## Influenza Season

As the old comic line goes-"I felt so bad--OH, how bad was it? It was so bad that my neighbor slammed the door to his house and I thought my bones were going to shake loose. <u>WELL- that's not so bad</u>--Oh yeah-my neighbor lives 3 miles away".

So if you've got the "3 mile aches" then you probably really do have the "flu". But if you've got just a sore throat or nausea, vomiting or available for our patrons. Audrey diarrhea--you don't have influenza.

Do you have a viral illness? Possibly, (that's the most common Harris, provides the reader with a infection causing those symptoms). Isn't the flu a virus? Yes. Is it the first hand account of the actress's same virus? Absolutely not!

The term "flu" has come to mean almost any viral illness that affects more than just a few people. (like polio, measles, mumps, etc) that's the "flu shot", and if you do get sick due to the influenza virus we can treat the symptoms and help you feel better, until it goes away. Bed rest, fluids and tylenol are still the best treatment, and believe me, these people rest in bed! There is a medication, called Amantadine, that helps shorten the course of the illness and lessens the severity but once you've got influenza--you've got it until it goes away, which usually takes 5-7 days.

Almost everyone gets better from influenza, but it's the complications that we are most concerned about (like pneumonia or other secondary bacterial infections) especially in people younger than 2 years old--older than 65 or those of any age who have other medical problems such as diabetes, emphysema, asthma, and high blood pressure.

When to get your immunization (flu shot) is also very important. The peak season for influenza is November through February and getting your shot too early can leave you unprotected late in the season. Unfortunately, we haven't found a vaccine that will last longer or protect you year after year like the polio vaccine does. And often, it's a guide different influenza virus from one year to the next, or several influenza






