Texas NYA Assigned Government Frequencies

The National Youth Adminstration of Texas has been assign ed three government frequencies for mobile communication units to provide NYA youth employees actual wory experience in eper ating, constructing, maintaining, and repairing mobile equipment, J. C. Kellam, State NYA adminstrator, announced today.

Only three other states, Iowa, New York, and Main, have assign ed the frequencies-26,700, 26,-725, and 26,750 kilocycles according to information recieved by Kellam from the Interdepartmental Radio Advisory Committee of Washington. Thes frequencies are restricted to communications between any fixed NYA station and an automobile or between any two cars but not between two fixed stations.

The assignment of the government frequencies for use by mobile units will supplement the amateur frequencies which NYA radio clubs are operating in conjunction with NYA shops, Kellam

The transmitter at Austin has been issued the first NYA call le tterfor use of the government frequency-KHXA-Kellam said, and any cars attached to this station will have transmitter bear ing the calls, KHXA1, KHXA2. and so on.

"The work experience provided young men in operating and maintaining mobile communication equipment is in line with the program of national defense." the State Youth Adminstrator pointed out. "Inasmuch as this type of communication is similar to that used by the U. S. Army in connection with the operation of armored cars and tanks, as well as the pack-type of transmitter carried by an individual,"

The State Highway Commission has let the contract for building 4.1 miles of grading and draining structure on Highway School. 183 in Shackleford county. This w illinclude a bridge over Hubbard Creek, which will be the 2205hot, well balanced lunches between Baird and Albany.

T. M. Brown and Son and W. S. Crawford Company of Dallas were successful bidders and the project calls for an expenditure of \$81,220. Beginning at a point ever, Cross Plains is planning on 8,5 miles south of Albany, where grading and drainage structures January 1st. have already been completed, the next stretch to be improved will extend a little more than 4 miles southward, and reach nearly to the Callahan county line.

Unemployed boys and girls in Texas who are 16 years of age out of school, in need, and who want the work experienced provided on National Youth Adr stration projects are now elig. for such employment, J. C Kellam, state NYA adminstra announced today.

With the minimun age requirement for work on NYA projects reduced from 17 to 16 years, approximately 127,000 Texas boys and girls become eligible for NYA employment, Kellam said. With funds that are available, the National Youth Adminstratin in Texas will be able to provide employment for 15.00 of these young persons at any one time, it was pointed out.

"As youth go off NYA projects into private industry or other eligible youth in the State will have the opportunity to replace them," Kellam explained,






