

In some hospitals

Contractor misreads cancer tests

The Air Force plans to reexamine some 32,000 Pap smears as one of several precautions taken because a contractor misclassified a portion of Pap smears taken during June-September 1977.

A Pap smear is a sample of tissue taken from the female cervix to detect cancer.

Although the Reese Hospital was not one of those serviced by that particular contractor, women in the South Plains area may have had Pap smears taken at other Air Force hospitals that did use the service. (A complete list of those hospitals is included at the end of this article.)

Women who received Pap smears at any of the involved hospitals between July 1, 1977 and May 31, 1977, who have not

had another Pap smear taken at a different medical facility since then, should contact the Reese Hospital for information. Anyone with questions about the Pap smear tests should call Robert A. Gregorio, Patient Affairs Representative at ext.

Lt. Col. (Dr.) Phillip Pixley, Hospital Commander, said Monday that few women in the area are expected to need new tests. "Most women receive a Pap smear annually," he said, "and since Reese wasn't one of the hospitals using the contracted service there probably won't be very many women here that will need to have a new Pap smear taken."

A team of Air Force medical specialists began reexamining the slides Monday at Brooks AFB, Tex. The team will notify bases involved of slides different from those reported by the contractor.

Commanders and supervisors have been instructed to deal promptly and severely with those individuals who persist in their use. That is one good reason for you to avoid these words. Another good reason, and hopefully a more important one, is that they hurt and offend other human beings.

Elimination of this hurt is my goal and everyone's responsibility.

The experience of coming into faith is simply not open to this kind of scientific investigation. No natural science could possibly establish as fact the supernatural entrance of God into human history or into an individual human life.



Command supports letters to Congress

Command officials believe that some Air Training Command (ATC) personnel are unsure about their rights concerning letters to members of Congress.

The right of Air Force members to communicate with members of Congress, either for or against legislation and other matters, is explicit according to ATC legal officials. That right is protected by United States Code 1034, by Department of Defense Directive 1325.6 and by

Air Force Regulations 11-7 and 35-15.

In addition, ATC Regulation 500-6 (Commander's Special Interest - Letters To Congress) explains the right simply and directly. The regulation also states that commanders are expected to ensure that the right of Air Force members to communicate with a member of Congress is not abridged and to ensure that no action is taken against an individual because of contact with a Congressman. 



Airmen launches missiles



Launching missiles in Lubbock may be a hard to believe spectacle, but; for one base airman it's a weekly

A1C Matthew Ota, T-38 jet engine mechanic with the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron takes practice shooting off minature rockets each Saturday at a clearing east of the base off Fourth Street.

The Cleveland native got involved with this unusual hobby at the age of 10 when his brothers took up the activity as a past time. After moving to Evansville, Indiana at 12 he continued to get involved. "It was at the time when the space program was going into full gear that I really became interested in rockets and what they were all about," stated Ota.

Ota's infatuation with missles continues while here as a member of the National Association of Rocketry's local club, the Rocket Benders. This local group is made up of professional people, high school and even grade school students.

"The national association is a spin off group of the Federation Aeronautics Internationale in Paris," says Matthew. "It is the official organization which sanctions all contests, such as those held in Phoenix and Dallas this past year which I took part in, and that certifies all records.'

"The rockets we use are made up of light weight material such as paper, balsa wood and cardboard, averaging in cost of \$1.50 and \$25. The engines are preloaded, under Department of Transportation guidelines, with Class C black powder that is ignited by an electrical charge," stated Ota.

Rockets average in heights of three inches to 10 feet. Some of which are home made and others are kits that can be bought through local hobby shops. Some of the rockets are exact replicas of the Minuteman, Titan and Saturn series missiles, there is even a Star Wars version available.

"It's fascinating and a thrill to see your rocket take off, go 500 or more feet straight up then to see the parachute bring the projectile back," says Ota. So far this year he has had 100 flights including contests and the Saturday morning sessions with the club.

Ota is currently the Bender's Secretary and says that anyone interested in participating or watching the club can contact him or come out to their practice missile range on Fourth Street in the Terre Estates North edition each Saturday around 11 a.m. to have some fun and have any questions answered.


Primary elections will be held in eight states during the month cf August.

Some baggers due pay

The Civil Service Commission has determined that individuals who bag and carryout patron's purchases soley for tips at Department of Defense (DOD) Commissaries located in nonforeign areas are covered by the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). Consequently, these "Baggers" are entitled to the full protection afforded by the FLSA, which includes a minimum wage

compensation for overtime work.

Any person who has worked as a Bagger since May 1, 1974, is entitled to minimum wage and, possibly, overtime payments under the FLSA. Claims for retroactive wages under FLSA may be filed with the appropriate regional office of the U.S. Civil Service Commission. Each claim must specify the location of the Commissary at which the Bagger worked. A claim should include approximations of hours worked, dates worked, and amount of tips received. Claims should also include some means of verification, such as names of Commissary Officials, name of Head Bagger, copies of PCS Orders, copies of parental permission slips and/or copies of Federal/State Income Tax Returns covering the period worked.

Any questions concerning entitlements or the processing

guarantee and appropriate of claims should be forwarded to the Civil Service Commission. The addresses of the Regional Offices of the Civil Service Commission are available inthe Civilian Personnel Office.

> Shoppers are reminded that tipping after Aug. 1 will be discouraged because the baggers wages will be computed into the cost of the groceries through a two per cent surcharge. Patrons wishing to bag their own groceries and not pay the surcharge will be handled at a special check-out

Applications for bagger/ carryout personnel are being taken at the Civilian Personnel Office. Anyone interested in applying should contact the Civilian Personnel Office as soon as possible. Commissary officials remind Roundup readers that the jobs are open to all, including military personnel and their dependents.

Commissary survey shows customers getting bargain

Prices at Air Force commissaries are about 25 per cent less than at supermarkets off base, according to a June survey by the Air Force Commissary Service (AFC

AFCOMS officials said teams surveyed two supermarkets nearest each of eight bases scattered throughout the United States. Commissary prices ranged from about 21.6 to 29.8 per cent less than off-base cent.

Chain stores may be able to beat commissary prices on some items by selling at a loss to attract customers, said SMSgt. Rodney Miller, commissary management specialist at AFCOMS. "However, overall savings to our patrons would

still be at least 20 to 21 per cent after the surcharge (4 per cent)," he stated.

To add to day-to-day savings, General Burkett urges commissary shoppers to watch for the AFCOMS "Smart Owl" signs which indicate special savings.

"When our customers see the Smart Owl, they can be assured that the item is being sold at a price of at least 15 per cent below the normal savings," he

AFCOMS is able to offer the special prices because of "great cooperation from our vendors, suppliers or the manufacturer of those products. Last year the AFCOMS special national sales program saved our patrons at least \$1.5 million. We expect savings this year will exceed \$2 million," General Burkett said.



Thrift shop reopens doors; Proceeds go to area groups




