appendix presents a threat, that of release of foreign material into the abdominal cavity. When discussing the appendix, I would be remiss not to warn against use of laxatives in the presence of undiagnosed abdominal pain. They should not be used until the cause of such pain is diagnosed or appendicitis ruled out.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My wife was diagnosed as having hyperthyroidism. She is under medication. She has refused to have sex with me. She believes it can be fatal. Is this true? Also, what are the symptoms of thyroid crisis? I hope you will answer real soon. Our marriage may very well hang on your answer. — F.H.

If your wife's doctor is convinced that her hyperthyroidism (overactive thyroid gland) is under control with the medicines, and if he has not forbidden it there is no reason for her to fear having sex. A thyroid crisis, or "medical storm" as it is called, can be a very dramatic event. It occurs most often today in persons who have untreated hyperthyroidism. Features include extreme irritability, delirium, coma, high fever (106 or higher), heart irregularity, vomiting and diarrhea.

Before we had thyroid control drugs this was a threat in the post-thyroid surgery period. I suspect that a brief chat between you, your wife and her physician would save your marriage. The booklet, "Your Thyroid: How It Works for You," might be helpful. For a copy, write to Dr. Donohue, P.O. Box 11210, Chicago, Ill. 60611, enclosing a stamped, self-addressed envelope and 50 cents.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My husband will have an infected salivary gland operated on because of a stone in it. His face and inner mouth were puffed and red, but antibiotics helped that. We have never heard of this condition. My husband has always eaten apples every day. Could that have caused his stone? — A.H.

His apple-eating didn't cause the stone. The presence of the stone set up the condition for inflammation by blocking the gland's duct. Eating any acid food (apples are an example) increases salivation. The greater salivation aggravates the situation in the blocked duct.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have been having irregular heart beats. I think I am getting concerned. When they occur I can feel a twitching in my chest, just below my throat, right in the middle. When I put my finger on my neck artery I can de-

tect extra beats in my pulse. It usually lasts a brief time, then goes back to normal. The pulse gets fast at these times. I have no other symptoms. I know you have called this paroxysmal atrial tachycardia and said it can occur in a healthy heart. How does one find out for sure? — A.R.

This does sound like paroxysmal atrial tachycardia. This is a transient rapid speeding up of the heart beat. More often than not the heart is healthy and no cause for the acceleration can be found. The EKG is normal between attacks. The way to make the diagnosis is to have an EKG taken during an attack. This is accomplished by wearing a portable device that records the EKG for longer periods — 24 hours or more, or until an episode occurs.

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Merger Plans Suspected In Braniff Chairman's Resignation

DALLAS (AP) — The resignation of Braniff International Inc.'s long-time chairman and chief executive officer, Harding Lawrence, led to speculation Wednesday among analysts that merger discussions between the Texas-based airline and Eastern Airlines Inc. led to Lawrence's departure.

Lawrence, 60, had served as Braniff's chief executive for more than 15 years. He announced Tuesday that he was retiring, effective Jan. 1, in a move that did not surprise most airline analysts, who have seen the financial health of the nation's eighth largest carrier decline over the last two years.

Braniff's financial problems were underscored Wednesday when Standard & Poor's Corp., a major bond rating service, reduced its rating of the company's senior debt to "B" from "BB." Debt with lower standing was cut from "B" to "CCC." All the ratings indicate speculative investments, but the lower ratings indicate S&P believes the risk has increased.

S&P said the reductions reflect "substantial losses incurred by Braniff over the past two years related to overexpansion after deregulation of the airline industry, as well as the recessionary environment."

Lawrence, in a long statement, said he was retiring to spend more time with his family. Braniff spokesman Jere Cox denied there was any pressure for Lawrence's resignation from directors or creditors.

But one analyst, Sim Trotter, a vice president at the securities firm of Rauscher Pierce Refsnes Inc. in Dallas, said "There is not much question that he was forced into it."

Braniff and Eastern, one of the nation's largest airlines, disclosed preliminary merger talks Dec. 15. There has been no change in the status of those talks over the last two weeks.

Braniff said it expects to announce Lawrence's replacement at the company's Jan. 7 board meeting.

"It was something Lawrence has been considering for the past couple of years," said Cox. Lawrence was not available for

comment, having left his office for what was described as an extended vacation trip.

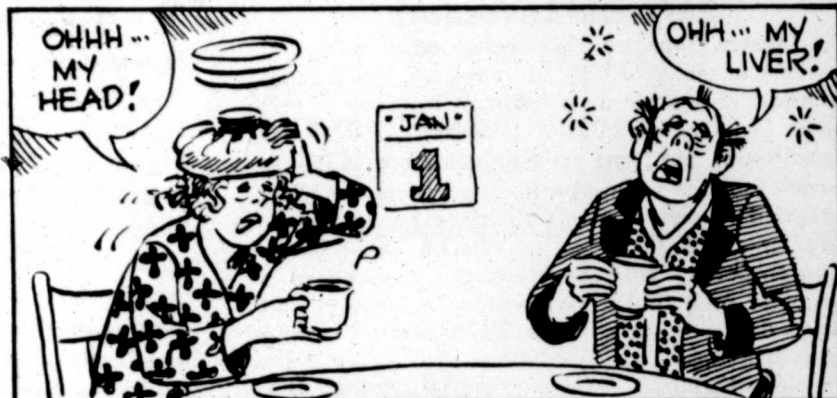

Police Enlist Psychic's Aid In Search For Child

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Detectives turned to a psychic Wednesday to aid in the search for 6-year-old Avery "Peaches" Shorts, missing since Friday when she was sent on an errand from her home in a housing project.

Knox County Sheriff Joe Jenkins also planned to lead up to 200 deputies, reserves and rescue workers on a New Year's Day search of the ridges and ravines that surround the Montgomery Village project.

"Personally I don't believe in it," Knoxville police chief Bob Marshall said as psychic Bobby Drinnon joined a

search of the village. "But a lot of people do, though. Maybe he'll make a believer out of me. We want to find the little girl."

More than 100 police officers and volunteers used dogs and helicopters to scour the isolated, sprawling project and its surrounding hills last weekend but were unable to find any trace of the girl.

Marshall then assigned four detectives and unlimited resources to the case. They undertook an endless series of interviews — using lie detector tests at times — but came up empty.

"This is just another effort we want to exhaust," Charles Evatt, chief of detectives, said. "We don't want to leave any stone unturned. We're checking out all leads, no matter how small."

Evatt said it was the first time detectives used Drinnon, who volunteered his time after they approached him at his office in Morristown, about 40 miles northeast of Knoxville.

Meanwhile, District Attorney General Ronald A. Webster asked Gov. Lamar Alexander to offer a \$5,000 reward to find people responsible for kidnapping the girl. Alexander did not respond to the request immediately.

Housing project officials repeated their offer of a free apartment for a police officer willing to live in the project and patrol the area, plagued by numerous burglaries and other minor crimes.

Smoke Detector Law Strengthened

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The City Council adopted a new, tougher smoke detector law Tuesday that is expected to affect some 180,000 dwellings.

Smoke detectors are now required only in new single-family homes, and apartment buildings and hotels of combustible construction at least four stories high.

The new law requires smoke detectors in all single-family homes upon change of ownership and in all duplexes, apartment buildings, boarding homes and hotels made of combustible materials.

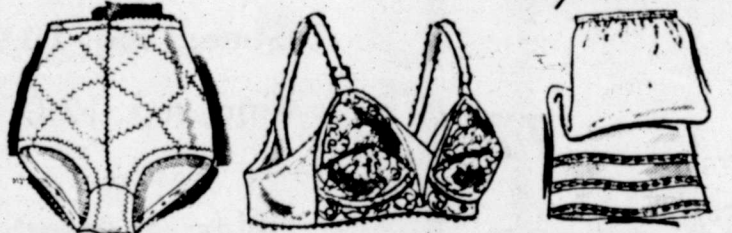

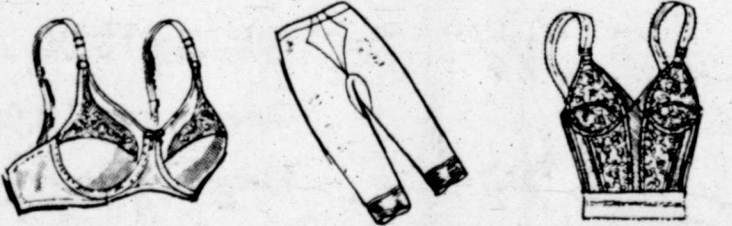

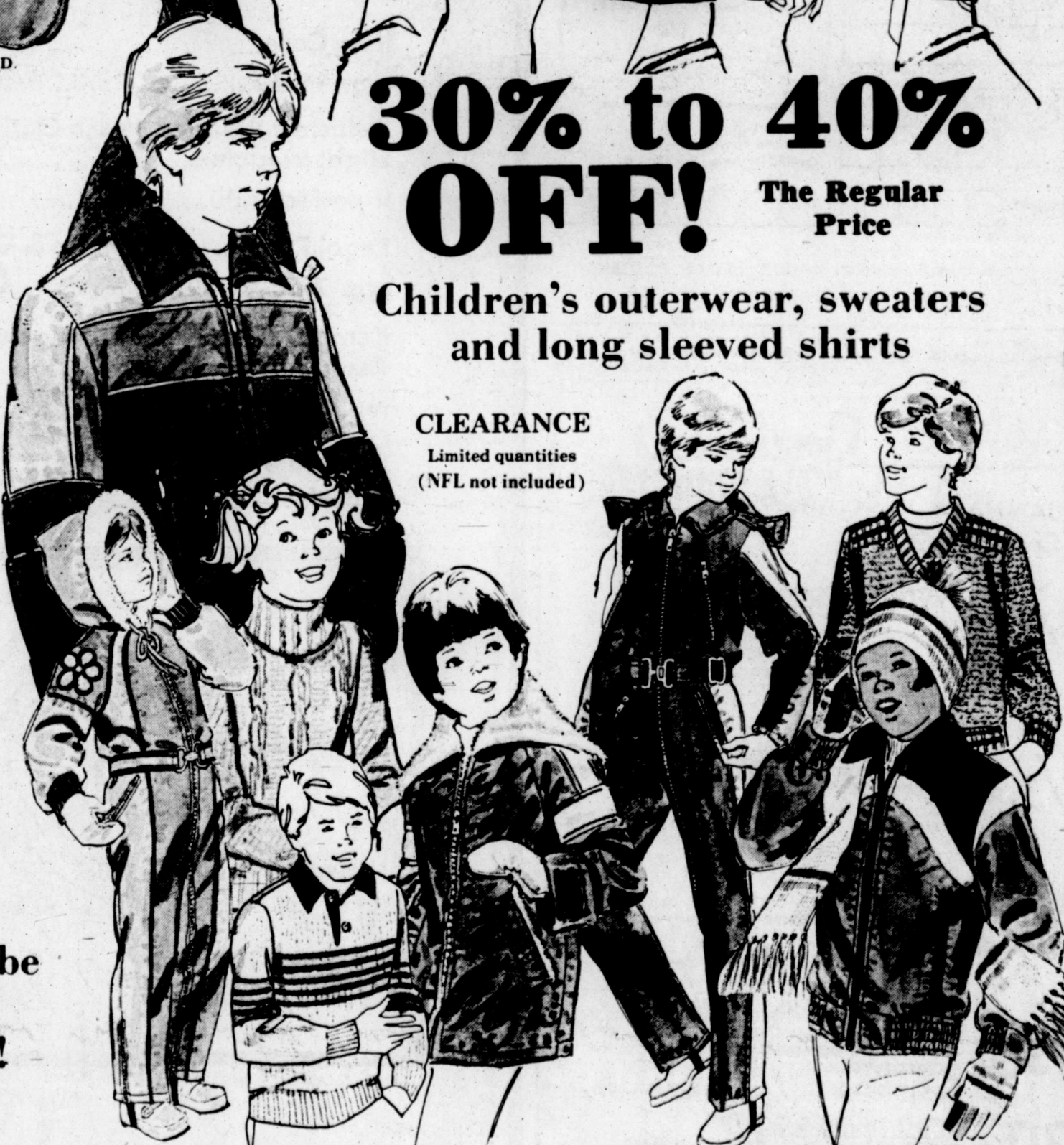

Tavern Owner Becomes Governor Of Connecticut

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — William A. O'Neill, a 50-year-old tavern owner, became Connecticut's 84th governor Wednesday during a somber ceremony at the state Capitol, six blocks from a hospital where Ella Grasso is battling the cancer that forced her to resign the office.

O'Neill had served as lieutenant governor since Mrs. Grasso's election to a second term in 1978. His political and economic base is a restaurant-bar called O'Neill's Taproom in East Hampton.

O'Neill's old job of lieutenant governor went to state Senate President Pro Tempore Joseph J. Fauliso.

Following a 10-minute ceremony, O'Neill and Fauliso praised Mrs. Grasso and vowed to emulate her "high standard of public service."

O'Neill asked everyone to "pray for the recovery of our great governor," and said he would "do my utmost to humbly guide this state in the manner that Ella Grasso would have if she had been able to continue."

Prior to the ceremony in the Capitol's Hall of Flags, an O'Neill aide released a letter Mrs. Grasso had written to O'Neill.

It said, in part, "Your many years of positive and productive service to the people of Connecticut have provided you with the kind of skills and experience that will assure your success as governor." State Democratic Party Chairman James Fitzgerald said Gov. Grasso will be a "hard act to follow." But he insisted O'Neill is "not a bartender. He's not walking into the governorship pulling off his apron."

Mrs. Grasso, 61, announced Dec. 4 that she would resign "at the close of business" on Dec. 31 because of her health. She said she no longer had the stamina to continue and would step down midway through her second term.

She was listed in guarded condition Wednesday morning in Hartford Hospital, where she's being treated for intestinal and liver cancer.

In sharp contrast to the usual pomp accompanying the swearing-in of a new governor, O'Neill asked for a brief ceremony in the Capitol's Hall of Flags.

Invitations were sent only to members of the immediate families of O'Neill and Fauliso.

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — A man, who lay dying in the driveway of a home for more than 10 hours was ignored by the homeowner who thought he was a drunken neighbor, authorities say.

John Jacob Golko, 58, died Monday night, 12 hours after he was found by garbage men picking up trash.

Police at first thought Golko had been assaulted but later said he had died of exposure. The officers said they did not

know if Golko was intoxicated, but speculated he stumbled and fell. The weather was relatively mild, in the 40s.

"We've closed the case," said an Olympia detective.

Police gave this account of the incident:

A dog at the house barked until 1 or 2 a.m., but his owner didn't check to see what the commotion was about. A neighbor told police she arrived home at midnight and saw what she thought was a black and red coat in the driveway.

Golko was wearing such a coat.

When the homeowner carried out his garbage the following morning, he noticed the man lying in his driveway, but later told police he thought it was a drunk neighbor. He went back inside.

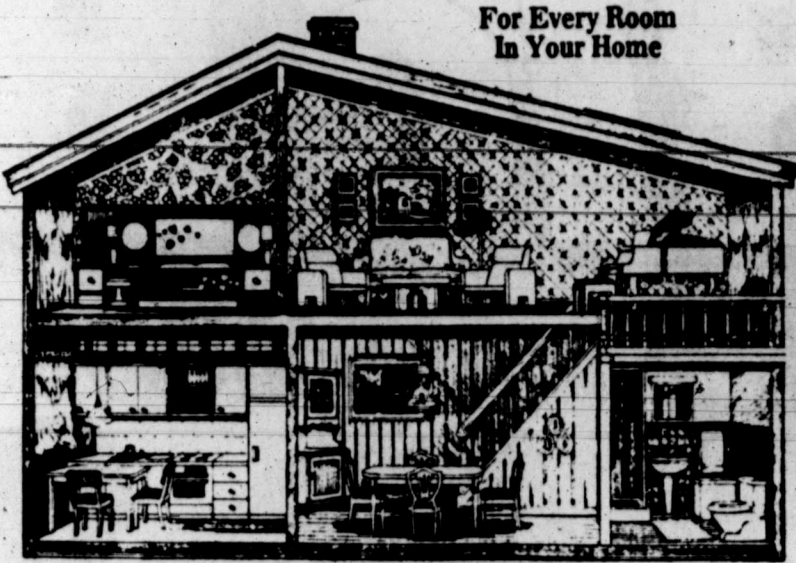

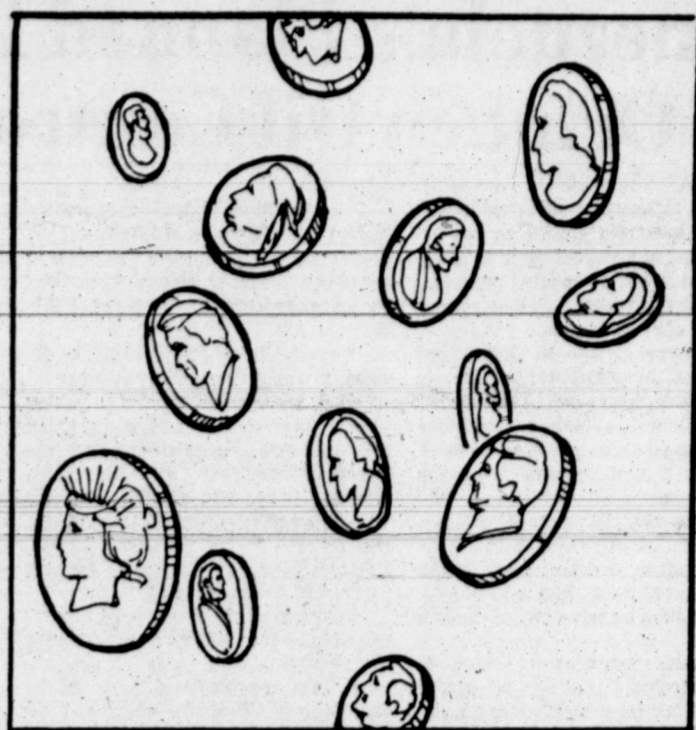

KIDS-ONLY CLUB New Year Time For New Hobby

By SHARI LEWIS
The new year is as good an excuse as any for exploring a new hobby. Have you ever thought of becoming a numismatist? (That's what you'll turn into if you start collecting money as a hobby.)

Young people sometimes begin by specializing in one or two American coins (say, pennies and nickels). Next, they branch out to other United States coins or paper money, foreign money or ancient coins.

If you want a real challenge, you could look for errors — coins or bills with mistakes on them (ones that were incorrectly stamped, struck twice, that are blank on one side, or that have a goof in their design).

Here's how to start: Check the change in your pocket every day. Make arrangements with your parents and friends to check their change too. Look at the design, date, mint mark and silver content on the coins. In the past, many countries used pure silver in their coins. U.S. dimes, quarters and half dollars were silver until 1964. Then they became 'sandwich' coins, made up of layers of various metals. The dime and quarter sandwiches had no silver in 'em at all. The half-dollar sandwiches had some silver from 1965 to 1969. Now there is no silver in any U.S. coins. That's why the date on a coin can tell you a lot more than just when it was made.

Here are some hot tips on things to look for: Civil War coins (called copperheads). United States bills of \$1, \$5

and \$20 with the word 'Hawaii' printed on the back. (These 'Hawaiian' notes were used there during World War II.) And for a good investment, keep your eyes open for certain African and South American coins. Some of these countries mint so few that the coins will probably increase in value. Look in coin guidebooks or ask at your local coin store for the names of specific countries that have coins worth collecting.

Economy Move Axes Job Of Police Pup

WESTPORT, Mass. (AP) — Blitz the canine cop is out of a job, the victim of a state measure to cut taxes.

Since last July, when he joined the town's police force, Blitz has tracked criminals, held back unruly crowds and found lost youngsters in the woods.

But the town selectmen have decided that Blitz must turn in his badge and his harness. It was money, not his performance, that spelled his undoing.

In November, voters in Massachusetts approved Proposition 2 1/2, a measure designed to cut property taxes. And the police department faces a \$46,000 budget cut to stay within the new guidelines.

Blitz was costing the town about \$750 each year for food, vaccinations and quarters. His boss, Police Chief Rene Dupre, said the cost "is peanuts."

"I hate to lose him, but it helps me save a job. I would rather have a man than a dog," he said. "The only place I can cut is services. We can stop replacing cruisers, leave vacancies unfilled and fire

the dog."

Blitz's handler-owner, officer Charlie Bouchard, said the dog, which used to ride in the back of his remodeled squad car, will now spend more time with his children.

Families In Texas To Get Assistance

AUSTIN (AP) — About 600,000 Texas families will get help from the federal government this winter in paying home heating bills.

Acting Commissioner Marlin Johnston of the Department of Human Resources said Wednesday Texas will receive \$33.8 million under the Home Energy Assistance Program that was established by the recent Congress.

The payments to low-income households will begin in January and continue through March.

Museum Retains Flavor Of Lawless Frontier Deadwood

DEADWOOD, S.D. (Special) — W.E. Adams loved the Black Hills. He loved it so much that he felt he should contribute something to let future generations know what the area represented, and who had lived there. So Adams made a significant endowment, the Adams Museum in Deadwood, which marked 50 years of operation last year.

The Adams Museum is a family attraction. It's free, though donations are appreciated. If you're in the historic city of Deadwood, you can get a real sense of the gutsy frontier town through a visit to the Adams museum.

Sometimes it seems that Adams' ghost is there today, pulling youngsters toward exhibits he knows will help bring back Deadwood's lively past. And hundreds of displays highlight the western history of the once notorious city. You can dream of the life of Ned Love, the black cowboy who later was known as the first Deadwood Dick. Or if you listen closely, you might hear the sudden gunshot that left Wild Bill Hickok lying face down and dead at a poker table in the Number 10 Saloon. The famous Dead Man's Hand, black aces and eights and a red jack, is scattered beside him.

The Chinese of Deadwood's Chinatown... Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane memorabilia... original Indian beadwork... the old steam engine which helped haul millions of dollars in gold from the still prosperous Homestake Mine.

PHILADELPHIA (Special) — January 17th will mark the 275th birthday of Benjamin Franklin, and there's just one place to rediscover his many contributions to America — Philadelphia.

Franklin arrived in Philadelphia in 1723, 17 years old and penniless. He later became a printer, author, statesman, inventor and shaper of the American Revolution. He imparted his wit and wisdom, creativity and genius to his adopted city — the "City of Brotherly Love," which continues to revere him today.

Just glance at a city map of Philadelphia if you need proof of the city's esteem for Franklin. The Benjamin Franklin Parkway, Franklin Square, Franklin Field and the Benjamin Franklin Bridge are all tributes to this remarkable man.

Many of the places he lived, worked, worshipped and entertained still remain and are seen by millions of visitors each year.

The first stop is Franklin Court in the heart of Independence National Historical Park, "America's most historic square mile." A gleaming metal skeleton, located near Third Street between Market and Chestnut, marks the outline of a house he built to his specifications while he served as a diplomat in France. A row of homes which he once owned fronting Market Street has been restored and now houses the B. Free Franklin Post Office (the only functioning post office in the country open seven days a week) and the Aurora print shop.

Underground is an exhibit offering a glimpse into Franklin's life and times, entitled "Franklin — Man of Unlimited Dimension." A passage way of mirrors and neon lights lead the way to a multimedia journey into the 18th century. A bank of telephones enables visitors to "direct dial" many of Franklin's con-

poraries, like Jefferson and Adams, for their comments on this man of endless talents and energy.

A diorama of fixed marionettes depicts scenes from Franklin's life with revolving stages showing his role in many key historical events. Computer terminals flash his thoughts on a variety of subjects from marriage to his suggestion of the wild turkey as the nation's symbol. All buildings in Franklin Court and throughout Independence National Historical Park are open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Just a few blocks away is one of America's most treasured buildings, one in which Franklin spent many hours during the hot summer of 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was written and signed, Independence Hall. Franklin was no stranger to those halls. He had served as a member and clerk of the Pennsylvania Assembly and president of the Supreme Executive Council of Pennsylvania. He later worked there as a member of the Constitutional Convention.

Franklin left his mark on many of the surrounding buildings as well. He was founder of the American Philosophical Society, whose library still stands at Fifth and Chestnut Streets. The Library Company of Philadelphia, the first circulating library in America and another

Franklin "first," rented the second floor of Carpenter's Hall.

Franklin worshipped at Christ Church on Second Street, and he and his wife, Deborah, are buried in the Christ Church Graveyard at Fifth and Arch Streets.

One of Philadelphia's most popular tourist stops, Elfreth's Alley, the oldest continuously occupied residential street in the United States, is also linked to Franklin. He supposedly lived along this quaint street, near Christ Church, as a tenant in 1728.

Franklin is fittingly memorialized at one of the nation's leading science museums, the Franklin Institute. Entering the foyer, a 30-foot marble statue of Franklin sits majestically beneath an 82-foot octagonal dome. This is the only officially recognized memorial to an American leader outside Washington, D.C., and not government owned. (Although there is an entrance fee to the museum, the Franklin Memorial is free.) Surrounding the statue is the largest collection of "Frankliniana" in the world, including many of his inventions.

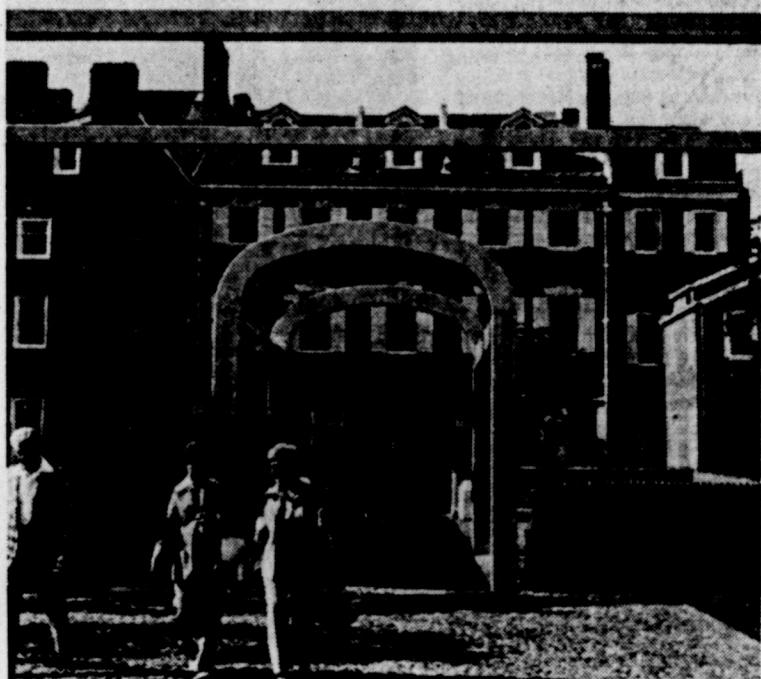
Tributes to Franklin can be found throughout this city which he helped to

mold. A bust, at Fourth and Arch Streets, was made of 80,000 pennies collected by Philadelphia school children. A statue of Franklin as a young man stands on the University of Pennsylvania campus at 34th and Walnut Streets.

Philadelphia owes Franklin a tremendous debt of gratitude and repays him by preserving many of the sites he knew so well for future generations to explore. His 275th birthday year is a good time to see his legacy — Philadelphia.

Northern Wales Found Irresistible Land Of Majestic Castles, Mountains

If you like mountains and castles, you can't help but love Northern Wales. If you add in folk festivals, lovely gardens, historic houses, the sea, and little puff-billy steam railroads, it becomes irresistible.

And everywhere, you hear the local people talking in their musical, almost poetic speech (it's no accident that poets are the most honored artists in Wales).

Little steam trains puff up from Portmadoc to Ffestiniog, along Lake Tala and from Aberystwyth to the Vale of Rheidol. There are great castles of the middle ages at Harlech, Caernarvon, Conway, and Beaumaris. The Prince of Wales is proclaimed at Caernarvon because of a legend that Edward I proclaimed his baby son Prince of Wales there to satisfy the Welsh who demanded a ruler who didn't speak any English.

At Bodnant are the 87 acre gardens built on a tree bedecked slope which make one of the most beautiful views in Britain. Back of them the hills lead on up into the mountains via the Vale of Conway.

If you take the train to Ffestiniog, you can visit the monuments of an almost dead industry — the slate caverns, of the Llechwedd Slate Caverns and the Gloddfa Ganol Mountain Center. At Llechwedd, the steepest passenger incline railway in Britain has just been opened, allowing access to a completely new section of the vast underground chambers and mine workings.

Snowdonia, the mountain range about Mount Snowdon, is the major natural feature of north Wales. A rack and pinion railway to the top is the most exciting

railway trip in Britain. At the foot of the mountain, on the coast of Penrhyneddraeth, is Portmeirion, one of the world's most curious coastal resorts, a luxury hotel built in the form of a village by an architect who loved arches, vistas and bell-towers. It's enchanting. And in the mountains you can go touring by a pony, or you can fish, climb, walk, or canoe.

At Ruthin, with its castle and nightly medieval banquet, on Wednesdays the

townfolk dress in medieval costume to give visitors a glimpse of the past.

Llangollen, a town by the banks of the River Dee, is host every year to the International Eisteddfodd, at which 15,000 spectators gather to watch folk dancers and singers from 26 countries spin, sing and do their national dances in a setting of pure loveliness.

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Unexplained Explosion Kills Five In Kenya Hotel

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — A fiery explosion, possibly from a bomb dropped by a small plane, tore through the famed Norfolk Hotel Wednesday night, and police said at least five people were killed and 85 injured.

The blast, centered in the kitchen and dining area, occurred as New Year's Eve party-goers crowded the renowned hostelry where British aristocrats and big-

game hunters have stayed for almost 80 years.

Western tourists were reported among the casualties, but it could not be determined immediately if any were Americans. Officials said a list of the dead and injured would be released Thursday.

Police Commissioner Ben Gethi told reporters "it is too early to tell" what

caused the explosion. There have been no recent acts of terrorism in Kenya and Gethi said he did not know what the motive for a bombing might be.

Kenyan President Daniel Arap Moi said on national radio, "I regret to inform you that a bomb — who knows whether it was a bomb or something else — exploded in the hotel. He spoke in his customary New Year's Eve broad-

er that there was an explosion." Hotel waiter Benjamin Maina told a reporter, "The blast came from overhead."

Gethi said two children were missing in addition to the dead and injured admitted to Nairobi hospitals. The hospitals broadcast an appeal for emergency blood donations. Nairobi Hospital surgeon Dr. Andrew Hicks said many of the victims were seriously injured.

The explosion at about 8:40 p.m. heavily damaged the kitchen, coffee lounge and dining areas as tables were filling with holiday diners.

Witnesses said taxis parked in front of the hotel were blown across the street, and debris was scattered over a wide area. In the resulting fire, flames shot 40 feet in the air.

"We were several miles away and we heard the explosion," said John Harris, 40, of Shreveport, La., a Pentecostal missionary in Kenya.

"We rushed to the scene and saw a cook stagger out from the wreckage, bleeding. He said some of his friends had been killed."

City firefighting equipment took 15 minutes to arrive and then, witnesses said, a shortage of water hampered firemen's efforts.

Most of the hotel is built in a two-story-high quadrangle around a lawn, and a large part of the structure was destroyed. Cottages and other buildings containing guest rooms are nearby.

The stick-and-stone hotel opened Christmas Day 1904 and is one of central Nairobi's best-known landmarks.

Over the years it housed aristocrats and settler-farmers as Britain developed its east African colonies. At one time, hunters chased lions in a swamp in front of the hotel, and President Theodore Roosevelt began a big-game safari from the hotel's steps.

Immigrant Abraham Block bought the hotel in 1927, and his two sons currently operate it.

Fugitive Financier Vesco Reportedly Flees Nassau

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) — Fugitive financier Robert Vesco reportedly has fled his home here, two days after he broke a two-year silence to appeal for political asylum here, a Bahamian government spokesman said Wednesday.

Ken Hienrich of the Miami office of the Bahamas News Bureau said immigration officers went to Vesco's ocean-side Nassau home Wednesday afternoon to serve him with an order that he leave the island in 14 days.

"The serving officers were told that Vesco and his family had left Nassau Tuesday," Hienrich said. "We don't know where he is."

Hienrich said Ulysses Brown, the captain of Vesco's boat, The Patricia, said he did not know where Vesco was headed nor whether he intended to return.

Brown also said he did not know how Vesco left the island.

"The boat is still docked at his home," Hienrich said. "I'm just not sure where he went. Who knows?"

The spokesman said an immigration officer from the Bahamas Ministry of Home Affairs and the assistant commissioner of police, Paul Thompson, had gone to Vesco's home, an oceanfront residence called the Meleme and owned by George Mosko, a Greek businessman.

Vesco, 45, has been wanted by U.S. authorities since 1974 on charges he plundered \$224 million from an international investment firm. He had been living in the Bahamas since 1978.

The government contends Vesco looted Investors Overseas Services of \$224 million while he was head of the compa-

ny and that he tried to have charges in that case dropped by contributing \$200,000 in 1972 to Richard Nixon's presidential re-election campaign.

Vesco later fled the United States for Costa Rica, where he lived from 1974 to 1978 before the government of that country made it clear he was no longer welcome.

He came to Nassau on a short-term

residency permit granted in connection with the liquidation order against Bahamas Commonwealth Bank, which he formed during a 1973 trip to the island nation.

On Nov. 11, Bahamian officials without explanation gave Vesco 30 days to leave the island, although he was later granted a "brief extension" of that order until Dec. 31.

On Monday, Vesco issued a public appeal for political asylum in the Bahamas.

He asked for "recognition and a declaration that I am a person entitled to political asylum under the accepted doctrines of international law and treaties," he said in a letter to Bahamian Home Affairs Secretary Clement Maynard.

He asked that his request be handled "as a matter of urgency."

Masquerading Terrorists Kill Italian General

ROME (AP) — Two terrorists masquerading as delivery boys shot and killed a general in the Carabinieri paramilitary police as he and his wife returned home from a New Year's Eve Mass, police reported.

An obscure group called the Communist Fighting Unit asserted responsibility for the assassination of Enrico Calvaligi, deputy commander of the Carabinieri anti-terrorism force in northern Italy.

Calvaligi, 61, also was in charge of security in the maximum security prisons where convicted and suspected terrorists are held. He was the first general and the highest-ranking uniformed official killed by left-wing extremists in years of bloody hit-and-run attacks.

A female caller who telephoned the Italian news agency ANSA indicated the attack was reprisal for Monday's police storming of a convict-held maximum security prison in Trani. About 70 inmates had seized 18 guards as hostages and in the assault four prisoners and 23 hostages and police were injured.

Government sources said Calvaligi worked closely with judge Giovanni D'Urso, a top official in the national prison system who was kidnapped Dec. 12 by the leftist Red Brigades — the same group that kidnapped and killed former Premier Aldo Moro in 1978. The Red Brigades have not set specific conditions for D'Urso's life, but have demanded the closing of some of Italy's penitentiaries.

Police said Calvaligi was shot by two gunmen in the front yard of his apartment building near Piazza dei Navigatori in southern Rome.

Investigators gave this account:

The gunmen, in their late teens, rang the bell to the general's apartment, announcing through an intercom they had a package for Calvaligi. After being told the general was not home, they opened the outside gate of the apartment building and waited in the passageway leading to the front door of the building.

Five minutes later, Calvaligi and his wife got out of their car and entered the passageway where one of the terrorists presented him with a gift-wrapped basket containing eight bottles of wine. As the general handed a tip to one of the youths, the other drew a pistol and shot Calvaligi three times in the head and chest, killing him instantly.

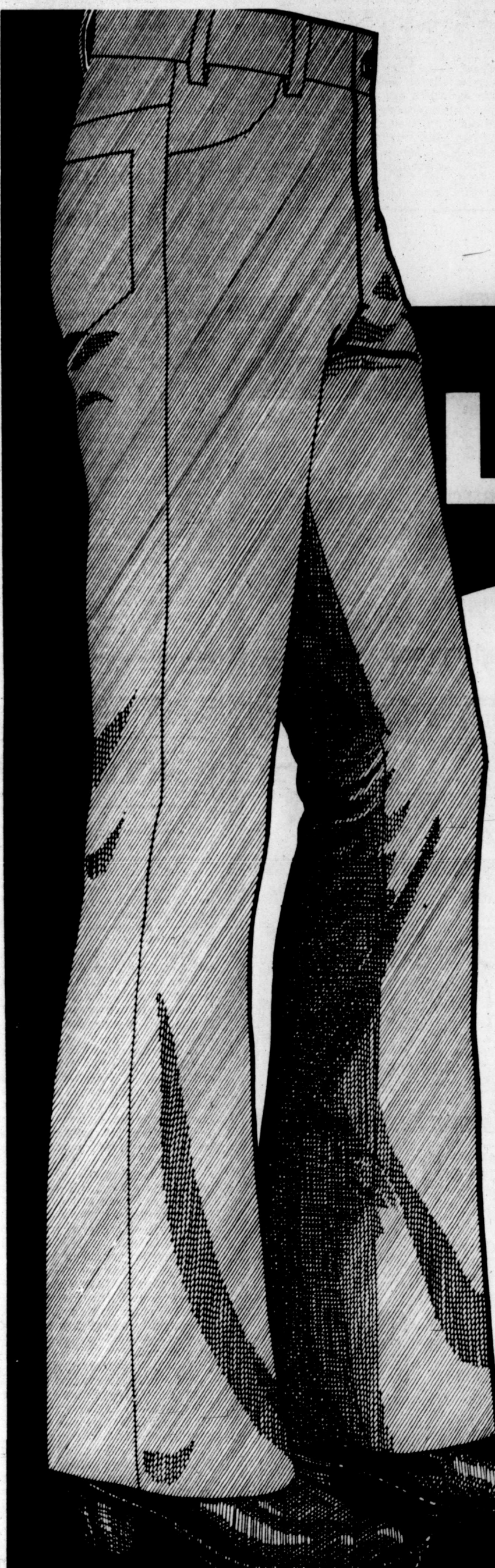
The killers fled in a waiting green Fiat 128, which was found abandoned an hour later about two miles north of the scene of the slaying.

Belated Yule Gift Given Sheriff

DALLAS (AP) — Lame-duck Sheriff Carl Thomas got a belated Christmas gift Tuesday, just 36 hours before his involuntary retirement from the Dallas County Courthouse.

Thomas, defeated in his re-election bid by former Dallas Police Chief Don Byrd, was given a life-sized oil portrait, painted and presented by Dallas artist Dmitri Vail. The work depicts Thomas in full uniform, complete with diamond-studded badge.

"I learned to like Carl Thomas a great deal," Vail said of the controversial sheriff, whose one term in office was marked by lawsuits over jail standards, deputy dismissals and sex discrimination allegations. "I've painted a lot of portraits and I never painted a portrait of anyone I didn't like."

Oiler Owner Dismisses Phillips

HOUSTON (AP) — Bum Phillips, who promised the Houston Oilers would "kick down" the door to the Super Bowl this year, instead was kicked out the door Wednesday by owner K.S. "Bud" Adams.

"The last time I talked to Bud Adams about this was concerning extending my

contract," an obviously surprised Phillips told reporters while perched on his pickup's tailgate in front of his nearly-completed Missouri City home.

"I'm not bitter," said the tobacco-chewing Phillips, who has been head coach and general manager of the Oilers

for the past six years and led them to the National Football League playoffs the last three.

"Hell, he (Adams) owns the club and he can do anything he wants to with it."

"I guess they expected a more than I could produce."

Phillips said he was "shocked" by the Wednesday morning dismissal and that his first reaction was "horse bleep."

He said Adams called him to the office Wednesday and told him he had been fired.

"I then went to the phone to let my wife know," Phillips said, "and she had already heard it on television. I'm a little bit disappointed about that."

"At least they could have given me 24 hours to let my family know and to notify my assistants."

Famous for quick one-liners, flamboyant cowboy boots and short, drill-sergeant hair, Phillips said he wasn't sure what his plans were, but that they would include football.

"I don't know what's going to happen right now," he said, "but if I get any other coaching offers, I'll probably take them. I have to pay my bills and coaching is the only job I've ever had."

He may not have to look far for work. New Orleans Saints general manager Steve Rosenbloom said Wednesday Phillips is considered a candidate for the head coaching job there, but added others are being considered.

"I was sorry to hear about Bum," Rosenbloom said, "but that's the nature of the business." See PHILLIPS Page 3

Return to the excitement and enthusiasm that comes from coaching a promising college football team. We ask you to seriously consider talking to the board of Texas Tech University.
KEND has yet to receive a reply from Phillips, but it may be just wishful thinking on the part of Ackers and Dee. Phillips is rumored to be in line to take over the New Orleans Saints.

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Tar Heels Roll Past 'Horns In Bluebonnet Bowl

HOUSTON (AP) — Amos Lawrence and Kelvin Bryant, North Carolina's twin 1,000-yard rushers, each scored touchdowns and an opportunistic defense led by safety-punter Steve Streater decked the Texas Longhorns 16-7 Wednesday

night in the 22nd Annual Bluebonnet Bowl. Lawrence, who went over 100 yards for the eighth time this season, ripped 59 yards on North Carolina's first possession for a 6-0 lead and Bryant put the Tar

heels ahead for good at 13-7 with 1-yard run in the second quarter. Streater, the only player in Atlantic Coast Conference history to make All-Conference at two positions in the same year, ignited the Tar Heels to the lead

early in the second quarter. Streater punted a Bluebonnet Bowl record 63 yards to get the Tar Heels out of trouble and then, on Texas' first play after the punt, Streater intercepted to set up the go-ahead touchdown by Bryant.

The Longhorns, trying to end a disappointing season on a winning note, scored in the second quarter when freshman Mike Luck of Houston scored on a 1-yard run set up by a 42-yard end around play by speedster Herkie Walls.

The Tarheels, who finished 11-1 for the season with their second ACC title in four years, added a field goal in the third quarter, a 31-yard boot by Jeff Hayes.

The three-pointer was set up when Texas punter John Goodson fumbled a snap on fourth down, giving North Carolina possession at the Longhorn 15.

The Tar Heels, who became only the 11th college team in history this year to have two 1,000-yard rushers, relied heavily on the passing of sophomore quarterback Rod Elkins and the receiving of senior tight end Mike Chatham.

Elkins used the airways to drive North Carolina to the Texas 1-yard line in the fourth quarter, but Lawrence was denied a touchdown on a fourth down play.

Neither North Carolina touchdown drive took very long. The first was completed in four plays and the second took only three.

Elkins hit Chatham for 16 yards prior to Lawrence's 59-yard run in the first quarter. Lawrence broke through an opening on the left side of the line, cut to his right and outran the stunned Longhorn secondary.

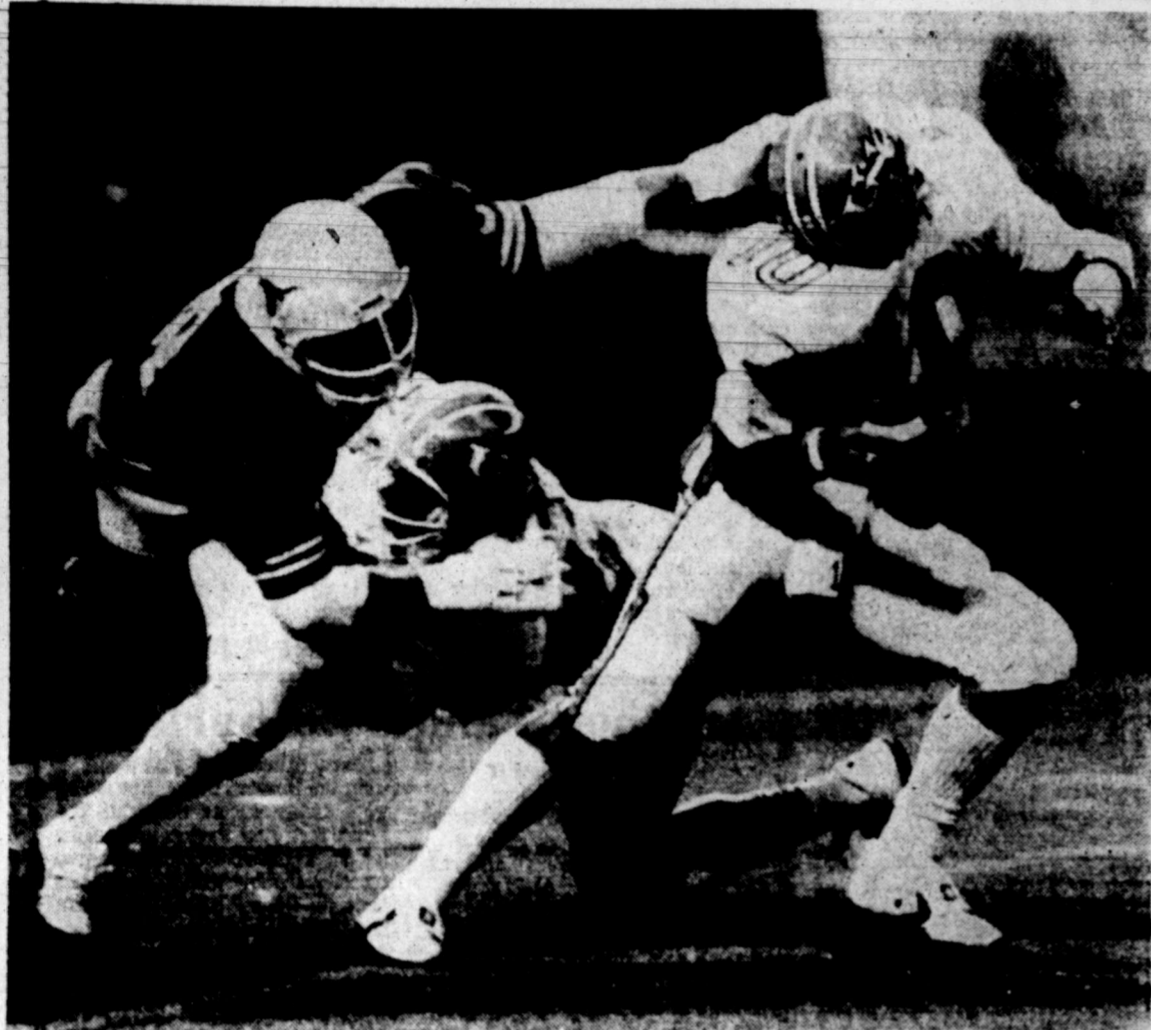

Burleson May Opt For Free Agency

BOSTON (AP) — Baseball's basic agreement apparently gives shortstop Rick Burleson "the ultimate weapon" sooner than expected in contract negotiations with the California Angels, one of his representatives said Wednesday.

Stephen Freyer said a clause in the agreement between players and owners may allow Burleson to become a free agent before next season even though he is heading into the option year of his contract.

Three other players — center fielder Fred Lynn and catcher Carlton Fisk, both of Boston, and first baseman John Mayberry of Toronto — apparently are in the same situation.

Marvin Miller, executive director of the Major League Baseball Players Association, said Tuesday that a clause in the May 23, 1980, agreement allows a player

with six or more years of major league experience whose contract has expired and who is not eligible to be a free agent to ask his team for salary arbitration.

Miller said that if the team refuses to go to arbitration, the player can become an unrestricted free agent.

"The ultimate weapon a player has is always free agency," said Freyer, part-

ner of Burleson's agent Jack Sands. "If this interpretation holds up it looks like we'll have that weapon a year early."

Freyer said Miller's interpretation enhances Burleson's bargaining position and added, "Obviously, this information is crucial to Rick and crucial to the Angels."

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Pitt Maintains Vigil For National Title

The Pittsburgh Panthers will be crowded around their television sets on New Year's Day and New Year's Night, hoping to pounce on a national championship.

Georgia's got it now. All the top-ranked Bulldogs have to do is beat Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl.

But the Fighting Irish, who had a chance to grab the national championship before crumbling against Southern California, have a habit of destroying other teams' championship dreams in bowl games.

And if Georgia does happen to lose, there are second-ranked Florida State and No. 4 Oklahoma colliding in the Orange Bowl with an opportunity to leap

frog into first place.

Which pretty much leaves the third-rated Panthers between a rock and a hard place. Pitt did what it had to do, stopping Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers while crushing South Carolina 37-9 in the Gator Bowl last Monday night. Now it hopes Notre Dame can do a job on freshman Herschel Walker and the Bulldogs.

On Wednesday night, North Carolina played Texas in the Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston.

Georgia is 11-0 and Walker is clearly the reason. It's the same team which went 6-5 without him a year ago.

"We'll have to get two, three, four, five guys to tackle Walker," said Notre

Dame linebacker Bob Crable. "If we get a lot of people on him, that will more or less negate him... But if we stop one guy, that leaves 10 more and you can't win a football game like that."

Like Georgia, Florida State has never won a national championship. It had a chance last year when it went undefeated into the Orange Bowl, also against Oklahoma. But the Sooners ruined the Seminoles' bid for perfection with a 24-7 victory.

"It'd be nice to know that big thing's out there," coach Bobby Bowden of Florida State said of the national championship. "But I've never even fought for No. 2. I'd just love to beat Oklahoma."

The Cotton Bowl game between sixth-

ranked Baylor and No. 9 Alabama is a rematch of a 1979 game in which Bear Bryant's Crimson Tide bombed the Bears 45-0.

"We have a chance to prove some things," said guard Frank Ditta of the Bears. "If we beat Alabama, nobody can say we didn't have a good team." The 10-1 Bears have never won 11 games in a season and have never finished as high as sixth in the national rankings.

While Baylor is trying to prove it's as good as its regular-season record, Michigan will be trying to show 16th-ranked Washington and the fans in the Rose Bowl that it's not as bad as its postseason record.

"I'm looking forward to our first win

in the Rose Bowl," said coach Schembechler of the fifth-ranked Wolverines, who have lost seven bowl games, five of them in Pasadena, Calif. "But I think this Michigan team has character, we did

so much more than anyone thought we could do.

Bears, Tide To Play For Pride

DALLAS (AP) — The sixth-ranked Baylor Bears, smarting from a severe whipping they received a year ago from Alabama and concerned about their national image, were a field-goal underdog to the Crimson Tide in the Cotton Bowl's annual New Year's Day Classic.

Despite being a charter member of the Southwest Conference, it is only the second appearance in the Cotton Bowl for Baylor, which lost to Penn State in 1974.

No. 8-ranked Alabama, coming off a disappointing-for-them 9-2 regular season, has never been all that successful itself in the Cotton Bowl, winning once in four tries.

"A lot of people still can't believe we won the Southwest Conference," said Baylor All-America guard Frank Ditta. "It bothers me. We worked hard to get to where we are."

The big blemish on Baylor's 10-1 season was a loss to weak San Jose State in the middle of the season. No Baylor team has ever won 11 games in a season.

Also, Alabama blasted the Bears 45-0 during the 1979 regular season.

"We have a chance to prove some things," said Ditta. "If we beat Alabama, nobody can say we didn't have a good team."

Both teams feature bristling defenses anchored by an Associated Press All-American.

For Alabama, the defensive catalyst is end E.J. Junior while Baylor calls upon middle linebacker Mike Singletary to

provide leadership.

Baylor, on paper, has the more spectacular offense with a 1,000-yard runner in Walter Abercrombie, while Alabama has used three different quarterbacks trying to get its wishbone into gear.

Alabama running back Major Ogilvie downplayed any sentiment that the game means more to Baylor than it does the Crimson Tide.

"Pride is just as important as playing for the national title," he said.

Should Alabama win, it will be the 306th victory for coach Paul "Bear" Bryant and put him within nine of Amos Alonzo Stagg's national record. It would also be Bryant's second Cotton Bowl victory. His 1950 Kentucky team beat Texas Christian in the Cotton Bowl.

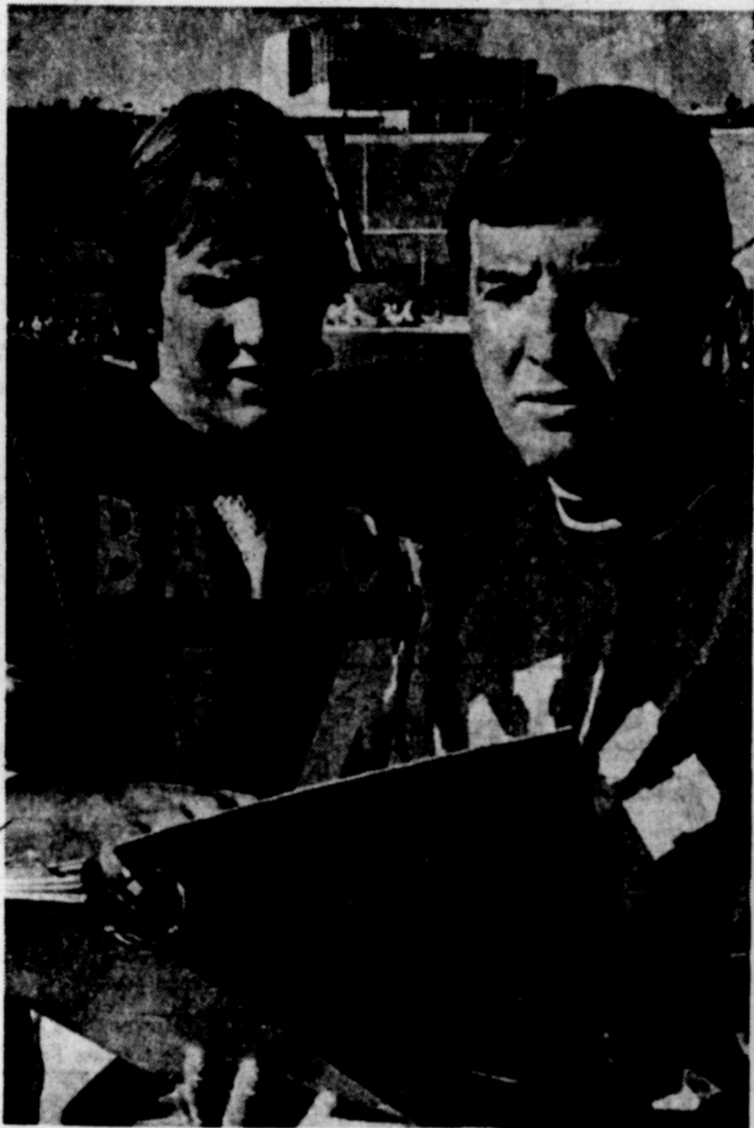
Baylor coach Grant Teaff, asked if this is the most important game in the school's history, said, "Time will tell."

The Bears have never finished the year ranked sixth or higher in the AP poll.

It's Alabama's 22nd consecutive bowl appearance, and 34th overall, both national records.

Bryant said Wednesday he will not name his starting quarterback until game time. There were strong hints that he would start a freshman for the first time in his coaching career.

"I'd like for it to be Don Jacobs," said Bryant of his senior signal caller. "But he hasn't looked like the same quarterback as last year. I'd rather start a senior but it may be (freshman) Walter Lewis."

Dooley Says Georgia Not One-Man Show

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Georgia is more than a one-man team and coach Vince Dooley says Notre Dame will have to do more than just stop tailback Herschel Walker to defeat the No. 1-ranked Bulldogs in today's Sugar Bowl.

While Notre Dame coach Dan Devine was comparing Walker, Georgia's freshman stud, to pro star Earl Campbell, and while strong safety Dave Duerson was saying that "we've got to stop their running game and force them into passing," Dooley warned that Georgia is "a total football team."

"That's one of our strengths," he said Wednesday. "I'm not so sure if we're great in any one phase, but all phases of our game are pretty good. We're not totally dependent on Herschel Walker, but, on the other hand, if we didn't have him, we might not be in as good shape as we are."

Georgia is in 11-0 shape, the only team in the country to make it through the regular season with an unblemished record, and close enough to smell its first-ever national championship. It is, however, essentially the same team that was 6-5 last year before Walker burst on the scene by rushing for 1,616 yards and 148.9 per game, the latter figure fourth best in the country and the former a national record for a freshman.

Three years ago, Notre Dame won the national championship by drubbing No. 1 Texas 38-10 in the Cotton Bowl while holding Campbell to 116 hard-earned yards in 29 carries, the longest 18 yards.

Earl Campbell and me are two different persons," says Walker, a blend of 225-pound power and 9.2-second speed.

Notre Dame has to play us — Georgia — not Texas. It's gonna be fun. It's fun to be challenged by a bunch of great athletes, and Notre Dame has plenty of them."

quarter they're tired and he's still going strong."

All-American end Scott Zetek says Notre Dame plays "team defense. If everyone does their individual job we will play very well. The Georgia team isn't just Walker. We will have to concentrate on the whole team."

"I don't think the game will be decided by any one man," echoes Duerson. "In our preparations, the coaches have tried to avoid overconcentrating on Walker. He's their big-play man, but they'll have 11 guys on the field. It will be an 11-man show... or should I say 22."

"Our preparations are the most serious since the Alabama game. It really can't be described. You have to be there to see the intensity."

With the game barely 24 hours away, Dooley described himself Wednesday as having a "grinding" feeling inside, "churning a little bit. The opportunity we have (i.e., the national championship) will be enough motivation for us. But there's a limit to it. I don't know much motivation you can throw in."

Seventh-ranked Notre Dame will have plenty of motivation of its own, although its chances for a national title probably evaporated in the 20-3 loss to Southern California that ended the regular season. Not only do the Irish have a shot at the nation's No. 1-rated team, but the 56-year-old Devine is bowing out after six seasons. He has an over-all 53-15-1 record at South Bend, including a 3-0 mark in bowl games.

"We've given it a lot of thought," says Crable, a junior. "For the other coaches, too. And the underclassmen's view is that this is a game for the senior class, too. The greatest tribute we could pay the seniors is to go out and win the game for them."

Devine says the fact that it will be his swan song hasn't really hit him yet.

"The players give up their individuality to become members of a team," he said. "If the head coach can't do that, you can't expect the players to do that. After the game it will dawn on me that I'm no longer associated with a football team and it will probably be a real shock."

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Wolverines Try To Reverse Past Bowl Fortunes

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Michigan's Wolverines, from coach Bo Schembechler down to the last man on the roster, aim to erase a reputation for post-season losses in Thursday's 67th Rose Bowl game.

"I'm looking forward to our first win in the Rose Bowl," said Schembechler referring to the seven times his teams have lost bowl games including five Rose Bowl contests. "I know we are playing a very underrated team, which is typical of most Washington teams."

"But I think this Michigan team has character, we did so much more than anyone thought we could do. Did you know this is the first time we have won the Big Ten championship outright since 1971?"

Both Michigan and Washington, of

the Pacific-10, posted 9-2 records in the regular season. The Wolverines lost two of their first three games and then won eight straight.

Washington lost to Oregon, a team ineligible for the Rose Bowl, and to Navy in a non-conference game. The Wolverines rate No. 5 in The Associated Press poll and the Huskies only No. 16 despite a 20-10 victory over powerful Southern California that whipped Notre Dame.

The capacity crowd of 105,000 in the Rose Bowl, and a national television audience, will see a battle that shapes up as a clash between an explosive Washington offense headed by quarterback Tom Flick and a small but quick Michigan defense which did not allow a touchdown in the final 18 quarters of the regular season.

The Wolverines won the title and the trip West with a 9-3 victory over arch-rival Ohio State.

Flick, a 6-foot-3, senior from Bellevue, Wash., was the player-of-the-year in the Pacific-10, after completing 168 passes of 280 attempts for 2,178 yards and 15 touchdowns.

"We didn't want him to run because he was our only quarterback and we didn't want to take a chance on getting him hurt," said Coach Don James whose Huskies upset Michigan 27-20 in the 1978 Rose Bowl after going in as two-touchdown underdogs. "I think we called just one play where he was expected to run the football."

Michigan's quarterback John Wampler, also 6-3 and a senior, doesn't run either. He suffered a serious knee injury in the last Gator Bowl game and wasn't even called on to play this season.

He came on in the third game and

completed 106 of 192 attempts for 1,377 yards and match Flick's 15 scoring tosses.

Schembechler doesn't want Wampler to run and the Michigan quarterback has All-American receiver Anthony Carter, a 161-pound receiver who will be the smallest man on the field and perhaps the biggest threat.

Carter set a Michigan record with 20 touchdowns receptions in his two seasons, including 13 this year.

James, who admits the 48 hours prior to a big game are the hardest, said, "We try to make our running game go first. The fact is, though, that if you've got to pass if you expect win out here."

The Big Ten hasn't won in the last six Rose Bowl games and the criticism has been that Midwesterners could neither pass well or defend well against aerial attacks.

Michigan this season appears to ne-

gate both of those criticisms and beat Purdue and the Boilermakers' All-American quarterback Mark Herrmann, 26-0, holding Herrmann to 129 yards passing and getting two touchdowns from Carter on passes from Wampler.

In their nine victories, the Huskies of Washington have scored 20 or more points which puts pressure on the Michigan defense which the Washington coach respects, saying the Wolverines played defense much better than any other team in the nation.

Linebacker Andy Cannavino and tackle Mike Trgovac lead the Big Ten club's defense at 220 and 235 pounds respectively. The Wolverines gave up just three touchdowns during the season.

Weather shapes up as near perfect with the temperatures expected to be in the 70s. The Rose Bowl field is natural grass, but neither team, which play their home games on artificial turf, have had

trouble during the workouts.

James brought his club to Southern California two weeks ahead of the game as he did three years ago. Schembechler changed his approach and practiced in the new Michigan field house until a week before the game. He believes the change will increase the game intensity of his young squad which numbers only seven seniors.

Running back Stanley Edwards, who played against Washington as a freshman, commented, "Coming out early causes too many distractions. I sense a different attitude this time. We're right into the game."

The Huskies running attack suffers through the injury loss of Ron Jackson but still will have starters Kyle Stevens and Toussaint Tyler.

Michigan has Edwards at fullback, a switch from tailback, with Butch Woolfolk in the latter position.

Seminoles, OU May Win Title

MIAMI (AP) — Second-ranked Florida State and No. 4 Oklahoma collide in the Orange Bowl game tonight, hoping another New Year's Day contest elevates this 47th annual event into a battle for college football's national championship.

Neither controls its destiny in the chase for the No. 1 position in the final Associated Press poll, which will be announced Saturday night.

Top-ranked Georgia, the only unbeaten, untied team in the nation, can settle the issue with a Sugar Bowl victory over No. 7 Notre Dame.

Coaches Bobby Bowden of FSU and Barry Switzer of Oklahoma insisted Wednesday that the outcome of the Georgia-Notre Dame clash would have no bearing on the Orange Bowl, but each said he would like to see a Fighting Irish victory.

"It'd be nice to know that big thing's (No. 1) out there," said Bowden. "But I've never even fought for No. 2. I'd just love to beat Oklahoma."

"We want to be No. 3 again," said Switzer. "That's been our niche for several years. I just want to see how good Georgia is."

Third-ranked Pittsburgh could not be overlooked in a final poll if both Georgia and FSU lost Thursday. The Panthers made their bid for the national title by destroying 18th-ranked South Carolina 37-9 in the Gator Bowl game Monday night.

FSU and Oklahoma each carry 7-game winning streaks into the 7 p.m. CST battle before a sellout crowd of 76,

114 and a national television (NBC) audience. The forecast calls for unseasonably cool weather, with gametime temperature in the 40s.

Oklahoma, 9-2, is a 5-point favorite to down the Seminole, 10-1, in the rematch of the 1980 Orange Bowl, which the Sooners won 24-7.

The Sooners, who had 36 turnovers while dropping two of their first four games this season, will test a tough Seminole defense with a strong, balanced wishbone attack in which four players range in total yardage from 659-678: David Overstreet, J. C. Watts, Stanley Wilson and George Rhymes, a freshman who will be performing before a hometown crowd.

Bowden said the wishbone presented a particular problem for his team since FSU rarely faces it. "It's just like a disease. You don't want to face it often," he said.

FSU improved its running game in 1980, getting away from the pattern of being a high-powered passing team. Sam Platt, a converted wide receiver, rushed for 983 yards and quarterback Rick Stockstill threw for 1,377 yards and 15 touchdowns.

"We've got good players, but not compared to years past," Switzer said. "We do not have a superstar back ... a difference maker ... like Billy Sims was last year."

"We have won on defense, on kicking and on capitalizing on mistakes," said Bowden. "We have not driven the ball very far. If Barry and them don't lay the ball down, it may be a replay of 1980."

Schnellenberger Blasts Lack Of Media Interest

ATLANTA (AP) — Miami coach Howard Schnellenberger rapped local media and the city of Atlanta Wednesday for what he called a lack of interest in Friday's Peach Bowl, which pits his 20th-ranked Hurricanes against Virginia Tech.

"I personally think it's the biggest game in town," said the 46-year-old Schnellenberger, who in his second year at the Florida school guided the Hurricanes to an 8-3 record and their first football bowl appearance since 1967.

"I was surprised when I picked up the morning paper and couldn't find anything on the game until the third page," he said when asked if the Peach Bowl was slighted because of Georgia's upcoming Sugar Bowl meeting with Notre Dame and the Atlanta Falcons' playoff game with Dallas, which dominated the front page of sports sections here.

"I think it sets back a little for the city of Atlanta not to get behind the event. It will be an outstanding Peach Bowl game," said Schnellenberger, who commented at a coaches' news conference with Tech's Bill Dooley.

Miami is a six-point favorite over Virginia Tech, 8-3, in the 2 p.m.

(CST) nationally televised contest at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium.

Schnellenberger, the former Baltimore Colts head coach and assistant with the Miami Dolphins, made light of his lack of bowl experience.

"This is my first bowl appearance as a head coach and if I do a lot wrong, I hope you'll understand. I also hope that Bill Dooley's experience in bowl games will not be too much to overcome," he said.

Dooley, brother of Georgia coach Vince Dooley, took squads from North Carolina to six bowls, including two previous appearances in the Peach Bowl. In only his third year at Virginia Tech, he guided the Hokies to their first post-season appearance since 1968.

"The University of Miami is an outstanding football team," said Dooley. "They were ranked 20th in the nation, but after looking at films, it is my estimation that they should be higher."

"They are big and strong and have an outstanding defense. All around it will be a big challenge to our football team," he said.

Miami was ranked 13th nationally in defense.

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Underdog Minnesota Begins Long Playoff Road

the Vikings were being ignored as a play-off contender. Between the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the National Conference's Central Division champions, and the emerging Detroit Lions, nobody was giving the Vikes much of a chance.

But that didn't faze them. With Tommy Kramer passing for 3,582 yards — second only to Archie Manning of the New Orleans Saints — and with Ahmad Rashad catching 69 passes (fourth in the NFC) for 1,095 yards (second in the conference), the Vikings turned themselves around, winning six of their last eight games and regaining the division title they had won for six consecutive seasons before relinquishing it to the Bucs a year ago.

In that span, they lost Super Bowl VIII to Miami 24-7, lost Super Bowl IX to Pittsburgh 16-6, and lost Super Bowl XI to Oakland 32-14. Oh, yes, they also lost Super Bowl IV to Kansas City 23-7 after the 1969 season, before the American Football League became the American Conference.

Saturday's other second-round playoff game, in the American Conference, sends the Buffalo Bills to San Diego to face the high-powered Chargers. On Sunday in the NFC it's the Dallas Cowboys, fresh from their 34-13 wild-card thrashing of Los Angeles, heading into Atlanta

to face the Falcons. In the AFC it's the Oakland Raiders, coming off a 27-7 pounding of Houston, taking on the Browns in Cleveland. The Raiders' romp was instrumental in costing Oilers' Coach Bum Phillips his job.

If the Falcons beat Dallas (the Cowboys have won six of seven games from Atlanta including a 27-20 playoff triumph in 1978), they'll be the hosts of the NFC championship game Jan. 11 regardless of what happens in Philadelphia. If the Cowboys and Eagles win, Philadelphia gets the home field. Minnesota earns a home berth only if it and Dallas win, since the Cowboys, as a wild-card team, can't play at home.

Similarly, if the Chargers win on Saturday, they assure themselves of the AFC title game at home on Jan. 11 against either the Browns or Raiders. Buffalo can be at home if it and Oakland win. If the Bills and Browns win, Cleveland is the site of the conference championship.

Buffalo has a few fond memories of San Diego. In 1964 and again the next year the Bills beat the Chargers for the

championship of the AFL. The 1966 first-place finish was their last until this year. And one reason they finished first was

the Bills 26-24 victory over the Chargers in San Diego, when they rallied from a 24-12 deficit.

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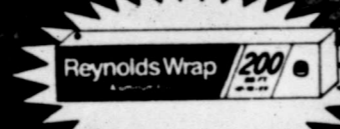
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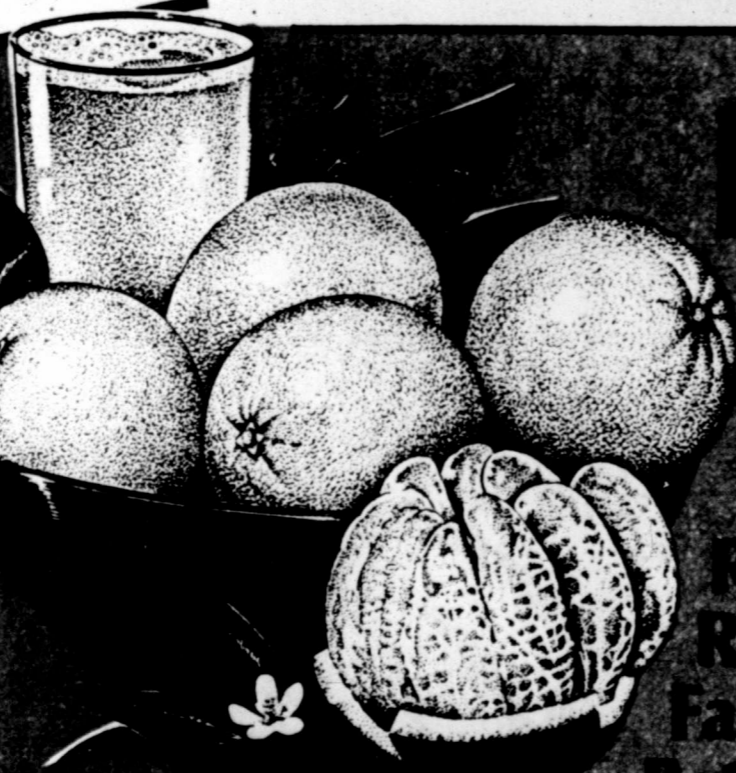
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Lack Of Playoff Experience Concerns Bennett

ATLANTA (AP) — A lack of playoff experience is a concern of Atlanta coach Leeman Bennett as the Falcons prepare for two-time Super Bowl champion Dallas on Sunday, but not to All-Pro rookie tight end Junior Miller.

Despite Bennett's worries, the Falcons, who reeled off nine consecutive victories en route to the NFC West title and a 12-4 record, are three-point favorites Sunday in the 3 p.m. (CST) nationally televised (CBS) contest at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium.

The Cowboys are in the playoffs for the 15th time in 16 seasons and knocked

off Atlanta 27-20 in 1978 in the Falcons' only other playoff year.

"We're a much better football team this year than we were in 1978," said Bennett. "Of course, the thing that concerns me this year is the youth we have. Everybody had been saying that this is the second time for us in the playoffs, but that's only partly true. There are a lot of people on this team that weren't here in 1978."

One of them, of course, was Miller, the No. 1 draft choice from Nebraska, who caught 46 passes for 574 yards and a club-record nine touchdowns.

"I don't think we'll have any problem getting up for a big game like this. We've had lots of big games this year and this is just another big one," said the 6-foot-4, 235-pound Miller.

"As far as I'm concerned the reputation of the Dallas Cowboys doesn't mean anything. We were 12-4 and so were they. Whoever wants it most will win," said Miller.

"I don't know what it will take but I feel this team knows how to win. We can do it. We came from behind in six or seven games. It comes down to who will die, who will quit, and this team won't quit," he said.

The Falcons also start three other rookies, linebackers Buddy Curry and Al Richardson and defensive back Kenny Johnson, and list 19 players on their roster with two years or less pro experience.

"The thing that's different for the playoffs is that there's a lot more pressure from the media and a lot more pressure for tickets for Aunt Susie," said Bennett.

"Teams that have been there like the Cowboys are used to that. It's done with a shrug of the shoulders. It's the price you have to pay to be in the playoffs," he said.

The Cowboys, basically the same team that knocked off the Falcons in 1978, lost two starters in Sunday's 34-13 wild card victory over Los Angeles.

Linebacker Mike Hegman suffered a

dislocated elbow and safety Randy Brown will replace Hegman and Dennis Hughes dislocated his shoulder. Guy Thurman will start for Hughes.

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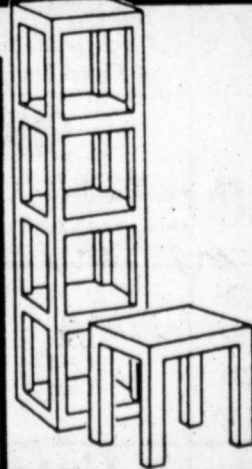
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British Olympians Draw Snub From Government

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher Wednesday firmly defended her decision to leave out Britain's Moscow Olympic stars from Queen Elizabeth II's New Year Honors List.

It was "totally and utterly right," she said in a British Broadcasting Corp. interview.

The Olympic athletes had defied Mrs. Thatcher's plea to join the American boycott of the Moscow Games as a protest against Soviet intervention in Afghanistan.

Her snub to the Olympic squad angered opposition Labor lawmakers including former minister of sport, Denis Howell, who said the "humiliation" would be corrected as soon as Labor returns to power. The Honors List, announced by Buckingham Palace based on recommendations from the government

of the day, included 687 names. There were knighthoods for artists, businessmen and TV interviewer Robin Day, as well as life peerages and hundreds of British Empire medals.

But conspicuous by their absence were Olympic gold medal winners Sebastian Coe and Steve Ovett, the two greatest middle distance runners in British history; sprinter Allan Wells, decathlon champ Daley Thompson and breaststroke swimmer Duncan Goodhew.

Every Olympic gold medalist of the modern era has been honored by his country until now.

But Mrs. Thatcher was unrepentant. "Russia was still in Afghanistan. Russia is still occupying Afghanistan by force. Her preparations are there, if ever she chooses to use them, for Poland. I hope she never will," said Europe's first

woman premier, known to the Soviets as the "Iron Lady."

"We felt very strongly indeed that to go to the Olympics, which is an ideal, would be used by Moscow to indicate that the rest of the world approved of her policies. I still believe that it was wrong to go under the circumstances."

She respected the view taken by the athletes. "That is their right. It is the right which we protect and preserve. It is not the right which prevails in Soviet Russia."

Goodhew, captain of the swimming team, said it would have been "something fantastic" to get an honor but simply going to Moscow had its rewards.

He recalled a Moscow Radio interview in which he was asked why he was at the Games when his government advised against it.

"I said it's quite simple really — we have freedom of choice in Britain and we have a chance to decide for or against an issue. It made it worthwhile for me going because I knew no matter how much the Russian government tried to cover up the fact of the boycott and everything, they could not cover up the fact that the British government told us not to go and we did go."

Neither Coe nor Ovett offered any comment. Coe's father and coach, Peter Coe, said only: "Let sleeping dogs lie."

Sir Denis Follows, British Olympic Association chairman, said: "It is very sad and a strange breach with precedent."

Auburn Trustees Might Select Coach Friday

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — The Auburn University Board of Trustees reportedly will meet Friday as it nears a final decision on a new head football coach to succeed Doug Barfield.

Barfield, meanwhile, has met with Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant to discuss a possible job with Auburn's cross-state rival Crimson Tide.

Bryant, in Texas for the Cotton Bowl, said he hasn't offered Barfield a position on the Alabama staff but "we talked about it if this happened or if that happened."

Bryant said his 12-man staff is at its limit now but didn't rule out possible changes in 1981.

"I've told Doug before I thought he was a good coach," said Bryant. "I let him know that before he got fired. He'd be a fine addition to any staff."

Barfield, who resigned under pressure after five seasons at Auburn, had no immediate comment.

Meanwhile, the Anniston Star reported Wednesday that the Auburn trustees plan to meet in private session Friday and may pick a new Tiger coach at that time.

Auburn president Hanly Funderburk's office said no board meeting was planned, and Gov. Fob James' assistant press secretary, Windy Leavell, said no such meeting was on their schedule. But the Star, quoting a member of the board who asked not to be named, said the meeting was set for mid-afternoon.

The Star also quoted the trustee as saying, "I feel strongly that the selection committee will come forth with a name

for the board to consider on Friday."

The leading candidate appears to be Pat Dye, who recently resigned as head coach at the University of Wyoming and who has acknowledged meeting with Auburn about the Tiger job. Dye is a former Georgia star who also worked on Bryant's Alabama staff.

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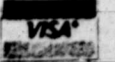
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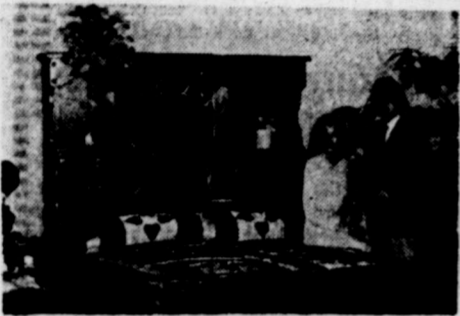
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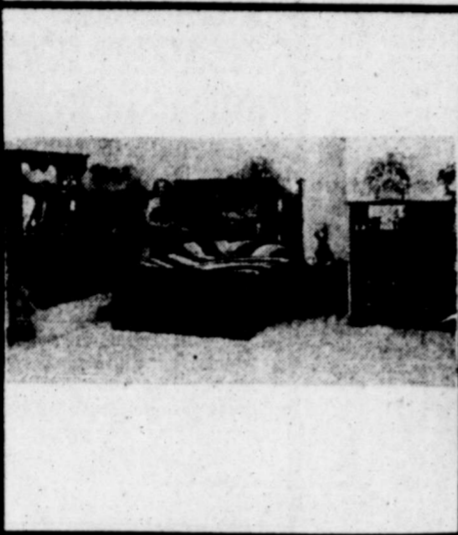
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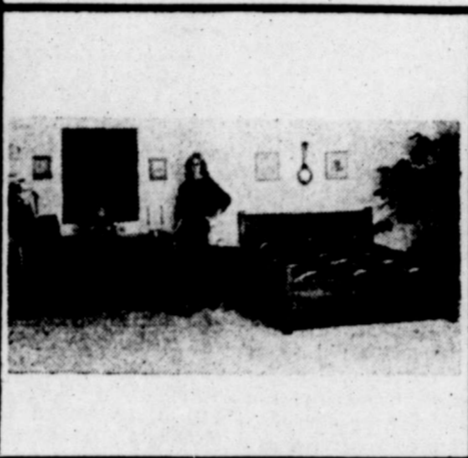
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
