Plan special exercise

Base, Methodist Hospital work together

Reese Air Force Base and Methodist Hospital in Lubbock have scheduled a joint emergency training exercise for Monday between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The coordinated plan is designed to test the ability of both organizations to react to a major mass casualty disaster situation. It will help both organizations determine whether their individual

This is in regard to the policy that we have to wear our shirts in the day now. When we come in the morning we are wearing our T-shirts and in the afternoon it gets hot and we can't take our shirts off. I would like to know if that can be rescinded in the hot weather now. Name withheld by request

Because of the weather conditions in this area, a change is being made to the Wing Supplement to AFR 35-10. It will authorize an individual to remove the utility shirt when, in the opinion of the work center/immediate supervisor, weather conditions warrant it; a white or olive green T-shirt must be worn when the utility shirt is removed. The utility shirt must be put back on when leaving the immediate work area.

Dining Hall

I would like to know if there is any requirements or guidelines to enter the dining room facility. I have been on this base three months and several times I have seen service men enter the dining room in tight t-shirts, very short shorts and females entering with t-shirts. Does the civilian manager of the dining hall have the authority to refuse service? **TSgt. Leonard Zugby**

AFR 35-10 contains guidelines for civilian dress and provides for the installation commander to supplement these standards when appropriate to promote health, welfare and morale of personnel assigned to the base.

The guidelines established are felt to be adequate and that additional restrictions would not promote morale.

The Wing Dining Hall is operated by a civilian contractor and they have no authority to enforce dress regulations. The contractor may point out to an offender that he or she is in violation and ask them to make appropriate correction. If the individual does not wish to make the correction the contractor may report the violation through official channels; however, service cannot be refused by the contractor.

Each and every member of the Air Force is responsible for complying with AFR 35-10 and

it is their duty to bring violations to the attention of the individual concerned.

Social Actions editorial Alcoholics—living in a fantasy world

by TSgt Doug Stevens One of the most obvious and frustrating truths about the practicing alcoholic is their



anti-social behavior which now fills so much of your recent past, why can't you see and admit that drinking is at the root of your problem?" or "How can you look back on this long list of bizzare behaviors and apparently ignore what it is describing about your drinking to everybody else who sees you?" unpredictable as far as quantity of alcohol consumed is concerned.

Second, are the psychologically-induced blackouts. This is the suppression or repression of painful or shameful incidents which cannot be rationalized. For the most part, this is done on a spontaneous instinctive level rather than through deliverate and premeditated effort.

inability to see themselves realistically. People around them are constantly thinking about them, or saying to them, "with all this One of the major reasons for self delusion in addition to rationalization, projection and denial is the faulty use of memory. The limiting circumstances involving the faulty use of memory can be divided into at least three categories.

First, the chemically-induced blackout. There is a difference between "pass-out" and blackout. Passing out is defined as a loss of consciousness. Blacking out, on the other hand, is a loss of memory which the person goes on functioning as though they would remember the whole period of time involved. The blackouts, as the illness progresses, become more frequent, of longer duration, and more Lastly, a great deal of self-delusion and selfevasion can be traced to "euphoric" or "feeling memory." This is when the individual "under the influence" is rendered incapable of remembering accurately how they behaved. They do not — remember the weaving gait and bellicose behavior. they remember only "how they felt" and "how they acted."

Blackouts are a major sympton of alcohol abuse and alcoholism. Assistance for alcohol related problems is available through the Social Actions office. If you or someone close to you is having problems with alcohol, get help, call me at ext. 3575, for an appointment. The life you save could be your own.

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Legal corner

The objective of the Area Defense Counsel Program is to provide assistance to all Air Force members facing courtmartial proceedings, Article 15 punishment, or other administrative action. Many problems arise because people are not aware of their obligations or do not know who they can turn to for advice during times of need.

The following problem will help you understand your obligations under the law and the role which the Area Defense Counsel plays in the military

Airman Jones is stationed at Reese. He has recently purchased a number of items including a used Dodge van, stereo equipment, a tape deck,

Airman Smith has a pair of

speakers and offers to sell them to Jones for \$100. Jones has no money left in his checking account, but decides to buy the speakers anyway. Jones borrows \$50 from a friend in the barracks and writes a check for \$50 at the base exchange. Jones gives the money to Smith for the speakers. Jones plans to "cover" the check he wrote at the BX with \$65 that Airman Wiley owes him. Wiley is getting

Has Jones committed an offense under the Uniform Code of Military Justice? What should Jones do?

Airman Jones has violated either Article 123a or Article 134 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. These provisions make it a criminal offense to write bad checks. Jones committed 'a violation of Article 123a for writing a check at the BX when he knew that it would be



this money from home, and has told Jones that he will pay him, in the next couple of days.

As a week passes, Wiley tells Jones that this money still has not arrived. In the meantime. the BX manager notifies Jones that his check has been returned by the bank for nonsufficient funds. Another few days pass by and Jones received a second notification with a request for immediate repayment. Jones' first sergeant finds out about the bad check, and advises Jones to repay the BX. After more time passes, Jones' commander notifies him that he is being given an Article 15 for writing a bad check on base.

Jones still has not received any money from Wiley, and he is not sure when he can repay the BX.

dishonored. Jones also violated Article 134 for failing to maintain sufficient funds in his checking account for payment to the BX. The fact that Jones could not cover the check because of Wiley's failure to pay him the \$65 is not a valid defense. Jones had the responsibility to insure that his checking account was properly maintained and in good standing at all times.

Under the present circumstances, Jones should seek the advice of his local Area Defense Counsel. The Area Defense Counsel is a lawyer that Jones can talk to about his case. Anything said is in confidence, and will not be repeated without Jones' permission. After discussing the facts with Jones, the Area Defense Counsel will advise him on how best to proceed.

Interview with ATC boss Update: covers command interests

(This is the second in a continuing series of interviews in which Gen. John W. Roberts, commander, Air Training Command (ATC), discusses subjects of interest to ATC members with Bob Reed of the command Office of Information.)

As you know, general, we've already released a story to our base papers that ticks off many of the items discussed at the recent USAF Commanders Conference – CORONA – which you attended. So I won't ask you to repeat them. But to go back a bit, what single word might best describe the spirit in which you and all of the other top Air Force officials changed. So after agonizing

controls. No hemming and tions to a lively discussion hawing. Just ordered it removed from the OER.

I don't mean to needle, general, but weren't you Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel (DP) when the system was initiated four years ago?

That's not needling. That's the truth. I was the DP, and I freely accept my full share of the blame. Even more, I was so sold on its apparent potential - we all were - that I fought hard for it for the first couple of years. But when its harmful effects boiled up to the surface, I became just as fully convinced that it had to be

which I hope will bear fruit in the near future.

Back to some intangibles, general. I'd like you to comment on a feeling that runs deep with some in ATC-probably throughout the whole Air Force. constantly run into the skeptical belief, expressed by officer and enlisted members alike, that our senior Air Force officials aren't really interested in doing anything about their complaints-the irritants that bug them. As one disenchanted young officer put it, "they just keep talking, not doing.'

I give them my personal word that we're "doing" and not just talking! I really

approached the meeting? How about panic, urgency, determination?

(General Roberts, smiling) -I might accept two of those. Perhaps the best one is "urgency," although it falls short, too. I can state, unequivocally, that this CORONA was the most productive, as well as people oriented, of any I've attended in the past five years. In addition to the usual analyses of operational and global issues, there were more discussions of down-to-earth details, more pointed comments from all present, including Secretary Stetson and Chief of Staff General Allen, and more actions taken by the Chief than ever before. It was a fine session.

What topped the agenda as the most pressing problem?

That was predictable: The **Officer Effectiveness** Report (OER) system. What we had originally thought would be an excellent management tool had proven to be extremely damaging to officer morale - particularly its controlled rating provision. The Chief took care of that quickly. After a comparatively short discussion he eliminated the

over it a little longer, I wrote the wish some of those who feel that present DP and told him how I felt.

Will there be more changes, or modifications, in the OER system?

Undoubtedly. But they'll take time. The main thing was to get that controlled rating removed immediately, and the Chief did it.

Am I safe in assuming, general, that the current distressing drop in pilot retention was also high on the list?

You certainly are. It was as hot a topic at CORONA as it is here in ATC. I was happy to be able to report on some of the positive steps we've taken: Making sure that pilots are reimbursed for out-of-pocket expenses incurred while on directed TDY; increasing the crossflow of pilots, both FAIPs (First Assignment Instructor Pilots) and non-FAIPS, into new weapons systems; sending two second lieutenants out into the field to get a direct 'grass roots' feedback on complaints and irritants: the use of 'Buck Stop' to put initiatives into the hands of unit commanders and their people-I won't go into the rest. The others present at CORONA also made contribu-

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
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'Lump sum' SRBs get nod

Because the fiscal year 1979 budget contains only enough funds to pay for approximately one half of the selective reenlistment bonuses (SRB) in lump sum, April 1, 1979, has been set as the start date for these payments, Air Force officials announced.

As in the past, members applying for reenlistment bonuses before April 1st will receive them as yearly installment payments on the

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anniversary of their reenlistment.

Through the SRB program the Air Force pays a bonus for reenlistment in certain skill fields as a method of encouraging retention.

A special provision was contained in the new appropiation bill for airmen in retraining status. Airmen with specialty codes slated for termination or reduction will still be eligible for SRB for the purpose of reenlistment in zones A or B.

These zones determine the amount of the bonus.

Authority to pay SRB suffered a gap between Oct. 1, and Oct. 20, when the legislation was cleared, but Air Force established the following policies to compensate:

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
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

A resource that all Air Force civilian employees should know about is the Equal Employment **Opportunity Program (EEO)**

EEO is designed to assist all employees or potential employees in the areas of counseling, referral, and special emphasis groups.

The primary function of the counselors is to try and resolve any alleged discrimination

problems informally at the lowest level. If the problem is not resolved satisfactorily within 21 days, the complaintant may seek further action through Air Force channels with a formal complaint.

Carlos Jordon is the Technical Representative of the Contract Officer here. Recently cited by the Air Force for his outstanding management





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


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Fuller, Hollis scorch net; **Rattlers drop two anyway**



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


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Unbeaten Rattlers host tourney




The Rattlers will be shotting for the second straight tournament title. The varsity squad walked off with champioship honors at the New
