"And when bis bretbren saw that their father loved him more than all his brethren, they bated him, and could not speak peaceably unto him." Genesis 37:4

> The tragedy in the family of Jacob which finally caused the boy Joseph to be sold into slavery is fully revealed in this passage of Scripture.

Jealousy and parental favoritism was the cause of the continual strife in this family. The brothers could not speak "peaceably" to their younger brother. No doubt there was bickering and shouting and arguing. What an unhappy family this must have been! And it caused the tragedy of brothers selling a brother.

Modern delinquency is caused in most part by children being unwanted by one or both parents; by jealousy among the children and parents. It is not caused by a peaceful home.

Jealousy, which can start in the family, can spread to be jealousy between races and nations.

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


