Hunts Bidding For Geothermal Energy Control

family of Texas, in a bid to dominate America's geothermal resources, has obtained federal leases making them the biggest developers of the burgeoning energy source, The Washington Post said

The family in the past has been accused of trying to corner the markets in soybeans and, most recently, in silver.

Now, the Post said, Hunt family

tions have staked claims on roughly onesixth of all federal land leased for geothermal power exploration.

Quoting Interior Department records, the Post said the Hunts hold 252 of the 1,-600 geothermal leases issued by the Bureau of Land Management, which oversees development of resources on federal

The leases give the Hunts control over

federally leased geothermal land, it said.

Geothermal energy is the power of the hot water, steam and molten rock trapped beneath the earth's surface. It is the power that keeps Old Faithful spouting and, in less frequent and vastly larger eruptions, causes volcanoes like Mount St. Helens to become active.

Harnessed geothermal energy already generates much of San Francisco's elec-

It said a number of major oil compa nies are getting into geothermal energy, but the Hunts' holdings are already three times as big as any of theirs.

'Found Money' Case Goes To Trial Today

WACO (AP) — A South Texan who dug up \$481,816 on his father's farm in 1977 will be the first witness, today, as the state of Texas lays its claim to the

Assistant Texas Attorney General David Bragg said, Friday, that James Dean Bridges, now 19, dug up the money after a fight with his father. Bridges and Percy Garcia, now 20, stuffed the money into two suitcases and went on a

short-lived spending spree that ended when they ran a red light here.

The money was confiscated by police and the legal battle for the case began.
The state claims it as "mislaid" money, to be held in state coffers until it is claimed. McLennan County also wants it.

Internal Revenue Wants Its Cut
The city of Waco wants to recover \$35,000 it spent in legal fees.
Garcia and Bridges say the money is theirs. The Internal Revenue Service

Interest adding up to \$155,939 has been added to the money since it was put in two Waco banks.

Red Congress Eyes Rewards, Ousters

MOSCOW (UPI) - The Soviet Communist Party congress has sent its offer of a summit to Ronald Reagan and approved the nation's economic blueprint. On Monday, it will decide which of its leaders to purge and which to reward.

Officially the 5,002 delegates to the congress took the day off, Sunday, after a week of sessions that lasted six to 12

One of their last jobs before adjourning. Tuesday, will be to select the membership of the ruling Politburo and sub-

ordinate bodies such as the Central Com-Brezhnev Safe

Leonid Brezhnev's position as party general secretary is safe, Western analysts agree, and to a large extent he will determine what, if any, changes are made in the Politburo, composed of the Soviet Union's 14 most powerful men.

Kremlinologists think the most likely to leave is Arvid Pelshe, the 82-year-old Latvian in charge of insuring party control in all major aspects of Soviet life.

Pelshe is the oldest member of the geriatric Polithuro, and his retirement unlike most, could well be voluntary, Western diplomats think

'He is a political nonentity," said one senior diplomat, recently,

Despite one German press report that Andrei Gromyko would retire, there is no indication that the polished, 71-yearold foreign minister is ready to give up his job as the Kremlin's top diplomat.

There also was speculation that Alexei I. Shibaev, who leads the All-Central Council of Trade Unions, would be elevated to the Politburo as either a full or non-voting member. Apple Polishing

Shibaev caught Brezhnev's eye in 1966 when he referred in a speech to the party first secretary as the leader of the Polit-

That was only two years after Brezhnev had replaced Nikita Khrushchev, and his dominance in the Soviet leadership was not yet fully established.

There was no doubt last week, however, that Brezhnev was in control of all aspacts of Soviet policy.

His keynote address, last Monday, proposed a face-to-face summit with President Reagan to improve U.S. Soviet relations. It also gave a hazy indication that the Soviets might be willing to renegotiate the SALT II treaty and open talks

on other nuclear weapon reductions.

Although Prime Minister Nikolai Tik-

honov formally presented the 11th fiveyear plan to the congress, Friday, his report contained nothing that Brezhnev had not already outlined.

During the weekend. Brezhnev met with key leaders of East Bloc countries. including East Germany's Erich Honecker and Janos Kadar of Hungary. The content of their discussions was

not made public, but they almost certainly included the labor crisis in Poland. where the emergence of the Solidarity independent union has sent shudders through the communist world.



Khomeini Urges Peace Mission To Join War

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Iranian ruler Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini beseeched an Islamic peace-seeking mission Sunday to join the fight against Iraqi invaders, saying "We must all come un-der the banner of Islam not only in words but in action," Iran's official news media reported

Iran's Pars news agency said the 12-member delegation, including longtime Khomeini ally Yasser Arafat of the Palestine Liberation Organization, cut short its Tehran visit by a day and headed to the Iraqi capital of Baghdad.

There was no indication of what the mission may have achieved in its 11/2-day visit to Tehran, but Pars quoted Arafat as saying "I am optimistic." But it said

others refused to comment directly, lest they jeopardize the impartiality of their efforts.

Tehran Radio said Khomeini told the Islamic Conference delegates at his Husseinat Jamaran Mosque headquarters in the Iranian capital:

"If you have good will and have come here to put out the fire, then you must sit in judgment. You must visit the border areas. You must see the other side as well as this side. If you come to the conclusion that we have launched the aggression, then you must fight us. If you conclude that they launched the aggression, you must fight them.

Khomeini told the delegation Iran has lost 60,000 "martyrs" in the 23-week-old war and that 100,000 people have become disabled and 1.5 million were war refu-

"Our oppressed nation has been attacked because it wants to return to Islam and the Islamic way of thinking and to remove the hands of those acting contrary to the principles of Islam," Pars quoted Khomeini as telling the mission. We all must come under the banner of Islam not only in words, but in action."

Pars said Arafat, who has known Khomeini since his days of exile in Iraq in the 1960s, introduced the Islamic delegates. Their mission was formulated in January at the Islamic Conference in Taif, Saudi Arabia, which Iran boycotted.

Embassy Hints Iranian Involvement In Deaths

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The Iraqi Embassy here hinted that supporters of Iran were behind the assassination of two Iraqi staff members, and said it had no knowledge of the group that has claimed responsibility, the independent newspaper al-Anhar reported Sunday.

The newspaper carried an Iraqi Embassy statement that it no knowledge of the "Martyr Ali Nasser Organization," said it carried out the machine-gun killings Friday of two embassy accountants.

The claim was made by an anonymous telephone caller who told the newspaper the killings were to avenge the death of "Ali Nasser" allegedly at the hands of Iraqi secret service agents.

The Iraqi Embassy said the statement was intended to "hide the true identities of the culprits.

It mentioned the recent visit to Lebanon by "suspect delegations" which it said had "allies on the Lebanese scene." This appeared to be a reference to an Iranian delegation that visited the Lebanese capital last week although the statement did not mention Iran by name.

The Iraqi statement said the delega-

tions had come to "attack the people, government and army of Iraq in an at-

tempt to cover their defeats. The Iraqi Embassy has been the target of frequent attacks since the Iran-Iraq war broke out Sept. 22. Iran's revolutionary regime of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini commands a larg following among Lebanon's 950,000 Moslem Shiites who make up the largest single sect in this half-Moslem, half-Christian Arab nation of 3 million.

Angry Israeli Settlers Block Highway

YAMIT, Occupied Sinai (AP) - The Egypt-Israel highway, a symbol of peace between the two former enemies, was blocked Sunday by about 100 angry Israeli settlers involved in a money dispute with their government.

During the four-hour protest, police arrested nine settlers for unauthorized possession of weapons and illegal assembly, officials reported.

The settlers set fire to an old pickup truck and some tires on the road in protest over a government decision to tax the money they are getting in compensation for giving up their homes when Israel relinquishes the rest of the Sinai Desert in April 1982.

Israel is returning the Sinai, which it captured during the 1967 Middle East War, to Egypt as part of the U.S.-sponsored peace treaty.

The government last year approved payments of \$200,000 to \$360,000 for farms and houses in the northeastern corner of Sinai that will have to be evacuated. It decided to impose the tax following public outcry at the size of the compensation

About 100 of the area's 3,500 settlers braved rain and cold to take part in the road blockade.

Several Hundred March In Protest Of Murders

people marched single-file through the streets of Atlanta Sunday to dramatize their outrage over the slayings of 19 black children and the disappearance of two

The march, sponsored by the Association of Christian Student Leaders, was billed as a prelude to a "national save the youth walkathon" on March 15 in Atlan-

The silent demonstrators walked the one mile from the Georgia Capitol to the Martin Luther King Jr. chapel at More-house College, where they attended a rally and a vesper service for the families of the dead and missing children.

The Rev. David Smith, president of the association, said the march was "to signify how our children have met their deaths, one by one.

The city of Atlanta is under siege Young children are being snatched into eternity at the rate of one a month for the past 19 months," Smith said.

Smith, a Boston University theology student, said the U.S. Justice Department should "act with all deliberate speed rather than all deliberation and no

federal aid to help the investigation.

Dr. Bernard Lafayette of St. Louis, founder of the National Black Student Leadership Consultation, said Sunday's march and rally by mostly young people signified an end to the apathy that many have seen on college campuses.

Student leaders who sponsored the march, he said, decided they "cannot stand by silently and watch our young children coil in fear."

Another prayer vigil lasting 24 hours ended Saturday and one participant said the service was a cry for God's help to solve the baffling crimes.

"It has been a very draining experience. No answers have been put forth. Just one big cry for help," said Judy Moore, who remained in the Cathedral of St. Philip for the entire service.

A volunteer search for clues in the cases drew about 400 people to a Cobb County area bordering the city Saturday. but nothing significant was found.

It was the first weekend search in the county, where one of the child victims was found, and the 20th search by volun-

The discovery of some bones Saturday caused police to rope off the area, but a medical examiner called to the scene said the bones were the remains of a large dog.

Meanwhile, Police Chief George Napper denied he has been shoved aside since a special investigation into the deaths was started.

Public Safety Commissioner Lee P. Brown has announced that the special 7month-old unit would be separated from the normal chain of police command and report directly to him rather than to Nap-

'I'm still chief, still doing my job," says Napper. "I was in on the discussions about the changes in the task force when they were being considered, and I agreed with the changes.

"Somebody's got to stay on top of the day-to-day operation of the bureau and the millions of things that have to be attended to. I'm the police chief. The job falls on me," he said

In Baltimore, Camille Bell, the mother of one of the slain children, blamed "apathetic" police for losing valuable clues when the first murders occurred al-





'About Time' For Crackdown

THE REACTION of the typical law-abiding citizen to a tougher policy on the forfeiture of bail bonds by criminal defendants who don't show up for trial can be summed up in three words: "It's about time."
Dist. Atty. John Montford told bail bonds-

men last week that his office will be more diligent in the future in seeking final judgments on bond forfeitures ordered by the

An Avalanche-Journal study several weeks ago showed that less than \$4,000 had been collected by Lubbock County last year on bond forfeitures.

All that's changing, Assistant Dist. Atty. Yvonne Faulks told the Lubbock County Bail Bond Board: The prosecutor's office had obtained final judgments on approximately \$64,450 in felony bond forfeitures in the lat-

AS DISTRICT JUDGE Tom Clinton noted. Montford inherited the lackadaisical attitude toward making the bondsmen pay up when their clients don't show up.

"We never saw any final judgments before John came in" as district attorney, Judge Clinton said

He added that "the bail bond was never intended as a means of the county making money" but is, rather, merely a way to assure that the defendant appears in court to answer to the charges against him.

This means that, when the accused doesn't show, the bail bond has not done it's job: And, if it's not doing the job, then it should be forfeited.

In that regard, we're not so sure Montford isn't planning still to be too lenient with the bondsmen. He said his main priority in cases of forfeitures still will be to have the defendant returned for trial-which is, of course, the right priority.

BUT THE DAMAGE won't be fully rectified if the bondsman subsequently gets his client into court

There still will have been a delay that has slowed the wheels of justice, helped to keep the courts clogged and perhaps made it more difficult to keep on tap witnesses and evidence needed to successfully prosecute the

The bondsmen, who make good money out of the system, should have the responsibility of either making certain the defendant appears when he's supposed to or of forfeiting the bond money

"Don't mickey mouse us," Judge Clinton warned the bondsmen, appropriately.

This is just one of the battles in a larger war on crime but it is one which the prosecutors and the courts can win on behalf of the people, if only they'll use the weapons at their command.

THE AVERAGE citizen may not think there is such he or she can do to combat the surging crime wave in Lubbock. But there is.

It's time we returned to the old custom of the West of "looking after one another...

IN RECENT days, much of the city has been apprehensive and in some instances almost near panic as a result of random snipers firing at motorists or into homes.



Indeed, the Washingtonian of whatever measure of bravery, begins yearning for spring the day winter is ushered in. For when snow falls, the city is full of people, who, like T.S. Eliot's J. Alfred Prufrock, wonder if they dare to eat a peach.

Newspapers, radio and television recite the harrowing experiences of those hardy citizens who challenged the streets and highways

SCHOOLS ARE closed. PTA meetings and potluck suppers are postponed. Bus drivers are authorized to bring their vehicles to a halt and abandon their passengers if they decide a snow-sprinkled thoroughfare poses a danger to life and limb.

The Civil Service Commission proudly announces that 58 percent of the city's federal workers made it to their jobs by noon. Those who didn't are granted hardship leave; so are those who patriotically left work early to avoid contributing to traffic jams.

In Washington, even a forecast predicting flurnes sends officialdom and citizenry alike into a tizzy of mapping contingency plans.

"HOW'S THE driving?" a Washingtonian will ask nervously of a dauntless neighbor at the wheel who made it two blocks to the drugstore over a lightly powdered street.

'Not too bad," is the reply. "But don't use your car unless you have to. After a couple of inches of snow fell in late December. I found picturesque the advice given to

alarmed residents of the metropolitan area. "Don't drive unless absolutely necessary," said an official in the Bureau of Traffic Engineering and Operations. "If you do drive, use the lowest gear possible. Don't brake unless you have to When you do brake, use a short, light, pumping motion." And finally, "Keep both hands on the

I don't know what the folks back in my New England hometown would say about all this. Kids up there apparently are born with a capacity for driving in snow and on ice, conditions which prevail from late November to early April.

INDEED, IN my day snow was annoying only because boys were awakened an hour early to remove it from sidewalks and driveways. Walking to school was an adventure, not a misfortune.

No school I ever attended closed because of too much snow. If school furnaces balked, the kids sat at their desks bundled in mackinaws and great-

HE RECENTLY unburdened himself, saying he was appalled at "so much hatred, so many lies, such squalid racism, such despicable anti-Semitism," and "murderous hatred" reminiscent

Various representatives of the dictatorships that dominate the United Nations probably were briefly shocked into wonderful speechlessness by the spectacle of the United States actually defending its friends, values and interests.

Then they fell to denouncing Novak for having to talk back. He r ing his altogether warranted reference to the Nazi era, and adding: "It is as though this chamber has retrogressed by 40 years-as though this is not 1981 but 1941, and not in Geneva but along the Hitler-Stalin Axis."

THE HUMAN Rights Commission, like the United Nations itself, is full of the spirit of Goebbels and Vishinsky, so it has convicted Israel of war crimes. Such lies are, fellow Americans, your tax dollars-a lot of them-at work.

Without the absurd generosity of the United States, the United Nations, which has become the moral equivalent of a Nuremberg rally, might

But at least the United States has changed sides within the United Nations. Until recently, the United States collaborated with the jackals

Repeatedly between January, 1979, and December, 1980, the Carter administration either acquiesced by abstention, or actively supported assaults on Israel.

THE VAINEST moralizers ever to serve in American government collaborated with the UN campaign to brand Israel an outlaw state, to pronounce Israel's capital (Jerusalem) "occupied territory," even to compare Israel with Nazi Ger-

Some of Carter's closest aides, and perhaps Carter himself, believe he may have lost the election because of the "mistaken" UN vote of March 1 1980 when UN Amb. Donald McHenry voted (by mistake, the administration tried to suggest) for a vicious anti-Israel resolution.

THAT VOTE probably did give Ted Kennedy an otherwise impossible victory in New York's primary, and so prevented Carter from knocking Kennedy from the race in March. But the "mistake" was congruent with a consistent administration policy. The Carter administration was especially proud

of its courtship of the "Third World," particularly at the United Nations under Andrew Young and McHenry The latter first became prominent in the summer of 1979, when he conducted negotiations at

Kennedy airport. Soviet thugs had hustled a potential defector, a ballerina, aboard a Soviet air-The Carter administration accorded the aircraft something like the status of an embassy, instead

of boarding it and expelling the thugs and releasing the woman That media melodrama, and the public's en-

joyment of it, was a foretaste of the behavior of the American government, media and public when Iranian thugs assaulted the U.S. embassy. But the world turns. When some of the gray-

clad, gray-souled permanent people in the State Department saw Michael Novak's spirited language, they said to a Reagan appointee, in effect: We do not approve of language such as Novak's. The Reagan appointee said, in effect: We do now.

JAY HARRIS: A Happy Warrior



CAN A HAPPY leader be an effective one? Can a man who exudes confidence as well as caution, reasonableness as well as firmness make a go of it as President in these perilous times?

Those questions are being applied early on in President Reagan's career by the pundits and

those "fer" and "agin" the new man.

As a result, Mr. Reagan is being compared to
Presidents past in terms of demeanor, how he faces major challenges, his sense of humor, his at times seeming bluntness in dealing with foreign issues, his sleep and work habits as well as his recreation and rest.

On balance, the President compares well across the board. But, the real test, of course, is still

IRONICALLY, ONE of the Mr. Reagan's more interesting aspects, his optimism in the face of some of the gravest problems ever to confront a President, seems to confound those who nitpick at this stage of his job.

That the President would attack this or that par-

ticular issue with what at times seems to be almost a light-hearted approach worries some Washington watchers.

Yet, in matters of major import, such as setting forth the U.S. position on Communist infiltration into Central America, his budget and tax proposals to a joint session of Congress, his resolve to 'go back to the drawing board" on the budget, all reflect a man who knows what he is about.

But, coming and going about the nation's capital, to Camp David, in making light of his age on 70th birthday party, in a friendly wave to the press, basically Mr. Reagan reflects the attitude of a cheerful man who looks on the bright side of

"IT IS about time we had a President like this," Anthony Harrigan, who on occasion pens items

for this paper, noted recently. "We have had too many introspective Presi-

dents in recent years," Harrigan says. Both Jimmy Carter and Richard Nixon were more or less loners, it is argued, although Mr. Carter at first was more outgoing than Mr. Nixon. Former President Lyndon Johnson was both gregarious and reclusive. But, he also was aggressive to the point of being combative. The tall Texan was one of the more puzzling men to hold the office. As Senate leader, he was superb. As Presi-

dent, he was an agonized person. In some ways, these moods reflected that of the people. Or was it the other way around? Since the euphoria of the post-World War II years, and especially during the Sixties and the Vietnam War trauma, a mood of growing pessimism has pre-

vailed among many across the nation. Once an exuberant, outgoing people, we have shown signs of turning inward, being gloomy. Many seem to have a "Doomsday" complex

IT IS NOT the first time, of course, But, it is of concern to those who see in such a mood the erod-

ing of a people's confidence in themselves. Back in the early days of the Great Depression. this same frame of mind moved across the land.

chilling hopes and dreams of millions. Then, Franklin D. Roosevelt came on the scene. And despite the fact that during his tenure, the longest of any President, he brought about many things that were harmful, he gave the nation the

courage it needed in its hour of peril. FDR's exhortation to a people in the depths of despair to fight back and to realize that the "only thing we have to fear is fear itself" served to shore up a country on the brink of economic disaster. That it came from a man who had suffered both personal and political setbacks was all the more impressive Indeed, FDR was "the happy war-

AND WHILE Mr. Reagan's political philosophy in many ways is 180 degrees from that of Roosev-

elt's, the mood is there. And that is not bad, we suggest. The American people need a renewed spirit of confidence, a belief that we are a nation can solve the problems which beset us, at home and abroad. As we head into the critical Eighties, Mr. Reagan's mood may well rub off on most of us, and serve as a key in-

gredient of his leadership. Many seem to forget that Mr. Reagan's age, while a worry to some, also is an asset. In his 70 years, he has seen a lot of life. He was born into a poor family in a small town. He has savored many

successes, all as a result of his own efforts. The fact that he finally attained what once was the "ultimate dream" in America is not lost on him, of course. But, neither does he seem to be overwhelmed by it, as was Mr. Carter.

IT MIGHT BE of interest to note that another man in the White House who exuded some of the same casual humor, vet firmness where it counted, was one of the nation's more revered Presi-

We refer to President Eisenhower, who also marked his 70th birthday while in office, incidentally. But, unlike Ike, Mr. Reagan thus far has escaped serious health problems

One need not look too hard to find other cheerful men who also were great leaders. In World War II. Prime Minister Winston Churchill, even in the darkest days of the Nazis' bombings of Britain, maintained an air of confidence and cheerful concern. A more recent example is Egypt's President Sadat, who also seems to be a happy man.

Going back even further Abraham Lincoln managed to keep his sense of humor, his human qualities and sense of state even in the midst of his travails. These are qualities to be admired in men and nations-common sense, reasonableness. firmness, a belief in oneself and one's fellowman. hope, faith.

Mr. Reagan may be no "miracle worker." but it is better to be a happy warrior than a grim one.

El Salvadoran Jets **Back Army Troops**

Government soldiers backed by jet fighters battled anti-junta guerrillas at two towns in El Salvador's eastern province of San Vicente, according to peasants streaming into the capital, Sunday, from the embattled province.

The refugees said troops loyal to the civilian-military junta, backed by the air power, repelled guerrilla assaults launched late Saturday, but some witnesses reported "sporadic and heavy gunfire" Sunday around San Lorenzo and

The battle for control of San Lorenzo, about 30 miles east of here, has been raging for the last three days, according to those who fled the fighting.

Clean-Up Operation
The reports could not be independently confirmed, but a military spokes-man in the capital described fighting there as "an army clean-up operation."

The spokesman refused to comment reports that Salvadoran army helicopters shuttled between San Vicente and the capital, ferrying wounded soldiers to military hospitals here.

But army officials acknowledged, "We have had some wounded."

The leftist guerrillas had been rumored for the last week to be planning a major offensive this weekend, but their leadership issued no communiques on the outbreak of heavy fighting and the army issued no official reports on its cas-

LONDON (AP) - Former Transport Secretary William Rodgers, a leader of Britain's opposition Labor Party, declared, Sunday night, he would quit the party, a decision that appeared to mark the formal breakup of the 80-year-old British socialist bloc into two separate

Eight other dissidents among Labor's 288 members in the 635-seat of House of Commons and some 20 Laborites in the House of Lords were expected to quit the ideologically torn party, Monday. They, along with three legislators who resigned from Commons on Feb. 20, were expected to form a new, more moderate social democrat party The rebel Commons members would

be the third largest group - behind the ruling Conservatives and Labor - in the lower house

Labor's "Sickness" Rodgers, 52, told a meeting in his

north England constituency of Stockton that he would quit the party "at a very early date The Labor Party is afflicted with

sickness, and when a patient is dying,

Rodgers, a clerk's son who joined Labor at the age of 18, told his audience: "I do not ask you to approve of what I do,

but only to understand." Rodgers made his announcement despite a last-minute appeal to the rebels from Labor Party leader Michael Foot to reconsider.

On Saturday, Foot urged the dissidents "even at this eleventh hour" to stay and fight for their beliefs within the

Infighting between Labor's left and right wings is nothing new. But after

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's Conservatives swept the Laborites from power in May 1979, the party moved leftward, and the split blossomed into open warfare.

The more moderate Laborites lost a series of party policy votes to the left wing, which is headed by former Energy Secretary Tony Benn. Among these were decisions to support widespread nationalization, unilateral nuclear disarmament and withdrawal from the 10-nation European Economic Community. The last straw for the moderates was

a Labor Party conference decision to give trade union chiefs and grass-roots party officials, who are preddrhinantly left-wing, the major say in the choosing the party leader. This previously had been the province of the legislators. As a first step toward forming a new

party, Rodgers, former Foreign Secretary David Owen, and two other former Labor ministers who are no longer members of Parliament - Shirley Williams and Roy Jenkins - announced Jan. 25 they were setting up a Council for Social Democracy. The rebels are expected to sit as a

separate group in Parliament for about six weeks before formally establishing a new party in April.



LONDON (AP) - British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher arrived home Sunday from a four-day visit to the United States that British newspapers saw as a demonstration of similarity in the thinking of Mrs. Thatcher and President

Reagan.
Mrs. Thatcher, accompanied by her sband and by Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington, made no statement after landing at London's Heathrow airport.

But the British press was rife with comment on the working relationship forged by the two conservative heads of state during her American visit.
"There clearly has been a meeting of

ds," said the Sunday Observer, with only minute differences of approach surfacing over El Salvador and the Middle East.

The Sunday Times said Mrs. Thatcher "lined Britain up four-square with Reagan's call for a tougher stand against Russia." It added that "the Thatcher-Reagan alliance ... appears to span the whole policy spectrum in an openly ideological way uncharacteristic of anything

that has gone before."
The Conservative News of the World asserted that Mrs. Thatcher "returns to London elated with the measure of understanding reached with Mr. Reagan and secure in the knowledge that the special relationship between Britain and the United States is firmer than ever"

"What stirred her was the dynamism of a fresh new government with the bit between its teeth," the newspaper said. The Observer said, however, that the two allies were not in accord on every is-

It reported that the "plainest speaking of the visit evidently came between Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington and ecretary of State Alexander M. Haig

Jr." in their discussions on South-West Africa, also known as Namibia. Namibia is ruled as a trust territory by South Africa, despite United Nations calls for independence and free elections there to include black nationalist guerrillas.

"Carrington told Haig that, unless the U.S. government made clear to South Africa its determination to see a peaceful solution leading to free elections, the whole area would rapidly be desta-

It said Carrington had told Haig, "This would be an open invitation to the Soviet Union and its cohorts to inter-

Secret Service Officer's Gun Malfunctions, Fires In Case

WASHINGTON (AP) - A rifle used in guarding President Reagan malfunctioned and harmlessly discharged a bullet moments after Reagan's motorcade left church Sunday, a Secret Service spokesman said.

The gun, used by a Secret Service officer stationed on a nearby rooftop, was in a metal storage case. The misfired bullet did not leave the case and no one was in-

jured, said spokesman Dick Hartwig. "It was weapon malfunction and it appened while it was in a storage case,

Hartwig said. "So no bullet got out." Reagan, in an armored limousine, was about 100 yards away from the Na-

cident occurred, the spokesman said. The president had attended a 70-minute worship service at the church and had left before the other members of the con-

The officer, who was not identified by name, was on the rooftop of the church in northwest Washington and had put away his rifle when it malfunctioned Hartwig said.

He said persons remaining on the church grounds "thought it was a firecracker," and did not take cover.

Asked whether the officer will be disciplined, Hartwig said an "in-house inquiry" will be conducted into the inci-

Asked whether Reagan was informed of the incident, the spokesman said, "I would assume that he knows now." Mark Weinberg, assistant White House press secretary, said there would be no reaction from the president.

Hartwig said accidental discharges "happen all over the country.

Uniformed officers of the Secret Service are not agents and do not serve on the president's protective detail. They guard the White House and foreign emb and are also positioned on rooftops when the president travels in the city. Outside of Washington, SWAT teams of local police often are used for such duty.

Tax, Budget Arguments Readied

WASHINGTON (AP) - Arguments over taxes and chopping the federal budget will get a full airing on Capitol Hill this week as Congress awaits complete details of President Reagan's economic proposals

Lane Kirkland, president of the AFL-CIO, is scheduled to tell the House Budget Committee Wednesday about organized labor's view of the administration

And the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, which so far has not given a very favorable reception to Reagan's tax cut plans, has called in a number of economists in addition to Federal Reserve Chairman Paul A. Volcker.

Although the president outlined his plans on Feb. 18, administration officials have said Reagan will not submit a detailed revision of the 1982 federal budget until March 10.

Meanwhile, cabinet officials have een before committees daily pitching for cuts in spending and taxes in an intensive lobbying effort that a House Democratic research group dubbed "Re-

agan's congressional squeeze play."
Generally, Republicans have been pushing for prompt action on the entire package which they say is essential to restoring the nation's economic health. Democrats, however, are criticizing the plans as being unfair, tilted to favor the well-to-do and almost certain to prompt a new round of inflation.

Reagan has proposed a three-year package of \$125.9 billion in cuts, including reducing the 1982 budget by more than \$40 billion and cutting individual income taxes across-the-board by an average of 10 percent a year for three years.

While the Budget Committee in the Republican-controlled Senate is pushing forward with constructing a package of spending cuts in hopes of pressuring the House to take similar quick action, the

committees of the Democrat-controlled House are holding off until they see the full Reagan program.

"The House is just too big to spurt off in one direction all dressed the same." said a Democratic staffer.

Another witness scheduled to appear before the Ways and Means Committee is economist Arthur B. Laffer, whose controversial "Laffer Curve" predicts that cuts in tax rates should increase economic activity and thus bring higher, not lower, tax revenue. This assumption has been the basis of administration claims that it is possible to have cuts in business and individual taxes as well as increases in defense spending coupled with budget cuts in other areas, all while avoiding increased inflation.

The House meets Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and has a light schedule. Just pro-forma sessions are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday. On Wednesday, it will consider a resolution allowing the House Ethics Committee to continue probing activities related to congressmen implicated in the FBI's Abscam investigation of corruption

The as yet unpublished study also indicates, Suitts said, that federal aid programs now targeted for funding cuts by the Reagan administration are the primary factors behind the drop in the pov-

Suitts said the study shows a drop from 24 percent to 17 percent in the number of families in the 11 Southern states whose annual income is below the federal poverty level. In 1980, the poverty level for a family of four was \$6,750 a year.

President Reagan's proposed budget cuts, he said, would "cut out the government's role in the only thing that stands

between poverty and a little above poverty for large number of people who have made a little progress in their lives over the last 10 years

Suitts said the preliminary findings of the council's poverty study "run in the face" of the economic assumptions on which the Reagan proposals are based.

The administration is assuming, he said, "that if the government would re-move itself, and the private sector was unleashed from governmental obligations and pumped up by government tax

AUSTIN (AP) - Management's spokesman on the Texas Employment Commission says denying jobless benefits to people who quit would make the unemployment compensation system fairer.

Ken Clapp's comments on a Senatepassed bill that is scheduled to come before the House on Wednesday were isstied in a memorandum to Sen. Roy Blake, D-Nacogdoches, the sponsor. Blake's bill says a person who quits a

job voluntarily or is fired for misconduct cannot collect unemployment benefits until he or she works for six weeks in another job and is laid off.

Clapp, who was Gov. Dolph Briscoe's executive assistant, said most states already have a "return to work" provision in their unemployment compensation

He told Blake he sent questionnaires to 43 states and Puerto Rico and received answers from 42 and the Caribbean commonwealth.

The answers "indicated clearly that those states having such provisions feel that the provisions lower the amount of benefits paid and provide a more workable and fairer system," Clapp said.

He said 51 percent of the states that responded said return-to-work requirements decreased total benefit costs while increasing appeals of decisions in contested cases

Minnesota reported total unemployment benefits dropped by one-third in the first year after it passed a return-towork law, Clapp said. Texas' average weekly benefit is

among the three lowest in the nation,

and 76 percent of the state's employers pay the minimum tax levied to support the jobless benefit system Of the poll results, Clapp said, "The primary advantages seemed to be a reduction in the overall amount of benefits

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH: Elderly Man Should Heed Physician's Advice

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am an elderly man. My doctor suggested to me that I get vaccinated against pneumonia. This is something new to me. I never heard of this kind of vaccination so I told him I'd have to think about it. I am scared of any kind of shot and have heard that people get more sick from shots than from the real illness. Did I do the wrong thing? Do vaccines work? - P.P.

You always have every right to be cautious, but in this case I think you did the wrong thing. Vaccines do work. For example, have you heard of a child developing diphtheria lately? It happens, but not as it did before the diphtheria vaccine. Since the advent of polio vaccine. most medical students never see a person with polio. Vaccines have helped eliminate some of the most devastating diseases humans have suffered from.

The pneumonia vaccine your doctor wanted you to have has been used to prevent one kind of pneumonia. the most common kind, that from the bacterium pneumococcus. It is very safe and an effective vaccine. Its side effects are minimal - perhaps a little redness and soreness where the shot is given. But that's about it.

Because penicillin cures most of the cases of pneumococcal pneumonia, many people have felt safe from it and are not interested in getting a shot to prevent it. However. pneumococcal pneumonia, even with penicillin available, can be a serious and deadly illness, especially in people with severe heart, lung or kidney disease. Those people are not able to fight this infection effectively, even with penicillin. So if your doctor suggested the vaccine for you. I think you should reconsider your decision. It might prevent a serious illness at a minimal cost.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I note with some interest your comment recently with reference to calling British doctors "Mr." I feel quite sure your explanation is histor ically correct. However, there is some amplification that might be interesting.

I am an American doctor and have a Fellowship in surgery from the Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh, Scotland (1926). Even though one's main interest is surgery, you are a Dr. until you become a Fellow. Once you have gained your Fellowship, you become That distinguishes you as a Fellow

Rings On Leather-Top Table Plague Reader

Could you please tell me how to re move white rings from a leather-topped table? Wet glasses were put on the table and left unnoticed. I'm at my wits' end!

Don't you wish folks would think before they set a glass or cup down on a piece of furniture that's not protected! The rings can't be removed, but can be

Well, since the damage has been done, first clean the entire leather surface with saddle soap, letting it dry com-

Sparingly and evenly, apply a scufftype liquid shoe polish with a soft, clean cloth to the affected area, using a shade tha closely matches the natural color of the leather If the polish should stain the leather

darker, pour a little of the polish on a clean cloth and lightly coat the entire top of the table to more or less even the col-

Never coat leather with varnish or similar products. Leather is a skin and

needs to breathe. It contains fats and oils

If your table top has become dull, it's most likely dirty. Saddle soap will properly clean it, and it should be cleaned every six months. Saddle soap contains essential oils the leathe needs

As a final caution, if you must polish leather for any reason, use only leather dressing polishes sold by most better furniture stores. - Heloise

Pancake Festivities Mark Shrove Tuesday

CHICAGO, Ill. (Special) - This year, Shrove Tuesday falls on March 3. In early centuries, the three days preceding Lent were known as Shrovetide, when people confessed and received penance. To be absolved of one's sins is to be "shriven," so the day before Ash Wednesday became known as Shrove Tuesday.

The story is told that on Shrove Tuesday some 500 years ago, a housewife in Olney, England, became so involved with her baking that she forgot the time until she heard the church bell calling all to be shriven of their sins. In her haste, she forgot to remove her apron, and she ran to the church skillet and pancake in hand. In years to follow, other women did the same, and it became a contest to see who could reach the church steps first. The famous Olney pancake race had begun, and it has continued to this

Another, more recent Shrove Tuesday tradition is International Pancake Day, a three-day festival held in Liberal, Kan., the "Pancake Hub of the Universe." A major event in the festival is a pancake breakfast, where thousands of guests from across the country consume more

than 15,000 pancakes with syrup

But the real highlight of the festival is the international competition. In 1950, a member of the Liberal Jaycees read about the Olney race and decided to hold a pancake race in Liberal in friendly competition with the women in Olney. The idea took hold and it is now an annual event

Contestants in the Liberal race must wear a dress covered with an apron. They run over a 415-yard S-shaped course, and must flip their pancake twice while running: once at the start of the race and once near the end. The woman who completes the race fastest with her pancake still in her skillet is the winner. A transatlantic phone call establishes the international winner of the Liberal-Olney competition each year

Specialist Says More Than Apples Needed To Keep Doctor Away

There are better ways than "an apple a day" to keep the doctor away.

Dr. Sam A. Nixon, a Houston, Texas. specialist who is president of the Ameriean Academy of Family Physicians, is happy to spell out some of the better wavs.

'You avoid the doctor by first having a doctor," said Nixon, whose association of 50,000 members, incidentally, distinguished itself in the early 1970s by becoming the first medical specialty requiring members to take an examination every six years to certify they are keeping up with medicine.

Nixon explained

You need to have a doctor, a family physician preferably, one you know and trust and have confidence in - one who takes the time to know you," he said.

Such a doctor, Nixon stresses, does a baseline physical and talks with you about your life, dietary, study and play styles - and how each can affect your health outlook and outcome as you go through life.

We talk about prevention and risk

We take all this information and discuss, with the patient, how to minimize risk factors, how to manage risk factors and how a person can take responsibility in this business of staying healthy.

How often should you see a doctor if you aren't sick? It depends on the risk factors. Nixon says.

And it depends on if you have a fever. if you have pain, if you pass out or spit blood or have an accident - and other such things. Obviously, for any acute condition you see a doctor soon as possible.

"Periodic evaluation, on the other hand, might be two times a year or once every two years," Nixon said.

tors and have no chronic condition such as high blood pressure or arthritis, they have a good chance of avoiding doctors to the maximum extent

It is an all-time great stress chaser. A good belly laugh now and then is important for anyone who wants to stay on the good health road, Nixon allowed.

Nixon, who says he does his best to keep himself physically fit, exhibited little or no stress during the interview. He doffed his Western hat this day, smiled and unbuttoned his coet while passing pleasantries. Then he settled easily into a chair, more in the manner of one who was going to listen to his favorite soothing music - not face a battery of ques-

He never shed the pleasant image. Nixon. a big force on the medical front, also is a professor at the University of Texas Medical School in Houston.

Another title is Director of Continuing Education for Health Professionals there. That includes experts in medicine, dentistry, public health, nursing, and related specialties

All these duties don't keep him from making an occasional house call - espe-cially to check elderly patients for whom a trip to the office, especially in bad weather, can be a trial.

The Academy he heads is based in Kansas City. Mo. It focused on lifestyles and healthstyles in a study of personal healthcare attitudes and practices late in 1979 - as the first step in a broad program to do a better job of helping doctors help people stay well.

The subjects were business executives, family physicians, farmers, garment workers, secretaries and teachers all probed on healthcare attitudes and practices.

Nixon said the academy is using the

report as a springboard for new directions in preventive medicine. As a first step, the AAFP recently joined the International Ladies Garment Worker's Union in a pilot program in Wilkes Barre, Pa.

This aims to demonstrate health pro-

motion and disease detection in the workplace The "Lifestyle, Personal Healthcare"

survey study by the AAFP came up with findings on attitudes about sex. These questions were asked:

1. "Do you feel that sex is necessary for your happiness?"
2. "How satisfied are you with your

sex life now? The breakdown of answers by profession was interesting.

Answering yes to the first question: executives 52 percent, physicians 49 percent, farmers 42 percent, teachers 38 per-

cent, secretaries 31 perecent. Answering "very satisfied" to the second question: farmers 47 percent, physicians 42 percent, secretaries 28 percent, teachers 34 percent, and executives only

29 percent. The questions on sex were asked of only five of the six occupational groups in the survey.

The garment workers were not sent thse (sex) questions at the request of their union," the AAFP report said.

Nixon said the Academy believes it is not merely the length of life but the total quality of life which deserves attention. "Since much of our waking lives and our identities are tied up in the work we do, the workplace is a logical place to look for some of the stresses which affect both lifestyle and health."

On stress and work, AAFP Survey

findings included: •Despite the stress which stems

from workload, deadlines and pressure from bosses, escape from such pressures is not a major motivation for changing one's line of work, nor is it a cause of job unhappiness - suggesting a persistence of the work ethic and a belief that stress on the job is a normal part of employ-

 Among those motivations which are important considerations in changing jobs, achieving greater self-fulfillment is about as important as improved salary ·A top cause of job unhappiness is

ck of appreciation at work. On stress and lifestyle, these conclusions were drawn

•Smoking, drinking, sex, exercise and eating are all perceived as stress-related activities by varying proportions of the six occupational groups surveyed.

•Talking to a friend is a leading means of coping with stress for all six groups. So is eating (predominantly among the female groups) and exercising (among physicians and executives).

·Heavy drinkers and heavy smokers are most common among business executives, the group reporting the most stressful job. Heavy drinkers are least common among farmers, and heavy

workers - the two groups reporting the least stressful jobs

home I try to decrease my intake of sweets and breads. I prefer broiled fish, fowl or steak and vegetables "Sometimes I am successful and

"I am not much for jogging but I work on an exercise bike two or three or four times a week. I like to walk. My wife and I take walks when we can.

I am a stickler for seat belts, particularly on front seats. 'My car doesn't move unless I have

Most accidents occur under 25 miles

per hour and within 25 miles of home." How does Nixon feel about patients who try to keep up with medicine by referring to the "Merck Manual" and the "Physicians Desk Reference." The first is a work that is the equivalent of a bible of medical practice. The second contains descriptions of prescription drugs - including precautions, possible side effects and so forth

'I'd tell any of my patients thinking of investing in the books if they want to save money they can come to my office and use my copies.

HEARTLINE: I keep reading or hearing something different every day about our gas situation. First we are decreasing our usage and then we aren't. I read that a properly tuned car saves gas, but then in another article in the same magazine, it said that a tune-up really didn't save gas.

All these commercials and several friends tell me that cars today get better mileage than those a decade ago. However, other friends said that cars are getting no better mileage than those of the early 70's. My son says that automobiles use 80% of our petroleum, but a friend says that cars only use about 25%, that indus-

try uses the bulk.

Now, I am just an old fellow trying to keep up with the facts. Can you tell me some facts about gasoline and cars so I can act like I know something when I get together with my buddies? B.M.

ANSWER: Automobiles use

about 28% of petroleum. The new car of today gets 60% better gasoline mileage than the average new 1974 car. A tunedup vehicle gets 5 to 12% better gas mileage than one that has not been properly maintained. Demand for gasoline was off 8.6% in February and March from a year earlier. Gasoline stocks now are at 277 million barrels, 10% above normal and 37 million barrels above the previous record All storage tanks are full. Seven out of ten motorists said they were driving less this year than a year ago, while three out of four said the price of gasoline has forced a change in driving habits. Sixtythree percent said they had cut down on week-end or social trips; 49% had reduced shopping by car, and 18% said they were taking shorter trips by car. 20% had stopped solo commuting to work. Auto travel during the third quarter of 1979 was down 17.3% compared with the same period of 1978.

The certificate or money fund will produce a high yield and give you time to do some long-term planning for that \$10,- Then, visit your public library. Take out some books on savings and investments. There's no rush. Take your time and make up your own mind what you want to do with your money.

If, after studying, you decide you don't want to take any risk with your nestegg, keep it in short-term certificates or a money fund. If you decide you're willing to take on some risk, in hopes of greater financial rewards, consider individual stocks or mutual funds investing in stocks.

I've heard there's not much demand for li-brarians right now, but I enjoyed work-ing part-time in a public library during high school so much that I want to go into the field anyway. Please tell me what kinds of opportunities here are in library science and what I'll need to study to get a job after graduation.

- J.G., Brooklyn, N.Y. While it's true that in recent years the demand for librarians has cooled, a new

survey suggests warming trend. Your hottest job prospects today are in the special libraries of government agencies and private firms whose ventures range from aerospace technology to health care. These librarians use highly developed skills to provide materials and services tailored to the organization's needs.

In addition to the usual master's degree in library science, the special librarian needs a strong background in a particular area such as engineering, mathematics, computer science, art, languages

For a career in more familiar setting, look to the public libraries where you'll find the most openings and the pleasure - or pain - of finding books and materials for people of all ages and backgrounds.

Despite the seller's market for special librarians, job prospects are chilly in colleges and universities where declining enrollments have forced budget cutbacks. But if you can land a job as an academic librarian you may find great satisfaction in rubbing elbows with faculty members while organizing reference materials for students.

As bleak as a winter landscape is the job outlook for school librarians because of the trend toward school closures. However, if you won't be happy doing anything but teaching students how to use library resources and developing audio-visual programs and you can find a job as a school librarian, grab it. School librarians get higher pay, work shorter hours and take longer vacations than li-brarians in any other field.

Imprisoned Guerrilla Vows Fast

BELFAST. Northern Ireland (AP) -Bobby Sands, 26-year-old IRA guerrilla at the Maze prison outside Belfast, began a hunger strike "to the death" Sunday, renewing tension with the British government over the issue of political status for IRA prisoners

The Northern Ireland Office said Sands, who is serving 14 years for possession of firearms, refused breakfast Sun-

Sinn Fein, the Irish Republican Army's political wing, said Sands has vowed never to eat again unless the government gives "political prisoner" status to the imprisoned guerrillas in this British province.

Northern Ireland Secretary Humphrey Atkins said the government would make no concessions to Sands and that if he and any other prisoners stick to their hunger strike, "then they will die." Some 4,000 demonstrators marched

Sunday in Belfast despite heavy rains to show their support of Sands. The march followed torchlight processions in Belfast and Londonderry at midnight Saturday.

The mostly Roman Catholic IRA is fighting to oust the British from predominantly Protestant Northern Ireland and unite the province with the overwhelmingly Roman Catholic Irish Republic to the south.

Sinn Fein said in a statement earlier this month that Sands would be joined at an unspecified time by three other prisoners whom it did not name

Sands was one of the IRA "Provisional" wing prisoners who in December helped negotiate an end to a 53-day fast by prisoners demanding political status. Sean McKenna, one of the seven fasting prisoners, is still hospitalized. He was near death when the fast ended

The start of the latest fast coincided with the fifth anniversary of the abolition of "special status" for Maze prisoners status the prisoners want restored. The British government has refused to grant political status.

ing a joint return, the exclusion will be-Qualifying dividends are those paid by most U.S. corporations. Qualifying interest includes interest from bonds and other debt obligations of domestic corporations, the U.S. Treasury and banks and thrift institutions.

But, on your 1980 return — which must be filed by April 15, 1981 — you're allowed only the dividend exclusion. That exclusion is \$100 for each taxpayer. It becomes \$200 for a married couple, if each spouse owns stock on which \$100 of dividends was collected or if they owned stock jointly on which \$200 of dividends was collected.

Q. You wrote that cash dividends paid on stock are taxable - after taking into account the "dividend exclusion." You also wrote that "stock dividends" - paid in extra shares of stock are not taxable.

How about dividends reinvested to buy more shares, through dividend reinvestment plans?

A. As the tax rules now stand, reinvested dividends are taxable. There's a move afoot to change that. But we'll have to wait and see what happens in the halls of Congress.



Surviving May Mean Shooting Thy Neighbor

Citizens Arm Themselves To Survive

DALTON, Ga. (AP) — Small but
buting bands of Americans are arming themselves and learning how to kill be-cause they are convinced the social order is crumbling and they will have to fend for themselves to survive.

Attached neither to hate nor politial groups, they range from middle Americans who are remortgaging their homes to pay for guns and shooting lessons for their families, to professional men accues, to professional men accumulating arsenals of military-type weapmes and strongholds scattered through Southeastern woodlands, Midwestern suburbs, remote Western ranches and mountainside cabins in the Pacific

Variously named retreatism, survivalism or futurism by its adherents, the phi-losophy was found in a dozen states visit-ed by this correspondent.

It is a retreat to medieval times," said Brian Jenkins, an expert on terrorism and insurgency who works for the Rand Corp. in Santa Monica, Calif. There are inner perimeters in America today, places people are reluctant to leave for fear of their own safety. The national perimeter no longer seems se-

No official figures exist on the number of people involved but survivalists who agreed to be interviewed insisted they knew of thousands of others.

William Pier, a California survival supply distributor, claims to have 200,000 es on his nationwide mailing list and says be made a \$1 million profit last year by selling freeze dried food and other items. Pier said scores of similar businesses across the nation sell items rang ing from portable potties to radiation suits and \$8,000 night vision glasses.

"Survivalism will be one of the great with industries of the 1980s," said Peter Weyland, a Washington computer specialist whose firm is establishing a survivalism referral service.

The emphasis is on self reliance. Survivalists are stock-piling food and building shelters as primitive as dirt foxholes or as sophisticated as concrete bunkers. Some are learning how to defend these Going beyond the bomb shelter craze of the 1960s and '60s, many advocate extreme action in time of emergency.

"If there is nuclear war, I hope everyone in the cities is killed. I don't want them coming out afterwards expecting me to feed them or to take what I've got," J. Allan Croft, 30, a foreman from northern Georgia, said at a weapons training camp where his 10-year-old son, John, was learning to fire a rifle.

His view was echoed by many who believe crisis will come not from nuclear devastation but from economic collapse. which will panic city populations into running wild, or from earthquakes which will shatter the country and isolate com-

But whatever the cause of the expected chaos or the background of the believers, they seem to share an attitude about people not similarly prepared: Stay away from me and what I've got.

"What would I do if my neighbor came for help in a major catastrophe?" asked Ron Burns, a freeze-dried food

manufacturer who has a hideaway in Utah's mountainous Heber Valley. might help him, but some of my customers say they would rather kill him.

The accumulation of guns is one characteristic of survivalism. Those seriously concerned are buying as many as a dozen firearms per family and hiring martial arts professionals to teach them to use them against attackers.

In states where machineguns are allowed, private groups are adding them to their arsenals and seeking tactical instruction from sophisticated training schools featuring Vietnam veterans.

The Treasury Department says private citizens in this land of 226.5 million people own at least 140 million rifles, shotguns and handguns. That is 50 million more weapons in private hands than 10 years ago, when the population was 203.2 million, for a 36 percent increase in weapons ownership over a population increase of about ll percent.

The hard core adherents seek refuge in mist-shrouded mountain valleys and rock-rimmed desert redoubts, reluctant to travel far for fear doomsday will swallow them up away from home

They differ markedly from the more public paramilitary groups such as the

Wisconsin-based Posse Comitatus, which advocates tax revolt and states rights. and the Minutemen, a group of law-and-order advocates based in Missouri and

The survivalists are part of an evolving social pattern where gun owners look at their weapons not as recreational but as defensive weapons.

"They are crossing that threshold in greater numbers," said Dr. John Crothers Pollock of New York, author of a recent study on fear in America. "It is the angry ones, not the fearful, who see a solution to the ills of society in the gun. And their decisions involve the whole fami-

A typical family on the threshold is the Pierres of Phoenix, Ariz. The Pierres are a 17-gun family, most of these pistols owned by their collector son, Bob, 19.

"Everyone we know has guns," said

Husband Todd, a heavy equipment operator, carries a personal 45-caliber automatic pistol the family affectionately calls "Bruno." Whenever the Pierres go to town, so does Bruno.

"It's a sign of the troubled times," said Mrs. Pierre, who sleeps with a loaded rifle beside her bed when her husband

Some who have crossed the threshold from recreation to defense gathered in the northern Georgia woods early this winter, women and children self-consciously pecking at freeze-dried meats and fruits while the menfolk checked out rifles and pistols arrayed on wooden tres-

This was the first session of Harold's American Survival School, set in a forest glade near Dalton, Ga. This quiet place was previously frequented by shy lovers and partying young people. Today, if the big warning sign fails to keep trespassers off, the roar of gunfire should convince

"I sort of wonder if I should really be doing this, but I guess my husband is ," said Dorothy Priest, a transplanted Californian cradling a 12-gauge shotgun in her arms. She blasted a distant target and explained she and her husband had come to Georgia to escape "too many drugs, too much crime."

Husband Des Priest, an organic chemist, said they had spent \$800 of their vacation money to take four days of courses on armed and unarmed self defense, advanced first aid and radiation detection. The Priests' next step will be to stockpile food, buy half a dozen guns and maybe build a bomb shelter in their rural home.

'We are not just concerned about nuclear war," Mrs. Priest said. "What if we have a serious tornado? We will still need to protect ourselves from others.

The Georgia families shooting at dark forest shadows were outnumbered by curious reporters whose visit was not discouraged by businessman Harold Van Wert, 40, of Dalton, a low-key entrepreneur of survival supplies

"I just wanted to show you that no Klansmen and no communists are training here." Van Wert said. "We are filling a need from local folks and not breaking the law doing it. School resumes in March with 50 students

Some of the instructors were sheriff's deputies, a pattern common in the 30 weapons training schools known to have been operating around the country in re-Jeff Cooper - owner of one of the

most famous, Gunsite near Prescott, Ariz. - said interest is booming and that he has been asked to franchise his operation across the country.

Those seeking tactical expertise visit sophisticated paramilitary centers cloaked in anonymity such as "Force 10," discreetly located amid 200 acres of rolling forest near Calhoun, Ga.

We have 14 instructors who train everyone from armchair commandos such as doctors and lawyers, security men for corporations and body guards. said Wade Lane of Marietta, Ga., who runs Force 10. "We also visit remote communities around the country who are worried about their defense and anxious to learn tactics on how to act as a

The emphasis on armaments worries some prominent survivalists. "They are learning how to kill and nothing else," said Kurt Saxon of Harrison, Ark., a writer who encourages the simple lifestyle.

"They, too, will become predators after the catastrophe, preying on the local population," he warned

Writer and weapons specialist Edward Ezell of Houston sees paramilitary training an eventual threat. "People believe there is something wrong with our society, and their flashpoint is low," he

said. "What scares me is that as they be come more frustrated they will react less rationally. They already number many, and the converts to the cause will be large. And they are not just Anglo-Saxons. They include blacks and other mi-

As more of the anxious turn to weap ons, so too do they stockpile supplies for their troubled future. "It goes hand in hand, food for times of chaos and the guns to defend it," said Ron Burns, whose Packaway Supplies of Napa, Calif manufactures freeze-dried products.

But just as weapons training concerns some of the survivalist faithful, so does

the merchandising worry others.

"The whole thing is becoming a ripoff," said Nancy Tappan of Rogue Riv er, Ore., widow of one of the pre-emi-nent survivalist writers, Mel Tappan. Every individual has a separate set of needs, yet they are mass marketing whole concepts, at up to \$10,000 a pack-

PRESCOTT, Ariz. (AP) - In circles where the gun is king, Jeff Cooper is crown prince.

"An armed society is a polite sociehe tells his subjects, and in his company people are very polite indeed.

The former U.S. marine colonel, a

tanned, fit 60, entertains visitors by cocking his Colt .45 automatic pistol and noting berries off the juniper bushes in his 200-acre backyard.

There are people in America who have never seen a real gun," he complained. "This is the first time in U.S. history that heads of families have not been to Uncle Sam's trade school," referring to the absence of full military mobilization since World War II

To make up for Uncle Sam's shortfalls, Cooper runs the American Pistol Institute at his own Gunsite Ranch in northern Arizona. Cooper's ranch, tucked away in the corner of an isolated, high desert valley, is a mecca for those

who aspire to shoot to kill.

Clients include judges, storekeepers, professional men "and even two clergymen," Cooper said.

Cooper says he wears a pistol when he attends church himself ever since he read of an armed holdup in a California chapel. "They wouldn't have succeeded if I had been there," Cooper boasted.

Cooper tells clients that under English common law a citizen may use any method to prevent an attempt on his life "If a man chooses to prey upon society, he has signed his own release," said Cooper, who is fond of catch phrases.

Asked about the rising crime rate involving handguns, Cooper responded: "The death rate is still the same - one per customer

"Does violence beget violence?" he asked rhetorically

"I sure hope so," he said, smiling as

he answered Cooper has become a favorite tutor of because of fear of the future. "Skill at arms is necessary for survival. A pistol is a grand way to end an argument someone else starts," Cooper said

His six-day course costs \$400 plus expenses, and he will train about 1,000 people this year, twice the number he trained in 1980

The course incorporates Cooper's own on-the-job training. "I've killed three enemy in war." he said. "And I've helped out my friends in Rhodesia, El Salvador, South Africa and Guatemala by training people, not personally fighting their wars. Not that I have against mercenaries. Their morality is

Cooper tells his clients, "The pistol on your belt is very much like a fire extinguisher. Use it at the source of the flame." He believes citizens should assist others in trouble, whether in a supermar-

ket holdup or a bank robbery. His intensive training sessions, supervised by instructors drawn from the police and military, are held over sophisticated training courses including a "fun house" where life-sized human targets

Cooper does not hesitate to criticize his clients' performances. But he reassures them that even if they are not quite the edge back home: "The creeps of the

The killing was ruled an accident, even though investigators said Romero loaded the gun imself with live ammunition rather than blanks.



'George and I have known each other for very many years," Saban told a small press gathering in a Yankee trailer alongside the playing field. "Like him, I feel strongly about discipline. You have to pay a price to win."

In announcing Saban's appointment, Steinbrenner acknowleged that he was installing a man whose career had been spent entirely in another sport. "There is nothing magical about having 40 years of baseball experience, the Yankee owner said. "He doesn't have it. I didn't have

Saban was head coach of Northwestern University in 1954 and had a young Steinbrenner as his assistant in charge of receivers. The team went 0-10-1, tying Il-

"George exemplifies everything that sport stands for," Saban said. "He's a winner. Personally, I think George's de-sire always has been to be a football

For the last eight months Saban has been running Steinbrenner's Tampa Bay Downs, a thoroughbred racing track in

Saban attended Indiana University captaining the team as a senior in 1942. and later played with the Cleveland Browns of the National Football League for four years. He was captain of the Browns during 1946-49 and an all-league linebacker for two years.

Baylor will play the winner of today night's Texas Christian at Texas A&M tussle in the Thursday night doubleheader at San Antonio. The winner meets Houston Friday night in the semifinals. The championship game will follow on Saturday to determine the league's representative in the NCAA playoffs.

Houston fell 78-77 to Texas A&M earher in the day. The defending SWC champion Aggies, who started 1-7, finished 7-1 to tie Texas Tech for fourth place with 8-8 ledgers.

Texas, which downed Rice 90-80, tied the Owls for sixth placee at 7-9.

TCU was seventp at 6-10 and SMU had already completed its regular season in the cellar at 3-13.

Texas Tech Coach Gerald Myers had high praise for the Razorbacks, who won although superb guard U.S. Reed didn't score a point.

'Old Arkansas is smart and cool." said Myers. "They're old heads. They know how to keep their poise.

Texas A&M lost its poise, almost blowing a 24-point lead. The Aggies had to dodge a last second shot to win.

Baylor Coach Jim Haller was euphoric with his Bears' second place finish, saying "Everyone has been talking about Houston being the second place team but all I know is that we tied them. Maybe next year we'll finish first."

Federal authorities said the music stars are to testify that they never gave permission to any Sam Goody employee to counterfeit their work.

George Tucker, a convicted tape counterfeiter, also is scheduled to testify for the government,

Levy and Stolon, both of New York, were indicted Feb. 28, 1980 on charges they reproduced and sold the tapes with out permission of the musicians or their recording companies.

By law, permission must be given before any copyright recording can be re-produced. Musicians receive royalties w.en their music is legally reproduced.

The forgeries are almost identical in sound and appearance to the authentic albums and tapes, but there are slight irregularities in the packaging and the recordings.

Counterfeits, which have been found at record stores throughout the country, are usually offered at the same retail price as originals, but at wholesale, their cost is much less than the authentic al-



Scientists Spot New Galaxies

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) - Astronomers at the University of California Sunday reported the discovery of several previously unknown galaxies 10 billion light years away from Earth - the farthest part of the universe yet seen.

The discovery, they said, supports the "big bang" theory of how the universe began, which has been challenged by some scientists in recent years.

"Evidence from these farthest galaxies," an announcement from the university said, "strongly supports a theory suggesting that a primordial explosion or 'big bang' occurred about 18 billion years ago and was followed by the formation of stars and galaxies from the expanding gases within about 2 billion years.'

A report on the discovery of a huge galaxy 10 billion light years from Earth was published by astronomer Hyron Spinrad in the Astrophysical Journal for

The discovery of the distant galaxies The scanner captures and stores minute quantities of light from a distant point in the sky night after night until there is enough to be measured.

The light from the distant galaxies is so faint it "is only about 2 percent as bright as the normal background glow of the night sky," the report said.

To get a recording of one of the new-

ly-discovered galaxies, Spinrad said he had to make 23 separate observations for a total of 40 hours spread over a threeyear period.

The size of the distant galaxies was measured by both radio and optical readings in which astronomers in various parts of the world cooperated with the Berkeley scientists. It was through mysterious radio signals from distant points in the universe that astronomers first guessed there might be galaxies out there. The new findings show the signals were indeed coming from galaxies, but the cause of the radio waves is still un-

Spinrad said it appears "the most dis-tant galaxies are much larger than our Milky Way Galaxy. He said it would "re-quire a thousand billion stare like our to give the light they must have

The light observed and measured by the scientists has been traveling through space at the speed of 6 trillion miles per year for about 10 billion years.

Since astronomers believe the universe is 18 billion years old, the discovery means astronomers "are looking more than half way back in time toward the moment many believe marks the beginning of the universe." the report said.
