Rights of Smokers

I would like to know if there has been any effort made to implement AFR 30-27 or Department of Defense Regulation 6015.18. This has to do with the protection and rights of non-smokers.

Air Force Regulation 30-27 has been out since March 29, 1978 and supports the findings and recommendations of the Surgeon General of the

United States regarding the hazards of smoking.

The intent of this regulation is to provide the best possible conditions for the health and welfare of Air Force people, while at the same time to maintain a balance between the rights of smokers and non-smokers. In a complex issue such as smoking, it is difficult to have a regulation for every situation that might affect these groups. Consequently, there are many areas and situations when sound, objective commander/supervisor judgment and individual courtesy must prevail to maintain this balance of rights.

The regulation follows the DOD guidelines on

smoking in facilities, but has been purposely designed to allow commanders/supervisors to exercise judgment based on individual facilities and personnel. In work areas, each supervisor who plans work space should accommodate the preferences of smoking and non-smoking employees, provided that: (1) The efficiency of work units is not impaired; (2) No additional space is required; and (3) No costly alteration to the work space or additional office equipment is required.

Wing policy is to follow the guidelines in the basic AF regulation. It is simple, short and direct; therefore, we do not see the need for a wing supplement or regulation.

By Tuesday morning I was paralyzed from the neck down. My head was too numb from the day before to have been affected. On this day, the kids went swimming and loved it. Of course, I ensured that there was no horseplay around the pool, but apparently they considered drowning a counselor serious business.

On Wednesday I decided not to go swimming.

On Thursday the chaplain arrived at 7:30 in the morning for his usual spiritual guidance and morning devotion to the kids. Didn't work.

Today is Friday and the final day of camp. Already, the kids jumped me this morning as I crawled out of my tent. With all forty stacked on top of me, I had some problems finding a little privacy.

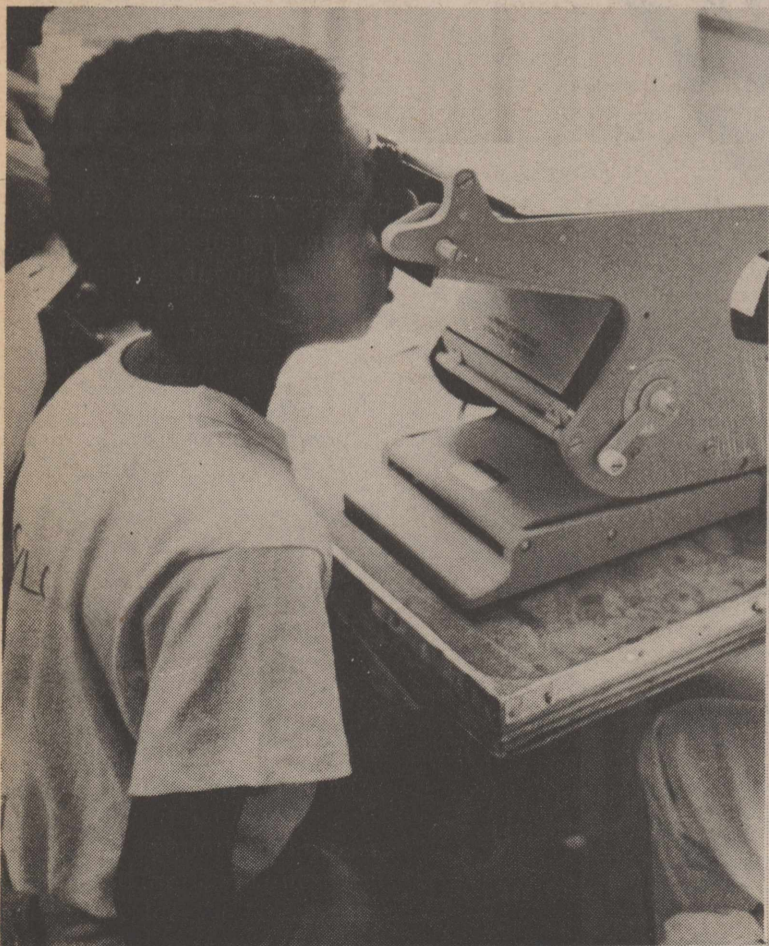
The week is nearly over. My body is crippled and deformed for life. My arms and legs are bruised. My eyes are bloodshot, my voice is gone and three of my ribs are cracked. Other than that, the camp was all peaches.

Despite all the brutality and abuse, I enjoyed the camp, and that's speaking seriously from a masochist's point of view. And I think that the kids and the rest of the counselors had a good time also.

Well, this is the end of another camp. At least until next year. So for now, I guess I've said enough. Besides, I hear my ambulance coming now.

Stockholders Report

(Editor's note: This is the third in a series outlining the 1978 Air Training Command report to stockholders. This week the Roundup focuses on Medical Training and Professional Military Education.)

Medical Training

ATC medical training programs graduated 7,108 students in various medical fields during 1977, both at entry level and in advanced programs, conducted to assure continuing high standards of health services to Air Force personnel worldwide.

Because of a shortage of physicians, ATC conducts several excellent "paramedical practitioner" training courses. During 1977, the Physician's Assistant program graduated 79 students; the Obstetrics/Gynecology program, 15 students; and the Pediatric Nurse Practitioner program, 17 students.

The ATC training program to prepare new medical com-

manders for management responsibilities entered its second year. With 23 graduates in 1977, 69 new medical commanders have now completed this course, 30 without prior command experience.

Professional Military Education

The Air War College (AWC), the senior professional military education school for the Air Force, prepared 264 resident graduates for high command and staff positions in 1977. The AWC curriculum focuses on problems affecting national security policy, and employs military strategy, capabilities and employment, with special emphasis on applying aerospace power in a wartime situation.

The Air Command and Staff College (ACSC) provides intermediate professional military education, and graduated 540 officers from its 40-week resident course in 1977.

The school prepare selected officers for command and staff duties required of majors and lieutenant colonels.

In 1977, the Squadron Officers School (SOS), graduated more than 2,700 young officers in the first step of their professional military education. The school prepares officers for command and staff tasks required of Air Force junior officers while providing a foundation for further professional development.

Last year, the Air Force Senior NCO Academy prepared 194 senior noncommissioned officers to fulfill their leadership and management responsibilities. The Senior NCO Academy is the highest level of a five-phased professional military education system for Air Force NCOs.

Command Level PME achieved new records for enlisted personnel. In 1977 the command NCO Academy graduated 1,061 students.

Reese bluesuiters support world-wide weapons meet

Three Reese bluesuiters and one T-38 will be taking part in William Tell '78, the world-wide weapons meet.

According to base officials, Capt. Louis D. Wright and Capt. David A. Kinzer instructor pilots with the 54th Flying Training Squadron and SSgt. Robert Marko, a crew chief from Organizational Maintenance Squadron, will represent Reese at the Florida based meet.

The men will fly or maintain the lone T-38 which will be used as a "target" aircraft during the competition.

Top fighter interceptor teams from the U.S. Air Force and Canadian Forces will compete Sept. 15-Oct. 6, to test their aerial marksmanship.

The weapons meet is sponsored every two years by the Aerospace Defense



Command (ADCOM). The competition gives air defense units an opportunity to

demonstrate their proficiency in air defense operations.

Twelve teams from the Canadian Forces, ADCOM, Tactical Air Command, United States Air Forces in Europe, Pacific Air Forces, Air Forces Iceland and Air National Guard will compete.

Two "firsts" await this year's competitors. For the first time, teams will be pitted against PQM-102 drones in addition to firing missiles against subsonic and supersonic Firebee drones and towed targets.

Also, for the first time this year, some missions will be flown against manned targets using the Air Defense Weapons Center's new Air Combat range.

Air Force modifies leave request forms

Modifications to Air Force Form 988, "Leave Request/Authorization," are being considered by the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center (AFMPC) and the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center (AFAFC).

Proposed changes will reinstate the leave accrued block on the front and place selected leave policy and procedures information for the

member and supervisor on the reverse. The modifications, if approved, will be effective with the form's next printing.

Planned modifications are part of the previously announced changes in leave procedures designed to reduce abuse by military members.

Local finance officials say the new leave procedures will become effective Sept. 1, 1978.

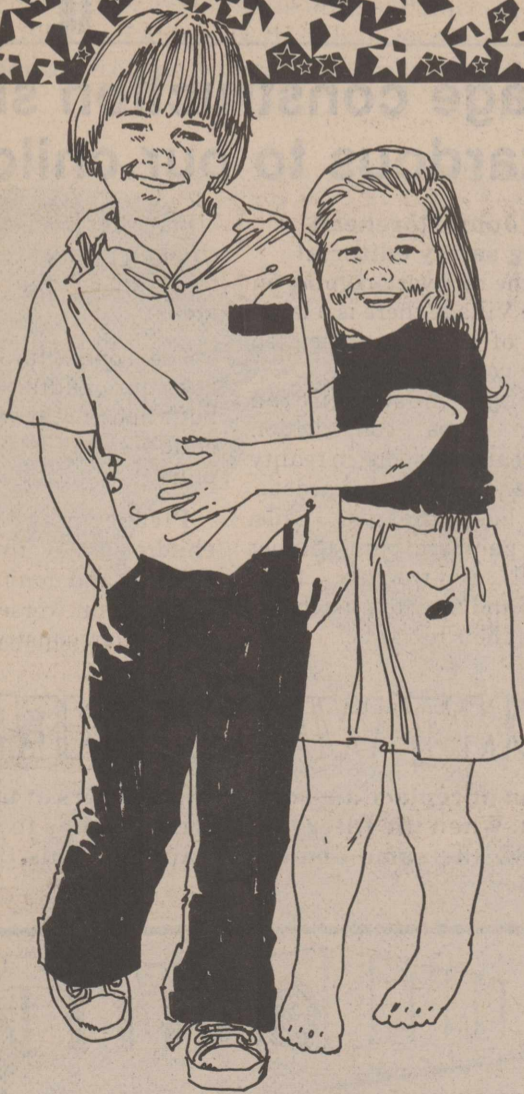

Community Service Council asks for local blood donors

The countdown has reached seven days for Reese's base-wide blood drive.

The Community Service Council (CSC) sponsored drive will be held in the Simler Theater lobby on Aug. 25, one week from today. Local officials say that the blood drive will be conducted by the South Plains Blood Service and will run from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

A CSC spokesman emphasized the need for maximum participation at the drive because of the huge quantities

of blood required by the South Plains Blood Service within its 22 county area of responsibility.

A new drain on the service's blood supply is the Health Sciences Center Hospital. It is already requiring an average of 200 pints of blood per month and is expected to begin kidney transplants this fall — each transplant requires a minimum of four pints of blood. The South Plains area averages 80 pints of blood used per day.

Prospective donors must be between 17 and 65-years-old

and weigh at least 110 pounds. They can not give if pregnant or had a delivery, miscarriage or abortion within the past six weeks. Any major surgery within the past six months also rules out potential donors.

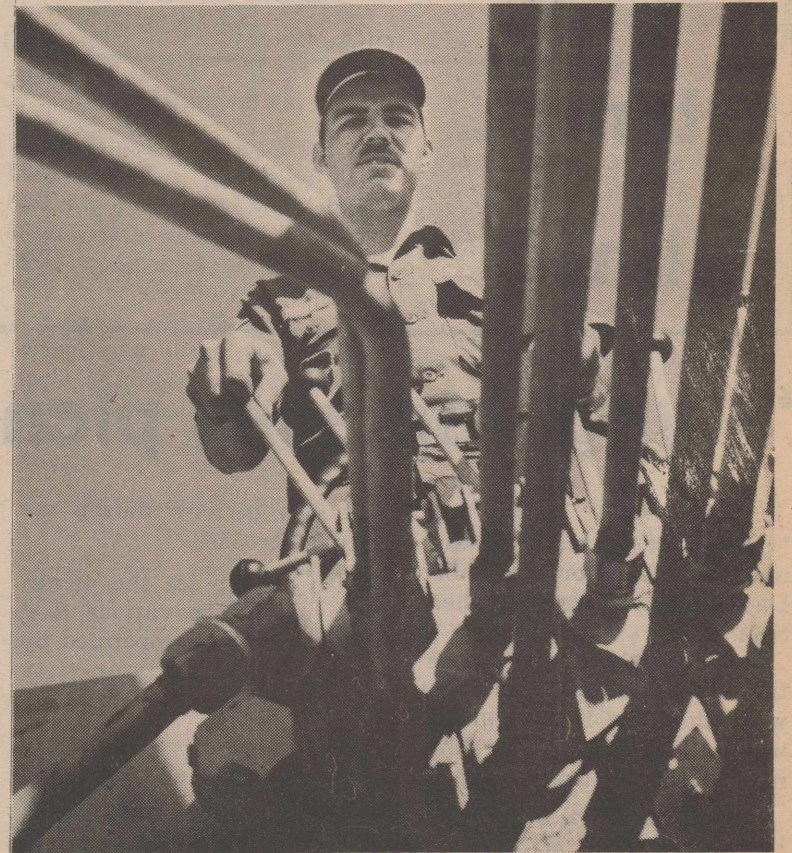
Donors should eat prior to giving blood, but; they should avoid extremely fatty foods up to four hours before giving blood. Donors will need to know their social security numbers when filling out the donor cards at the theater.

Student load to increase

Starting with Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 80-01, Reese's student load will increase approximately 50 per cent.

According to base officials, the size of new classes will be about 60 students compared with the average of 40 now being trained. UPT Class 80-01 will begin the T-37 phase of training in late November.

The official also noted that there will be a slight increase in the number of instructor pilots to help handle the new load.

According to Bill Tynan, Public Information Officer here, the famed Thunderbird show will highlight an afternoon of aviation events which also include the

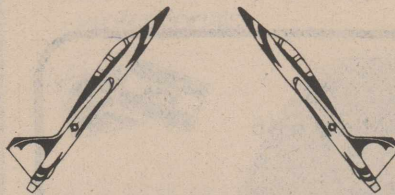
appearance of the U.S. Navy precision parachute team.

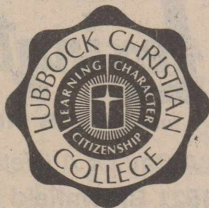

Legislators say 'no' to bagger surcharge

There will be no 2 per cent users' fee for commissary bagger services unless President Carter vetoes the fiscal year 1979 military authorization bill.

The House and Senate have approved an amendment to the bill which will exempt commissary baggers and carry-out personnel from the 1938 Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). The bill must now be sent to the President for signature.

After the President receives a bill, he has ten days (excluding Sundays) in which to sign or veto it, or it becomes law automatically. There is no indication when Congress will send the bill to the President, but a bill normally averages about three work days to reach the White House, according to Air Force officials.

The fiscal year 1979 authorization bill primarily covers the period Oct. 1, 1978-Sept. 30, 1979, but the provision pertaining to baggers and carry-out personnel is permanent legislation. If the President signs the bill, they will remain independent agents working for tips.

The users' fee was initially scheduled to take effect July 31 to provide salaries for commissary baggers and carry-out personnel, and to cover costs of administering the program. The Civil Service Commission had ruled baggers and carryout personnel are government employees entitled to minimum wage under FLSA.

The Department of Defense had postponed the users' fee until Sept. 30 because Congress was considering the amendment to exempt baggers and carry-out personnel from FLSA.

New CHAMPUS forms due

CHAMPUS Form 500, a new claims form for both CHAMPUS and CHAMPVA beneficiaries will probably be available in November. The form was developed by CHAMPUS officials because of the large number of claims returned to beneficiaries for additional or correct information under the old form (DA 1863-2).

First Lt. Bob Griggs, Reese CHAMPUS advisor, said the new form is for use for noninstitutional care from

civilian providers such as physicians, pharmacies, medical suppliers and medical equipment suppliers. Lieutenant Griggs said that noninstitutional claims account for about 70 per cent of all claims.

Lieutenant Griggs encourages individuals to use the new form as soon as available. Officials said that CHAMPUS contractors will continue to process noninstitutional claims under the old form until Feb. 1, 1979.

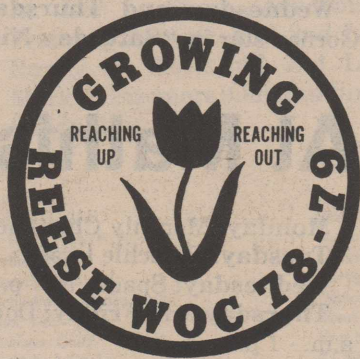

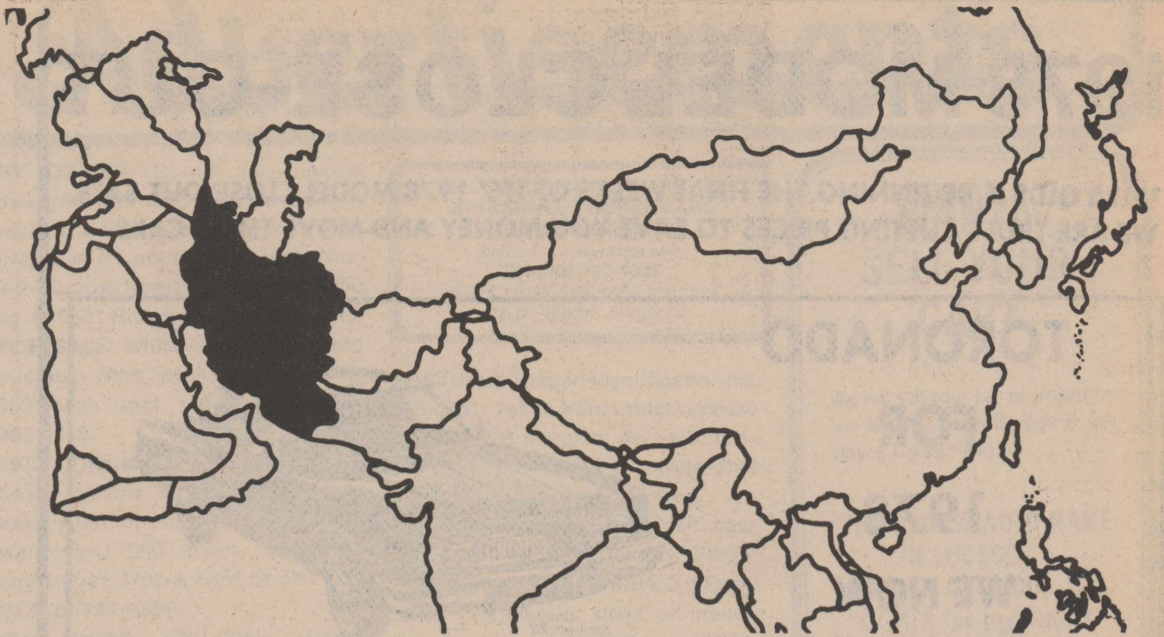

Iran: Ancient nation prospers today

(Continued from last week)

(Editor's Note: With the arrival of Cadet Reza Pahlavi, Crown Prince of Iran, and five other Imperial Iranian Air Force students here for undergraduate pilot training, Reese people need to know a little about Iran, its history and customs. The following is a capsule look at our ally in the Middle East.)

Iran, historically known as Persia, is counted among the world's most ancient nations. Its first period of greatness was from 559 to 330 B.C. under Achaemenians, a dynasty founded by Cyrus the Great. In 1971, the country celebrated the 2,500th anniversary of the Persian Empire.

Covering an area slightly larger than Alaska, Iran has more than 33 million people. Iranians enjoy free education through college, free health care and other benefits. The average individual income ballooned from about \$150 in 1966 to more than \$1,100 in 1976 and is still rising.

In Iran, the New Year celebration begins on March 21, the first day of spring. A figure called Amo Nooruz, similar to the western Santa Claus,

symbolizes the bringing of gifts for the people. Friends are invited to visit, celebrate and eat and when they are leaving the host gives them presents.

Iran is the largest purchaser of defense equipment from the United States under the Foreign Military Sales Act. Under the same act, Iran also sends students to the United States for training under the Security Assistance Program Training.

From research done at the Air University Library at Maxwell AFB, Iranian oil exports have been estimated at 828.1 million barrels a day at \$13.95 per barrel. In 1977, U.S. exports to Iran totaled \$3,004 million while imports from Iran amounted to 2,756 million.

Iran is a constitutional monarchy in which the Shah plays an active role. The Prime Minister (head of government) is appointed by the Shah. Other cabinet members are appointed by the Prime Minister with the approval of both Houses of Parliament.

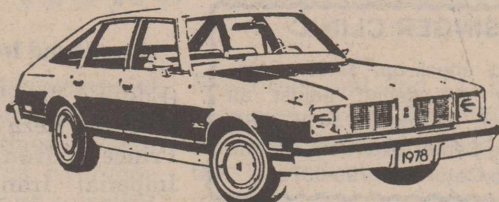

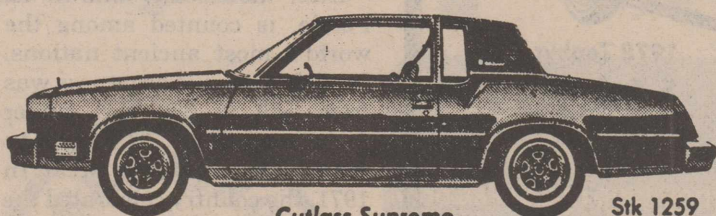

Jack Kearney and Kevin Heise have done it again — torn up another golf course for a "best ball" partnership title.

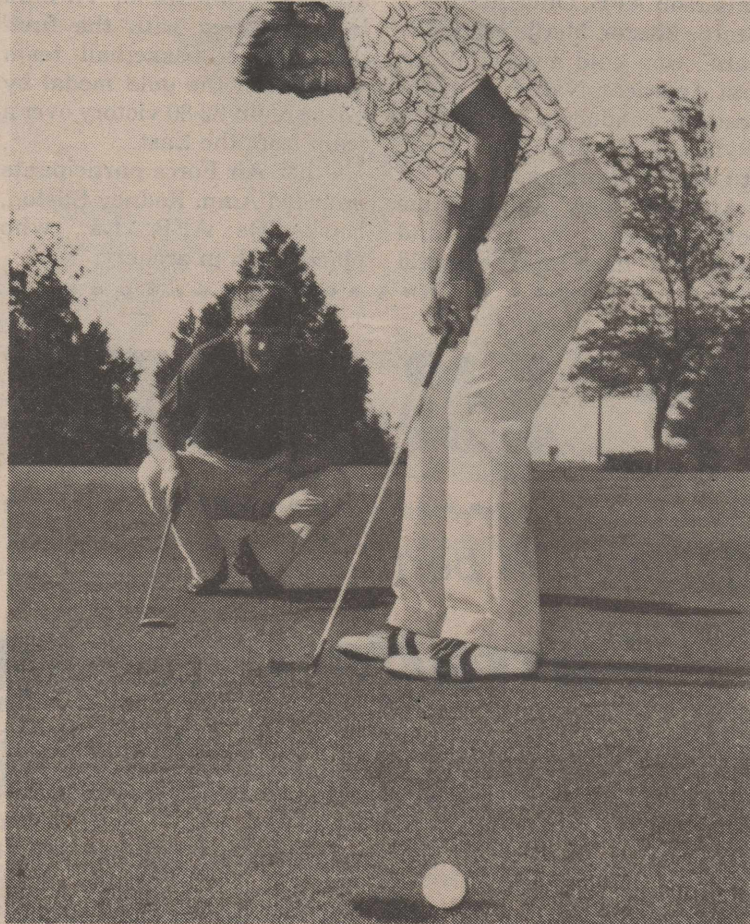

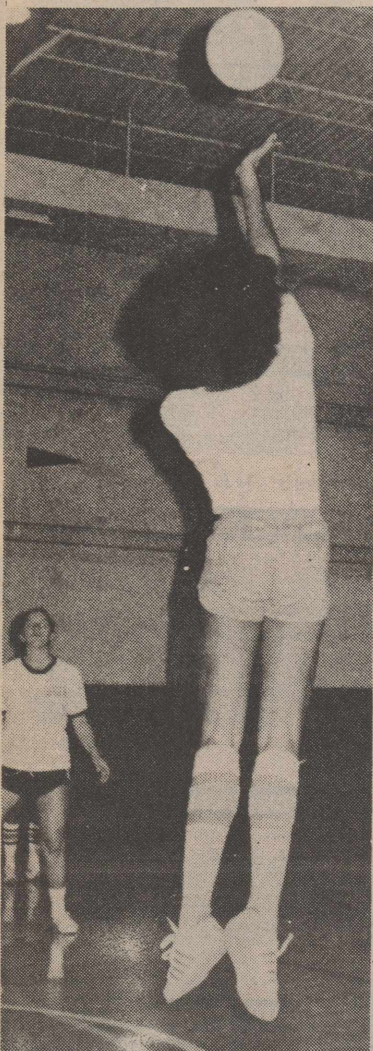
Coaches are needed for women in basketball, volleyball and racquetball.
