


Many inquiries concerning the show have been coming in from a wide area, reports Brooks Middleton, in charge of contestants entries.



As a consequence, the arbitrary position originally taken by three members of the School Board has the net effect of overriding the expressed judgment of a majority of the citizens in the community.

Houseflies Aid **Cancer** Research

The housefly, perennial villian i man's fight against disease, is now being useful in this fight by helping speed up tests of anti-can-

cer compounds-drugs that may someday prove effective in controlling cancer in human beings. They are being used in these tests because of the speed and ease with which they may be reared, according to report from the U. S. Department of Agricul-ture. comparatively little space, time, effort and expense, a supply of 1,000 to 2,000 flies can be reared daily for laboratory use. They complete their whole life cycle in a little more than two weeks, yet they are physiologically similar to higher animals in

many characteristics. This com-bination makes them useful for quick testing of growth-inhibiting, or anti-cancer, drugs. By contrast, mice and rats nor-mally used for testing growth-in-bibility materials take the methods. hibiting materials take two months of effort in breeding and rearing to mature. There is also additional waiting for the slower results which follow. Flies fed milk containing a material to be tested can be dissected and results ob-served after only three days; ro-dents take much longer. The work with flies was origi-

nated by the Department of Agri-culture in finding a chemical that would cause sterility in insects. This could serve as a means of cutting their numbers and keeping them under control, thus furnishing an alternative to the use of poisonous insecticides which nearly always involves some dan-ger to human being, and to which insects have a tendency to build immunity.
