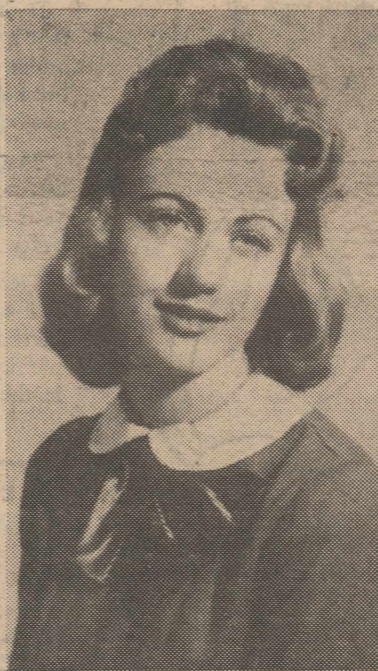

## Adult Sewing Classes Open October 6

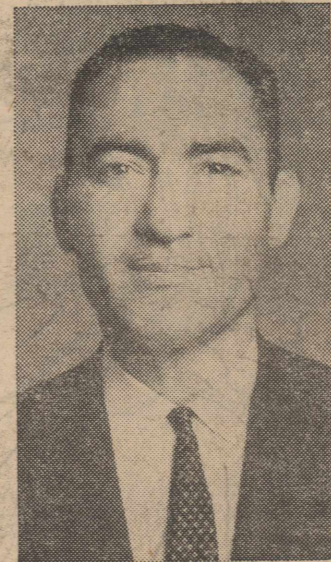

## Rev. Louis Kaplan To Show Adolph Eichmann Atrocities On October 10

Rev. Louis Kaplan will speak on the subject, "Will Krushchev try to force the allies out of West Berlin and involve the world in nuclear war," and show a film of the Adolph Eichmann atrocities in the school auditorium Tuesday, October 10, at 7:45 p. m.

The appearance of Rev. Kaplan is being sponsored by the Assembly of God Church, it was announced this week by Rev. Leeland Lewis, pastor.

"The apostasy of the Christian Church in Russia paved the way for Marxist theories to infiltrate every phase and every fiber of the Russian society," the Rev. Louis Kaplan, former New York City businessman of Russian Jewish background, said as he prepared to speak at a recent appearance.

The visiting minister made a study of the Russian revolution and its aftermath because of interest in his own national background. He said his parents fled Russia soon after the 1917 revolution when Jews were severely persecuted.

The Communists persecuted believers in all religious faiths, the minister said, because of their own atheistic beliefs.

Communists frequently tied bundles of straw about the bodies of Jews, poured on kerosene and set fire to the straw, Rev. Kaplan said. Then the Communists would dance about the human bonfires in glee, he added.

The evangelist warned that apostasy in American churches could end with the same result. He reminded that Israelites of Bible times were warned again and again about turning to strange gods in times of prosperity before the Israelites were allowed to suffer at the hands of atheistic nations.

The minister has traveled 350,000 miles and visited more than 1,000 churches and auditoriums in the United States and Canada since his conversion to Christianity in 1935, he said. He disposed of a real estate business in New York City to follow an evangelistic career.

His address here will be illustrated with a sound motion picture film entitled, "The Adolph Eichmann Atrocities." The film was captured from Nazi officers and depicts massacre in part of the six million Jews said murdered at concentration camps like the notorious Auschwitz camp.

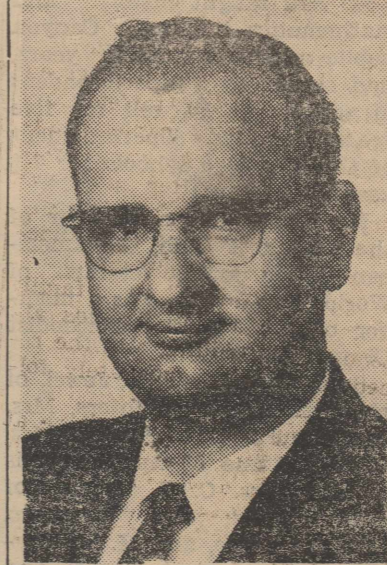
## Holly Harrington Is WSC Queen Candidate

The couple left immediately on a wedding trip to Colorado.

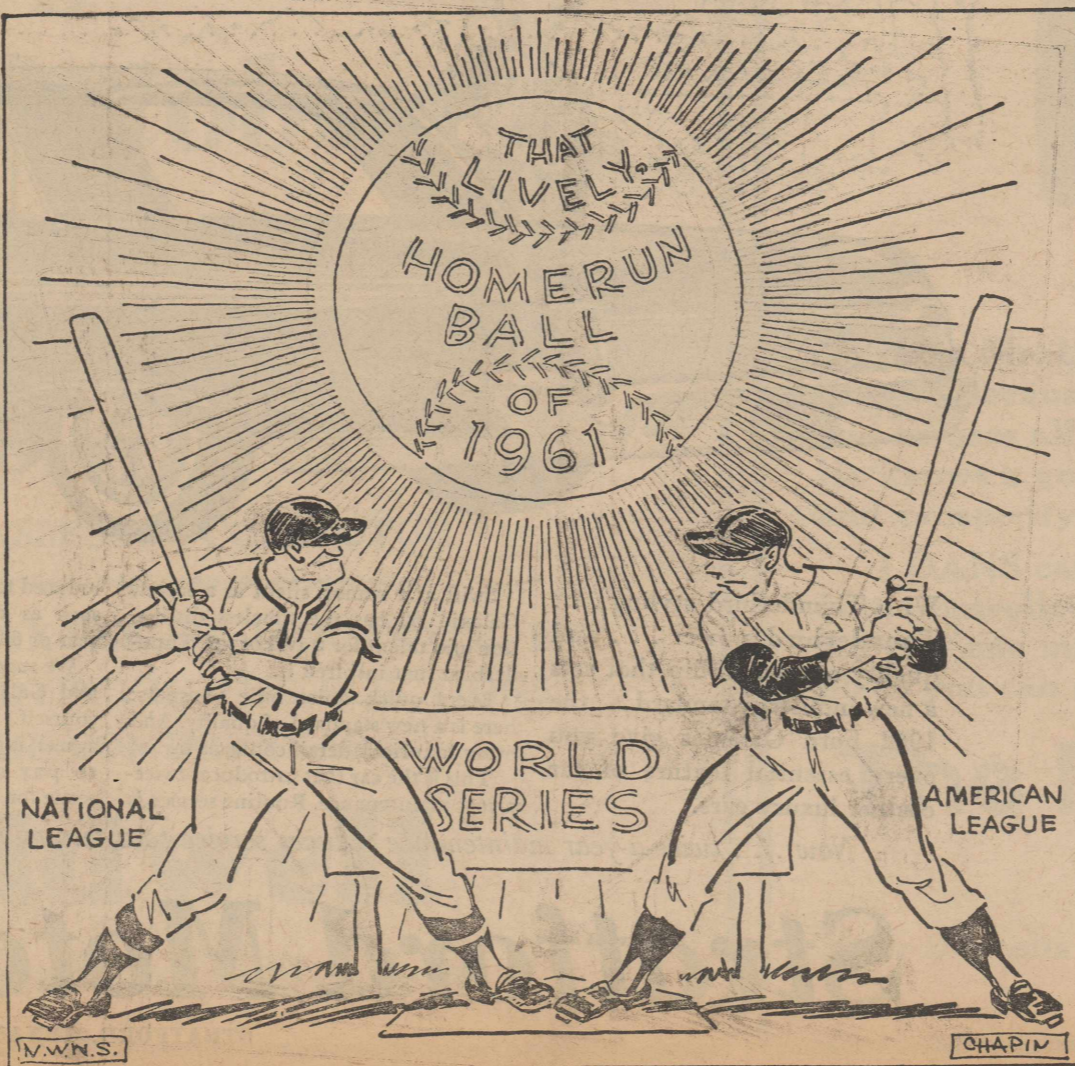

Stratford Elks and Coach Weldon Bates breathed a sigh of relief at the end of their 12-7 victory over Lefors here Friday night. The Pirates outweighed and could out-pass the Stratford Elks but they failed to properly estimate the value of the Elks' dogged drives of a few yards at a time.

## Two Electra Men Land Whale Size Catfish Near Giddings

"The experience that comes once in a lifetime" is the way two Electra men described the landing of the biggest catfish ever caught in Texas.

The two men, Nobie Etidham and Willie McSpadden landed the fish at the boat ramp on Diversion Lake, recently after a day long battle. They had the help of a dozen men, who could hardly believe their eyes when the fish was pulled up the ramp and on to a hay truck with the help of three wench trucks.

The two men first got an inkling of the presence of the big fish in the lake about a year ago while running a trotline. Several times they spotted the

big fish, and lost several trotlines which they attributed to the fish. They told no one of what they saw for fear that their listeners would call the story ridiculous.

Several weeks ago they decided to make a serious attempt to land the big fish. They had a welding shop make a huge fish-hook and attached it to a one-inch rope. They baited the hook with a whole beef liver, tied the rope to a tree on the side of the lake, dropped hook and bait in the fish's favorite deep hole and waited. After perhaps an hour's wait, they saw the tree beginning to sway

from the tightening of the rope. They started their motor boat, but by the time they arrived at a big disturbance in the water, the fish had straightened the hook out like it had been made

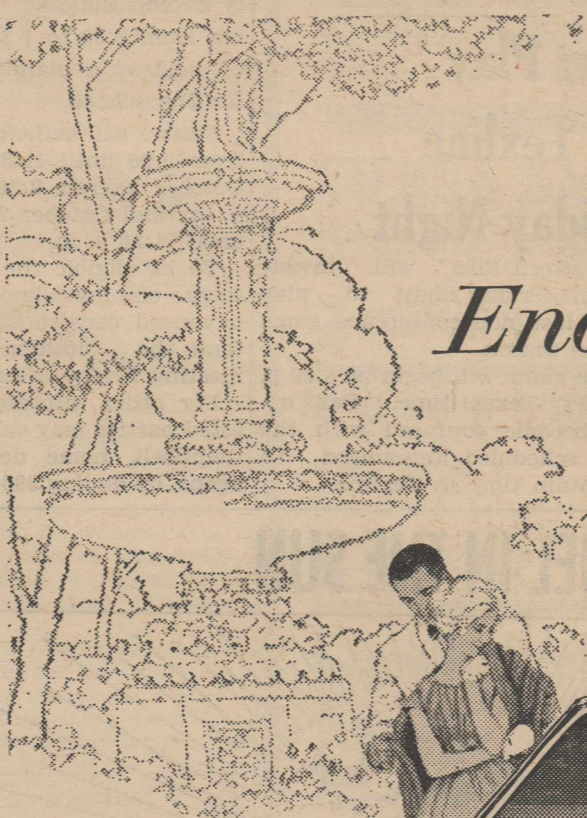

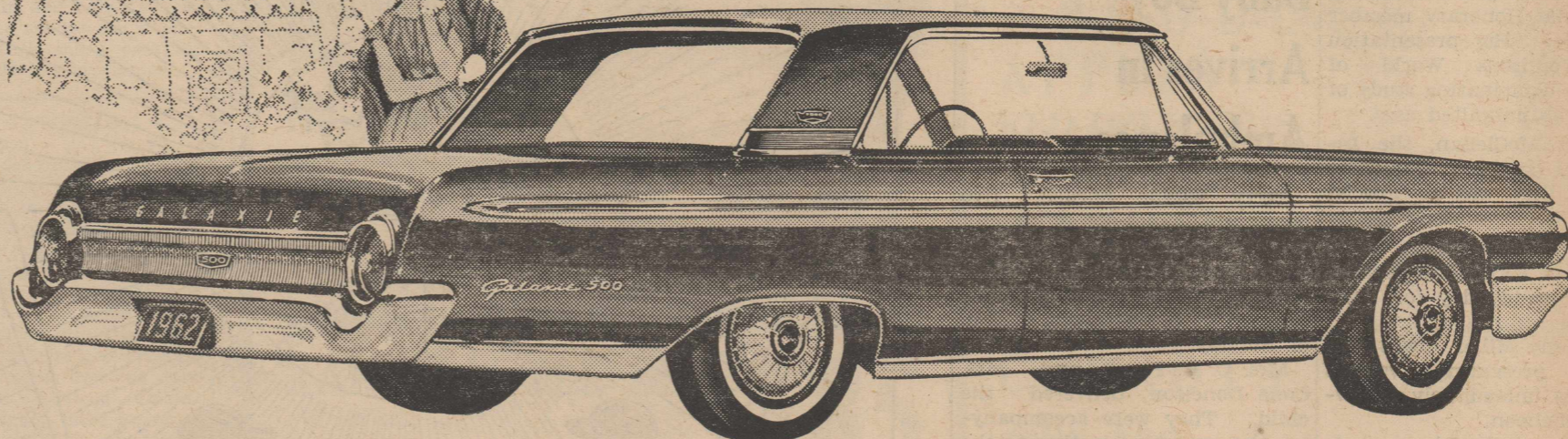

## Announce Premium Schedule For 1962 Good Quality Wheat Supports

The U. S. Department of Agriculture September 19 announced a premium schedule under the 1962 wheat price-support program ranging from three to 24 cents per bushel for varying qualities of hard red spring, hard red winter, and hard white wheat as measured by the baking quality (sedimentation) test.

The objective of this new premium program, was announced by USDA August 23 is to more nearly reflect the value of quality wheats in support prices to producers, thus providing more of an incentive for producers to grow higher quality

wheat. The quality premiums under the new schedule are substantially higher than those under the present price support program which is being supplanted.

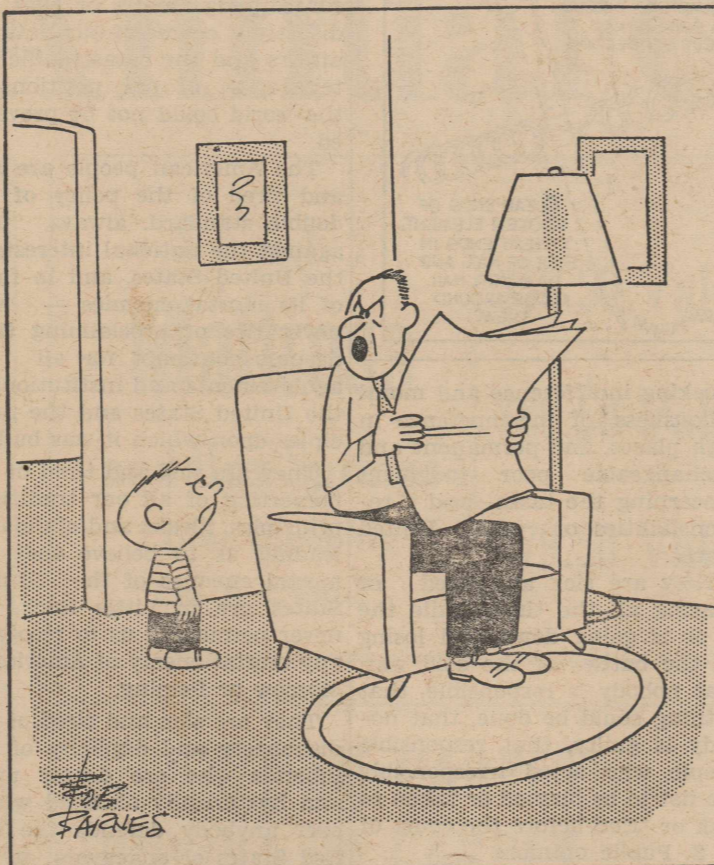
The baking quality test more nearly reflects the true value of hard wheats for making flour for commercial bread baking under modern circumstances. The test result reflects both the protein content of wheat and the quality of its gluten and is an index of bread baking "strength."

The premium schedule announced September 19 will apply to 1962-crop hard red spring, hard red winter, and hard white wheats put under the 1962 price-support program either through loans or purchase agreements. To obtain the premium for quality in the case of warehouse-stored wheat, the warehouse receipt must show the quality in terms of the baking quality test. Facilities for providing such tests are being expanded to meet anticipated needs. In the case of 1962-crop farm-stored wheat put under price support, plans are under way to assure that every lot can be tested.

Department officials stated that the premium schedule will be kept under review during next year's support operation toward the end of modifications and improvements. In gaining, the objective of providing an incentive for better quality wheat production, consideration will be given to developing discounts which will be included along with premiums in the price support schedule for subsequent years.

While producers have no sure way to guarantee the level of

wheat quality, there are wheat varieties and certain cultural practices which when used will greatly increase the probability of better quality. Information on these factors can be obtained locally by most producers from County Extension Agents. The purpose of the quality premium in the support operation is to provide more of a price incentive to encourage producers to take the steps needed to help improve wheat quality.

The schedule for the 1962 crop provides for premiums on hard wheats with baking quality values of 40 or above on the quality scale. Wheats with a value of 40 or higher are preferred for commercial bread baking. Hard wheats with no test or testing below 40 will be supported at the basic loan rate for the county under the 1962 program. For the higher quality wheats, premiums as indicated in the following schedule will be added to the basic county loan rate to determine the support price for these lots:

Baking qualities and premiums per bushel are: 40-44, 3 cents; 45-49, 6 cents; 50-54, 10 cents; 55-59, 14 cents; 60-64, 19 cents; and 65 and over, 24 cents.

Under the 1961 and previous price-support programs, premiums for protein content from 11 to 17 per cent ranged from 1 to 12 cents per bushel, with additional premiums for content over 17 per cent.

S. to its grave for Nikita Krushchev.

But it is later than they think. The era of silence for the American people is over. The American people are not feeble-minded; they are not a bunch of minors who need Liberal guidance and one-world nurses to do everything for them. The American people are mature enough to take their affairs in

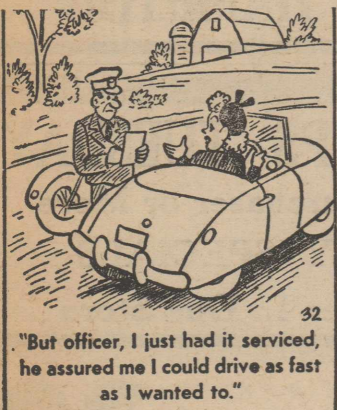

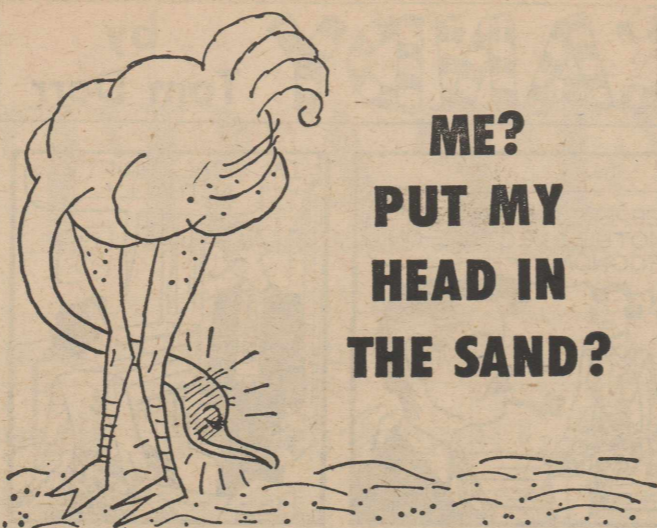

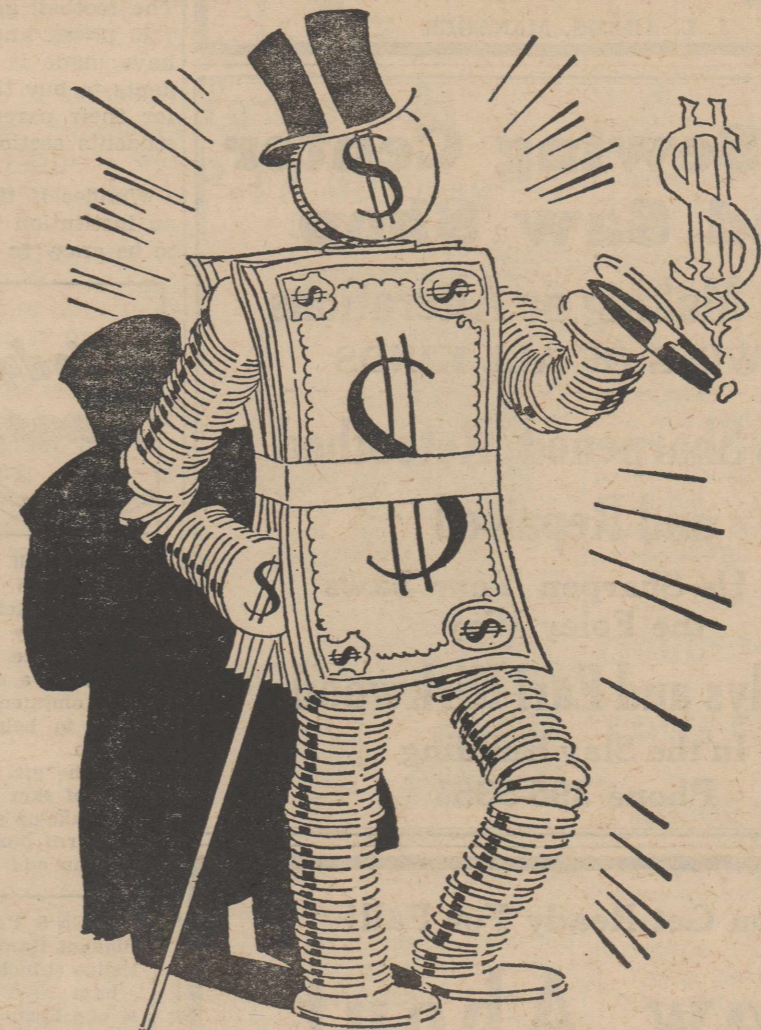

### WT Parents Day Saturday

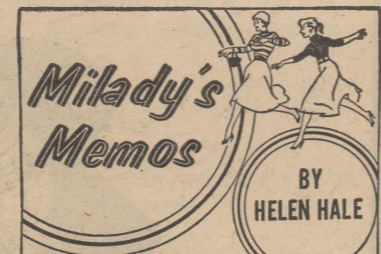
