Dorm phones

I have a problem in the dormitory concerning the Class C telephones. Lately there have been numerous long distance collect calls being taken over these phones. I would like to know why this has been allowed on government phones.

I am certainly glad you brought this question up, as it gives us an opportunity to clarify a pretty sticky situation. As explained by the Base Communications Officer, in your telephone conversation, we have no way of stopping a collect call from coming into and being accepted over a Class A or C telephone

However, once the call is accepted, it becomes an unauthorized, unofficial long distance phone call which cannot be paid for by Reese. When this happens, it is turned over to the telephone company for investigation.

The General Telephone Company's fraud section at San Angelo, Texas, is currently

investigating five cases of telephone fraud at Reese. The Class C phone you mention is one of those cases. After a thorough investigation by General Telephone, assisted by the 1958 Communications Squadron, most of these unauthorized collect calls are traced, collected and appropriate disciplinary action taken through the OSI and Unit Commanders.

Needless to say, only organizatioins with special billing numbers are authorized to accept a collect call. So if you know of others placing themselves in this situation, ask them to call ext. 3202, and get assistance in clearing the account before GTE and civil authorities get involved.

Conserving energy?

I live in the dormitory and I have a question. Yesterday (Oct. 4) I was home for the afternoon and I had my window open and some sergeant came by and told me I had to have my window closed because it was conserving energy. Now how can this be conserving energy with the window open? I don't turn the air conditioner on, and when the window is closed I have to turn

An Air Force policy has been in existence for a long period of time requiring buildings with air conditioning systems to keep the windows closed.

The sergeant was correct in enforcing this policy. However, Barracks 320 does have individual thermostats installed in the rooms and as long as these thermostats are turned off, open windows will not waste energy. Unfortunately, because so many of our barracks occupants raise their windows and do not turn off thermostats, the above policy was established.

The open window policy has been changed for Barracks 320 and 230 where individual room thermostats are installed. However, it will be the responsibility of each individual to turn off heat/air conditoning when opening windows. It is imperative that this is done to maximize our energy savings.

Sharp appearance helps

The proper wear of the military uniform has been an important part of military tradition down through the ages. Military clothing of a particular color and style shows that the wearer belongs to some special group; usually the uniform indicates the wearer's occupation.

Civilians groups use uniforms to distinguish themselves as professionals, (policemen, nurses, security guards). Their wear of the organizational uniforms can project a positive impression or a negative one. For example, what would be your opinion of a Policeman that wore a faded jacket and soiled uniform or a nurse with a patched dress? How confident do you think you would be in their ability to protect or care for you?

The same negative feelings would also hold true for a shabby and ungroomed Air Force member. We, as military members, have a continuing role in an effort to ensure that the civilian population is confident of our ability as a military deterent. We must reflect proper credability on behalf of the United States Air Force by our dress and appearance. If the stripes on your uniforms need replacing, do so. Replace soiled or faded field jackets. Don't wear a torn or faded raincoat.

In other words, "Look Great for '78." To keep everyone up to date, here are a few changes to AFR 35-10.

RAINCOAT: The military raincoat may be worn with the civilian clothing if the insignia is removed.

The Hospital (White) Uniform (Women):

- The permastarched caps worn by nurses with the dress is now optional indoors and is never worn out of doors.
- The optional lightweight blue jacket is not to be worn with the white pantsuit.
- The organizational cap may be worn with the white pantsuit if authorized by the installation commander.

What should you do?

D. Stand near a dry dead snag for protection from lightning.

To survive . . . The best protection from the





does keep you in the open to get wet, but there is nothing around to attract the lightning which could be fata.

"A" could be deadly since tall trees can attract lightning and if you select "B" you may not get hit by lightning itself but something on the hill above you fall down toward you.

"D" would probably keep you safe from lightning for a short time, but how long will the snag stay dry with the rain. There is also the possibility of wind blowing dead branches down on

Maternity coverage changes

Reese Hospital editorial

CHAMPUS has a Special Maternity Benefit.

If delivery is expected to be in a hospital, the entire "maternity episode" is considered as one inpatient admission. The maternity episode begins with the first doctor visit and ends with the six-week post-natal check-up. During this time, all visits, complications of Pregnancy, and Maternity Related Hospital Admissions are considered under the one admission plan. However, CHAMPUS does not cover the post-natal pap smear.

The maternity care episode includes generally four different providers, the hospital, the "OB" doctor, the pediatrician and the anesthesiologist.

The newborn exam in the hospital is a covered benefit, however, CHAMPUS will not pay for well baby exams after discharge.

Once pregnancy is established, parents should obtain

an appointment with a doctor of their choice and after the first visit, should report to the registrar section of the Reese Hospital with the wife's ID card, the date of the first visit, the doctor's name and the



estimated delivery date. The hospital will prepare a DD Form 1251, Statement of Non-Availability in several copies. A copy of this form should be attached to each claim form either the parent or the provider submit to CHAMPUS.

Also, the squadron which is represented also awards a 3-day pass to the top airman.







Eligible guests are limited to the immediate members of the family of the authorized military sponsor. No more than two guests will be authorized per family.







Reese made it to the championship round by topping the "B" Division's Sting, 6-0, and the North American All stars, 4-0. Reese tied Lubbock United, 0-0, marking the first shutout for the team this season.
