

Farmers Vote On '62 Wheat Quotas Aug. 24

Wheat producers will determine whether or not wheat marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1961 wheat crop on August 24.

"The decision farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the Nation not only for 1962 but also for many years to come," said Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman when he announced the referendum date. "The program available with quotas in effect would be far different from that which could be operated without quotas," he added.

If two-thirds of the referendum voters favor quotas, cooperators will be eligible for full 1962 wheat price support. Although the level of support has not definitely been determined, it will be higher than the present level of \$1.79 per bushel if proposed legislation now before Congress becomes law. At a recent press conference, Secretary Freeman said that the national average support for wheat would likely be in the neighborhood of \$2.00 per bushel.

If farmers decide in the referendum against quotas, there will be no limit on marketings, price support would be at 50 percent of parity (wheat parity is now \$2.37 per bushel) and would be available to those farmers who plant within their acreage allotments.

On May 12, Secretary Freeman proclaimed marketing quotas and a national acreage allotment of 55 million acres for the 1962 wheat crop on the basis of estimated supplies and utilization of wheat. At that time he deferred setting the date for the referendum pending action to provide an improved wheat program for next year's crop.

"Though action has not been completed on a new program," the Secretary explained, "it seems desirable to now set a date for the referendum on 1962 marketing quotas in order that all producers may be appraised of the voting time. Under legislation now being considered, stocks of wheat would probably be reduced by 100 million bushels rather than increased by that amount if changes are not made. This would result in savings to the Government on this crop of \$50 million in the first crop year, and in the period before new stocks could be disposed of at present rates the savings on this one crop would amount to \$258 million."

Paratrooper Given Wings

(AHTNC) — Army 2nd Lt. Claude R. Henderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Henderson, Sunray, recently was graduated from the 101st Airborne Division Jump School at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. Lieutenant Henderson received his paratrooper wings after completing three weeks of intensive ground and aerial training which included five parachute jumps. The 101st, a major Strategic Army Corps (STRAC) unit, maintains a constant state of readiness to move anytime, anywhere, in case of national emergency. He entered the Army last January. The 23-year old officer is a 1956 graduate of Sunray High School and is a 1960 graduate of West Texas State College in Canyon.

The Texas Legislature passed the first sales tax in the state's history late Tuesday night. It is a 2 per cent tax on most items costing more than 25 cents except groceries.

The sales tax was part of a record \$354 million tax package.

The legislature also passed the largest state budget in Texas history.

No action was taken on a pay raise for teachers and the governor called a second special session of the legislature at a time to be fixed later.

The sales levy, effective Sept. 1, taxes at a 2 per cent rate most retail purchases over a quarter. You would pay a penny tax on purchases of 25 to 74 cents, two pennies on purchases of 75 cents to \$1.24, three cents on purchases of \$1.25 to \$1.74, and so on.

The tax exempts groceries, prescription drugs and work clothing costing less than \$10. It also omits the tax on items of feed, seed, fertilizer and farm machinery.

The bill exempts beer, wine and other alcoholic beverages from the sales tax unless they are purchased with a meal.

Passage of a revenue bill wasn't the end for weary lawmakers. They still face another special session to pass a teacher's pay raise at a date to be set by Gov. Price Daniel.

Daniel must also decide what he plans to do about the sales tax he has violently opposed.

"I want to see and read the tax bill and appropriations bill before I comment on them, and before deciding the date for the session on the school program," Daniel said in a statement.

Taxes and appropriations were taken care of minutes before the midnight deadline Tuesday of a 30-day special session of the Legislature. A 140-day regular session ended in dismal failure on May 29.

Both measurers were prepared by House-Senate conference committees.

A tax compromise was reached after most lawmakers were ready to give up hope and look to another special session.

The House passed the tax bill 84-62, then enough members switched votes to give the bill 100-45 approval, the two-thirds necessary to put it into immediate effect Sept. 1, the start of the next fiscal year. Senators passed the measure, 23-8.

A gigantic \$2.49 billion budget for the next two years was passed, 73-72 in the House and 22-8 in the Senate. The measure spends \$398 million from the general revenue fund, \$127 million more than the current spending.

House liberals waged a desperate last-ditch fight to kill the sales tax package.

Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston, who saw his gas pipeline tax reduced to a token levy in the package, called the measure the "Sealy-Wilson" tax.

He referred to John Sealy of Midland, head of the "Citizens for a Sales Tax" lobby group, and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, who revised the pipeline tax to exclude all gas processed by gasoline plants. Eckhardt said it destroyed 78 per cent of his bill's potential.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger, chairman of the House conferees, said the token pipeline tax would provide an ample court test of the taxation theory. Two previous pipeline taxes were declared unconstitutional. The levy, as written by Eckhardt, was a major stumbling block in House-Senate ne-

Burial was made in the Petersburg Cemetery.

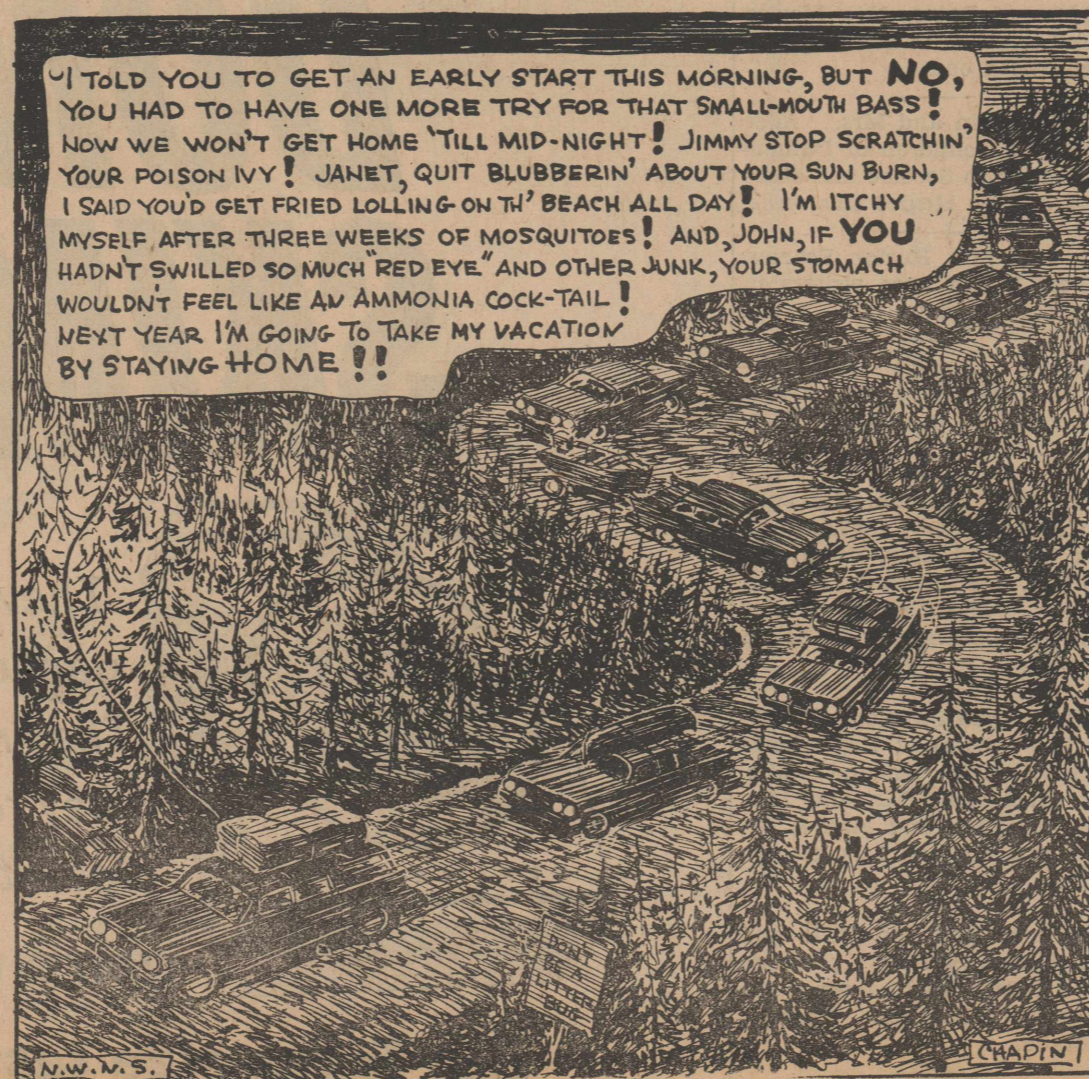

Law enforcement agencies throughout the country are working closely with the FBI in the struggle against espionage, sabotage, and subversive activities. The assistance of every law-abiding person in our Nation is needed, and all patriotic organizations and individuals are requested to report information affecting our internal security to the FBI.

Here are some suggestions for individuals and organizations wishing to aid the FBI in the internal security field:

1. Keep informed on current events which affect our Nation. Acquaint yourself with the activities of the enemies of democracy so that you can readily recognize their efforts to undermine our cherished freedoms. Those anxious to weaken our security are not always easy to identify. Communists have been trained in deceit and secretly work toward achieving their goal of replacing our way of life with a communist dictatorship. They create cleverly camouflaged groups, often claiming to be working for peace or civil rights, and strive to dupe loyal citizens into help-

ing their cause. They frequently attempt to gain control of legitimate organizations through infiltration. While individual communists are difficult to recognize, their primary aim — the advancement of atheistic communism — remains constantly clear.

2. Be sure to report all facts in your possession relating to espionage, sabotage, or subversive activities to the FBI. Many times a small bit of information

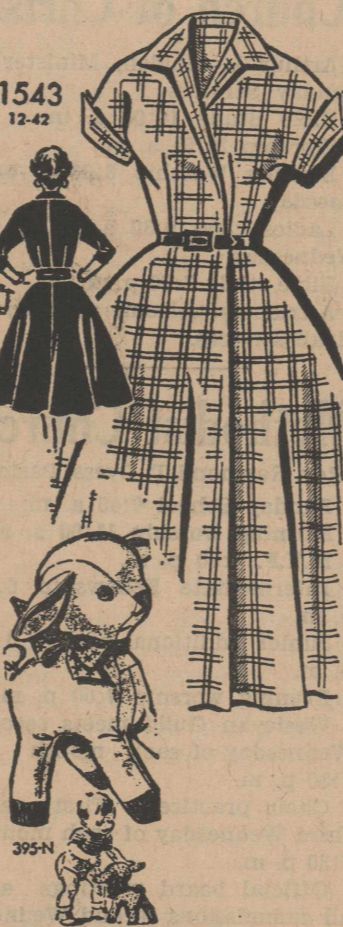

3. The FBI is interested in receiving facts. We want to know what a person does to further the cause of communism or other enemies of freedom. Avoid reporting idle rumors and malicious gossip.

4. Do not circulate rumors about subversive activities or draw conclusions from information coming to your attention. The data you possess may be incomplete or only partially accurate, and by drawing conclusions or circulating rumors you can cause grave injustices to innocent persons. Hysteria, witch hunts, and vigilante activities weaken our security. It is just as important to protect the innocent as it is to identify our enemies.

5. Refrain from making private investigations. Report the information you have to the FBI and leave the checking of the data to trained investigators. Indiscriminate inquiries might well jeopardize investigations already under way. In cases involving espionage, it often is more important to identify members of a spy ring, their contacts, sources of information, and methods of communications than to make immediate arrests.

6. Be alert. American workmen who are producing the materials and weapons for our defense can be our best guardians against sabotage and espionage. Among the prime targets of foreign-directed espionage are our major defense industries, and alert workmen at these installations can greatly assist in the protection of our defense secrets by promptly reporting any indication of sabotage or espionage.

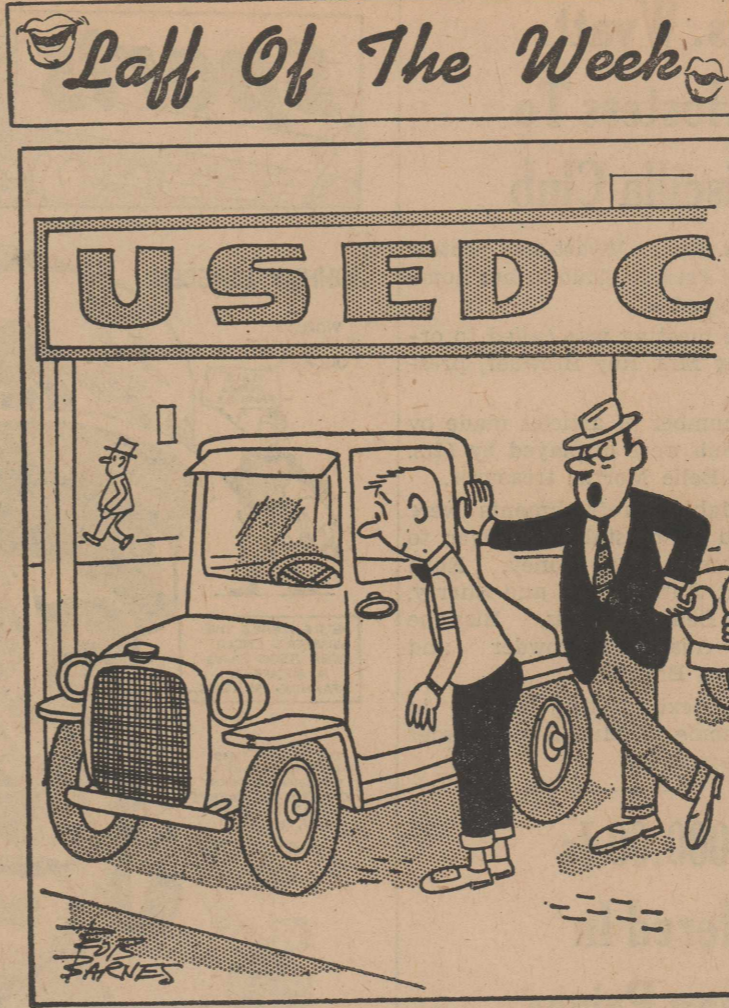
7. The FBI is as near as your telephone. The first page of telephone directories shows the number of the nearest FBI field office. Each office is open 24 hours a day, including Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. You may furnish us information either by telephone, letter or in person. Data in FBI files is held confidential; hence, we cannot inform you regarding the results of any suspicions relative to subversive activities. nor can we supply characterizations or evaluations of individuals, organizations, or publications.

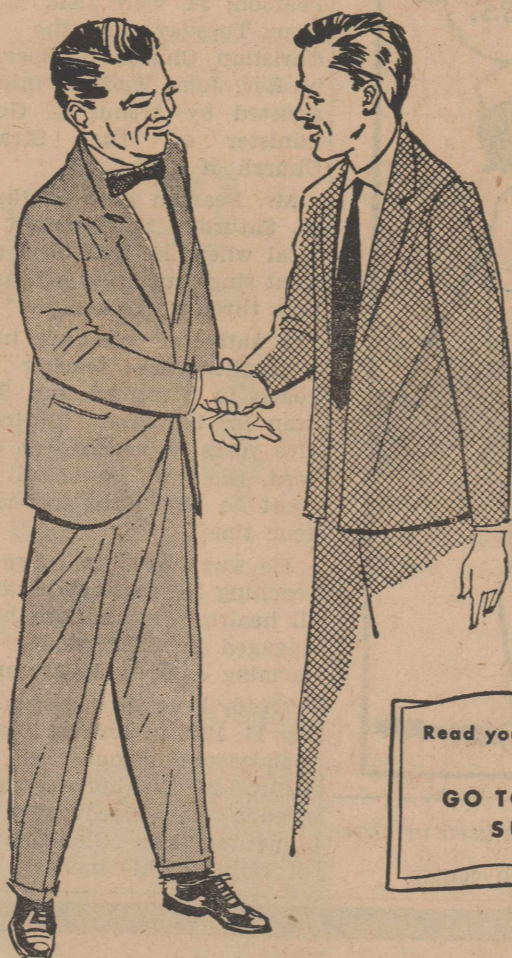
This program was set up in 1958. It is a program which a farmer or rancher can use to treat all his soil and water conservation problems on a planned basis.

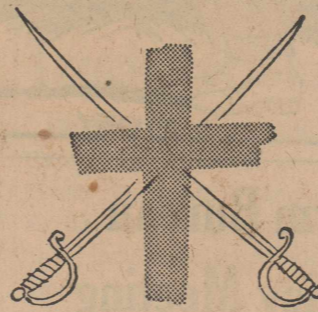

Cost share assistance varies from 50% on practices such as cross fencing and dams to 80% on practices such as building waterways and planting grass etc.

He may draw up \$25,000.00 and take from 3 to 10 years to complete his work.

Ernest Goule, county agent, or Vernon Bullard, the ASC manager, will be glad to discuss this program with those interested. The Soil Conservation Service boys from Spearman provide technical assistance since Sherman County does not have a SCS Unit. Goule and Bullard will take an application and aid you in getting in contact with these boys.

Justice Douglas voted for in sixty-six cases and against in three. Justice Frankfurter voted for in fifty-six cases, against in sixteen. Justice Harlan voted for in twenty cases, against in fourteen. Justice Brennan voted for in eighteen cases, against two. Only Justices Burton and Clark voted oftener against the communist position than for. As for Earl Warren, Chief Justice, his vote decided thirty of thirty-nine cases in favor of the communists.

This present Court has opened FBI files to anyone — they have usurped states rights — they have interfered in interstate commerce — told schools and colleges whom they had to hire as teachers and instructors — told businesses what stock they could hold — meddled in Congressional investigations, turned loose a confessed rapist, interfered with police procedure in investigations, and in a number of other cases made questionable decisions. These men all took an oath to uphold the laws and the Constitution and were to serve during good behavior. They are public servants and should act as such, but they act as though they are not to be held to their oath of office. Part of the responsibility that such men are our Supreme Court lies with the Senate, for they approve the appointments made by the President, but can you ever remember that such an appointment was refused? They, the Senate have raised questions now and then, but always give their approval in the end.

We all know, if we will admit the fact, that we, as voters are to blame for what we send to Washington, but must we keep on letting our government get away from us? Too many Americans stand with their hands out, open, palms up, and with their eyes closed and aren't willing to admit we are headed for trouble. Indeed we are already deep in trouble, but it's never too late to right a wrong.

I urge you, Mr. Editor and other readers to obtain the book, 'Nine Men Against America' and read it. There is a copy in our Sherman County Library where they are many informative books and a courteous, pleasant librarian to serve you.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Perhaps you have been asked, and I know that many of those who will read this have been asked, "Would you like to sign this petition to our congressmen, calling for the impeachment of Earl Warren?" Several signed that petition; some declined, and others said, "Let's include the entire Supreme Court." This is indeed the feeling of a great number of Americans these days. There was a time when our Supreme Court was a highly respected institution, not that it didn't make mistakes, but it stood for something. Americans felt that their Constitution was being handled carefully and judiciously by that Supreme Court when it was called upon to settle disputes as to the meaning of that Constitution concerning the rights of individual citizens and the American states. That was its original purpose.

Our Supreme Court wasn't much in the news until twenty-five years ago, when our president began to denounce the justices as senile, a horse and buggy court, in retaliation for some of the Court's decisions as to the constitutionality of certain New Deal laws and practices. But that same president appointed a justice (and he was approved by our Senate) who was once a member of the Ku Klux Klan. He's still on the court, showing all just how 'liberal' he is. And he isn't the only one who is quite liberal; he's just been on the Court a longer time. Another justice is old in years, he's eighty-nine, but quite active yet. Undoubtedly he has stayed in good shape by hopping from one side of the fence to the other in rendering his opinions these past twenty-two years.

In a compilation made by Senator James O. Eastland (Congressional Record, July 10, 1958) this is what he found: In the past fifteen years, the Court heard seventy-three cases of vital concern to the communists. Justice Black voted for the position advocated by the communists in all seventy-three

Secretary Of Agriculture Asks Support For Wheat Plan

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, in a speech in Oklahoma City Wednesday, urged farmers and consumers to support the new government wheat program signed into law by President Kennedy in the Agricultural Act of 1961.

Secretary Freeman predicted the new wheat plan will save taxpayers 50 million dollars during the 1962 crop year — and at the same time increase the income of farmers 10 to 15 per cent. The new wheat legislation should reduce government surplus stocks of wheat by 100 million bushels, in contrast with a carryover of 100 million bushels from this past crop year.

"Better income for farmers can be expected as a result of the temporary legislation for wheat and feed grains, the expansion of marketing order programs, and the improvements to our programs for rural credit," Secretary Freeman said.

Growers in commercial areas will have an opportunity to earn payments for reducing their 1962 acreage, Secretary Freeman stated. To be eligible for payment and for price support, farmers must divert to conservation use 10 per cent of the farm acreage allotments for the
