

Baird Basketball Teams Win Dist. Crowns With Perfect Records

For the first time in years, possibly the first time ever, Baird High School holds the District championship in both boys and girls basketball, and both teams won the championship of District 10-A with an unblemished district record.

The Bears clinched the crown Friday night when they won over the Lions of Albany 64-38. They added to their laurels Tuesday night by winning a 52-51 squeaker from Ranger to close out district play. In the Albany game Cotton Barnes took scoring honors with 20. Jud Gilliland made 17 and Tommy Higgins 16. Tally Windham and Tommy Barton each scored six.

In bi-district play, the Bears meet the winner of the Santa Anna - Copperas Cove game Tuesday, Feb. 19. The two teams are in a deadheat for their district title. Play for the bi-district championship is scheduled to begin on February 26.

Friday night, February 15, the Bears go to Roby for a game to keep them in condition for the play-offs. Both A and B teams will play that night. Roby is champion of District 87-B. On Friday, Feb. 22, the Roby teams come to Baird for games.

The Baird girls clinched the district championship Tuesday night when they coasted to a win over Ranger 85-29. Paula Corn led the team in scoring with 33. She played at her forward spot for only a quarter and a half. Coach Howard played all his team members and switched

his forwards and guards in an attempt to keep down the score. The girls wind up their district play Friday night (tonight) at Albany. The game will have no bearing on the championship.

Their bi-district play begins on March 5 and their opponent will probably be Goldthwaite. To keep in shape for the race for the state title the Baird girls will play two games in Hamlin. On February 21 they meet Trent in a doubleheader at Hamlin. Hamlin plays Paint Creek as the other half of the twinbill. On the following week, February 25, the games are reversed and Baird meets Paint Creek and Hamlin plays Trent. Edd Farmer, former Clyde star, coaches at Hamlin.

The Baird girls went through the 1962-63 season with only two losses, both in tournament play. They lost to Sundown in the Dyess tournament and to Trent in the Hardin-Simmons affair.

Baird Girls Win Awards at H-SU

Baird High School's girls basketball team walked away with its share of awards in the annual Hardin - Simmons University girls basketball tournament reeled off last week end at Rose Field House.

The Baird team brought home the third place trophy and three members of the team took cherished awards. Paula Corn was unanimously voted the outstanding performer in the tourney after she broke several existing tournament records. Elaine Hass was awarded the sportsmanship trophy and Sue Howard made the second all tournament team.

Baird won their opener from Burkburnett 88-32 as Paula Corn netted 54 points. Karen Bearden hit 16 and Elaine Hass made nine. Jones made six and Green three.

In the second game Baird took out Sands 62-55. Corn continued her scoring spree when she hit for 52 of her team's 62 points. Bearden made seven and Hass three.

Baird, playing without the services of starting guard Sheri Jeeter who injured her ankle in the first game, lost their semi-finals game to champion Trent. The game was forced into overtime, but Trent took over to win 59-51. Corn made 26 points.

In their game for third place, Baird had no trouble in beating Avoca, defending champion, 80-54. Corn broke all existing records when she scored an amazing 66 points.

Miss Corn scored 198 points in the tournament to break the total point record, and averaged 49½ points for a new record in that department.

Track Hopefuls Begin Workouts

Coach Vernon Townsend of the Baird Bears said this week that he expected some 20 athletes, many of whom helped Baird to an impressive record in track and field events last year, to form his 1963 team.

Several of the boys have been working out for some time, and others will join the squad at the conclusion of basketball season.

The first meet on the Bear schedule is at Iowa Park on March 2 at the annual Iowa Park Relays. The Baird team took second place there last season. On March 9 the Bears are entered in the Possum Kingdom Relays in Graham. They also won second at Graham in 1962. Other meets entered are as follows: March 15, Tarleton Relays at Stephenville; March 23, Bluebonnet Relays at Brownwood; March 30, Red Dog Relays at Ranger, Junior College.

The 10-A District meet will be held on April 6 in Ranger. The regional meet will be held in Denton two weeks after the district, and the state meet will be in Austin two weeks after that.

Coach Townsend said that team wise, his 1963 Bears would be as strong as last year, but that individual members might be below some of the 1962 contenders.

He said that if the Baird basketball team goes into regional and state playoffs, he would have to skip the first two meets on the above schedule.

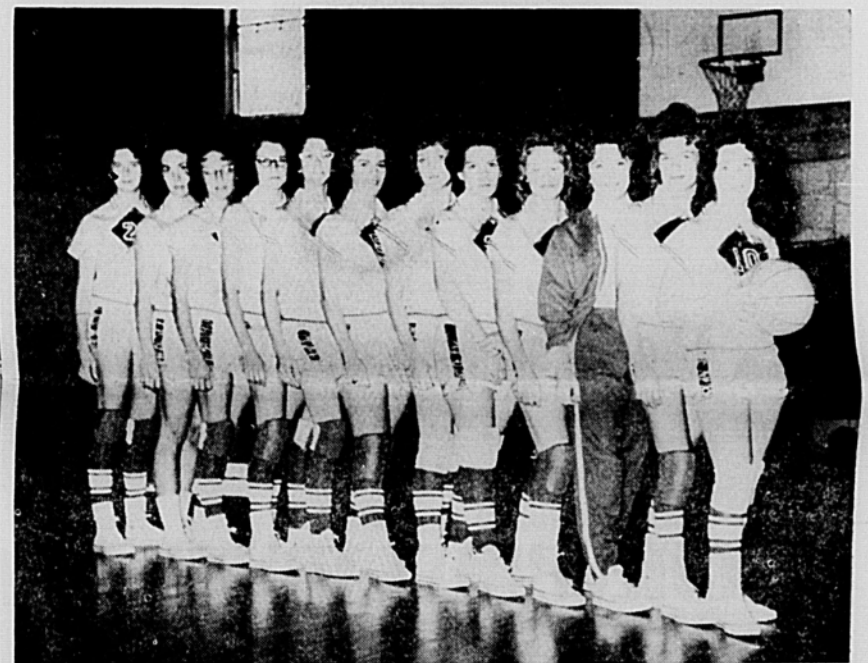

It's the Law in TEXAS



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When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot! Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out —

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any

improvement for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "Covenants" on restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordin-

ance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be certain the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. Financing: Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your home, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until

you pay for it. If you fall behind the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to make up any loss the lender makes in re-selling the house.

Well worked out contracts help make your dream house come true. A construction contract or a so-called "earnest-money" agreement or receipt is no job for an amateur. Too many legal details are involved. Your lawyer is trained by education and experience to protect your best interests in contracting and closing real estate deals.

You know what you want. You should be careful to get what you want through careful planning and a properly prepared and executed contract.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

"Range seeding is now in progress in the Lower Clear Fork Soil Conservation District and Callahan County," says John D. Isenhower, District Supervisor of the Lower Clear Fork District. Each year there arises numerous questions as to What, When, Where and How to go about getting this all important job done.

When considering the land and other resources, the following questions should be considered.

1. What is this plot of land best suited for over a long period of time?

2. What should I expect from this plot in the way of production?

3. What treatment or management is needed to bring about this desired sustained production?

Planting grass on rangeland following Brush Control is needed in many instances. Most of it is done following chopping or some other satisfactory seedbed preparation. Your local Soil Conservation Service Technicians are available to assist you in planning and applying brush control, grass seeding and other conservation measures needed in a complete conservation program.

There are several farmers and ranchers interested in planting old fields that have been in cultivation and are now turned out. Most of these are being planted on a well prepared firm seedbed. Others are planting in a thin stand of small grain where blowing is a problem. Using this method the grain is mowed or shredded in the boot or early head stage. This allows the new grass seedling to have access to more sunshine and less competition for moisture.

There are many different factors effecting the final outcome of a range seeding program. Soil types, condition of or type of seedbed preparation, kind and amount of seed to plant, deferment of the grasses and last and probably the most important is to use it properly after the grass is established. By training and experience your local Soil Conservation Technicians have the answers to many of the questions that come up concerning the planting of range and pasture grasses.

D. C. Cox, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service states that, "the optimum seeding dates for warm season grasses in this area are Feb. 15 to May 1st., with the

maximum lasting to June 1 under certain conditions.

Cost sharing assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program and the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service are providing financial assistance in getting these needed conservation practices applied.

Interest On Life Insurance Taxable

Although payments for Veterans Administration benefits are tax-free and need not be reported on 1962 Federal income tax returns, interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit with VA is not a "benefit" and is taxable.

Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas, Texas, said today the ruling on dividend interest was made by the Internal Revenue Service.

Still tax-free are the proceeds of a GI life insurance policy, including the dividends themselves, he said.

Onstot added that other VA benefits which need not be reported on Federal income tax returns include:

Education and training allowances, disability and compensation payments received by veterans for service-connected and non-service-connected disabilities, grants to seriously disabled veterans for homes designed for "wheel chair living," grants for motor vehicles for veterans who lost their sight or lost the use of their limbs, and World War I emergency officers' retirement pay.

Onstot pointed out that VA death benefits to families of deceased veterans also are exempt from taxation. They include death compensation and pension, indemnity and all GI insurance payments.

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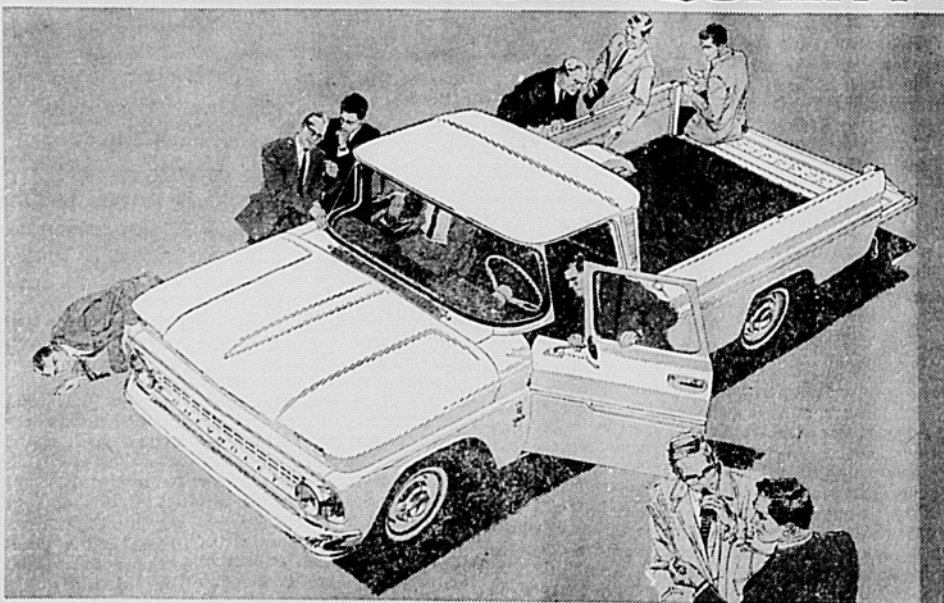
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Letter To Clyde Church . . .

Below is a letter recently received by the ladies of the Clyde Church of Christ from Mrs. Gwen Antwine, wife of a missionary in Switzerland. Mrs. Antwine is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Hagar of Clyde. Dear Ladies,

As the year draws to a close and the new year begins, one has a tendency to look back and try to summarize one's accomplishments and failures. One makes resolutions to improve and correct things whenever possible. This is as it should be. However, many of us only "think" about these things; we "do" nothing about improvement or correction. Let us make it different this year. Let us strive to do those things which we have earlier put aside.

Since my last letter in April, our summer has past - which, by the way, was a lovely warm summer. The Lord blessed us with much sunshine to help us through our winter. On September 17 we journeyed to Augsburg, Germany, for a two and one-half to three-month stay. The preacher in Augsburg, Brother Heinz Muller, a native of Germany, and his wife, Ruth, went to the States for a visit with their supporting congregation.

We had more responsibility in the work in Augsburg than here in Zurich as we had no co-worker. Clyde preached to the German congregation and the American military congregation on Sunday mornings. On Sunday nights only the American congregation assembled and most of the time the men of the congregation prepared a lesson for the evening service. During the week Clyde had to teach the Bible class on Wednesday evening for the German congregation. On Thursday evenings the Americans assembled. Before all German assemblies Clyde would pick up several elderly ladies. With one of these ladies we had the privilege of getting better acquainted. (Later, I shall describe this sister of yours). Clyde spent much time in "picking up" and "taking home" the invalids and sick of the congregation. Clyde also had a boys group on Friday afternoons for which he prepared a Bible lesson.

Brother and Sister Muller have three boys - ages 11, 13 and 14 years old, whom they left in our care. Every day at lunch time I cooked for us seven, counting our Debbie and David. The Muller boys were extremely well behaved and were always ready to help. I did the washing and ironing for us all. However, a cleaning lady came twice a week to put the house in order. The boys took care of their rooms. They had school half a day or 4 to 6 hours and then they spent the rest of the day doing their homework. It took them three to five hours to finish their homework.

In this time we had some very rich experiences. Our children had association with other children of Christian parents and they experienced having older brothers. The Muller boys were very good with our children. They taught Debbie and David many good things by their example.

We had the opportunity of getting acquainted with the Christians in Augsburg. Association with the Americans was much like being in America which made us a little homesick. Association with the Germans was also a rich experience. It is unbelievable the hardships through which some of our German brethren have lived. One example is a very fine Christian grandmother. Her name is Frau (Mrs.) Kathy Bussjager (pronounced Katie Boos-yea-ger). Kathy is 73 years old and has been a Christian about 8 years. She had been a Catholic and was living in the "Fuggerei". (The Fuggerei is a housing unit where rooms are rented to persons of little means. Four hundred years ago when a Mr. James Fugger, a very rich man, established this housing unit, the rent was about 47 cents per year. Today, they pay the same amount per year. However, there are restrictions. One can only have a chance to rent an apartment or room there if they are Catholic. Also, they must pray the Lord's Prayer once each day their entire lives for Mr. Fugger or "James the Rich" as he also was called. They pray this prayer everyday that he might be released from purgatory.) Well, Sister Kathy was a Catholic and lived in the "Fuggerei." She and another lady from the Fuggerei were baptized at the same time. Of course, when they did this they automatically had to seek living quarters elsewhere. The other lady then renounced her baptism that she might continue to live in the Fuggerei. Kathy moved out and found a room with some family. However, this proved unsatisfactory so she had to move again. When I first met Kathy two years ago, she was living in an old apartment which looked as if it was earlier a chicken house. But this is only a little of the sorrow this sister has had. From the very beginning of her life she has experienced difficulty after difficulty. The first five years of her life she was constantly black and blue from abuse from her step-father. Her mother stood by the step-father in his actions. Kathy experienced no love those first five years. The situation became so terrible that she ran away to a neighboring

farm house. There she found shelter with the neighbor's dog. For eight days she slept with the dog in the dog house and ate with the dog - all this unbeknowning to the owner. Finally the farmer discovered her and she was sent back home. However, it was only shortly afterwards that the authorities took her away from her parents and put her in a children's home inside a Catholic convent. She was then reared there until she was about 14 years of age. For some reason she was persuaded to return to her parents at this age.

She had hoped to study under some apprenticeship, but was made to go to work in a factory where she immediately could earn wages which were turned over to her parents. She didn't remain there long, however, and from then on, she was on her own. Also, her husband was not in the best of health. His health was damaged during World War I. Because of this, his life was shortened, leaving Kathy again to herself. For approximately 20 years she lived here and there and finally became a renter at the "Fuggerei". Just a few months ago she had to move out of the "chicken house" apartment but was able to locate another apartment. At the present she lives in a nice modern apartment building where she enjoys, for once, many of the nice conveniences of this age. However, she must still suffer. She has very bad legs and can hardly get around. She suffers much pain and must wear metal and leather braces on her legs. What would be your attitude if you had lived through a life such as hers? Kathy loves the Lord and has grown much in her 8 years as a Christian. She tries to cheer the sad, weary and discouraged ones when at the same moment she is in deep physical pain. She invites members to her apartment and tries to teach them God's will that they might grow spiritually. I thank the Lord that you brethren have sent us

here to Europe, to this mission field, that we might plant the seed, God's Word, in the hearts of people like Kathy. She is one of many who are faithful and have suffered much in their lives. What if no one had come to tell Kathy and all the many others the truth of God's Word? With the prayers and financial help from you brethren it is possible to spread the Gospel to countries.

Our three months in Augsburg was an encouragement to us as well as getting more experience in the Lord's Vineyard.

In a few days we are awaiting the birth of our third child. Then we hope to prepare for a trip to visit you. Pray for the work here. Pray that we may have continued good health in order to work for the Lord. God bless and keep you.

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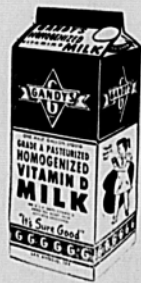

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Clyde Lions Hear Discussion On Securing Surface Water for City

Prospects for a supply of surface water for the city of Clyde were discussed at the regular weekly meeting of the Lions Club at the Community Center Tuesday night. Lions Club members were joined by members of the city council, other interested citizens and Soil Conservation Service representatives at the meeting.

Lion President Lee Loper called on Weldon Edwards of Clyde, secretary of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation Service District Board of Supervisors to introduce the speakers. Mr. Edwards called on D. C. Cox, Work Unit Conservationist of the SCS in Baird who presented E. J.

Hughes as the speaker. Mr. Hughes is area conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service with offices in Brownwood.

Mr. Hughes outlined the program being planned as a conservation and flood control measure for the upper Pecan Bayou and told how communities such as Clyde could take advantage of the program to secure needed surface water for residential, industrial and recreational use.

He said that the community could secure the needed water by the enlargement of retainer dams included in the flood control program. The community would pay only for the increase in size of the retainer dam. He suggested that the community secure a water engineer to determine the needs and to make recommendations. Mr. Hughes said that all the community had to do at this particular time was to tell the Soil Conservation Service that it was interested in working with the service in the use of their project for securing water for the community. Upon that assurance, he said, the SCS would begin planning in that direction.

Paul Kenner, head of the

planning party in charge of the flood control project, pointed out on maps the sites probably best suited for dams the size that would be needed for the project.

City councilmen at the meeting indicated that they were studying the project and that they would make a decision soon in order that the SCS could begin its planning.

Baird Girl Sets All Time High Sales Record At Southwestern Livestock Show in El Paso

Below is a re-write of an article by Cliff Sherrill which appeared in an El Paso newspaper for which Mr. Sherrill works. Miss Finley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Finley of Baird and a member of the Baird 4-H Club, caused a sensation when she set an all-time record in winning and in total sales at the Southwestern Livestock Show in El Paso last week. Mr. Sherrill's article follows:

The beautiful Baird girl in solid black Western wear who escorted the coal-black Angus Grand Champion calf and two other champions into the Junior Auction Sale of the Southwestern Livestock Show took \$4502.40 in sale cash, more than a 10th of the sale's total \$40,931.95 for 108 animals — a record without precedent for one exhibitor in the Southwest.

A Triple-Victory
Miss Finley, 17, and her triple-victory provided the smash hit sensation of the Southwestern Livestock Show in both Junior Show animal judging and in the Junior Auction Sale, the two big events of the show itself.

Her performance as a feeder of champion animals is closely identified with El Paso County, for she was coached in her calf and lamb raising operation by Travis Allen, former assistant County Agent in El Paso County in charge of 4-H Club activities. Mr. Allen went from El Paso to Baird as Callahan County agent, and worked through last year with that county's 4-H Club, of

which Miss Finley is a member. Mr. Allen is now at Portales, N. M.

Prices paid for animals in yesterday's Junior Auction Sale did not set a record for any one animal or for the sale total, but it was described by officials of the Southwestern as "a good sale, better than some, not as good as some in total revenue, but an all-around fine sale."

Brought \$40,931
This year's 108 animals — one was scratched from the original 109 — in the auction brought \$40,931. Last year's 118 animals brought \$44,188. So, by real comparison, average for each animal this year's sale was as good as last.

Bidding started yesterday at a mild pace. The Grand Champion calf pushed into the ring by Miss Finley brought \$3.50 a pound for its 853 pounds, a good price, but not a record. The buyer was Chelmont Merchants Assn., with John McKee and James Hay doing the bidding.

The Grand Champion lamb, shown by Jim Kropp of Floyd County 4-H, brought \$7 a pound, or \$637 for the 91 pound lamb. Safeway Stores was the buyer.

The Grand Champion Barrow, shown by Rose Ann Duffey of Lea County New Mexico, 4-H Club, was bought by El Paso Natural Gas Co. at \$3.50 a pound. The hog weighed 210 pounds, bringing \$735.

Next Came Calf
Next came the Reserve Grand Champion calf, shown by Dolores Lankford of Howard County 4-H, the calf weighed 907 pounds and selling to Jack Chauvet of Peyton Packing Co. for \$1677.95 at \$1.85 a pound.

Vicki Finley's Reserve Grand Champion lamb brought \$5.25 a pound for its 78 pounds, or \$409.50, bought by the State National Bank.

Baird Ag Students Become "Screworm Vigilantes"

Vocational agriculture students attending Baird High School have recently become "screworm vigilantes" according to their teacher, Dick Vestal. The students are cooperating with the Southwest Screworm Eradication Program by conducting a weekly survey of livestockmen in the area to determine how many, if any screwworm infestations the stockmen have found.

Carrying on in the best tradition of the vigilantes of the Old West who prevented outbreaks of lawlessness through constant surveillance, the local Future Farmers of America are aiding in the attempt to prevent outbreaks of the screwworm, which costs the livestock industry many millions of dollars each year. Program officials indicated that the eradication effort is entering a critical stage with the approach of warmer weather and reporting of this type can literally determine its success or failure.

Mr. Vestal said he has 10 students contacting 50 livestockmen each week. The students record the number of screwworm cases each producer discovered during the previous week and the number of samples that were sent in for identification by the Mission, Texas, laboratory. The individual student reports are tabulated by the teacher and a single report is mailed to screwworm eradication program officials. The information is considered by officials in planning release of sexually sterile screwworm flies now being reared in a plant near Mission at the rate of over 75 million per week.

Livestockmen are encouraged to check their animals often and treat any wounds or scratches. About 10 maggots taken from deep in the wound should be sent to Mission for positive identification and the wound should then be properly treated with an approved insecticide. Kill any screwworms that drop out on the ground.

The recent cold weather has lowered the native screwworm population considerably, Vestal said, and program officials feel now is the time when great strides toward eradication can be made. However, if infested animals are not found and treated, screwworms may once again spread across the state and undo all that has been gained. A single screwworm case left untreated during favorable weather can develop into hundreds of cases within a few weeks, the vocational agriculture teacher stated.

Any farmer or rancher in the area not being contacted by one of the students, who finds screwworms in his livestock, should tell the vocational agriculture teacher or county agent immediately, Mr. Vestal said.
