AFAF drive starts Wednesday

The Air Force Assistance Fund, the only campaign conducted solely for and by Air

Force people, will kick off here Wednesday morning. Although the campaign won't

"officially" get underway here until Wednesday, local officials have been preparing for the

drive for several weeks. Last week, Maj. Jon Wingo, AFAF project officer, met with his unit project officers to formulate plans for this year's campaign.

AFAF workers will be shooting for at least \$7,663 before the campaign's conclusion on March 30. Last year Reese people donated more than \$10,800 to the fund. In 1978, Reese helped stake the Air Training Command to a record setting \$329,262 total. This year the command goal is \$231,245. Air Force wide, AFAF officials hope to top the \$2.8 million figure.

Working with Major Wingo as unit project officers are: Capt. Tim Finnegan, (3409) wing staff; Capt. David Fintel, Hospital Squadron (3186); Capt. Dennis Eflien, Operations (3851); 1st Lt. Karen Hagauer, Resource Management (3617); 2nd Lt. William Schurr III, Maintenance (3572); Capt. Kelly Cartron, 1958th Com-

munications Squadron (3179) and 1st Lt. Cloretta Yates, Air Base Group (3420).

Anyone wishing to contribute to the drive but that doesn't hear from a key worker within the first few days of the campaign should contact the project officer in his or her organization.

Contributions to the AFAF support three agencies whose

Social Actions, Information earn 'best in ATC' awards

Proof that 1978 was a "very" good year for the 64th Flying Training Wing continues to come in as two wing staff agencies have been added to the roll of base units honored by Air Training Command.

Social Actions and the Information Office have been selected as best in ATC at the wing level for 1978. Earlier this year the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron was named as the best CE unit in the command.

Both Maj. Vincent P. Micucci, Social Actions chief, and Capt. Robert A. Brus, Information chief, agree on what made their perspective units stand out in '78.

"Strong support of our programs by base people and a dedicated staff were the keys for us," said Major Micucci. "From command personnel on down,

folks gave the information staff top notch support all year," echoed Captain Brus.

Winning the best in command honors was especially gratifying for the two wing staff members. Both programs had fallen on hard times before Major Micucci stepped in at Social Actions and Captain Brus took over the helm of the Information Office.

In the recent ATC Inspector General visit, the two units were among the most highly praised on base.

Involvement key

Stressing involvement, on base and in the local community, the Social Actions staff produced one of the most active programs in ATC last year. Social Actions personnel beefed up existing programs on base, added new ones such as

the Personal Assistance Center and extended their efforts into several community programs. Major Micucci became an active member of many South Plains committee's and councils.

Members of the staff working in Social Actions include Major Micucci, TSgt. Clyde McDonald, TSgt. Doug Stevens, SSgt. Bill Goodrich, Sgt. Catie Crow and Lyn King. First Lt. John Ebron and SSgt. Gilbert Gallow were members of the Social Actions team in '78, but, have left for new assignments. SSgt. Dave Davis also worked in the unit, but, cross-trained late last year. He was replaced in January by SSgt. Tommy Chmitlin.

Risner addresses UPT grads

Retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Robinson Risner will be the guest speaker for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 78-03 graduation ceremonies this morning in the base theater.

General Risner, who was the vice-commander of the Air Force Tactical Fighter Weapons Center at Nellis AFB, Nev., before his retirement in 1976, will address the 34-member

graduating class shortly after 10 a.m.

A native of Mammoth Spring, Ark., he spent 33 years in the service. During the Korean conflict he flew more than 100 combat missions in the F-86, destroying eight enemy aircraft. He was the 20th jet ace in Korea.

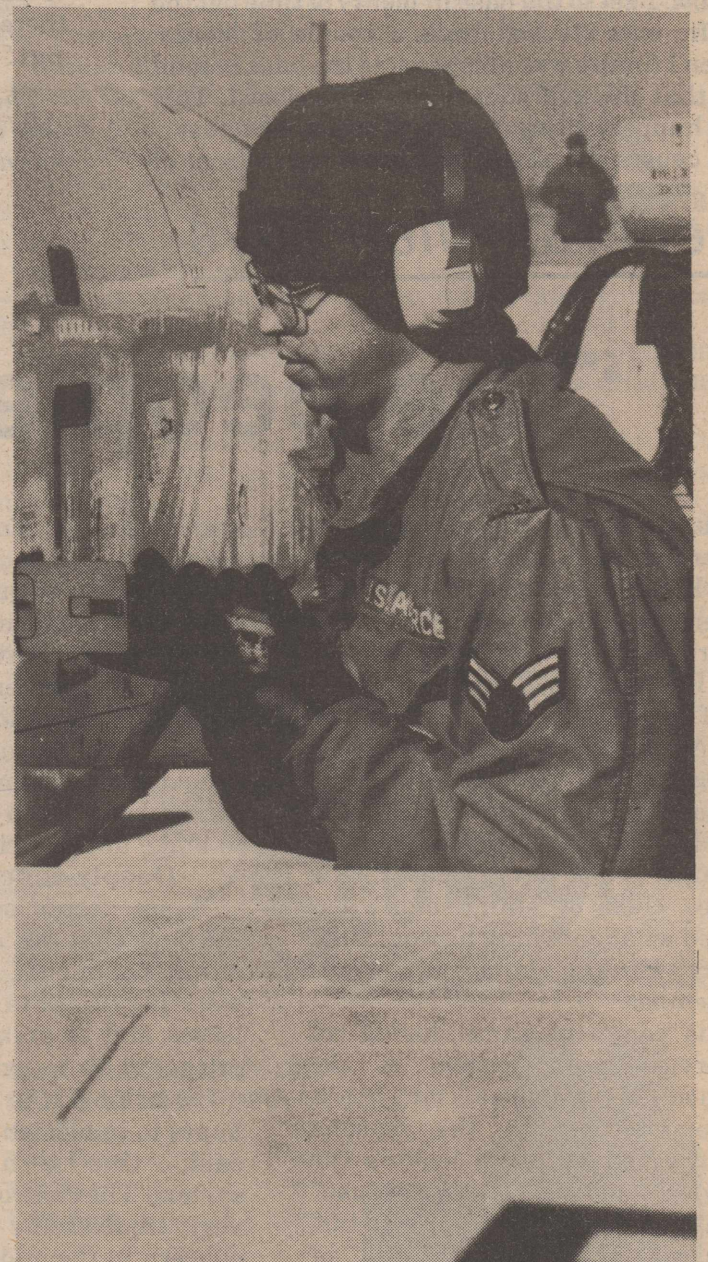
In the Vietnam era General Risner flew the F-105 Thunderchief into combat. He

was shot down over North Vietnam in April of 1965. Rescued and returned to duty, he was shot down again in September of 1965 and held prisoner in Hanoi for seven years and six months.

In November of 1974, just 21 months after his final rescue, he was initiated into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame.

Just some of the ways the AFAF can be used to help smooth "troubled water" are:

- Air Force Aid Society loans or grants for emergencies and for dependents education.

- Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows Home at Fort Walton Beach, Fla., which has a primary purpose of caring for needy widows but also accepts retired enlisted

persons and their spouse age 62 or older.

- Air Force Village in San Antonio, a home for widows of Air Force Officers, retired officers and their spouses. A key feature in the benefits is that no qualified applicant shall ever be refused admission because of an inability to pay.

You might ask, "Why should I contribute to one of the retirement villages — I will never live there." Few of us know what our personal situation will be 20 or 30 years from now. A realistic approach is to consider the retirement homes as insurance. They will be there should you ever need them. Further, should you die unexpectedly your widow and children may stay at the respective village

for up to one year until your widow can make appropriate plans for the future.

Also, the Air Force Aid Society has liberalized its policies for emergency assistance loans and grants; changes include an increase in loan limit and a new loan category for automobile repairs and insurance.

Our wing goal this year is \$7,663. We can contribute through payroll deductions, which is both painless and effective. At the same time, the benefits accruing from the AFAF may be those that ultimately provide security for you, your family, or for the many others in the Air Force.

Gate closed

The reason I am calling is because of the traffic this morning (Jan. 31).

I was about 10 minutes late in getting to work and the reason why is because I had to wait in line at the front gate on 4th street about 15 or 20 minutes.

Now, I get to the base in plenty of time but the traffic was stacked back a couple of blocks. When I finally was able to get to the base I found out that the golf course gate was closed. This has happened two or three times in the past.

It causes a real traffic hazard out in front of

the base, simply because the people are anxious to get on the base and they cut through the Credit Union parking lot on 4th street and try to push each other out of the way. It is going to wind up with a bad wreck out there.

Apparently it was just due to the Security Police being late in opening up the gate and I can't understand how this happens. It is going to cause somebody to have a bad pile up out there.

The Security Police received an alarm from one of the base fund facilities at 7:42 that morning.

Established security procedures require that the gates to the base be closed until it is known whether the alarm is simply an equipment malfunction or an actual robbery. After responding to the alarm, the preliminary investigation by the Security Police showed there was no robbery and the gates were reopened for normal traffic at 7:56 a.m.

The Security Police fully recognize the effect that these emergency responses have upon traffic and they make every effort to reopen the gates as soon as possible. Please indulge the security procedures on base because they are worth your patience.

General Allen says

'The people . . . are the Air Force'

(Editor's Note: The following is excerpted from an interview with Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Lew Allen Jr. in the Armed Forces Journal. The interview appears in the February 1979 issue.)

"The people in the Air Force are the Air Force: their character, their integrity and the words of duty, honor, country — are really the words and values that don't change." Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force chief of staff, said when asked what one thing he would like every airman and officer to remember.

His comment came during an interview with writers of the Armed Forces Journal.

Commenting on the reasons often given by pilots leaving the service, such as "Mickey Mouse" treatment and erosion of benefits, General Allen said, "Those, of course, are not the only reasons,

and I'm not sure they're the dominant ones.

"One of the phenomena that we face now, and did not face for some years, is the availability and anticipated greater availability of airline jobs for pilots. Some of our people are attracted by such considerations, and the surge in hiring gives them an opportunity to make another choice.

Deeply concerned . . .

"I am deeply concerned about the fact that we do lose a large number of pilots. . . . We . . . have to work very hard to minimize those losses and to make the career as attractive as we possibly can."

Describing the initiatives he hopes to implement, General Allen said, "One is a revised OER system. The controlled OER was a very troublesome thing—a great concern in the middle captain and major age group. . . . There are a lot

of theoretical arguments about whether it was a good system or a bad system, but they're a little academic—the fact is that for whatever reasons, the system was not liked by the people it was applied to.

"Therefore, I decided to stop the controlled OER, and we'll work for a better approach in the future. But at least for the moment, we removed a source of annoyance.

Mickey Mouse aspect . . .

"Another aspect—the 'Mickey Mouse' kind of thing—deals not just with pilots, but with people throughout the Air Force. Does one have an excessive amount of regulation, additional duties, burdensome and unnecessary training requirements, and other demands which are too time consuming for their contribution to the primary mission?"

Asked what one thing he would like to accomplish as chief of staff, General Allen said, "My views have probably changed a little. I would have originally associated that question with some particular force characteristic of the Air Force—an MX, or a strategic system, for example."

No doubt . . .

"There is just no doubt in my mind that the thing I would like to do—it'll be hard for anyone else to measure, so I will only have to know it myself when I leave, in my own assessment—is to contribute to continuing the character of the Air Force as an institution during the time I'm in it, not to destroy it, and to have established more firmly the characteristics that will preserve it into the future and improve it."

ATC commander stresses helping each other out

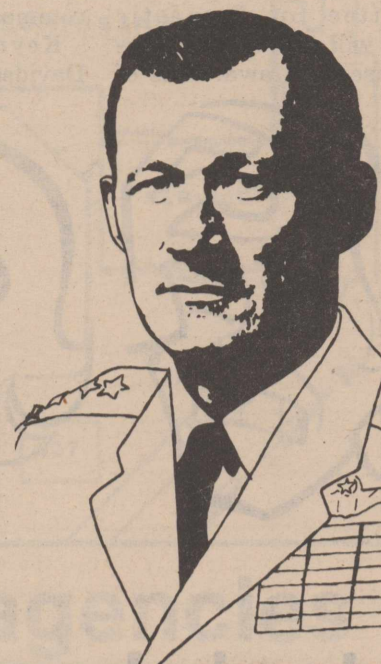
The first 21 Air Force Reservists accepted for return to active duty under the reactivated Voluntary Reserve Return Program (700 have applied so far) have given many reasons for their desire to return.

But according to an article in a recent issue of the Air Force News Service, one particular one has surfaced over and over again. It has to do with "family." Said one returnee, "My wife and I were filled with a sense of 'we're coming home again.'" Another: "I missed the closeness of being in the military family." Yet another: "The decision to come back was (based on) this feeling of belonging."

I mention this because it points up graphically one of the most attractive aspects of Air Force life, but one which — accustomed as we are to living with it day by day — we sometimes forget.

However, we are reminded of it each year when we are given the opportunity to contribute to the Air Force Assistance Fund — to prove again that "the Air Force takes care of its own."

Widow's home offers security

Teresa Village, Fort Walton Beach, Fla., is the location of the Enlisted Widows Home. This is a non-profit charitable corporation operated exclusively for the benefit of enlisted Air Force members and their dependents.

The primary purpose of the home is to care for needy widows and widowers.

The young enlisted man's wife, whose husband dies suddenly is also eligible for residency, along with her dependent children, while they

adjust to life without husband and father.

Another objective of the home is to provide a residence for widows and widowers, age 55 or older, and a limited number of retired enlisted members, age 62 or older, and their spouses, at a price they can afford.

Residents of Teresa Village are provided an apartment which includes free maintenance and an array of recreational and social features designed to provide a relaxing way of life.

Contributions to the Enlisted

Widows Home are used to assist those whose earnings are insufficient for them to pay rent and continue to meet their personal needs and obligations.

A small staff headed by a retired Air Force chief master sergeant carries out the administrative and support functions of the organization as directed by the Board of Directors. Managed for and by enlisted personnel, Teresa Village's staff is supplemented by local professionals, many of whom serve without payment or only token payment.

Counseling program ends successful run

An extremely successful 14-month experiment in "people helping people" came to a conclusion this month at Reese.

The Personal Assistance Center established back in December, 1977 has terminated operation. Authorized by Col. Charles Bishop, 64th Flying Training Wing Commander, to provide a counseling resource for assigned personnel, the PAC was staffed with volunteer counselors who donated their time and energy to assist others experiencing personal problems.

During the 14 months of operation, 72 cases involving 96 individuals were worked by PAC counselors. The vast majority (86 per cent) of PAC clients completing an evaluation of the program expressed gratitude for a very positive and helpful counseling experience.

With the advent of a mental health facility in the Reese Hospital, counseling assistance will be available there in the near future. A report on the PAC experience has been submitted through Air Force channels recommending this option for bases without a mental health resource.

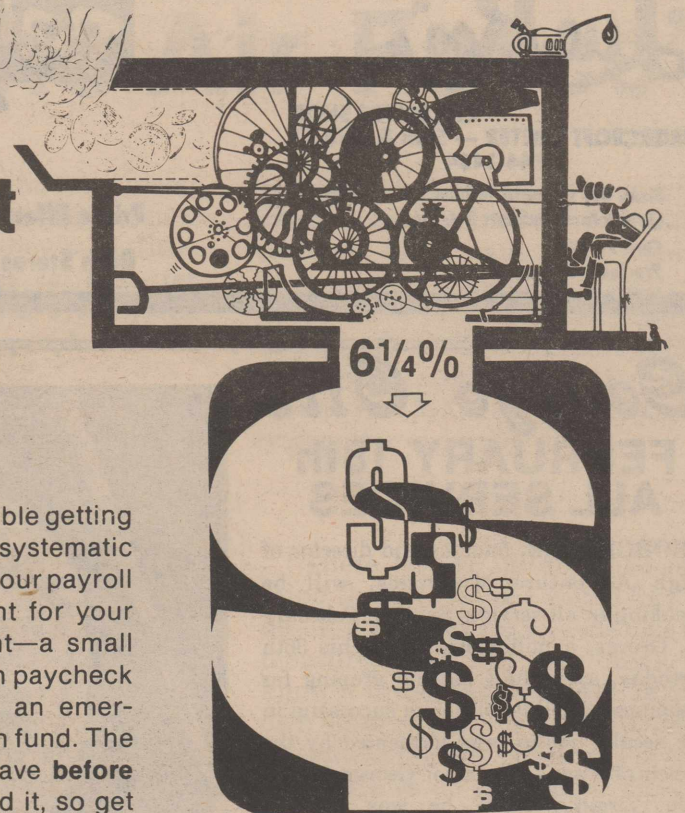

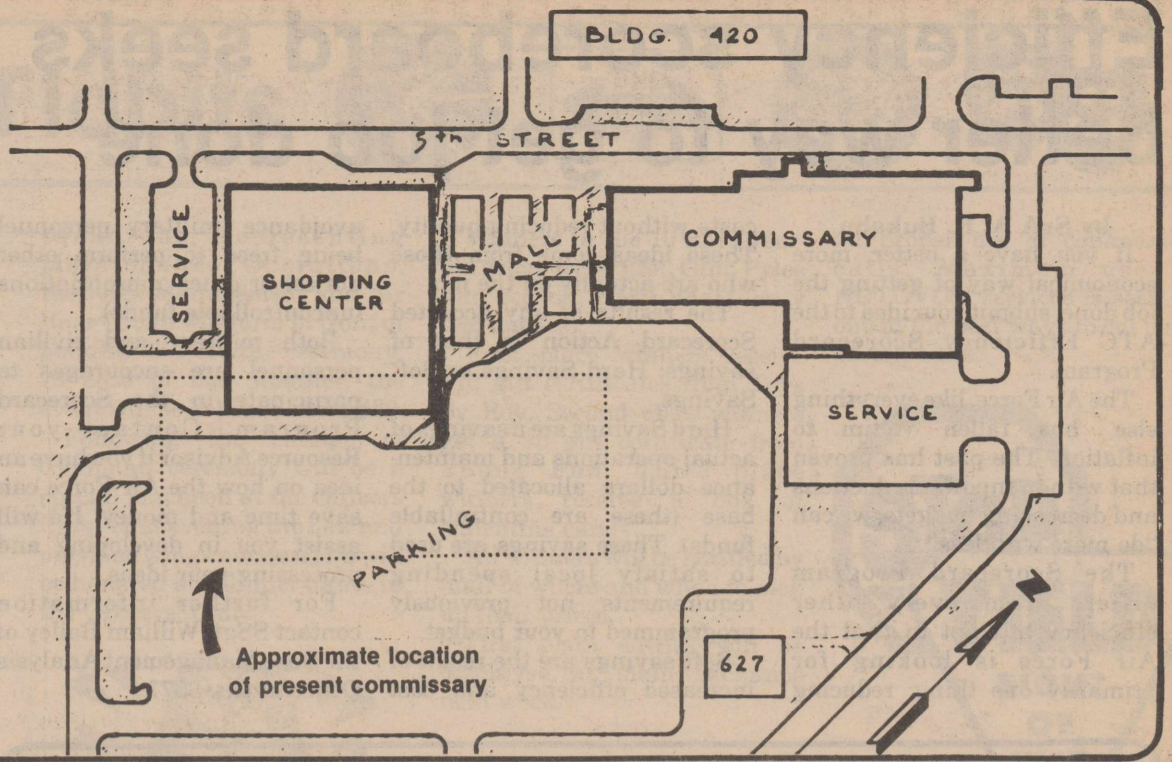

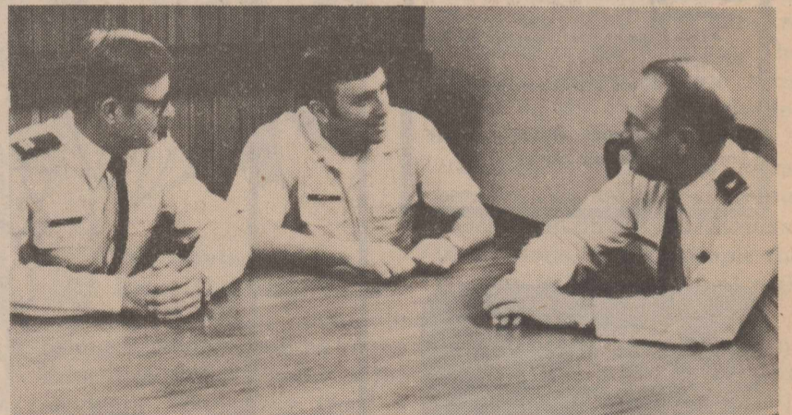
brought sound management techniques into the program. Through improved organization, the office was able to make impressive strides in areas such as community relations and public information while providing the base with its most comprehensive internal information program in several years.

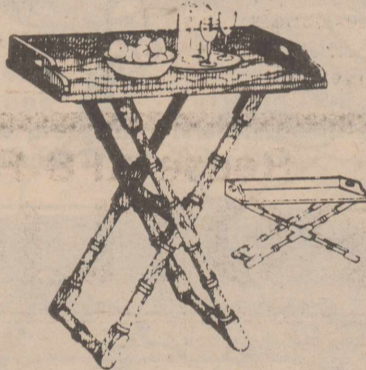

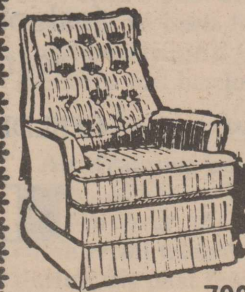

If you have a better, more economical way of getting the job done, submit your idea to the ATC Efficiency Scorecard Program.

The Air Force, like everything else, has fallen victim to inflation. The past has proven that with manpower reductions and decreasing budgets, we can "do more with less".

The Scorecard Program differs from every other efficiency attempt in that the Air Force is looking for primarily one thing: reducing

costs without reducing quality. These ideas come from those who are actually on the job.

The results of any accepted Scorecard Action is that of savings: Hard Savings or Soft Savings.

Hard Savings are a savings of actual operations and maintenance dollars allocated to the base (these are controllable funds). These savings are used to satisfy local spending requirements not previously programmed in your budget.

Soft savings are the result of increased efficiency and cost

avoidance (military personnel being freed to perform other duties) or other appropriations (uncontrollable funds).

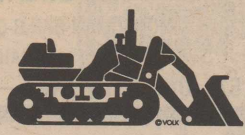

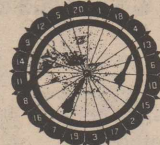

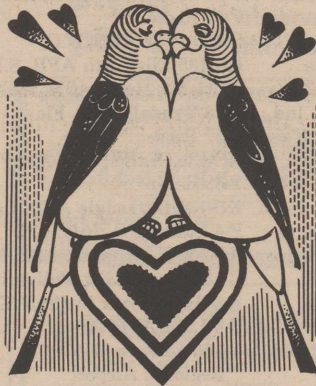
Change of command

First place entries will be displayed at main exchange next week.

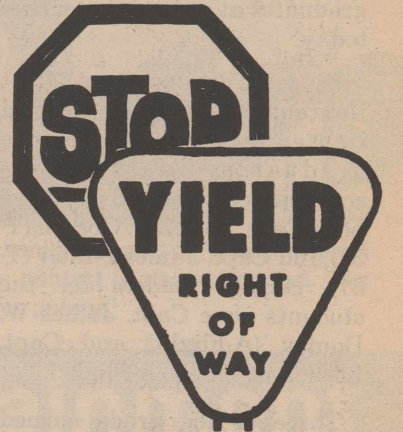
Respecting retirees

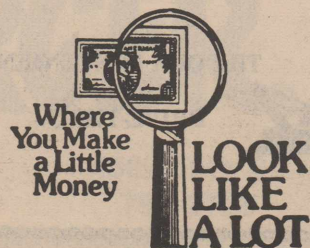



Reese military personnel 35-years-old and older now have to "walk" through their physical fitness test, according to recent change made by Air Force officials.

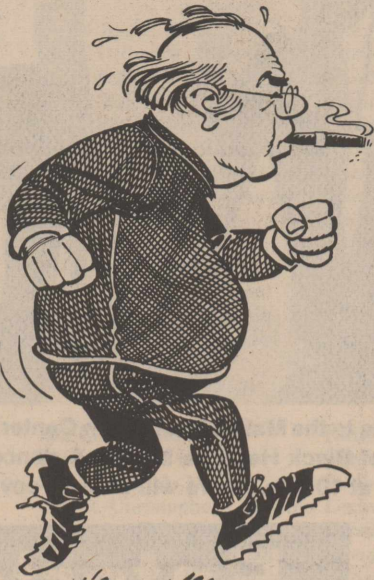
Now, Air Force Physical Fitness Program will increase emphasis on regular conditioning and use a three-mile walk as the annual test for members 35 years of age and over.

Officials said the positive aspects of the program — look good, feel good — must be emphasized and each member be motivated to participate voluntarily.

The change to a three-mile walk as the only test for persons 35 and over is based on evidence they are more prone to heart problems. This is especially true for those who may not have fully prepared themselves for the test. Persons under the age of 35 will continue to have the option of testing by the 1½-mile run, three-mile walk or timed running in place.

The annual physical fitness test is designed to insure that



Air Force members meet and maintain minimum standards. Preconditioning, in the form of a steady, progressive, personalized exercise program is the best way to prepare for the annual test, officials said.

Instructions on how to begin and maintain a regular exercise program in a variety of sporting activities are contained in Air Force Pamphlets 50-56 (male) and 35-57, Volume 1 (female). Officials cautioned that a sharp increase in physical activity without prior conditioning is unwise and possibly harmful. The best method of prevention,

they said, is progressive training and gradual adjustment to an increased level of physical activity. Officials said that the three-mile walk in the prescribed time (43½ minutes for a 35-year old male) is a strenuous test of physical stamina and requires preconditioning.

Officials said it is the individual's responsibility to attain the needed level of physical conditioning in preparation for the annual test. Commanders may authorize participation in physical fitness conditioning during duty hours when mission requirements permit. Program officials explained, however, that the Air Force does not have the luxury of authorizing full, on-duty time for a mandatory, organized conditioning program.

When administering the yearly test, program managers will identify those who have not fully conditioned themselves to physical activity, those who do not feel prepared to test, or those who have a known or suspected cardiac condition. The first two categories should be entered into a training program, while those with a known or suspected heart condition should be referred to a medical facility.

Officials recruit women for missile assignment

The Air Force is continuing its program to assign women to Titan II missile launch duty positions at McConnell AFB, Kan., Davis-Monthan AFB, Ariz., and Little Rock AFB, Ark.

The program is open to retrainees. Officer and enlisted women may apply.

Women captains and majors are needed. Officers seeking crew duty should have at least three years on station before entering technical training. Criteria for selection of officers is contained in AFR 36-1 and AFM 50-5.

Applicants must complete an AF form 90 in accordance with AFR 36-23, and process through normal personnel channels.

Officer applicants may also mail a copy of the form to Headquarters Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center (AFMPC/MPCROS7A), Randolph AFB, Texas 78148.

Criteria for selection of enlisted women is contained in AFR 39-1 and AFM 50-5. Specialties 316XOF and 541XOE are used on Titan launch crews. Training quotas will be programmed throughout 1979.

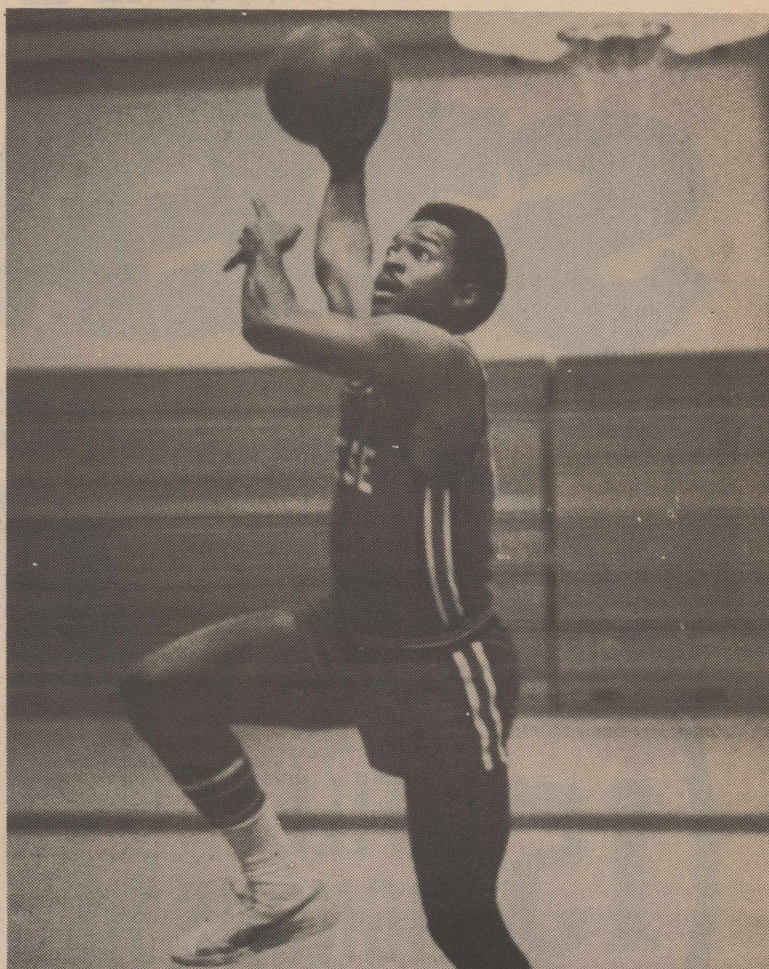
Four teams stay alive in IM tourney action

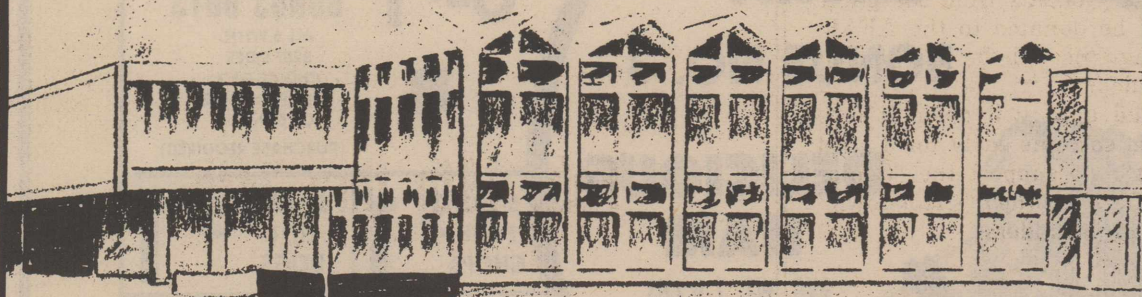

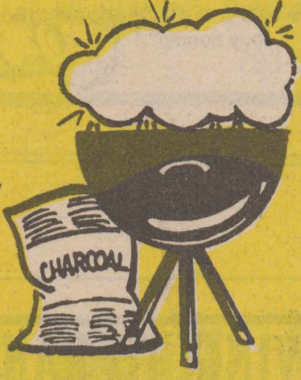
