

New Wheat Farm Acres Due July 2

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" allotment for 1963 on a farm which does not have a wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS County Office as soon as possible, R. C. Buckles, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, states.

Such farmers have until July 2 to file applications for such an allotment. Because the usual program deadline of July 1 occurs on Sunday this year, the 1962 deadline is extended to the end of business on Monday, July 2.

Under the wheat allotment-marketing quota program, a "new farm" is a farm on which there is no wheat acreage history, including acreage considered as wheat under the conservation reserve or the Great Plains program, for any of the years, 1960, 1961 or 1962.

The chairman emphasized that formal application for a "new farm" application must be made in writing on a form provided for that purpose, and the application must be filed at the ASCS County Office by the July 2 deadline.

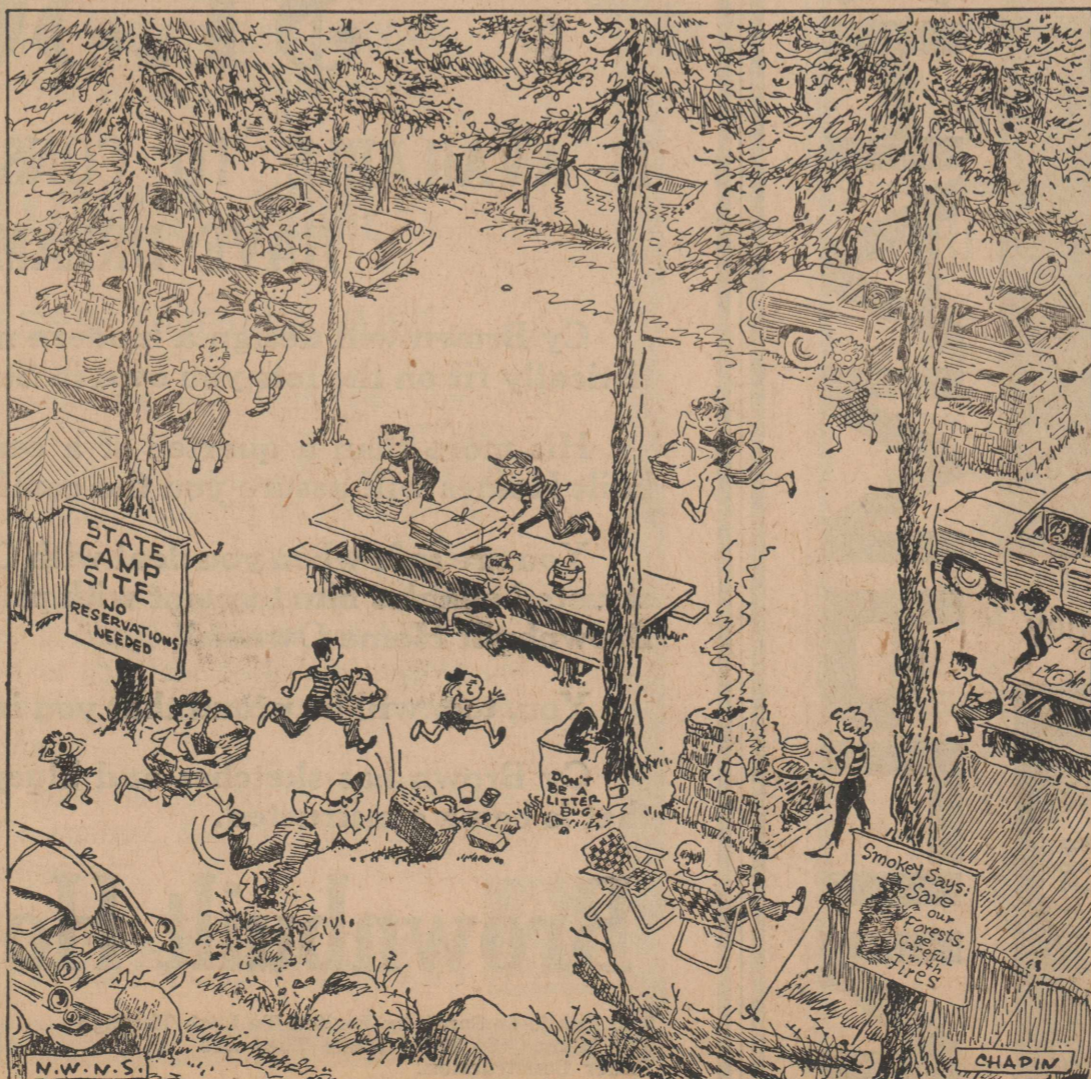

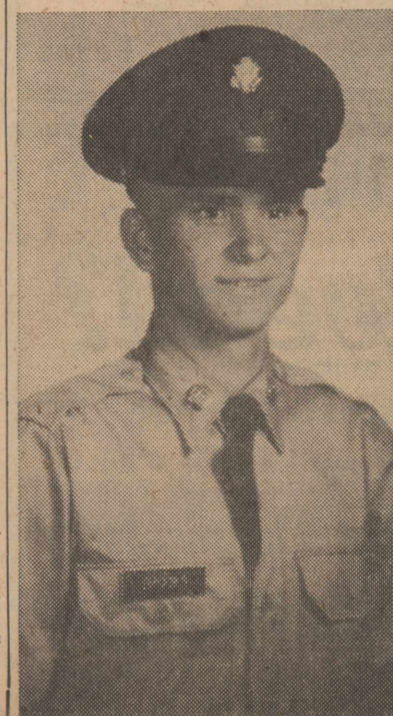

TFB Opposes New Farm Program

Congress should defeat the Administration's proposed farm bill because it is bad for both farmers and consumers, the head of the state's largest farm organization asserted this week.

J. H. West of Bishop, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, charged that passage of the proposed bill, H.R. 11222, now awaiting action in the House, would:

- (1) Give farmers no reasonable choice in the referendum provided for in the bill.
- (2) Result in higher costs to consumers.
- (3) Copy failure of agriculture in regimented nations.

The TFB leader said farmers would be faced with an impossible choice in the referendum which the bill provides.

"Producers would be forced to choose between (1) complete government regimentation and (2) the withdrawal of all price supports in conjunction with a program of dumping government surpluses to destroy the market for current production," West said.

"We would have the choice of submitting to economic imprisonment or committing economic suicide," he explained. "Obviously, there is no choice involved, and farmers would be forced to accept the strictest form of regimentation ever imposed in this country."

West further charged that the bill would hit the consumer's pocketbook with "both barrels." "Costs of administering the program would necessarily be high," he said. "These costs include payments for land retirement, higher price supports and increased costs of administration."

He said that the real costs of the program would be reflected in the grocery store.

"Regimentation-type controls automatically decrease productive efficiency, thus resulting in higher food costs," the Farm Bureau leader explained.

West added that passage of the H.R. 11222 would be copying the failure of other nations which have planned farm economies.

"Regimented nations today are the ones with food shortages," the TFB president stated. "Government planners cannot run farms as efficiently as farmers can."

"In Russia, a system of collective or regimented agriculture has failed to feed their people adequately" the farm leader explained. "It is no accident that in the Soviet Union today over half of the vegetables and livestock products are raised on approximately 5 percent of the arable land where collective farm workers are permitted to tend their small plots free from government interference."

"This is proof positive that free farming works" West asserted. "Why copy failure?"

"West, who is a member of the American Farm Bureau board of directors, said Farm Bureau is for a positive, not punitive farm program which permits a maximum of freedom for the farmer with a minimum of cost to taxpayers."

Insect Control Guides Revised

Two popular insect guides have been revised and may be obtained from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office at College Station. They are the Vegetable Guide L-255 and Livestock Guide L-256.

The Vegetable Guide has been revised and the insecticide Sevin is now recommended for use on cantaloupes and watermelons as well as other crops listed under the Cucurbit group.

Ronnel (Trolene) is now recommended for grub control in the Livestock Guide. It may be used in a feed mixture to control grubs in beef cattle. Directions for mixing the material with feed can be found on the manufacturer's label.

Also, the recommended waiting time from last application of Co-Ral to slaughter has been reduced when used on beef cattle, sheep and goats.

The insecticide Sevin has now been recommended for the control of lice and mites on poultry.

The chemical Dibrom has been added to the list for use to control flies in the dairy and livestock barn.

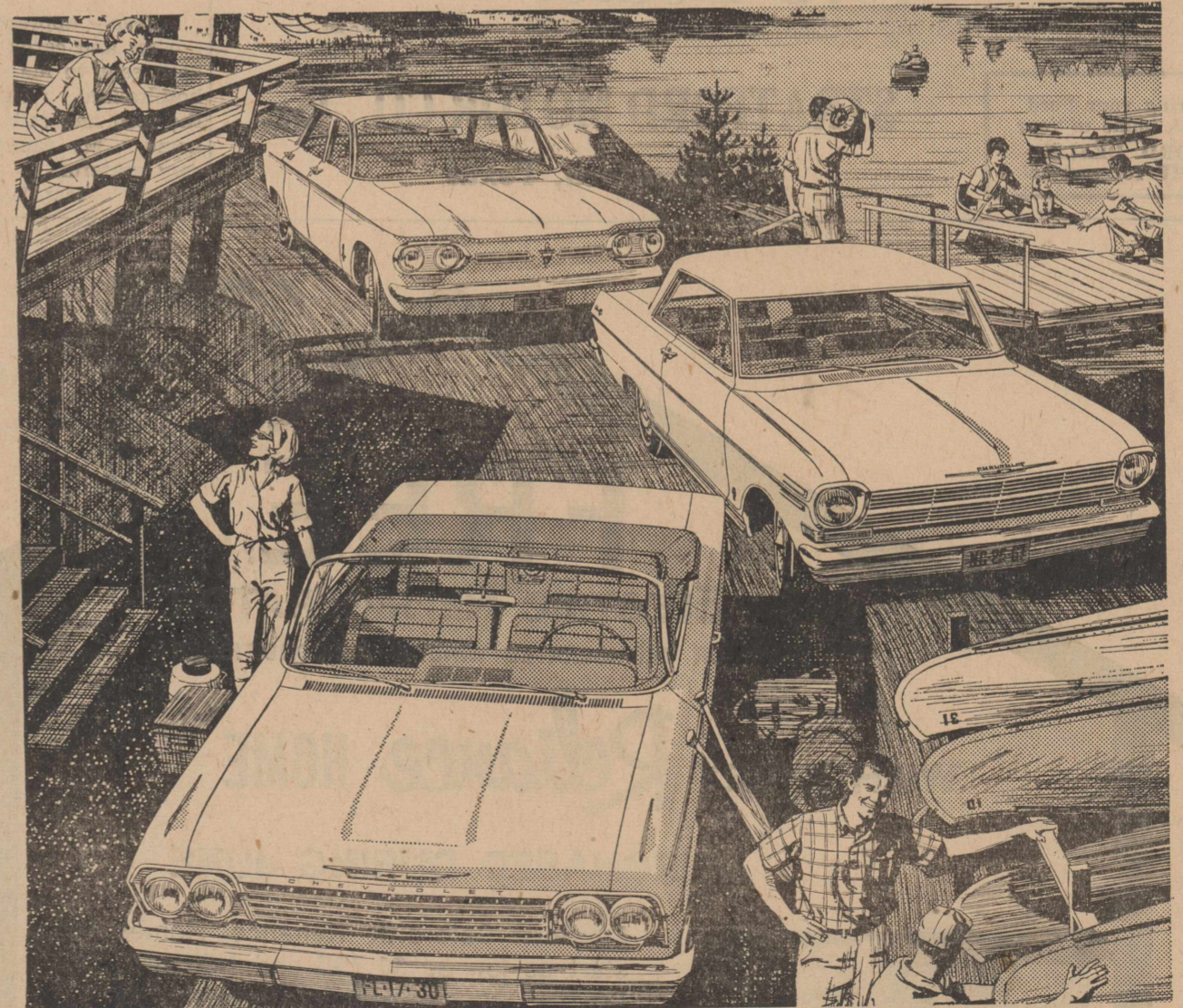

Wind Erosion On Irrigated Land Studied

Wind erosion can be controlled on irrigated land by maintaining a crop cover during as much of the season as possible and by keeping the soil surface rough and cloddy between crops, points out a new U. S. Department Agriculture publication.

"Wind Erosion Control on Irrigated Lands" (L-506) explains that conditions are favorable for soil blowing on many irrigated fields. Cultivation and preparation of land for irrigation often leave the soil pulverized and bare and winds in most irrigated areas are high enough to cause this soil to blow.

The publication, prepared by Stephen J. Mech, agricultural engineer of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, outlines erosion control practices to use during preparation of new fields for irrigation and after the soil has been stabilized or "tied down."

On a new field, Mech says, the wind erosion hazards will be minimized by beginning land preparation in the summer. He advises planting a cover crop immediately after leveling and ditching to stabilize the bare

and pulverized soil. The publication suggests a schedule of practices for farmers to follow during this soil stabilization period.

After this soil is stabilized, a cropping system that includes other erosion-preventing practices is recommended. Mech advises delaying spring plowing until just before planting,

preparing a cloddy seedbed, seeding forages in stubble, and planting row crops on ridges. Erosion-resistant strips of stubble or cover crop should be left in large fields of cultivated row crops, as these fields are particularly susceptible to wind erosion.

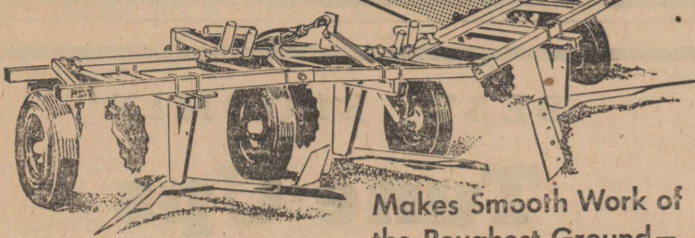
