

Food Topics

Instead of drinking orange juice for breakfast every morning, try for variety by spooning frozen concentrated orange juice over fruit cocktail for a treat.

For a refreshing tomato juice cocktail heat tomato juice with instant minced onion and slices of lemon. Chill and serve with chopped ripe olives, with minced parsley sprinkled on top.

Add a bit of garlic salt to melted butter in which you pan-toast bread cubes for soups or salads.

Helen's Favorite:
Fruit Slaw Mold (Serves 6)
1/2 cup fresh dates, cut
1 3-ounce package lemon gelatin
1 cup boiling water
3/4 cup cold water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons crushed tarragon
1 cup shredded cabbage
1 cup grapefruit sections
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; add cold water, lemon juice, salt and tarragon. Chill until thickened. Add all remaining ingredients. Chill in 1-quart mold until firm. Unmold and serve on salad greens.

Canned cling peaches can be filled with tartar sauce to serve as an accompaniment to fish platters.

For a luncheon salad blend together deviled ham, chopped hard-cooked eggs, celery and pickle relish with enough mayonnaise to hold together and serve in fruit cups.

Maraschino cherry juice is excellent for sweetening and coloring grapefruit halves for dessert. Add a spoonful of slivered, toasted almonds for flavor contrast.

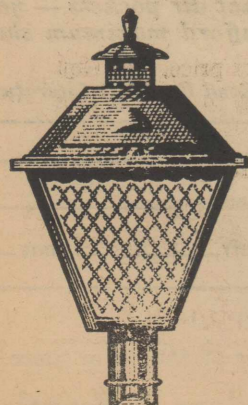

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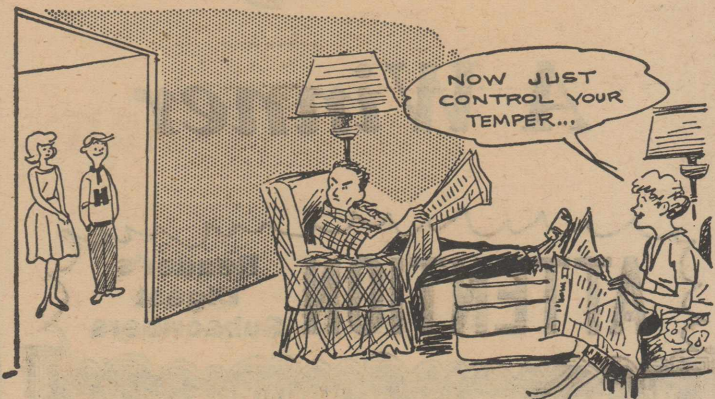

More About Thirteen-Year-Old 'Steadies'

THE WEEK'S LETTER: "I have read your replies about girls that are thirteen being too young to go steady. I agree with you that a girl should not lose interest in her studies because of a boy. I am thirteen myself, but I do disagree with you that thirteen is too young to go steady. I am going with a boy who is fifteen. He comes up to the house on weekends. My parents get mad when he is there, but when the

family is together they will joke about it. Why? And why do you think thirteen is too young? Isn't it better to be with a boy who is nice and around your own age than to be with any fellow who comes along, old or young? Of course, I don't do that. I was only trying to make my point. Will you answer my questions? Why shouldn't girls of 13 show interest in boys?
OUR ANSWERS: We agree

with you when you agree with us that a girl should not neglect her studies for a boy . . . or vice versa.

Even if you disagree, thirteen is too young to go steady.

You do not go steady. You are permitted to allow a boy to come to your home to see you. Your parents would permit other nice boys to visit, too.

Your parents do not get mad because he is there. In our humble opinion they act with restraint because they don't want to encourage the lad to the extent he may want to come every day of the week as well as on weekends.

Would you prefer your parents "joked" about it, "fussed" about it—or said nothing at all?

Girls of thirteen should rightly show an interest in boys—and we emphasize the "s" in boys. It refers to the boys a girl meets at school, church and other properly chaperoned functions.

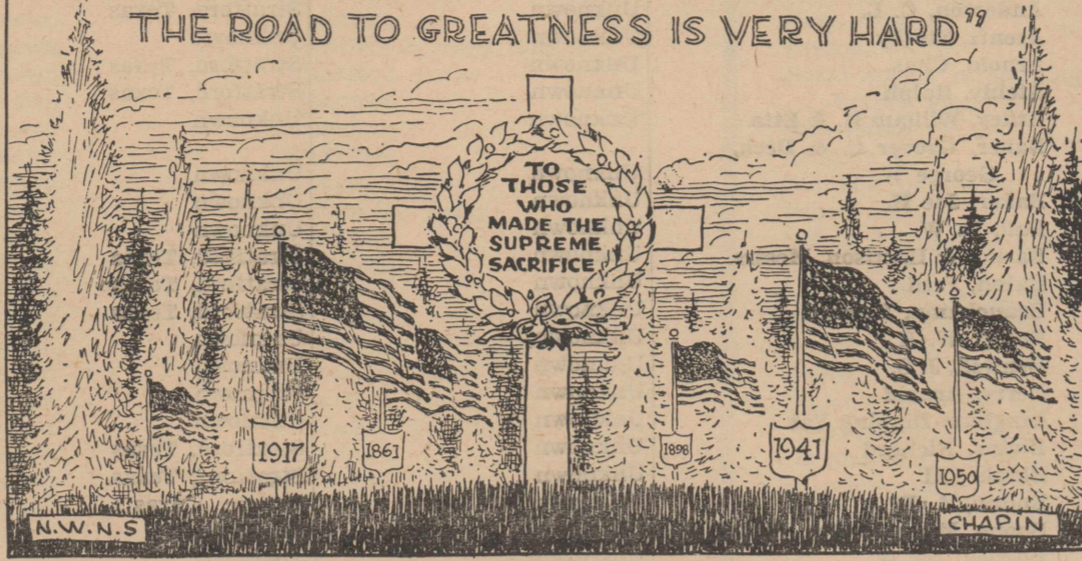

To Cure More - Give More

The American Cancer Society has added to its slogan, "fight cancer with a checkup and a check," a new and meaningful phrase — "to cure more, give more."

It has every reason to do so. Twenty-five years ago there were only 160,000 people alive cured of cancer. Today, there are at least 1,100,000 alive and cured of cancer. And the figure is going up each year.

Twenty-five years ago, it was stated that one out of seven were being cured of cancer. Today, it is one out of three. And tomorrow, if every one had an annual health checkup, it could be one out of two.

Today, some 87,000 Americans die needlessly of cancer each year. They are lost because they did not receive early diagnosis and prompt treatment.

The American Cancer Society says that the possibility of preventing deaths from cancer are greater than for any other chronic disease and that more can be done against cancer than against any other disease.

That is why the Society developed the theme — "to cure more, give more." The public must learn what it can do to protect itself against cancer.

This requires a big and costly educational effort. Statistics show that about 40 per cent of the population of the country do not know cancer's seven danger signals — signals that may mean the difference between life and death.

Also the Society wants to step up its research program. Already a drug has been found effective against one very rare type of cancer. The Society has great hope that in the next few years much can be achieved in the field of immunology — prevention of cancer through vaccination. Until research supplies the answer, we cannot hope to save more than one out of two of those who develop cancer.

As President Kennedy's Conference on Heart Disease and Cancer said, "this is no time to sit still on research." A good way to advance research is to heed the Society's 1962 theme — "to cure more, give more."
