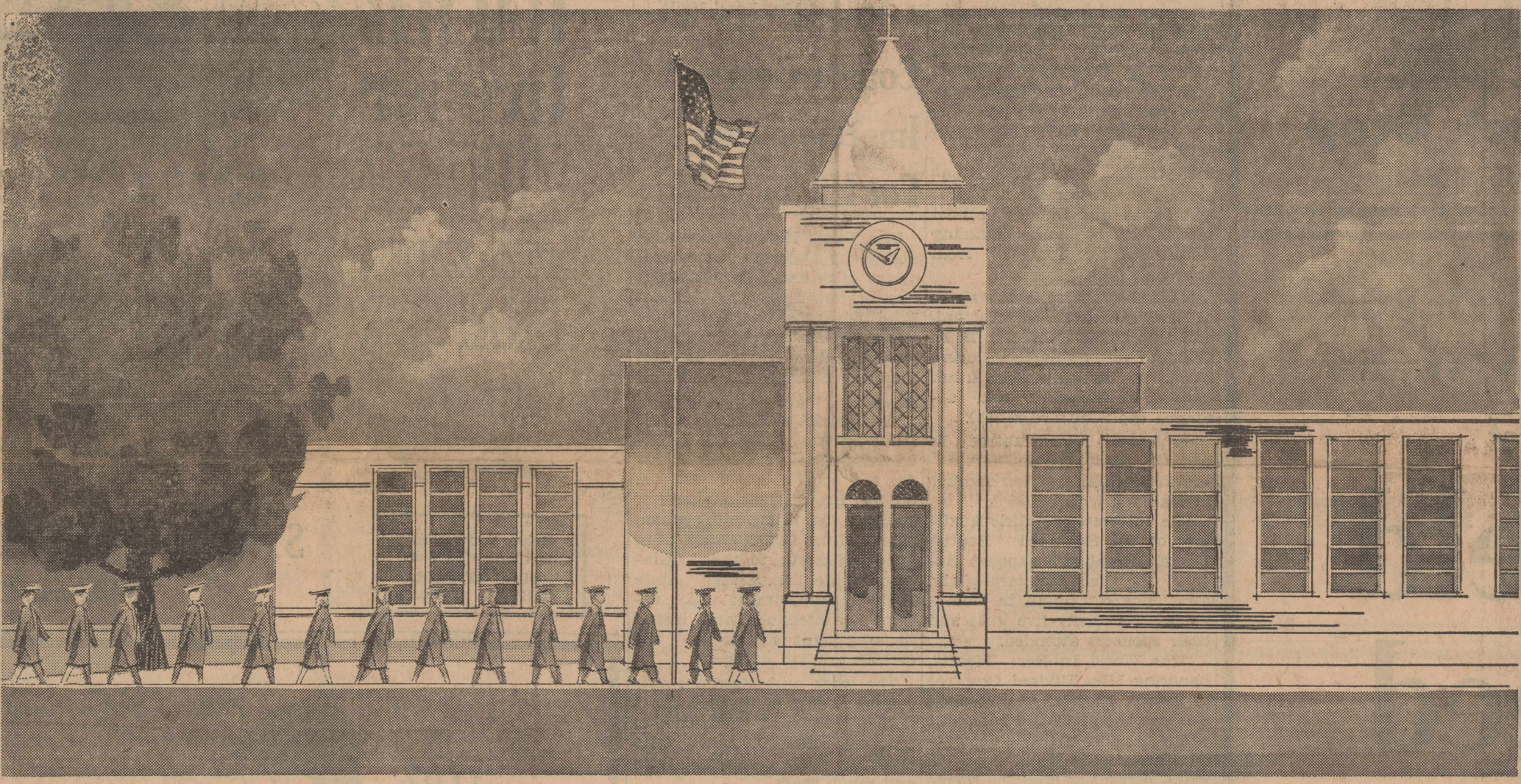

County Gets Improvements For Highway 54

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$6,000.00 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in Sherman County as part of the 1962 FM Road Program, announced District Engineer Charles W. Smith of Amarillo.

The district engineer said 11.6 miles in this county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of H. L. Gallegly Sr., resident engineer of Dalhart. On this project which extends from U.S. Highway 54 in Stratford north to the Oklahoma State line. The State Highway Department will assume maintenance and install flashing light signals at the CRI&P railroad crossing.

The work authorized for this county is part of the new \$23 1/2 million FM road construction program which involves 1,216 miles of newly designated farm and ranch roads.

Herbert C. Petry Jr., chairman of the commission, pointed out that more miles of new farm roads will be constructed under this program than has been possible in recent years. Normally, about 1,000 miles of new FM roads are added to the highway system each year — but the 1962 program represents an increase of more than 200 miles above the average.

Petry noted that this type of

road "is the land service road" that has done so much to develop the state. These roads have meant a great deal to the development of our economy, providing all-weather routes for our rural population and better service to schools and for delivery of mail. The new FM program is a one-year program. Future FM programs will remain on a one-year basis, the Commission said.

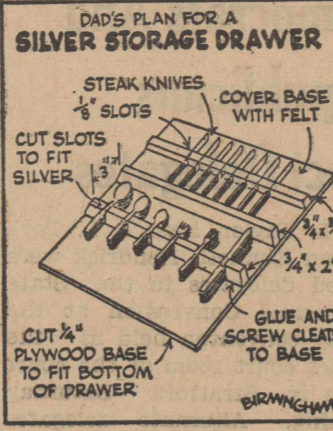
Boys Ranch Is Proud Of Fire Trucks

A new fire station complete with two gleaming red fire trucks now protects the nearly 300 boys at Cal Farley's nationally-famous Boys Ranch following

the dedication of the new equipment Saturday by firemen of the Panhandle and South Plains.

The new trucks were donated by the Panhandle Firemen's Association and members of the Lubbock Fire Department. The fire station is the contribution of Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Hafner of Chillicothe, Texas. Mr. Hafner is secretary of the association and a former county agent of Childress.

More than 300 firemen and their families convened at the ranch for their semi-annual convention, dedication of the new fire fighting equipment, lunch with the boys and a tour of the ranch. They represented more than 1,000 firemen in communities throughout the area who joined hands in the drive to raise funds for the fire protection of Boys Ranch. Before, the equipment was placed in operation the nearest fire truck was at Vega, 22 miles away.

The new trucks are a 500-gallon pumper, constructed by the Howe Manufacturing Co. of Anderson, Indiana, at cost and a 300-gallon booster built by the Lubbock Fire Department. The new building is of Colorado stone with sliding doors and landscaping that was done by the boys of the ranch.

Ted Lokey Jr., Amarillo, was master of ceremonies for the dedication ceremony.

Cal Farley, Ranch founder, expressed his appreciation to the firemen for the equipment on behalf of the boys. Dedicatory addresses were made by Mr. Hafner, Cliff Delano of Dalhart, association president, Earl Phillips of Hereford, chairman of the fund raising committee and Glenn Smith, fire chief at Lubbock. The invocation and response were given by boys of the Ranch and a choral group of the non-sectarian chapel sang several selections. More than 40 communities were represented by the firemen at the dedication.

Mrs. Dale Knight is recovering from painful grease burns on her left foot which were sustained in a grease fire at her home about eight weeks ago.

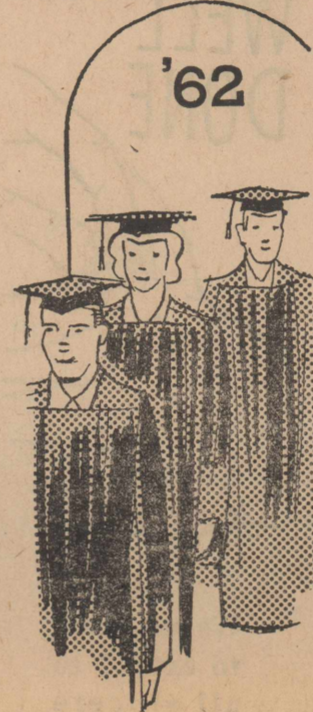

Rains Aiding Wheat

Spotted rains over the area and overcast skies have given some aid to the growing wheat crop in this area. Spotted showers fell over the area Monday morning. The sudden downpour in Stratford at 8:00 a. m. registered only a trace.

Tuesday night the official reading in Stratford was .17 of an inch. The heaviest rains were to the east where as much as an inch was reported.

Farmers over most of the territory reported receiving some rain but said the ground was so dry, it was hard to guess how much moisture fell.

The official moisture reading for Stratford for the current year is 3.33 inches.

Recordings for the year are: January .35, February .09, March .61, April 1.94, and May .34.

A Texas Employment survey of the territory issued previous to the current damp weather stated:

"The wheat crop has suffered from dry hot weather. Growth is stunted and heads are small. Irrigated wheat is holding its own, but hot winds dry it out rapidly. Harvest should get underway about June 10. A shortage of tractor drivers to turn under the stubble is expected to develop."
