Reese honors 'best' of 1978

Salutes Senior NCO, NCO, Airman of Year

Two members of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron (CE) and one from the 3500th Resource Management Squadron have been named as Reese's top enlisted personnel for 1978.

Selections for the Senior Noncommissioned Officer (NCO, NCO and Airman of the Year Awards were announced at a special awards banquet here last Friday.

Named as the Senior NCO for '78 was RM's SMSgt. Guy A. Chauvin, Traffic Management Office supervisor. TSgt. Bradley L. Charters, a quality control technician in CE, was honored as the NCO of the Year. Top airman honors went to another CE worker, A1C David J. Anderson, a construction equipment operator.

Nineteen bluesuiters were nominated from various base units for the awards. Winning selections were based on on-the-job knowledge and performance, off-duty involvement in community affairs and the results of selection board interviews.

Chief Master Sergeant Al Chock, Reese's senior enlisted advisor, announced the winners while Colonel Charles E. Bishop, 64th Flying Training Wing commander presented the three men with certificates of recognition. Adding to the list of honors was Bill McMillan, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Armed Services Committee, who presented each of the men with a special plaque.

The awardees also received \$50 U.S. Savings Bonds, courtesy of the NCO Academy Graduates Association. All nominees received desk sets, from the Reese Federal Credit Union and Lubbock National Bank.

Senior NCO of Year

Sergeant Chauvin, who supervises five of the Traffic Management Office sections, additionally served at the TMO officer here since May. He continued his personal education in 1978, enrolling in traffic management courses through Chicago College and completing two other technical courses.

When Reese kicked off the Combined Federal Campaign this year, the Korean veteran became the transportation monitor and doubled the unit's 1977 record for contributions. An active member of the Reese Catholic Parish, Sergeant Chauvin supports many charitable and service programs on and off base.

NCO of the Year


Sergeant Charters is noted for management expertise and is credited by his supervisors for significant improvements in the Base Engineer Automated Management System.


Working toward a bachelor of science degree, the Oregon native is currently enrolled in a sociology course at South Plains College. His natural



As we enter into the new year, it's too bad we're not endowed as was the Roman god Janus, for whom our month of January is named. He had two faces, on opposite sides of his head so he could look forward and backward at the same time.

If we were similarly constructed, as we move forward into 1979, we could be gazing backward, assessing the past year. All in all, I believe we'd conclude that it was a good year for Air Training Command.

Perhaps one of the most important events occurred when Air University joined the command. With that move ATC, already successfully administering all initial flying, technical and military training in the Air Force

— the best in the world — also assumed responsibility for AU's vast education complex.

In another important area, ATC proved its readiness capacity beyond doubt by successfully participating with operational commands in a series of readiness exercises here and overseas.

Naturally, there were problems and challenges. I compliment each of you, military and civilian, on your splendid work in 1978. You have served your country well. I am confident that you will continue to do so in 1979.

In other words if you have personalized checks from another bank they are charging you 25¢ for the check to write it. I think that it is extremely unfair.

Lubbock National Bank (LNB) has provided

banking services to Reese since 1957. Many of the services, including check cashing, have always been without charge to military members and civilian employees who work on Reese.

Recently, however, drastic increases in operating costs have caused LNB to reconsider past policies. Two of the major expenses identified to the Reese facility were the costs of providing cash to cover the checks of non-LNB depositors and the collection and write-off costs of dishonored checks.

In view of the unique situation faced by the military member and a desire by LNB to continue serving its Reese customers, a "fee schedule" for check cashing was implemented rather than a more restrictive policy patterned after that exercised by other banks in the area. The fee schedule published in Reese Bulletin Nr. 96, Dec. 14, appears reasonable and is in accordance with AFR 170-7, Banking Services on Air Force Bases.

I, along with LNB officials, regret that a continuation of free check cashing is not possible. If you wish to discuss specific banking problems or need financial advice, Maj. Roy Markle, Comptroller and Bank Liaison Officer, is available at ext. 3518.

Human Relations key to success

Human Relations and supervision go hand in hand. In order to be effective as a supervisor you must practice good human relations.

A previous article on human relations and supervision dealt with being fair to your people, not allowing favoritism, and being receptive to ideas. In this article, I will address the need of being considerate, the art of giving constructive feedback, and the skills of listening and responding.

• Be considerate: Nothing contributes more to building a strong, hard working, loyal team than a considerate supervisor. We

need to be courteous to superiors and subordinates alike. Put yourself in their place before making decisions affecting them. Know that they have pride, individual personalities, and selfrespect. You will get much more effective work by treating those characteristics as assets rather than by trampling on them.

• Be constructive in your criticism: If you criticize, be sure it's the method and not the motive that is being questioned. Get all the facts. Suggest a constructive course of action. After all, telling someone that what they did wrong is useless unless you also tell them how to correct it and how to avoid the same mistake in the future. If

you can, precede the criticism by a bit of praise. No one likes to be "put down" and left there!

• Be willing to listen and respond: Establish two-way communication. Do not dominate the conversation. The best way to encourage communications is to find out what is important to your subordinates. Ask questions, draw him or her out and get to know them personally, not just as numbers or cogs in the machinery.

Being a supervisor in today's Air Force is a challenging and rewarding job. It is not a job that can be done by just anyone. It takes a special person to be an effective supervisor — a person with pride and committment to a never ending challenge.

CO - the silent killer

Carbon monoxide, or CO, is often called the silent killer because it is an odorless, tasteless, and nonirritating gas that can kill you under certain conditions.

This article looks at CO, where it is found, how it is dangerous, first aid, and some preventive measures.

Carbon monoxide is probably one of the oldest and most dangerous gases known to man. Carbon monoxide is formed anytime there is incomplete combustion or anytime something is burned with an insufficient air supply. Carbon monoxide is especially noteworthy during cold weather because water, gas, and coal heaters can be sources of CO if they are improperly vented. Automobile exhaust contains carbon monoxide; hence it is dangerous in enclosed areas.

Charcoal fires produce CO so they too can be dangerous in enclosed spaces.

Carbon monoxide is dangerous because it combines with the hemoglobin of the blood, thus reducing the oxygen carrying capability of the blood. This in-turn deprives the body of its normal supply of oxygen. This can lead to asphyxiation. or death by suffocation.

Carbon monoxide "poisoning" usually shows up with such symptoms as a throbbing headache, weakness, confusion, and/or vomiting, and a flushed or reddish appearance. As exposure increases, the confusion may become more severe, so that a person may not be able to help themself, and may require the assistance of

First aid for CO "poisoning" initially consists of removing the victim to a source of fresh air. Second, get medical help as soon as possible, even if the patient appears to be recovered.

With these first aid measures in mind, lets look at ways to prevent CO "poisoning". (1) Make sure gas, water and coal heaters are well vented. (2) Do not run cars, trucks, etc. in enclosed areas for any length of time. If you must warm up your car pull it outside. (3) If you have a faulty exhaust system on your vehicle, get it fixed. (4) Do not use charcoal grills or stoves in an enclosed area for heating. Never use charcoal in a tent or camper trailer, "It's better to be cold than dead."

These are not all the known measures that can prevent CO poisoning but these are some of the most important. Remember, Carbon Monoxide can be fatal it is a killer. Stay away from it and stay alive.

Marijuana

What you should know

Q. Does marijuana use cause chromosome damage in humans?

A. Chromosome damage due to marijuana use or abuse is unlikely. Results from past studies have been contradictory. One study has reported chromosome breakage with marijuana use, while another study has demonstrated a higher rate of chromosome breakage in persons not using marijuana.

Five other studies have not been able to establish a relationship between marijuana use and chromosome

In the study reporting chromosome damage with



marijuana use, the rate of chromosome breakage with marijuana use was comparable to that of Valium (most commonly prescribed tranquilizer in this country), aspirin, or color television.

The test subjects involved in this study were taking more than one drug. Therefore, the results of this study are considered unreliable.

Bishop gets Holloman assignment

Col. Charles E. Bishop, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, will be reassigned to Holloman AFB, N.M., effective March 1.

Colonel Bishop will assume command of Tactical Training Holloman, a unit of the Tactical Air Command. He will be replacing Col. Samuel Johnson.

Computing WAPS can be confusing

by MSgt. James H. Shomper The promotion and testing office has received several inquiries concerning Promotion Cycle 80A 6/7. These questions indicate many people are confused about how the Weighted Airman Promotions

system (WAPS) works. In order to better understand WAPS, people should become familiar with the terms below:

• Testing Cycle - Test Cycles were established to distribute the administrative workload involved in testing. Testing Cycle for Cycle 80A 6/7 began Jan. 1 and ends March 31.

 Promotion Eligibility Cutoff Date (PECD) - This date is established as the last day of the month preceding the Testing Cycle. PECD for Cycle 80A 6/7 was Dec. 31. PECD is of major importance as all APRs, decorations and skill level requirements must meet this cutoff date to be considered in the promotion cycle.

• Promotion Cycle - The increment months of a cycle. Cycle 80A 6/7 begins Aug. 1, and ends July 1, 1980. The promotion cycle is the basis from which Date of Rank (DOR), Time in Service (TIS) and Time in Grade (TIG) requirements are computed.

• Study Reference - AF Pamphlet 39-8 lists study references for each AFSC and can be reviewed in your Orderly

Room. Airmen compete, test and are selected for promotion in the Control AFSC they have on their PECD (Dec. 31).

The first major subject that should be addressed is the computation of the WAPS points and the factors involved. There are 6 factors which make up the WAPS system. Each factor is given a point value, maximum total score is 460 points. Listed below are the factors involved, maximum score for each factor, and how the scores are computed. This information may be found in AFR 39-29, Table 8.

 Specialty Knowledge Test (SKT) - Maximum score is 100 points. Individual score is based on the percent answered correctly.

• Promotion Fitness Exam (PFE) - Maximum score is 100 points. Individual score is based on the percent answered correctly.

• Time In Service (TIS) Maximum score is 40 points. Two points are awarded for each year of Total Active Federal Military Service (TAFMS) up to 20 years, as of the last day of the last month of the promotion cycle (July 31, 1980). One sixth point is credited for each month of TAFMS (15 days or more are counted one sixth point, periods of less than 15 days are dropped).

McClellan to be energy showcase

McClellan AFB, Calif., has been selected as one of three Department of Defense installations to serve as a showcase for innovative energy

Sacramento Air Logistics Center at McClellan will be used to demonstrate new coal-fired boiler technology, windgenerated energy, solar-energy uses, electrical-mechanical conversion systems and conservation measures.

Air Force Logistics Command officials estimate the project will cost between \$100-\$300 million for the McClellan phase. Selected buildings throughout the base will also be used to test new technology.


