

It should be generally known that the formation of a soil conservation district for Sherman County is under consideration, states Bill Brooks, local SCS technician. This organization must be approved by at least a two-third majority of landowners of agricultural land in the county who vote. It is expected that a notice of an election will be posted later this winter. The purpose of the organization is to provide more assistance to all farmers and ranchers (whether or not they are landowners) in solving their conservation problems.



There are now 182 such organizations in Texas covering about 98 percent of the total land area. "HE current plight of the duck population is well known to any nimrod who enjoys an icy morning in a boat or blind. Ducks are in trouble, and the hunter who wants some birds for tomorrow will have to take fewer this year and hope that things will look brighter after the next nesting season.

Ducks are hardy, remarkable birds and, given a little help, will always be around to provide what many hunters consider the finest wing shooting of all.

The hardiest duck of all-the mallard-is also the most numerous. The mallard is highly adaptable and much of the eastern and western hemispheres are included in his range.

The mallard may nest as far north as the Arctic Circle, or as far south as Northern Mexico and is found in many states the yearround

Believed to be the ancestor of almost all varieties of domestic duck, the mallard quickly adapts to his environment. His menu depends upon the locality in which he lives and includes a great variety of plants, insects and fresh water mollusks-particularly snails and water bugs.

Baby mallards, of course, are born swimmers. Mother mallard watches her brood carefully, and at the first sight or sound of danger quacks a warning that sends the baby ducks under water. Baby mallards may stay under water, apparently without effort, for as long as two minutes. Quite often, while they are submerged, mother mallard puts on a convincing "broken wing" act which captures the attention of any predator.

Skimming across the top of the water, mother will entice the predator to give hopeless chase, while the baby ducks seek a safe hiding place.



Fire Fighters Hope To Remodel **Old Fire Truck**

Stratford Volunteer Fire Fighters are dreaming of remodeling the old 1944 City fire truck, and converting it into a modern fire fighting piece of machinery which can be used in an emergency to fight fires within the city limits. The old truck is kept in running order and is kept in the city hall as a standby truck when the other two trucks are out on a call.

Remodeling of the old truck would require a cash expense of approximately \$1,500.00. A new motor would have to be purchased along with a 500 gallon, water tank, and a new water pump. Fire department boys would do most of the remodeling work although some hired labor would be required.

The new unit would involve an investment risk of \$3,000 to \$4,000 as compared to the much more expensive trucks which are used for this purpose at the present time.


