Prussic Acid **Poisoning**

Plants of the sorghum group (Johnson grass, sorghum, sudan and hybrid sudan) have a high potential for prussic acid poisoning. These plants have cyanide-containing compounds which are converted to prussic acid is liberated in the rumen, absorbed into the blood and carried to the tissues where this potent toxic interferes with oxygen utilization. If prussic acid is detected, cattle should be removed until analysis shows the prussic acid has dropped.






