Bagley joins Security Service; Montgomery heads 64th ABGp

Col. Monte D. Montgomery will replace Col. Bobby R. Bagley as the 64th Air Base Group commander here July 14.

Change of Command ceremonies will be held in the wing conference room at 9 a.m.

Colonel Montgomery comes to Reese from Lackland AFB, Tex., where he commanded the 3504th Recruiting Group (RG). Colonel Bagley, who assumed command of Air Base Group in March, will be assigned with

Headquarters, USAF Security Service at Kelly AFB, Tex.

New base commander

Colonel Montgomery earned his Air force commission in 1956 as a graduate of the Reserve Officer Training Corps at Rutgers University. He attended pilot training at Vance AFB, Okla., receiving his wings in 1957.

The Oklahoma City native spent the next six years in

Maine and then flew C-123 Provider and T-33 Shooting Star aircraft at Stewart AFB, N.Y., until 1966. After a tour of duty flying the AC-47 skytrain in Vietnam he returned to the United States and served as a T-37 instructor pilot at Williams AFB, Ariz.

In 1969, he became the assistant director of Operations for the 3525th Pilot Training Wing at Williams. From 1971

39 grads pin on wings today

Thirty-nine fledgling pilots will be winging their way to new assignments following graduation ceremonies for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 78-06 here today.

The guest speaker for the 10 a.m. graduation will be Maj. Gen. Evan W. Rosencrans, Air Training Command vicecommander, General Rosencrans was graduated from West Point in 1948 and received his pilot training at Randolph AFB, Tex., and at Williams AFB, Ariz.

The general flew 133 combat missions during the Korean conflict. While flying the F-80 Shooting Star over North Korea he was credited with shooting down a MIG-15. General

Rosencrans added 132 combat the new pilots during this missions in Southeast Asia during the late 1960s. He piloted the F-100 Super Sabre there.

The command pilot became the ATC vice-commander in August, 1977.

Preceeding the graduation in the base theater, there will be a coffee in the Officer's Open Mess. That is slated to start at 9 a.m. Following the graduation will be a luncheon at the Officer's Club at 11 a.m. with a Red Carpet tour on tap for graduation visitors at 12:30 p.m. A dinner-dance honoring the graduates will be held at the Officer's Club tonight, starting

The graduating class includes 27 men from the Air Force Academy, six Reserve Officer Training Corps graduates, five members of the Air National Guard and one student commissioned through Officer Training School.

The class began training last July with 34 members. Five students were added to the class during training.

Safety group increases efforts

The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), is stepping up efforts to halt the spiralling rise in injuries and deaths in and around the home.

The agency, which is geared to protect the consumer from hazardous products, has turned its attention to citizen band (C.B.) radios. The CPSC's concern with C.B. radios has been spurred on by the deaths of eight people in April because of electrical shocks received while installing C.B. antennas. Last year, there were 123 C.B. related deaths in the United States.

The commission will try to ease the problem by requiring labels on the radios, warning consumers about the potential hazards involved with C.B. radio and antenna installation. In addition, the commission suggests that inexperienced radio operators check with a local C.B. organization beforing attempting to install the radio or antenna.

The CPSC is also eyeing the 47 per cent increase in chain saw accidents since 1975. There were more than 40,000 people injured by chain saws last year, most getting caught in the "kickback" (sudden movement of blade toward body). Chain saw mishaps have claimed the lives of 30 people during the past three years, 80 per cent of those deaths were a result of partial decapitation.

Another target of the CPSC is children's toys.

Recently, the agency has tested or ordered tests on 150,000 toys designed for children under eight-years-old. Toys identified as having sharp edges or other hazards will be banned from the market. Of particular concern to the commission are baby rattles. After Aug. 20, no rattles small enough to be swallowed by an infant will be manufactured.

More than 44,000 children were treated for injuries caused by sharp or swallowed toys last year.



Be ready to vote

(An AFNS Editorial)

Every American citizen has the duty to vote. Thousands have fought and died for the privilege. It is our responsibility in this election year to use that right.

The Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) for absentee ballot makes voting away from home simple and easy. The FPCA may be used anywhere by Air Force members and their spouses and dependents and by U.S. civilians residing outside the territorial limits of the United States.

The FPCA must be filled out completely and accurately or it may be declared invalid. If election officials cannot read the information submitted on the FPCA, or part of it is left incomplete, an absentee ballot will not be mailed to the voter.

Your state of legal residence must be written on the FPCA form along with your legal residence address. The address to which you would like the ballot mailed must also be included.

Make sure to complete both sides of the form and sign the application.

Your voting officer has complete information on FPCAs and will assist you with proper addresses where the forms should be sent. Fill out your FPCA now and apply for your voting ballot.

Base veterinarian plans rabies clinic on July 8

A rabies vaccination clinic for all cats and dogs belonging to military personnel and their dependents will be held here

According to Capt. (Dr.) Richard C. Postlewaite, Chief of Veterinary Services, the clinic will be held from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. in the Veterinary Services facility, bldg. 631.

The captain noted that all dogs and cats four-months-old or older in Reese Village are required to have a current rabies vaccination. He explained that a current vaccination is one given within the past year.

All animals must be carried or restrained by a leash. Only rabies and distemper vaccinations will be given during the

Annually, more than 500,000 animal bite cases are reported to medical authorities in the United States. Approximately 30,000 victims receive the painful series of anti-rabies vaccine injections used in the prevention of rabies.

Capt. (Dr.) Lee Booker, staff veterinarian at Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center, Tex., says that the vast majority of animal bite victims are young children. He notes that not only may the children be subjected to the 14-21 day shot treatment, but; that bites may leave children with emotional as well as physical scars.

Dogs and cats (the most common pets) are the most likely animals to transmit rabies to humans should they contract the disease from other domestic pets or wildlife. By minimizing the potential for rabies in pets, explains Captain Booker, the threat of humans getting the disease is reduced. He adds that it is essential that rabies vaccinations are kept

Health care changes tomorrow

Beginning tomorrow, the Department of Defense will implement a New Health Care System which will affect most beneficiaries now receiving care under the Uniformed Services Health Benefits Program.

Currently, the system consists of two parts, Direct Care, through the Military Treatment Facility and CHAMPUS. Tomorrow, a new addition, called the Cooperative Care Program will be implemented.

The Cooperative Care Program will actually be a phasing together of the two existing programs in order to provide the most benefits at the lowest possible cost. Under the present system, if a patient is released to CHAMPUS, the

Military Treatment Facility disengages completely for care for that particular problem.

Under Cooperative Care, the Military Treatment Facility Providers may, under certain circumstances, send otherwise CHAMPUS Eligible individuals to a civilian facility for diagnostic tests which will be paid for out of Hospital Supplemental Funds. 
