Those were the times, we're told, when the forests were busting at the seams with wildlife. Why, on a day in the woods a fellow was likely to see a bear or two, deer and antelope in great numbers, a giant Canada goose, trumpeter swan or a flock of whooping cranes.

Bag limits? No such thing in those days. A fellow could take all the ducks he could carry; he could blast away at passenger pigeons until his gun became so hot he couldn't touch the barrel.

Yep, those were the days-before "too many people" appeared on the scene, to spoil things. Civilization did away with the "gude old days."

It must be true that civilization -an expanding population that constantly needs more and more living space—has helped reduce wildlife numbers. But more serious damage was inflicted by the oldtimer, who took more birds and animals than he needed, just because they were plentiful. The oldtimer was himself greatly responsible for the passing of the "gude old days." He wasn't willing to share the wealth, to leave something for the next generation. As far back as he could remember, there had always been plenty of wildlife and, for some reason, he seemed to believe the supply was inexhaustible.


