Tommy Lovett came in third for Stratford in the mile race, making the time in 5:03.

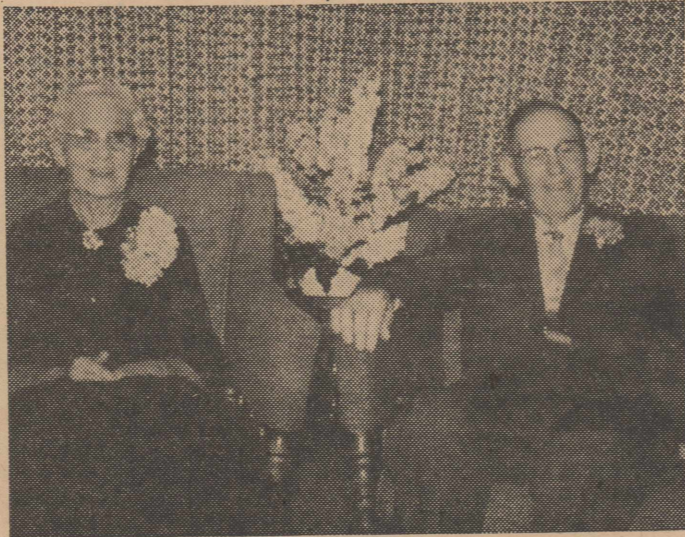

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Dr. Floyd D. Golden pictured the common people of Russia as a people living in fear of starvation, at the meeting of the Sherman County Wheat Growers Association Friday night.

Kenneth Kendrick served as toastmaster. R. C. Buckles gave the invocation. Officers elected for the coming year included: Kenneth Kendrick, president; F. D. Brannan, vice president; and E. Goule, secretary and treasurer. W. L. Pendleton read the nominations for members of the board of directors, who were elected by acclamation.

Kenneth Kendrick gave a brief analysis of the proposed wheat program that is being studied by congress. The proposed program would cut acreage base about 20% and pay the farmer approximately the same amount of money for the land left out of production as could be made from the sale of the crop.

Dr. Floyd D. Golden of Amarillo, one of 30 educators visiting in Russia last year described the conditions which he found in the Soviet Union as the group studied the political and educational system, and the privations of those who profess some form of religion. For the common people, he said human life is one of the cheapest commodities and the grave is their goal. All freedom has been destroyed by the threat of starvation and the Russian controlled press always pictures the United States in an unfavorable position. There is no free enterprise for Communism does not allow operations at a profit.

In the presence of another Soviet citizen, the individual never shows any symptoms of being unhappy. If he did and was reported, his work card would be taken from him. Without employment he and his family would be left to starve.

Young people gather at the Pioneer Palaces when they are not in school and do not have work to do. Here they are provided with recreation and entertainment and an indoctrination into the Communist Party. The 3% who have distinguished themselves as having been most valuable to the Communist Party are selected for duties with the party at the age of 27. These favored few are elevated to the higher positions and live in accommodations in keeping with their rank in the party. The others are expended as workers with a work card and are assigned to labor wherever they are needed by the state. In the event a person complains, the work card is taken back by the state, leaving the individual without employment to earn food or a place to live.

Communist Russia first had two types of farms, state and collective. On the state farm 400 to 600 are assigned to produce products for the state and receive a very low wage. On the collective farms, several farmers were allowed to produce crops, claiming a share for themselves and giving the balance to the state. The collective farms are being dissolved as the practice supplied the initiative required for private enterprise and the desire to gain a profit from their labors.

New modern machinery is displayed in the museums of Russia but on the farms most of the work is done by hand as it is in the factories. Some obsolete machinery has been supplied for their use.

The division of labor between the sexes awed the Americans. Heavy work is usually assigned to the women. Men drive the trucks. Women load and unload them. Men lay bricks but women dig the ditches. Men are

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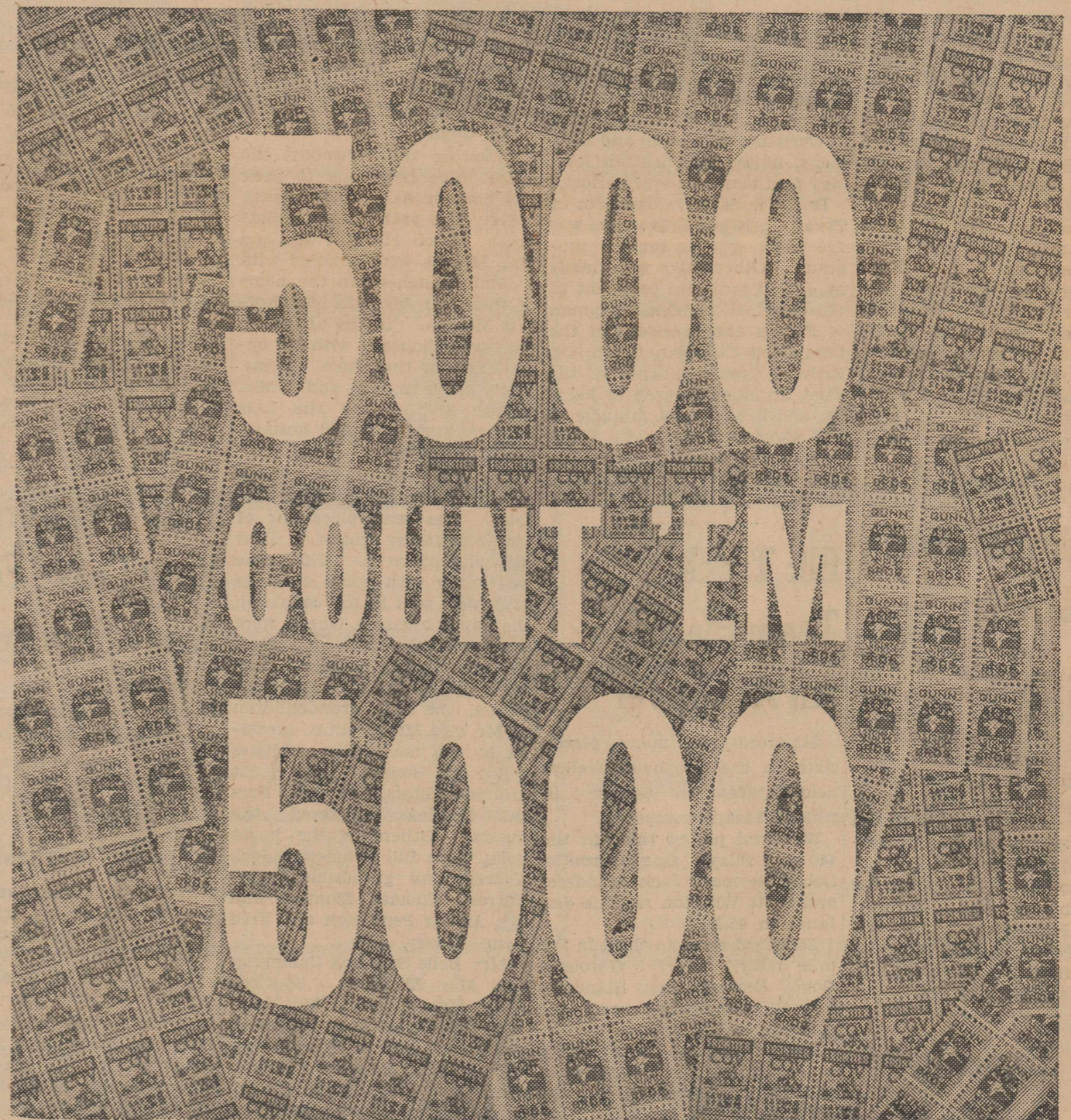
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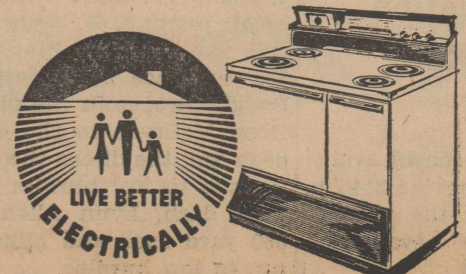

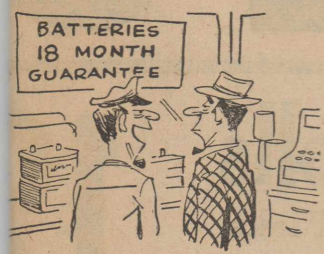

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### Beet Growers Plan Trip To Washington

A trip to Washington, D. C., on behalf of new sugar beet legislation is planned by representatives of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association when proposed legislation comes before the Senate Finance Committee.

James W. Witherspoon, Hereford attorney and legislative representative of the group, says that the trip may be made within a week. He said association representatives and area congressmen were disappointed because they were not permitted to appear before the House Agriculture Committee when it voted for a 21-month extension of the present act.

The association seeks assurance that new sugar beet farmers will get an increased quota of the domestic sugar market.

Congressmen and senators from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico have pledged support for an amendment to the sugar act to provide increased quotas for area growers.

welders but women are the architects. Their lack of knowledge is noticeable in newly completed buildings which are ready to fall down almost by the time they are complete. Workers must go along with

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the dictates of the Communist Party or face liquidation by starvation. Crowds of people roam the Russian streets aimlessly. They go into the shops and look but do not have the money with which to buy. It is more pleasant for them to pass the time roaming the streets than to remain in the dark and dingy apartments to which they are assigned. A family of 4 or 5 live in a 10x12 room. Three rooms are provided for the average family of 20. Each family must share the kitchen and bath with 6 or 7 other families.

Despite their misery, Russians are a dedicated people. They have no choice. They are told that they will conquer the free capitalistic countries without firing a shot. They plan to

use infiltration into freedom loving countries and conquer them by dividing races and classes to such an extent they can conquer them in their weakened state without firing a shot. Russians estimate that after infiltration it will be necessary for them to liquidate about 60 million Americans to completely conquer the United States.

Men control the Russian missiles program. The visiting group were unable to locate any great Russian scientists. The work in this field, they found had been completely by German scientists who were captured and taken into custody after Germany fell at the close of World War II. Russia, however, is spending three times more

for education than the United States.

In a question and answer session, Dr. Golden told the audience that Russia finances her projects by collecting an income tax of from 10 to 35% of the workers pay. The tax is assessed according to the amount of

money that is needed and taken from the payroll.
