

School Opens August 29th

Stratford schools will open Wednesday, August 29, it was announced this week by R. W. Standefer Jr., superintendent.

Classes will continue Thursday and Friday, Monday will be a holiday in observance of Labor Day and classes will be resumed Tuesday, September 4.

School buses will operate on schedule on the old routes the first day of school. Adjustments will be made where necessary. The school cafeteria will be open on the opening day of school.

Parents of children who will start to school for the first time this year, are reminded that beginners must be immunized against smallpox, diphtheria and polio. Birth certificates are required for enrollment. They may be secured from the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin.

The schools have a complete faculty except for the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. E. E. Riggs who is moving to Weatherford, Oklahoma. This leaves the school in need of a junior high science teacher. Workshop August 27-28.

A workshop for Stratford school teachers will be held August 27 and 28.

K. Newburn Jr. Is Victim Of Snake Bite

Mr. Newburn took his son to Mrs. R. W. Standefer Jr., public school nurse. She repeated the treatment.

In Dumas, a doctor repeated the treatment given the boy by Mr. Newburn and Mrs. Standefer. Young Newburn was also given vaccine treatment.

The boy is getting along nicely and seems none the worse from the experience.

Daily Rains Soak Fields Over Territory

Showers which started Friday and have fallen each evening and night, soaked Stratford with 2.58 inches of moisture up to Wednesday morning. Rainfall to the west is reported to have ranged upward over five inches.

To the east approximately two inches of rain has fallen. Typical of the rains this year, the amounts have varied in almost every locality. Some farmers state that they have had more moisture than their fields will hold in some locations, while other parts of their fields could have used more rain to a good advantage. As a whole, most of the territory has received at least 1.50 inches of rain since the evening showers started.

In Stratford the records kept by Horace Sneed were: Friday .02, Saturday 1.35, Sunday .43, Monday .54 and Tuesday .24

In the rains Saturday night, as much as three to four inches fell on land west of Stratford which had been suffering for lack of moisture. This amount fell in the vicinity of the Flores, Mullins and Bryant land. To the east, approximately 1.25 inches of rain fell in the vicinity of the country homes of Bill Crabtree, Arlyn and Lorel Haile.

Conditions are favorable for the growing sorghum grain crops. Most irrigation farmers have turned off their irrigation wells, believing they have sufficient moisture to support their crops in the cool weather which has resulted from the general rains.

Wheat growers depending on early wheat pasture to feed their livestock will start drilling soon after the fields are dry enough for them to work.

Plowing of summer fallowed land will start on a grand scale when the fields are dry enough for work to be started.

The change in moisture conditions give producers hopes that the dry weather cycle which they experienced during the first of the year has changed.

An American Field Service International Scholarship has been awarded to Miss Luz Helena Lopez of Bogota, Columbia, who will attend Stratford High School as a senior student this year. She will live in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Dyess.

Miss Lopez has studied English for twelve years, and writes of her life as follows:

"My family is composed of five members: my father, who is incapacitated, and for this reason cannot work; my mother, who works in "Coltejer" and maintains us; my brother, who is twelve years old and is studying in the "Virrey Solis" School, third grade, and my younger sister, fifteen years old, who goes to the "Nuevo Gimnasio", fourth grade. Last is myself, who is eighteen years old, and also went to the "Nuevo Gimnasio", completing all the course and passing my "Bachillerato".

Now I am going to the "Centro Colombo-Americano" here in Bogota to perfect English and also to learn typing, shorthand, Spanish correspondence, and how to be a secretary.

I don't belong to any club. I like music, cooking and swimming. Also to visit people and talk and watch the television. Sometimes they invite me to go to the movies.

If when I return I don't have finished my bi-lingual Secretary Course, I'll finish it. But if I have finished it I'll go to work. Because my mother has worked ten years to help us. Now I'll help her. I am much thankful for Americans. They give me this wonderful opportunity for to see America. These are my plans for the future. My reason for wishing to go to the United States is because I like America very much, her customs, her life, and her language. I think I like to go to the United States. I'll learn very many things, I'll prepare for the future and I'll be very happy there."

The purpose of American Field Service International Scholarships is to increase understanding between the different nations of the world. In order to accomplish this purpose, scholarships are granted to young students from numerous different countries for one school year of study and experience in the United States, so that they may let Americans know more about their own countries, and on their return home, let their families and friends know more about the United States. The American Field Service, is a private organ-

The full text of the 14 proposed State Constitutional Amendments to be voted on in the general election November 6 are published in this week's Stratford Star. So that you may be fully informed, you are urged to read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

Number One on the ballot (HJR 25) — Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

Number Two on the ballot (SJR 9) — Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

Number Three on the ballot (SJR 22) — Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

Number Four on the ballot (HJR 46) — Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

Number Five on the ballot (HJR 51) — Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

Number Six on the ballot (HJR 36) — Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

Number Seven on the ballot (SJR 13) — Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

Number Eight on the ballot (SJR 7) — Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

Number Nine on the ballot (HJR 70) — Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

Number Ten on the ballot (SJR 12) — Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

Number Eleven on the ballot (SJR 25) — Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

Number Twelve on the ballot (SJR 19) — Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

Number Thirteen on the ballot (SJR 6) — Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

Number Fourteen on the ballot (HJR 32) — Provides for trials de novo on all appeals

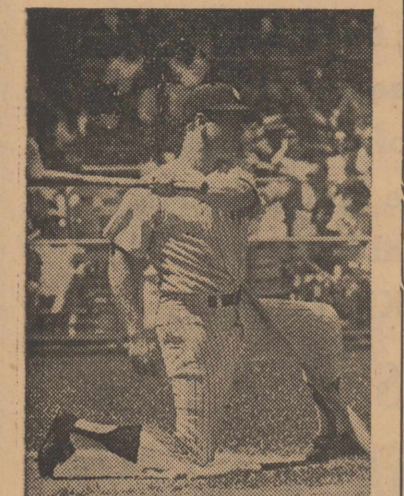
We get a great deal of pleasure out of going to see the Beauty Spots in our town as listed in the paper.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts in counties or political subdivisions of this State; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Article III. Hospital Districts. The Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts in counties or political subdivisions of this State; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the creation of hospital districts in counties or political subdivisions of this State; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the creation of hospital districts in counties or political subdivisions of this State."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the other unaltered, and the proposed Amendment, in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, shall be placed on said machine for the voter to mark for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and the necessary laws as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
