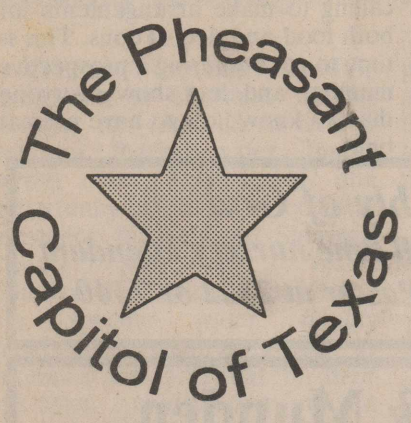

Seventy years ago, a boy was born in Griswold, Iowa, who was destined to become a versatile man. Donald John Casey was born on an Iowa farm, joining his five brothers and two sisters. He lived

the typical life of a farm boy, attending country grade school and Griswold High School. He volunteered for the US Marine Corps, spending over two years in the South Pacific Theater during World War II. After the war he followed his high school sweetheart to Grinnell College for two years, and they were married.

He went back to the farm and soon purchased his first tractor, an

F20 Farmall. After five years as a successful farmer, he acted on a lifelong dream of becoming a veterinarian. He held a farm sale, loaded his household goods on a stock truck, and took his young family to Ames where he enrolled in the College of Veterinary Medicine.

Norton Sentenced To Life In Prison

The state could not prove that Joseph H. Norton is a future threat to society, so a Potter County Jury sentenced the convicted capital murderer, Joseph Norton, to a term of life in prison on Thursday, July 14, 1994.

Norton was convicted Monday July 11th in the June 16, 1993, shooting death of Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Steve Booth. Booth, 28, was shot five times with his own .45 caliber pistol alongside U.S. 287 after making a traffic stop north of Stratford.

Norton will be able to apply for parole after serving 35 years, when he is 84 years old. But Selden Hale, an Amarillo attorney and former chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, said new, more stringent parole laws virtually nullify the chance of parole for capital murder convicts.

Steve Booth is survived by his wife Renee and two sons Brian age 8 and Brady age 3 all of Stratford.

Stratford Area Foundation Meets

Stratford Area Foundation met Friday, July 15th. It was reported that the money requested for the tree project and the fire department had been paid. The money committed to the little league is still pending matching funds. The board granted a request to the Stratford Chamber of Commerce for a new PA system. The total cost is \$1,300. The Area Foundation pledged \$650. The City of Texhoma requested \$2,465.17 for new street signs on the Oklahoma side. They have to have this in order to get the 911 service. This request would come from the J.B. Riffe endowment fund for Texas County. They will receive \$1,232.58 pending matching funds. As always, the only way projects like these can be funded is for individuals and businesses to donate to the Stratford Area Foundation, the J.B. Riffe Endowment Sherman County or the J.B. 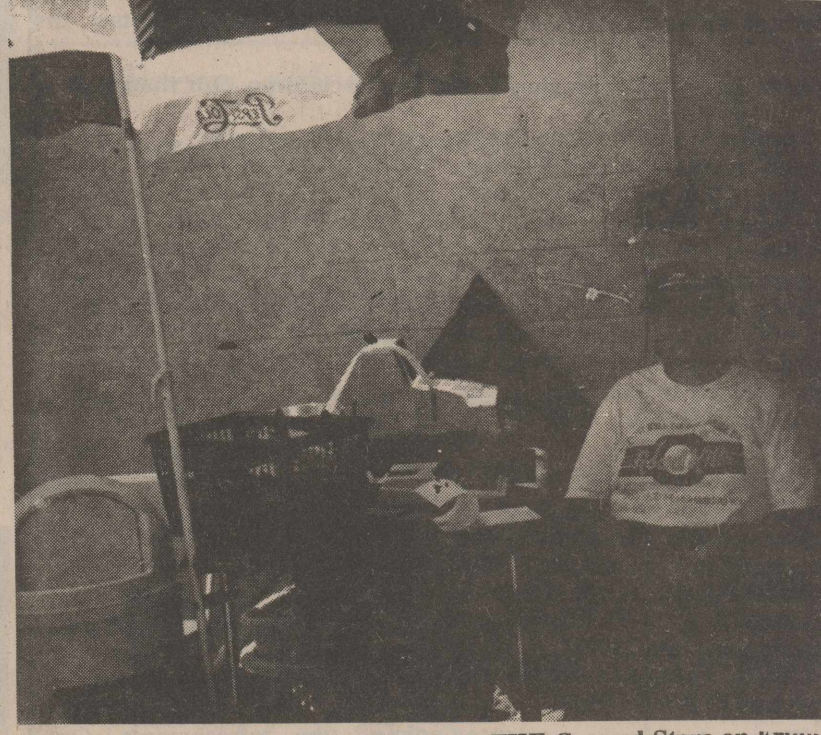

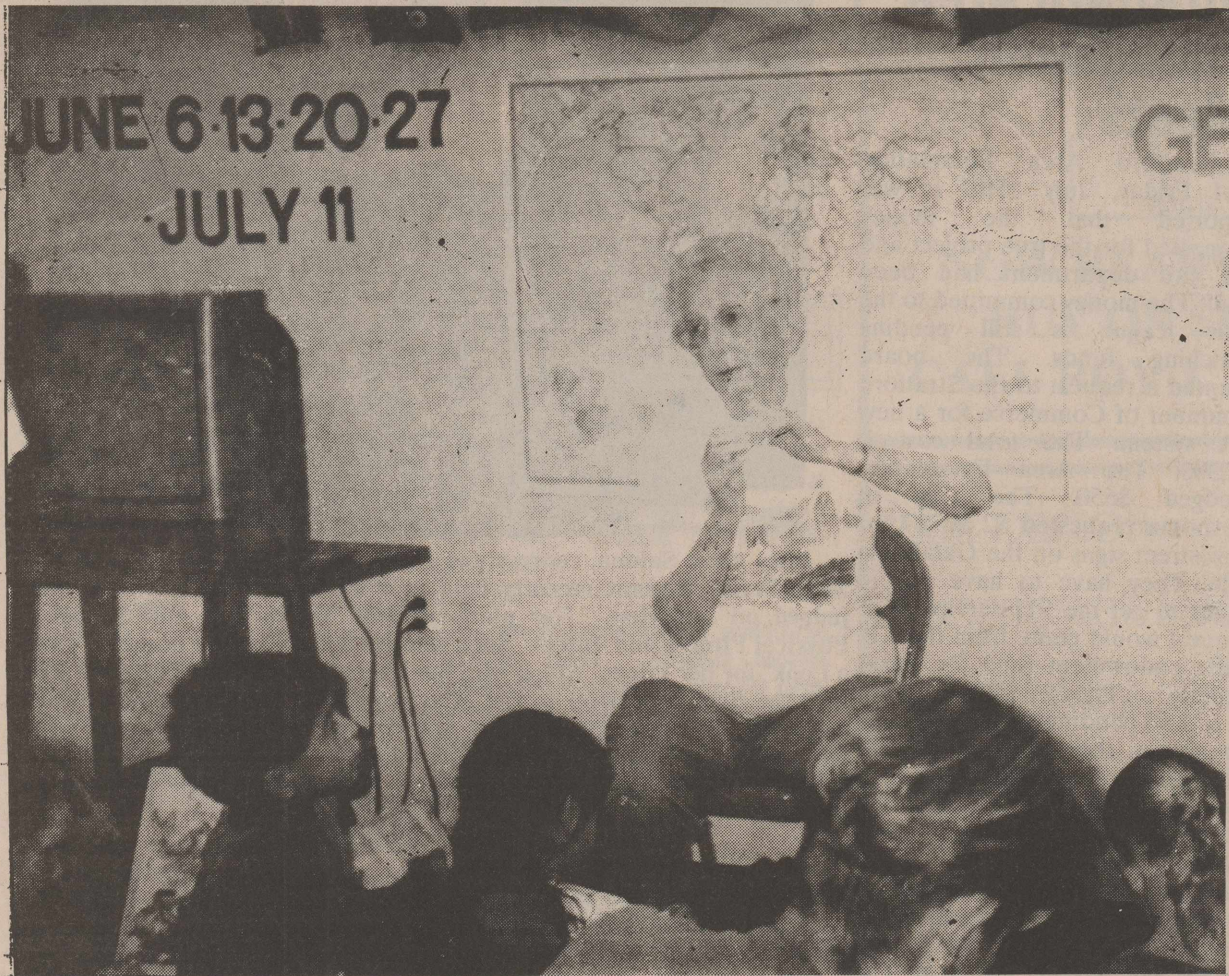

Vinita Olive Davison

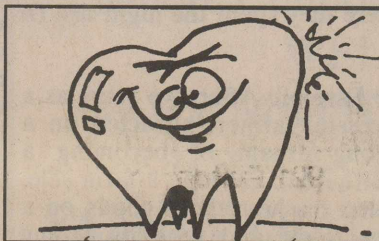
Vinita Olive Davison, 90, died Monday, July 11, 1994.

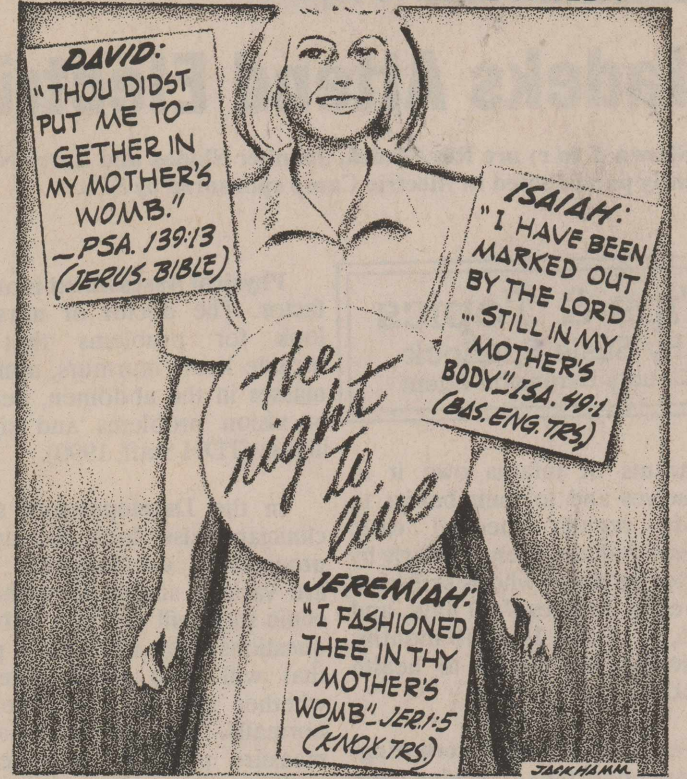

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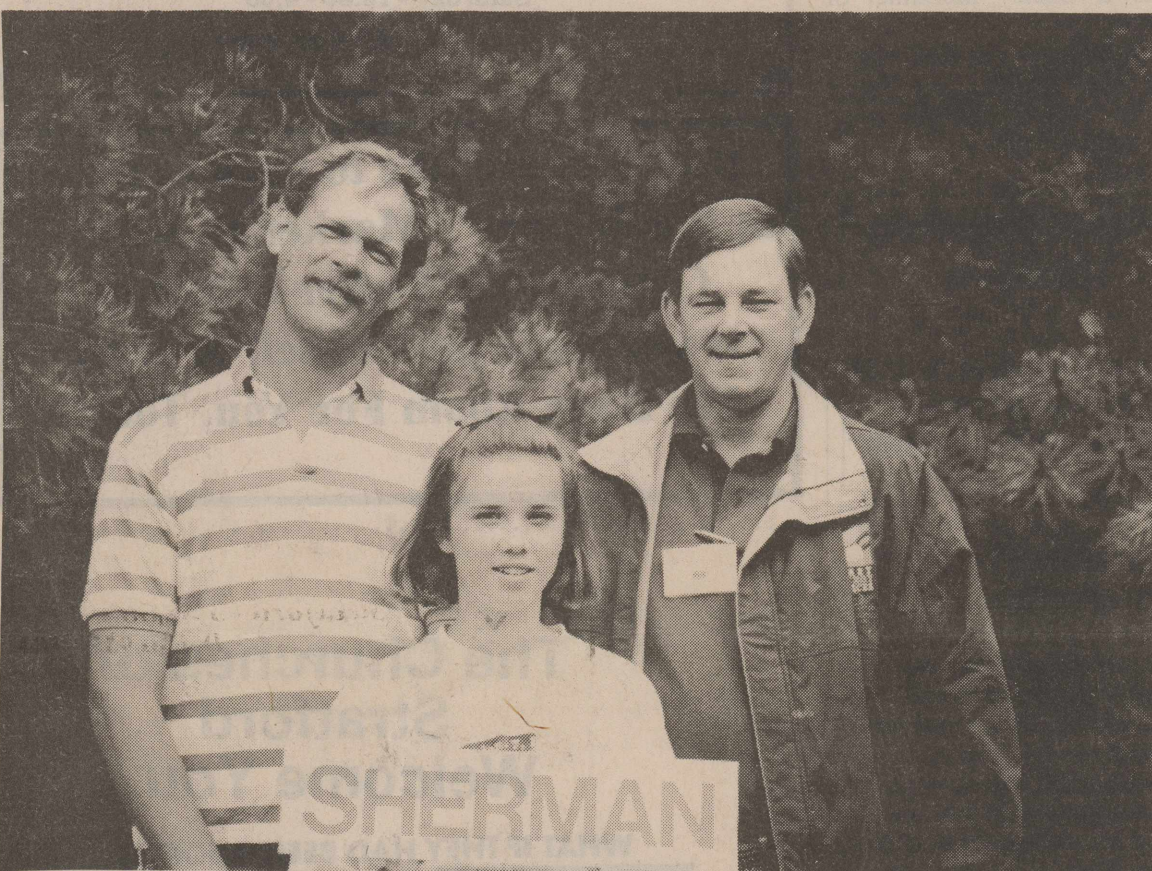

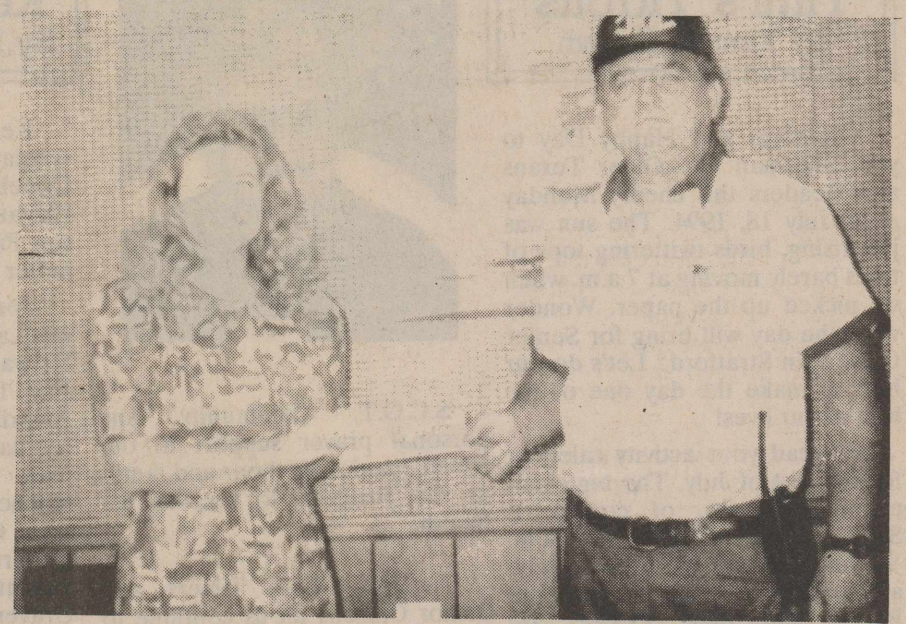

Parents of infants owe it to themselves and to their babies to provide regular medical care. Babies should be seen regularly by a doctor or nurse who is skilled in baby care. At ages 7-10 days, and 2, 4, 6, 9, 12 and 15 to 18 months, the doctor will attend to health concerns.

Weight and height screenings are very important. Tracking gains in length and weight is crucial in helping the doctor or nurse to address the baby's overall health. The baby's growth is usually assessed through measurements of height, weight and head. Head size is checked because a baby's brain reaches about 70 percent of its eventual size during the first year and 80 percent by the end of the second year (Papalia & Olds, 1982). Growth patterns vary tremendously due to a number of factors:

- *Actual length of pregnancy in weeks (40 weeks is average)
- *Size of the baby at birth (19 to 21 inches in length and 7.5 pounds in weight is average)
- *The baby's body type (thin, stocky, etc.)
- *Genetic background (*size of parents)
- *The Baby's diet, exercise activity level and general health.

Babies follow their own unique level and general health.

Babies follow their own unique pattern of growth. Most babies grow in spurts, but in predictable sequences. However, only an experienced clinician will be able to determine if the baby's growth is normal or if something seems to be interfering with the baby's growth.

Physical Assessment is another factor. The doctor or nurse will look for problems that may include heart murmurs, abnormal masses in the abdomen, deafness or vision problems and sign of illness (TDH Staff, 1990).

In the Developmental stages, clinicians also look for delayed progress in development. There are various simple tests that the clinic staff will do on a baby and questions they will ask a parent that will help them determine whether the baby is developing normally. The tests are made to measure physical, adaptive, and social development.

The physical aspect entails reflexes, motor skills, hearing and vision, eye control, hand control, sitting and creeping and standing. Adaptive-Social characteristics include crying, language, socializing, feeding and alertness.

It is important for parents to take their baby for these well-baby visits regularly to discover possible problems and find early solutions.

The doctor or nurse will want to see the baby at 7-10 days for observation of his progress and to repeat the newborn screening test done in the hospital.

The doctor or nurse will:
*Check the baby's length, weight and head circumference and do a complete physical and development assessment.

*Observe how the parent handles the infant. They will reassure the parents and offer help as needed.

*Determine whether the mother is getting enough support and enough rest.

*Discuss the baby's feeding schedule.

Technical Assistance Program Available To Confined Animal Feeding Operators for Site Specific Water Quality Management Plans

Confined animal feeding operations in Sherman County who are not required to have a state or federal water quality permit are advised of the opportunity to receive technical assistance through the Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation District to develop a site specific water quality management plan to prevent or minimize the potential of their operation contributing to a nonpoint source pollution problem.

"The advantage of participating in this program is that if a operator voluntarily develops and maintains a site specific water quality management plan (WQMP) through our district and has that plan certified by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), the operator will be compliant with state water quality law and exempt from other state regulatory processes regarding nonpoint source discharge of pollutants," said Wendell Stacy, chairman of the Sherman County SWCD.

"Of course the producer will have to maintain his or her plan to retain their certification," added Mr. Stacy.

In explaining a water quality management plan, Mr. Stacy said that a WQMP includes appropriate land treatment

practices, production practices, management measures, technologies or any combination to achieve a level of pollution prevention or abatement.

S.B. 503, which was passed in the last regular session of the Texas Legislature names the TSSWCB as the lead agency in Texas for activities relating to abating agricultural and silvicultural nonpoint source pollution.

The TSSWCB is responsible for assuring that individual water quality management plans comply with state water quality standards established by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

"As a result each WQMP developed, maintained and implemented by a landowner or operator through a SWCD must meet rules and criteria adopted by the TSSWCB," said Mr. Stacy.

"With a little fine tuning and certification of an existing soil and water conservation plan for a confined animal feeding operation, a producer might find that his or her operation will adequately meet state water quality goals," said Mr. Stacy.

Best management practice standards will be based on criteria in the current USDA Soil Conservation Service field office technical guide for our district Mr. Stacy said.

Safe Place Hotline

Proof that we have a violent society is everywhere...brutal murders and rapes...neighbors assaulting neighbors. Some experts say that violence on TV makes our children violent because they learn what they see. Others say that children raised in single parent families become violent because of the broken home. What about the children raised in violent homes? An unbelievably high percentage of homes in the USA are violent. Research has shown that children from violent homes learn that violence is a way of life. They learn to hide their feelings, to resolve conflict by hitting and yelling, and that it is acceptable to be violent to people you love. This is an ongoing cycle of raising children to be violent. If you do not believe that we are teaching our own children to be violent, notice what you do the next time you become angry. Then, notice how your children deal with their anger. Notice any similarities?

We need to realize that domestic violence affects everyone. Nationally, 50% of all homeless women and children are on the streets because of violence in the home. 25% to 35% of women who visit medical emergency rooms are there for injuries related to ongoing partner abuse. Tax dollars not only pay for some sever injuries inflicted by batterers, they also pay for court costs and prison time for abusers. Each year approximately 21,000 people are killed in this country; approximately 15,000 of the

homicides are solved. Of those 15,000 victims, 4,400 are killed by someone in their family. My and your tax dollars pay for case time, court trials, prison sentences, and appeals. Also, the next time somebody is the victim of a violent crime, ask yourself if the adult or adolescent criminal was or is a member of a violent home.

In many cases, when a batterer murders an intimate partner or ex-partner, other people are killed. The other people may be friends, new partners, family members, the victim's children, or even the batterer's own children. Many of these murders are brutal, with multiple stab wounds or multiple gun shot wounds; some victims have been beaten to death. Many batterers attempt or commit suicide after murdering their victims. Domestic Violence is everywhere and affects everybody in some way.

Home should be a place where people can be safe and get away from violence. Ironically, this is the most dangerous place for many people. They are abused mentally, physically, and sexually. When you see or hear somebody abusing a partner, call the police. What they are doing is illegal, wrong, and could lead to severe injury or death. If we want to stop violence and violent crimes in the world, we can begin by being aware of our own violence and stopping violence in Sherman County, in our homes.

Oven-Baked Stroganoff

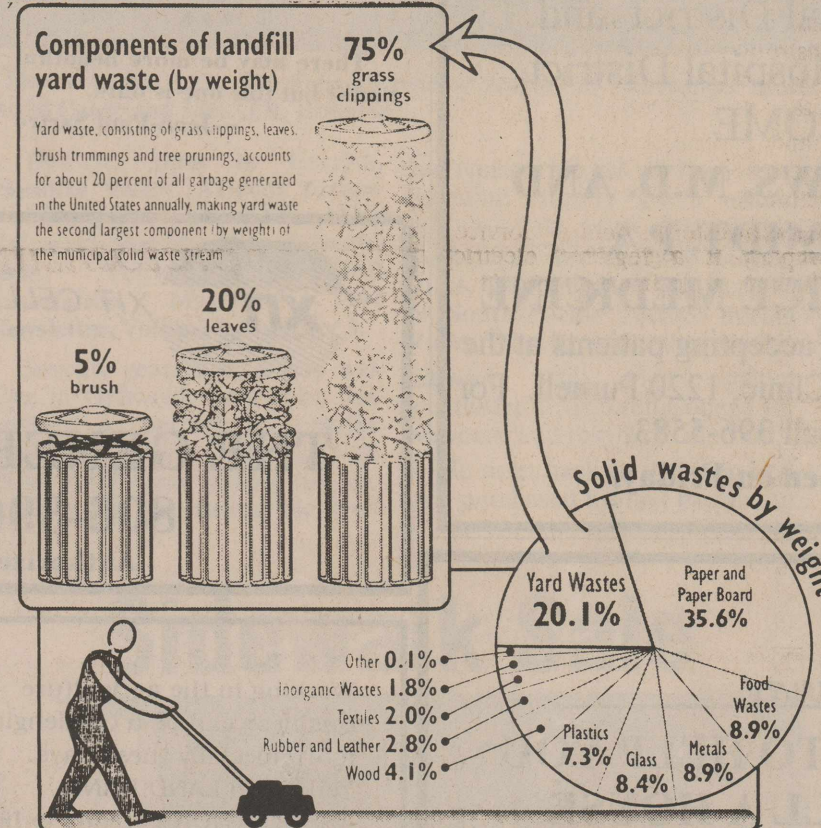
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 2 pounds bottom round beef steak, cut in thin strips
- 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 clove garlic, minced or pressed
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup each dry red wine and tomato paste
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cup beef broth
- 1/2 cup sour cream

Chopped parsley for garnish
In a wide frying pan over medium heat, melt 2 tablespoons of the butter. Add beef strips, about half at a time, and brown on all sides. Transfer strips, as they brown, to a deep 3-quart baking pan. In the same frying pan, melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter; add onion and mushrooms and cook until golden. Remove pan from heat and mix in flour, garlic, salt, pepper, wine, tomato paste, bay leaf, and broth. Stir to blend, then pour mixture over meat.

Cover tightly and bake in 250° convection oven for about 4 hours or until meat is very tender when pierced. Remove from oven and mix in sour cream. Sprinkle with parsley. Makes 6 servings.

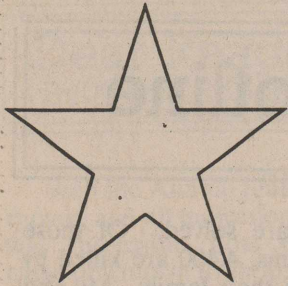
