About 250 people attended the meeting. One hundred and forty old timers, 35 of whom were from out of town, registered. Favorites given the old timers were old fashioned pantallettes of white felt for the women and red flannels for the men.

Mrs. Alfred Pronger was mistress of ceremonies.

A boys' trio which included J. D. Plunk, Jimmy Cameron, Karl Kirkwood, and a girls' trio composed of Linda Hamel, Barbara Howerly and Gail Bever entertained the crowd by singing interesting numbers.

## Old Timer Arrives Late For Reunion

Ben W. Craven, a resident of Stratford from 1906 until 1916, arrived in Stratford Saturday just a little too late to attend the Old Timers Reunion.

Mr. and Mrs. Craven had been visiting with their daughter and family in California, and were on their way home to Marengo, Illinois.

Mr. Craven could remember the names of E. L. Manson, his employer, A. E. Pronger and P. J. Pronger, and Eula Mattingly. Mr. Craven is employed as a linotype operator with the Marengo Republican News, and plans to retire the first of the year.

He started his career in the printing industry in Stratford in 1906, when in his teens, he accepted a job with E. L. Manson, as an apprentice in the hand set publication of The Stratford Star.

James A. Craven, an agriculturist who farmed a few miles north of Stratford, bitterly opposed his son entering the field of business and industry. When Craven informed his father he wanted to be a printer and had secured the promise of employment at the pay scale of \$2.00 a week for a 60 hour work week, his father finally gave him the permission. He did make the reservation that young Craven would be up at 4:00 a. m. and do all the chores around the farm which included milking the cows in the morning, and then walking the two miles to Stratford to work. He walked home after working until 6:00 p. m. and milked the cows each night.

At the end of seven years, Ben W. Craven had mastered the art of the printing industry to such an extent that he was drawing a prize wage of \$1.00 a day for work hours of 8:00 a. m. until 6:00 p. m. when he left Stratford in 1913 to seek higher wages in the city.

Ben W. Craven will be 71 years of age September 21. He enjoyed viewing the present day equipment of The Stratford Star, and comparing it with what he worked with in the early days.

Ben W. Craven has a much different view of life than his agriculturist father, James A. Craven. Three of his sons are highly paid craftsmen of the printing industry. A fourth son is a TV star. Their daughter is married and lives in California.

**P. P. & K. Contest Open To Boys Ages 6 To 10**

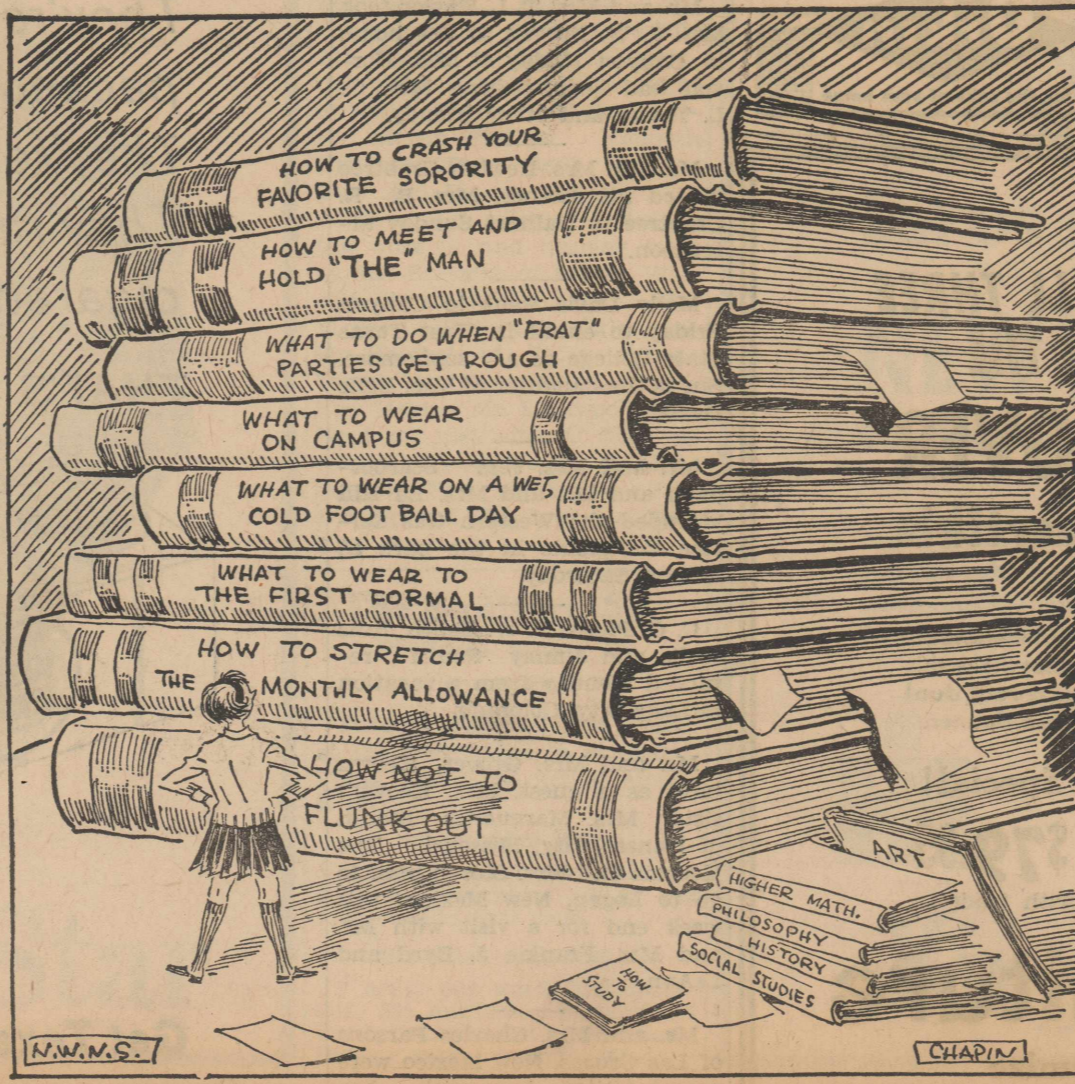

Ye can discern the face of the sky; but can ye not discern the signs of the times? Matthew 16:3

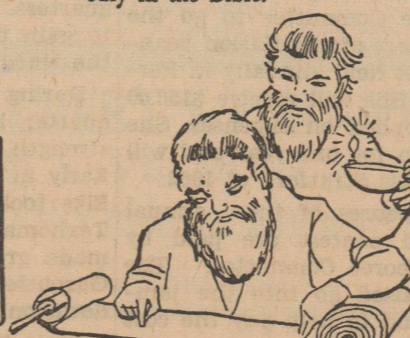
Jesus used these words in answer to the Pharisees who wanted Him to show them a sign from heaven, to prove the truth of His leadership.
