### Funeral Rites Tuesday For Cummings Baby

Funeral services for Marlon Walker Cummings, five month hree week old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Cummings, were conducted Tuesday morning in the First Methodist Church by Rev. Raymond T. Dyess, pastor.

Burial was made in the Stratford cemetery.

Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Cummings, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Cummings and Mr. and Mrs. Walker Taylor.

The baby died about 6:00 a. m. Monday in Memorial Hospital in Dumas as the result of burns sustained in an early morning fire in the Cummings home.

Floyd H. Reeves, city policeman, discovered smoke coming from the Cummings home about 3:00 a. m. He went to the house to investigate and see if it was occupied. As he neared the front porch, Wayne Cummings brought his wife out of the front door and returned into the dense smoke and flames in an attempt to save the baby. Reeves followed Cummings into the house, but not being acquainted with the house plans, was unable to even find a door leading from the room. Cummings was driven back by the flames that blocked his path.

Reeves followed Cummings from the house and turned in the fire alarm. Cummings used a hoe to break out a window in the bedroom and rescued the child by going into the house through the window.

Sheriff A. L. Wilson, Jim Close and Claude Fedric arrived at the home about the same time. Wayne Cummings was handing the baby to his wife. Jim Close took the child and carried it to the fire department ambulance where they started giving it oxygen.

Realizing the child needed immediate medical attention, they rushed it to the Stratford Clinic where Dr. Paul E. Smith administered emergency treatment, and advised immediate hospitalization.

Jim Close held the baby in his arms. (Continued on Page 3)

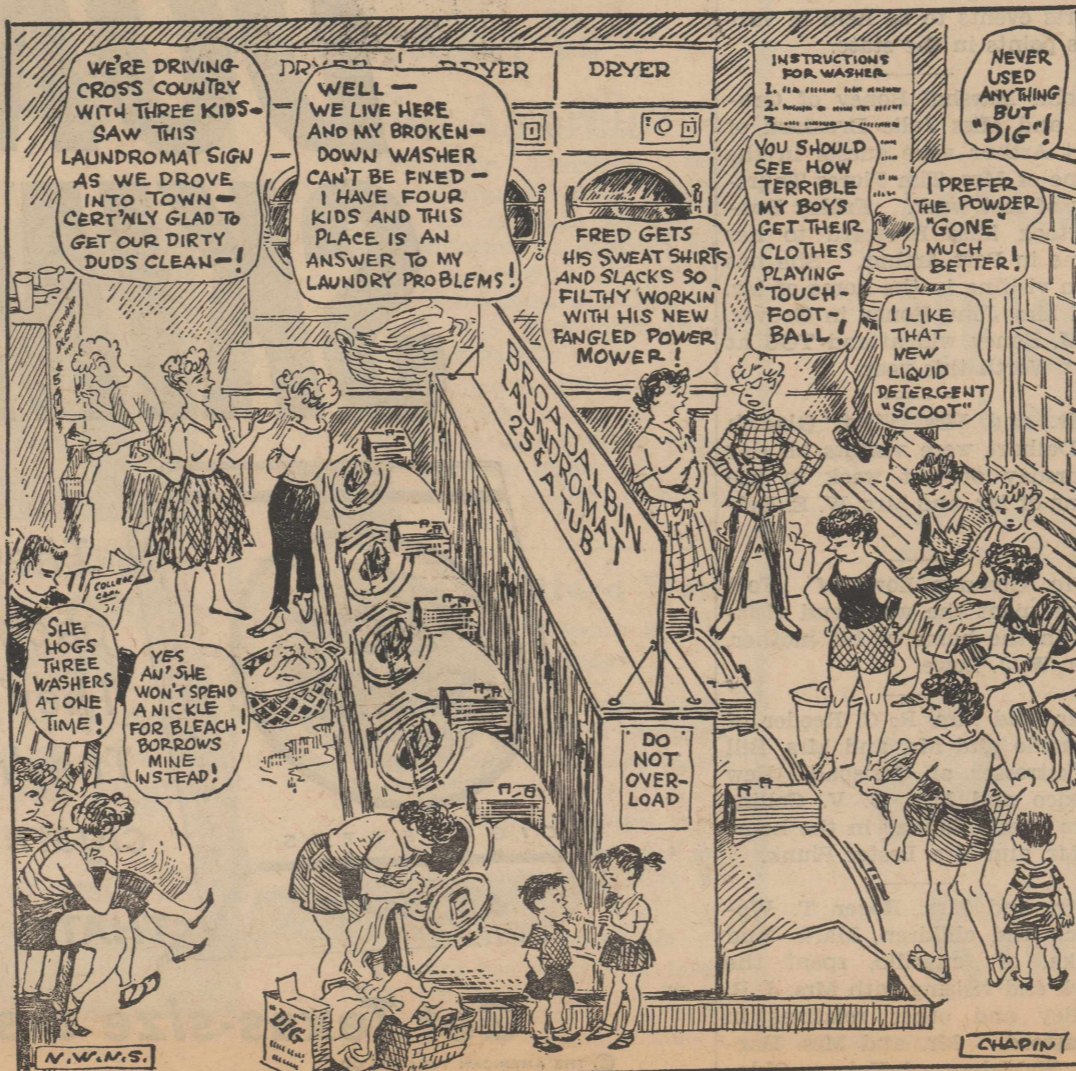
### Study Club To Feature Safety Belts

**SOLOMON** was considered the wisest man of his time and through the centuries his proverbs have been studied and applied by succeeding generations.

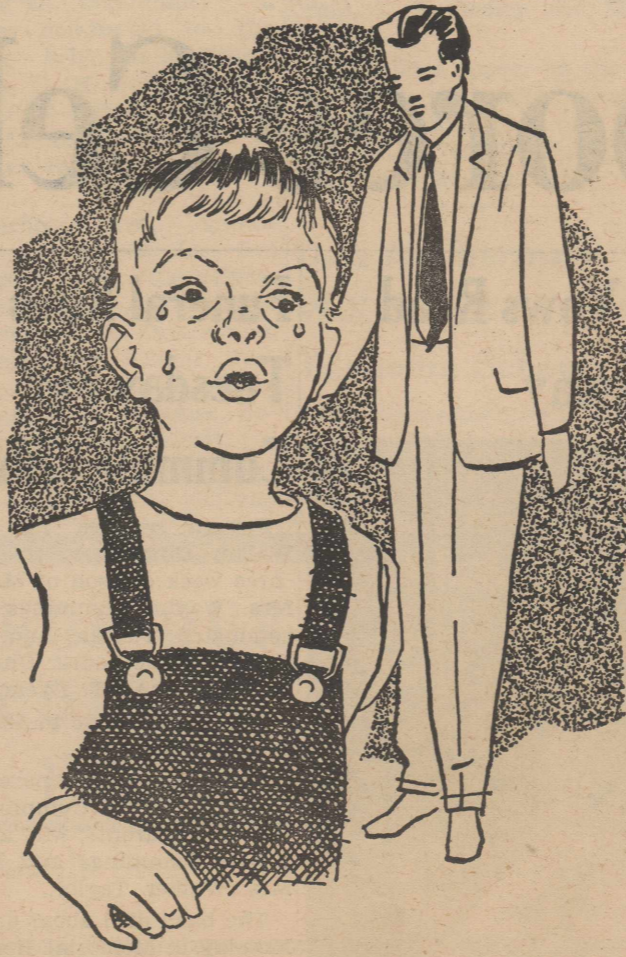
This one is most applicable to our modern world!

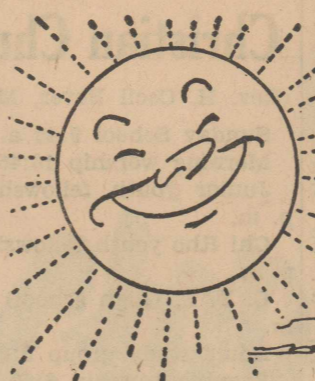

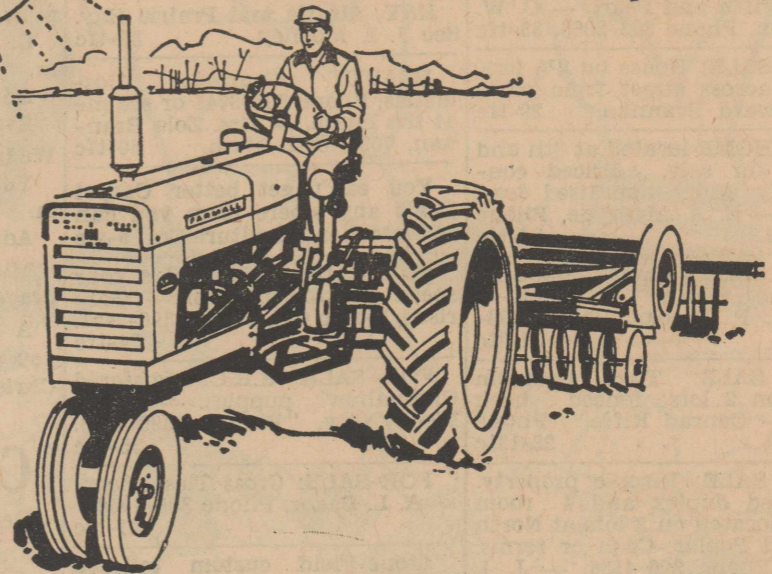

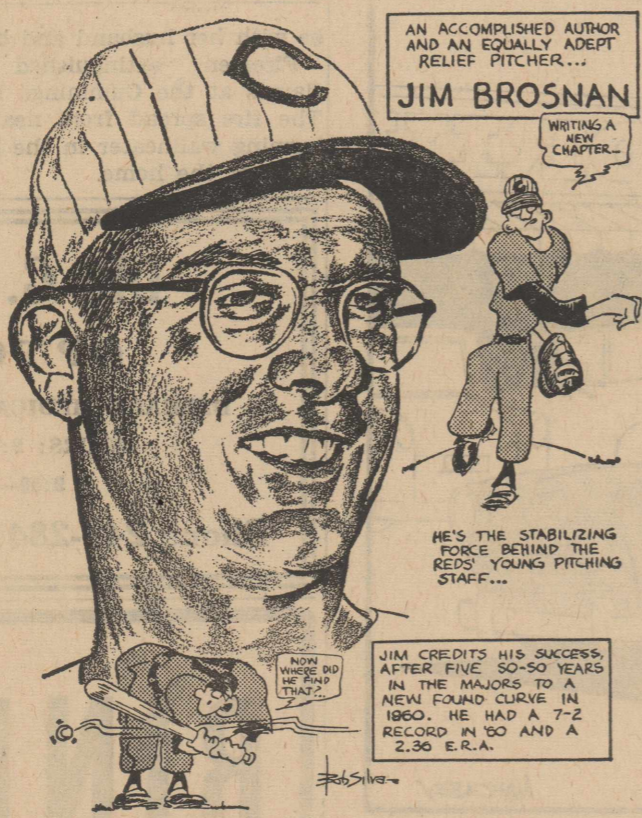

### You Can Trust The Communists

To Do Exactly As They Say (By Dr. Fred Schwarz)

The thesis of this book is that Communists are Communists, and they intend to do exactly what they say they will do. So the title is not as startling as it may seem. They can be trusted to do what they have stated in clearly defined principles. If we continue to believe that the Communists think, feel, and believe as we do — how wrong we are! The unifying purpose concealed in their recently chaotic and contradictory conduct is revealed when we understand the philosophy of Communism.

This book tells of the successful techniques for seizing power in the different nations. The program that is probably to be used in America would interest us most. It is to be brought about by a series of small concessions to Communism, each relatively insignificant in itself, each presented as an alternative to an atomic war. Each in itself may appear indecisive, but each a step to surrender. When America is encircled economically and militarily, when foreign markets are disrupted and foreign trade destroyed, when America is an island in a Communist sea, and lies under the shadow of military annihilation, authority will be centralized and a few Communists will wield great power. At the chosen moment the final Communist assault will take place and resistance will be token and half-hearted. The dictatorship is then established by control of every medium of mass communication, radio stations, television, publishing houses, books, magazines, and every school class. The Communists are wooing and winning the vast uncommitted peoples of the world, not with bombs, bullets and money, but with words and books. One hundred people are being reached with Communist lies for every one being reached with the Christian or the democratic truth.

To understand the mechanics of Communism one must learn material dialectics. According to dialectics the driving force in any situation is the conflict of two opposing forces. The conflict between two forces is the dynamic of progress. In other words progress is only attained through conflict. The Com-

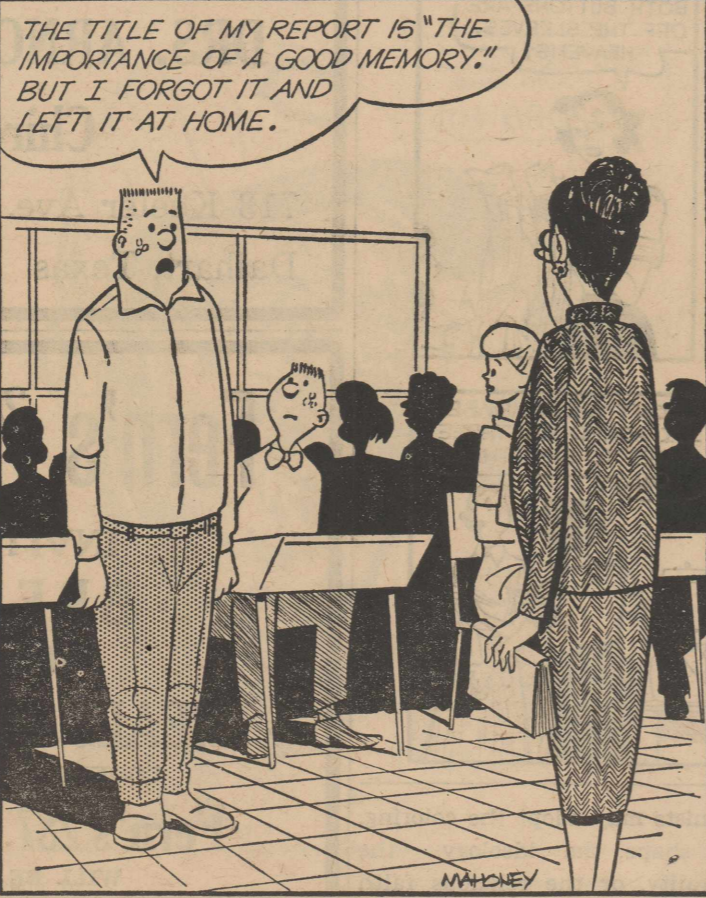

### Stratford School Enrollment Shows Gain Over 1960 Peak Attendance

Stratford schools have an enrollment of 524 students as compared to 490 students in the early days of the school term last year. There are 378 students in the elementary school

as compared to 363 in 1960. Stratford high school has an enrollment of 146, a gain over 127 enrolled in the school during the opening days of the 1960 term.

Enrollment figures released this week by Superintendent R. W. Standerfer Jr., indicate there are: 52 pupils in the first grade, 50 pupils in the second grade, 53 pupils in the third grade, 44 pupils in the fourth grade, 53 pupils in the fifth grade, 47 pupils in the sixth grade, 37 pupils in the seventh grade, and 42 pupils in the eighth grade.

In high school, there are: 52 in the freshman class, 39 in the sophomore class, 33 in the junior class and 22 students in the senior class.

During the peak enrollment of 1960, there were at one time, 521 students in the Stratford schools. Several of these students were children of Sheehan Pipeline employees who moved to Stratford in November.
