## Driver Injured In Train-Truck Collision

Kenneth Martin, 21-year old Carter Trucking Co. driver, was injured Friday morning when a Santa Fe freight train collided with his cattle truck at a grade intersection about 7 miles north of Dumas.

Martin suffered a fractured right leg below the knee and several scalp lacerations. He was hospitalized in Memorial Hospital in Dumas.

Thirteen head of cattle were killed, and 20 others were injured.

The crash occurred at 10:00 a. m. at the intersection of a dirt road and the Santa Fe tracks, about 50 feet west of U. S. Highway 287.

Officers said Martin had loaded the cattle at the Diedrichsen Feed Yards, about 200 feet from the highway, and was headed east on the dirt road from the feed yard to the highway. He was to drive north with the livestock.

The side of the truck cab was caved in. The freight train stopped a few hundred feet north of the crash.

### Texas Independence Day

In view of some recent developments in a far-off land in connection with a question asked by an Indonesian of our Attorney General, the Honorable Robert Kennedy, it appeared to me that a little light should be thrown on the subject. It is especially appropriate at this time, since March 2 was Texas Independence Day, and one of the great days in the history of mankind in his fight for freedom and independence. I do not know the exact words used between the Attorney General and the Indonesian student, but it was the general understanding from reports of the transaction that the Mexican War was a war of aggression on the part of this country against Mexico in which the land area presently constituting the State of Texas was the grand prize. Whether or not this was the actual subject matter of the discussion between the two, I do not know, but correct or incorrect, it was the impression in the minds of those who read accounts of the statements. Hence, in order to clarify the situation and to redeem any lost prestige suffered by this country, the Attorney General, Texas, or Mexico, I think it would be well to look to the true facts.

The revolution in Texas preceded the Mexican War by some eleven years. According to Stephen F. Austin, this revolution was a stand against military dictatorship. The aim in the beginning was not independence from Mexico. On November 7, 1835, it was declared by the colonists in a consultation at San Felipe de Austin that they had "Taken up arms in defense of the Federal Constitution of Mexico in 1824". It was not until the Alamo was under bombardment on March 2, 1836, that a convention of colonists held at Washington-on-Brazos declared the independence of Texas.

The Mexican War was actually precipitated by the annexation of Texas in 1846. Mexico broke off diplomatic relations with the United States immediately after the admission of Texas and the 28th State of the Union on December 29, 1845. The first encounter was at Palo Alto near Brownsville May 8, 1846. Another engagement was fought at Resaca de la Palma on the following day. The Mexican forces then withdrew into Mexico proper and no other battles were fought north of the Rio Grande. In the first instance, General Zachary Taylor had been ordered to seize disputed Texas land settled by Mexicans, and it was after the border clash that the United States declared war on May 13, 1846. Ten days later Mexico declared war on the United States. Generals Winfield Scott and Zachary Taylor moved rapidly to Mexico City and it fell on September 14, 1847. The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed on February 2, 1848. Mexico relinquished any claim to Texas, including the area below the Nueces. It ceded to the United States that part of the present United States west of Texas and the Louisiana Purchase and south of Oregon. However, the United States paid

Music groups from the second grade, third grade, sixth grade, junior high and high school appeared on the musical program.

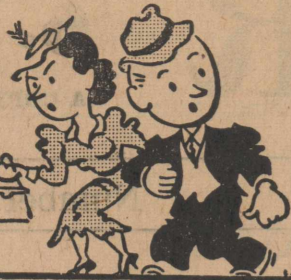

produced for export by Texans included cotton, grain sorghums, wheat, rice and livestock. "It is a real tribute to the efficiency of Texas farmers that they were able to make this contribution to helping feed the world's consumers," said David Brown, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 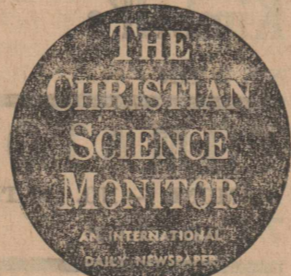

Mexico 15 million dollars. It must be kept in mind that all of this transaction took place twelve years subsequent to the declaration of independence by the valiant men of Texas gathered at Washington-Brazos on March 2, 1836. It was after the successful conclusion of the revolution as it developed after March 2 that brought complete freedom and independence to Texas and it became a Republic, which it remained until it became annexed as the 28th State of the United States.

Although independence was not declared until March 2, 1836, it seems to me that the fight for independence by Texas began on February 23 when fewer than 200 men entered the Alamo on February 23 at the approach of a Mexican army numbering 3,000. It was then that the siege began which lasted until March 6, 1836, ending when the walls were stormed by the overpowering numbers of Mexican troops and the defenders were slaughtered to the last man.

So very much could be written about the honor and glory of those stalwart patriots at the Alamo that the space within this newsletter would be wholly insufficient to even pay surface treatment to the subject. However, I would commend to those interested in the true history of our fight for freedom the reading and re-reading of the early days of Texas history. Few events in the history of the world can approach the story of the Alamo for sheer bravery, honor, self-sacrifice, devotion to duty, and dedication to the freedom of the individual, and certainly none can surpass it. It was all summed up on February 24, 1836. The previous day Santa Anna had hoisted a blood-red flag, meaning "No quarter". William Travis replied from the Alamo with a cannon shot. On the next day he sent out his famous message "to the People of Texas and all the Americans in the World":

Fellow citizens and compatriots, I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna — I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man —

The enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken. I shall never surrender or retreat.

Then, I call on you in the name of Liberty, of patriotism

and everything dear to the American character to come to our aid, with all dispatch — The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days.

If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as

long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor or that of his country.
