Police said the Jeep was stolen from the Louisiana State University campus in Baton Rouge. The Rolls bore California license plate 603NQQ and an English license plate with the same numbers and letters.

Tech Scholarship To Commemorate Muleshoe Couple

A Texas Tech University scholarship has been established by friends and relatives in memory of Jerry and Pat Zimmerman Lawrence, Muleshoe public school teachers who were asphyxiated in their home Oct. 29, 1980.

Mrs. Lawrence was a reading teacher at Muleshoe Junior High School. Her husband was a teacher of vocational agriculture at Muleshoe High School.

Two \$500 scholarships are to be awarded annually, one to a student in the College of Education and the other to a student in the College of Agricultural Sciences. Applicants must be juniors with grade point averages of at least 3.0 (of a possible 4.0). Awards have been designated the Jerry and Pat Zimmerman Lawrence Memorial Scholarship.

Persons who want to contribute to the scholarship endowment should send their contributions to the Texas Tech Foundation, P.O. Box 4650, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas 79409. Contributions should be accompanied by a notation indicating they are for the Zimmerman-Lawrence scholarship.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence were graduates of Texas Tech. Mrs. Lawrence was in her second year of teaching at Muleshoe. Lawrence was teaching for the first year in Muleshoe. They had been married about one year.

Brownwood Police Seek Pay Raise

BROWNWOOD (AP) — City police, claiming their pay has not kept up with the cost of living, are asking voters to approve a pay raise that could result in a 16.3 percent tax increase in October, city officials said.

If passed, the measure would order a pay raise for each of the city's two dozen officers, except the police chief.

"We haven't been keeping up at all with the cost of living increase and we're losing lots of officers because of this," said police Lt. Don Yoes, president of the Brownwood Municipal Police Association.

City Manager Virgil Gray agreed police pay is low but said, "In my opinion all the city employees are underpaid."

He said the measure would require \$124,200, which the city could not provide without a tax increase.

a graduate of Abilene High School and Commercial College here. She is a Catholic.

Miss Riojas said of her feelings about the death penalty, "If the crime is that serious, then I believe in it."

Courtroom observers noted that jury selection in the case, which began Monday and in which each possible panel member is questioned individually, is going much more quickly than expected. Three jurors were seated Tuesday in what one trial participant termed "a

streak of luck."

The first two jurors, 45-year-old Jeanette Weitzel and 38-year-old Joe Preston Goetz, were chosen Tuesday morning. Sandy Meador, 23, was picked Tuesday afternoon.

Lubbock County Criminal District Attorney John Montford has used only one of his 15 peremptory strikes, which allow an attorney to cut jurors from the panel without providing the court a specific reason. That strike was used Wednesday afternoon after the questioning of 29-

year-old woman indicated that she believes in the legalization of marijuana.

Defense attorneys Floyd Holder and Dick Alexander have used two of their strikes.

Robert C. Wright, judge of the 137th Judicial District in Lubbock, is presiding in the case, which was moved here after Wright ruled the case against the Loren-

zo man had received too much publicity in Lubbock County to ensure selection of an impartial jury.

Court officials estimate that the trial of Alexander may last as long as three weeks. If Alexander is found guilty, the jury will have to decide between a life sentence and the death penalty as his punishment.

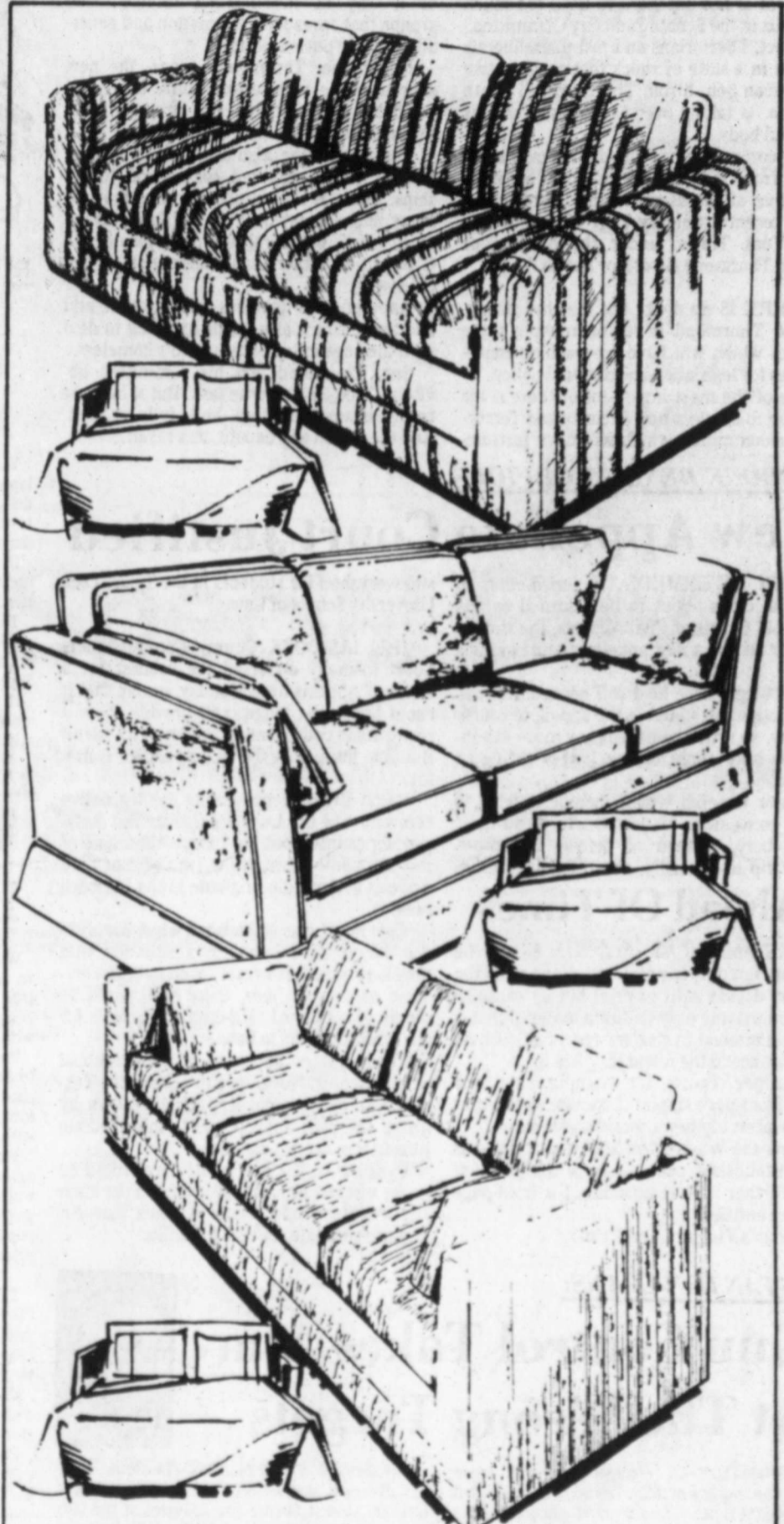

El Salvador's Leader Claims Repulsion Of Guerrilla Raid

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI) — El Salvador's President Jose Napoleon Duarte said Wednesday his troops repulsed a sea invasion by 100 guerrillas launched from neighboring Nicaragua in the fifth day of a leftist offensive.

The invasion reports underlined fears the war could explode into a regional conflict involving Nicaragua as well as rightist-ruled Guatemala and Honduras — and perhaps even the United States.

The United States Wednesday resumed military aid to the embattled Salvadoran government, trying to defeat an offensive begun Saturday by leftists using "sophisticated equipment from abroad," according to a U.S. spokesman in Washington.

Salvadoran troops crushed rebel attacks against two provincial capitals but fighting raged in a third, headquarters of an elite paratrooper unit trained by U.S. Army Rangers, the Defense Ministry said.

President Duarte, speaking in English, told a news briefing at the presidential palace.

"There was an invasion in boats of around 100 guerrilla people who arrived yesterday at El Cuco," a town on El Salvador's southern Pacific coast near Nicaragua, ruled by the leftist Sandinista government that came to power in 1979.

"We have our soldiers fighting them and they (guerrillas) are now moving back, back to the sea," said Duarte, a Christian Democrat appointed to the post during a military-backed reorganization of the junta last Dec. 13.

The leader of the beleaguered U.S.-supported government said the nationality of the guerrillas was not determined but "it is obvious they (the boats) come from Nicaragua."

A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy in the capital confirmed Salvadoran armed forces were fighting in the El Cuco area but provided no details on the battle.

Guatemala confirmed it had rushed 500 soldiers to the border with El Salvador but said the move was "only preventive" and not to fight the guerrillas.

State Department officials in Washington said President Carter had decided to resume military aid to El Salvador, cut off because of allegations government troops were involved in the Dec. 2 murder of three U.S. nuns and a woman social worker.

The \$5 million package includes the loan of two U.S. Transport helicopters — to be flown by U.S.-trained Salvadoran pilots — trucks, radios bullet-proof vests and credits for the helicopter's maintenance.

The State Department said no U.S. military personnel will be sent to El Salvador. A Spokesman for U.S. Ambassador Robert White said Carter's decision "takes into account" the unexpected effectiveness of the "general offensive" launched Saturday by the 4,000-6,000 member Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front, an alliance of five Marxist-led guerrilla groups.

"The leftist offensive indicates that the left is getting better arms than ever before and that they are getting more sophisticated equipment from abroad," the spokesman said.

He said White believed there was "clear evidence" that nearby Nicaragua, ruled by leftist Sandinista guerrillas, "is being used as a base of transport and support for Salvadoran leftists."

U.S. Resuming Arms Shipments To El Salvador, Officials Say

WASHINGTON (UPI) — American arms shipments to El Salvador are being resumed in light of a new offensive by anti-government guerrillas who are receiving "substantial" outside arms supplies, the administration announced Wednesday.

The State Department announcement cranks up a \$5 million military aid program that was curtailed last month because of the murders of four Americans.

The aid package includes communications gear, Jeeps, trucks and items ranging from armored vests to tear gas. In addition, the United States will loan the Salvadoran government two "Huey" helicopters to replace aircraft lost in the renewed fighting.

The State Department said no U.S. military personnel will be sent to El Salvador.

"A major military offensive was conducted by leftist guerrillas over the past weekend in which they demonstrated that they are better armed and constitute a military threat," said a State Department announcement. "Captured documents and weapons confirmed that the guerrillas have received a substantial supply of arms from abroad."

Three nuns and a social worker were shot to death on a plantation near San Salvador, and there were allegations security forces of the ruling junta were responsible. The United States decided Dec. 5 to suspend \$20 million in economic assistance and the \$5 million in military sales credits.

Promised cooperation in a State Department investigation by the new civilian government of Jose Napoleon Duarte persuaded the United States to restore the vital economic assistance on Dec. 17.

Judge Orders Troopers Out Of Busing Dispute

ALEXANDRIA, La. (UPI) — A federal judge, citing landmark desegregation cases of the 1950s and 1960s, Wednesday ordered state troopers out of the Buckeye High School busing dispute and sharply rebuked a state judge for interfering with his rulings.

Federal Judge Nauman Scott, who will hold a contempt hearing Thursday

on possible fines of up to \$1,000 a day against state Judge Richard Lee and other principals in the feud, called the entire affair "most inappropriate."

Lee and Scott have been battling about whether three white girls may continue attending all-white Buckeye or must be bused 21 miles to racially mixed Jones Street Junior High in Alexandria.

The girls — eighth graders Michelle Laborde and Lynda McNeal, both 13, and seventh grader Ramona Carbo, 12 — accompanied Lee to the hearing. They wore blue jeans and Miss Carbo had on a gray and blue Buckeye sweatshirt.

Scott ordered state troopers and all other state officials not to enforce the orders of 9th Judicial District Court, where Lee sits, in the busing case. Scott said Lee could issue whatever orders he wished but they could not be enforced.

Scott also lashed out at the state jurist, saying the dispute should have been pursued through the courts without Lee making personal appearances at the school to enforce his orders.

"I want it distinctly understood this court has never interfered with an order of the state court," Scott said. "This court has refrained from any action ... against a state judge until it was forced to protect its own order."

"This court has made no public statements, no appearances on TV and has not commented on the case before it or pleaded its side in the media."

Lee, who has become a folk hero in rural central Louisiana for his stand against Scott, appeared repeatedly on television and stood in the door of the schoolhouse in attempts to enforce his orders.

Scott said Lee should "put up or shut up" by citing legal precedents in his favor.

"There is nothing personal in this," Scott said.

In addition to a possible first day contempt fine of \$4,000 and succeeding fines of \$1,000 a day against Lee, the girls' parents and guardians could be fined up to \$2,000 for their first violation of Scott's orders and \$500 each succeeding day. Buckeye Principal Charles Waites also is named in the contempt motion but Scott assured him he would not be fined.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has given Scott virtually a free hand to enforce his desegregation orders.

Spectator groups and protestors from all over the state are expected Thursday at the federal courthouse in Alexandria for the contempt hearing. Ku Klux Klan leaders have announced they will attend, without their robes and hoods.

Scott has requested extra seats and U.S. marshals to maintain security, but state police said they planned no additional security.

Scott refused Wednesday to step down from the contempt proceedings.

The feud began in September and early October, when Lee transferred custody of the three girls from their parents to friends living in the Buckeye attendance zone so they could continue attending the all-white school rather than go to Jones Street Junior High, which is 53 percent black.

Faced with counter-orders from Scott, Lee insisted that the girls be allowed to remain at Buckeye. He personally led them into classes for four days.

Explaining his permanent injunction against state officials, Scott said the matter had gotten out of hand.

"This court feels that this whole procedure is the most inappropriate, most

regretful sort of procedure that could have happened," Scott said.

He said schools in the parish must be racially mixed and he must make sure his orders are followed. Scott said desegre-

gation rulings dating to the 1950s back his stand on Buckeye.

"There have been a million cases just like this," he said. "I am not starting anything new."

Increased Demand For Texas Citrus Seen

A freeze in Florida and a fruit fly infestation in California are causing citrus fruit losses that will create a high demand for Texas-grown citrus, market experts predict.

The expected market increase comes just as farmers in the Rio Grande Valley are recovering from effects of a freeze two years ago and the winds of Hurricane Allen last August.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown is determined, therefore, to protect the Texas crop from possible

infestation by the fruit fly that is plaguing California growers.

"The Texas citrus fruit industry is valued at \$40-\$60 million, and we cannot afford to jeopardize this valuable agricultural production," Brown said Tuesday, indicating a quarantine on importation of California produce was possible if the out-of-state fruit poses an immediate threat of the fruit fly to Texas orchards.

Brown said his office is keeping tabs on developments of the fruit fly infestation in California, which began last summer and now is concentrated in the San Jose-Santa Clara area.

Classified Ads Result In Arrests

Several advertisers found out Tuesday night that want ads get fast results when Lubbock police rounded up seven suspected prostitutes who had run advertisements in the newspaper.

Reading the personal section of the classifieds, Detectives Paul Mayfield and Ted Daniels found several advertisements telling of "nude modeling and nude dancing."

When the officers made their first call at 8 p.m., the woman who answered said she only worked out calls.

The two detectives then rented a room in the Koko Inn under an assumed name and made arrangements with two women.

When the women arrived, Mayfield got one of the women to tell her business rates by asking, "How much for a good time?" reports said.

After some haggling over the price, the two women were arrested.

The suspects, both from Lubbock, were described as black women, one 31 years old and one 20 years old.

Later, at 9:40 p.m., the two officers went to a house in the 900-block of E. 37th St. which was advertised as open 24 hours.

Two women met the detectives and invited them into a back room, reports said. After prices had been agreed on, the two were arrested and taken to the Lubbock County Jail on suspicion of prostitution. One of the women had a child whom police turned over to a neighbor for safekeeping, the report said.

One suspect was a black 20-year-old and the other woman was a white 19-year-old, the report said.

On their third run, the officers encountered more difficulties.

The detectives went to a house in the 300-block of East 34th St. at 10 p.m. and were met by a woman, who allowed only one man in at a time.

Mayfield entered the residence and was required to show some identification, the report said. The woman then asked that he expose himself, explaining that she knew police could not expose themselves.

Mayfield told the woman he would have to leave if there were police there as he could not afford to be caught.

The woman then walked the officer to the door, but suggested when they stopped that something could be worked out. After she listed rates, Mayfield arrested her. The woman, a white, 24-year-old Dallas resident, was taken to Lubbock County Jail and booked, reports said.

In the final raid, two other detectives, Aubrey Stark and Loyd Brown, went to a house in the 300-block of East 34th St. and were met by two women.

The men were advised of prices for services and told other arrangements could be worked out with each girl in the privacy of a room.

Both women were arrested in the private room, reports stated. The two were described as white females, one a 22-year-old Lubbockite, and the other 23 years of age from Ft. Hood.

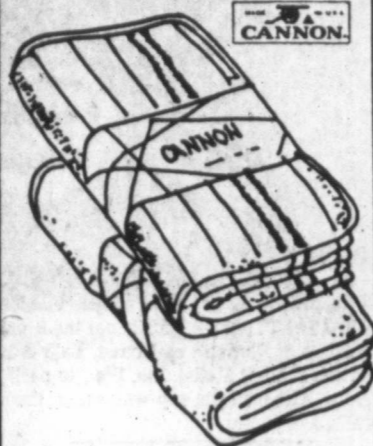
The suit said the workers have been on an illegal work stoppage since Jan. 3 in violation of an existing collective bargaining agreement in force until March 5.

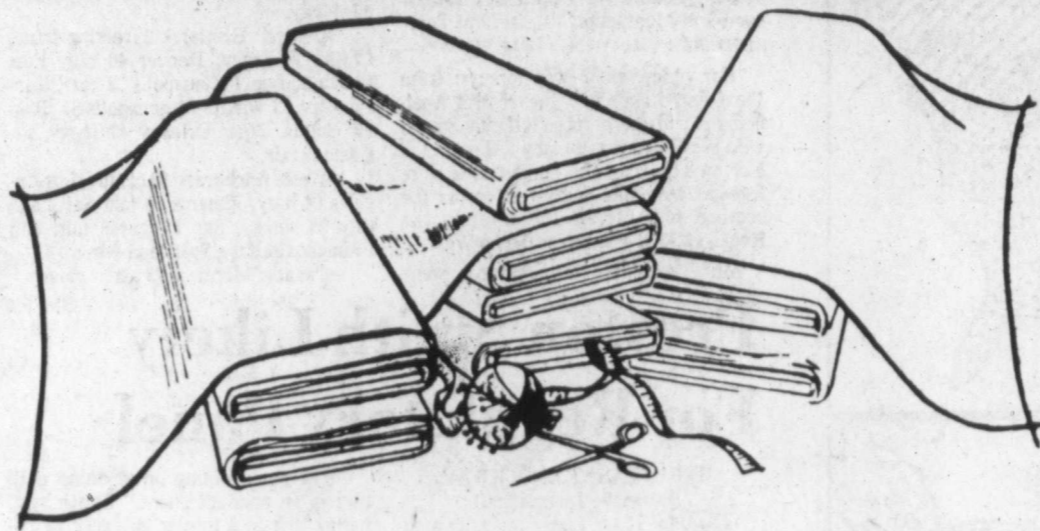

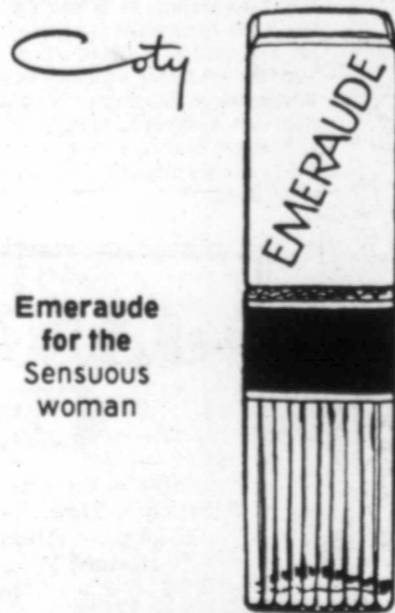

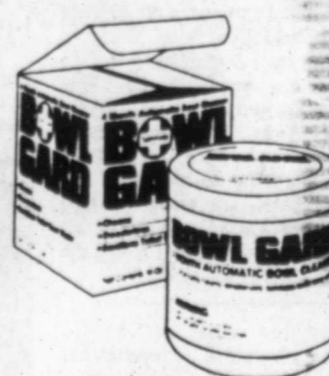

Chrysler, Autoworkers Reach Agreement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Working against a federal board deadline, the Chrysler Corp. Wednesday reached a tentative agreement with the United Auto-workers Union on a package of concessions that may enable the automaker to receive government loan guarantees and stay in business.

A Chrysler spokesman said company and union chiefs initiated the agreement and Chrysler chairman Lee Iacocca took it to the Chrysler Loan Guarantee Board that met at 4 p.m.

UAW President Douglas Fraser immediately carried the proposed agreement to the union negotiating committee at a local hotel, and a spokesman said the panel quickly voted "to give approval to a tentative settlement."

The Chrysler Loan Guarantee Board told Chrysler to present by 4 p.m. Wednesday an acceptable plan to cut the firm's costs by \$1 billion this year to

quality for \$400 million in federal loan guarantees — Money the automaker said it needs to stay in business.

The board oversees the \$1.5 billion in Chrysler loan guarantees authorized by Congress.

Chrysler already has received \$800 million in guarantees.

Treasury Secretary G. William Miller, chairman of the board, told Chrysler Tuesday its original cost-cutting plan was unacceptable because it did not contain enough financial cushions to ensure the automaker's future.

Miller gave Chrysler, its lenders and the UAW an ultimatum to come up with an acceptable plan within 24 hours, in time for the board's meeting, or face the likelihood the board would deny Chrysler's request.

Negotiations began immediately and continued non-stop.

Chrysler spokesman Bill Stempfen

said Wednesday morning he was "sure" the lenders would agree to a new concessions package and was "optimistic" the UAW would accept the plan.

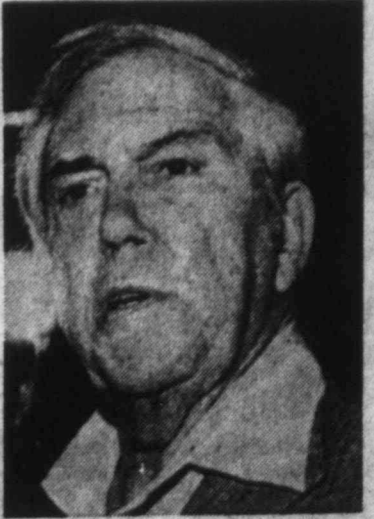
"There's no anxiety about this," Stempfen said.

UAW spokesman Don Stillman said a few hours before the board meeting there was "some progress on some key items" but that some difficult issues remained unresolved.

He said the company had not budged from its original figure of \$673 million in concessions from the union, and the UAW would have to meet that figure if it wanted to keep 70,000 Chrysler employees working.

The automaker originally asked the UAW to accept a 21-month employee wage and benefits freeze and asked its creditors to accept \$573 million in Chrysler preferred stock for its outstanding notes.

The UAW counter-proposal included a larger profit-sharing plan for employees and also preferred stock options in

UAW Proposes Industry-Saving Measures Before Subcommittees

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United Auto Workers Wednesday urged Congress "not to stand idly by and allow the auto industry to go down the tubes," proposing relief measures including a "scrapage" bounty on old cars.

Departing U.S. trade chief Robert Hormats told the Senate trade subcommittee some progress is being made in negotiations with Japan toward relieving the imbalance in car exports.

He said Japan this year will increase its purchases of American-made parts for new car construction, and his office has been urging Japanese automakers to authorize use of American-made replacement parts.

Besides Hormats' report that Toyota, the largest Japanese auto exporter, is now interested in setting up a production plant in the United States, little new came out of the hearing.

Various congressional committees have taken testimony on the problem in the past two years, but this was the first under Republican control.

Coming at a time when the Chrysler Corp. is again on the verge of collapse, it gave the UAW a chance to renew its plea for the government to help the auto industry out of its "wretched condition."

Japanese cars now account for more than 21 percent of the U.S. market. But the U.S. International Trade Commis-

sion, a federal agency, determined late last year that imports were not the main cause of the industry's decline.

"I hope you will agree that Congress should not stand idly by and allow the auto industry to go down the tubes," UAW President Douglas Fraser said in a statement.

The union's chief lobbyist, Stephen Schlossberg, said the autoworkers are asking for "the imposing of some kind of a quota law and encouraging the executive (branch) to begin head-to-head, hard negotiations with the Japanese 14 get some import relief."

Among other UAW suggestions:

- Action to lower interest rates.
- Congressional approval of a tax credit for trading in a used car for a domestic auto that gets at least 6 miles per gallon better efficiency.
- A "scrapage bounty" for people who commit their old gas guzzlers to the scrap heap.

The Swiss Defense Ministry called the practice "unworthy and regrettable," and said a military enquiry was under way.

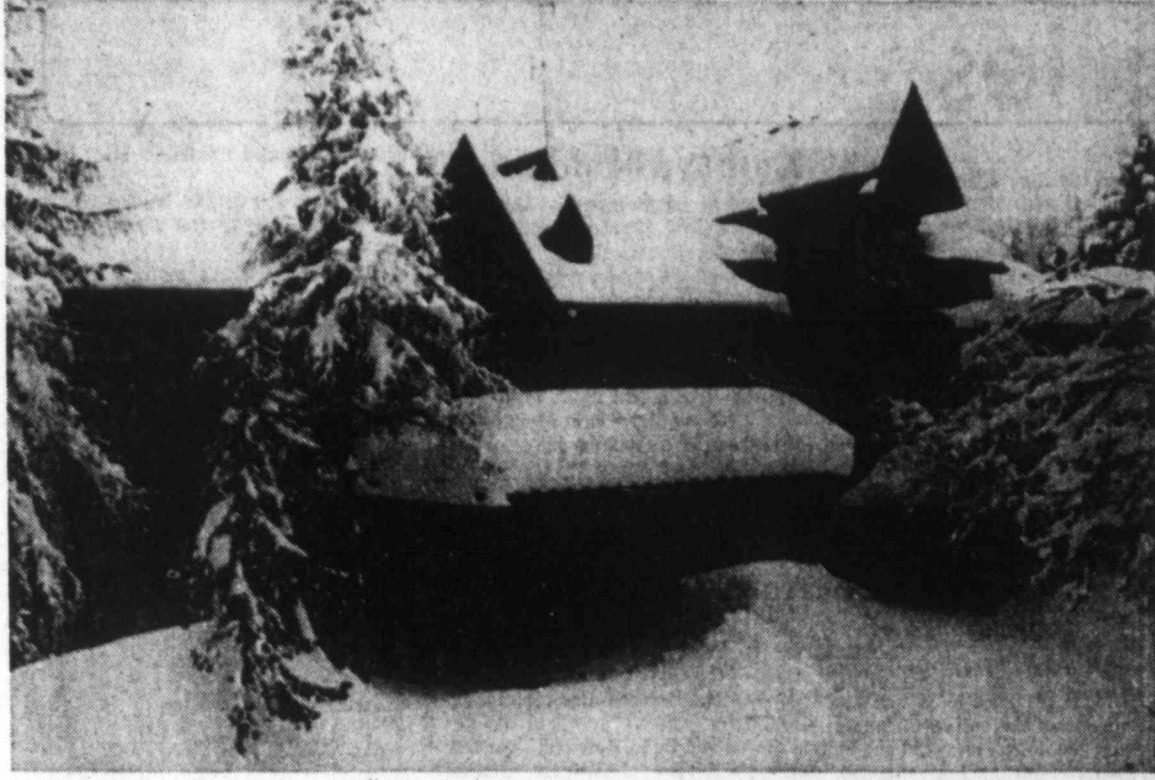

Luis Sunyer Sanchis, one of the richest men in the country, was snatched from his offices in Valencia province Tuesday by five hooded men and a woman armed with pistols and submachine guns.

Relatives and employees appealed on the radio and in the press for Sunyer's freedom.

The trip, the first Iraq has permitted Western reporters to make to this area, also indicated a four-day Iranian effort to recapture Susangerd produced the fiercest fighting since the war began Sept. 22.

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr ordered the counter-offensive after week of criticism that he had failed to block the Iraqi advance. Bani-Sadr also is Iran's military commander-in-chief.

Iraq invaded Iran shortly after it abrogated a 1975 treaty sharing the Shatt-al-Arab waterway, which divides the two oil-producing nations in the south. Iraq claims it will not withdraw from occupied territory until Iran recognizes its sovereignty over the waterway, Iraq's only outlet to the sea.

The Iraqi general commanding the southern sector said Iran and Iraq each threw a full armored division, with each division having some 330 tanks, into the battle for Susangerd.

The general, who asked not to be named, said the Iraqis destroyed or captured two-thirds of the mainly British-supplied armored vehicles committed to the battle and the others retreated.

He refused to give figures on the Iraqi losses. A check of the immediate area noted the charred remains of 23 of Iraq's Soviet-made T-62 tanks. Soldiers said others had been removed.

Iraqi bulldozers were building roads and pits to hide fuel tankers only 300 yards behind Iraqi rocket emplacements.

Sand-colored tractor-trailers were dragging away U.S.-made M60 and British Chieftain tanks the Iraqis had abandoned.

Of more than 40 tanks that could be counted, fewer than a dozen appeared to have taken serious hits.

Packets of grenades, full rocket racks and unopened canisters of tank shells — all with American or British markings — were strewn for miles along the battlefield.

Money From Jenrette's Shoe Tagged Abscam Bribery Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The \$25,000 that former Rep. John Jenrette's estranged wife found in his brown suede shoe included \$100 bills from the payoff to Jenrette's co-defendant in the Abscam case, Justice Department sources said Wednesday.

FBI agents checking the money reported that some of the serial numbers matched those on a list of the \$100 bills used for the \$50,000 Abscam bribe that led a jury to find Jenrette guilty, one source said. It could not be learned how much money matched the Abscam bills.

Another source said the Justice Department planned a careful review of Jenrette's trial testimony based on the new development.

But, cautioning against speculation the government was considering bringing perjury or income tax evasion charges against the South Carolina Democrat, the source said it would be "wildly premature for anyone to conclude anything" at this time about the government's plans in the case.

However, the discovery raised the possibility a perjury prosecution could be considered if a federal judge or an appeals court accepts legal challenges to the Abscam case and overturns Jenrette's bribery conviction on Oct. 7, 1980.

The development also was significant because, although Jenrette was convicted, the government never proved he actually shared the bribe money that undercover agents posing as representatives of a fictitious Arab sheik gave to co-defendant John Stowe.

Stowe was videotaped accepting \$50,000 from an FBI agent. But at their trial, Jenrette denied splitting the bribe and said the only money he took from Stowe was a \$10,000 loan he passed on to his wife's parents.

The other \$40,000 remained unaccounted for even after Jenrette's conviction.

The bills in Jenrette's possession could be used by the government to defend against an appeal.

Jenrette's wife, Rita, said she found the \$25,000 in a closet in the couple's Washington residence Friday. The 29-year-old onetime beauty queen announced Sunday that she planned to di-

vorce Jenrette, 44, after four years of marriage.

The former congressman denied Tuesday that the money was part of the Abscam payment.

Returning to Washington to confer with his lawyer, Jenrette told reporters at National Airport that the \$25,000 came "from a number of sources."

The Justice Department's Civil Division plans to sue members of Congress for return of the Abscam money when and if their convictions are upheld by federal court and sentences are imposed.

Jenrette was defeated in the fall primary and resigned from Congress after the conviction left him liable to expulsion.

New Jersey Prosecutors Blast Tactics Of Abscam Operative

NEW YORK (UPI) — Two New Jersey federal prosecutors criticized the tactics of a key Abscam operative because of a "petty jurisdictional dispute," the top Abscam prosecutor testified Wednesday.

Thomas Puccio, chief attorney for the federal Organized Crime Strike Force for the Eastern District of New York, said the New Jersey officials, Assistant U.S. Attorneys Edward Plaza and Robert Weir, were upset because their office was not given a greater role in the political corruption probe.

"There were a lot of petty criticisms because an investigation that impacted on New Jersey — their domain, so to speak — was being handled in New York," Puccio said. "It was a petty jurisdictional dispute."

Puccio testified in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn at a hearing on a motion by seven Abscam defendants who are trying to have their convictions overturned on the grounds of government misconduct and entrapment.

Plaza and Weir criticized Abscam operative Melvin Weinberg for putting words in the mouth of Sen. Harrison Williams, D-N.J., who is awaiting trial on Abscam bribery and conspiracy charges.

The New Jersey prosecutors' criticism involved a taperecorded meeting on June 28, 1979, at which Weinberg told Williams to "blow your own horn" when he met a phony Arab sheik.

Puccio said there was an attempt to give the U.S. Attorney's office in New Jersey a greater role in Abscam but "it proved unworkable because of the way Plaza and Weir interacted with the undercover people."

Puccio said the two "did not get along" with Weinberg or FBI Agent Anthony Amoroso, and had "a disruptive influence" on the probe.

"The chemistry between them and the FBI was very bad," Puccio added. "Plaza, especially, had become very abusive to Mr. Weinberg."

Fire Station Bids Solicited

HOBBS, N.M. — A new fire substation, estimated to cost approximately \$506,000, is expected to be constructed in the northwest section of Hobbs with design bids expected by mid-May and construction completed by the end of January next year, according to Hobbs City Manager Joe Harvey.

As originally proposed in 1975, Harvey said, the cost to construct a new fire substation was estimated at some \$225,000 with an additional \$90,000 for pumper unit and \$25,000 for a new ambulance, for a total cost of \$342,000.

"No additional bond issues or added taxes will be necessary to construct the new fire substation," Harvey said, adding that a new station was needed at the proposed location because more than 29 percent of the fires in the past five years in Hobbs have been in the northwest quadrant of the city.

Additionally, he said, more than 40 percent of the ambulance runs also were in that section.

Plans call for placing a ladder truck at the new location, Harvey said, as the recent construction of several multi-story buildings in the city create a need for such a truck. Two ambulances are expected to be located at the new station.

The city manager also noted that instead of purchasing new fire trucks, plans are in the works to renovate and overhaul existing fire trucks, which are mostly models in the 1960 era. He said that one existing truck had recently been converted to diesel and is giving good service.

Area Solon Opposed Clayton Bid

State Rep. Froy Salinas of Lubbock was one of only 21 representatives to vote against the re-election of House Speaker Bill Clayton, he said Wednesday, because he is philosophically opposed to anyone serving more than two terms as speaker.

Clayton, a Springlake farmer, won an unprecedented fourth term as speaker Tuesday with 120 of the 150 House members supporting him.

"I think it's bad public policy to have a person serve more than two terms," Salinas said. "The main reason is that it's an office that is very powerful, and he is not directly answerable to the people."

"If the people voted on the office directly, if it was a statewide office, I wouldn't have any objection to the speaker being speaker for life."

"I don't have anything against him," he added. "I think he's a good guy. But I don't think he should be speaker for life."

Salinas, a third-term Democrat representing District 75-B, said he is not worried that his vote against Clayton will damage his effectiveness.

"I think effectiveness is a question of competence," he said. "I think a person who's competent doesn't have to worry about being effective."

Asked if he is concerned about committee assignments, he said, "I'll work wherever he puts me. I'll learn what that committee's functions are and do the best I can on it."

Salinas served on the House Natural Resources and Liquor Regulations committees in the 1979 session of the Legislature.

He declined to speculate on how much support Clayton would have for a fifth term, which Clayton has said in recent days he might seek, but the Lubbock legislator and insurance man said Clay-

Buckle Saves Clerk From Bullet

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Buzz Warner, 52, was working in the rear of a convenience store when a man walked in wearing a ski mask and carrying a pistol and ordered him to hand over the money from the cash register.

"Go to hell!" Warner told the bandit, at first thinking the man was making an un-humorous joke.

But the robber fired one shot at the store clerk's belly from across the counter at point-blank range.

"I clutched my stomach. It was like someone hitting me with a fist," Warner said.

Crouching and holding his waist, Warner watched the young gunman run from the store. Then he pulled his hands

away from his abdomen, expecting to find blood.

Instead, he found a chunk of leather missing from his belt buckle. "It was just messed up a little," said Warner, who was not injured in the Tuesday holdup attempt.

The spent bullet ricocheted from the metal shank of the buckle, which was covered on both sides by tooled leather, and was found laying on the glass countertop.

Warner said he had worked at the store for about six weeks without problems. He said he would never forget the day two years ago when he bought the belt buckle.

"I've never been a day without it," he smiled. "Thank God I had it on then."

HINTS FROM HELOISE:

Proper Seasoning Of Iron Skillet Prevents Food From Sticking

DEAR HELOISE: I have a small iron skillet that's just right for one person. It's been used a great deal, but lately food sticks so much that I seem to leave more than I take out. I know you've printed the remedy for this in your column several times, but would it be possible to print it again?—M.F.B.

taking care of it. But once we overheat it, or leave it in contact with water too long, and rust sets in, then we've got to get back to the basics and re-season that pot or skillet. Properly seasoning your skillet will eliminate sticking, discoloration of food, that off-taste and rusting. To season, first, thoroughly wash the skillet in hot, soapy water. Dry thoroughly. Turn your oven to about 300 degrees, generously rub the pan with salt-free fat

(suet is good) and let it heat in the oven for about two hours. Careful now when removing that hot pan from the oven! Be sure and use adequate potholders, 'cause cast iron can really absorb the heat! Wipe off any remaining fat with a paper towel, and you should have a trouble-free cooking utensil. When you get ready to wash that iron pot, just use soapy water, being sure to dry it thoroughly. Rub lightly with a little cooking oil before storing. Never put cast iron in your dishwasher—the detergent is too harsh. If a little scrubbing is needed, use a soap-free scrubber like nylon net or plastic mesh. If the pan begins to get discolored or sticks again, just re-season it from time to time.

Book Examines Human Energy

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — There's no energy crisis in Flora Davis' life. Miss Davis is as worried about gasoline supplies and electricity prices as the average person, but that's not the type of energy that really interests her. What excites her is the ability to do things, overcome depression — "how to tap your body's natural energy to look better, feel better, and do more — every day of your life," or so says the dust jacket of her latest book, "Living Alive!"

In it, Miss Davis, a 15-year veteran of books and articles on medical and psychological subjects, examines the effects of diet, sex, sleep, exercise, biorhythm, barometric pressure and more. "There's nervous energy and constructive energy ... Nervous energy is spinning your wheels," Miss Davis said in a recent interview.

It was a cold, sunny morning, after breakfast, and she had enjoyed just the right amount of sleep. Her energy level was high. Late afternoons bring a slump, and suggests a 20-minute re-charging nap.

"Would you like some coffee?" she asked. The book says coffee is "a mild upper." No ashtrays. Cigarettes are "downers."

"I follow my own advice, but not all advice applies to everybody. ... I follow what helps me," said Miss Davis, who was a Redbook ghost-writer for the sex researchers Masters and Johnson. "Living Alive!" is "doing respectfully well. Doubleday says it'll be part of the back list steady sales over a period of time," said the energy expert, who has produced two other popular-sales books, some textbooks and numerous self-help magazine articles.

Miss Davis doesn't inject her own philosophy into the writing, preferring instead to translate into fathomable English the research and conclusions of a variety of experts.

But she said she tries out their theories on herself. And sometimes they don't work.

"Protein sets off a biochemical reaction," she said, referring to "brain chemistry."

"So when we get up and eat a big, starchy breakfast, we're putting ourselves back to sleep. And steak at night wakes you up when you want to wind down."

"I tried doing days backwards — steak for breakfast and cereal at night. I couldn't stand it," she said. The household returned to traditional meals.

Energy didn't always concern Miss Davis. "In a vague sort of way, I heard for years that if you blocked certain emotions, you blocked energy."

Now she advocates wipeout fantasy therapy for the objects of repressed anger. "Not only do you have to do the in, but dispose of the body," she said. "Grind them up and scatter them over the back lawn or something or it will come back."

Everyone is divided into "larks and owls," the terms for people who perform best during the day or at night, and "sprinters, hurdlers, trotters and strollers," which describes the gait of energy levels.

Weather also contributes to energy, she said, with a rising barometer better than a falling one. "but no one asks students what weather they want to take the Scholastic Aptitude Tests, although they'd do better on a nice day," she said.

"September is also the psychological New Year," Miss Davis continued. "Most of us just hang in there through the winter. People who ski say, 'Hooray, it snowed.' I say, 'I have to drive in that stuff.'"

Miss Davis said she had "a very personal interest" in the subject. "I was involved with a man with an enormous amount of energy. Much more than I had and I thought maybe something was wrong."

"He never got jet lag and got along on four hours' sleep," said the mother of two children.

How did it work out? "Just fine, he's out skiing with Jeff and Rebecca. I didn't feel like going along."

Foley is hearing the case of John Kirch, who is accused of first-degree murder in the shooting of Winona County sheriff's Deputy John Schneider last September.

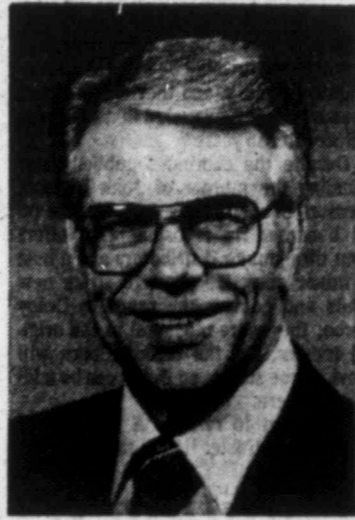
The order restricts artist Frances Clark from making sketches of Kirch or members of his family. The sketches were being broadcast with the station's news reports on the trial.

Great Lines From Films Offered In New Book

NEW YORK (AP) — Once I read the script of a really awful Foreign Legion movie, "March or Die." It contained this line: "You assured me, DuPont, that there would be no turmoil in Morocco."

It's oddly soothing to say this line aloud, particularly in a crowded elevator. My only regret is that it's not included in a fine new book just out, "The Movie Quote Book."

But then, author Harry Hain, a mild-mannered reporter for a great metropolitan daily here, deliberately shunned lousy dialogue when choosing 2,876 quotes from 571 films for his tome.

"I wanted to celebrate screenwriters, not put them down," says Hain, a Texan who came here in 1975 to write about films and inmates thereof after 10 years of movie-reviewing at the Nashville Tennessean.

His criteria for quotation in "The Movie Quote Book," he says, is that the lines be famous, or funny, or memorable. He's put them into 373 categories, such as:

•CHILDREN: "Well, there won't be no pitter of little feet in my house — unless I was to rent some mice." (A forlorn Peggy Lee in "Pete Kelly's Blues.")

•DYING WORDS: "Cancel my appointments." (Sylvia Sidney in "Summer Wishes, Summer Dreams.")

•ELEPHANTS: "One morning I shot an elephant in my pajamas. How he got into my pajamas I'll never know." (Groucho Marx in "Animal Crackers.")

•GOOD-BYES: "So long. So long, you ancient pelican." (Regis Toomey, as John Wayne limps away in "The High and the Mighty.")

•MARRIAGE: "Getting married is serious business. It's kinda formal, like funerals or playing stud poker." (William Gargan in "They Knew What They Wanted.")

•TELEPHONE SCENES: "Hello. Is this someone with good news or money? No? Good-bye." (Jason Robards in "A Thousand Clowns.")

•VIOLENCE: "I caught the black-jack right behind my ear. A black pool opened at my feet. I dived in. It had no bottom." (Richard Powell in "Farewell, My Lovely.")

It may seem odd that a guy saves movie quotes the way some guys save twine. But quote-keeper Hain says he's never tossed out any of those he's jotted down. One day he got to thinking about them.

This caused the book, fleshed out with more quotes from the more elderly movies you get late at night on TV, if you're lucky. The old quotes often were matched against the old scripts.

They didn't always match, he notes, so he used what actually was said in the film. Being a movie buff helped in other ways.

A prime example: He didn't need to see "Casablanca" again or check the script to know that Humphrey Bogart never said, "Play it again, Sam" to the piano player. Never happened.

The closest we get to that line is where Bogie's old flame, Ingrid Bergman, comes unexpectedly into Bogie's bar and says, "Play it, Sam. Play 'As Time Goes By.'"

And, of course, later on Bogie drunkenly sighs: "Of all the gin joints in all the world, she walks into mine."

All that is in Hain's "The Movie Quote Book," a fine work, a good read. But I sure wish he'd find it in his heart to include in future editions one of the best lines of all time.

It goes: "You assured me, DuPont, that there would be no turmoil in Morocco."

Parker, Papale Follow Similar Pattern

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — One is new to the Philadelphia Eagles. The other's tenure has run out.

One will be going home as the starting wide receiver when the Eagles travel to New Orleans for Super Bowl XV Jan. 25 against the Oakland Raiders. The other will be going on business.

But Rodney Parker and Vince Papale have something in common — both are among the unheralded free agents who have shown the ability and desire required by coach Dick Vermeil in his resurrection of the Eagles from the bottom of the National Football League over the

past five years.

"You know, I really appreciate the free-agent guy who does something," Vermeil said of Parker earlier this season. "To see somebody achieve something he's not supposed to get done — that just makes a coach feel super."

Papale, 34, came to the Eagles in 1976, a wide receiver without college experience who had played semipro ball at 27 and two years with the Philadelphia Bell of the World Football League.

"I knew my limitations, but I thought that work and enthusiasm could make the difference," Papale said.

It did, and Papale, playing with abandon on special teams, became Philadelphia's real-life "Rocky," as he made the grade with the Eagles for three seasons.

But an injury and the rebuilding of the team through improved drafting ended Papale's dream come true during an exhibition game in August 1979. A newspaper headline said, "Goodbye Rocky."

Papale has remained close to the team and was present Monday when Vermeil held his weekly press conference, this time after the Eagles had beaten the Dallas Cowboys 20-7 for the National Football Conference championship.

"Vince Papale and guys like him helped build the foundation of this football team," said Vermeil, whose teams have posted 4-10, 5-9, 9-7, 11-5 and 12-4 records in his five years at the helm.

Parker, 27, was cut at the end of training camp this year and took a job as a deputy sheriff in New Orleans. The wide receiver, who had played two seasons in the Canadian Football League after being released by Atlanta as a rookie in 1978, rejoined the Eagles Sept. 30 when Scott Fitzkee broke his left foot.

Parker made important catches against Chicago, Washington and San

Diego. In the final regular-season game against the Cowboys Dec. 21, he caught four passes, including a 30-yard touchdown pass that reduced the Cowboys' margin to less than 25 points, insuring the Eagles' division title.

Starter Charley Smith suffered a broken jaw in the game, and the recently activated Fitzkee broke his foot again in the Eagles' 31-16 playoff victory over Minnesota.

So as the Eagles readied for the conference championship, Parker prepared to start. "Now the burden was on me. When your number's called, be ready," he said.

Raiders Riveted By Renegades

OAKLAND (AP) — Several rejects and renegades have helped make the Oakland Raiders what they are today — a team heading for Super Bowl XV.

"If you can't do it at Oakland, you can't do it anywhere because this is the last stop," says John Matuszak.

Quarterback Jim Plunkett, free safety Burgess Owens, linebacker Bob Nelson, defensive end Cedrick Hardman and cornerback Dwayne O'Steen, along with Matuszak, are among the current Raiders whose market value was considered small or nothing recently.

"I think the San Francisco 49ers got a sixth-round draft choice for me," 11-year veteran Hardman says. "They didn't want the draft choice as much as they wanted to get rid of me."

Plunkett, of course, is the most impressive of the team's reclamation projects. He was released by the 49ers three years ago and as Raiders' boss Al Davis recalls, "was a mixed-up and dispirited guy."

Defensive lineman Matuszak was a free agent, unwanted and considered uncontrollable by other National Football League teams, before he joined the Raiders.

"No other team would touch me," Matuszak recalled as the Raiders began preparing to meet the Philadelphia Eagles in New Orleans.

At Davis, the Raiders' managing general partner, would and did deal with Matuszak, however. He signed him just before the 1976 season opener, primarily

to add defensive line depth.

Matuszak became a starter quickly because of a series of injuries on the team which went on to win Super Bowl XI 33-14 over Minnesota.

"I'm proud of John. He's a friend now, and I hope we've made more than a great football player out of him," Davis said.

"We are good friends, and I've thanked him," said Matuszak. "With Al, you tell him something once and it's there. He knows how I feel without me saying it over and over."

Over the years, many players considered over the hill elsewhere have helped the Raiders win. George Blanda, pushing 40 when he came to Oakland, was pushing 50 when he retired as the NFL's

all-time leading scorer.

Davis has missed a few times, such as with his acquisition of Bubba Smith, the defensive lineman unable to regain All-Pro after coming to Oakland in 1973. But an NFL-record 16 consecutive winning seasons attests to Davis' general success.

"He's so far ahead of everyone else in football that it's pitiful," said Hardman.

Hardman has been used as a "designated pass rusher," as he describes it, in his first season with the Raiders. He plays in most passing situations, which meant virtually all the way last Sunday in the 34-27 victory over pass-happy San Diego in the AFC title game.

NFL Officials Admit Difficulty In Halting Super Bowl Scalping

NEW YORK (AP) — When it comes to the Super Bowl, the price of a ticket is apt to be whatever the market will bear, and the National Football League says it is exceedingly hard to stop the scalping.

In response to a published report that NFL players, coaches, team officials and ticket scalpers are enmeshed in a multimillion dollar black-market business, a league spokesman said Wednesday:

"The resale of Super Bowl tickets at inflated prices after their initial allocation has been a growing phenomenon. It is extremely difficult to control, but will be reviewed by the league at its annual March meeting."

The face value of a ticket is \$40, but resales go for as much as \$500 apiece, the price paid by corporations and high-rollers for the chance to be in on one of the biggest annual single-day events in sports.

In some states, selling tickets for more than their face value or for more than a set percentage above face value is illegal — but in many states it is not. That's the case in California, site of Super Bowl XIV. Before last year's game, dozens of newspaper ads offered top dollar for tickets.

In New Orleans, where Super Bowl XV will be played Jan. 25 between Philadelphia and Oakland, ticket scalping is illegal. But people are getting around the law by charging \$40 per ticket plus a "service fee" for the work expended to get the tickets, or charging the face value of the ticket but requiring, along with it, the purchase of a nearly worthless item or trinket for, say, \$10 apiece.

The NFL said that for the last three years, commissioner Pete Rozelle's office has sent out a list of recommendations for the clubs' distribution of tickets.

Among the guidelines, it is suggested that clubs set a firm policy regarding the number of tickets available to players, coaches and staff members, with four as the maximum on non-participating clubs and 15 for participating clubs (the Eagles and Raiders this year). Players and other employees on participating teams now are required to sign a form stating they will not profit from the sale of tickets.

Rozelle was quoted in the story in the Los Angeles Times as saying that, when he brought up the subject of the NFL controlling ticket distribution, the team owners said they didn't want to "have someone from the league office come in" to take over the operation.

According to the published report, scalpers and travel agents have organized "ticket captains" throughout the country to purchase tickets. Those captains resell them at a profit to ticket brokers.

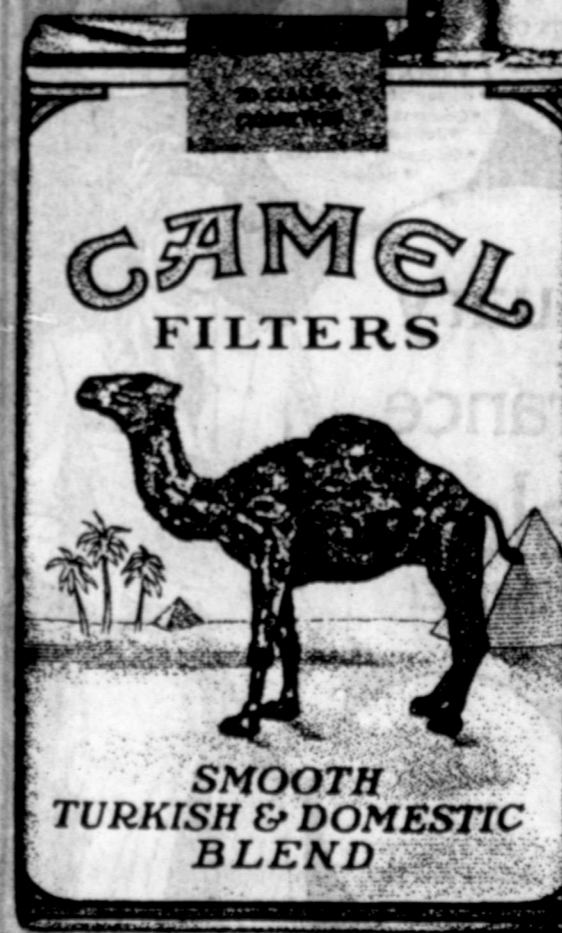

Police Chief Claims 'Shoot To Kill' Policy Gaining Support

TERRE HAUTE, Ind (AP) — Police Chief Gerald Loudermilk says his new "shoot to kill" policy is finding strong support nationwide.

"I've had a steady stream of letters and phone calls commending me, and not a single negative one," he said.

Loudermilk announced last week that he had revised his department's deadly force policy to give officers broader use of guns because he was fed up with rising

crime and restraints on police in dealing with criminals.

"If it boils down that it's us against them, I want it to be us," said Loudermilk, who has been police chief for about a year in this city of 65,000 on the Indiana-Illinois border.

He said Tuesday he had received about two dozen letters from California, Kansas, Florida, Arkansas and Louisiana, as well as from several Indiana towns.

Several letters came from ministers and nearly half were from former law enforcement officers, he said.

A former policeman from Sacramento, Calif., wrote: "I commend you for your stand against the criminals. A policeman knows if there is no reason to use his gun, that he will leave it in his holster."

Under the old policy, Loudermilk said, "there was always a question in a

police officer's mind as to whether or not he would get in trouble if he used his gun.

"That's eliminated now and we hope the new policy will deter criminals."

Loudermilk says the issue of shooting to kill has been blown out of proportion by publicity.

"Our policy is the same as Evansville's," he said. "Our officers are well-trained and they are not trigger happy.

They won't use their guns if they don't have to. And they won't jeopardize an innocent bystander by using them."

The Evansville Police Department's guidelines on deadly force should not be classified as a "shoot to kill" policy, Inspector James Klemm said Wednesday.

As early as 1974 he said, Evansville officers have been advised that when all other means fail and it becomes neces-

sary for an officer to use his gun, "shooting to wound or shooting to scare has no place in effective police work."

But "nowhere does it say they have to shoot to kill," he said.

"People who say policemen are trained to wound are crazy," he said. "Deliberately shooting a gun out of someone's hand, that's a TV specialty. You shoot to stop 'em. You shoot to keep from being killed."
