Excess Wheat May Be Grazed Until May 1

Excess wheat may be pastured until May 1, when it must be destroyed, it was announced this week by Vernon Bullard, manager of the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service office.

Wheat land is being measured for compliance with the allotment program at the present time. Bullard asks the co-operation of producers in working with the men measuring the acreages, in designating their diverted acres.

Deep Water Depletion In Court Test

Wednesday the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District sponsored the trial of the lawsuit of Marvin Shurbet, a Floyd County farmer, against the U. S. Internal Revenue Service. The trial is being held in the U. S. District Court at Lubbock with Judge Joseph B. Dooley presiding.

Shurbet's case is being treated as a test case by the Internal Revenue Service.

Testimony by witnesses for plaintiff, Marvin Shurbet, will attempt to show that ground water in the southern High Plains of Texas is a natural deposit and that it is being exhausted by pump extraction.

Plaintiff will further contend that landowners who can establish an actual initial cost in the ground water beneath their land, as distinguished from the cost of the land itself, and who are using that water to produce income, are entitled to deduct this cost of water on their federal income tax returns as the water is exhausted.

The High Plains Water District has worked for seven years in an effort to establish ground water in the southern High Plains as a depletable natural resource under the federal tax laws. If the court finds that the plaintiff's contentions are valid and justified under the law then all-water-users in the area with a like set of circumstances should be eligible to deduct, on their income tax returns, the cost of the ground water as it is used.

County March Of Dimes Drive Opened Tuesday

The New March of Dimes opened its 1962 campaign here Tuesday to raise funds for a stepped-up battle against diseases that disable millions of Americans.

The announcement was made by William Glenn Hart, Sherman County campaign director. He said the drive will continue through January 31. Bill Cummings is assisting Hart in directing the drive. Dale Knight will supervise the March of Dimes Trap Shoot and C. C. Plunk will arrange for the March of Dimes basketball game to be played during the drive. A comic basketball game has been substituted for the mothers march which was formerly held in the county during the drive.

In an appeal to county residents, the campaign director said that contributions to the drive were needed by the National Foundation to finance widening attacks on crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio.

"Our ultimate goal is to prevent these crippling diseases, and accelerated research program financed by the National Foundation is our brightest hope," he said. "But we are broadening our program to patient aid at the same time. Pain cannot wait."

The director explained that establishment of chapter-sponsored special treatment centers and evaluation clinics had been speeded up during the past year. "These centers provide improved medical services in treating patients not receiving adequate attention from other sources. In addition, National Foundation chapters with sufficient funds have been authorized to aid victims of all types of birth defects where such help is needed.

"The need for these programs, in addition to the continuing aid we furnish victims of paralytic polio, can be seen from the huge numbers of people with disabilities caused by birth defects and arthritis," he continued. "More than 11,000,000 Americans suffer from arthritis or rheumatic diseases. As our medical advisors tell us, in the vast majority of arthritic patients, disability can be prevented or reduced through early diagnosis and early total treatment.

"More than 250,000 American children are born each year with a significant birth defect that may cause lifelong disability. Many congenital defects go unrecognized in children but cause problems in later life.

"Treating this enormous disease problem takes money. We volunteers in the New March of Dimes are proud of the record of our communities in the past in supporting the fight against polio that led to the polio vaccines. Now, in the larger battle, we say 'Your Dimes Will Do It Again.'"

During the fiscal year 2,720 disabled Texans became employable as the result of services provided by the Vocational Rehabilitation Division. Their increase in purchasing power was estimated to be in excess of \$4,500,000 a year.

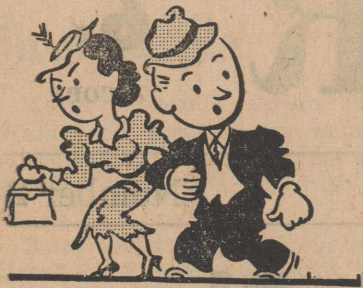
Keener's announcement make it possible for citizens who may desire the office to make their decisions and announce their candidacy before the filing deadline on Monday, February 5.

Woe to thee, O land, when thy king is a child, and thy princes eat in the morning! Ecclesiastes 10:16

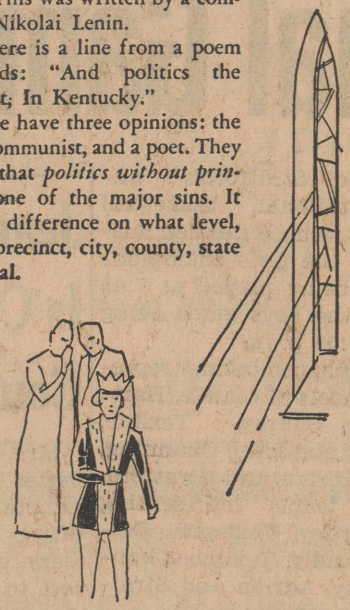


This famous quotation from the Bible tells a story by itself: there is no peace in politics because of treachery.

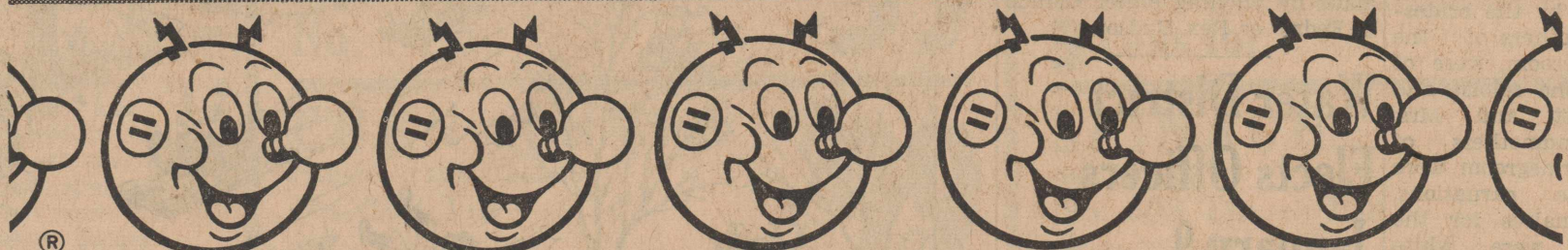

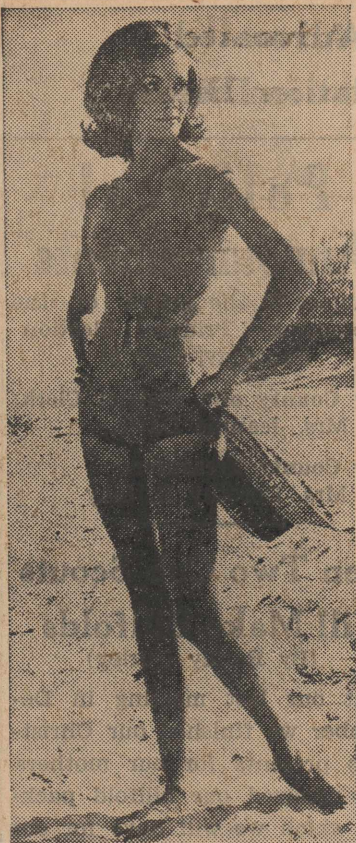

Diaper Test In Home Is Advocated To Detect Mental Retardation Disease

A Texas plan to detect phenylketonuria, a metabolic disease in newborn infants which can cause mental retardation, has been proposed by a Houston pediatrician.

Dr. John K. Glen, writing in the December issue of the Texas State Journal of Medicine, suggested a voluntary plan, with do-it-yourself kits to be provided mothers of newborn babies to take home from the hospital.

Under the plan, Dr. Glen writes, the doctor requests the mother to perform urine tests on her infant at three and six weeks of age. The mother is given a packet of test materials by the hospital at the doctor's request.

The test is simple. When the baby is three weeks old, the mother tests the paper from the infant's urine on the diaper. If the paper color changes to blue-gray, the mother is advised to have her doctor give the baby further tests. If there is no color change, the mother repeats the test at six weeks. Then if there is color change, the mother is advised to see her doctor.

The plan provides the broadest possible early screening for the disease, Dr. Glen stated. Although PKU is rare, occurring only once in 20,000 births, early detection is necessary for early treatment. Testing has indicated that 200 to 400 babies with PKU are born each year and that the disease is responsible for at least one per cent of the 200,000 mentally retarded now in institutions. Treatment by special diet should be instituted as early as possible to prevent failure of normal brain development — preferably before the infant is one month old. Untreated, such children usually are severely retarded by the time they are seven years old.

The Texas plan is part of the educational program launched by the Texas Medical Association for physicians to encourage detection of the disease in newborn infants.

Such educational programs have been highly successful in other states. In California, Missouri, Washington, and New York City, all babies brought to maternal and child health clinics were screened for the disease with the simple "diaper" test. Private hospitals in Akron and Cincinnati, Ohio, spearheaded the "do-it-your-

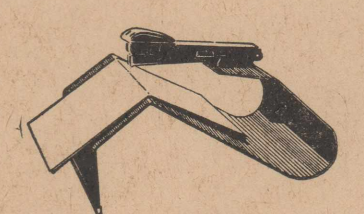

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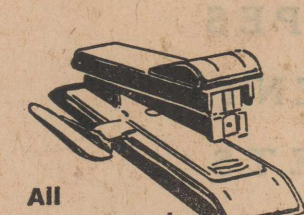
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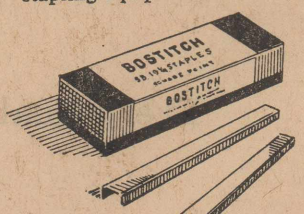

General Walker Will Speak Friday In Amarillo

Major General Edwin A. Walker will speak in the Municipal Auditorium of Amarillo on Friday, January 5, at 8:00 p. m.

Since General Walker was relieved, by President Kennedy, of his command of the 24th Infantry Division in Western Germany last April 18, he has been one of the most discussed men in America.

Following the announcement on June 12, 1961 by the Secretary of the Army that General Walker had been admonished "for taking injudicious actions and for making derogatory public statements about prominent Americans," a wave of indignation arose across the country, resulting in the scheduling of a congressional investigation of this "muzzling of the military," led by Senator Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, a member of the Senate Committee on Armed Services.

On November 2, General Walker made a formal statement to the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee, announcing his intention to resign from the Army, in which he said, in part: "By God's grace, by action of the Congress, and by appointment to the US Military Academy, it has been my privilege to be a commissioned officer in the United States Army for the

past 30 years. My life, my service, my dedication to my troops, their purpose, their hopes, are a matter of record. I hope that the origin and depth of my motivation and intent are discernible and clear.

"I have been removed from command of the 24th Division. My career has been destroyed in its usefulness to my country. I cannot accept retirement with its emoluments and benefits. To do so would be a compromise with my principle.

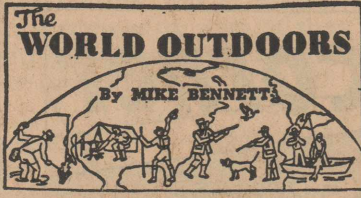
"I take leave of military duty with a heavy heart. I must find other means of serving my country in the time of her great need, in order to pursue the dedication of a lifetime.

"To do this, I must be free from the power of little men who, in the name of my country, punish loyal service to it—

"We are at war. We are infiltrated. We are losing the war every day. Are our hands tied, yours and mine?" We need a substitute for defeat. If it is not within the power of this Congress to provide it—then the people of these United States are not truly represented."

General Walker made his first speech as a civilian in Dallas on December 12 to a cheering crowd of 5600. Since that date he has spoken in Jackson, Mississippi, to a full auditorium of 3600. His address in Amarillo, for which there will be no admission charge, will be the first of others he will make over the country.

EARLY Americans, pushing their covered wagons across the vast expanse of seemingly endless valleys and mountains, surely had the idea that there always would be more land available than their descendants could ever require.

They could not anticipate, of course, the flood of immigration and the tremendous increase in native population that would combine over the years with the development of modern transportation to bring about the "small world" of 1962.

It is, indeed, a small world. And this great nation of ours with its thousands and thousands of miles of green valleys and high mountains, arid deserts and lush green forests, is getting more crowded all the time.

President Kennedy, in his natural resources message, called for "inventory and evaluation of the nation's public domain holdings to serve as a foundation for improved resources management."

There have been recent administrative decisions designed to strengthen the Bureau of Land Management, which is charged with the responsibility of supervising public lands. Conservationists have applauded these decisions, because they feel the BLM must be in a position to do something about trespass and illegal use of public lands.

An Interior Department spokesman has estimated there are at least 10,000 cases of trespass and illegal use of BLM lands in the West. He also believes that unauthorized cutting of federal timber is going on in several hundred areas. Land locators sell meaningless quit claim deeds to public lands for use as homesites, camps, and business locations.

But, the needs of tomorrow demand that we achieve effective management today.

1962 Sugar Beet Acreage To Be Unrestricted

The United States Department of Agriculture announced this week that there will be no governmental acreage restrictions on the 1962 crop of sugar beets.

The decision was based on a number of considerations, notably the following:

1. Latest estimates indicate that sugar production from the 1961 sugar beet crop will be about 2,525,000 tons, or approximately 200,000 tons less than anticipated at the beginning of harvest.

2. The inventory of beet sugar at the end of 1961 will be close to 100,000 tons less than at the beginning of the year.

3. There are major uncertainties regarding the beet sugar quota which may be effective for 1963, the year which most of

Texas leads all states in Vocational Agriculture enrollment, is second in Distributive Education, is second in Homemaking Education, and ranks third in Vocational Industrial Education.

the 1962-crop of beet sugar will be marketed.

4. In view of these uncertainties and other considerations, the maintenance of sizeable stocks of beet sugar appears prudent.

5. Available processing capacities of beet sugar factories limit production within reasonable bounds.

Although the present Sugar

Act expires June 30, 1962, it is understood that preferred consideration will be given to sugar legislation when the Congress convenes in January.

Acreages of the 1961 crop of sugar beets (estimated at 1,120,000 planted acres) were also unrestricted. However, acreages of the preceding six crops were restricted.

Ordinance No. 152 Regulating Speed Of Trains

An Ordinance
Entitled an ordinance regulating the speed of electric, gasoline motor and steam locomotives or trains within the City limits of the City of Stratford, Texas: Providing for a penalty for the violation hereof, and repealing all ordinances contrary hereto.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Stratford, Texas:

Section 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any engineer or other person in charge of any electric, gasoline motor or steam locomotive or train to run the same within the corporate limits of the City of Stratford, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than thirty-five (35) miles per hour.

Section 2. Any engineer or other person in charge of any electric, gasoline motor or steam locomotive or train violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof in the corporation court of the City of Stratford, Texas, shall be fined in any sum not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

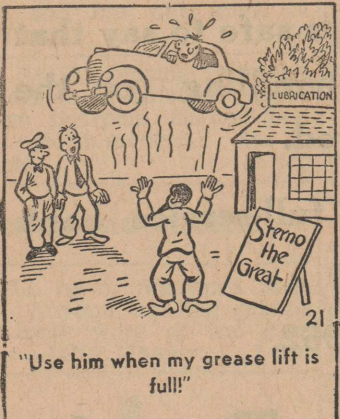
