In November, "Colonization" was the theme and the board depicted early settlers, Indians and Pilgrims. November 20, the first Thanksgiving was illustrated by Mr. Crusoe, elementary art teacher, with a large drawing of the Indians and Pilgrims banqueting together during Thanksgiving.

During the present six weeks, the theme is "The Founding of a Nation" which features the Founding Fathers and the Revolutionary War. November 27, pictures of Benjamin Franklin, first American, were displayed. December 4, pictures of John Adams, founding father, were chosen to be used. The latter part of the six weeks will be used for presenting Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of Independence, George Washington, Writers of the Revolutionary War, such as Thomas Paine, Patrick Henry and Philip Freneau. Copies of famous documents will be shown.

The second semester, plans have been made to feature the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln and various other men and women of American heritage, the Westward movement, World War I, World War II, Texas Heritage, Sherman County Heritage, and the last weeks of school will feature "Today-World of Progress".

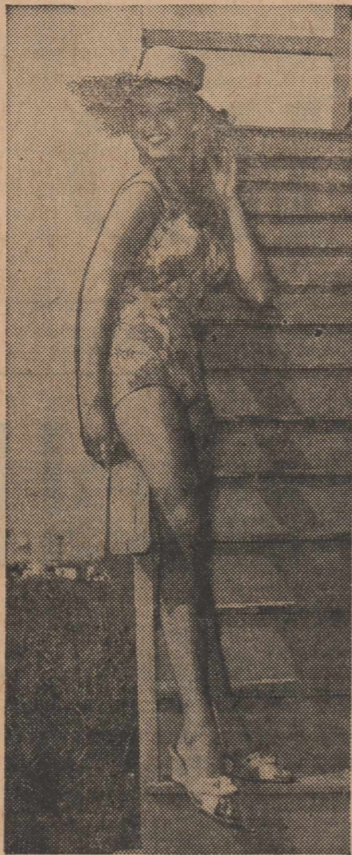
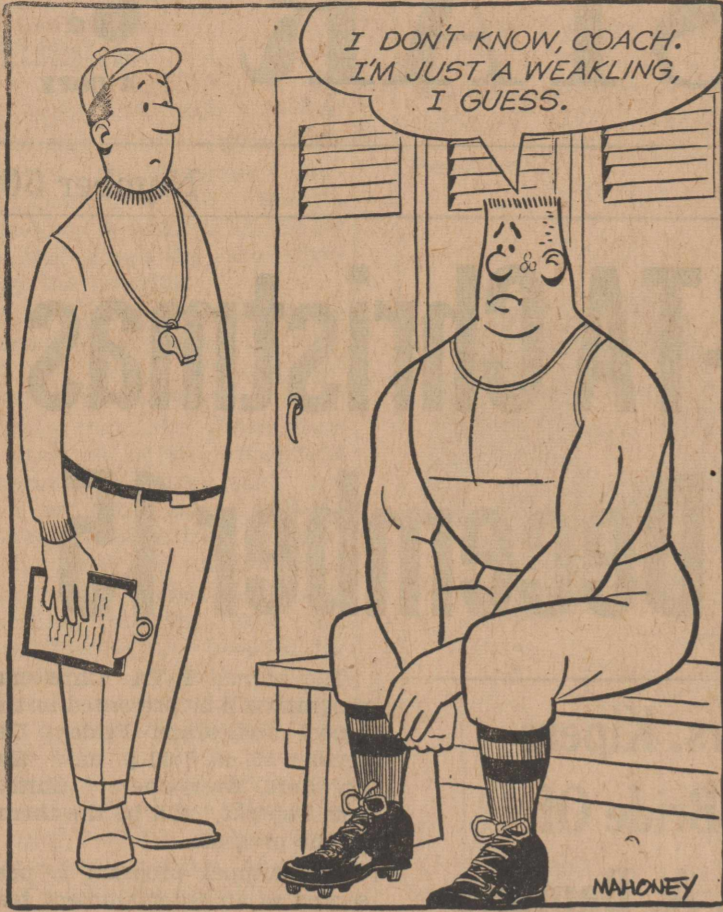

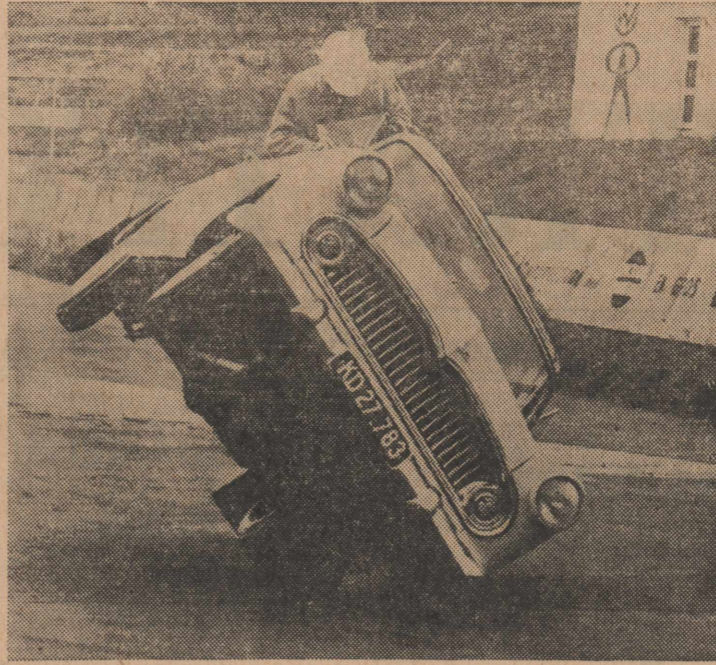

## Highlights And Sidelights From Your State Capital

(By Vern Sanford)  
AUSTIN — More than 600 "Texans for Tourists" attended Gov. Price Daniel's conference on tourism.

They took a long look at



sources and resources that can be used to promote national advertising of the state's visitable virtues.

While here, they decided to set up a non-profit organization called the Texas Tourist Council. Tentatively scheduled was an organizational meeting for January 10, "or during the next session of the Legislature."

Texas Tourist Council will seek the reverse effect of another group who tried to exploit the state — the carpet-baggers. It was the influence of the latter that caused the Legislature to prohibit the use of state funds for advertising Texas' attractions 86 years ago.

Governor Daniel said, "Now

the march of time has come full circle — we find ourselves engaged in a vigorous economic competition which might be called, in a friendly way, another "war between the states".

He referred to the battle for tourists — third largest industry in the nation; the 13th in Texas.

Texas Tourist Council will seek \$300,000 a year from the Legislature, for advertising tourist attractions. Texas law now requires that state funds be matched by business and industry. So some system of financial subscription will have to be devised.

### Bankers Asked For Ideas

Governor Daniel sent a letter to the Texas Bankers Association asking the bankers to present a proposal for protecting the rights of bank depositors.

He recommended that newspaper ads be published by the banks to locate owners (or heirs) of accounts inactive for more than seven years.

Governor Daniel added that proper notice to the state of an escheatable property would be "an incidental result of this protection."

He said the subject will be submitted very soon to a special session of the Legislature and asked the TBA to present its own proposal before December 20.

"The reason for the urgency is the known fact that a sizeable number of national banks are transferring these dormant deposits to the profits of the banks without advertising for lost owners," he wrote.

"I believe most Texas bankers will agree that this is a practice which should be stopped for the protection of the good name of the banking profession in Texas, as well as for the protection of the rights of missing owners and the rights of the State if no owners exist."

### Wilson Announces

Attorney General Will Wilson has announced as a candidate for governor.

The 49-year old Dallas native said he has remained loyal to his party, but is "an independent Democrat who wears no man's collar and is not a captive candidate of any faction or interest group."

### Shivers In The News

There's considerable talk in Austin about the possibility of former Gov. Allan Shivers running again.

This surprised some since Shivers backed Jack Cox in 1960 and Cox is the Republican candidate.

Rumor started with Shivers' statement that: "If I get involved in politics at all next year it will be as a candidate."

### Health And Welfare

Speaker James A. Turman announced appointment of an advisory committee, composed of Representatives George Richardson of Fort Worth, Obie Jones of Austin and Jim Markgraf of Scurry, to help the Texas Legislative Council study coordination of state health and welfare agencies.

Study was requested by the 57th Legislature in view of the fact that 90 per cent of every state dollar expended is for highways, education, public health and welfare.

All but the health and welfare agencies are centrally coordinated.

### Textbook Study

Five representatives have been appointed to an interim committee to study contents of textbooks used in public schools. Particular attention will be paid to those relating to American heritage, traditions, philosophy and history.

Representatives W. T. Dungan of McKinney, Bob Bass of DeKalb, John C. Alaniz of San Antonio, Nelson Cowles of Hallsboro and Ronald E. Roberts of Hillsboro are to report their findings to the 58th Legislature.

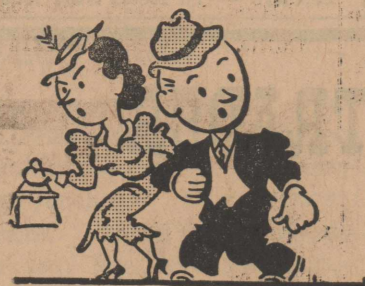

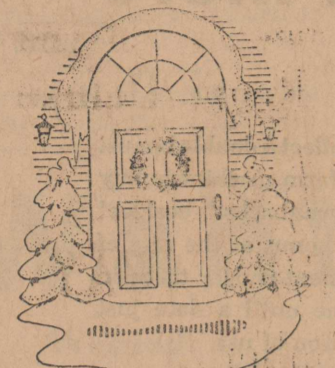

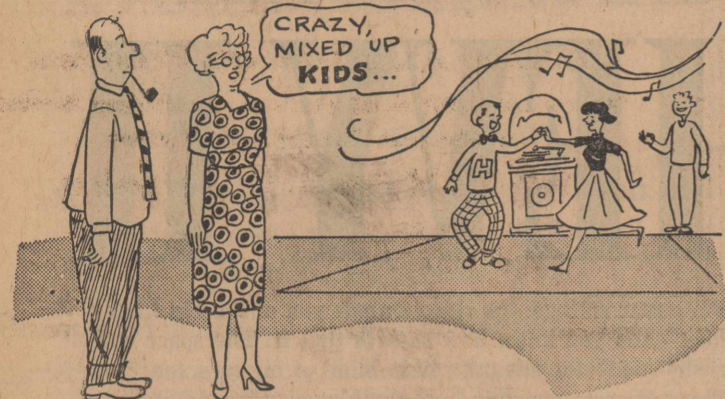

### An Adult Looks At Today's Youth

By C. D. Smith



**AUTHOR'S NOTE:** Recently, this column discussed some of the reasons parents have when they say, "no" to their children's wishes regarding dates, parties, dances, etc. Several letters brought comments on the article. They are evidence that many good people, both adults and teenagers, realize that love and guidance are important in preparing a youngster for a full, useful and happy life. The following thought-provoking comments were received from a Dr. Einar, in California, who says he

"keeps young" working with youth and children.

**THE WEEK'S LETTER:** "Dad" means the world to both my youngsters now—the most congenial pair you'd want to meet—and I have NOT trained 'em that way, either. They "just grew up" (but it was the basic training "at the cradle" that counts). Also, the religious aspect. Train a child in Christianity for the first 6 years of life and he will not go far wrong!

"Adolescence is an awkward, problematical and contradictory

stage of life. The teenager lives in a kingdom all his own. His language is jive, his philosophers are disc jockeys and the lawgivers are rock'n roll song writers. The youth of today are very little different from the young people of yesterday. We laugh at their songs but forget that we sang crazy ditties in our time, too. None of us escaped the zany age when we were described as "crazy, mixed-up kids."

"One problem that faces our young people today is insecurity. Psychologists tell us 60 per cent of American teenagers today are going steady. They did not do so 20 or 40 years ago, but they do NOW—because they yearn for security. They live in an insecure world, and do not need judgment passed upon them or scathing fingers of condemnation pointed at them. They need LOVING GUIDANCE!"

"We should remember that during these "changing" formative years, patterns of behavior are being grooved, and decisions that affect later years are being made. presentative about payment possibilities.

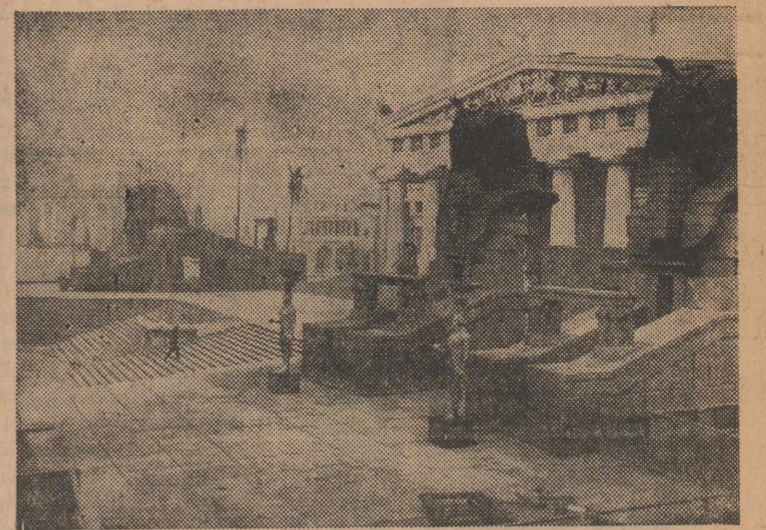
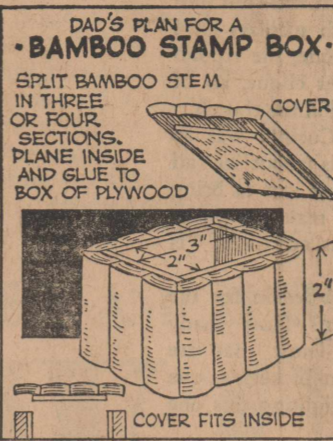

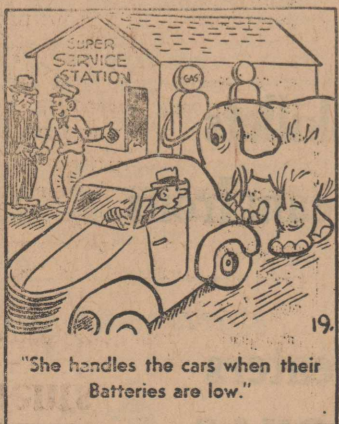

**MEDITORIAL:** Today let's talk about appetite, weight loss and weight gain. There are many centers in our body, some known and some unknown, which influence our appetites. The dictionary defines appetite as a natural longing or desire for food. Why some persons say they never have an appetite and are never anxious to eat is not clearly understood. Most people, though, are ravenously hungry most of the time. All we have to do is look around us a little bit and we can find all the proof of this we need.

Recently, a group of researchers have discovered what might be a hormone, secreted by the stomach, that stimulates the appetite. The possibilities with such an "appetite stimulator" would be tremendous. First those patients who have had part or most of their stomach removed and have had difficulty with poor appetite could be given such a hormone. Also, and even more important, if an "anti-appetite stimulator" could then be produced, we might have the perfect medicine for the obese.

To leave this train of thought, what does a sudden increase or decrease in appetite mean? The latter in the older middle-aged or elderly could represent several reasons—a small stroke, a stomach ulcer or tumor, an anemia or other chronic illnesses. The symptom of filling up too soon or not being able to eat as much as before could be caused by a stomach tumor. Sometimes a decrease in appetite along with a failure to lose weight (or even with a gain) could represent a low thyroid condition (hypothyroidism).

An increase in appetite with more food being consumed can also be significant, especially if there is no gain, or even a loss, in weight. This could represent diabetes or an overactive thyroid (hyperthyroidism).
