

Scout Hut Building Committee Sets \$2977 As Building Fund Goal

The cost of erecting a permanent boy scout hut in Stratford was set at \$2,977.00 for a turn-key job at a recent meeting of the Boy Scout Building Finance Committee.

The tile structure building, would have a composition shingle roof, and be erected on the 15x40 concrete slab which the scouts have on the building site. The construction cost figure includes the laying of gas and water lines to the building.

The committee believes that the erection of such a building is justified by the interest taken by the boys in scout work. At present there are 35 boys enrolled in scouting and it is believed that the group will increase to 50 or 55 by December.

Wayne Cummings is the newly appointed scoutmaster. He will be assisted by Bob Garoutte, assistant scoutmaster, and Ted Reynolds, junior assistant scoutmaster.

The boy scout troop is sponsored by the Stratford Volunteer Fire Department. Ted Reynolds is the institutional representative.

W. O. Parvin is serving as the chairman of the building committee. Other members of the committee are: D. W. Roberson, Bill Riffe, J. B. Wilson, V. O. Lasley, Max Stephenson and Jim Close.

November 15 has been set as the deadline for raising the building fund. Jim Taylor will head the drive for financial contributions. Ted Reynolds will accept contributions in materials.

The permanent scout hut will be built on property provided by the city. In the event scouting should become dormant, then the building would revert to the city as a community building.

The new scout hut will be available for the use of the public when it is not being used by the scouts, it was announced this week by a spokesman for the boy scout troop.

Pathologist To Survey Wheat Disease

The movie and narration in the county exhibit building will follow the reunion of the group in the Wohlford home.

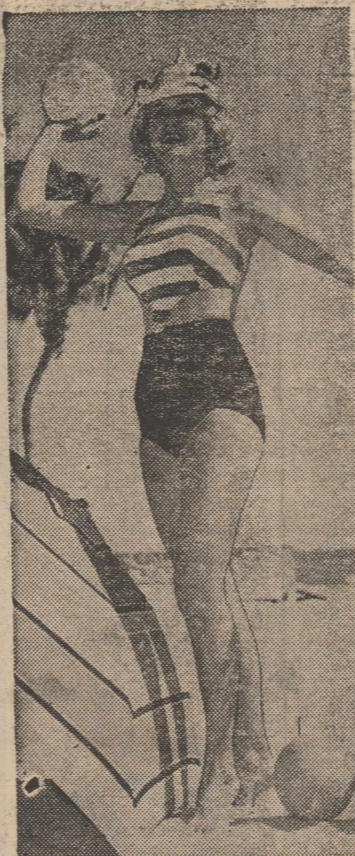
Band To Enter Marching Contest October 24

Orland Lasley Fractures Hip Roping Steer

Orland Lasley fractured his left hip about 9:00 o'clock Sunday morning when he roped a steer, pulled the rope behind himself and leaned back as a snubbing post. Lasley was thrown to the ground when the weight of the steer tightened the rope. Lasley was able to get up on his feet, but fell again almost instantly, according to Jim Tiner, who was working with him at the Lasley ranch at the time of the accident.

Man accomplishes his best work under an annual average temperature of 62 to 68 degrees, if the climate is not too monotonous and there is some change between seasons.

The acreage indicated on the allotment notice sent to producers before the August marketing quota referendum is the 1962 wheat acreage allotment for all purposes, R. C. Buckles, chairman of the Sherman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers.

This allotment figure reflects the 10-per cent minimum diversion to soil-conserving uses as required by law to participate in the 1962 wheat stabilization program, the chairman explained. It is also the figure to be used in determining whether or not there will be a marketing quota "excess" on the farm. If the wheat acreage on the farm exceeds this allotment, or "permitted acreage" in the case of small farms, the excess 1962 production from the farm will be subject to marketing quota penalties.

Mr. Buckles said that there has been some confusion among producers about the wheat acreage allotment, but there is only one allotment figure for each farm under the 1962 wheat program. This allotment figure, which represents a 10-per cent reduction below what the allotment would have been under previous legislation, applies under all phases of the program, marketing quotas, price support, and stabilization payments.

Producers who do not comply with their 1962 allotments will be subject to marketing quota penalties on their "excess" production. Under recent legislation, marketing quota penalties on the 1962 crop were increased to 65 per cent (instead of the former 45 per cent) of the wheat parity prices as of May 1, 1962.

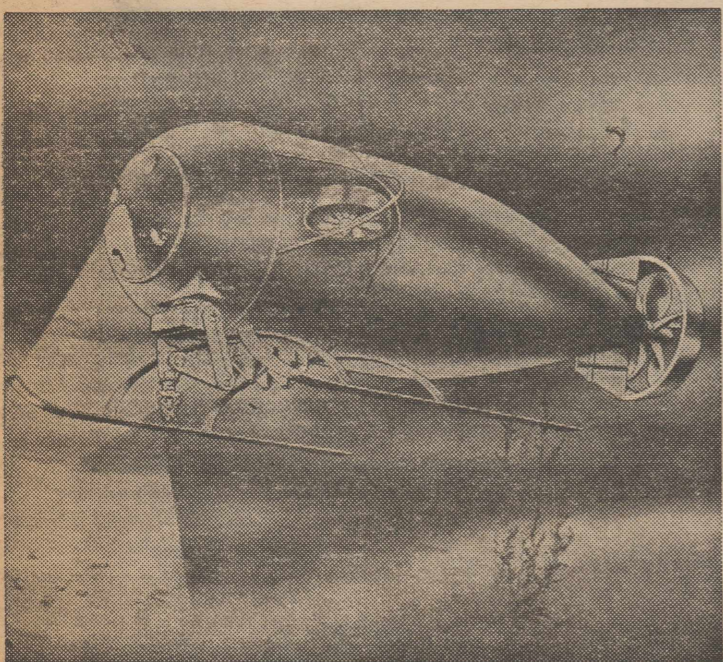

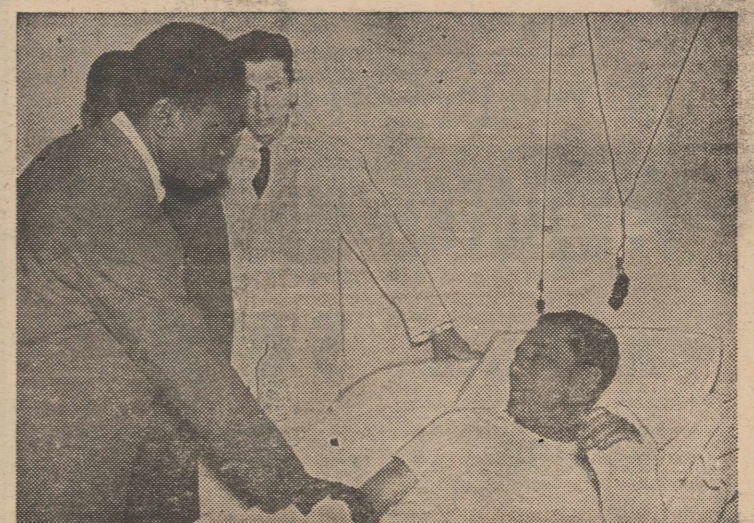

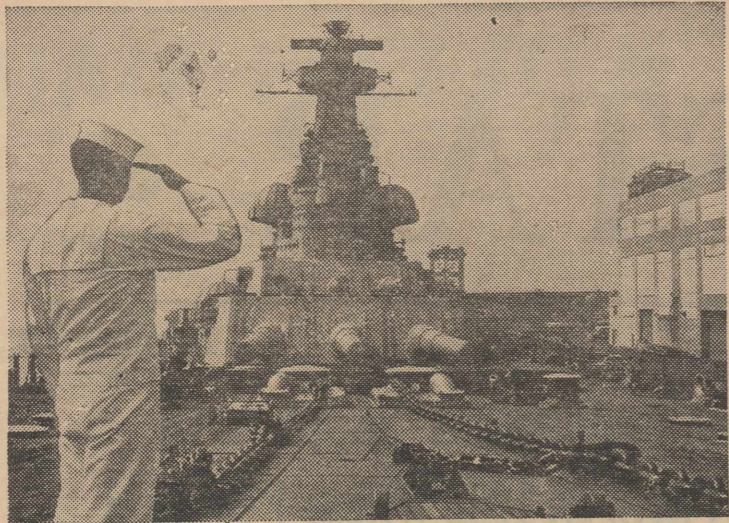

Crucial By-Election Is Nearing

San Antonio, Texas is agog on the eve of a congressional by-election, to be held November 4, in which a conservative Republican candidate is rated as a possible victor over a pro-socialist democrat. The latter is left-wing State Senator Henry B. Gonzalez, Texas Democratic wheelhorse, who is also a National Director of the Americans for Democratic Action, the Fabian Socialist organization which has captured key posts in the Kennedy Administration. Gonzalez enjoys generous financial and organizational support from the ADA, as well as from the AFL-CIO and its shock

troops — the well-heeled Committee on Political Education. The Republican candidate is John W. Goode Jr. A militant conservative, he is upholding the policies of Republican John G. Tower, who won the sensational Texas senatorial by-election against heavy Democratic odds last May. Should Goode defeat Gonzalez, his victory would assume great national significance as an indication of a developing national revolt against the policies of the Kennedy Administration. The San Antonio press, unfriendly to Goode, nevertheless concedes that his chances of success are "fifty-fifty." The GOP candidate is fighting hard but is described as "desperately" in need of funds. 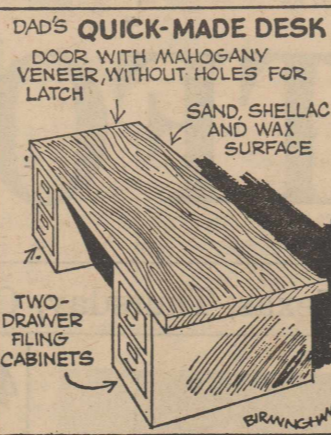

Roll them in a bit of olive oil and serve with tiny carrot sticks. Say "good morning" with cheery canned peaches, filled with strawberry jam or currant jelly and broiled. These are wonderful with or without cream.

HELEN'S FAVORITE:
Nut Bread (Makes 1 loaf)
¾ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
4 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup nutmeats, chopped fine
1 egg, beaten
1 cup sweet milk
2 tablespoons vegetable or salad oil
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add nuts. Beat egg, add milk and mix. Add to dry ingredients and stir well. Blend in oil. Turn into a greased bread tin (5 x 3 x 8 inches. Bake about 45 minutes or until done in a slow (300°F.) oven.

Fix this dessert in a hurry: heat a one pound can of pears with a cinnamon stick, a dash of nutmeg and lemon juice to taste. Remove cinnamon stick and serve warm. Apricot whole fruit halves and tiny marshmallows molded with lemon-flavored gelatin and fruit cocktail make a nice dessert. If dinner vegetables leave you in a quandry, heat a can of green beans in their own liquid, drain and top with soured cream, salt, a pinch of sugar and curry powder.

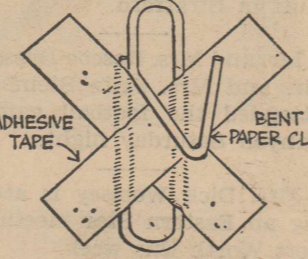

Easier Housekeeping

Glazed Squash
(Serves 6)
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
2 cups mashed squash
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup pineapple juice
Spread 1/2 of brown sugar over bottom of greased 1-quart casserole. Spread squash over sugar. Dot with butter. Mix remaining ingredients, pour over top of squash. Bake in a moderately hot (375°F) oven for 50 minutes.

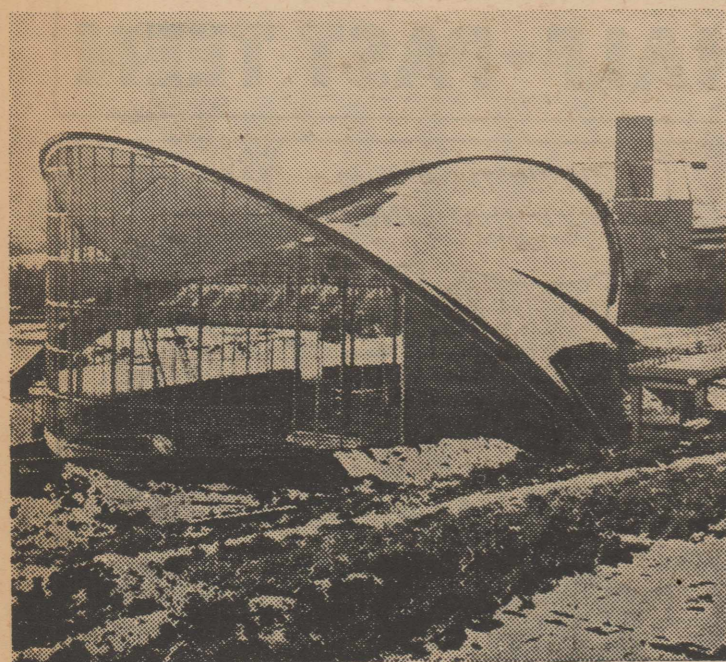

County SC District Educational Meetings To Start In November

The Sherman County Soil Conservation District Committee which has been circulating petitions for a district in Sherman County met Tuesday in Stratford. The committee reviewed the petitions and made plans for educational meetings which will start in November. The required 50 signatures on the petitions have not been secured to call an election for a soil conservation district.

A group of local farm leaders met with the Soil Conservation District Committee and asked them to show the cause for the need in Sherman County of a proposed soil conservation district. These individual citizens questioned the committee on the advisability and need for a soil conservation district in addition to the present government programs and technical assistance available to farmers in the county. The citizens apparently felt like a soil conservation district would duplicate programs already available to farmers in the county for the purpose of doing soil conservation work. These citizens were particular-

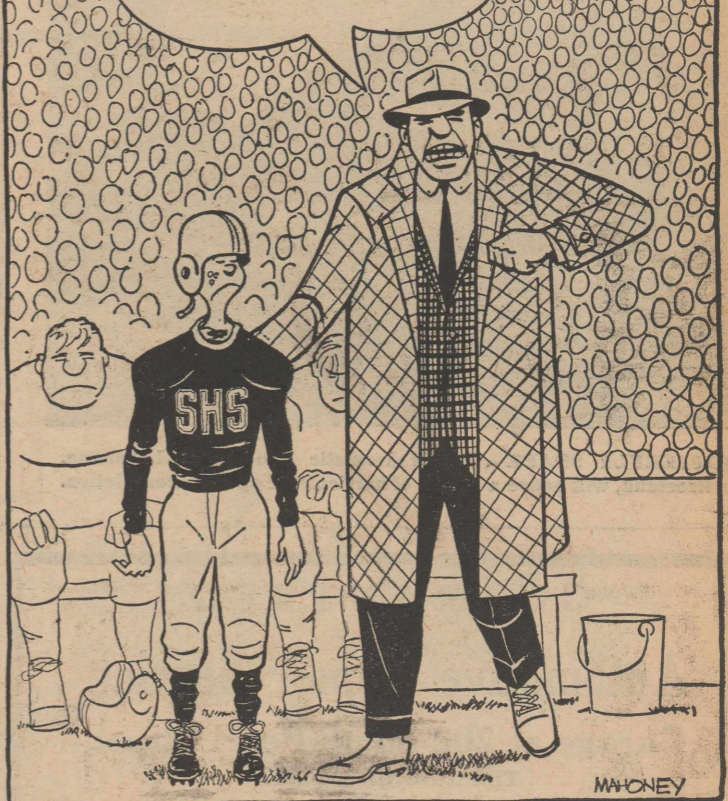
ly critical toward any need for three additional government farm technicians, which would be available locally through a soil conservation district. The citizens asked the Soil Conservation District Committee how they could justify three additional government technicians in Sherman County where Soil Conservation technicians were already available to farmers locally through the County ASC program and Great Plains Conservation program, which are in addition to the Extension Service.

The SCD Committee explained that with more technical assistance available locally through the SCD, farmers would be encouraged to do more conservation work in the county.

Shrimp-Cheese Fondue (Serves 4)
1 slice bread, halved and buttered
1/4 pound grated cheese
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1 cup cleaned, cut-up shrimp
2 eggs, well beaten
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Place bread in shallow oblong baking dish. Scatter shrimp over all of bread, then sprinkle cheese over all, along with mustard. Mix egg, milk, salt and pepper. Pour over bread. Bake 30 minutes in a preheated moderate (350°F.) oven, until puffy and brown.

Whip together a "shake" for hungry youngsters with milk, ice cream, canned peaches and sliced banana. An electric mixer or blender may be used to make quick work of this.
An easy frosting for a plain cake uses melted chocolate which is allowed to run in "drips" over the cake down the sides. Sprinkle with silvered, toasted almonds.

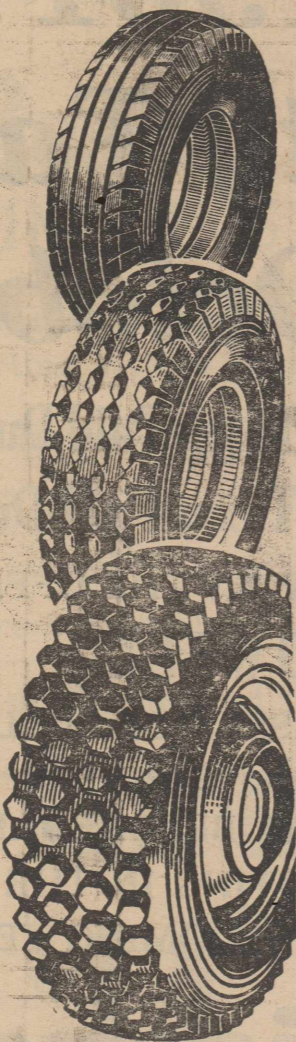
