General Kelley was a classmate of Col. Monte Montgomery, 64th Air Base Group commander, during their college days at Rutgers University. They were also teammates on the Rutgers Lacrosse squad. Reportedly, General Kelley was named to the first-team All America squad while at Rutgers and Colonel Montgomery also earned national recognition.

Graduation ceremonies are slated to begin at 10 a.m. in the theater. Later in the day there will be a special luncheon at the Officers' Open Mess and a dinner dance tonight, also at the Officers' Club. Both gatherings will be in honor of the 37 new pilots.

Class 79-02 began training on Jan. 25 with 38 students. The graduating class contains three captains and 34 lieutenants.

The class commander was Capt. Arthur M. Nickell with Capt. Kenneth M. Koopmans and Capt. Darcy L. Lawton serving as section leaders for "D" and "H" flights respectively.

In section-one, Captain Lawton was the first to solo in the T-37 and 2nd Lt. Roland M. Sasscer was the first to take up a T-38 alone. Over in section-two, 2nd Lt. David S. Brackett was the first to solo a T-37 and three students (2nd Lt. David S. Brackett, 2nd Lt. John H. Baker and Captain Koopmans) all flew solo in a T-38 on the same day.

Student load to increase

The activity rate associated with our pilot training mission will increase dramatically over the next few months and this will have a significant impact on the entire base.

As an indication of what is in store for us, our most recent class, undergraduate pilot training Class 80-01, just commenced training with 58 members. This is nearly half again as large as our average class size of 40 during the past several years. Our total student population will increase during the next year from approximately 280 to nearly 500 students. Moreover, we expect our instructor pilot force to increase by about 60 people along with a significant increase in aircraft maintenance personnel.

Along with the population growth, our flying activity will also increase. Over the past year we averaged about 200 flying sorties per day. We expect the sortie rate to increase to about 450 sorties per day over the next year.

The increased activity will place additional demands upon all of us, particularly during the initial phase when our permanent party strength and our facilities are undergoing adjustments to manage the heavier training

activity. I believe the pill will be easier to swallow if we can all fully appreciate the importance of our job relative to national security. It is a fact that the Air Force is beginning to face a very serious pilot shortage. In fact, all of the services are undergoing a severe challenge in retaining experienced pilots.

As increasing numbers of pilots separate from the Air Force, higher demands will be placed upon the Air Training Command to provide replacements. Our problem is further amplified by the fact that, throughout the Air Force, our pilot force is younger with less operational experience at a time when more sophisticated and complex weapons systems are coming into the inventory which place much higher demands on the aircrew. In short, we must not only increase the quantity of our graduates, but must improve the quality as well.

Every person on this base shares the responsibility of training a quality pilot. Please accept my sincere gratitude for the outstanding support you have given to this important mission in the past. I urge your continued support.

Some tips for a safe holiday ...

such as trees, lights, candles, ornaments, and gift wrappings, can lead to tragic fires.

As their season's greetings, fire protection experts at the Air Force Engineering and Services Center (AFESC) offer some reminders to help everyone have a fire-safe holiday season.

• Buy a small, fresh tree, and leave it outside

from the tree, and turn off all decorative lighting before retiring or leaving the house.

• Remove all gift wrappings and packing materials promptly and dispose of them outside. Don't "bonfire" them in the fireplace.

• Remove a real tree as soon as possible after Christmas, or whenever it begins to shed needles.

in water or wet sand until you're ready to decorate it. If you're using an artifical tree, make sure it is flame resistant.

• Cut tree base at a 45- to 60-degree angle and use a good tree stand with a holding area for water or wet sand.

• Use only electrical wiring bearing the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) seal. Make sure electric toys and appliances bought as presents carry this same seal of approval.

• Do not use flammable decorations.

• Place tree in coolest part of room away from heaters, fireplaces, heating ducts or TV sets.

• Don't put the tree or move furniture where they will block exist or hallways leading to exits.

• Place the switch for the lights well away

• Place candles well away from draperies, decorations, or other flammables. Above all, don't put them n the tree! Also keep them away from areas where they might be overturned or wherever small children play.

• Electric trains, race car sets, etc., produce sparks and should not be near the tree.

When entertaining, don't allow smoking near the tree or around decoration and wrappings. Have plenty of large, safe ashtrays available.

Buy a smoke detector as an early Christmas present for yourself and others. If your home already has one, check it frequently, especially before the start of the holiday season.

Most of all, have a fire emergency plan. If fire strikes, clear everyone out of the house and call the fire department. (AFNS)

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
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Keep 'safety' in mind during holiday shopping

Christmas shopping is fun and purchasing toys for children can add to this fun. However, a second thought should be given to gift selection to ensure that the item is safe for a child.

Choose a toy appropriate for the child's age and development. Many toys have age group labels on the package.

Select chemistry sets and electrically operated toys, especially those that produce heat, for older children.

Avoid toys that produce excessive noise, even toy cap guns fired too close to a child's ear can cause damage. Avoid shooting games, especially those involving darts and arrows.

Toys for small children should be choosen with extra care. Playthings that are safe for older children become hazardous in the hands of little ones. When choosing a toy for a toddler or infant, consider such things as: Does it have detachable small parts that can lodge in the windpipe, ears or nose?

Is it apt to break easily into small pieces or leave jagged edges?

Has it been put together with easily exposed pins, sharp wires, nails, etc.?

Does it have parts which can pinch fingers or toes or 'catch hair?

Survey findings indicate Commissary patrons save

According to a recent survey, people who use their Commissary entitlement may be paying nearly 34 per cent less than those shoppers who aren't.

Joe Vasquez, commissary manager here, explained Monday that two supermarkets, considered representative of those in the Lubbock area, were surveyed a few weeks ago by members of his staff.

"We selected two major chain stores that were capable of providing the same service to

shoppers as the base Commissary. We avoided surveying any of the "convience stores" to keep from inflating the commissary savings. In fact," continued Vasquez, "when we couldn't match brands between the stores we used the 'in-house products' which tend to be a little less expensive than the name brands."

Eighty-six items representing the average family's shopping list, were campared at the three stores. The results indicate that Commissary patrons save an average of 34 per cent over those who shop off base.

"We're not trying to say that you pay less on everything you buy in the Commissary, says Vasquez. "But, we believe that • people who take advantage of their Commissary entitlements, on the average, will see substantial savings."

The base Commissary is open to active duty and retired military personnel and their dependents and certain other authorized groups.



Command PME centers get college accreditation

Reese's Professional Military Education Center is one of 11 Air Training Command PME Phase III Centers scheduled to receive accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Certificates of accreditation for all of the ATC's PME Centers will be accepted by command representatives this week at the Southern Association's general assembly meeting in Atlanta. This is the first time that all NCO Leadership Schools of a command have received their accreditation certificates in the same ceremony.

Reese's Leadership School has been in operation since July of 1976. It is currently under the guidance of MSgt. Ronnie J. Craft, Commandant of the PME Center.

Evaluation of the ATC schools by teams from the Southern Association began in September and was completed last month. Each school was checked for administrative operation, faculty qualifications, facilities, academic standards and other related areas.

The Community College of the Air Force already offers four hours of college credit for the course. The Southern Association's accreditation will enable NCO Leadership School graduates to transfer the credits to most colleges.





Traffic citations aren't popular things to receive, nor, according to security policemen, are they fun to give.

The fact remains that traffic tickets are the only effective means of encouraging people to drive more safely. The "points system" that puts teeth in traffic tickets is remarkably efficient at identifying chronic violators for unit commanders.

It's a common belief that the Security Police decide who gets a ticket and who goes free. Not so. The Security Police are instructed to ticket traffic violations they witness during their tour of duty, unless they are responding to or carrying out a more urgent assignment. The person who decides whether or not a citation will be issued is the operator of an automobile. If he is driving safely and obeying the base traffic code, he will not collect a ticket. If he decides to disregard the speed limit, he has also decided to ask for his traffic

by Air Force regulation. The offender's unit commander sits as sole judge and jury on each traffic citation. He decides guilt or innocence. If the commander's finding is "guilty", the points are assessed. If his finding is one of "not guilty", then no points are assessed.

Points are only assessed for moving traffic violations. Parking violations are not moving offenses, for example, and do not earn traffic points. Yet parking tickets, like speeding tickets, are sent to the offender's unit commander for action. Repeat parking offenses are sometimes dealt with by unit commanders through Article 15 action. Sometimes, repeat parking offenders have their base driving privileges suspended.

The number of traffic citations issued on base is up sharply in recent weeks from what it was during the summer. Here are the most common violations:

Speeding: The base speed limit is 20 mph on most streets, except in the housing area

There are no fines associated with military traffic citations. There are mandatorily assessible points, however. Collecting six or more traffic points within a 12-month period of time results in the requirement for the offender to attend Driver's Improvement Course V. Earning 12 traffic points within any 12 consecutive months means an automatic revocation of the offender's base driving privileges for six months.

In addition to assessing traffic points for moving traffic offenses, commanders may take Article 15 action. In more serious cases, such as driving while intoxicated, Courts Martial action may occur.

Who decides how many points are to be assessed for a traffic violation? That's decided

where the speed limit is 15 mph.

Improper start from stop: A more sophisticated phrase for squeeling tires.


Failure to yield or failure to stop: These offenses occur when people disregard a stop sign or do not yield for traffic having the right-of-way.

Parking on seeded areas: Put simply, this means don't park on grass.

Illegal parking: The base traffic code prohibits parking in other than designated parking areas. Fire lanes are painted red along the curbing. Parking is prohibited there. Parking is prohibited along streets within 15 feet of an intersection. Other examples of illegal parking include double-parking, or parking on white hash lines.

Unattended vehicle: This offense occurs when a vehicle is left unattended with the keys in the ignition.

Dream of flight took many years

The 24-word tribute is his craft on the banks of the engraved in granite on a soaring monument at Kitty Hawk, N.C.

It reads: "In commemoration of the conquest of air by the brothers Wilbur and Orville Wright, Conceived by genius, achieved by dauntless resolution and unconquerable faith."

Though tens of thousands flocked to their flights in later years, few men ventured into the December cold of 1903 to witness the Ohio preacher's sons experiment with powered flight.

The achievement of powered flight was drawing near. Following the dreams of ages, inventors in Europe and America were almost to their airborne goal.

Less than 200 miles north, in Washington, D.C., Dr. Samuel Langley had built a heavierthan-air machine that held great promise of flight.

That October, just weeks before the Wrights would fly at Kitty Hawk, Dr. Langley tested



Wright brothers success launches powered flight

(Continued from page-10) Wilbur and Orville Wright spent the summers from 1900 to 1902 at Kill Devil Hills camping in tents and battling mosquitoes. By the winter of 1901, they decided most existing aeronautical data was wrong and set about building the world's first wind tunnel to test their

In 1902 they tested an advanced glider near Kitty Hawk. After more than 1,000 controlled flights, they decided they were ready to add an

Since no manufacturer of the time was able to provide an engine light enough for their needs, they built their own. Their twin wooden propellers were also made from scratch.

In September, 1903, they returned to Kitty Hawk. They had heard of Dr. Langley and knew he was preparing for test

Despite their desire to be first, bad weather slowed them down.

Then a propeller shaft cracked during an engine test. Orville had to return to Dayton for a new one. He came back to Kitty Hawk on Dec. 11 with news of Langley's second attempt.

Within days they were ready again. On Dec. 14, Orville and Wilbur tossed a coin to decide who would make the first attempt. Wilbur won.

He did get the plane into the air but couldn't control it. In a crash landing, he damaged the rudder. It took three days to repair the damage.

As Wilbur had made the first attempt, it was now Orville's turn. Dec. 17 dawned cold with winds 22 to 27 miles per hour. Ice had formed on puddles near the Wright camp.

Hoping the wind would die down, they waited. By 10 o'clock they could wait no longer and decided to attempt a flight.

At 10:30, Orville laid down on the lower wing of the plane as the engine was started. The plane moved down the launch ramp and lifted into the wind. Orville flew 120 feet in 12 seconds.

Wilbur made the second flight, travelling 175 feet. Orville, in the third trial, flew the machine 205 feet, reaching heights of 12 to 14 feet. The final flight of the day, again with Wilbur as pilot, went 852 feet in 59 seconds.

Later as the Wrights and onlookers discussed the flights, a gust of wind hit the plane and rolled it over. The damage was severe. It could not be repaired in time for any more flights that year and in fact never flew again.

The Flyer, as it was named, had a 40-foot wingspan. It was powered by a four-cylinder, fuelinjected engine which made 12 horsepower and weighed some 170 pounds. Machine and pilot together weighed some 750 pounds. The plane's total cost was less than \$1,000.

Skepticism of the Wright's achievement was great. Many could not even comprehend controlled flight, much less believe it had been accomplished.

The Wright's accomplishment was neither widely believed nor extensively publicized until much later, in 1908, when a reporter witnessed a 1,000 foot flight.

A transformed world has not forgotten the Wright brothers. On Dec. 17, 1978, the United States Air Force will celebrate the 75th anniversary of their accomplishment.

women of the Department of Defense and the Armed Forces, I extend heart-felt condolences to Mrs. Brown."

Secretary of the Air Force John C. Stetson also remembered, "General George S. Brown was a great military leader and very close friend. His devotion to freedom and love for his country were guiding principles for the Air Force and the nation. General Brown's passing is a profound loss to our country. We will miss him."

Air Force Chief of Staff General Lew Allen added, "With the death of General George S. Brown, the Air Force and our nation have lost a great American. He was a rare individual – a man who demonstrated courage, dedication and leadership in all that he was asked to do, from his brilliant combat record in World War II to his achievement as our country's senior military officer.'

"General Brown's long career of dedicated service to the United States included many contributions in many key positions — in combat, in peacetime — as Air Force Chief of Staff and as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. His personal strength helped to assure the nation's strength, today and for the future. His wisdom and standards of excellence will continue to guide me in my responsibilities as Chief of Staff.'

"On behalf of the men and women of the United States Air Force, I extend our deepest sympathy to Mrs. Brown and the family."

In a military career which spanned over 37 years and three major armed conflicts. General Brown held a wide variety of operational and staff positions culimating with four years of duty in the nations highest military job.

On August 1, 1943 he took part in the famour World War II low-level bombing raid against oil refineries at Ploesti, Romania. For leading the remnants of the 93rd group back to its temporary base in Bengasi, Libya, General Brown distinguished service cross.

During the Korean War, General Brown served as commander of the 62nd troop carrier group at McChord AFB, Washington, and as director of operations for the Fifth Air Force in Seoul, Korea.

He was responsible for all Air Force Combat Strike, Air Support, and Air Defense **Operations** in Southeast Asia as Commander of Seventh Air Force and Deputy Commander for Air Operations U.S. Military Assistance Command in Vietnam.

General Brown was born in Montclair, New Jersey on August 17, 1918. He graduated from high school in Leavenworth, Kansas. After attending the University of Missouri for

(then a major) was awarded the one year, he received a congressional appointment to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York.

> General Brown graduated from the Academy in 1941. Entered pilot training and then became a member of the initial cadre of the 93rd Bombardment Group which flew B-24 Liberator Bombers.

> Later assignments included Executive to the U.S. Air Force Chief of Staff; Military Assistant to the Secretary of Defense; and Commander of the Eastern Transport Air Force, McGuire AFB, New Jersey.

> In September 1970, General Brown became Commander of the AirForce Systems Command Headquarters at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland. On August 1, 1973 he was appointed by the President to be Chief of Staff of the Air Force, and on July 1, 1974 to be Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for the Department of Defense.



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

Tuition assistance coverage expands

Active-duty Air Force members enrolled in on-ground flight training classes can now receive tuition assistance covering up to 75 percent of the cost, say Reese Education Services officials.

The program is limited to onground portions of instruction because of the complexity and cost of in-flight instruction. such instruction is generally tailored to individual aptitude and can vary widely.

In July, 1977, the aeroclub and base education office at Travis AFB, Calif., made a request for tuition help for military aeroclub members. Although G.I. Bill funds were available to some, they did not apply to persons who enlisted after Dec. 31, 1976.

Military Airlift Command developed the Travis idea into

Active-duty Air Force an official proposal and it was embers enrolled in on-ground approved this fall.

> Air Force tuition assistance can be used to pay for academic courses at regionally accredited institutions, but may not exceed 75 percent of tuition charged for other undergraduate courses at the institution. Officials said tuition assistance for technical or occupational training can also be paid for either VAapproved, or Federal Aviation Administration-certified flight schools.

Tuition assistance may also be paid for the on-ground portions of instrument and commercial license training.

The move is expected to boost training enrollments in military aeroclubs and civilian flight training programs. For more information contact the Education office at ext. 3469.




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
