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

For diverting acreages equal to 20 percent of their base or 20 acres, whichever is larger, producers will be eligible for a payment equal to 50 percent of their normal production on their diverted acres times the county support price. Actual payment computation will be based on a payment rate per acre for the county times the acreage diverted and a productivity index for each farm, which will reflect its normal production

There is also a provision, the director said, for further reductions at a higher payment rate. This additional reduction can be any amount up to 20 percent As an added incentive, the higher rate will be 60 percent of normal production. The payment will also be computed on the basis of an average county rate and a productivity index for the farm.




