

# T-38's are 'cost effective'


have flown the Northrop T-38 Talon, a twin-engine turbojet primarily used by the Air Force for pilot training. It is the first trainer-type aircraft employed for Thunderbird use. At one time, the Talon held 12 world records, eight of which were set before completion of the plane's flight test program by noted aviatrix Jacqueline Cochran.

Though not specially constructed for use by the Thunderbirds, the plane has been slightly modified for demonstration aerobatics. This includes the addition of a nonpolluting smoke oil system which injects oil into the plane's exhaust, causing the oil to vaporize and form a white smoke trail. The plane's dramatic color scheme, its most visual modification, enhances



# T-bird pilots are 'pros'

To the unseasoned spectator, a Thunderbird performance seems reminiscent of daredevil barnstormers who leapfrogged cross-country in the twenties. Landing their open cockpit biplanes on grassy meadows after performing several heartstopping rolls and spins, the enterprising aviation pioneers offered rides for less than the price of a hamburger and fries at today's prices.

Nothing was planned. There were no schedules to meet, no crowd lines to adhere to and few, if any, regulations to follow. It was a carefree era when thrilling a crowd with dazzling aerial stunts and showy acrobatics took precedence over the safety of spectators and performers.

Today, however, airspace is rigidly controlled and monitored with sophisticated computers and radar tracking equipment. Strict regulations prime consideration.

Without special waivers from the Federal Aviation Administration, which ultimately grants approval for the exacting half-hour sequence of intricate maneuvers, the Thunderbirds could not perform. At some Thunderbird show sites, adjacent highways must be temporarily closed in the interest of safety.


While a Thunderbird demonstration is, indeed, a spectacular sight, some people refer to the maneuvers as "daring, death-defying stunts and acrobatics." But the Thunderbirds are quick to emphasize that not one portion of their aerial display is created specifically as a crowd thriller.

When the planes sweep past the spectators in the diamond formation the Thunderbirds are demonstrating maneuvers which have proved successful in

are enforced and safety is the actual combat situations. The same is true for each maneuver in the show - and every Air Force pilot has been taught variations of these same aerial combat tactics.

It's the ingrained discipline, concentrated practice, and precise timing required of the pilots which provide the basis for a truly unique Thunderbird show. These attributes, combined with a precisely choreographed launch ceremony, sharp appearance, descriptive narration, and vividly painted airplanes, transform an otherwise ordinary flight exhibition into an exhilarating Thunderbird aerial ballet.

Such precision cannot be accomplished by the daredevil or stunt flier. It must come from hours of practice, discipline, and sacrifice. It must come from an intense desire to achieve perfection. It must come from professionals.

# Air Force leaders discuss 'readiness'

Open House will not only see a lot of the Air Force, they will be hearing a lot about it too. And the one thing visitors will hear about the most is "readiness."

That's the key phrase in today's Air Force. From the Pentagon to Lackland AFB's basic military training school, readiness is what it's all about.

Recently, Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force Chief of Staff, and Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Training Command commander, had the opportunity to discuss the Air Forces state of readiness with two militarily oriented organizations. Both men had some interesting things to say about—readiness.

"The United States should not only support ready military people," said General Allen, "it should demand it.'

The Air Force Chief of Staff pointed out that to deter or counter Soviet ventures America needs ready forces. "Readiness is a contemporary

watchword for the capabilities we need," he explained, "it encompasses modern systems; responsive, tautly postured structure and organization; strong linkages through communication and through cooperation with allies; a full ladder of supplies and many other elements. Among these, ready people are foremost and,

People attending Reese's 29th like modern systems, they come at a price."

> General Roberts also talked about "quality people" as the key to readiness. "It takes people to insure readiness-top quality people who are well trained for their vital jobs," he

> The ATC commander emphasized that, "the Air Force has been fortunate to get quality people, but, that is becoming harder all the time. It's a changing world and many of the changes affect the people we are trying to recruit.

General Roberts pointed out that many of the incentives that military people took for granted are now either gone or are uncertainties. "The GI Bill educational program as we have known it, is past history; 20-year retirement is a 'maybe' proposition and commissaries, exchanges, medical care and other facets of the compensation package are constantly under fire."

While acknowledging that the salary is much higher than "when we joined up," it is still lower than what the Civil Service Commission wanted to pay the commissary baggers.

Switching to deterence, General Allen noted that, "The United States has successfully maintained strategic nuclear deterance, and for a considerable period of time now the military concept of supporting our deterant posture has been a Triad of strategic nuclear forces."

He went on to explains that the Triad forces include submarine launched balistic missiles, land-based ballistic missiles and air breathing weapons which include bombers and now the cruise


General Allen called the cruise missile a "remarkable" weapon which can penetrate Soviet defenses with high confidence and precision. "The cruise missile will present the Soviets with an extremely demanding defensive chore. It represents both deterrent power

and an incentive to arms control," he said.

The technological advances have made readiness more important than ever. "The days when we could respond the way we did after Pearl Harbor are gone forever," said General Roberts. "After that tragic attack we still had months and even years to mobilize our industry, round up willing recruits and supply combat ready people to combat zones. Those months and years we had for response have been compressed into minutes."




# Several exhibits on tap tomorrow


# Cherry heads T-birds


Lieutenant Colonel Dan Cherry flies the number one or lead aircraft for the Air Force Thunderbirds and is serving his second year as the unit's commander. In this dual capacity, it is his responsibility to manage the most visible flying unit in the Air Force.

"It's a most challenging job," says the Marietta, Georgia native. "The Thunderbirds have the unique responsibility of representing the thousands of talented Air Force men and women around the world who are working very hard to keep America free. Air Force people are truly a group of dedicated professionals. When you view our aerial demonstration we hope you will experience some of the same feelings of pride that we feel for the Air Force Blue."

Dan received his commission through the aviation cadet training program in 1960. He graduated from Florida Southern College with a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics and is currently studying for a master's degree in systems management from the University of Southern California.

Prior to his selection as the team's commander/leader, Dan served as operations officer for the 71st Tactical Fighter Squadron and chief of the Air Force Operations Briefing Team at the Pentagon. During two tours of duty in Southeast Asia, he recorded 295 combat missions in the F-105 and F-4 and was credited with an aerial victory over a North Vietnamese MiG-21.






# Thunderbird legends tell of proud, awesome bird

Long ago, before the vast southwest was settled, Indian tribes lived in awe of the many gods and spirits that ruled their destiny. When thunder and lightning pierced threatening skies, young braves stood reverently with outstretched arms, their eyes lifted heavenward in search of the great Thunderbird.

Huddled around glowing campfires near weathered tepees, aging but respected chiefs spoke cautiously of the bird's infinite strength.

Many tribes believed the majestic creature controlled nearly all the powers man could imagine, particularly the invisible forces of good conquering evil and light overcoming darkness. His long and honorable life, coupled with his ability to grant success in war, afforded the Thunderbird equal status with such Indian deities as the Earthmaker and the Sun God.


While reports of the bird's physical appearance are vague and hurled to earth.



and varied, experts generally agree that the Thunderbird resembled a gigantic eagle or hawk. Crude drawings and burnt outlines on leather and buckskin depicted the bird in typical southwestern Indian colors of red, white, and blue.

Thunder was believed to be caused by the flapping of the bird's mighty wings and lightning was attributed to the opening and closing of the bird's fiery eyes or to arrows carried in its razor-sharp talons

When the name "Thunderbirds" was selected by the first team in 1953, the Air Force's Air Demonstration Squadron was based near Phoenix, Arizona, an area steeped in Indian lore. Then, as today, the roar and fire from their sleek jets, reminiscent of the thunder and lightning in the legend, symbolize peace and goodwill a tradition with which the Thunderbirds firmly identify. No other name would do. No other name could do.

# IFS opens doors to base visitors

Although most of the Open House activities will be centered on or around the Reese flightline, one major activity will be taking place in the middle of the base.

The Instrument Flight Simulator (IFS) complex, a multi-million dollar Air Training Command (ATC) hallmark, will be open for tours from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m.

The Reese simulator is the first of six facilities to be installed at Air Training Command (ATC) bases.

It opened its doors to the first students in August of 1977.

The use of the simulator complex reduced the actual flying time for each student by about 40 hours or approximately 20 per cent of the hours required in the conventional program.


The Reese facility requires a staff of 80 operators and logistical support personnel. The simulator complex consists of 16 individual simulators (eight T-37 and eight T-38

cockpit motion bases). Each motion base provides the student with simulated flight motion in many directions.

While "flying one of the Reese simulators, both the student and instructor pilot observe a realistic terrain on elaborate television screens mounted on the simulator "windows." The picture is beamed from a color television camera moving above a large terrain map board in another room. The camera turns, climbs and descends based upon inputs from the cockpit.

The simulator concept offers a totally safe environment to practice instrument and emergency procedures in a realistic, controlled and economical environment.

# Aerial team's enlisted work hard, flash pride

They've been up since before dawn pre-flighting their airplanes, making final checks, and loading the support aircraft. It's now 3 p.m. and they've spent the last seven hours tucked compactly inside a constantly vibrating C-130. In a few moments, the plane will touch down and taxi to a predesignated parking spot on the ramp. Although they were at work more than 10 hours ago, the Thunderbirds NCOs' work day is just about to begin.

It's a hectic schedule, one that requires the utmost in ability and performance. The job demands long hours of bonetiring travel. Yet as the Thunderbird NCOs step from their aerial home, their pride, professionalism and dedication are evident.

It's not merely an image they present to the public. It's a complete lifestyle - the Thunderbird trademark. Each team member earns the right to wear the coveted Thunderbird patch only after successfully completing a competitive selection and observation process.

More than 50 of the team's NCOs are responsible for assuring all Thunderbird aircraft are maintained in a flight ready status. The remaining NCOs provide the essential skills needed to support the flying mission.

Specialists and technicians in administration, supply, life support, photography, graphics, operations, and information work with their maintenance counterparts to produce a


The show is slated for a 2 p.m. start, and will help get the

Many of the aircraft will zome past the viewing stands in excess of 120 miles per hour as radio control pilcts try to duplicate many of the formations and manuevers of the "big boys" — the Thunderbirds.

Members of the show team will be on hand before the show in Hanger 82 to give spectators a close up look at the scaled down models and to answer any questions they have about radio control flying.

The model show is one of the annual highlights at the Reese Open House.





# Since 1941 Reese has instructed fliers

Lubbock Army Air Field (later to become Reese AFB) came into existence on June 23, 1941, shortly after the citizens of Lubbock area donated over 2,000 acres of land west of Lubbock to the government for construction of the training facility.

The field was officially opened in late 1941, and the training of aviation cadets began in early 1942.

By the end of World War II a total of 7,000 bomber, fighter and transport pilots had been trained at the facility. With the end of the war, the base was closed down on Dec. 31, 1945.

The base was reactivated on Aug. 1, 1949, with the 3500th Pilot Training Wing moving to Reese from Barksdale AFB, La.

First Lt. Augustus F. Reese, Jr. had lived in Shallowater, located about six miles north of the base. He was killed in action at Cagliari, Sardina, May 14, 1943, while on a mission in a P-38 to destroy a railroad supply

Lubbock Army Air Field train. The ceremony naming ater to become Reese AFB) the field Reese AFB was held ame into existence on June 23, Nov. 5, 1949.

Many training airplanes have been used at Reese — the T-6, T-28, AT-7.

The first jet trainer, the T-33, was introduced on Sept. 4, 1958.

The second jet trainer, the T-37, entered the program on March 13, 1961. Training went supersonic in 1963 when the T-38 replaced the T-33.

In 1965 the T-41, a military version of the Cessna 172 was introduced. It was brought in as a preflight trainer.

The newest innovation in pilot training was introduced in August 1977, when the Air Force's first Instrument Flight Simulator began training students at Reese. The IFS became fully operational with pilots training in both T-37 and T-38 simulators in April 1978. The simulator reduces actual flying time, reduces fuel cost, increases safety and aids student proficiency.


# Scarbrough pilots solo jet







# CARE Line

(Editor's Note: All calls to the CARE Line MUST be accompanied by the caller's full name and duty phone so that answers may be provided personally if space is not available in THE ROUNDUP. All information will be held in confidence and names will be withheld from print upon request. Names and numbers are required in order to give quick, personal responses to legitimate questions. ### Hospital appointments

(Commander's note: We have received two complaints that the Hospital asks people who are more than 10 minutes late for a routine medical appointment to reschedule. I hope the following will clarify the need for this policy.)

Hospital outpatient appointments are constantly at a premium and patients are instructed to cancel their appointments at the earliest possible time if and when it becomes apparent they will not be able to report for their appointment at the prescribed time.

The hospital will hold open a patient's appointment for a maximum of 10 minutes past the appointed time with the full understanding that traffic and parking problems sometimes cause patients to arrive in the clinic a few moments late. If the patient is late in excess of 10 minutes for an appointment, however, they are asked to reschedule their appointment.

This procedure has been adopted for the convenience and courtesy of all of our patients. Routine appointments are scheduled in 20 minute intervals which in most instances is the appropriate time required for a health care provider to provide a thorough examination. Patients who report excessively late not only waste the health care provider's time but also waste an appointment that someone else could have utilized.

The possibility exists that as a result of the wasted appointment another patient was forced to then seek medical attention at their expense in the civilian community. If the hospital is to

allow patients to report late for appointments in excess of 10 minutes it is unfair to all the patients that follow on that particular day.

A delayed appointment in most cases forces the health care provider to run behind schedule for the remainder of his scheduled appointments. Patients are encouraged to be considerate of all the other patients and make every effort to arrive for their appointment on time.

### **Orientation rides**

Controllers are not allowed to get familiarization rides here at Reese because of fuel allotments. But right now we have a C-141 parked on the main ramp and ROTC candidates are being given rides in the T-37's. I would like to know why Controllers can't be given the same rides, which would be helpful in their job.

Your question concerning orientation flights is probably shared by many of our personnel who want an opportunity to fly an operational aircraft during their tour of duty. While fuel allocations have a bearing on the number of orientation flights we provide, it is not the only criteria. In the case of ROTC cadets, these flights have proven to have an extremely high motivational value. In other words, they are cost effective because of the positive influence orientation flights have on recruiting cadets.

As you undoubtedly know, orientation flights are flown on a discriminating basis for selected

personnel at Reese including controllers of your unit. Others receiving orientation flights include non-pilot instructors, air traffic controllers (FAA), maintenance (Crew Chief of the Month and Maintenance Man of the Year), the Wing Airman of the Month, Wing NCO of the Quarter, the Senior NCO of the Year, and the Wing Junior Officer of the Year (support officer).

What I am saying is that selected Reese people are receiving orientation flights and will continue to receive them to the extent that it is proven to be an effective use of an expensive resource.

You might be interested to know that your OIC agrees with you and has been working to increase the numer of flights authorized for controllers. As a result of his efforts, this subject is under review and may be revised slightly in the near future. I must emphasize that we will not open the gates, but will continue to require strong justification. Your best opportunity to obtain an orientation flight is to perform in an outstanding manner that makes you the most competitive person for one of the authorized rides. I wish you the best of luck and hope to hear from you again if you get that flight.

# 'Direct Pay' program keeps pay day simple

Paydays are safer and more convenient for the 2,268 people on Reese who are taking advantage of the "Sure Pay" program. There remains, however, 38 officers, 610 airmen and NCOs and 174 civilians who, for various reasons, still depend on the U.S. Mail for check delivery each payday.

Ever wonder why the direct pay deposit program can be given such a pretentious name as "Sure Pay?" Let's approach the explanation with a look at some of the reasons you may not get paid next payday.

• An undetected error in the computerized payroll process.

A failure in the positive controls on checks after preparation.

• An undetected malfunction in the mail inserting machine, placing two or more checks in the same envelope.

• An error in manual sorting of checks by ZIP code, sending your check to the wrong substation..

• Mishandling by the Post Office.

• Check "ripped off" from your post office box.

• The check is destroyed after

receipt. Some typical reasons offered each payday include: eaten by my dog, run through the washer, thrown out with the trash and lost.

There are just a few of the things that occur. Next payday, one of the three to five people who won't receive their checks on time will come up with a new one. You could say that five to 822 aren't bad odds and you may continue to say that until it happens to you. If yours is one of the first six reasons listed, after a reasonable wait for the check, you can be rescued by the Reese AFO. If yours is the seventh reason, you can expect to wait 60-120 days for a check replacement by the Treasurer of the U.S. Do the odds look a lot different now?

"Sure Pay" may be the answer for you. Simply open an account in a financial institution and authorize us to deposit your check in that account. Prior to each payday you'll receive a statement showing the amount to be deposited to your account. The Military or Civilian Pay Sections in bldg. 800 can help you join your "Sure Pay" friends.

# **Emergency room abuse** forces stronger policy

People continue reporting to the Emergency Room after duty hours with all types of problems that could and should be seen in the Primary Care or Pediatrics Clinics during normal duty hours.

Emergency room treatment of colds, insect bites, rashes, etc., are not necessary, since the Hospital has generally been able to provide appointments within 24 hours. The Hospital established new Emergency Room Procedures last October to effectively use its manpower and resources. Because of minimal manning, effective measures must be taken to reduce non-emergency visits to the Emergency Room.

Patients who repot to the Emergency Room after duty hours will be screened and examined. Those patients determined not to be "true" emergencies will not be treated. The Hospital no longer stocks cold preparations and similar medications in the Emergency Room. However, patients will be given an appointment in the next days Primary Care or the Pediatrics Clinic as is appropriate.

If you have a fireplace, be sure damper is closed except when the fire is going, otherwise heated or cooled air goes wastefully up the chimney.



# White House, DoD key renewal of urine testing

As a result of White House initiatives and a Department of Defense directive, a new urinalysis program has been established by the Air Force.

Maj. Vincent Micucci, chief of Social Actions here, explains that the program is designed to determine the extent of illegal drug usage within the Air Force.

"For enlisted peronnel," said the major, "a requirement has been set by Air Force Headquarters to annually test 60 per cent of all people 25 years old or younger," he pointed out that this age group of enlisted personnel exhibits the highest incidents of illegal drub abuse. Unit commanders will select those to be tested by name, rather than on the random system used in previous programs.

Major Micucci further explained that, "All officers, regardless of age, will be tested at their first base of assignment."

What this all translates into is that approximately 50 bluesuiters will be tested here

each month. Although base officials admit that the testing will be a hassle for most members, they maintain that the advantages of obtaining an accurate drug abuse assessment is of paramount importance in the Air Forces' fight against drug abuse.

The Social Actions spokesman warns that although no disciplinary action may be taken as a result of the testing, failure to show up for the testing would be a violation of a direct order and certainly punishable. The major also noted that certain administrative actions may be taken if the test results are positive.

Hand in Hand with this program is a publicity campaign to increase the awareness of all military personnel of the Limited Privilege Communications Program (LPCP). "We hope that by putting more emphasis on LPCP, we can get more people into the rehabilitation program on a volunteer basis," says Major Micucci.

LPCP, initiated in 1971, is for Air Force members who voluntarily present themselves to their commander, first sergeant, social actions officer or medical personnel for treatment and rehabilitation in regard to personal use of drugs. Persons volunteering for help under the LPCP are protected from disciplinary actions under the Uniform Code of Military Justice, and from separation with less than an honorable discharge.

Air Force personnel are afforded this protection under the LPCP as long as they are not under investigation for drug usage; have not been apprehended for usage; or have not been advised of action to recommend them for administrative discharge because of their usage of drugs.





# Base pilot training mission includes foreign students

Although the primary mission at Reese is to train pilots for the United States Air Force, several foreign students receive flying and technical training here under the Security Assistance Training Program (SATP).

Capt. George D. Reasonover Jr., chief of Foreign Training here, explained that foreign students receive SATP instruction under two different programs — Foreign Military Sales and Grant Aid.

"Most of the students trained here," says Captain Reasonover, "fall under the Foreign Military Sales program. As part of a 'package' deal included in the sale of modern aircraft to our allies, the United States trains the men and women who will fly and provide ground support for the new aircraft."

A few students receive training under the Grant Aid program in which the United States pays for the cost of training. However, with the increase in Foreign Military Sales the past few years, Grant Aid Training has been reduced to a small portion of SATP. For example, only one out of the last nine foreign students to train here was funded through Grant Aid.

Captain Reasonover pointed out that the U.S. receives many positive benefits from SATP. Some of these are: the reduced likelyhood of direct U.S. military involvement in foreign disputes; standardization of equipment among the allied forces, broader logistics support through cooperative arrangements, maintenance of overseas base and overflight right, aided U.S. balance of trade and enhancement of U.S. Air Force influence world wide.

And, the foreign students learn more in SATP than just how to fly or maintain aircraft. Two per cent of the money paid for the program by the participating countries goes for an informational program that exposes the students to the American lifestyle. It includes tours of other cities, museums, courthouses, factories and visits into the homes of their military instructors and members of the local community.

This weekend, eight students are on a tour of Washington D.C., where they will get an "up close and personal" look at America's government in action.





### Walters offers seminar

Col. William B. Walters of the U.S. Army Reserve in Lubbock is offering qualified persons the opportunity to enroll in the National Security Management Course Seminar through the group study program.

The seminar program is divided into six units that must be completed in two years.

Classes will be conducted weekly on Wednesdays beginning on Oct. 4 and running through May. They will be held in the Army Reserve Training Center at 2819 4th St. Classes will run from 7 to 9 p.m. with provision made for makeup meetings. No meetings will be scheduled during holiday

Persons eligible for the course are active duty and reserve officers of any branch of service in the grade of lieutenant colonel, commander or above, or those officers in the grade of major or lieutenant commander who have a baccalaureate degree or have completed a command and staff course or its equivalent. Federal, state or local government employees rated GS-13 or above who have baccalaureate degrees and whose duties relate to the education provided by the course are also eligible.

The classroom atmosphere is informal as the course is designed to foster group discussion in order to arrive at a

problem's best solution. Topics covered include economic and political aspects of the National Government, international relations, the national budget, and duties of various governmental posts and agencies.

Reservists will receive retirement point credit for attendance and completion of each unit. A certificate of graduation is awarded upon completion of the course.

Persons interested in enrolling in the course should contact Colonel Walters at home at 799-8092. Early action is desired to insure enrollment.


### Talon Inn sets new hours on trial basis

### Get airman ready for testing

Almost nine months ago the "STRIPE" program began. STRIPE, the acronym for Superior Training Results in Promotion Enrichment, stemmed from two fundamental enlisted promotion problems.

First, a failure of minorities (blacks, women and Spanish speaking) to achieve promotion rates commensurate with the majority and secondly, an abdication by the supervisor of his role to help get his people promoted. Complete and

thorough training, motivation, and evaluation and feedback are supervisory roles in this promotion scheme. The new round of Weighted Airmen Promotion (WAPS) testing which commences this month will provide supervisors an opportunity to make STRIPE work.

It is Air Force policy to reference WAPS test questions to study and reference materials. readily available. Information on references used to write promotion tests is published in AFP 39-8, WAPS Study Reference List. To do the best when testing, make the most out of AFP 39-8 by being certain that you obtain and study all correct or applicable references. The WAPS Study Reference List is published twice a year, in May and in September. Copies are available through your unit orderly room, your WAPS monitor/WAPS Library, and/or your servicing CBPO. Make sure you consult the correct edition.

Members testing under WAPS should set up a study schedule and adapt to diligent study habits. Supervisors should take a personal interest in the course of their subordinates' studies. Total effort on the part of the members testing and their supervisors will help to get more eligibles promoted during the next promotion cycle.'

# 5.5%: Carter recommends lower military raise for Oct. 1st

President Carter has proposed a 5.5 per cent limit to the Oct. 1 pay raise for about 2.1 million military members and 1.4 million federal civilian employees. For military personnel, the increase will apply equally to Basic Pay and Quarters and subsistence allowances.

Military members can determine their approximate overall pay increase by multiplying Basic Pay and Housing and subsistence allowances by 5.5 per cent each and totaling the three figures. The actual difference in future take-home pay will be slightly less than the total because of social security and income taxes to be withheld from basic pay.

The House of Representatives or the Senate can override the 5.5 per cent rate by adopting a

disapproval resolution. If either House adopts such a resolution, an 8.4 per cent pay adjustment would become effective Oct. 1.

The Federal Pay Comparability Act requires the President to adjust salary rates each year in October for Federal employees under the General Schedule and most other white-collar systems. Military members receive an adjustment comparable to the average change in the General Schedule rates.

The President must adjust Federal Pay at a rate his advisers say will achieve comparability with salaries in the private sector or he must propose an alternate plan.

The President's pay agent (The Secretary of Labor, does not Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Chairman of the Civil Service determine Commission) determined an systems.

average increase of 8.4 per cent would be necessary to achieve the required comparability.

"I would normally have no hesitancy in ordering a pay raise achieving comparability," the President told Congress.

He said he proposed the 5.5 per cent limit "in the light of the overall economic situation now facing our country... This will allow the Federal Government to set an example for labor and industry and lead the fight against inflation by example, and not just words alone..."

The 5.5 per cent raise will cost about \$2.9 billion. An 8.4 per cent raise would cost \$4.5 billion, according to White House figures.

The annual pay adjustment does not apply to Federal bluecollar workers or postal service employees whose pay rates are determined under different systems

# Carter's veto leaves bagger issue cloudy

The Department of Defense has postponed the two per cent users' fee for commissary bagger and carryout services until Dec. 31.

The fee was originally to begin July 31. DoD postponed it until Sept. 30 to allow congress time to act on a proposed amendment to the Fiscal Year 1979 Military Authorization Bill.

Congress approved the amendment last month to permanently exempt baggers and carryout personnel from the provisions of the 1938 Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), but President Carter vetoed the Military Authorization Bill.

Congress has sustained the veto and is expected to pass a new Authorization Bill soon containing a similar FLSA exemption. If the Bill passes with that exemption and is passed by the President, the two per cent users' fee would not be required.

The services planned the users' fee after the Civil Service Commission ruled that bagger personnel must be paid wages under the FLSA. The two per cent fee would be necessary in the United States, the services said, to provide salaries for the baggers and carryout people and to cover the costs of administering the program.





### AF needs recruiters

Recruiting Service is having increasing difficulty in attracting volunteers for recruiting duty in several metropolitan areas, officials have announced.

Higher cost of living off base is the reason given to members of the Recruit-the-Recruiter team by many NCOs for not volunteering for recruiting duty. This is especially true in some high cost areas where there is a shortage of recruiters.

"I want to assure all NCOs who want to join us that government leased housing will be available to those who meet the eligibility criteria for family or bachelor leases in the area assigned," Brig. Gen. William P. Acker, Recruiting Service commander, said. "These leases, like on base quarters, include all utilities, except telephone service."

Each recruiting squadron has appointed a housing officer to provide our recruiters in high cost areas with housing support similar to the way on base housing officers function.

In addition to making adequate housing available by government leases to eligible sergeants (with more than two years) through master sergeants, recruiters receive a one-time \$83 clothing allowance, increased ration allowances, up to \$40 per month out-of-pocket expense reimbursement, and up to \$150 monthly special duty assignment proficiency pay. (ATCNS)






