The City of Stratford recently put up the towns Christmas lights. The City has certainly got in the Christmas spirit with all the holiday decorations and lights that have been put up.

12-01: Officers assisted the Fire Department in responding to a pickup fire in the 600 Blk S. Pearl. The owner had put the fire out before the Fire Dept. arrived. Officers also responded to a criminal mischief call in the 500 Blk. N. Chestnut where a pickup window was shot out with a BB Gun. Officers also responded to the 400 Blk. Pine in reference to a truck window being shot out by a BB gun. Officers then responded to a call or a truck blocking the drive at Crossroads. The driver was located ad advised to move the truck. Officers again assisted the Fire Department by blocking traffic.

12-02: Officers received a complaint of person(s) unknown stealing a Christmas decoration and approximately 60 lights from the 600 Blk. Purnell. Officers also responded to an Alarm at the First State Bank. The alarm had been accidently set off.

They have to have the windows replaced, turn in a claim with their insurance company, and are left with a feeling of insecurity. The police department will follow-up any lead we receive to assure the person or persons involved are prosecuted to the extent of the law.

Breast Cancer Screening To Be Held

The Women's Center of the Don & Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at First United Methodist Church, 520 N. North Main on December 8, 1994 from 10:00 to 2:30 p.m.

Breast cancer affects one in nine women. The Key to boosting your chances of winning the battle against cancer are early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a registered nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our mammography machine is certified by the American College of Radiology ensuring a quality film.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier



Experts on behavior modification state that the best defense against diet disaster during the holiday is a combination of planning and strategy:

*Plan ahead. Before you go out, think about the food that may be available. Think through what your best choices will be and fit them into your diet goals. On special party days, eat lightly at other meals to balance the calories and fat in your party food. Eat a high-fiber fruit snack about one half hour before the party to curb your appetite.
