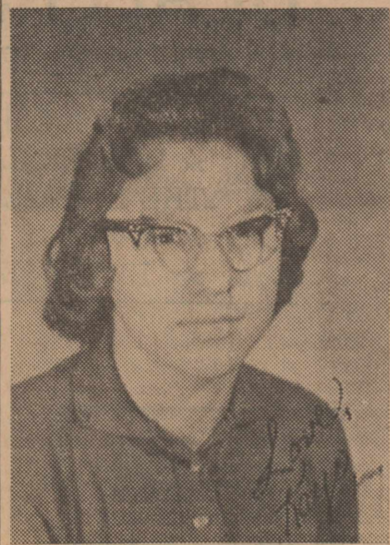

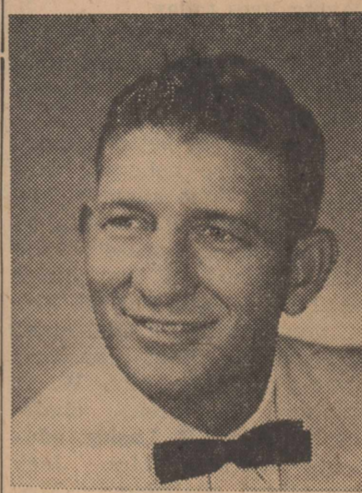

## Mrs. Garoutte Laid To Rest Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Earl Garoutte, 70, were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the First Christian Church by Rev. H. Cecil Bever, pastor. She died of a heart attack at the family home in Stratford about 4:45 p. m. Sunday.

Mrs. Garoutte had been in failing health for several months. Sunday, she had seemed to feel much better than she had in weeks. During the afternoon she and Mr. Garoutte had talked about a banana tree they had moved and wondered if it would live. He was in the shop in the back yard when he heard his wife knock on the overhead door. When he opened the door, Mrs. Garoutte started falling backwards. She stopped against the family car about four feet from the door. He caught her as she slumped to the ground with a heart attack. In her hand, Mrs. Garoutte carried a live branch of the banana tree.

Mrs. Garoutte was born December 27, 1897 in McKinley, Missouri.

Survivors are her husband, Earl C. Garoutte; a brother, J. C. Jones of Marionville, Missouri; two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Boyd of Hutchinson, Kansas and Mrs. Lester Mack of Rogersville, Missouri.

The 15-acre marketing quota exemption does not apply to the 1962 wheat crop.

"This is a change from marketing quota programs for previous wheat crops", R. C. Buckles, chairman of the Sherman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, states, "and we want all growers, especially those with small wheat acreages, to understand fully just how the program differs for this year. Since the quota exemption has been lowered for 1962-crop wheat, the quotas will affect many more growers this year".

Under previous programs, farms which produced no more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest were not subject to wheat marketing quotas, Mr. Buckles explained.

Under the 1962 wheat program, farms subject to marketing quotas are those on which the acreage of wheat exceeds the smaller of (a) 13.5 acres, or (b) the highest acreage the farm had for harvest in the 3-year period 1959, 1960, and 1961. Wheat farmers may therefore avoid marketing quota penalties on their 1962-crop wheat by complying with (1) their farm wheat allotment, or (2) their wheat quota exemption (if this is larger).

For 1962, the penalty will be 65 per cent of parity as of May 1, 1962; previously, it was 45 per cent. And the amount of wheat subject to penalty will be twice the farm's normal yield on all of the acres in excess of the wheat allotment (or the wheat quota exemption if the farm has no wheat allotment). This amount may be reduced if the proved 1962 actual yield is less and a request is filed by a stipulated deadline.

Chairman Buckles also reminded farmers that price support on 1962-crop wheat will be available only to those wheat growers who have filed applications to participate in and who then actually comply with provisions of the wheat stabilization program. Diversion payments are also available to wheat growers who participate in the 1962 wheat program.

## Stratford Applies For Foreign Exchange To Attend Local School

Recently, at a meeting of the Stratford Lions Club, attended by representatives of all local organizations, it was decided to

make an application to the American Field Service to bring a foreign exchange student to Stratford next year.

The students exchange program was started by a New York taxi cab driver who volunteered for ambulance duty with the Red Cross during World War I and World War II. He believed that if people of different countries knew and understood each other better, there would be less chance of wars, and that in exchanging students, the United States would have the best ambassadors possible, both in foreign students who lived in American homes and attended

American schools, learning our customs and character, and in our American students, living with a family in a foreign land.

At the present time there are approximately 2,200 foreign students in this country, with 22 being located in this area. A number of communities are applying for the first time to get a foreign student next year. These students are the top students from their country, being selected from the top 3%. All of the students speak Oxford English. There is a choice as to whether Stratford wants a girl or a boy, and from what country, though the spon-

sors will not necessarily get the choice. There is no choice as to religion. A colored student will not be sent to this area. The student will be a senior in high school next year. This community will be eligible to send a student to a foreign country the year after it has had a foreign student in the community.

This is a community project, and cannot be undertaken by an organization or individual.

The expense for bringing a student to Stratford is \$650.00, which will cover his transportation and allow him \$14.00 per month spending money. Clothing will be furnished by the student and his parents. Other expenses will be taken care of by the host family, and the family will be allowed a \$600.00 deduction on income tax. The family must have both parents in the home, be over 37 years of age, and must have had children in the home, though they need not live in the home at the present time.

Any family interested in keeping the student in their home should apply to Mrs. Herbert Folsom or E. R. Bell.
