Members of the local service will be on hand from

the lobby of the Simler Theater. CSC officials indicate that they hope this drive will top the 40 pints donated during the last drive held here in May.

The South Plains Blood Service supplies 38 local hospitals and requires 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. today in approximately 80 pints per

day to service the 22-county area. One year ago the figure was 70 points per day. Kidney transplants expected to start this fall at the Health Sciences Center will add an even larger burden on the South Plains Blood Service.

Prospective donors must

be between 17 and 65-yearsold and weigh at least 110 pounds. Donors should eat prior to giving blood, but; they should avoid extremely fatty foods up to four hours before donating.

CSC officials encourage Reese supervisors to allow their people time to give.

# Base gets \$66,000 CFC goal

The Combined Federal Campaign gets underway here Sept. 13 with Reese people being tasked for a "fair share" total of \$66,000, up \$6,000 from last year's target.

Maj. Robert Lee Clark, CFC project officer, said Tuesday that approximately 100 key workers will start visiting base units the second week in September with hopes of having the campaign wrapped up by Sept. 22.

The project officer pointed out that he hopes most people will donate to the campaign through the payroll deduction program. "Payroll deduction is the easiest way to contribute," said Major Clark. "The fair share amounts suggested don't take a very big chunk out of pay checks, but; they really add up for the CFC during this year."

The Reese goal makes up more than two-thirds of the goal for federal employees on the South Plains. The combined target for Reese and other local agencies is \$90,000. Reese shattered the target in last year's campaign, collecting \$79,703.48 for slightly better than 135 per cent of its goal.

Reese military and civilian employees are urged by CFC officials to donate their fare share or approximately one hour's wage per month. For example, an airman (E-2)

should give \$2.65 per month and a technical sergeant should give \$4.50 each month. The suggested donation for a first lieutenant is \$11 per month while the fair share for a major is \$17.50. On the civilian side of the house, a GS-3 has a fair share of \$1.95 every pay period (two weeks) while the target for a GS-6 is \$4.85. A WG-8 should donate about \$5.50 every two weeks and a WS-7 should give

The CFC Supports numerous service agencies including the United Way and its 34 charitable groups. #### Haircut costs up

Today I went into the base Beauty Shop to get a hair cut and the price had raised 75 cents and I just want to know the justification there was because the price did not raise any more in the base Barber Shop or the Officers' Club Barbar Shop.

AAFES contract concessions provide the service in our Beauty Shop. AAFES regulations provide AFFES flexibility in establishing prices to meet local market conditions and maintain BX prices at a level which offer a

reasonable savings to the customer. The BX prices are determined by a survey of local community beauty shops. The local beauty shop prices are averaged and the BX tries to reduce their prices 25 to 30 per cent below the local average.

On July 10, the BX Beauty Shop went under a new contractor for the third time within nine months. A price for men's haircuts is not included in the prices established in the contract, therefore the contractor is not obligated to perform this service. Rather than refuse service to the male patron, the contractor has instructed the Beauty Shop personnel to provide the service at a charge of \$3. The average price for this service in a local beauty shop is \$6.50 and \$3.75 at the Beauty College where people are just learning to cut hair.

Our beauticians are trained professionals and they require approximately 20 minutes or more to cut a male's hair versus 8-10 minutes for a hair cut in the Barber Shop. The major reason for the time difference is the Beauty Shop provides a semi-hairstyling while the Barber Shop provides only the cutting at their price of \$2.25. The services received at the Beauty Shop and those at the Barber Shop are not the same, thus the price difference.

## Can hats cause headaches?

Hats — although they are intended as a head covering they can cause a number of physical ills. The specific ill, of course, depends on the individual

These ills range from headaches, down through the body to heartburn.

On the serious side, there is no proven medical relationship between these ills and hats. The ills are caused by the misuse and abuse of hats. Think about the last time you corrected someone or were corrected — yourself. Didn't it at least cause you some "heartburn"? Obviously, there's no need if everyone would abide by the intent of AFR 35-10 and conform to the Air Force requirements.

Although 35-10 doesn't give any guidelines as to when to change oil in your hat, a little bit of common sense should prevail. When the hat comes to you when you whistle or when it stands by itself, it's too late. In this weather, as soon as the oil marks start to show around the edges of the flight cap or you can scrape on the cloth seatband of a fatigue cap with your fingernail and see a mark—it's too late. There's not too much that looks worse than a hat that drips oil like a grease rag.

The biggest problem around Reese seems to be concerning the flight caps and fatigue cap. The oil problem is a fairly common one with most hats. Another fairly common problem is the hat that is folded, bent, misshapen, spindled, or otherwise mutilated to fit in a pocket. A fold in a flight cap causes the wearer to appear as if his head is hinged in the middle, since a cap generally conforms to the shape of the head. The fatigue cap gives the observer the same impression.

Another problem with hats is that quite a few people have "hat" and "no-hat" areas confused. The common conception seems to be that hats are to be worn indoors and not worn outdoors. Actually, this is not true. Hats were originally designed as protection from birds and other flying objects. It follows then, that since there are no birds indoors and there are birds outdoors, you should wear a hat outdoors to protect your hair. Seriously though, hats are intended to be worn outdoors by all personnel at all times, except in areas designated by the commander as "no-hat" areas.

Remember, proper wear and care of your hat will guarantee that that part of your uniform will "LOOK GREAT IN '78" and many years beyond.



### **CHAMPUS** users share costs

This is the first of a series of articles to help you to better understand the CHAMPUS

CHAMPUS is not a Health Insurance Program, although it

is similar in many respects. The program does not involve premium payments as does similar Civilian Health Insurance Programs.

Many persons inquire as to how they may enroll in the program? There is no action on the individual's part for enrollment, their eligibility is based on their status and relationship to the sponsor. Basically, Active Duty Dependents, Retired Members and their Dependents and Dependents of deceased Members are eligible for care.

The only type of identification needed is the Uniformed Services identification card. DD Form 1173 for dependents, and the DD Form 2AF (Gray) card for retirees. Active Duty Personnel are not eligible for CHAMPUS Benefits. The identification card will indicate whether or not you are authorized care from civilian

CHAMPUS is a cost-sharing program. Anytime you receive

care from a Civilian Source, you will have to share the expenses. The actual amount that you will have to pay is based on your "cost-share" under CHAMPUS rules and whether or not you choose a "participating provider." A participating provider is one who will sign the claim form, and accept what CHAMPUS pays as the total payment of the bill. You will not be held liable for any amount which CHAMPUS will not pay if the provider signs the claim form, you will, however, be liable for your cost-share. For more information, contact me in the Registrar office or call ext. 3521.

#### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL CARE CLASS**

Do you know how to help injured in case of an accident? Lubbock Christian College will sponsor classes in Emergency Medical Care this fall. ### Commissary plans October discounts

The Air Force Commissary Service (AFCOMS) plans a special 30-day sale starting Oct. 3 for Air Force commissaries worldwide, says John Foster, Reese Commissary officer.

More than 300 items will be included in the sale, which AFCOMS officials said will offer savings of nearly 20 per cent off from everyday commissary prices.

Overseas commissaries will be allowed to extend the sale if they experience delays in receiving merchandise from their U.S. shippers.

"We can document that we saved our customers \$1.5 million in 1977 as a result of special sales only," said Maj. Gen. Daniel L. Burkett, AFCOMS commander. "This year we expect those savings to be at least \$2 million.

"We recognize the problem that inflation and the declining dollar is causing military members worldwide. The AFCOMS staff has been working with vendors and manufacturers in order to obtain and pass on to our patrons the best savings possible," he said.

Foster urges commissary shoppers to watch for the AFCOMS Smart Owl, which he calls a merchandising "eye catcher" to call attention to discounts at least 15 per cent below normal commissary

The special sale highlights AFCOMS' second anniversary. AFCOMS was established in January 1976 and assumed operational control of Air Force commissaries Oct. 1 that same

Since then, AFCOMS officials say they have streamlined operations, reduced expenses and continued to save patrons money.





### October UPT classes take on four women







Foreign students from Iran, Belgium and Thailand will be traveling from Reese to Washington D.C. next month as part of a special Foreign


Training Information program.



# Intramural golf starts playoffs


Four intramural golf teams were slated to fight for the base title yesterday as the playoffs opened on the Reese links.


