State Health Department Cites Max Stephenson

An official State Health Department citation was awarded this week to Max E. Stephenson, Stratford city employee, for proficiency in sewage plant management.

The impressively designed certificates of competency, signed by the state commissioner of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, credit recipients with having demonstrated "skill and knowledge" of sewer treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work.

Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their work's influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

The Texas general sanitation law requires that at least one plant operator per shift be certified by the state health agency, but other plant personnel and persons in related fields frequently seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to advance themselves professionally and to increase their efficiency as vital public servants.

"The recipients of these certificates are a credit to their profession and to their communities," sponsors of the certification program said.

Points toward certification are earned through actual work experience and by attendance at annual district and state short schools sponsored and conducted by the Texas State Department of Health, the engineering extension service of Texas A and M College, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

Scout Camp Fund Drive Starts Friday

R. C. Buckles, Floyd Keener, Hose Flores and Paul Chesmer will head the Sherman County fund drive Friday to raise the county's share of the \$150,000 which is needed to build facilities at Camp Don Harrington in order to accommodate the Boy Scouts of the Llano Estacado Council who desire to use the camp during the summer.

This is the first capital fund drive in the history of the council and should not be confused with the annual fund raising campaign which finances the council.

The funds raised annually have been adequate to carry out the necessary routine expenses of the council but they are not enough to provide additional facilities necessary to take care of the ever growing number of boys.

In the past 10 years the number of the boy scouts in the council has increased by 95%. The number of packs, troops and posts have increased 104%. The number of scouts attending the summer camp at Camp Don Harrington has increased 133%.

In order to keep up with these increases a campaign will be conducted to finance the improvements and enlargements of Camp Don Harrington, the summer scout camp located 14 miles south of Amarillo. The facilities of Camp Don Harrington are available to all the scouts of the council area and have been used by the local troop in the past, as they will be in the future.

The new facilities proposed for the camp are: two patrol lodges, 10 camp sites, quarters for cooks, an office, a trading post, warehouse, a workshop and a garage.

Improvements to be established for the camp include an archery and rifle range, a swimming pool, a parking lot, a dining hall and other general camp improvements.

R. E. Oquin Funeral Tuesday

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation has announced its intention to prosecute all persons apprehended stealing drip gasoline from their pipelines. When prosecuted in county court, the convicted felony draws an automatic penitentiary sentence of from one to five years.

Two Sunray men entered pleas of guilty in justice court here Friday on charges of stealing drip gasoline from the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation lines in Sherman County. The case was filed in justice court as a misdemeanor and a warning. Any following offenses will be tried in county court, a Shamrock spokesman said.

Ollie and Ollis Miller were fined \$100 and and court costs of \$19.50 each.

The men were apprehended at 9:30 p. m. the previous Sunday while "blowing" a drip, by Horace Myrick, special agent for the company. The pair had 35 gallons of raw fuel in their possession when nabbed. Myrick said the men were hauling the drip in small containers in a pickup truck.

Meanwhile, a Shamrock spokesman said the loss of drip was not as critical as the damage to valves and pipelines during the recent freezing weather.

He said drips "blown" by unauthorized persons were left dripping and the heavy water content freezes easily. More than a dozen of the big valves have been replaced in recent weeks at considerable expense to the petroleum firm.

The crude gasoline is gathered in this area by Shamrock employees or special contractors.

Citizens Order 75 Paving Extensions

Stratford citizens owning property along the proposed city street paving routes have placed 75 orders for extensions of the proposed paving along their property lines. Paving to be constructed by the bond issue will be 24 feet wide and will be placed in the center of the unpaved streets.

Property owners along the paving route have been given the opportunity to secure the six feet of additional paving to extend the pavement to their curbs for 75¢ per linear foot.

Concrete curbs and gutters which are required for protection of the pavement and proper drainage, will be constructed for \$1.65 a running foot.

The 70-foot street intersection will be paved by the bond issue and the city will pay the costs of paving and guttering the connecting alleys.

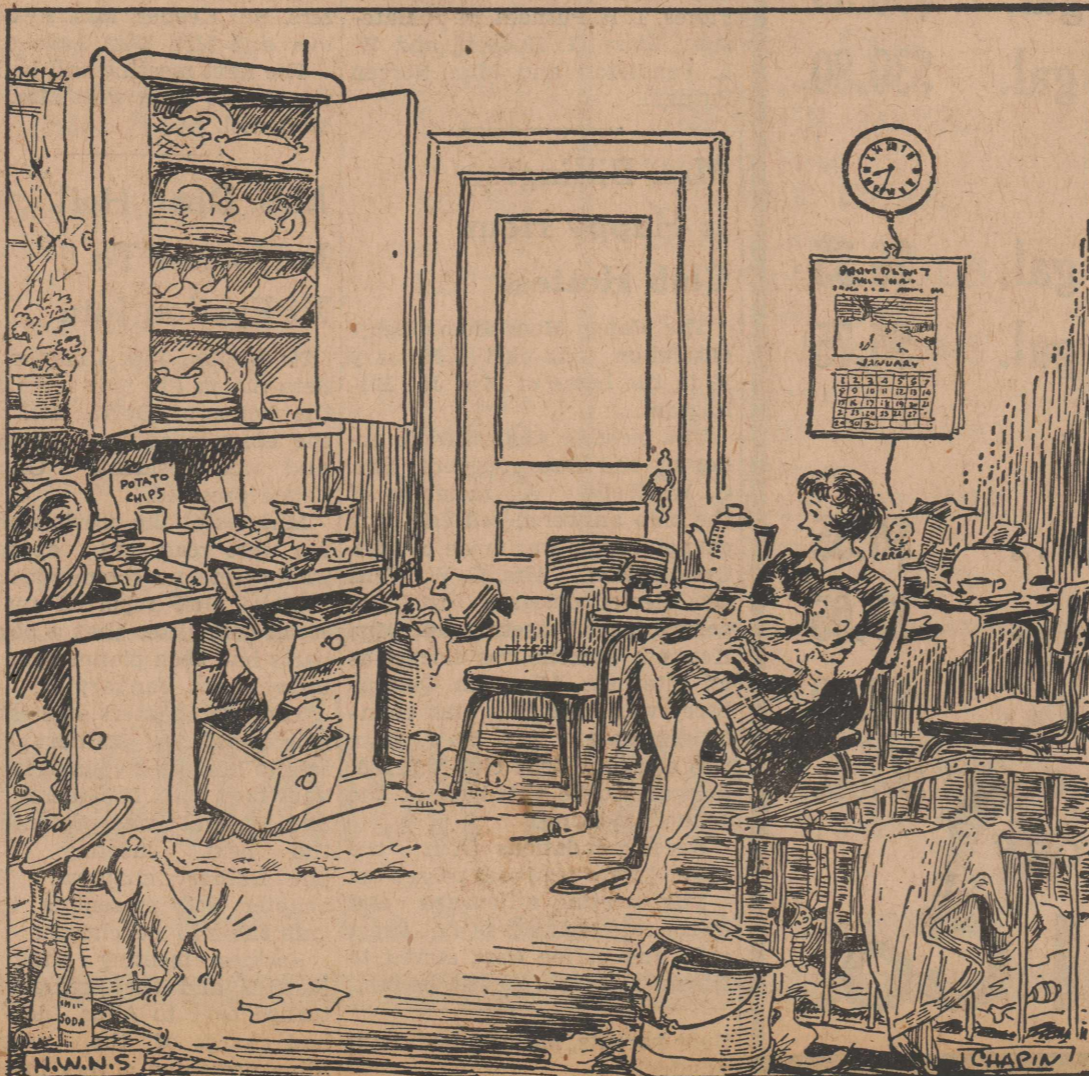

How People Know We Like Them

THE WEEK'S LETTER: "I am a girl of sixteen and like a boy who is also sixteen. We go to the same school. I don't know if he likes me or not. My girlfriend says he does, but I don't know. He acts like he does sometimes, and then sometimes he doesn't pay any attention to me. He tells the kids he likes another girl. But he tells me different. He doesn't know I like him because I don't want him to think he was a big shot because

two girls like him... What should I do? How should I act if he really does like me? And, how will I know he does?"

OUR ANSWER: You already know it. He has already told you so and, apparently, he has told your friends as well. On the other hand, you have not returned the compliment because you think he likes another girl.

Let's face it, we can't expect anyone to know that we like them

unless we tell them so. Of course, we show people every day that we like them without actually saying so. We do it by being friendly, by speaking when we pass in a school hallway or on the street, or maybe by sitting down together for a coke in the drug store. As a rule, we never have to tell people whether or not we like them. We show it in our actions toward them.

However, we like some individuals more than we like others. They have no sure way of knowing this if we do not tell them. We make a mistake when we refuse to let someone know we like them until we are certain that they like us too. If we do not let them know that we like them, they assume that we don't, at least that we like them no more than a mere speaking acquaintance.

Our advice is to forget about the "other girl" and let the boy know that you do like him.

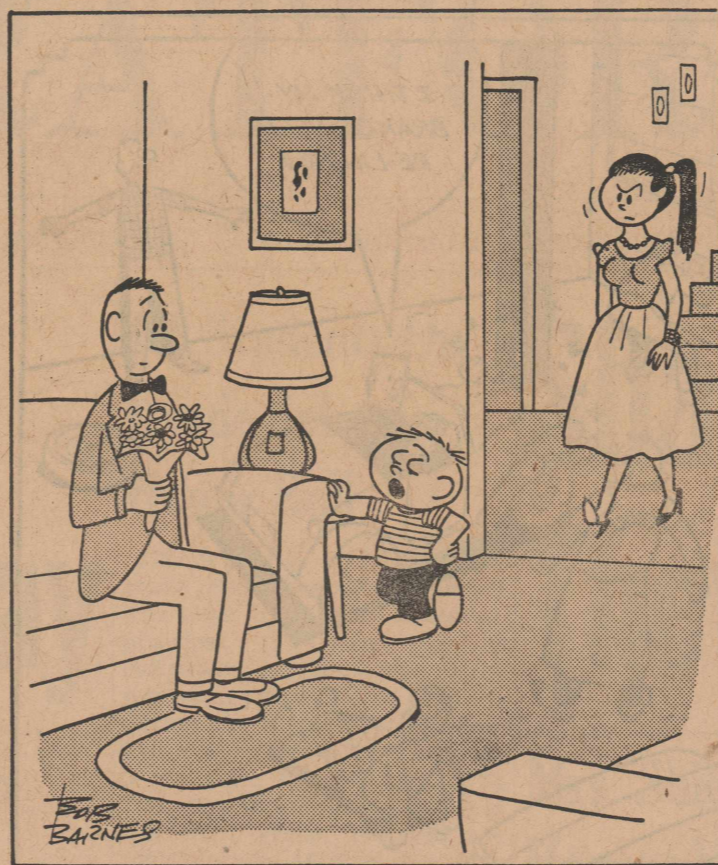
and unshorn lambs can be determined. Since April 30 falls on Sunday this year, the final date for filing applications is May 1, 1961.

Applications being filed at this time are to show all sales of wool and unshorn lambs during the period between April 1, 1960, and March 31, 1961. For a sale to be considered completed during that period, title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered, and the last of the factors needed to determine the net sales proceeds must be available.

Mr. Buckles urges growers to be particularly careful in reporting purchases of unshorn lambs on their applications. Inaccuracy on this point is the most troublesome problem in administering the wool payment program, he said.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers up to the incentive level of 62 cents a pound. Under the percentage system, the grower who receives the highest price for his wool also receives the largest payment.

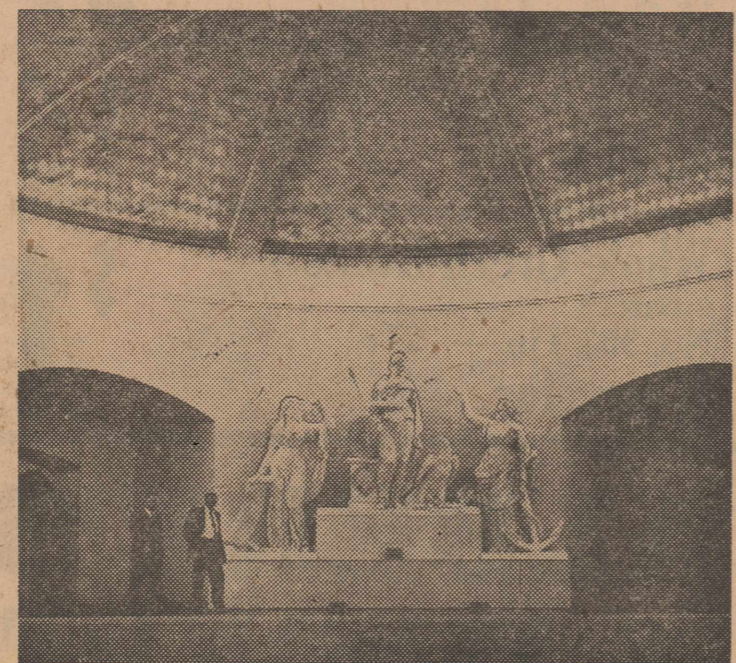

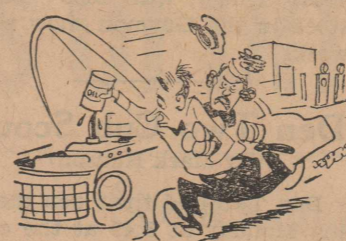

No report has been received on the heifer Scott Whorton showed in the junior breeding class.

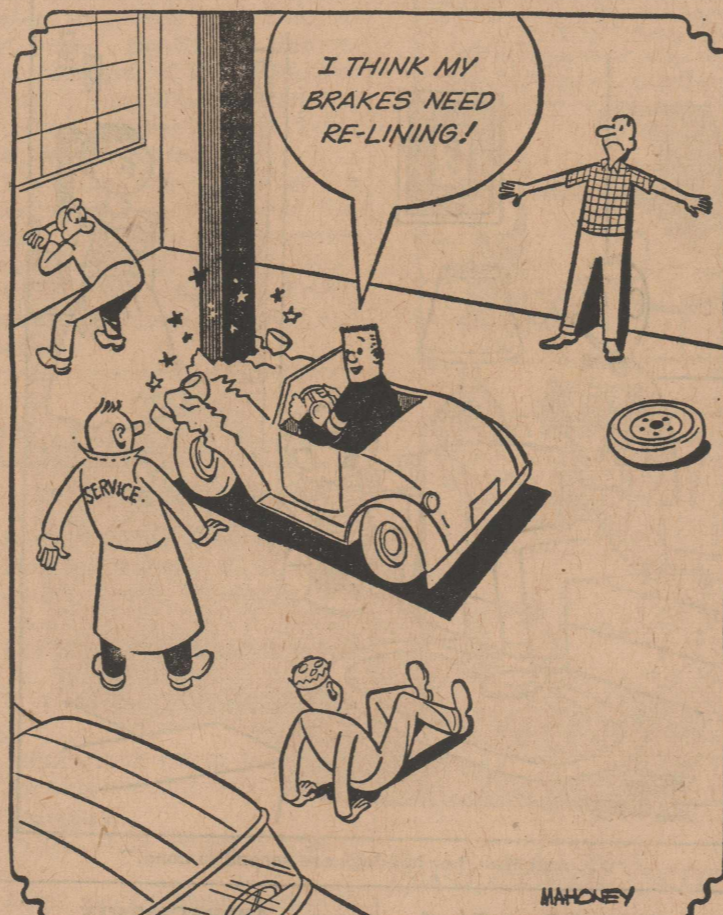
