To exhibit in the favorite foods show the girls will: (1) plan the place setting and center piece carefully. If the dish is for a special occasion such as a birthday, select appointments to carry out the birthday theme. (2) Write their recipe and menu on cards. (3) Exhibit their recipe and menu cards, place setting, center piece, and other appropriate table appointments on a card table. (4) Be able to tell how to prepare and serve the food, why this food makes a difference, and to discuss table courtesies.

The winner of the favorite foods show will be eligible to compete in the district show. Winners of the district shows will compete in the state show. This is a junior division for county and district competition.

In the better bake show the 4-H girls will exhibit cherry pie and biscuits. Their records will also be judged.

Fire Department Battles Blazes

Stratford firemen put out four fires Friday afternoon between 2:30 and 5:15.

A pile of wood near the Dairy Queen which is used to barbecue meat, was ignited from sparks of a nearby trash barrel.

Immediately after the fire fighting equipment had been put away firemen were called to the George Allen property on Third Street. A grass fire was setting a wooden fence on fire.

A third blaze, in the back yard of the Earl Riffe home where the interior of a small storage house was damaged, required the services of the fire department.

Before this blaze was entirely extinguished, high winds had fanned embers in the wood pile near the Dairy Queen into a blaze. The fire department was called again and additional water was used to soak the pile of wood and put out the fire.

At 2:00 p. m. Tuesday Stratford firemen were called to aid the Keyes fire department in putting out a grass fire on the Perkins-Prothro ranch near Kerrick.

A grass fire in the yard at the Leslie Parker home caused a fire alarm at 1:45 p. m. Wednesday. Mrs. Don Riffe was attempting to put out the fire with a garden hose when the fire department arrived. Some of the shrubs in the yard were damaged by the fire.

Organize For New Feeding Program

Eighteen F.F.A. members and thirteen of their fathers attended a meeting in the vocational agriculture department of the high school building Tuesday night. The meeting, called by Charley Lamb, was to organize the 1962-63 F.F.A. commercial beef feeding program. Seven F.F.A. members, who had previously expressed an interest in the program, were unable to attend.

The commercial feeding program has been designed to train the boys in the practical aspect of livestock feeding. This program does not offer ribbons or prizes, and the animals are not shown at a livestock show. In every phase of the program, the committee working with the boys strives to make each operation as practical as possible.

The F.F.A. boys started their commercial feeding program in 1954. Since that time, they have fed Angus and Hereford heifers and steers, which have been good quality feeders. In only one of these years did the boys lose money. That loss occurred in the program last year when the average loss was about \$8.00 per head. In the past, the boys have made marketing trips to such markets as Pueblo, Colorado, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and Amarillo. Plans for the future call for an attempt to get the cattle marketed in Kansas City. This would be a much looked forward to trip by the boys in the program.

F.F.A. boys selected Walter Lasley, C. W. Wells and Bill Pendleton to serve as the adult committeemen. This committee will assist the boys in locating and purchasing cattle, and when the program is finished, will help in contacting buyers for finished livestock.

Tentative plans call for the purchase of steers weighing between 400 and 450 pounds by May 15. The cattle would then be placed on grass for the summer and moved to wheat pasture next fall. Around December 1, the cattle will be placed in the feed lots, and following a 150 day feeding period, they will be sold.

As a climax to the program, the boys will then be taken on a marketing trip to the city and market receiving the cattle.

Volunteers also receive \$75 a month for each month with the Peace Corps, or a total of \$1800 after two years' service.
