In general, the operation of the 1962 feed grain program for barley will be similar to the provisions in effect for 1961 corn and grain sorghum production. Payments will be made to producers who divert barley acreage to a conserving use.

As additional program details are worked out, State and County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committees will be advised so this information can be passed along to winter barley producers. Yield and acreage information is being prepared in county ASCS offices and each winter barley producer will be mailed his barley base acreage, his yield (established on the basis of 1959-60 average acreage and production) and payment rate per acre. The signup period for winter barley producers will
