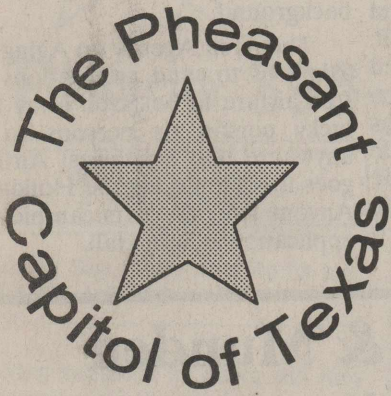

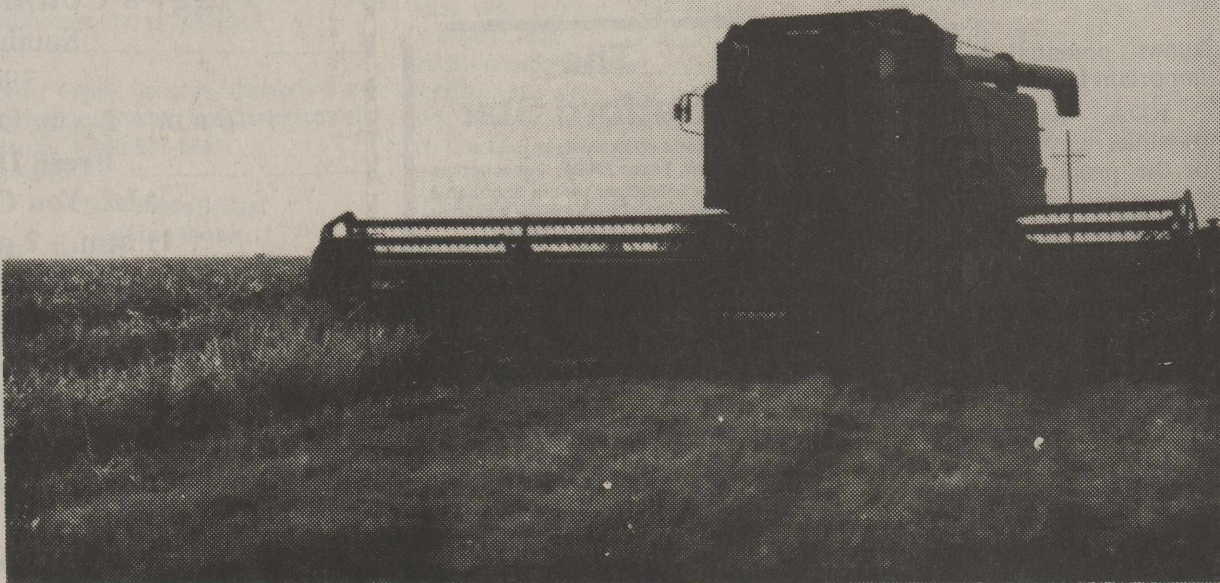

Kimball & Lasley Recently Re-Elected To Board

Kenton Kimball of Stratford and Walter E. Lasley both of Stratford were recently re-elected to the Sherman County SWCD board of directors October 12, 1994. Kimball represents Zone 1 of the district. While Lasley will represent Zone 2.

The purpose of the Sherman County SWCD, with headquarters in Stratford is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 213 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Amarillo VA Hosts Health Fair For Area Veterans

The Amarillo Department of Veterans Affairs will be holding a free Health and Veterans Information Fair in Stratford from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. October 22. The Fair, to be held at the County Barn on Maple Street, is open to all veterans and their families.

The Fair will not only provide health checks and information but will also introduce the VA Medical Center Clinic staff and services to Stratford area veterans in anticipation of the opening of the Stratford Veterans Primary Care clinic. The Clinic, slated to open in November, is an extension of the Amarillo Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center and will provide primary health care services to veterans in and around Sherman County and the Oklahoma Panhandle.

Staff from Amarillo will be on hand to assist veterans in the application process for medical care at the new clinic. Veterans wishing to enroll for medical care should bring copies of their discharge papers to the health fair.

Free health services at the Fair will include: flu shots, cholesterol testing, glucose checks, blood pressure checks, information on AIDS, cancer, advanced directives, veterans eligibility and benefits, osteoporosis, and personalized diets among others.

Roseland Inc. To Open Processing Plant

Roseland Inc. would like to announce that we will soon open our oilseed processing plant located 2 miles east of Etter on F.M. 281. Roseland Inc. now has a crew of five people working at the plant under the supervision of Mr. Bill Lemons. When the plant becomes operational we will employ 12 people in various plant capacities. The installation of some of the final equipment is scheduled for late October and early November. We expect to begin processing later in November, taking in soybeans and producing soybean oil, soybean hulls, and soybean meal. Certain amounts of soybean oil have been sold to vegetable oil refiners in eastern Texas for processing into cooking oils and margarines. The initial meal production will go to local hog farms, and the hulls to area cattle feeders. We are buying soybeans from southwestern Kansas and the Panhandles of Oklahoma and Texas.

Roseland Inc. recently sponsored a booth at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo where information was distributed about the plant and the production of soybeans, sunflower seeds, and canola in the northern High Plains.

We are interested to buy more area soybeans and we welcome any producers of soybeans to call us, at 1-800-295-6754, for our delivered prices. We expect to bid for sunflower seeds in the spring, and will make firm price quotes for the 1995 production of soybeans, sunflowers and canola. Buyers of soybean meal and hulls are also encouraged to call.

PUBLIC NOTIFICATION OF RDA'S FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

The City of Texhoma, Texas has made an application to the Rural Development Administration (RDA) for Federal Assistance for the community of Texhoma, Texas to construct a new wastewater collection system and improvements to the treatment plant in Texhoma, Oklahoma.

The system would include a complete collection system, and lift station and tie into the Texhoma, Oklahoma sewer system and be treated by the Texhoma, Oklahoma, Public Works Authority. The proposed collection system is expected to consist of approximately 3,720 linear feet of eight inch and 11,650 linear feet of six inch sewer collections lines, nineteen manholes, five drop manholes, twelve cleanouts, one duplex lift station and assorted appurtenances. Proposal is to use the effluent to irrigate neighboring range land located to the west of the present treatment plant. If Star, Thursday, October 13, 1994, implemented, the project has no

known potential to impact any important land resources.

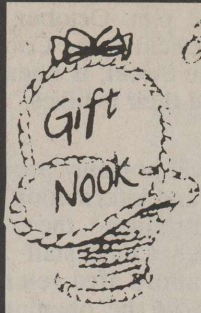
RDA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of the proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, RDA will not prepare an environmental impact statement for this project.

No other federal agencies are participating in the proposed action.

Any written comments concerning this determination should be provided within fifteen (15) days of this publication to Mr. Bobby J. Sparkman Rural Development Specialist, Rural Development Administration, P.O. Box 1946, Plainview, Texas 79073. RDA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen days. Request to review the RDA environmental assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the above listed address.

Prussic Acid Poisoning

Plants of the sorghum group (Johnson grass, sorghum, sudan and hybrid sudan) have a high potential for prussic acid poisoning. These plants have cyanide-containing compounds which are converted to prussic acid is liberated in the rumen, absorbed into the blood and carried to the tissues where this potent toxic interferes with oxygen utilization. If absorbed into the blood and carried to the tissues where this potent toxin interferes with oxygen utilization. If absorbed rapidly, it can cause respiratory paralysis. Early symptoms are labored breathing, frothing at the mouth, irregular pulse and staggering.

Stressed plants should be checked for prussic acid before they are grazed. When growth conditions change due to rainfall, drought, frost, etc., analysis should be conducted to head off problems. If prussic acid is detected, cattle should be removed until analysis shows the prussic acid has dropped.

Delay feeding hay or silage for 4-6 weeks to allow for breakdown of the prussic acid.

A sodium nitrite-sodium thiosulfate combination can be administered as an antidote. It must be injected intravenously very slowly. The dosage, and administration are critical. The toxic principal works very rapidly, so speed of detection is important.

Suspect forage can be checked for nitrate and prussic acid at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab, 6610 Amarillo Blvd. West, Amarillo, Texas 79106 or at many local labs. About a 1 pound sample that is representative of the forage should be submitted through your local veterinarian. Cost for the tests are:

Prussic Acid-\$5.00 per sample
Nitrate-\$6.00 per sample.

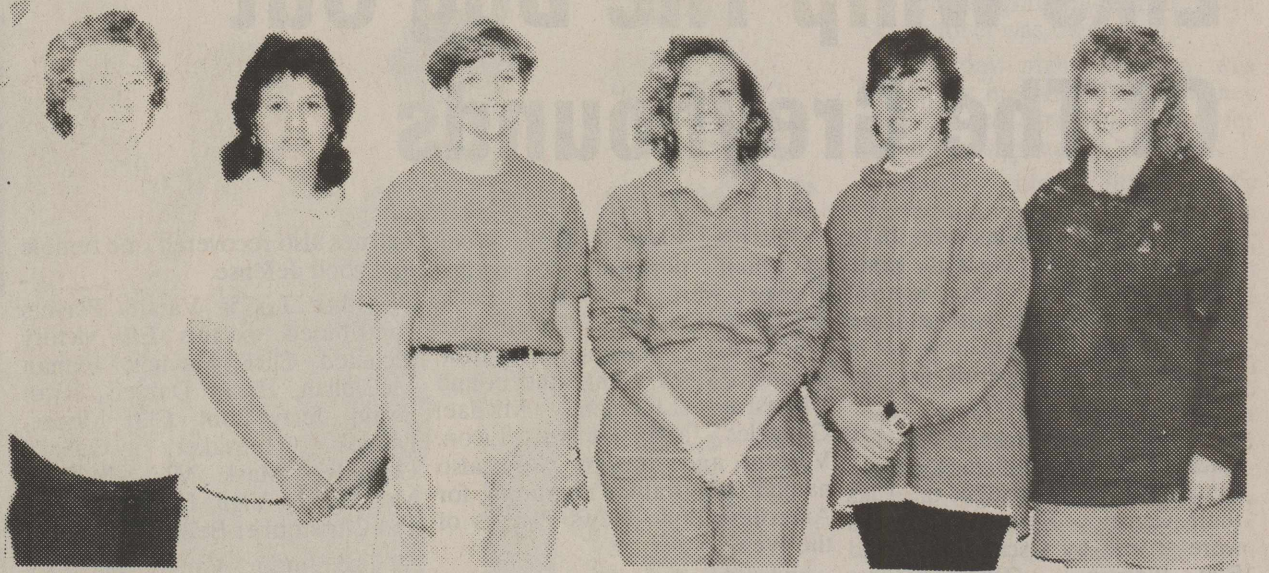

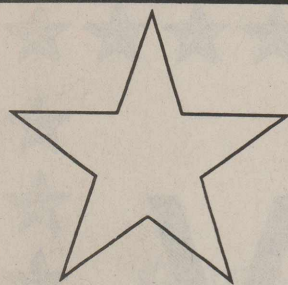

Mr. Fleming asked that those who need farm credit as a result of hail, high winds, tornadoes and excessive rain make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 310 Rock Island Avenue, Dalhart, Texas 79022.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until 04/17/95 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. Fleming said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

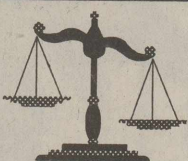

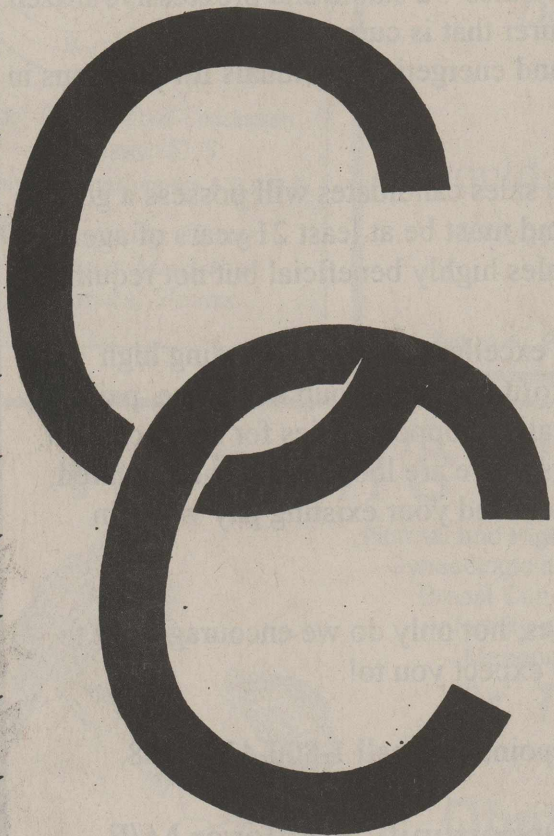

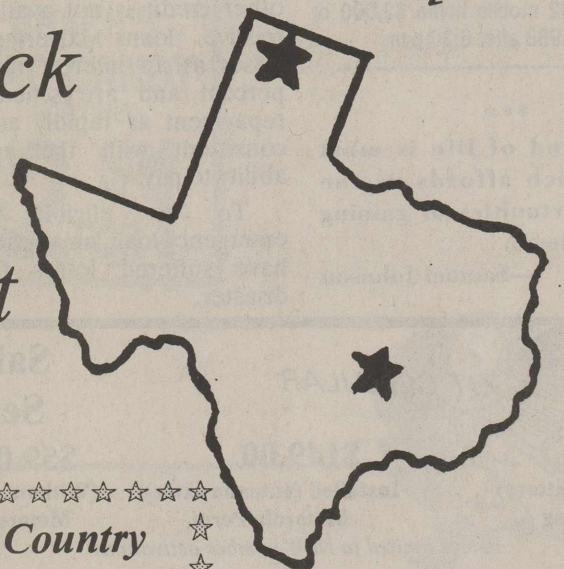
